

REPORT ON TRIP TO EASTERN EUROPE

(Continued from August Issue of Silver Lining)

RUSSIA: We did not travel to Russia but we visited with two of the elders in Budapest. In Russia, our brethren live in the Ukraine area. They have gone through many hardships but they feel this has helped them grow in the Spirit. They have recently had many converts and their membership is approaching 500. They had 70 repenting who were mostly young people. Groups of 30 and 17 had recently been baptized. They have two Houses of Prayer which are private homes that have been remodeled to accommodate 150 persons. They have had up to 300 assemble for provings and baptisms. There are nine additional assemblies in homes. Military service is much like Yugoslavia which is much more lenient than in the past. The good behavior of the young brothers was noted by the authorities and this seemed to impress them.

The Russians also expressed thanks for American help and one elder, Peter Karcsa, told us, "Many thanks to the Americans -- we cannot repay you -- may the Lord do this. We have seen that prayers have a mighty power behind them".

CLOSING THOUGHTS AND REFLECTIONS. The language barrier was a problem but we were very fortunate to have excellent interpreters. We appreciated so much the services of Andy Hunyady and his brother, George. Also Eva Szabo from Ersekgsanad, Hungary, who traveled

with us to Romania and Yugoslavia. While in Budapest, Gizella Heffa and Sarah Toth also were very helpful as well as others.

For some of us the highlight of the trip was the visit to Romania. Singing hymns after supper in elder Virtaci's home until midnight was a tremendous experience even though we were very tired. We sang in three different languages but the melody was all the same. This was most impressive and we now know that music is surely a universal language.

The meeting with the Romanian elders was humbling. They appreciate so much the freedom they now have to worship. We have had this all of our life but do we really appreciate it?

We will be making reports to the World Relief and Mission Committees in the near future to help coordinate our assistance to the brethren in Eastern Europe. Your financial support as well as your prayer support is very much appreciated.

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

BIBLICAL ASPECTS OF OBEDIENCE

The doctrine of obedience remains as one of the most significant foundational priciples of the Christian faith. A most fundamental aspect of our relationship to God centers on our obedience to His ways. To exclude obedience from faith is to deny a true faith.

During conversion we become crucified with Christ (Gal. 2:20), which means we surrender our will. We voluntarily resolve to live in obedience. The Lord said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments" (John 4:5). The Apostle John wrote, "He that saith he abideth in him, ought himself also so to walk, as he walked" (1 John 2:6). The Lord Jesus "became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him" (Heb. 5:9).

Unconditional obedience involves following God's commands without always knowing the specific purpose He has in mind. This clearly reflects the Bible's standard of obedience. Abraham exemplified this when he answered God's call to leave his home country: "he went out, not knowing whither he went" (Heb. 11:8). Later, he obeyed God's command to offer up his beloved son Isaac as a burnt offering (Gen. 22:1-14). Although Abraham is usually referred to as the father of faith, he could as well be referred to as the father of obedience. Foremost is the example of the obedience by the Lord Jesus, who willingly gave His life and shed His blood for our atonement. Although He could have summoned ten thousand angels to lift Him out of His suffering, He instead prayed to the Father, "Not my will, but thine, be done" (Luke 22:42). He was willing to suffer rebuke, humiliation and death to obey God's wish. Jesus taught that if we obey His will, eventually we will know that it is the truth and is of God (John 7:17).

Anyone who sincerely seeks to live a life of obedience will encounter conflict. Self-will and rebellion are Satan's ageless weapons to over-

throw submission and obedience. Deceptive influences of modern society promote self-assertion and self-exaltation. Like a magnet, the cry of individualism seeks to draw a believer out of a humble and content state of biblical obedience. When a child of God falls prey to this deception, his love grows cool and he begins to withdraw from the mainstream of the fellowship. When a group of believers becomes collectively weakened by patterns of individualism, the entire church suffers. The result is a dim and divided witness to the world.

We must strongly resist the popular forces of self-centeredness which seek to undermine our love and unity. God wants His people to be perfectly joined together and to follow the same spiritual judgments (1 Cor. 1:10). When we find we can no longer do this, we have exalted ourselves above the church. The end of the church age is typified in the condition of the Laodiceans, who were so self-sufficient that they said we "have need of nothing" (Rev. 3:17). Jesus replied, "As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten: be zealous therefore, and repent" (Rev. 3:19)

Satan also seeks to offer a compromise between human reasoning and godly obedience. However, true obedience implies a complete trust in God, without conditions. Naaman, the Syrian, learned that he had to move beyond human reasoning to simple obedience in order to be healed (2 Kings 5:1-14). Suffering from leprosy, he sought healing from the prophet Elisha. Told to bathe himself seven times in the muddy waters of the Jordan, Naaman turned away in a rage, feeling the advice made no sense. When he abandoned his human reasoning and obeyed, he was healed.

