HOLY SCRIPTURES AND OTHER RELIGIOUS BOOKS TO RUSSIA

Elder Bro. Ben Maibach We have all been astonished recently at the breaking down of many barriers in Europe that have existed for at least 40 years between many of the communist bloc nations and the so-called free world.

It is our prayer that in these newly gained liberties our heavenly Father, who made it all possible, will not be forgotten, and in recognition of many answered prayers that oppressed souls will lift up voices of praise and thanksgiving to our creator. We must remember, however, that many of these people are still walking in darkness, and it becomes our responsibility as much as reasonable to share with them the glorious hope of the Holy Scriptures.

Many of our brethren have inquired as to what can be done to share the holy truth with those who formerly were prevented from obtaining the Bible, as the borders were closed to the introduction of any religious material including song books.

The Elgin, Illinois, congregation has found a source of approximately 6,000 plus Russian Holy Scripture, as well as name of people who have requested God's Word. They have sent approximately 200 Bibles and received word that they had actually been delivered. At a Mission Committee meeting in Chicago, IL, December 7, 1989, Bro. Wendell Gudeman, on behalf of the World Relief Committee met with us. He had in hand a Russian language Bible and children's Bible story books in the Russian language with the same pictures as those many of us have used in our own homes as well as in our Sunday schools.

It was agreed that we should contact Elder Bro. Petro Karcsa whom Bro. Wendell and I had met in Hungary in June 1988 and with whom we spend an enjoyable week visiting the various churches there. Bro. Petro is from the Ukraine not far from Kiev. He visited the United States this past summer and we had the blessed privilege of having him minister in our Detroit church as well as spend some time in our home. He related many stories of the growth of the faith in Russia. We were impressed with his sincerity.

In December we sent a package of Bibles and children's Bible story books to Bro. Petro for his examination and to ascertain that the translation of

Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

THE FRUITS OF REPENTANCE

Fruit is produced from the inherent substance of a living organism. Therefore fruit is a part of that organism, and its qualities demonstrate the nature of the plant which produced it. Carrying this theme from the physical into the spiritual, fruit is visible evidence of what rests within the heart of man.

The concept of fruit as a result of God's creation comes to light very early in Scripture. After forming sea and land, God then said, "Let the earth bring forth grass, the herb yielding seed, and the fruit tree yielding fruit after his kind" (Gen.1:11). This demonstrated the expectation of the Almighty as He formed that which in His divine eyes was "very good" (Gen. 1:31).

Repentance can be defined as a change of mind and spirit which results in sorrow for sin and a turning away from it. John the Baptist preached, "Bring forth therefore fruits meet for repentance" (Matt. 3:8). The people were exhorted to repent and bring forth appropriate changes in their lives. The Apostle Paul proclaimed the message of salvation through faith in Christ Jesus to mankind, and taught, ... that they should repent and turn to God, and do works meet for repentance" (Acts 26:20). Condemnation comes through the works of the flesh (Gal. 5:19-21), and salvation comes by grace through faith (Eph. 2:8). Good works cannot achieve salvation, but they are an inevitable result of true faith, a testimony of God's work in the heart (Jam. 2:17), "Repentance from dead works and faith toward God" (Heb. 6:1) are principles of the doctrine of Christ.

In the New Testament the subject of repentance nearly always refers to turning away from sin. One outstanding example is the story of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32). This young man wasted himself and his inheritance, finally reaching a desperate state in which he came to himself and returned in deep

remorse to his father. This and other Scriptures confirm that there can be no true fulfillment of repentance unless there is a turning away from sin (Prov. 28:13; John 8:10-11; 2 Cor. 7:9-11; Jam. 4:8-10).

However, even more striking than what the Prodigal Son did is the example of the forgiving father, who welcomed the son in his repentant state with arms of love and compassion. Repentance involves not only what we do, but more importantly what God in His infinite mercy has done for us in sending his Son to pay the price for our transgressions so that we might be forgiven. We respond by faith and fruit bearing (Rom. 6:22).

