#### HEFT AND HUNGARIAN TAPES

Recent changes in Eastern Europe have changed the political scene completely. With borders being opened, it is much easier to send aid into these countries. Our brethren there need our continued support as the economic systems are in great disarray. The proceeds from the sales of the Heft and Hungarian cassettes still go to help our needy loved ones in these countries. Even though small, the assistance we offer must be a great source of encouragement to them.

Bro. Joseph Farkasch, of Salzburg, Austria, has made tapes from the old "Long Book," beginning at number one and going straight through the book. He plays the classical guitar and other instruments. There is also singing on a few songs.

Volume I includes songs 1-11, 13-18; Volume II includes songs 12, 19-31; Volume III includes songs 33-48.

Each tape costs \$8.00. For shipping costs on orders of 1-5 tapes, add 75¢ extra for each tape. On orders of 6 tapes or more add only 30¢ extra for each tape. Make checks for Long Book Tapes payable to the Long Book Tape Fund.

Two cassette tapes are now available of the singing and playing of the Hungarian churches. The music, performed by choir and orchestra, is from the Zion's Harp and the Heft and other church books used in our church in Hungary. This music is played beautifully and reverently.

# **Light From The Word**

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

#### **CHOOSING A CAREER**

Although God promised to care and provide for His children (Matt. 6:25-34), He expects us to work and earn our living (1 Thes. 4:11, 2 Thes. 3:11-12). Giving sincere thought to career planning has thus been an important matter for believers. Today with over 22,000 career options available, 75% of which require post-secondary school training, the issue has become even more complex.

While career preparation is generally considered a school-related decision made by young adults, it should actually begin at home at an early age. The first step in such planning is the establishment of values that are essential in all careers. A recent study in a midwestern state revealed the top reasons for being fired from a job: (1) absence, (2) attitude, (3) poor performance, (4) failure to get along with others, (5) lack of skills, and (6) no interest. Of these six reasons, only one (lack of skills) is school-related; the rest are scripturally based, home-taught values. Jesus gave us the example of the proper set of work values when He spoke of Himself being a Shepherd rather than an hireling (John 10). A shepherd fosters a caring, responsible attitude toward his work rather than the self-centered attitude of an hireling.

As children grow into adolescence, they begin to become more aware of the working world about them, of their own interests and abilities, and of the various role models they observe. At this stage, it may be helpful to acquaint young people with general career clusters (rather than trying to focus on one or two careers among the thousands). One example of career grouping is to classify careers according to (1) mechanical, (2) social, (3) artistic, (4) scientific, and (5) clerical skills. In this way, adolescents can begin to formulate ideas based on their own interests and abilities. Regardless of how the grouping is done, it is important that youth are aware that a wide

range of occupations are valuable and important provided that they honor God and are performed honestly with a Christ-like attitude. David used both his lowly shepherd position and his exalted kingly position to glorify God.

This does not mean that every occupation is becoming to a Christian or in accord with teachings of the New Testament. Law enforcement usually requires readiness to use arms to accomplish its goals, violating scriptural principles which teach us to love even our enemies (Matt. 5:44), and "Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good" (Rom. 12:21)

Another important consideration in job selection is close proximity to one of our churches—either an established one, or a developing assembly. The opportunity to maintain proper priorities for family and church is of great significance. Some careers demand such a high degree of commitment that it is extremely difficult to devote adequate time and energy to those things which have eternal value. Jesus taught, "Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (Matt. 6:21).

If a particular career requires higher education, the selection of an institution should take into account accessibility to the brotherhood. Enrolling near home for at least the first two years can be very beneficial. When this is not feasible, every effort should be made to select a school which is near one of our churches or where services are held on campus. It cannot be emphasized enough that exposure to powerful influences of the world must be offset by the sustaining truths of God's Word. The Apostle Paul taught, "Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ" (2 Cor. 10:5).

Values become more important as an adolescent matures into adulthood and the job search narrows to a

specific career. The decision-making process becomes crucial. The standard steps of (1) selecting possibilities, (2) determining job values, (3) exploring possibilities, and (4) developing a plan, are helpful but only truly accomplished if done under the prayerful direction of the Holy Spirit (John 16:13). The primary motive of the decision-making process should be seeking the will of God. He expects His people to be diligent (Prov. 22:29), trustworthy (1 Cor. 4:2), honest (Prov. 11:1), fair (Lev. 19:35-36), obedient (Eph. 6:5), and respectful (1 Tim. 6:1) workers. Any job selection that would compromise these scriptural principles is not Godhonoring. Values which the world emphasizes in job selection are wages and prestige. We must realize that God's rewards and His honor are much more valuable than that which the world would offer. In fact, being "keepers at home" (Tit. 2:5) constitutes one of life's noblest careers.

