CONDITIONAL PROMISES Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle Shioda, Japan

The promises of God are very encouraging. When we think of our great God, the Sovereign, loving us, caring for us, bearing us on wings of compassion, and teaching us that we do have value, our hearts are over-

whelmed with gratitude.

Some of the promises in the Bible are almost unconditional. God loves us and forgives us even though we may fail miserably. John 5:24 is often quoted. "He that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life." So far as performance is concerned, nothing is mentioned. All that is mentioned is hearing and believing. It is often stated that believing in the original Greek includes adhering to, but still the conditions required to receive the promise, if there are any conditions, are hardly touched upon.

Therefore, the idea of obedience may lose favor among believers. It's what we might call, "The All This and Heaven, too," syndrome. It is probably a good idea to think about some of the conditional promises in the New Testament. It might help us to feel a little more responsibility. Liberty and Freedom always require heavy responsibility and self-discipline. Otherwise, your "high" may turn into a

deep "low."

In Matthew 7:21, Jesus said, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven: but he that doeth the will of

my Father which is in heaven." The promise of entering the kingdom of heaven is there but it includes the stipulation that we do the will of the Father, or at least try to do the will of the Father. Probably none of us do His will completely but we should pay some attention to the condition stated.

In John 15:10, the Lord Jesus Christ says, "If ye keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love." To be abiding in Christ's love is an exhilarating experience -- there is a feeling and a conviction that all is well. However, there is that phrase in the above Scripture, "If you keep my commandments," and that has to do with obedience, you know. To have some fear or concern that we might not be obedient to God or to Christ, is a good thing.

In Hebrews 9:28 we read, "So Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many; and unto them that look for him shall he appear the second time without sin unto salvation." In this verse the condition is that we be looking for the return of the Lord Jesus which may occur at any time.

In I John 1:7 it is written, "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin." To be continually cleansed from sin by the blood of Christ is a delightful situation but there is the matter of walking in the light.

By the grace of God let us practice self-discipline and self-control. Let's

not swing too far away from the principle of obedience. There are many promises in the New Testament which are conditional.

Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

THE MINISTRY

One of the most noble callings ever given to man is the ministry of the gospel. "How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things!" (Rom. 10:15). God promised to provide men for Israel with "understanding of the times" (1 Chron. 12:32) to serve as ministers and leaders of His people, and the same is true for the church today. The true spiritual leader is a servant, called by God to feed the flock and give himself wholeheartedly to ministering to others.

When help in the ministry is sought, the church should pray for divine guidance so that it can be revealed as to whom the Word of the Lord shall come (Luke 3:2). There are certain biblical qualifications for brothers being considered for service as deacons and bishops (elders). These also apply to ministers, because every newly appointed minister shares in the leadership of the church and is a potential deacon or elder. Brothers considered for the ministry should demonstrate order in their own household and they should have the respect of those not in the faith. They are to be serious-minded, spiritually mature, patient and willing to teach (1 Tim. 3:1-13). Such brothers should be blameless stewards who seek no earthly gain from these labors. They are to be lovers of hospitality and of good men, just, holy and temperate. They must be willing to defend the true doctrine (Titus 1:6-9). Their wives must be sensible and godly women who are "faithful in all things" (1 Tim. 3:11).

Following exhortation regarding these Scriptures and a time of prayerful consideration, the sentiment of the church is sought regarding who among the brothers should be considered to serve in the ministry. The ultimate responsibility for this decision rests with the elder, as the Apostle Paul entrusted Timothy: "And the things that thou hast heard of me among many

witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also" (2 Tim. 2:2).

