#### EAST AND WEST GERMANY 1989

#### Report by Bro. Gene Lehman Wolcott, IN

(Continued from November issue) Berlin is a beautiful city in the east, and we saw all the sights it has to offer. We watched the changing of the guard, as they goose-stepped at the German War Memorial, we saw the Brandenburg Gate, ancient entry to the city, the Berlin wall, government buildings, and much besides. We ate a delicious lunch in the shadow of the parliament buildings, and the cost was quite reasonable. We went to the top of the 800-foot television tower which overlooks the entire city, and we also visited the Soviet War Memorial, remembering the thousands of Russian soldiers who gave their lives in the liberation of the city of Berlin. However, nothing was said of the lack of freedom which now exists. The Word says that God creates kings and governments.

By this time it was late afternoon, and all had a ways to travel, so we bid a fond and emotional farewell to Paul and Elke, and Suzanne, whom we had only known for such a short time, yet had felt the tie of love which flows from heart to heart. It is our desire and prayer that we can meet again. Leaving the city of Berlin, we reached Markert's once again in the late evening, which by this time was already Monday. Seigfried and Elisabeth had been there during the day to see us once again, but of course, we were not there, and regretted not having seen them. Weary, yet grateful for the experiences of another day, we soon retired for the night.

When Tuesday dawned, we shared another good German breakfast which Traudel had prepared in the coal range, and afterwards had a short service based upon II Corinthians 5, as suggested by Hans. Gene spoke of the fact that all that exists on earth is but for a short season, and although there may be important people in castles and on the streets of Berlin. we are children of the King, and there is no higher standing on earth or in heaven. It is evident that Hans and others for that matter, feel that the dear "Vater" Arno Markert could soon pass into eternity, we must encourage each other that there awaits a rest for the children of God. It was just one more moving and memorable event in this trip upon which the Lord had opened the way. These dear souls need our prayers that they, as well as we, can retain faith.

# **Light From The Word**

Writings based on God's Word

#### **SERVING SELF OR OTHERS**

Perhaps the most basic temptation faced by man is that of yielding to self-will rather than to the Spirit of God. This had its origin in the downfall of Lucifer, when he became obsessed with himself and said: "I will ascend into heaven, I will exalt my throne above the stars of God . . . I will be like the most High" (Is. 14:13-15). The Apostle Paul warned that this affliction of man's spirit would intensify: "This know also, that in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves . . ." (2 Tim. 3:1-2).

We see a complete contrast in the attitude of the Lord Jesus Christ, who "made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men" (Phil. 2:7). Jesus taught that those who would become His true disciples would have to crucify their own wills, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me" (Matt. 16:24). When self is in control, the influence of the Spirit is greatly hindered: "God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace unto the humble" (Jam. 4:6).

The craving to elevate self was evident in the fall of Eve. Satan approached her with the enticing proposition: "For God doth know that in the day ye eat thereof, then your eyes shall be opened, and ye shall be as gods, knowing good and evil" (Gen. 3:5). She could not resist this intriguing temptation.

Today in our society there is much evidence of growing reliance upon human strength. The belief that man is able to control his destiny and determine truth by his intellectual powers is known as secular humanism. Many of the founders of our nation believed that God is sovereign. Many people today believe man is supreme, which is perhaps a fulfillment of the warning that people will become "lovers of their own selves." Such beliefs result in a distorted value system. For example, vast sums of money are spent to protect endangered species of animals, but it is considered acceptable to destroy unborn babies. In the current abortion controversy, the very name of the movement called "pro-choice" betrays the worship of self and the insistence upon the right to have one's own way. Humanistic philosophy maintains that inconvenience is something humans should not have to endure. Little wonder that we are consumed with litigation over numerous aspects of daily life and the family unit is under siege!

An attitude sometimes surfaces in the corporate world that if an employee's career is hindered because of dedication to meeting family needs, the family should be sacrificed in the name of personal fulfillment and achievement. Life-long commitment of spouses to each other and a willingness to sacrifice for their children are values which are clearly on the decline. Christianity teaches, "give of yourself to others," but humanism says, "take care of number one."