Government publications, libraries and related classes can provide helpful information for job selection. Talking to or working with individuals (especially brethren) involved in a specific career can provide excellent experience. Established godly values, an understanding of what God expects of us in a career, and knowledge about a particular career of interest are of great help. In our rapidly changing world, career planning may be a life-long process requiring much thought, prayer, and direction from the Holy Spirit for both young people and older adults.

Finally, we must remember that God's measure of success does not focus on the rewards of a career, but on obedience to His Word and love for one another—characteristics that may be displayed in a wide variety of careers (Josh. 1:8). Whatever our calling in life may be, we should fulfill it "... heartily, as to the Lord, and not unto men" (Col. 3:23), waiting on the Lord for his blessings.

## KINDERGARTEN TEACHER NEEDED IN JAPAN

Our church in Japan has a kindergarten where Sis. Renee Baurer and Sis. Terri Gramm are now teaching. There will be a need for a sister to teach for two years, through March of 1992. A sister who has the faith and conviction to apply for this position should speak to her elder and if he approves, apply to the missionary committee for consideration.

All expenses involved in the two-year stay in Japan are paid by the church. The sister is asked to give two or more years of her life in Japan at some sacrifice of compensation, although we do pay, in addition to expenses, a small monthly salary.

Bible stories are taught every day in the kindergarten. English is the language of instruction, but incoming teachers are encouraged to begin studying the Japanese language before coming to Japan. This is helpful in communicating with the Japanese people and in singing the hymns in Japanese.

The teachers are presently living in a new, modern apartment about a 10-minute walk from the church.

There may be a former teaching brother or sister who had served in Japan and was acquainted with the language, or a retired teacher who would be willing to give of himself or herself. A brother or sister without a teaching certificate would be considered. Even one year would be appreciated. Anyone touched in heart should most prayerfully commit it to our gracius God, talk to his or her family and then to their local shepherd. May God provide for our need and may His will be done.

#### NEWS FROM EASTERN EUROPE Andy Hunyady

Greetings Beloved!

The long awaited change finally came to the people of Romania. The terrorist reign of Nicolaie Ceausescu came to an abrupt end. "The antichrist was slain on Christmas Day" reported a jubilant announcer over the Romanian national radio network, according to media reports.

Unconfirmed reports from Buch-

arest, capital of Romania, estimated the number of those killed at above 60 thousand people. It all began in the city of Temesvar (Timisoara) after a Hungarian Protestant pastor openly criticized the "securitate" for the inhuman treatment of ethnic minorities. While seeking refuge in his church with his pregnant wife, the security agents broke down the doors to get

him. A large crowd of people gathered to protest the security's actions. The number of protestors increased to such extent that the army was ordered out to disperse the crowd. The peaceful demonstration turned into violence as the soldiers were ordered to shoot. Soon it turned into a blood-bath and thousands of bystanders, women and children, lost

their lives. Seeing the piles of dead bodies, the soldiers and army officers quickly changed sides and joined the protestors. The news of this horror spread like wild fire and within a matter of hours, similar fightings erupted in other cities, including Bucharest, the capital, where the army turned against the better trained and equipped security forces, which were protecting the leader and his staff.

As the army began to gain the upper hand in the battle, Ceausescu and his wife attempted to escape, but were unsuccessful. Having been arrested, they were charged as criminals, were tried and quickly executed by fring squad

by firing squad.

During the struggle between the army and the security forces, fear and uncertainty gripped the whole nation. Borders were sealed, communications were cut, and no contact with the outside was possible, except for the news media.

Because of close ties with families and brethren living in Romania, we had some very anxious hours and kept a close watch on the fast changing events, with great concern for the safety and well-being of our loved ones. We kept our faith and hopes high, trusting in God, believing that after the great struggle some good will come about!

Though the bloody fighting is over, the political situation is very unsettled. The new provisional government, called "the Council of National Salvation" is made up of reformist communists, who are trying to form a new democratic form of government. General elections for multiparty representatives are set for May 20.

In the second week of January, a group of brethren from Hungary entered Romania in six automobiles, loaded with food and medical supplies. After their return, they reported that all went well. At the border crossing they were welcomed by smiling Romanian border guards. People everywhere are relieved and happy to see the change. They are free to travel without reporting to the police, free to attend church, etc. The only problem, and a very critical one. is the food and medical supplies. A high ranking government official admitted to the press that the country has only about 7 - 10 days supply to feed the entire population.

In order to encourage outside help, the new government eliminated all import duties on food, fuel and medicines. Most of the western countries, including the U.S.A. and the Switzerland-based International Red Cross, began to send food as soon as it was considered safe after the shooting. The Hungarian government, in order to prevent local shortages and escalating prices, had placed new restrictions on the amount of certain food items taken out of the country, such as sunflower oil, meat and some dairy products.

