INTANGIBLE WEALTH Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle Shioda, Japan

Are you wealthy? Are you poor? Are you in between? Before you answer those questions you might want to ask a question yourself, "Are you talking about tangible wealth or intangible wealth?"

The Lord Jesus Christ said, "A man's life consisteth not in the abundance of things which he possesseth." This indicates that the assets shown on your balance sheet may not be the only measurement of your wealth.

This idea is reinforced by the message the Lord Jesus Christ conveyed to the church at Laodicea, Revelation 3:17, "... Thou sayest, I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing; and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked . . ."

Recently I asked an English student, a high school girl, whether or not she would like to be rich. She replied, "Yes, but not very rich. If I could have anything I want, now, it would be boring." She was speaking in English and I was impressed. This girl had just purchased a motor bike with money she saved by working as a waitress in a restaurant. It took her a long time to save that much money (there is no tipping here) and she was thrilled with her purchase.

Considering whether or not you are wealthy, let's make a list of your tangible wealth. This list would include bank savings, bonds, stock, land, buildings, life insurance, etc. The list

for your intangible wealth might start with health but even without good health you might be rich with intangible possessions such as peace with God, assurance of salvation, humility, submission to God and your brothers and sisters in Christ, a tremendous love for other people, a strong desire to help others rather than to hurt them in any way. The immediate result of these intangible assets is a joy and happiness that radiates. While tangible riches can be very useful if used prayerfully, let's go all out for those intangible riches which are invaluable.

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

APOSTACY

Apostacy is referred to in the Word of God as falling away or forsaking the faith. It consists of a desertion or departure from the true Christian faith. It is prophesied that a falling away will occur before the Antichrist is revealed (2 Thes. 2:3-4). It can happen to individuals, such as Demas, who forsook the Apostle Paul for the world (2 Tim. 4:10); or it can happen to groups of believers as prophesied regarding several of the seven churches (Rev. 2 and 3). The primary purpose of this article is to review the scriptural warnings against the dangers of apostacy and the instructions as to how it can be avoided.

The Lord Jesus pleaded with the Father in His last hours before Calvary on behalf of all who would become His own: "Holy Father, keep through thine own name those whom thou hast given me, that they may be one, as we are" (John 17:11). He provides all the necessary resources to help assure our remaining faithful, but we are subject to an enemy who, "as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour" (1 Pet. 5:8).

Certain characteristics often precede apostacy. These include lukewarmness, indifference, waywardness, individualism, intermingling and doctrinal confusion, as well as lack of commitment to Christ and His church. Lack of commitment is really just one step away from rebellion. The Word speaks of gainsayers, who are individuals who oppose or contradict authority and interpreted truth. Titus was given specific instructions as a leader in the church: "Holding fast the faithful word as he hath been taught, that he may be able by sound doctrine both to exhort and to convince the gainsayers" (Tit. 1:9). Timothy was given a similar exhortation: "In meekness instructing those that oppose themselves; if God peradventure will give them repentance to the acknowledging of the truth" (2 Tim. 2:25). Much loving effort should be

made to help correct wayward brethren who become ensnared in false beliefs and develop unsubmitive attitudes. However, the Word also makes clear that when such individuals sow discord in the church (Prov. 6:19) and confuse others, they must be reprov'd by the brethren, and if not submissive, separated from the fellowship (Rom. 16:17; Tit. 3:10-11).

Obviously, the best approach is to make every effort to prevent deception from entering the hearts of the believers. This is achieved by staying very close to the Lord, and being alert to the various dangers which confront His people. A humble attitude which is subject to the counsel of the Word and to faithful brethren is essential.

The child of God is to "give diligence" or make tremendous effort to add numerous virtues to his faith, such as knowledge, temperance, patience, godliness, brotherly kindness and charity (2 Pet. 1:5-7). Developing these virtues, serving others and suffering for the cause of Christ will go a long way in warding off the enemy's attempts to foster indifference, lukewarmness and doctrinal confusion. Moses was a faithful servant, "choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God, than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season" (Heb. 11:25).

