

ANGER AND FORGIVENESS Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle Shioda, Japan

Expressed anger sometimes has a beneficial effect. It releases stress and pent-up emotions. If someone becomes angry at us, let's remember that he or she may have a need to release stress. At the same time, we should examine ourselves as to what we did which triggered the anger. We may have made a big enough error to justify the other person's anger, in which case we should apologize and insofar as possible, correct our error.

"Be ye angry, and sin not: let not the sun go down upon your wrath." Ephesians 4:26. Anger can lead to sin but believers are supposed to have enough self-control to avoid that. Uncontrolled anger is to be avoided. On the other hand, a child who expresses some anger at other children who are always picking on him is only doing what he should do. It is necessary in order for him to maintain his self-worth.

We should not let the sun go down upon our wrath. This is to say that at the end of the day we are to

be forgiving toward everyone who may have crossed our path that day. To be under stress for a short time is one thing; to be under stress day after day is quite another. It can ruin our health and cause our death.

While expressed anger may have some benefits, there are no benefits from unexpressed anger, that I can find. That kind of anger boils inside of us while we try to pretend and smile, on the outside. That can be devastating. Hence, the only cure for some kinds of anger is forgiveness.

When Peter asked the Lord Jesus Christ how many times he should forgive his brother, the Lord replied, "Until seventy times seven." Matthew 18:21. Does this mean that the brother at fault continues to do the same thing over 490 times? Perhaps not. It may mean that we may recall over and over again, 490 times or more, how we have been wronged, and each time it comes to mind we are to forgive. This is the only solution, if it can be called a solution, for the past cannot be undone. We should forgive every

time it comes to mind, thinking that perhaps the other person is suffering, too, more than we realize.

Anger should never be so great that we cannot forgive. God has forgiven us for all our imperfections. How wonderful.

IV LIFESTYLE

As a new creature in Christ, a believer devotes himself to a life of zeal, commitment, and growth in understanding God's Word. He strives to be not only a "hearer" of the Word, but a "doer" of the Word as well. Consequently, his lifestyle is designed to follow the patterns found in the Bible. These are often at variance with contemporary ways which the believer must resist.

The Scripture forms the foundation for one's lifestyle. Because the Word is infallible and without error, its messages and commandments are followed by the church. The Bible's standards are not optional. All of its teachings are "profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, and for instruction in righteousness." (II Timothy 3:16)

All of its teachings are essential for godly living. A true believer shuns the modern tendency to divide the Word into "essentials" and "non-essentials," feeling that to categorize a part of God's Word as non-essential is to elevate one's self above God.

Lifestyle centers around the motives of (1) becoming more Christ-like, (2) redeeming the time, and (3) doing those things that bear fruit to the glory of God and our Saviour.

The life of a true Christian reflects the Light (i.e., the virtue and holiness of Christ) in everyday discipleship. The light of Christ is observable, both inwardly and outwardly. Inward holiness is comprised of the fruit of the Spirit -- love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, and temperance. (Galatians 5:22-23)

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

FELLOWSHIP

"If we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (1 John 1:7). We can experience a measure of the joy of Heaven through the beautiful gift of fellowship with one another. This majestic expression of love is made possible only when it is centered in Christ Jesus. We must walk in His light and be cleansed by His blood in order to be joined with one another in this sacred bond. Shortly before He went to Calvary, Jesus asked God to share this wonderful gift with us: He prayed, ". . . that they may be one, even as we are one" (John 17:22).

The expression of our love in true Christian fellowship must come from hearts which deeply care about each other. Solomon made the right choice when he asked God for an "understanding heart" (1 Kings 3:9). God gave him abundant wisdom, which included the ability to listen to his fellow men and understand them. Fellowship involves patient listening and a willingness to take time for others because of a genuine interest in their spiritual well-being.

Fellowship in the spirit of Christ consists of open-hearted communication among brethren. While "small talk" about common interests of daily life may have its place, true edification occurs when fellowship is centered on spiritual conversation. This is pleasing to God. "Then they that feared the Lord spake often one to another: and the Lord hearkened, and heard it, and a book of remembrance was written before him for them that feared the Lord and that thought upon his name" (Mal. 3:16).

The motivation to communicate at the spiritual level must never be instigated by pride, whereby an individual seeks to demonstrate his knowledge of the Word or to outdo someone else he considers less spiritual. Such an attitude is not only judgmental, but condescending. It

brings no blessing. The goal must be edification, which is the building up of the believers. The entire purpose of fellowship is to edify each other and to nurture our relationship with the Lord (Rom. 15:2).

The primary purpose of assembling in the house of the Lord is for worship. Sharing in rich fellowship while together complements worship, especially when it centers on the spiritual. It is not a healthy sign if brethren frequently head for the door as soon as services are finished. It is also unfortunate if one's visiting is restricted to a particular group of individuals. This may reflect only partial love, as compared to concern for the whole body of believers. Christ was the perfect example in making special effort to seek out the lonely and others whose needs were unnoticed by man.