When a brother is asked to assume the responsibility of preaching the Word, it is essential that he and his wife prayerfully search their hearts and plead for the Lord's grace to fulfill their calling. A genuine spirit of humility should be evident, and although unworthiness may be felt, an attitude of willingness to become a dedicated servant of the Lord should prevail (1 Cor. 9:17-19; 1 Tim. 1:12). It is required of those who are placed in ministry and leadership positions to be sound examples (1 Tim. 4:12). Anything in the lifestyle of the brother or his wife which may be a hindrance to the effectiveness of these labors must be removed: "Giving no offense in anything, that the ministry be not blamed" (2 Cor. 6:3). How could a minister effectively exhort the brethren to abstain from unwholesome entertainments such as television and competitive sports if he were not free from these spiritually corrosive influences? Involvement in these and other worldly activities is an indication of a spiritual deficiency. Likewise, a minister's wife must be an example in attitude, word and appearance of the biblically-based teachings of the church regarding godly women. "Favor is deceitful, and beauty is vain: but a woman that feareth the Lord, she shall be prais-(Prov. 31:30). Adornment should be in accord with our modest traditional patterns, springing forth from a meek and quiet spirit (1 Pet. 3:3-4).

When the mantle of ministry of the gospel is placed on a brother, he is asked to promise to give all diligence to being a submissive vessel through whom the Holy Spirit can feed the flock. It is also required that he faithfully uphold the teachings of the Word of God as interpreted by the Apostolic Christian Church. Special emphasis is placed in the Word on holding fast to sound doc-

trine (1 Tim. 4:16; 5:17; 2 Tim. 3:14-17). Ministers must be free of seminary-rooted confusion and falsehoods, speaking "not with excellency of speech" or "with man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power" (1 Cor. 2: 1,4).

Ministers must realize that there will sometimes be resistance to their preaching of the truth. They are instructed to "preach the Word . . . in season (and) out of season: (to) reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine. For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but after their own lusts shall they heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears" (2 Tim. 4:3-4). It is not acceptable for a minister to remain silent or neutral about a controversial issue in order to avoid disturbing those who are not supportive of church teachings and standards. Rather there must be a willingness to "earnestly contend for the faith" (Jude 3); "Holding fast the faithful Word as he hath been taught, that he may be able by sound doctrine both to exhort and to convince the gainsayers" (Tit. 1:9).

If a minister at any time should become unable, because of varying convictions, to clearly defend biblically-based church doctrine and practices, he should examine his heart, counsel with his elder, and make his views consistent with the body of believers for whom he speaks. Each elder ultimately bears the scriptural responsibility for the wholesome feeding of the flock by the ministering brothers laboring under his charge (1 Pet. 5:1-2). One of the elder's greatest and most farreaching responsibilities is that of entrusting the preaching and teaching of God's Word to faithful men! When there is sincere humility of heart and an attitude of submissiveness on the part of every brother occupying the pulpit, this work can be done with joy, which is profitable to all (Heb. 13:17).

It was determined to seek the Lord's further guidance by appointing a subcommittee composed of members of the Missionary and World Relief Committees. Encouraged by the elder body to proceed, a number of planning sessions were held. The program was formally introduced in September, 1984, and has been growing in an orderly fashion. program was "The Lord's Work Opportunity Program For Apostolic Christians." Subsequently, this was modified to the present name of "Apostolic Christian Work Projects."

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The purpose of the Apostolic Christian Work Projects is to:

-- Provide opportunities to serve the Lord on a voluntary basis by any member or friend of the Truth who regularly attend and support the doctrine of the Apostolic Christian Church, who are so moved to contribute their time, efforts and skills.

-- Develop such Work Projects that will serve to aid those in need wherever they may be located within the boundary of the United States or

beyond.

-- Screen projects developed by other organizations utilizing the guidelines set forth in the World Relief Policy Statement and sanction them if appropriate.

- Develop and/or approve such projects, providing the planning, organizing, directing, controlling, staffing and funding of approved projects as may be required or appropriate.

-- Direct the implementation of the projects and to provide spiritual guidance and counsel to the participants and to take such measures as may be required to encourage and ensure that the faith and doctrine of the Apostolic Christian Church not be compromised.

This program and these principles are to be under the direct supervision of the Apostolic Christian Church Elder Body and its representation through its Missionary and World Relief Committees. It is intended that consideration be given only to World Projects that can be under this control, or, when members can participate as a group including an Apostolic Christian minister to conduct our own worship services.

ORGANIZATION

The program is coordinated by a committee called the "Apostolic Christian Works Projects Committee." It is composed of five members each from the Missionary and World Relief Committees.