There are many warnings and examples in the Word about spiritual drift which can ultimately lead to destruction. The children of Israel often followed a pattern of backsliding, "and in their hearts turned back again into Egypt" (Acts 7:39). Even in battle they sometimes retreated, "The children of Ephraim, being armed, and carrying bows, turned back in the day of battle" (Psa. 78:9). Faithful Jonathan, however, remained true to David: "the bow of Jonathan turned not back" (2 Sam. 1:22). The believer is sternly warned, "Ye therefore, beloved, seeing ye know these things before, beware lest ye also, being led

away with the error of the wicked, fall from your own steadfastness" (2 Pet. 3:17). "Take heed, brethren, lest there be in any of you an evil heart of unbelief, in departing from the living God. But exhort one another daily, while it is called today; lest any of you be hardened through the deceitfulness of sin" (Heb. 3:12-13).

As believers, we must be especially alert to the subtle nature of today's destructive forces which can undermine our spiritual stability. Many appealing but misleading ideas and biblical interpretations are espoused in modern day religious literature and broadcasts. A basic deception which colors many of these teachings is the belief that it is impossible for a true believer to ever fall away. It should be recognized that this misconception has far-reaching effects upon individuals' attitudes about sin, church discipline and the risk of exposure to spiritual deception. It can produce a false sense of immunity to danger, numbing our spiritual senses and making us easy victims of Satan. The Apostle Paul wrote, "But I fear, lest by any means, as the serpent beguiled Eve through his subtilty, so your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ" (2 Cor. 11:3).

The time-tested, biblically sound doctrines and practices of our forefathers continue to be taught from our pulpits throughout the land and exercised in our churches and homes. May we all recognize the profound significance of being wholeheartedly committed to these truths, so that no seeds of rebellion or false doctrine will ever take root in our hearts. We can understand why the Apostle John said "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children walk in truth" (3 John 4).

May we as God's people, in "simplicity and godly sincerity" (2 Cor. 1:12) resist the threat of apostacy, standing firmly with Christ our leader, and with our beloved brethren, as faithful Jonathan stood with David.

dangerous -- the doctrines which deny the need of repentance, confession, regeneration and self-denial by the redeeming blood of Jesus Christ, and the grace of God extended to man through Him.

There is evidence that where believers have walked in the light among the unredeemed and spiritually un-instructed, God could use them to draw souls to Him. Should one, however, fail or neglect to walk carefully, or guard against these false teachings, or false Christs, we could suffer great spiritual harm and loss, and fail our God and Redeemer by not helping others to find Him.

We are living in the latter times, of which Christ said, **Because iniquity shall prevail, the love of many shall wax cold.** No wonder then that He added, **Watch and pray lest ye fall in temptations, for while the spirit is willing, the flesh is weak.** Fortunately, the brothers hold services at many of our schools of higher learning, to encourage and strengthen the good, and to counteract the evil. Yet, I felt moved, out of my own personal concern and anxiety, to speak out on this matter.

me as I observed the campus. The affirmation that summer had arrived was evident. The grass was green, the flowers were bright, the horses were grazing in the pasture, the older youth were mowing or doing other yard work.

One scene though pricked my heart and brought a flood of childhood memories rushing to my mind. The

younger children were getting ready for Bible school and were loading in the vans to head to church. I had to think back to when I was young. The week of vacation Bible school was a time to be with friends, learn more about God's love and goodness, doing crafts, and sharing with others at the program what we had learned. For a moment I wanted to drop what I was

doing and go with them; but then, I felt a greater need to pray.

I prayed for God's wisdom to be with the teachers. I asked God to help the teachers to be able to express the love of God in a way that can reach our youth. I prayed that the Spirit of God would be able to break through the hurt, pain and fear so many of the youth at Gateway Woods feel and allow His power to love and heal. Children's hearts and lives that have been broken by the treatment of their own fathers place a real challenge before our staff and Sunday school teachers. We teach them that God is their Father but their view of a father is not good. We tell them God loves them but they only remember love as something painful.