With the new changes come new opportunities for us to render needed help, not only in the line of food, medicine and clothing, but the Holy Scriptures and hymnals. These are urgently needed also as they were forbidden, even though some were being smuggled in by brave individuals

With God's help, the brothers on the World Relief Committee, took steps to take advantage of the newly opened opportunity, and found a way to order a truckload of food parcels ready for delivery within a few days and at a very reasonable price. Just as this report is being typed, January 24, a phone call from an elder brother in Bucharest, Hungary, informed me that the shipment of food was delivered and unloaded at the home of an elder in the city of Arad. It contained 1200 packages, each weighing 15 kg. (33 lb.), with distribution to our beneficiaries to be made by the local brethren under the supervision of the local elders and their co-workers.

On January 17, early in the morning, another call came from Hungary. This time our well known Elder Bro. Albert Szabo, who had just come from Romania to visit his ailing sister, brought some very good news that we were waiting for. He said that before he left Romania, he consulted with the other elders, and according to their knowledge, none of our brethren or family members were harmed during the revolution. All are well but in need of food. When told that a load of supplies is on the way from Holland, he was deeply moved and said, "Surely the good Lord must have heard the many prayers of His people." In the name of the brethren in Romania he sends hearty greetings and heartfelt thanks to everyone who so kindly and graciously reached out to help them in this very critical hour.

He tells us here that, "Open rebuke is better than secret love." Proverbs 27:5. How many times, beloved hearers, it would be so good if we could help each other, rebuke each other and even try to help each other to overcome these weaknesses that men have?

It tells us here, too, how often a person could pat himself on his back and think, "I've got a real good job and it looks like I have really accomplished something." Beloved ones, it tells us how much better it would be to, "Let another man praise thee, and not thine own mouth; a stranger, and not thine own lips." Proverbs 27:2. It says, I believe, that self praise stinketh. Let us know this, beloved ones, how easy we can "turn off" if we start to praise ourself or brag upon what we have done. It is so much better if someone else would do it.

## SERMON BY BRO. HAROLD C. GRAMM OF MORRIS, MN

Text: Proverbs 27 and Luke 6:20-49

This chapter is one of the beautiful, familiar chapters that we have read, studied and considered as our parents read to us and as we studied it in Sunday school. Now as we read it again this morning after many years of looking into the beautiful Word of Life, it is still beautiful and wholesome. It's edifying and it filled our hearts with joy to overflowing.

As the Psalmist said here, "The full soul loatheth an honeycomb; but to the hungry soul every bitter thing is sweet." Proverbs 27:7. Beloved ones, if we were full and not hungry, this beautiful Word of Life probably would

not be a blessing to us.

It reminds me of when we were privileged to take a basket of food to a family that was destitute. The dad was in the hospital and they were real poor people. We gave them the basket of food and when we left, we said, "We hope you enjoy it." They said, "Well, anything tastes good when you are hungry." They were appreciative, if anything. To a hungry soul, anything tastes good.

Maybe I was hungry this morning. As we came into the assembly, it seemed like every song we sang was so beautiful; and now we read this beautiful Word of Life. I had considered something else this morning and planned to look for it. But when this beautiful book of the Proverbs opened up, it just didn't seem necessary to page or look into the beautiful Word.

We are so thankful for the wonderful Word of Life and the beautiful fellowship that we have. We're thankful for the songs we can sing together, for the Words that we read and the love that God had when He gave us this wonderful hope of eternal life!

He gives us a hungry heart that has a desire for Him. Even as the song writer says, "As a hart for water panteth, So my soul cries, Lord, to Thee!" Beloved ones, we know how a thirsty hart or a young deer would be looking for water. How thankful it would be, after it had run through many miles of dry land, over meadows, hills and plains, to come to a spring of water. Beloved ones, that is how you and I can be this morning if we are hungry and thirsty for this beautiful Word of Life. It can be for your heart and mine, like a cool spring of flowing water is for a hart or a voung deer.

We are reminded, beloved hearers, of the fact that we should not look forward too far. We are reminded many times that we should, "Live every day as it were our last, but build our work as it would last for-

ever."

As we go through life, we can consider our life and what we are doing. As we consider, let us consider that maybe this is the last chance we have. Maybe we'll never have another chance to do it again.

Even Solomon reminded men that they should not be too concerned about tomorrow, because tomorrow will take

care of itself.

But think about today, beloved ones. Today, now, we are in the house of worship and have taken out time to come together and to worship our loving God and our merciful Savior. God was so loving and so merciful, He sent His Son to this world after poor fallen men had fallen into sin.

I believe this one verse sums it all up, beloved ones, and tells us where all the trouble lies and where all the trouble stems from.

whole problem.

It is human nature and we are born with it. Let us not use as an excuse, "I'm full of wrath," "I'm full of envy and I can't help it," "I'm angry; I get mad real easy." Beloved ones, that is not an excuse. It is something the enemy can use against us. If we don't have the grace of God, we can be the downfall to our undying soul. So let us be careful and let us know that wrath, anger and envy, are dangerous things that the human race is confronted with.