The Committee is responsible for the planning, directing, funding and coordinating the efforts of the program. They meet periodically to review recommended projects and provide on-going supervision of the program. They also work to enhance the communications throughout the churches.

FUNCTIONS

Two basic elements of the program consist of PEOPLE and PROJECTS. Methods have been developed to compose a roster of VOLUNTEERS as well as to solicit PROJECT RECOMMENDATIONS. With sufficient listing in each category the program will become more viable and active. This requires the effort and support of the church leadership and congregations.

FUNDING

The sources of funding Work Projects stems primarily from the Mission and World Relief Funds. In addition, other church funds, special collections, gifts, annuities, bequests, etc., represent potential sources. Also, participating volunteers are welcome to share in the provision of some of their project's expenses such as transportation or lodging. The volunteer's home congregation can also help with the project expenses and thus become a participant in this fashion.

VOLUNTEERS

Any members or friends who are in accord with the precepts contained in the Statement of Purpose who are interested in voluntary participation

in this program are encouraged to submit a VOLUNTEER INFORMA-TION FORM. A supply of these have been provided for each congregation through its local elder. The appendix is also suitable for reproduction. Volunteers who have already participated in a Work Project, but have not completed a form are encouraged to do so.

PROJECTS

It is not possible to foresee the total scope of this program. It will be dependent upon the Lord's guidance and direction. The number of volunteers interested will help determine the number and scope of projects developed.

The projects fall generally into three categories: Local, Domestic and Foreign. Some of the projects already implemented or in the planning stage include:

LOCAL

- -- Home Sweet Home (renovation Bloomington, IL).
- -- Assisting Apostolic Christian Institutions (Rest Homes, Children's Home, Home for the Handicapped, Etc.).
- -- Note: Local projects will likely constitute fewer numbers since this has been a long established tradition in each congregation's own sphere. This Work Projects Program is not intended to usurp nor assume prerogatives of the local church. However, where local projects may need some type of assistance, including financial, this program might be considered.

DOMESTIC

- -- Recruiting and Placement Service for Apostolic Christian Institutions.
- -- Assist Small Congregations To Grow.
- -- Smaller Congregation Church Maintenance and Building.
 - -- Church Building Projects.
 - -- Church Maintenance Projects.
 - -- Kentucky Children's Homes.
- -- Food Packaging For Eastern Europe.
- -- Summer School Program (Alabama).
- -- Gateway Woods, Children's Home (Leo, IN).

-- Note: The establishment of new

Apostolic Christian Churches falls under the scope of the Mission Committee. Work Projects can assist after the initial sanction is approved.

FOREIGN

- -- Haiti Work Teams (school roofs, well drilling, veterinarian assistance, hospital assistance, trade school equipment, Bibles.
 - -- India Medical Assistance.
 - -- Japan (potential).
- -- Mexico City Reconstruction, AMMAR construction
- -- Note: It is not intended that the Works Projects Program usurp some of the long standing programs coordinated by the World Relief Committee such as CARE, M.C.C., Heifer Project, Material Aid Center, European Relief, RGMMI, grain shipments, disaster aid, etc.

Project identification is a vital part of this program. Only if there are projects will there be work for volunteers under this program. Therefore, each congregation and/or individual is encouraged to recommend projects for consideration. They do not necessarily have to embrace physical or material needs but may be of a "service" nature. It is hoped that many worthy projects will be submitted, realizing that all of them may not become viable or selected.

To submit a Work Project for consideration a PROJECT RECOMMENDATION FORM should be submitted. The recommendation will be processed for review. A supply of these has been provided for each congregation through its local elder.

CONCLUSION

With the faith and conviction that this program has been developed under the guidance and direction from God, it is prayerfully hoped that it can continue grow. As God gives inspiration to those moved to participate, may He also give the spirit of support and encouragement to the whole church.

Sermon ...

(Continued from Page 36) should honor our father and mother. It seems rather harsh, but those who chose not to do that, the penalty was death. It was one of the sins unto death, to defy your parents. There were children who were put to death because of that. That is quite a responsibility, isn't it?