The act of turning from sin, repenting in earnestness, finding forgiveness and peace with God and man need not take a long time. This varies with each individual and involves development of sufficient faith to grasp the reality of God's forgiveness. God justifies an individual when he sees genuine faith in the shed blood of His Son, the Lord Jesus. Conversion is an experience which takes time and is manifested by a new heart and lifestyle. "And they that are Christ's have crucified the flesh with the affections and lusts" (Gal. 5:24) and ... put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness" (Eph. 4:24). The bearing of fruit is a long process. It takes a lifetime of self denial and walking with God to bring forth the finest fruit (Jam. 5:7-8).

Repentance and conversion bring about an entire change in attitude, with fruit of the Spirit becoming manifest in the life of the true believer. Our lives should demonstrate, "love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance..." (Gal. 5:22-23). Baptism is the symbolic burial of the old sinful nature into the death of Christ, and the arising to a newness of life in Christ Jesus (Rom. 6:3-6). Fruit bearing begins when a convert turns to the Lord in repentance and begins to be transformed by the renewing of his mind (Rom. 12:2). The fruits become quite apparent if there is a genuine conversion. Jesus said that we are known by our fruits (Matt. 12:33).

As a result of his change in attitude and the crucifixion of his fleshly nature, the convert loses interest in the things of the flesh which once preoccupied his life. A hymnwriter once wrote, "...and the things of earth will grow strangely dim, in the light of His glory and grace." The convert's manner of living changes; no longer serving flesh and sin, he associates himself with things of the Spririt. The companions with whom he revelled in the world notice his disinterest in those things he formerly enjoyed (1 Pet. 4:4). His actions and appearance testify that he has chosen to be separate from the world. "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you" (2 Cor. 6:17). "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service" (Rom. 12:1).

Thus our duty is clearly to bring forth the fruits of repentance and then to devote our entire life time to fruit bearing. It is most sobering to realize the tremendous price God paid in sending His Son for the redemption of the sin debt which we owed and could not pay, and then to perceive His great expectations of our enduring fruitfulness (Col. 1:10).

As does the tree, faithfully putting on new leaves each season, bearing fruit with patience, arms uplifted toward God—so may each one of us, rooted in the Word of God, faithfully strive to bear much fruit. Even those fruits which come years after one's conversion still emanate from that foundation of true repentance and faith in Christ, which changed the course of life, and gave us the blessed hope of eternal life.

Hurricane Hugo Work Team Project - Awendaw, SC

Work teams will be needed through the winter months, due to the destruction of Hurricane Hugo. Many families will not be able to occupy their home this winter because of storm and flood damage caused by Hurricane Hugo.

All building skills are needed to repair and renovate these damaged homes. Due to the distances involved, it is recommended that plans be made to spend $4^{1/2}$ to 5 working days minimum at the job site, if possible.

KINDERGARTEN TEACHER NEEDED IN JAPAN

Our church in Japan has a kindergarten where Sis. Renee Baurer and Sis. Terri Gramm are now teaching. There will be a need for a sister to teach for two years, through March of 1992. A sister who has the faith and conviction to apply for this position should speak to her elder and if he approves, apply to the missionary committee for consideration.

All expenses involved in the two-year stay in Japan are paid by the church. The sister is asked to give two or more years of her life in Japan at some sacrifice of compensation, although we do pay, in addition to expenses, a small monthly salary.

Bible stories are taught every day in the kindergarten. English is the language of instruction, but incoming teachers are encouraged to begin studying the Japanese language before coming to Japan. This is helpful in communicating with the Japanese people and in singing the hymns in Japanese.

The teachers are presently living in a new, modern apartment about a 10minute walk from the church.

There may be a former teaching brother or sister who had served in Japan and was acquainted with the language, or a retired teacher who would be willing to give of himself or herself. A brother or sister without a teaching certificate would be considered. Even one year would be appreciated. Anyone touched in heart should most prayerfully commit it to our gracius God, talk to his or her family and then to their local shepherd. May God provide for our need and may His will be done.