Excessive emphasis on self often manifests itself in materialism and greed. The Apostle Paul wrote. They that will be rich fall into a temptation and a snare" (1 Tim. 6:9). This speaks directly to those whose goal is becoming wealthy, an all too common aspiration in our nation. The advertising field nurtures this by bombarding us with slogans which appeal to emotions and pride. There is little emphasis on the practical value of a particular item or service. Rather the claim is that it will make you feel good about yourself, look attractive, bring recognition, wealth, etc. In reality, trying to fulfill these desires with material things only leads to a self-indulgence which can never be satisfied. Jesus said, "Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal" (Matt. 6:19).

Sometimes our struggles with self are manifested in subtle habits which are not even recognized as selfish. Being habitually late is an example of this. When we frequently make others wait on us, we are subconsciously determining that our time is worth more than that of others. Those with a hasty tongue who readily interrupt others may not truly "esteem others better than them-selves" (Phil. 2:3). When a believer succumbs to the temptation of elevating his opinion above the collective judgments of the church, and then ignores accepted patterns of godliness, this too is a form of selfexaltation. Reluctant service is another example of unwillingness to deny ourselves. We may actually do a favor or carry out a good deed, but we let it be known that we have inconvenienced ourselves. If we would first overcome the struggle with self in our hearts and fully yield to the Spirit, then we would be able to render cheerful service and receive a much greater blessing.

There are abundant blessings promised by God to those who truly put Him first in their lives and seek to follow the selfless example of Christ. "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you" (Matt. 6:33). God permits us to enjoy the fruits of our labors, but we must not set our hearts upon them (Psa. 62:10). "Mine elect shall long enjoy the work of their hands" (Is. 65:22). "Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth" (Col. 3:2).

The greatest joy comes with willing service given for others, motivated by true Christ-like love. The Apostle Paul refers appreciatively to an example of humble service rendered to him while suffering as a prisoner. He writes "The Lord give mercy unto the house of Onesiphorus; for he oft refreshed me, and was not ashamed of my chain" (2 Tim. 1:16). How wonderful to someday be able to hear those beautiful words of the Saviour, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me" (Matt. 25:40).

nist countries, everything runs just by the book. If it is time to begin, one beings; if it is time to quit, one quits; if it is time to each lunch, one eats lunch. Therefore, we sat there about an hour, but when an officer once got to us, we were cleared in about ten minutes. The money we had exchanged when we went into the DDR. we had either spent there, or left with the dear ones we visited, and we had to declare all we took out. Once more. the Almighty went before us. and all was well. It did feel good, we confessed, to be on free soil once again. The first thing Hans did when he had the chance, was to call Dinah, and all was well.

Dinah had supper for us when we returned home on Tuesday night, and all of us being weary from the journey, we retired early. The warm showers and comfortable beds erased the cares of the day, and as we knelt by our beds, as we do each night, all of us thanked our God for His watchful care and mercies shown to us. The next day, Wednesday, Hans drove us to the southern Schwarzwald (Black Forest), where the Lehman ancestors originated. We drove on the autobahn past the city of Stuttgart, where we saw what appeared to be a mountain, but was really an immense pile of the war rubble from the city, now overgrown, and beautiful. Although silent, it still speaks of the horrors of war.

We drove into the village of Weiler, and stopping at the Evangelical Parrish Office, soon found the records of our family. The lady secretary was most kind to us, and went beyond the call of duty to serve us. We expressed our gratitude to her as best we could.

Then we drove to the small village called Burgberg, where Grandfather Lehmann was born, in search of the house, of which we had a photo. We parked our car, and across the street, there stood a lady with a small girl. Gene walked across the street, and asked the lady in German if she knew where the house in the picture was.