Those of us who are going through raising children know what it is like to have children not always be totally obedient. As children, who we see growing up, we know what it was like to make those decisions of whether we are going to be obedient or not. Yet, we know that the law is perfect. God is perfect. Though we, as earthly parents, would certainly not enforce it to that point as it would be very difficult, even in the old times to be a parent and enforce that penalty of death for disobedience.

God is perfect and that is His judgment and He gives us the opportunity to serve Him and to be obedient to His Word. Once again, as was with the old law, the penalty for disobedience is that we all die, but we all can have a hope of living again, only through our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

We see here that Paul wrote to this man Philemon hoping that he would have the heart to forgive his servant Onesimus for his disobedience. It could have very well been that he would have taken this letter out of Onesimus's hands, torn it to shreds and have this man put to death for his disobedience. I don't know enough about the law, but I imagine that would have been within his power to do so.

That would not have been God's will because this young man Onesimus

had become a believer through the teachings of the Apostle Paul. He had come across him and learned of God's perfect plan...learned of the coming of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, His death, His resurrection, and he had accepted that plan of salvation, even for a runaway slave.

We can find that today ourselves because we find ourselves going through life as, many cases, runaway slaves. We are born, we grow, we mature and we come to the point where we are accountable for right and wrong when we have that understanding of what is right, what is wrong, what is good and what is evil.

Then we come to a place in our life where we choose the better or the worse part. We make that willful choice, and as we do that, we, on our own accord and by our own failings, fall short of the perfection of God. We start to run away, and become even as a slave to sin. That's our nature and it can't be helped. We can pray for wisdom as Solomon did, but the only thing that is going to re-direct our lives is that changed heart.

There is one thing that takes up from being a runaway slave to being a child of God and that can only be done through the shed blood of Jesus Christ. There is nothing we are going to have to offer that is going to be worth the price that is required for our own.

We can try to do the best we can. Solomon tried to be the best he could with what he had and he was given much. Think of the wisdom that Solomon was given. As we read together here, Solomon had an incredible amount of wisdom given to him and it compares him to the great men of the time. It says, "... his fame was in all nations round about." I Kings 4:31. It says how many proverbs he spoke, how many songs he wrote and all the things that he spoke of. (See I Kings 4:32, 33). He was endued with a great amount of wisdom. Evidently also the ability to relate it to people so that they benefitted from his wisdom.

Yet, when it came to him making choices in his life, there is a point and time with Solomon's life where he was told in no uncertain terms that he should not go out and try to take the wealth and things he had and try to multiply his horses as the Egyptians had done and become great and

wealthy with horses. He was told not to marry women from other nations because he was told in no uncertain terms that if he did, it would be his downfall.

We can read almost verbatim what Solomon was told to do and not to do. We can read about the latter days of Solomon and find that he did exactly those things which he was told of God (God had revealed Himself to him) and he let all the wisdom he was given and yet, in his own choice, he fell short. He made those choices and chose wrong when he had been told that it was not the thing to do.

That was with all the wisdom in the world, you might say. All the wisdom that a man can be given because It tells us that the wisdom of Solomon was greater than any man had been given or would ever be given. So with all that wisdom, he messed up his life and he fell short, and because of that, the kingdom was wrenched out of his hand and was, in fact, divided.

God said, "For they father David's sake, I will leave you part of the kingdom." (See I Kings 11:12, 13). We know that the tribe of Judah remained and I think part of Benjamin's became the house of Judah. Yet, the ten tribes of Israel split off from his kingdom. He fell short relying upon his

own good judgment.

He was not a perfect man, but he had a perfect opportunity to be one, you might say. That is where we are going to find ourselves if we rely upon our wisdom, even if we rely upon the wisdom God gives us and upon the good that God could impart to us. We are only going to be given a limited measure of that good nature, and we are going to find that it is not perfection. We are not capable of carrying perfection. If we look at the letter of the law, we find none of the people in the Old Testament could meet up to that perfect law either. They all fell short.