The Lord has consistently prommised blessings to the obedient. Regarding Israel he said, "Oh that there were such a heart in them that they would fear me, and keep all my

commandments always, that it might be well with them, and with their children for ever!" (Deut. 5:29). The promise is repeated at the very end of the Bible. "Blessed are they that do his commandments, that they may have right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates into the city" (Rev. 22:14).

Obedience to God and His Word covers a very wide scope. Believers are to submit "one to another in the fear of God" (Eph. 5:21). They are to please their "neighbor for his good to edification" (Rom. 15:2). They are responsible to obey those who are over them in the Lord (Heb. 13:7,17) and to submit to the Spirit-directed exhortations of church leadership (Acts 15).

Believers are obligated to obey the authority of government, so long as no biblical teachings are violated. "Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers . . . the powers that be are ordained of God" (Rom. 13:1).

Obedience is one of the hallmarks of a godly family. "Children, obey your parents in all things: for this is well pleasing unto the Lord" (Col. 3:20). "Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord" (Eph. 5:22). These commandments clearly do not imply dominance, for parents are warned not to provoke their children to wrath (Eph. 6:4) and husbands are taught to love their wives as Christ loved the church and gave His life for it (Eph. 5:25).

Obedience is not a burden, it is a great privilege. It results in much inner joy and contentment. Jesus said, "If ye keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love; even as I have kept my Father's commandments, and abide in his live" (John 15:10). When we submit to the Word and the subordinate authorities which God has ordained (particularly Christ's body, the church), we will find a pathway which leads to love and peace and righteousness, rather than the fear, and turmoil and sin of this world.

SOVIET UNION

A package of Russian Bibles and children's story books was sent to Elder Bro. Peter Karcsa (Soviet Union) several months ago. It never arrived. With the tremendous increase in interest in Christianity in the Soviet Union, there is an increased demand for Christian literature. Perhaps they were taken along the way by someone in whose heart the Lord is now working.

In spite of this setback we continue to work toward being able to supply our Soviet brethren with the Bibles and children's books that they want and need.

The Russian believers desire their Bibles to be in either the Ukrainian or Romanian language -- not Russian. A brother and sister traveling to Eastern Europe took with them more than fifty Ukrainian children's Bible story books and delivered them to Elder Bro. Janos Papp (Budapest). It appears that sending future shipments of Bibles/children's story books to the brethren in Budapest for subsequent distribution within the Soviet Union is the preferred method.

ROMANIA

Two elder brothers from Romania, Albert Szabo and Alexandru Virtaci, were able to travel to America and attend the annual conference of the American elders and also to attend the national World Relief Committee meetings. This was an experience that could only have been dreamed of a year ago. These dear elder brethren were able to bring us up to the minute on conditions within their country. They also many times over expressed the gratitude of the brothers and sisters in Romania for our help in many areas.

A development which as been very exciting, but which has not yet been finalized, is the possibility of the Romanian government giving back to our church in Romania some of their buildings which were confiscated many years ago. These buildings have been used for several different purposes other than church, and many have fallen into disrepair. When title actually passes back to our brethren, they will surely need some help in bringing these buildings up to a condition where they can again be used for assembling as a congregation.

We have been trying to find a Romanian version of the Childrens' Bible Story Book for use by the brethren in Romania. Several sources have been checked, and when the right books are found, we intend to ship them to the churches in Romania.

The Romanian brethren have a desire for large print Bibles, especially for use on the pulpit. We in the U.S. would be very glad to accommodate them; however, they have not yet found a satisfactory example. The

Romanian elders were able to give us some direction on the type of Bible they need, but it appears that it will take some time to acquire this type of Bible. In the meantime, we intend to begin sending normal-sized-print Bibles to Romania with the food packages, as described below.

The Romanian Zion's Harp is in need of a better translation and should be rewritten. No one outside of Romania has been found who is qualified to do this work, so it appears that it needs to be done by Romanians within Romania.

We need to publicize better the capability of our church to get Bibles and song books into Romania and the Soviet Union. There are Missionary Committee funds already allocated for this purpose, especially Zion's Harp, which are a priority item.

Turning to food packaging, we continue to work through Christian Aid Ministries (CAM) to get food boxes into Romania. They are establishing three distribution points within Romania, one near Arad, which is in the vicinity of many of our brethren.

However, there is a great desire to once again package and ship parcels from Bluffton. As this is written, it is hoped that our own food packaging can begin in September.

The recommendation is, that after our packaging starts up again, that we place two months' worth of food packages, clothes, medicine, and Bibles into a sea container. CAM can then help us arrange transportation from Bluffton to Arad, Romania. The materials would be given directly to our brethren for distribution within Romania. We may have an opportunity to help or brethren acquire some trailers to pull behind their four-wheel drive vehicles to carry out this distribution.