In 1984 we read in the Guideposts concerning the unfilled need for 10,000 Bibles. We wrote to the organization and started sending some repaired and some new Bibles. Since that time, we have sent over 500 Bibles, much Sunday school materials and song books.

During this past year, Sisters Becky Knapp (Dave) and Jane Huette (Curtis) from Goodfield, IL, have been helping in this work.

If our churches or individual members have Bibles, Bible story books, Hymns of Zion, Tabernacle or Gospel Hymns that are worn and in need of repair, please let us know or send them to us. We tape and repair the books and obtain names and addresses of people in foreign countries who want and need them, package and mail them in large canvas mailing bags. It costs 55φ a pound to send books or \$1.10 for printed material of less than 30 pages. On a recent shipment to Africa, the cost to send a Bible was 72φ .

(Continued from Page 32) trust Him for what is out ahead, we certainly will be able to make it to the end of our days, regardless of how well we are educated.

It is a wonderfully story when we look into the Word of God and find how Abraham, in the beginning of His life, was led unto a promised land to big descendents who believed

... to his descendants who believed the same way he believed.

I think we can hardly understand in our own day, how much separation there was between the Jews and the Gentiles, and how thoroughly these people depended upon the law. But in Galatians, it tells us the law was simply the schoolmaster. (See Galatians 3:24). The law actually told men what was really right and wrong. Until there was something specific to tell what was right and wrong, sin was not charged.

Now then, "What shall we say then that Abraham our father, as pertaining to the flesh, hath found?" Romans 4:1. We know, loved ones, that when God talked to him, he obeyed. There was one impatient time in his life and it causes trouble yet today. Not that we are looking for somebody to blame the difficulties between the Arabs and the Jews. But here was a man who tried to obey God and follow Him with all his heart.

"For what saith the scripture? Abraham believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness." Romans 4:3. He believed God. Now then, with all the years that have passed by and all of the Scripture that has been added to the Word since that time, how well do we believe Almighty God in our own day?

Do we really believe that He loves us? Do we really believe that He is concerned about us? And that He will take care of us? Do we really believe that a good dose of tribulation or hardship or trouble is actually good for us? Or does it make us feel like He is working against us?

Our Aunt Nettie is in the hospital right now, and some of us first cousins have said, "Poor Aunt Nettie!" But why not just trust Almighty God? He is certainly aware that she is ninety-four years old . . . certainly aware that she would like to go home. So do we really believe He is going to take care of her and just take her right to that last day that she should live? He really will, won't He?

So when our own tests and our own trials come, rather than lamenting what is happening to us, almost being embarrassed over what is happening to us, why not be sure to ask Him, "What is it supposed to mean to me? What is this supposed to do for me?" Can we really believe He is not going to destroy us?

He is going to strengthen and restore us and make us more fit for His use and for His service. He has something for all of us to do.

Here was a man who believed God. He believed to the point that he obeyed Him. he moved when he was supposed to move and it was accounted unto him for righteousness.

"Blessed are they whose iniquities are forgiven, and whose sins are covered. Blessed is the man to whom the Lord will not impute sin." Romans 4;7, 8. David, in Psalms 103:3, wrote much the same thing.

If any of us are not at peace with Almighty God today, if any of us are concerned about ourselves, if any of us are afraid of death, here we have God's Word that our faith -- our believing what God has caused to be written in this Book -- will take care of whatever is wrong in our life.

Remember, "to believe" in Greek requires five English words to bring full meaning: to adhere to the Word, to cleave to the Word, to have faith in the Word, to trust in the Word, and to rely upon the Word.

To that extent, following the teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ for repentance, conversion and baptism, certainly our life can be cleansed from within, have peace with God and we can feel good about ourselves and have no fear about the future.

"Perfect love casteth out fear." I John 4:18.

What counted to us for righteousness because we believe God as did father Abraham? What did it say? Through him all nations of the earth should be blessed. (See Galatians 3:8, 9). We know that that phrase certainly points to the work of our Lord Jesus Christ, but the Lord Jesus is not here.

Before He left the earth, He turned the church over to men, to the believing people. That blessing has continued only by those who believe God.