We are going to fall short from being good, whatever our stumbling stone is. Perhaps our weakness isn't to have many stables of horses or many wives from all the nations, as Solomon's was. But there is a weakness in each of us and Satan in going to find that weakness. He is going to take that weakness and put a wedge in it and drive it home until it pops us wide open like he did Solomon.

The only way we are going to be able to overcome that is by the grace of God and the gift he gave us of the shed blood of His Son. Because Jesus came in perfection to make right our imperfections. So it has to be, the only way we can be changed from being considered as a slave to sin to a child of God is through Jesus Christ.

This is what Onesimus did. That is what made him different now coming back. He was not just a runaway slave ... that was in his past and he couldn't change that. We all have things in our past that we can't change. We can look back and see how many great failings, shortcomings and sin that might be in our lives. We can't change that, just like you can't unring a bell. Once the bell has run, it happened. Time goes on, and the results of that occur.

But is it never too late to turn around from running from those past actions and to turn back to God and ask His forgiveness. That is what this young man did. He found Paul. He found the Word being spoken. I don't know how this all unfolded in time --when exactly he ran into Paul, or when he first heard the Word. I don't know when Philemon first heard the Word and believed.

But it appears that this young man was coming back, having left as an unbeliever, and coming back now as a brother-in-Christ. It was up to Philemon now to accept him or reject him. But this young man had made a change in his life and he was now a useful tool in God's hands.

There was, no doubt, sin in his life before. He had run away from his master and we don't' know what else was in his life, but he had repented before Paul and brought his testimony to God and had been forgiven for his sins. So here it is that Paul writes this letter to Philemon encouraging him to receive him back, not as a runaway slave to be dealt with or to be punished, but rather as a brother and a useful tool in God's hands.

How did Paul say that to Philemon here? In talking about Onesimus, he said, "Whom I would have retained with me, that in thy stead he might have ministered unto me in the bonds of the gospel." Philemon, verse 13. Here Philemon, who professed to be a believer and follower of God, yet he was not there working with Paul and doing the work that God had directed

Paul to do.

So Paul has a feeling that his sense of responsibility as a child of God himself, as a believer in our Lord and Saviour, that instead of himself coming and serving Paul in the ministering of the Gospel, that he should instead send his servant. One simus could do that work. So we see that we do have a responsibility. Paul was calling that debt of Philemon to serve God.

The Word calls for our debt today as well. As children of God, how are we to serve Him? How are we to live our lives? What work does He have in store for us? It may be just something such as this... some act of forgiveness, or some act of giving of something that is ours to the work of the Lord and then let Him use it for His best interest.

We can't always see that and if Philemon would have had Onesimus as a servant, he would not have been doing the same work as what Paul had him doing. I don't know what kind of operation or what kind of duties he had with Philemon, but it was, no doubt, not the ministering of the Gospel, such as we see him doing here in working for Paul. So Paul saw fit to write and beseech this man to forgive.

He asks us each one to forgive also. We all have those things in our lives where things, we might say, "ruffle our feathers" and we become upset with one another. We may become disgruntled with the way a certain situation has been handled. Maybe we see that we had been wrong, but we might be absolutely

right.

If we take the stand for Philemon here, he had a real case, didn't he? He had this man work for him and he just ran off and left him. He was right in wanting this man back and in wanting restitution made.

What Paul offered was a "blank check," we might say, to pay off that debt. First of all, in requiring that Philemon consider his debt for the Lord for forgiveness he had received and then also as he said here, "If thou count me therefor a partner, receive him" meaning Onesimus, "as myself." Philemon, verse 17. He sent Onesimus as his brother, as a representative of the ministry of the Gospel. He wanted him to be re-

ceived as such, not as a slave.

"If he hath wronged thee, or oweth thee ought," anything, "put that on mine account; I Paul have written it with mine own hand, I will repay it: albeit I do not say to thee how thou owest unto me even thine own self besides." Philemon, v. 18, 19.

That is what our Lord and Saviour did for us, too, really. He gave us that "blank check" and said He came before we were even born, before we were even thought of. He came and gave His life and paid that debt. He said essentially to God, "If," and we could put our name in this blank, "if this individual has wronged Thee or owest Thee ought, put that on My account." Jesus said that to the heavenly Father. Put in on His account because He has a perfect way to pay the debt for our imperfections. He came as the Son of God . . . born of a virgin . . . and lived a perfect life, free of sin.