I couldn't completely express in words this struggle until I was listening to a song yesterday. With tears in my eyes and a lump in my throat I softly prayed, "Dear God may the hearts of all who hear these words realize the truth behind them and pray for children everywhere." I would love to share these same words with you and pray the same prayer.



for each loss.


Many a marriage rendered, many a

Late Friday night, June 19, we were all deeply concerned and saddened by the loss of our cherished church. It was struck by lightning,


which in time set a roaring fire through the whole building, completely destroying it, despite the efforts of six fire departments and a heavy rain.

We shall never forget that night. So many of us stood there with heavy hearts, watching so helpless, not being able to do anything about it, knowing our fond house of worship and everything in it was being destroyed.

It made one think how terrible it will be, when the whole earth will be a roaring fire, and if we don't prepare ourselves now, it will be too late, then, to do anything about it.

The loss, partially covered, was estimated at approximately \$500,000.

The first Apostolic Church was built in 1865 and replaced on the same site by the main part of the present structure in 1873. It was remodeled and added to in 1929, and again modernized and increased to in 1956 and 1958. It accommodated nearly a thousand people, and was often filled to capacity. Our membership is over 350, and about 370 children attend Sunday school.



The work of demolition and clean-up was undertaken and finished in one day. More than 100 men with willing hands and shovels, 30 trucks, nearly a dozen tractors equipped with scoopers, bull dozers, and crane hoist co-operated with almost unbelievable results. Scrap metal was salvaged and the fire rubble was hauled to an abandoned gravel pit. All that now remains is the dug out basement, where we plan to put up our new church.


A Building and Finance Committee has been elected. Along with the trustees and ministers, they have decided on an architect and are doing all they can to get the church rebuilt as soon as possible. A recent survey taken gives us a total population of approximately 850.

Bro. Leroy Huber and the Eureka congregation have so warmly welcomed us to join them. Our two congregations assemble together for

morning and afternoon services starting at 10:00 and 12:15. We also serve our lunches together. Eureka Sunday school will meet as usual in the morning, and our Sunday school will meet in the afternoon with our teachers.

We certainly appreciate their kindness, and enjoy being with them, as we still feel they are a part of us.

no need for me to carry those burdens in my pack today. I needed God to help carry those and if they were going to be tomorrow or next week or next year, there wasn't a thing that I could do about them anyway."

"So," he said, "do you know what I did? I unloaded that pack and I took off all of those borrowed worries, cares and woes out of my pack and I left them for God. I picked up what was left and I started feeling better. The load was lighter and I felt so much better because the load could now be carried. I could carry it!"

Don't we do that sometimes? We begin to worry and fret about what tomorrow might bring. We worry about our children if we are parents. We worry about our job . . . about the assignment that has some aspect to it that we don't quite know how we are going to handle. We can pick so many things to worry about, can't we, dear ones, and the load, because of it, can be so great?

But God teaches us that if we take one day at a time and if we will place our faith, our trust, and our confidence in Him, that He will help us through it. He doesn't say He is going to relieve us and not require us to go through some of those trying situations. He doesn't say that we won't have a load to carry, but . . .

He does say that He won't ask us to carry any more than what is within our own capacity. As long as we remember that and keep our faith, our trust and our confidence in Him, I think that the load we are asked to carry each day will be more bearable.

In the second reading, in Ephesians where the Apostle Paul is writing to the believers at the church at Ephesus, the church that he had helped nurture from its very begin-

ning, he begins this particular chapter to the Ephesians, "For this cause I Paul, the prisoner of Jesus Christ for you Gentiles, If ye have heard of the dispensation of the grace of God which is given me toward you." Ephesians 3:1, 2.

Let's stop right there and go back and pick up that first thought . . . "For this cause I Paul, the prisoner of Jesus Christ for you Gentiles." Ephesians 3:1. We know that the Apostle Paul, like the Psalmist we mentioned before, had many burdens to carry in his lifetime, too. We know that Paul himself writes that he was brought into the world to bring the message to the Gentiles . . . that he was the apostle for the Gentiles. We know he did an excellent job because so many of his writings remain in God's Word today.