## KINDERGARTEN TEACHER NEEDED IN JAPAN

Our church in Japan has a kindergarten where Sis. Renee Baurer and Sis. Terri Gramm are now teaching. There will be a need for a sister to teach for two years, through March of 1992. A sister who has the faith and conviction to apply for this position should speak to her elder and if he approves, apply to the missionary committee for consideration.

All expenses involved in the two-year stay in Japan are paid by the church. The sister is asked to give two or more years of her life in Japan at some sacrifice of compensation, although we do pay, in addition to expenses, a small monthly salary.

Bible stories are taught every day in the kindergarten. English is the language of instruction, but incoming teachers are encouraged to begin studying the Japanese language before coming to Japan. This is helpful in communicating with the Japanese people and in singing the hymns in Japanese.

The teachers are presently living in a new, modern apartment about a 10minute walk from the church.

There may be a former teaching brother or sister who had served in Japan and was acquainted with the language, or a retired teacher who would be willing to give of himself or herself. A brother or sister without a teaching certificate would be considered. Even one year would be appreciated. Anyone touched in heart should most prayerfully commit it to our gracius God, talk to his or her family and then to their local shepherd. May God provide for our need and may His will be done.

To his utter astonishment, she replied, "Das ist mein Haus." -- "This is my house." After all we had experienced in the past week, it was almost too much to believe at that point. As tears flooded his eyes. Gene called to Hans to come and listen to make certain that what he heard was indeed true, but it was. The kind lady directed us to the house, showed us inside and out, and gave us the utmost in hospitality. We took photos, and Pete and Gene searched through the area across a small stream for the ruins of the bone mill which Greatgrandpa Friedrich Lehmann, an elder in the early church in Germany had operated. Finding only a stone wall, we assumed that after 150 years we were in the right place, and headed back through the underbrush to the little town. Gene picked up a handful of small stones along the path which his ancestors had walked, thinking, as he did so, of the peace and tranquility of the place. He reflected that perhaps they, like he, had found the presence of God in nature, and in their time were comforted as he was. Words cannot describe the feelings of heart at that time.

We ate a delicious and more than ample lunch in a Gasthof in that little town, and as we were leaving, a car drew up. Here was the lady of the house with her husband one more time, a relationship developed. We have their address, and they wish to correspond with those in America who have roots in their home.

We left Burgberg, going to Villin-



gen, a larger town in the southern Schwarzald, where we spent some time shopping and buying a few tokens of memories of the Black Forest. We returned to Adolzfurt to Hans' son, Gerhardt's, for supper.

In the morning, we bid a fond farewell to Dinah, and the four of us who had shared so much together set out for the Frankfurt airport for our flight home. Pete left first, and there was a bit of a crash program putting it all together, but all went well.

When Peter had left, Hans found Verna and Gene, and the time of parting came. As we kissed and embraced, the love flowed from heart to heart, as we knew for certain that we had found a kindred spirit many miles distant. Seldom in life have emotions gone so deep in such a short time. All of us agreed, that no matter how long life lasts for any of us, we will never, never forget the experiences we had made together, and it is our hope, trust and prayer, that we can meet again.

In a brief summation, Gene reflects that he is 53 years old, and life for him up tot his time has been full. Yet, putting all together, never has he made an experience so moving and memorable. To God alone belong all praise, honor and glory.

#### CALIFORNIA, MAYWOOD Elder Bro. John Klotzle

"... to everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven . . ."

**Ecclesiastes 3:1** 

It appears that the time and the season has come and the course has been run for our beloved church at Maywood. For just about 60 years this haven for souls has provided a beacon of light and truth in the midst of a vast metropolitan area. With the passing of years and the transition of the neighborhood into a predominately Hispanic culture, the small flock has dwindled to 4 elderly members and a few friends.

The congregation was established in 1929 with several members who had moved from the midwest to Los Angeles who met in homes. In 1934 Bro. John Dapper was appointed as the first minister. A small bungalowtype church building was erected in 1938. During World War II many servicemen found warm hospitality among the Maywood families and fed on God's Holy Word and basked in the warmth of the fellowship of the brethren in this small church.