In the meantime, CAM is checking on the possibility of expediting the current shipments from Holland to Romania with less red tape and faster distribution inside the country.

There are currently over 350 names on the list for food packages in Romania. We are researching additional lists for more names that could possibly be added.

Several brothers met with David Troyer of CAM recently to discuss the food-packaging project. CAM is more

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHURCH WORK PROJECT Shadyside, Ohio

On June 15, 1990, a flash flood (the result of unusually heavy rainfall in a localized area) struck several small streams in the Shadyside, OH, area. Twenty-six persons lost their lives. Many narrowly escaped. 187 homes were affected. 72 dwellings were completely destroyed.

The Works Projects Committee has approved at this time projects to rebuild two homes. One of these is ready to start as of the first of September.

Shadyside, Ohio, is approximately 10 miles south of Wheeling, WV, 40 miles north of Sardis, OH, and approximately 120 miles southeast of Akron, OH.

Anyone interested in helping to reconstruct a home and possibly some lives, may contact Bro. Albert Gasser (Rittman, OH), phone (216) 925-3956. All types of construction skills as well as unskilled laborers are needed.

than willing to help us out in any way possible. They also met with Mahlon Gingerich of Iron Curtain Ministries, an Amish organization which has been wonderfully supportive of sending food parcels to our brethren in Romania.

Some families in Romania could use some of our used clothing. There is also a need for quilts and comforters. The sea container from Bluffton could be used to ship these items.

Bro. Heinrich Schmidt of West Germany is receiving \$500 per month from the World Relief Committee for medicine for Romania.

YUGOSLAVIA

Bro. Leon is sending funds every other month to Yugoslavia for the aid

of the brethren there. This amount includes aid to brethren who are former prisoners and their families.

While in Yugoslavia in June, Bro. Andy inquired about the continuing need for aid from the World Relief Committee, and Elder Bro. Rudolf Metzger of Yugoslavia confirmed the fact that the needs still are great.

Bro. Andy had a list of five young brothers who had been released from prison and qualified for aid from our Prisoner Aid Fund. Their needs had been confirmed by several of the Yugoslavian elders.

HUNGARY

Funds are sent every other month

ANGER AND FORGIVENESS Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle

If someone treats us in an undesirable manner, we don't like it. We may become crest-fallen and dejected. We wonder why we were spoken to in that manner, why we were treated in that way. Along with the feeling of being crushed there is usually some anger, not always expressed but very much there.

There is also a feeling that the person who has wronged us, owes us an apology; in fact, owes us a debt. Forgiveness cancels that debt.

Our Lord Jesus Christ taught us that we should forgive other 70 times 7 times, if necessary. Matthew 18:21, 22 "Then came Peter to him, and said, Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? Till seven times? Jesus saith unto him, I say not unto thee, until seven times: but until seventy times seven."

My first impression of this teaching is that someone would need to be in very bad condition to repeat the same offense 490 times, after which, each time, we would need to forgive him. However, our Lord Jesus Christ may have had something else in mind and that something else is what we want to consider in this article.

To forgive and forget is a common teaching. It means that once we forgive we should no longer hold a grudge or have bitterness toward that person. To actually forget completely is something beyond us unless there is something wrong with our minds. The brain is like a computer in that it stores information for recall. If we have a forgiving attitude we don't dwell on the unpleasant information which has been fed into the brain, but rather, we concentrate on the tasks immediately before us and other, more pleasant things. Through no fault of our own, a healthy brain retains unpleasant experiences which have caused us deep anguish, even though they may not be recalled or thought about very often.

Sometimes, when we have been wronged, we just keep recalling it, and it may be a source of bitterness and even ill health for ourselves. We might possibly recall it as many as 490 times. One explanation of what the Lord Jesus Christ taught is that each time an offense is recalled it should be forgiven. We should think, "He owes me nothing. He has no debt to me because I have forgiven him and I forgive him anew. Every time I think of it I forgive him."

After we recall the matter 490 times and forgive the person each time, it has become a habit and we continue to forgive forever.

The anger we feel toward someone who has dealt us an injustice may cause us to recall the incident. Every time we recall it, let's forgive. This is what our Lord Jesus Christ taught.

BIBLES NEEDED NOW

In November of 1989 we began our work in sending used Bibles to foreign countries where the Word of God is very scarce. We have received used and worn Bibles and Bible Story Books in the past, but not near enough. After making the needed repairs, we then package and send them by surface mail to Africa and the Philippines.

The response so far has been somewhat discouraging. If we consider the number of churches we have in our faith and all of the homes and families involved, there surely has to be a lot of used or worn Bibles that could be donated to this work. Right now we need over three hundred Bibles and have less than twenty.