But here he talks about being a prisoner. I don't know if he meant that in the sense that we usually use that term or not. He might have. Because we know for sure that Paul did spend time in the prisons in Rome and it may be that as he writes this, he finds himself on this occasion to be in the prison.

But he says, "For this cause I Paul, a prisoner of Jesus Christ for you Gentiles." Ephesians 3:1. There is another way of looking at that, I think. Maybe what the Apostle Paul is saying, instead of speaking of it negatively as if he is a prisoner, maybe he is saying, "I have given myself to my work, the work that God has assigned me to do. I am accepting that burden, that load which is the gospel story of Jesus Christ, and I am going to carry it to the Gentiles."

There may be other ways of looking at that as he has written it. It is not clear to me exactly how he means it. But we know that he is telling the people here at Ephesus that he has been given this gospel story to spread to the world, and that he is committed to doing just that.

He goes on to write, "If ye have heard of the dispensation of the grace of God which is given me toward you: How that by revelation he made known unto me the mystery . . ." Ephesians 3:2, 3. We know exactly how Paul found out the gospel message. We are sure that he heard about it before that day on the road to Damascus, but he didn't take any of it to heart.

He didn't believe it until that time

when God gave him this special dispensation when God blinded him on that road to Damascus and actually talked to Paul. Paul was instructed by God Himself in the person, we believe, and that is the revelation of the mystery Paul talks about.

He adds as a second thought here. He says, ". . . (as I wrote afore in few words, Whereby, when ye read, ye may understand my knowledge in the mystery of Christ)." Ephesians 3:3, 4. He is saying to them, "This is how I know the mystery of Christ. This is the experience I had . . . the thing that I went through . . . the teaching that I was given in that short period of time, and this is what I am imparting unto you. This is the knowledge that I want to share with you."

He goes on to say, "Which in other ages was not made known unto the sons of men, as it is now revealed unto his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit." Ephesians 3:5. He is saying, "I have a special message for you today. It's special because it has not been given to the world before, at least not by the Spirit and not in the depth of understanding that is available today."

He goes on to say, "That the Gentiles should be fellow heirs, and of the same body, and partakers of his promise in Christ by the gospel." Ephesians 3:6. We don't know (at least I don't know) the make up of the church at Ephesus. I don't know if the people were primarily Jewish or if the people were primarily Gentiles. I am assuming that there were at least some of both.

But here in this message, he seems to be talking especially to the Gentiles and teaching them of that new promise . . . that new hope that they have achieved because of the death and the rising again of our Lord and Saviour.

Paul says, "Whereof I was made a minister, according to the gift of the grace of God given unto me by the effectual working of his power." Ephesians 3:7. God made Paul a minister. God gave him the knowledge and understanding that he needed.

Has it ever crossed your mind what might have happened if Paul had not been willing to accept that ministry? It has mine. But such

thoughts, I try to erase from my mind, because I know the Apostle Paul has made such a tremendous and such an important impact on the life of many, many people across the world and across the ages. Many people know of the promise. Many people know of what Jesus did and how He was nailed to the cross and shed His blood for each and every one of us who would accept Him.

What if Paul had not accepted that charge? What if he had hidden and not followed the Lord? In my mind there is no doubt but what God would have found another way. But also in my mind, I know that He knew beforehand that Paul would accept the charge . . . would accept what he was asked to do.

Each one of us somewhere along in life's journey will be asked to do something for God. Will we be as willing and as ready to do the work as the Apostle Paul was? I pray that I will. I pray that we all will.

But you know, we can't do it by ourselves. We still have to have God the Holy Spirit working within us to be able to achieve anything worthwhile. Paul had all those things, and it can be our prayer that we, too, when we are asked to do God's work that we do it in God's way, and that we will be willing to commit ourselves to do it. Not our way, not in our time or according to our choice of times, but according to God's.