Our immediate neighbors, but not only those, anything that we can do that benefits people a thousand or twelve thousand miles away, is still a blessing through the Lord Jesus Christ, of the sending out of that Word.

Those people who pick up and leave their homes and go into a wilderness land and leave comfort behind have chosen a more difficult way than we have the easier way back home but there does need to be support back home.

So when we look at our own lives, and the things that we are most concerned about, we are overlooking the promises of Almighty God. I know we are concerned about weather itself, aren't we? The fact that nearly forty percent of the church lives from agriculture, the weather really is a big thing to us. We depend upon Him for our blessings. So we are concerned what it will be like in the coming year.

But He knows that, doesn't He? Just remember the people in the shop have the same concern. A company can change hands and the man who has been on the job for twenty-five or thirty years can lose his job overnight. We could just worry about that, if we are inclined to worry.

We really are in His care. We really do need to look to Him for our help and strength.

Take a look at what happened to Abraham. "He staggered not at the promise of God through unbelief; but was strong in faith, giving glory to God; And being fully persuaded that, what he had promised, he was able also to perform. And therefore it was imputed to him for righteousness." Romans 4:20-22.

"What He has promised. He was able also to perform." Romans 4:21. Do you know what Jesus said just before He ascended into heaven? "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." Matthew 28:20. Do we believe that?

There was another time that Abraham didn't stagger. Back at that time, people were offering up their children to gods. God told Abraham, "Take thy son," and He even said it in a more emphatic way. "Thine only son, and offer him up." (See Genesis 22:2).

Then He made it a little more difficult. He didn't tell him to go out in his backyard, but He told him to go to a certain place. It was three days away. Can you imagine what our hearts would be like if we had to take our child and go on a three-day journey and know that at the end of that journey, we would lose our child by our own choice? We ourselves would offer him up and lose his life?

How did Abraham handle it? Abraham decided that even after he was dead, God could really bring him back to life. All of this was accounted to him for righteousness . . . made him right in the sight of God! (See Galatians 3:6). Adam and Eve were in the garden. They had that whole garden at their disposal. There was only one restriction, and that was the thing they did wrong. There was just one absolute moral right or wrong. When Eve drew too near that tree, too close to the place of temptation, then the devil began to walk to her, caused her to doubt, and when she looked, she took. Then she influenced her husband, and paradise was lost.

God did not cast away mankind at that point. It is the same way in our own lives. When something goes wrong, that is not the end of things. There is always a way that a man can again be justified, made right in the sight of God. In that day, they needed to be clothed with the skins of animals so they were not ashamed.

In our own day, by our faith, by believing upon Him to the point that it is considered righteousness, we are clothed with the righteousness of Jesus Christ.

So do we really stagger? Do we hesitate about the way the Bible is written in comparison to our own lives? Or do we really believe He is going to see us to the very end? Indeed, He will! In those times when life is trying, and we all get our turns, loved ones, over and over there will be those times that just seems as if there is no way out.

I am amazed at the number of people, when they get to that point, who tell me they don't want to live any longer. But that is not the way to handle it, is it?

There is just one way... just at that point, believe like you never believed before. Just kneel down with the Bible open in front of you and plead with your heavenly Father for the solution.

Everything is so clear, so plain, and so easy for Him and He has the power to bring about His answer of His solution to our problem. He has the strength to do it. No matter how impossible it might seem to us, he is able to do it. This is how all things are done.

When we need to turn to Almighty God, when we are weary and tired of life itself, and we are in need of conversion, all we need to do is make that choice to draw near to Him. The rest of it comes about, not by any human intention, or not any ability. He doesn't put it that way. He doesn't say that we have to be of a certain intelligence. He doesn't say we need certain capabilities.

There are not any prerequisites when we come to Him, but we just come to Him with a fully submissive heart, willing to give our lives over to Him, trust Him for the rest of this life and the next million years. Then after that, He will still continue to take care of us.

So whether we can read our own name, or whether we are at the top of the class, we are still in the same place. We need to believe Him when He speaks to us.