How many of us can raise our hand and say, "That happened with us... we lived a perfect life, free from sin?" We can't, and we have no way to make up that debt, to unring that bell. We have no resources.

But God has provided a plan and sent Jesus Christ to say, "If we have wronged any or oweth Thee ought, put that on My account." Jesus took our accounts and paid them all. As He did that, He gave His life to do it. He gave us an opportunity... an opportunity for freedom, even as this Onesimus was becoming free from his bondage to Philemon, but yet, to become as a debtor and servant to our Lord and Saviour.

Because now it wasn't something that we have done to free ourselves from sin and to make our lives any more righteous, it is something God did for us! So the debt has not been paid by us so we can swell our chest and say, "Now we are righteous." It is something the Lord and Saviour did for us and so the debt we owe is now to Him. That is what He asks of us, that we go on to live our life free from that debt. So we can forget it all.

Paul here wrote to him saying that he would repay it. He even reminded Philemon about the debt, "... albeit I do not say to thee how thou owest unto me even thine own self besides." Philemon, v. 19. Paul brought the Word, no doubt, to

Philemon, and so the debt of forgiveness for his sins was not something that Philemon had done. He owed that to his Lord and Saviour, and so Paul was working as a tool in His hands so he could be forgiven and find remission.

That is where we find ourselves, each and every one today, needing to know that we have been forgiven. If we are in good standing before God, we are no longer a slave to sin, but we are as a brother and sister to Christ Jesus. That is what the Scriptures direct us to. We know what is right, and we don't have to search the Scripture real hard to find that.

It brings to mind, just this week, a colleague of mine was mentioning that he had gone to a Power Engineering Society Meeting. Out west, there are some places where they have tried to create alternate power forces. They take all these mirrors, a whole plane load out there, for I don't know how many acres of mirrored glass elements. They let the sunshine on those elements to reflect up and they concentrate all the energy of the sun onto this boiler system and it heats water, makes steam and generates power.

In the past they tried to lock those things on to the sun. They wanted to make a control system, and it will sense there the brightest spot is in the sky and lock the mirrors right onto that spot so that it concentrates the beam onto the water heater. They had that working but the problem was whenever the clouds would come and cause interference, the mirrors would get lost. They didn't know where that sun was at. They would just wander around looking for it and couldn't find it.

Finally, after many years of trying to get that system to work, they said, "Let's throw it out the window. We know where the sun comes up every day. We have computers that can figure out exactly where the sun is located at any minute of the day. Let's just concentrate those mirrors on where we know the sun to be." I had to think, that was relying on the wisdom of man to try to track the sun. They made a very fundamental mistake because God is unchanging. Where He puts the sun on any day of the year at any minute of the day, it is always the same.

It was the same when Paul wrote this letter and it is the same today. That sun hasn't changed and it is very predictable. The Word for God is just like that. The Son of God is the same. We know where He is going to stand and we know from His Word what is required of us. We don't have to search daily to see that.

But we do have to look into His Word and see where it is that He stands and make sure that we are locked onto His Word and that we are following It. That keeps us from having to search every day for the sun and search every day for our direction, because if we know where God stands on the issues (and different issues affect our lives differently), if we know where He stands on His Word, then we can line ourselves with that.

It takes all the searching, it takes all the chance of getting lost, it takes all the cloud affects when things come and cloud up our lives and cloud up our vision. It happens. But God can take that away if we will study His Word and see where He stands on the issues that confront us. Then if we can line ourselves with that, we will find the greatest source of energy that we could ever want. It is the source from Almighty God.

That is what he was teaching here to Philemon, to seek out God's will and to receive God's plan. That is what He speaks to each and every one of us, receive God's plan for your heart and for mine. That means to follow Him and to serve Him and give up of ourselves and our own wisdom and turn it over to God in His wisdom. He will direct our paths, and He has.