Paul goes on to say, "Unto me, who am less than the least of all saints, is this grace given, that I should preach among the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ." Ephesians 3:8. Paul realizes that he could be nothing or could do nothing. He is nothing, and he claims to be the least of the least of saints. He is right, you know. He couldn't do anything. All of the works that he did, the words that he left for us that we can read today, the people he touched, that he talked with, none of that could have happened save by the grace of God.

So it's not the Apostle Paul that we have to thank so much as God. Yet, we can't forget the fact either that the Apostle Paul willingly worked and suffered as he walked on this earth, and as he taught and brought the Word to the whole world, especially to the Gentiles.

"To the intent that now unto the

principalities and powers in heavenly places might be known by the church the manifold wisdom of God, according to the eternal purpose which he purposed in Christ Jesus our Lord: In whom we have boldness and access with confidence by the faith of him." Ephesians 3:10-12. The people who had lived before, some knew that there would one day come a Messiah, but I seriously doubt that any man who had lived, whether it be Job or Moses or Isaiah or any of the other prophets or men who lived and walked and did God's work, whether any one of them truly realized in depth just what the Lord and Saviour would bring to the earth.

That seems to be what the Apostle Paul was suggesting here, too, that even though there had been prophecy beforehand, God had held some of these things secret. Some of these things in their fullness were not revealed until the time had come for Jesus to walk upon the earth and to die upon the cross.

Paul goes on to say, "Wherefore I desire that ye faint not at my tribulations for you, which is your glory. For this cause I bow my knees unto the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, Of whom they whole family in heaven and earth is named, That he would grant you, according to the riches of his glory, to be strengthened with might by his Spirit in the inner man: That Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith; that ye, being rooted and grounded in love, May be able to comprehend with all saints what is the breadth, and length, and depth, and height . . ." Ephesians 3:13-18.

What is the breadth, the length, the depth and the height of the things that Jesus Christ brought to this earth? They are immeasurable, are they not, dear ones?

The promise of everlasting life. The peace, if we will but follow Him. The promise that our prayers will be answered if we will but bring them to Him. . . . and on and on and on!

In any one of those, are immeasurable blessings . . . immeasurable grace that He has brought to us. So the breadth, the length, the depth and the height are great beyond imagination!

"And to know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge, that ye might be filled with all the fullness of

God." Ephesians 3:19. All of these things that are immeasurable that have come from God are available to each and every one of us so that we might be filled as the Apostle Paul says here, ". . . with all the fullness of God." Ephesians 3:19.

God is passionate. God is patient. God is so very, very many things beyond what we can imagine . . . all powerful! Yet, as men, we cannot imagine just how great that power is or how wonderful His works or just what the depth is of the things that He can bring to us as individuals if we will but avail ourselves of that offering . . . if we will be commit ourselves . . . if we will but come to Him, even as a little child would come to Him.

That is the only way that we can even taste, that we can even get close to understanding the length and the breadth and the fullness of God.

These are the words that Paul says about that, "Now unto him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us, Unto him be glory in the church by Christ Jesus throughout all ages, world without end. Amen." Ephesians 3:20, 21.

The hope that the Apostle Paul has brought here to the believers at Ephesus, and the faith, the confidence, and the comfort were all things that the Psalm writer, that we read earlier, was longing for. So the two messages that we read here today seem to tie together. On the one hand in the day of King David, he had the need, the longing, the desire, and the problems. Then the Apostle Paul speaks of an heir, even in King David's line, the Son of God, Who came upon this earth and Who could provide all . . . ALL! . . . that was missing on that day when he wrote that Psalm that we read this morning.

The Apostle Paul is a very, very, special, special man. Yet, he was a man who had faults, too. But we can be so very thankful and so very appreciative that God did work within him to bring the fullness a little closer to us . . . the fullness that we read of today, so that we, too, can have a way, event as he describes, a way of reaching out and touching it and feeling it, and even bringing it in for our being and for our own comfort and care.

SERMON BY BRO. DON BRAKER OF KANSAS CITY, MO

"God Gives Comfort In Affliction"

Psalm 42 and Ephesians 3

Going back to the Psalm that we read here in the beginning, I am not sure who the Psalmist was. It was probably King David, but the words were apparently written at a time when his life was extremely troubled. yet, he knew even in his troubles that God could help him and that was where he could find the healing or the comfort or whatever it was that he needed.