We have been getting letters from individuals from these countries very often. Sometimes three a day which say, "Please send us a Bible." We have already bought "new" Bibles from the Leo, IN, Bible Distribution Center. But that is far more expensive than donated ones.

Hopefully, all of us will take this seriously and help send the Word of God to these needy people. We look forward to hearing from anyone in helping in this work. We do want to thank everyone that has already helped in some

My wife and I first tasted of this Christian charity with Sis. Irene Baer in Oppergruppenbach, Germany, who lives with her believing Sis. Julia. Irene was converted in Portland over 30 years ago and lived for several years in the northwest. Both received us with a special kindness.

A few days later we met our brother and sister-in-law, Elder Bro. Nathan Steffen and Sis. Marilyn and drove to Adolsfurt where Elder Bro. Hans Heer received us warmly. Not knowing we hadn't eaten yet, his wife Dena and daughter Edith hastily prepared us a meal in the Biblical example of Abraham who entertained the 3 strangers who abruptly appeared near his tent in Hebron. We had sweet fellowship with the Heers and were enriched in our short stay in their home.

On Sunday, June 24, our other family members joined us in Berne, Switzerland. The brethren there showered upon us not a little kindness but made room for us in their homes, helped us to church, and provided a special meal for us all in the Church on the Gibbel where Elder Bro. Herman Gambly serves. He and is wife Hauni received us so graciously. We were given a walking tour of downtown Berne by Elder Bro. Herman Marti and ministering Brother Paul Bauman. Among the points of interest we were shown the building where our grandfather Bro. Edward Grimm preached 70 years ago this summer. He and Brother Robert Bahler who also ministered the Word were selected to bring a monetary gift from the American churches to the impoverished brethren in Europe after World War I.

Continuing our travels, we drove east with the intention of some of us being in Hallein, Austria, the next Sunday and then on to Budapest, Hungary. But God had other plans; for my wife, Sis. Connie and I were to remain in and around Salzburg for another 11 days. While in Hohen Salzburg Castle, Connie experienced a compound fracture of her right femur where she had a tumor removed nearly a year ago. Fortunately, there was an orthopaedic hospital a few miles away where she was treated and successfully operated on a few days later. It was during this unexpected stay the loving interest and care of the brethren manifested itself so wonderfully. I was given transportation, invited into the believer's homes, given meals, had our wash done, and was invited to stay in the church at Hallein where a small room was furnished. I thought of the Shunemite woman who provided a room, bed, and a table for the prophet Elisha so many years ago as he traveled near her home, and I felt so fortunate to be the recipient of such thoughtfulness. Connie likewise was treated with equal kindness as sisters from Hallein and Salzburg came to visit her in the hospital bringing beautiful bouquets of flowers. Some couldn't speak English, and one dear sister patted my wife's hand, pointed to Connie's heart and then to her own and then smilingly pointed up to Heaven. Her hospital stay was in a 6 bed ward with 5 other women and the young mother next to her asked "How is it that you being a stranger in Austria have more visitors than I who have lived here all my life?

"I don't know them, but they are the people of our church who are like our churches in America" Connie

answered.

"How beautiful" was the woman's

reply.

Experiencing difficulty on booking a flight home, we were informed by our American travel agency that no refund could be granted on our return tickets we had to cancel and new tickets for home would run over \$3,000. for my wife and I. Upon learning of our dilemma, a young brother, Frederick Haas, volunteered in English to help us.

"For you I do it. It is no problem." He then proceeded to take off work a day and a half and drove to Munich with our return tickets and was successful in having them applied to another airline which had openings a few days later at a fraction of the cost

we had expected to pay.

To further aid us in our departure, the brother who recorded the "Long Book" songs, Josef Farkash drove us several hundreds of miles to Mannheim and then the next day to Frankfurt where we boarded our plane for home. At Mannheim we stayed overnight at the apartment of Sis. Christine Schwindt, the widowed aunt

of Bro. Josef. It was then we learned of her great service in world relief work. Last year she sent 380 boxes of clothing to the poor brethren in Romania. Many of the town people know of her efforts in this field and bring her much clothing that is practically new. On occasion deutch marks are slipped into the clothing to help her in shipping expenses. She was truly an inspiration to us, and just over a week before we were treated to a slide presentation in Hallein of the Swiss, German, and Austrian churches collecting clothes, goods, etc. for the churches in Romania. Thirty large vans were used to transport the gifts to 15 churches earlier this spring. The brethren assembled at the place of business of Bro. Philipp Haas who provided some of the vehicles for the project. He has a large wood specialty factory employing many workers, and upon a job completion he gives a Bible to the owners. In other ways, he finds opportunities to distribute many Bibles a year.

Space doesn't permit us to mention all the deeds of the dear brothers and sisters who so freely and lovingly gave of their time and substance to make our stay a memorable and unforgettable experience in spite of the pain and discomfort Connie underwent with her injury and subsequent

surgery.