It is not a perfect path to walk, but He certainly has a perfect ending to that path. Life eternal is going to be far greater than any bond we can find ourselves in today. It will counter balance any adversities, any sorrows, any stresses that we find in life. Life is so very short and eternity is so very long.

Let's take a little wisdom from the Scripture. Take a morsel of that wisdom from Solomon because Solomon said in some of his last writings, "Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God, and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man." Ecclesiastes 12:13.

"Paul Pleads For Onesimus" I Kings 4:29 - 5:6 and Philemon

SERMON BY BRO. NEAL WIDMER OF WOLCOTT, IN

We find here the Apostle Paul writing to Philemon, who was a believer, a man who had accepted the teachings of the Lord and Saviour and turned his heart over to Him.

But in those days they had servants and even slaves who worked for them. This man Philemon had a slave named Onesimus. This man Onesimus had actually run away. He was a runaway slave from his master Philemon. Here we find this man Onesimus had come and found Paul. the apostle. I am not completely sure, but I believe Paul was in prison in Rome at this time. I'm looking at the end of the chapter, it says, "Written from Rome to Philemon and taken by Onesimus, the servant."

So this man Onesimus took this letter from the Apostle Paul and brought it to his master whom he had run away from. Now this, no doubt, was a very tense situation for the man Onesimus and also for the Apostle Paul because it says there was a great bond of love between Paul and the runaway slave Onesimus here.

He made it very clear how much he loved him and how much he appreciated the work that Onesimus had done. Paul was in prison in Rome. You might see that as a great persecution. He was arrested and even put on trial often before the magistrates and rulers. But here he was in prison ... he was not a free man, to walk and to speak the Word. Yet, he wanted the Word to go forth.

So he had those who could come and visit him and those who could come and do the work which needed to be done. That is, no doubt, the role Onesimus was serving for him . . . not

as a slave to Paul, but as a freed man who is now really under the bondage of our Lord and Saviour, to work the works that God wanted him to work. Paul was directing him but he was following those directions, and through the Spirit doing the work of God.

Yet, Paul felt uncomfortable because he knew that Onesimus had run away from Philemon. He was actually a servant to this other man and he wanted there to be an understanding. So here he was sending the letter which he could have sent with another man, as the Apostle Paul, no doubt, had other people who were willing to go and do the work of the Lord. He could have sent this letter, this plea, to Philemon by some other means, but he sent it by means of the man who had even run away from his master.

It was a plea on behalf of Onesimus sent by Onesimus to Philemon. So it was a very tense situation, no doubt. That is why the Apostle Paul comes with a plea to Philemon. At first he begins his letter to make that connection, you might say, to speak to his heart and to express his appreciation for Philemon.

As we see, this man was a believer and yet, we know that as believers we do not always respond to situations as we should. Are we always looking for that spiritual direction in seeing things? We might put ourselves in a position as this Philemon.

Here he had a slave, who in those times was considered as property, and it was not within his rights to just run away. Perhaps he had been purchased with a great price . . . we don't know that. But he was gone now. He was lost property, you might say, to Philemon.

Now here comes the man who had run away bringing, not only this letter, but also he could bring a testimony of the fact he was not the same individual that ran away. He was now a converted individual, and we find the rather awkward position maybe of being a man, not only a slave to this man Philemon, but yet also a brother. This relationship of brother and sister-in-Christ Jesus was something that was new. People were not used to this concept.

But when accepting the Lord and Saviour and His love for us, that is how we become as brothers and sisters with Jesus Christ. That is quite a statement, isn't it? But we can claim that.

When Jesus claimed before the Pharisees that He was the Son of God, they had fits over it. They couldn't accept that and receive it because they thought He was putting Himself up on a great pedestal to call Himself that. Besides the fact that He was truly the Son of God, we can consider ourselves, through the light of His Scripture, as children of God -- sons and daughters of God -- if, in fact, we have accepted that perfect plan of His that we might have eternal life.

As that responsibility then comes upon us to consider ourselves as children of His, the responsibility, as well, is to conduct ourselves as children of the Most High God. That means to be obedient to parents... to be obedient to our heavenly Father and do His will.

We read in the old law that we (Continued on Page 33)