After the war, a number of families moved to the area and just prior to the establishment of the Altadena congregation, the Maywood church had grown to a peak of 52 members. The church building was expanded in 1952. The church flourished for a number of years. However, with the passing of time, the decease of a number of the older members and the gradual emigration of a number of families to churches in the midwest, the size of the congregation diminished. Since the late 1970's the Altadena ministers have been serving Maywood.

As reluctant as we have been to consider concluding holding services in Maywood, the emotional and sentimental attachments have had to give way to facing the practical realities of having to maintain a building with the seating capacity of over 100 for the use of so very few.

After counseling with the elder body and much prayerful consideration, we have felt led to combine the two congregations, Maywood with Altadena, and sell the Maywood

(Continued from Page 36) lent today because people do not have the knowledge of the Word of God and they don't have the peace and they don't have the grace. Therefore, how else could they be? What else would we expect of the world?

But, for us today, we need to grow in the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ. He tells us this. It says that we can do it through the knowledge. Also It says through the Lord Jesus Christ, not only can we have this peace and this grace, but we can have these great promises. (See II Peter 1:3, 4).

The Bible tells us that God, who cannot lie, (think about that!), God who cannot lie by an oath promised us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these we can be partakers of the divine nature! (See II Peter 1:4). That is the nature of God!

Isn't that what the Bible teaches us as we think about conversion? What happens in a person's life when they become converted? Isn't the old man dead? Isn't the new man supposed to be after Christ? Aren't we supposed to have the mind of Christ? Doesn't the Bible say to renew your mind?

This is the thing that can be ours by the divine promises and the power of God. It is possible. We can be above the things of this world. We don't have to be entangled in the things of this world. We don't have to be trapped in their snare and be under their influence. We don't have to be shackled with sin. We don't have to be in bondage again.

We can be really liberated . . . really free! When we think about the divine power that is in the Lord Jesus Christ, remember that He was resurrected from the grave. Death had no more victory over Him. The grave couldn't hold Him, but that power was there to bring Him out of the grave and set Him at the Father's right hand.

Now, as a part of the believing family that we sang about, we are also heirs and we have the inheritance. We have the promise that we, too, will inherit the Kingdom of Heaven. All we have to do is, what? Remain faithful. That is all God asks of us. Just be faithful in God's Word and in following after His Son and the promise is yours!

As we think about having faith, we also have to grow. Remember we

need to grow! There is a Scripture that says there were those people that when it was time that they should have been well on their way . . . well grounded . . . well with the knowledge of the Lord . . . enough time had passed that they should have had a full understanding and a pretty good foundation of what Christian living was all about, yet, we find that the Word tells us they were still like little babes. They were surviving on the milk. Why? Probably because they didn't put too much effort into it. They probably didn't take much time to read the Word of God.

They were just living for themselves. They were probably people who had made a beginning and just kind of quit right there. They realized they needed Christ as their Saviour and to be forgiven of their sins and so they probably repented and they probably asked the Lord into their lives and to forgive them.

But when they became baptized, they probably just kind of quit and just thought, "I'm safe. I'm inside the fold and secure. I really don't have to put forth any effort or be diligent any more. I am just going to kind of coast through my Christian life." They never really had a good understanding. They didn't search the Scriptures. They didn't really look to see what was the exceeding great promises and the power they had in Christ Jesus. They were just babes.

But then there were those people, the Bible says, who fed on the meat of the Word. They really were hungry and they thirsted for righteousness. Jesus said, "Those are the people that will be filled. Those are the ones that will be satisfied." Oh, those are the people that will have a precious, precious faith because they are really sincere and looking into the Word of God.

That's what the Bible always encourages. It always prods us, doesn't it, to understand, to do right, to do better, to gain that higher ground, and to walk close with the Lord? Doesn't the Word always encourage us to do this? We can find that it is easy for us to get kind of mediocre and just kind of lax and lazy and just go from day to day. Next thing you know, the week is gone by and we go on to the next week.