When the Son of Man comes in His glory and invites into His Kingdom His faithful saints, He shall recount their deeds on earth, ". . . I was an hungred and ye gave me meat, I was thirsty and ye gave me drink, I was a stranger, and ye took me in . . . I was sick, and ye visited me . . . Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me." (Matthew 25) And so when life's little work is done and eternity dawns for the dear brothers and sisters we have written about. an entrance shall be ministered unto them abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

"The righteous shall flourish like the palm tree . . ."

Psalm 92:12

It's enlightening to think about comparisons (of which the above is one of many) to clarify Scriptural truths.

The palm tree of Scripture is the date palm. It grows to the height of 50 to 100 ft. It does not grow wild, but has to be planted and carefully tended when young. It's different from other trees in that it grows from within. Its trunk is straight, tall and unbroken, terminating in a crown of emerald-green plumes. It is a beautiful and useful tree.

Because the Palm tree grows from within, its living tissue is in a column in the center of the trunk. The bark can be removed; it can be scarred and cut, but still the palm grows up and toward the sky for the bark is only the support and protection for the inner life of the palm. The quantity and quality of its fruit are determined by the success of the growth of its inner life. Likewise, our Christian growth is within. Our "outer man" is like the bark of the palm -- we can be mistreated, scarred by various circumstances, but if our inner self is healthy, nothing can retard our inner growth. Isn't that enough to make you rejoice!

The palm has 360 uses: food, timber, rope, cloth, baskets, mats, couches, brooms, shades, etc. Even the seeds are ground and fed to camels. The tree's roots extend far and deep into the earth taking advantage of hidden moisture. It thrives even in dry and sandy soil.

What a comparison! We, who call ourselves children of the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, need to drive our roots down deep into the source of Living Water for sustenance through our every day, glad or sad. In comparison to the palm, we ought to be willing to be used in many different ways. Have you ever heard, if one wasn't assigned a desired task, the remark "Well, I'll just sit back"? Not so with the palm tree. It is used for food but also for mats.

This bit of information was a glad surprise -- the palm bears its best fruit in old age; the fruit is sweetest when the palm is eighty years old. What do you think about that? When an apple tree gets old, the apples get smaller and smaller until it's worthless. Not so with the palm. The older it gets, the better and sweeter the fruit. It should be that way with us,

too. The farther we travel on our Christian journey, the sweeter we should get. "The righteous shall flourish like the palm tree," which suggests so much, whether it's the orderly and regular aspect of the tree, its fruitfulness, the perpetual greenness of its foliage, or the height at which the foliage grows as far as possible from earth and as near as possible to heaven! FORWARD

This booklet is intended to give a brief description of the Apostolic Christian Church. It tells of the church's origins, presents a short summary of its doctrine, gives its understanding of God's marvelous plan of salvation, and explains certain aspects of its worship.

Often, as various people come in contact with the Apostolic Christian Church, they become interested in many aspects of its beliefs and practices. The church, by diligently applying New Testament standards to everyday life and worship and also by practicing a deep reverence toward God, draws questions concerning its literal interpretation of Scriptures.

It is hoped that those who read this booklet will have many of their questions answered. However, all who are interested are encouraged to attend an Apostolic Christian assembly and learn by observation and hearing what is the true heartbeat of this body of Christians.

Salvation through Jesus Christ is man's greatest treasure. The Apostolic Christian Church seeks to do its utmost to help explain this marvelous gift from God, and prays diligently that others also will turn to God in true repentance, experience peace with God and man, and the gift of eternal life.

I DESCRIPTION

The Apostolic Christian Church believes in and promotes the doctrines of the gospel found in the Bible. It seeks to follow the standards set forth in the Holy Scriptures.

The church consists of approxi-

mately eighty congregations in twenty states. This includes two small churches in Canada and two in Japan. The total number of members is approximately 11,000. Children and unbaptized adults (called "friends of the truth") constitute another 9,000. Thus, about 20,000 persons attend the Apostolic Christian Church.

The church conducts worship services on many college campuses in several states in order to teach the Holy Scriptures to persons atttending universities.

The church is also engaged in many activities to benefit mankind. These pursuits are all done in the name of Christ. An organization called World Relief personally collects both finances and material aid for distribution to persons in need on a worldwide basis. It also makes distributions through a variety of approved organizations.

A national Missonary Committee has been established to follow through on opportunities to spread God's Word. An organization called Work Projects exists to help administer charitable efforts, whereby individual brethren join work teams on special projects to aid the needy and oppressed.

Thousands of Scriptures are distributed annually through Apostolic Christian Bible distribution. In recent years efforts to spread God's Word in this manner have increased sharply. Annual disbursements have quadrupled in the recent past.