People so often ask, "What is the difference between the Old Testament and the New Testament?" Not very much...just the ceremonial sacrifice is abolished for the greatest extent. But we need to believe just the way the father of faith, Abraham himself, believed in his own day. When God said, "Move," he moved. He followed.

There was a famine in that land and he had to pick up and go to Egypt for awhile. He could have complained, "What do you mean? I came to where you wanted me to come and now I have to move again?" That wasn't the point.

When God speaks to us, He wants us to believe Him. It will be counted to us for righteousness in this day as much as it was in Abraham's day.

"Believe God As Abraham Did" Romans 3:28 - 5:2

It is really something to be thankful when we think how clearly we are able to understand our present position before the Lord. To be able to stand in grace and have the privilege to just as firmly believe as Abraham believed in his own day, is a blessing within itself.

As people, we just miss the mark so very many times when we think about our earthly sojourn. We seem to have so much attached to how well we live, and how well we are getting along. We seem to be so concerned about having good incomes, having nice homes, driving nice cars, and wearing good clothing. Loved ones, this is all a part of vanity.

All too often -- and I need to be reminded of these things just as well as anyone else -- among believers, we just put so much emphasis upon life here that we forget about our real mission. Just remember, there are countless people upon the face of the earth that do not have the Word of God.

The entire Bible is only translated into three hundred languages. There are far more languages upon the earth into which the Bible is not translated than there is. There are possibly over five thousand tongues and dialects.

The Book of John is in print more than any other Gospel . . . just that one portion. Really, if any man had just that portion, he could easily draw nigh to Almighty God.

Now then, God is altogether different to so many people upon the face of the earth than He is to us. Almost all men worship something, some kind of a god far beyond themselves; and that proof actually comes When a man who has never seen a printed page looks up into the sky and sees the sun, the moon and the stars, and he sees the function of the earth, and he may not have a watch, but by the sun, he is able to tell time.

to them by the creation itself.

He begins to marvel as a young person that there is something absolutely wonderful about all the creation and he believes in some kind of god. That sense of right and wrong that is in the heart of every human is there also. So he begins to worship something.

But in this land of opportunity and freedom in which nearly every one of us has grown up, Satan will be right here with many different things to try to take the faith that we have in our Lord Jesus Christ away from us.

We sang in this hymn, number forty-two, about the Pool of Bethesda. Take a look at the illnesses that were listed here. Great multitudes were gathered under those porches: blind, lame, deaf, rheumatic, palsy struck and withered, consumptive weak, infirm, leprous, crippled, poor and whoever was distressed. I suppose depression would come under distressed.

Yesterday while at the Lutheran Hospital, I heard one of the employees say that the new Lutheran Hospital is already under construction on the west side of town. I think the question came up, "What are you going to do with this big building?" He said, "Part of it is going to be a chemical dependency unit." He is talking about people who are afflicted by drugs and alcohol.

They might have had a little trouble

in that day. You know we have all the things that are listed in this song, but we have got a lot, lot more, haven't we, heavenly Father? The greater part of all man's ailments are found in drawing nearer to Almighty God, whether we are brilliant people or whether we can hardly write our names.

I remember years ago at work (and I've seen this happen a couple of times), we had people that could not read their own names, let alone sign their own names. So at the beginning of the week, one of the other employees would take this man's time card and put a big black circle up in one corner. When he would come and ring in each morning, he would pick out the card with the big black dot. But he was able to make it.

That man still had the opportunity, by the words of other people, to draw nigh to Almighty God and to have the right kind of influence in his mind that would provide for him a healthy body. We certainly don't want to say by any means whatsoever that if we have an affliction, that it means we are not thinking right. But a part of being well, is our mental attitude. For someone who is seriously sick, I think it is well determined that if they had a strong will to get better, they will get better faster. I don't mean that that overcomes everything.

So if we can draw nigh to Almighty God, if we can feel good about ourselves, (and by that, I mean be at peace with Almighty God and be cleansed by the blood of the Lamb), and if we can feel that Almighty God will make things work out so that we can