I heard it said one time that, Seven

days without prayer makes one weak. It sure does, doesn't it?

Peter says here, "... if ye do these things, ye shall never fall." II Peter 1:10. There is not one of us that wants to miss the saint's reward, is there? None of us want to miss heaven, do we? If we didn't really care about heaven, we wouldn't really care about being here again. But there is not one of us in this room here that if we were given the chance right now to make a decision whether we want to go to heaven or not, everyone of us would choose heaven.

Yet, the Bible tells us how it is, that "... many are called, but few are chosen." Matthew 22:14. Also the one way is broad and how wide it is and how the gate is wide and how many people are on that road that leads to destruction. Very few people are on the narrow way that leads to eternal life. (See Matthew 7:13 - 14).

There is a lot of people that would love to go to heaven, but there is a lot of people that don't care much about looking into God's Word to see how to get to heaven.

Peter tell us here that we can do these things, and It says, "For if these things be in you, and abound, they make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ." II Peter 1:8. I was reading in chapter 15 in John yesterday about being part of the vine . . . being the branches and bearing fruit. (See John 15:5). You know, it is the Lord's will that we bear much fruit.

The branches that are unfruitful, the Word tells us that God is the Husbandman and He is the One that comes by and prunes and trims back and makes it so we can bear fruit. But those branches that never give fruit, He cuts off and He casts them away and they are not even good for anything but to be burned. (See John 15:6).

We try to exhort on these things. The Bible tells us, we shall "... suffer the word of exhortation." Hebrews 13:22. Many times it is not so easy, is it? We don't like to be exhorted, many times, In other words, we don't like people telling us what we have to do. That takes humility, doesn't it? It really take humility, because we like to be able to think we can do things on our own, understand our own, and we can figure out our own way.

He says here if we add to our faith virtue, knowledge, temperance, patience, godliness, brotherly kindness, and charity, he tells us how those things will help us to abound and be fruitful. (See II Peter 1:5-8).

This is what he is saying here, "But he that lacketh these things is blind, and cannot see afar off, and hath forgotten that he was purged from his old sins." II Peter 1:9. Do you see what is happening to this person here? This is one that will not listen. It is one that has just kind of neglected to hear the Word ... neglected to come to church . . . neglected prayer ... neglected reading ... probably has gotten more involved with the world again after he was washed and was separated from the world . . . probably one that has gone back again to the old life that he once lived.

We see that this type of person wouldn't hear. He wouldn't give much concern for the things that were being preached. He probably was a person that wasn't concerned with the brotherhood. He probably wouldn't take correction. He probably wouldn't take admonishment. He probably wouldn't look at others as examples. He probably was kind of a rebel or something like that. He had to do it his own way or be his own man. That's a pretty big philosophy today. You can see what can happen to a person in that situation. The thing that he forgot was that he was purged from his old sins!

I think if we are ever going to acquire a close walk with the Lord Jesus Christ, there is one thing that we always need to remember: That we are sinners saved by grace. That is it! By the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, we are in the family of God. Only by His grace can we even think about this eternity or this promise He has given us of life eternal in heaven.

If ever the time comes in our hearts and we forget about the cost of sin and the price that cost our Saviour, the Bible says that it was not with silver and gold or things like that that we were purchased. But it was with the precious blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. A Sinless Man shed His blood for you and me.

Whenever we forget that cost, I think we are in trouble. Because then we will go back in the world and say, "What is so bad about this? This doesn't matter much and it is not a big deal. Why should people be concerned about what I do and my life? They should just leave me alone." Live and let live, and that sort of attitude and it can be very detrimental to a person's spiritual life.

He says here, "Wherefore the rather, brethren, give diligence to make your calling and election sure." II Peter 1:10. Make it sure!

There are people that want to talk about eternal security and there are people who want to talk about once saved, always saved. There are a lot of different doctrines floating around in the world today. But when we come to the Word of God and have a clear understanding of what God's Word says, we know there is a calling, don't we? We know that there is a calling! God calls us, and we have an opportunity to answer that calling.