The church operates ten nursing homes for the elderly in five states. Included in this work are nearly two hundred apartment units for elderly persons not requiring specialized care. Also, the church operates a beautiful and modern Home for the Handicapped in Morton, IL, and a spacious and pleasant Children's Home in Leo, IN. These facilities provide physical, emotional, and spiritual support for handicapped persons and needy children. Also, a preschool program is operated at Athens, AL.

While the church is engaged in a multitude of charitable activities to help the poor and needy, its most accurate description rests in its devotion to the Word of God and its ongoing commitment to the glorious cause of Christ. Its major intent is to preach, teach, and live the gospel of Christ so that others also will hear and re-

spond affimatively to this message of salvation — and someday, by God's marvelous grace, enter into the portal of heaven.

II ORIGIN

The church was founded in the early 1830's by Samuel Froehlich, a young seminary student in Switzerland, who had experienced a Biblical conversion. Feeling led of God, he began preaching the simple truths of the Bible. Ultimately, some 110 congregations were formed in thirty-five years in several European countries. Froehlich's intent was to organize a church based on a literal interpretation of God's Word. He emphasized the verse, "... teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you." (Matt. 28:20). The church, while recognizing Froehlich's work, gives God the glory for all these accomplishments.

Froehlich was a scholarly and energetic preacher who, against great odds and many disappointments, powerfully conveyed the message of salvation. He was also skillful in persuasion, especially in personal visits, and in this way drew many to the Bible's pattern of repentance. His attitudes and Biblical understandings were shaped, in part, by the radical reformers of the sixteenth century known as Anabaptists whose doctrinal motto was "Sola Scriptura." This meant that Scriptures alone constituted the only true foundation for doctrine and life — and they were to be followed. The church has continued over the years to follow diligently New Testament teachings, and to regard the entire Word as infallible and inerrant.

The Anabaptists were the first reformers of sixteenth century Eruope to teach and practice adult baptism or "believer's baptism" as opposed to infant baptism. Froehlich, too, instituted the practice of adult baptism in his churches. In Europe, the church was known as Evangelical Baptist. It later became known as Apostolic Christian in America. This name was chosen because the church follows the teachings of Christ and the Apostles.

The Apostolic Christian Church found a presence in America in 1847,

when a church was organized in Lewis County, NY. The site was in the Croghan-Naumburg area. Another church was formed a year later at Sardis, OH, in that state's southeastern area.

From this beginning in America the church grew, primarily in the fertile farming areas of the midwest. As immigrants came from Europe (mostly from the Froehlich churches) and new converts were added in the United States, the church flourished. Early ministers, groomed and inspired by Froehlich in Europe, were zealous in preaching the Word in America.

From the 1920's on, most of the new churches formed in America were founded in metropolitan areas. This was because many of the church's offspring sought occupational opportunities in areas other than farming. Thus, today the Apostolic Christian Church consists of a blend of city and rural churches. While most of the larger churches still exist in rural towns and villages (there are a few exceptions), it is interesting to note the presence today of Apostolic Christian churches in large cities — such as Washington, D.C., Los Angeles, Chicago, Denver, Portland, Sarasota, Fort Lauderdale, Detroit, Phoenix, Kansas City, Philadelphia and Indianapolis.

III DOCTRINE

The doctrine of the church is based on a literal interpretation of the Bible which is recognized as God-inspired, infallible, and inerrant. New Testament teachings are carefully followed and counsel and advice are sought from examples found in the Old Testament.

It is believed that salvation is obtained by grace through faith in Jesus Christ. True faith embodies the component of obedience which instructs a soul to do as the Lord Jesus emphatically taught, "Repent; for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." (Matt. 4:17) The Biblical pattern of repentance is observed which includes godly sorrow (II Cor. 7:10) for a past sinful life, confession of sins (Matt. 3:6, Acts 19:18), restitution for past wrongs (Matt. 5:23, 24), and becoming dead to sin (I Pet. 2:24). The wonderful and matchless grace of God is given to

those who are humble in heart (James 4:6), along with peace and forgiveness from God.

Following a conversion, a growth in Christian graces, and manifesting the fruit of the Spirit, the new convert then gives a testimoney of his or her faith and conversion experience to the congregation. This is followed by water baptism by immersion (Matt. 3:13-17). Baptism symbolizes the burial of the old sinful nature into the death of Christ, and the subsequent rising of a soul out of the baptismal waters as a new creature in Christ Jesus (Rom. 6:3, 4). This is followed by the laying on of hands whereby a church elder prays over the new member as the official confirmation of the presence of the Holy Spirit in the believer's heart (Acts 8:17-19).

The new member is thus formally united with the church, which is Christ's body. He is expected to fully embrace the doctrinal and lifestyle standards of the church which are based on God's Word.