In the very first verse, we read, "As the hart panteth after the water brooks, so panteth my soul after thee, O God." Psalm 42:1. As we read the Psalms, we realize that they are the hymns of the children of Israel, the Jewish nation. That is why there seems to be so much beauty in them, so much comfort, particularly in the case of this one.

Don't we feel much as the Psalm writer did so often? "My soul thirsteth for God, for the living God: when shall I come and appear before God?" Psalms 42:2. The suggestion seems to be that he may even have somewhat of a death wish here. He may be wishing for the day to come when he could see God.

Don't we sometimes, under a load of despair or a load of discouragement, feel much the same way, where is thy God? Others might ask us as they see us bending beneath the load that we carry, just as they asked the Psalm writer here, where is He thy God? Where is He that thou would look to, and that thou would seek for Thy comfort?

Has He left you? Has He gone away? Those are not the words that it says here, but the suggestion seems to be just that. That is not what we need, is it, dear ones, when we have the cares and the woes weighing so heavily upon our heart? We don't need someone taunting us or asking us, where is that God that we talk about? We need their help and their

comfort too.

The writer says, "When I remember these things, I pour out my soul in me: for I had gone with the multitude, I went with them to the house of God, with the voice of joy and praise, with a multitude that kept holy day. Why art thou cast down, O my soul?" Psalms 42:4, 5. He doesn't say what has burdened him or what caused him to feel so low to write this Psalm.

Part of that is what makes it so beautiful because it can be applicable to whatever the earthly care or woe might be that we have at the moment.

The Psalmist goes on to say, "O my God, my soul is cast down within me: therefore will I remember thee from the land of Jordan, and of the Hermonites, from the hill Mizar. Deep calleth unto deep at the noise of thy waterspouts: all thy waves and thy billows are gone over me." Psalms 42:6, 7. He pictures himself, it seems, in some deep water here. It is as if the waterspouts that God had made had passed over him, and all of the waves and all of the billows had weighed him down.

Yet, he knows in his heart -- the words tell us so -- that he knows the Lord is there. Because it says, "Yet the Lord will command his lovingkindness in the daytime, and in the night his song shall be with me, and my prayer unto the God of my life. I will say unto God my rock, Why hast thou forgotten me? why go I mourning because of the oppression of the enemy?" Psalms 42:8, 9. It seems he is beyond consolation. His words keep coming forth with the weight that apparently is feeding on his soul.

Yet, this is but one of the Psalms, and if it was written by David, we know that he wrote many, many more so that even though in this one where the despair seems to be so thick and so heavy, there were others that he

wrote thanking God where he recognized that God was there and helped him through very trying times.

Even though we know that King David held a special place with God, we know he was a man and he had problems. He sinned. We know his life was full of trouble, turmoil and sometimes the devil was allowed by him to take control. So his life was heavy in all kinds of tribulations and yet, on the other side, he had the joys that God brought to him . . . the joys and the blessings!

As we read the Psalms, particularly those that were written by King David, we know that they can find a special comfort for us, and a special peace.

Yet, sometimes we see even as in that Psalm that King David was weighed down very heavily with woe, turmoil and troubles. We feel that way often and I sometimes wonder if when we feel that way, if a lot of it is not simply a fault of our own. It is something that we brought to bear out of our own being. It is not something that God has put on us. It is something that we have brought on ourselves.

I read one time where a man was telling about how the time had come for him when he was feeling much as the Psalmist felt. Feeling a special heavy load upon his shoulders, crying for help, crying to God and to his fellowmen for help and it just didn't seem to come. Then he said one day, "I stopped and took that load off my shoulders and I began to look at it."

He said, "Do you know what I found in that load? I found worries and cares in that load about tomorrow. I was borrowing worries of things that were coming tomorrow. Another big part of my load were things that were coming next week or next month or next year. I decided that there was