There are going to be testimonies today of people who answered that call. Because they heard God call them to Himself and say, "Repent before it is too late. Repent and come to Me and I'll cleanse you from all unrighteousness."

There is a calling and there is an election, isn't there? Who is the One that has to be satisfied with us when we talk about having peace and about having that assurance?

I can tell you today that I have assurance that if I died today at this very moment, if I died right this moment, I assure you that by the grace of God, I would go to heaven. But let me tell you this, that election, that assurance that I have is not the fact that I am an Apostolic Christian. It's not based on the fact that I'm a minister. It's not based on the fact of anything that I have accomplished or done in life.

But my assurance is based in my heart by the fact that I have peace with God. That is it! I know that God has accepted me!

I know that He has accepted each one of you that walk according to this Word by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and are serving God.

There is such a thing that we can know that we are of the family of God. There is such a thing to know that we can have assurance that our names are written in the Book of Life. It can be assured! These are the exceeding great promises! This is part of it, that we can know that we are saved!

We don't ever take that salvation for granted, do we? We don't ever just say, "Well, I know I am saved, so it doesn't matter what type of lifestyle I lead, or which way the pathway goes for me from now on because I know that when the times comes, I am going to heaven." That would be foolish, wouldn't it? Because God still has to be the One that is satisfied with us. God has to be the One that is satisfied and that is why it is so important we search our hearts and find out if there is any unclean thing within us because God knows our hearts.

It is important that God is the One that says whether or not because Jesus is the One Who is going to say, "Welcome into My kingdom." Or, "Depart from Me." Do you see? It is going to be up to Him. He is the One who is going to have the final authority. So it doesn't matter what people think of me; it matters what God thinks of me. That is why I have to look into the Word, too, to find out whether or not I have peace with God or whether or not I have peace with God or whether I'm doing the Lord's will or not.

This isn't something new, is it? I am not telling you anything new today. You've heard this before. Peter said the same thing, "You know all this." But it is for remembrance . . . it is bringing it to your remembrance. It is being told over and over again.

What are the things in life that you are most assured of? Isn't it the things that you know beyond a shadow of a doubt? Isn't it the things that you know to be true that you are really assured of? That you can say "yes" to and "no" to, and you know that it will be like this, or it won't be like that and this is the way it will go?

The things that we have knowledge in are the things that we can really be assured of. The Bible tells us that we can really be assured in the salvation of the Lord Jesus Christ by the knowledge of Him in the Word.

Do you think that someone could sing the Twenty-Third Psalm without really having confidence or assurance? Do you think that someone could come right to the brink of death and say that they know that it is well with their soul if they didn't have the knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ or faith in Him? It would be impossible, wouldn't it?

But, we know it, and that is why we are putting ourselves in remembrance of it today. I think it was Paul who said this thing wasn't done in a corner. This thing wasn't something that was done in secret but this was out in the open. The Lord Jesus Christ manifested Himself unto the world and right there in the Roman Empire, right in the midst of all modern civilization, the Lord Jesus Christ came into this world, and by many infallible proofs.

He did everything and the Bible tells us that if all the things were written about the Lord...if it was all put into books, the world itself could not contain the books necessary to write down all the things He did. (See John 21:25).

But these things are written, and they are written, why? So that we might believe. Believe in what? You might have life! You might have life and that you might not be blind and not see far off, but you might have life.

When you go to the hospital and see people with death so close, or people that are just eaten up with cancer, or so old that their bodies are just decaying and there is not much life left in them, somehow you wish they could have a couple more years, and they could get well again, get out of the hospital and get our of that condition. You just wish that for them because we like to see people enjoy life.

We like to see people have life. But what is life? What is life without Jesus Christ? What is life if we don't have the hope of salvation? What do people have to look forward to if they don't have a Saviour? What is it all about?