A life of peace and joy follows as one pursues the pathways of Biblical holiness and sanctification. Despite trials, and potential sorrow and temptation, God's grace is sufficient for humble hearts to receive happiness and contentment (I Tim. 6:6) in the expectation of heaven — if they are true and faithful until life's end. Selfdenial (Matt. 16:24), separation from sin and unfruitful works (II Cor. 6:14-18), and nonconformity to worldliness (Rom. 12:2) are integral parts of the Christian walk of life.

(Continued from Page 36) the Lord and Saviour who was there to see it and we believe He sees it today if we are willing to do alms; if we are willing to labor for the Lord in a small way as this poor widow. She possibly had no other way that she could do anything for the Lord, had no means to minister unto His people and she cast in her two mites, the last she had and the Lord saw it; it did not escape His attention. Beloved, it is a comfort unto us that we likewise can do for the Lord. Even the weakest and smallest of the children of God have an opportunity to cast in their two mites. It does not mean necessarily to cast into the contribution box.

but I believe in humble prayer in supporting to good work, in supporting the brethren that are called upon to sound the good Word and to labor in the vineyard, to pray for them fervently and also to support them. Oh, that each and every one can do so and the brethren likewise. If we all then stand together and stand for the good, God will bless it.

It has often occurred to me, this instance of which we have heard, the Saviour standing in the temple at the treasury. Later, then the disciples called his attention how this temple was built with the beautiful stones and all the gold. They which came to see it also admired it. We find He did not even comment upon it, did not say, "It indeed is a wonderful building." But he told them the day was coming that not one stone would remain upon another; He did not comment upon the building. He saw the sad condition of the house of Israel. The people of Israel did not accept Him as a Redeemer and Messiah which was promised. He told them that even that temple which they held high in their estimation should be destroyed and not one stone be left upon another. It often has been strengthening to me that the Saviour was not moved at things of that kind.

In another instance where He invited or told souls to follow Him. they found reasons to excuse themselves. We find that one young man spoke to Him, "I wish to be excused." He said his father died and he wished to bury him and Jesus said, "Let the dead bury the dead; come and follow me." And likewise we find in every instance where they found reason to excuse themselves. We find one bought a piece of land and he wished to see it. Another had bought some oxen and he wished to prove them. And we find that a third said he had taken himself a wife and wish the Lord excuse him. Now we might in our short-sightedness say that some of these excuses might have been worth weighing; that if a man's father died the Lord would surely be willing to excuse him. But the soul's salvation is the first thing we should take into consideration and we should not allow a single thing in this world to prevent us from following the Lord. Oh, it is definite and clear that if we allow ourselves to be held back, whatever it may be, that it will not be subject to the kingdom of heaven. We find the Lord said, and we find it in the Word that those who wish to excuse themselves, they are not and they shall not taste of the wedding supper that is prepared. Oh, beloved, that proves to us that God will not trifle with the invitation He will set forth. Therefore, all that hear the invitation that is extended from the Lord and laid to their hearts, they should not seek to excuse themselves. Those who have an opportunity to hear the invitations of the Lord should be as we can read of Zaccheus, that sinner, did not consider himself worthy. He climbed into that tree in the hope he might get a glimpse of the Lord and Saviour. He would have been satisfied if he could have only seen the Lord and Saviour. He climbed into that tree as the Saviour passed by. We find that the Saviour saw him and said, "Zaccheus, make haste and come down; for today I must abide in thy house." Beloved, what a blessing: what a difference there is between the one that wishes to partake of the blessings and the other that wishes to excuse himself. We have heard here of the prophecies of the Lord and Saviour of the temple and of the teachings. We have heard how that the Lord and Saviour mentioned and prophesied of the destruction of Jerusalem. I believe many of you have read of the record how that Jerusalem was destroyed and especially the temple. It was fulfilled to the very letter as the Lord and Saviour prophesied. Later we find in the second chapter that he pointed to the end of times, but that is not yet fulfilled. We believe according to the scripture that it is surely near at hand. He said here how nation shall rise against nation, and great perplexity upon the earth and tribulations, etc. We have heard here, "Men's hearts failing them for fear and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth; for the powers of heaven shall be shaken." I have often thought in this perplexed time in which we are living, the men that are in authority in different lands are striving to plan universal peace, or striving for something, but their hearts fail them. They know, I believe, in their own hearts it is impossible to bring about the peace they are talking about. I definitely and clearly points to the fulfillment of the Scripture.