There is a song -- a secular song -- that had that title, "What Is It All About?" Why are we here? What is the purpose of our being born and living in this world? What is it all about?

It is all about Jesus Christ and His love that He has for mankind, and not wishing that anyone would perish, but that all would come to the knowledge of His Son and be saved. (See John 3:16). This is the fullness of life and it is in Christ.

### SERMON BY BRO. MICHAEL THOMAS OF VALPARAISO, IN "You Can Know You Have Salvation"

II Peter 1

When we read these Epistles of Peter, somehow we get a different picture of him than he was during the time when he was following the Lord with the other disciples. Because we see here that Peter has a more clear picture, doesn't he, than he had then? He understood more about what the Lord had taught them.

Remember when they were with the Lord Jesus Christ that He told them some of the things they didn't quite understand at that moment, but that there would be a time when the Holy Ghost would come and He would reveal unto them whatsoever things Jesus had been trying to explain to them. Then they would come and be clear in their minds.

So we see as Peter writes these Epistles today, he has a very good understanding of salvation ... of the work of Christ . . . and of being a follower or a disciple of the Lord.

Now the question today is, can we give a good answer if we were called upon today? Remember the Word tells us that we should be ready always to give an answer to someone that might ask us of the hope that lies within us. Do we have enough knowledge of the Word of God to be able to tell somebody else about salvation?

I think a lot of times we get a little fearful and a little afraid because we think we have to be able to explain all the Bible in all aspects of it. But that is not really what the Lord wants us to be able to do. But be able to have faith, first of all, faith in the Lord Jesus Christ!

As Peter told it here, it becomes precious faith. (See II Peter 1:1). Have you ever thought about that? Is your faith precious to you today? Or is it taken for granted? Is it something we just kind of expect to be with us day after day as we go through life?

You know, all men do not have faith. Everybody doesn't believe in the Lord Jesus Christ. There was a time when we didn't have the faith. Remember what it was like for us outside the faith? We found ourselves awaken by the Word of God and we found ourselves lost and without hope in the world. Think about that.

Let's go back to the time when we were lost and without hope because we didn't have the Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ. But today, by the grace of God we are able to believe in Him and receive Him as our Saviour. Now as we think about our position in Christ now, the Word tells us that we should go on. There are things that accompany salvation, isn't there?

The Bible doesn't just stop with the believing in the Lord Jesus Christ, but it goes on unto perfection. (See Hebrews 6:1). That's the Word. It tells us. It seems like this is what happened to Peter, didn't it? He had knowledge. Remember when the Lord asked Peter, "Whom do the men say I am?" He said, "Some say a prophet, this one and that one." The Lord asked Peter, "But whom do you say I am?" He said, "Thou are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Matthew 16:16. That was the basis the Lord was going to build His church upon.

We could see that Peter believed that, but yet there were times that Peter didn't quite have it all together. I would dare to say, that as Peter was writing this Epistle here, he had a pretty good understanding, didn't he? He had a pretty good understanding and it came from the knowledge of the Word of God.

Is there any time that you can spend in the Word of God that is not beneficial for you? Every opportunity that you have to gather around the Word... to pick up the Bible at home ... to somehow hear the Word of God, it is always a benefit to your soul. Because it can help you faithfully serving the Lord and following after Him.

It says this is the precious faith (II Peter 1:1) and I think we need to realize how precious it is. Don't take it for granted.

He says, "Grace and peace be multiplied unto you through the knowledge of God, and of Jesus our Lord." II Peter 1:2. Look in the world today and you see a lot of people that are just frustrated . . . just mentally disturbed. People just don't know how to cope with life hardly anymore. They really have a hard time of being able to go through life.

We see here that we can have, "According to his divine power hath given unto us all things..." II Peter 1:3. It is the power of God that can give us a sound mind! That is so important today, isn't it, when you think about it?

Because we see today a lot of people just throw up their hands and quit. That's why probably suicide and it's probably why drugs and probably why every other thing that is so contrary to the Word of God is so preva-