Beloved, let us turn our hearts unto wisdom. Let us do then as the Saviour said in this parable, "When we see the buds swell, when the tree sends forth its twigs and the buds, we surely then know that Spring is at hand." Let us not be of the foolish as the Lord and Saviour at one place had to tell His hearers. He told them that they could tell what weather they should have. In this time when the winds are from the west, we say that it is fair weather, and when it is from the south, we say we are going to have rain. Things that are contained in the Word of God and prophecies are contained therein, let us not be likewise but let us profit by this Word knowing as we can see here. "Behold the fig tree, and all the trees: When they now shoot forth, ye see and know of your ownselves that summer is now nigh at hand." "Verily I say unto you, this generation shall not pass away, till all be fulfilled." It often creates a great concern in our hearts and it is our fervent prayer that God might be with us and shield and protect us that the things we have heard here, this terrible time of sore tribulation which is before us: we find that there was never a time of tribulation like it, even from the beginning of the earth.

It says here, "Ye shall be betrayed both by parents and brethren, and kinfolks and friends: and some of you shall they cause to be put to death." Daughters shall stand up and cause their mothers to be put to death, and sons their fathers, and fathers their sons. Can we imagine it, now in this time, how the hearts of loved ones, the fathers and mothers go out for their own that have been called away, and the Scripture reads that a day and a time is coming when children shall betray their parents and shall cause them to be put to death.

SERMON BY RETIRED ELDER BRO. JOHN BAHLER OF ROCKVILLE, CT

St. Luke 21

Beloved brothers, sisters and friends, in the concluding words of this chapter we have read there is a comfort that perhaps we have not all appreciated enough. We have heard here how it says, "And in the day time he was teaching in the temple; and at night he went out and abode in the mount that is called the Mount of Olives."

Beloved, we must believe that the Lord and Saviour resorted unto the Mount of Olives for a reason. He was with the people in the temple, as we have heard, in the day time and taught them and even in this case on the following morning again returned unto the temple. But in the night the Saviour resorted unto the Mount of Olives. We find in another instance where He would seek to go by Himself and even spend an entire night in prayer with God. Beloved, have we ever thought of it, the Son of God, He that was endowed with the Spirit of God, sent forth by God Himself, He that was with God and shared in His majesty from the beginning of time and came here below to carry out this plan of redemption and salvation and yet found reason to isolate Himself and alone go unto the Mount of Olives and pray to His Father.

Beloved, how many of us have done that very thing? I believe that many of us, and perhaps all that have come to the Lord, have gone by ourselves behind locked doors, closeted ourselves in and prayed unto the Lord. But have we done as our Lord and Saviour, spent an entire night in prayer? Oh, beloved, it is a teaching unto us that in all our cares and trials and every burden that we must bear,

that we could do as our Lord and Saviour.

He did not do in vain as we would. He wished to invite and tell them to take up their cross and to follow Him, to follow Him in every respect, and we have also even embarked upon the narrow way. And, therefore, if we also feel so heavily burdened and our hearts are filled with cares, and trials come over us we can then likewise, can we not? We find that the Saviour in the morning again was able to teach. The angels came to minister unto Him and He was strengthened. God likewise will send His ministering angels unto us if we pray fervently. It has often been a comfort unto me in the reading in the book of Daniel. We can find there that Daniel was in distress with the condition of the children of Israel and he took it. upon him to pray fervently. He prayed and he pleaded with God that God might not lay the charge and the sin upon Israel. He pleaded that God might forgive, and he tried to make reconciliation.

We find that that Angel, Gabriel, came unto Daniel and said that even the beginning of the prayer there satisfied God. He said this unto him even before Daniel had an opportunity to empty his heart in prayer. The angel was commissioned and sent unto this Daniel and said to him that God would accept his prayer. Beloved, can we appreciate the value of a fervent prayer?

Therefore, beloved, may God grant us also that needed grace that we faint not in prayer but that we might always pray and would also watch over our prayer. And beloved, if we then watch over our prayer then God will be able to shield and protect us and will be able to keep us. We have heard in the beginning of this chapter how that the Saviour upon being in the temple and standing near the treasury saw the rich man casting in their gifts. He also saw the poor widow there. Nothing escaped the attention of the Lord and Saviour. He beheld there what they were doing. Saw the rich were casting in much of their abundance, and He saw the poor widow cast in her two mites and it was all that she had.

She was willing and wanted to do it from the depth of her heart to bring an offering unto God. She wished to do alms unto the Lord that the Lord would see it. Oh, we believe that was her aim and the Lord saw it. We can find the giving of alms certainly will not go on unnoticed and unappreciated on the part of God. We can find in the case of Cornelius, he was not of the children of Israel but was of that Italian band, and was not of the commonwealth of Israel, and yet we find he was a devout man. He feared God. tried to serve Him to the best of his knowledge and ability and tried to do much alms.

When the angel came unto him he told him, "Thy prayers and thine alms are come up for a memorial before God." And God remembered his alms as they were equal to his prayer. Beloved, that points out unto us that our faith should not be dead but that our faith should have works. We believe that this poor widow wished to show unto her God her faith was not dead. She wished to do something for