Active involvement in fellowship requires training. It should start with young children. Parents should encourage their participation in organized Sunday School visits to other churches. Families should experience the blessing of visiting other Apostolic Christian congregations as they travel on vacations or visit friends and relatives. It is unfortunate if children are deprived of this unnecessarily. Occasionally a brother is hesitant to visit other churches because of fear of being called upon to pray. If this cannot be overcome with sincere effort, an acceptable alternative is to ask the lead minister or elder of the church being visited to excuse one from this task. This will be graciously honored. Young group fellowship throughout the churches is also edifying. The bonds of Christ's love are strengthened when the activities are spiritually edifying to all.

The full potential of sweet Christian fellowship can hardly be comprehended. God "hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus" (Eph. 2:6). Christ's pure and holy love is poured out upon every one of

us without partiality. If we are to fulfill His commands and experience fellowship in its purest form, we also must love all the brethren. The Apostle Paul warned: "That there should be no schism in the body; but that the members should have the same care one for another" (1 Cor. 12:25). "Owe no man any thing, but to love one another: for he that loveth another hath fulfilled the law" (Rom. 13:8). Brethren should avoid the temptation to withhold their love from someone who does not conform as they might expect. We need not compromise our convictions to be loving and caring to all the brethren. This may be the most effective approach in helping a struggling soul to see the benefit of laying aside personal preferences for the sake of the unity and welfare of the body of Christ.

Fellowship efforts must be extended to seeking souls. It is extremely important that a warm welcome be given to strangers who enter the doors of our assemblies. "Be not forgetful to entertain strangers: for thereby some have entertained angels unawares" (Heb. 13:2). Many have testified that their first impression upon entering one of our churches has had a deep and lasting impact. We should gladly encourage anyone who has an interest in learning about our Saviour. We have nothing to be ashamed of. If we are apologetic about some of our church beliefs and practices, it is probably because we do not totally understand them. Rather, we should enthusiastically support our beliefs and try to help others find salvation. Share a "Welcome" booklet and be willing to become personally involved.

Jesus made very clear the most powerful evidence of our being his true disciples: "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:35).

Outward holiness is distinguished by restraint, discretion, and moderation in attire. Costly array (I Timothy 2:9) and conformity to fancy and ridiculous styles in clothing are avoided. (Romans 12:2) Gender distinction in attire and in general appearance is according to God's will. For women, outward piety is reflected by a chaste, non-sensual appearance. (I Peter 3:2) Long hair gathered in a modest style, together with the absence of cosmetic enhancements and jewelry, are reflective of an inner holiness and humility. (I Timothy 2:9, I Corinthians 11:15) Men, too, maintain an outward demeanor that is consistent with the themes of sobriety and discretion. Long hair is avoided. A clean-cut, respectful appearance reflects a heart that is full of spiritual sincerity and seriousness. Men eschew loud and sporty attire.

V WORSHIP

The worship service in the Apostolic Christian churches reflects the brethren's special reverence for God and for Christ. A special attitude toward the omnipotence (Revelation 19:6) and holiness (Psalms 99:5-9) of God is demonstrated.

All aspects of worship are intended to draw worshippers nearer to God and to deepen human appreciation of His ways. Thus, all worship procedures (i.e., reading Scriptures, preaching, singing, and praying) are intended to give God, not man, supreme recognition and to glorify His name.

For instance, the church follows the Bible's ideal in sermon presentation. The Apostle Paul was explicit in stating that he did not preach to his churches "with excellency of speech or of wisdom" (I Corinthians 2:1) and that "my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in the demonstration of the Spirit and of power." (I Corinthians 2:4) Rather, he determined to know nothing except Jesus Christ and Him crucified. (I Corinthians 2:2) Thus, ministers are not trained in man's knowledge at seminaries or Bible colleges, and worldly knowledge is

not deemed important. The church feel strongly that one's faith should not stand in the wisdom of men, but in the power of God. (I Corinthians 2:5) If preaching was done with wisdom of words, "the cross should be made of none effect." (I Corinthians 1:17)

Ministers are chosen from among the congregations and serve open-ended terms. They are men of good report, with a good understanding of and fidelity to Scriptures, and are loyal in supporting the doctrines of the church. They serve without salaried compensation. More than one minister serves a church, the average being three to five.

Ministers do not select Scriptural texts or prepare sermon outlines before the worship service (on special occasions such as weddings, funerals, or holidays they may choose an appropriate Bible text). Instead, ministers and elders pray and meditate on the Word during the week. For their message, they open the Scriptures randomly as they stand before the congregation and use these texts for their message. It

is felt God knows much better than the minister what the congregation needs to hear. The minister thus humbly depends on the Holy Spirit for inspiration, praying to be used as an instrument for the benefit and edifying of the worshippers.

Singing, too, is simple and holy in "a cappella" fashion. All music is intended to focus on God. The intent of worship is not to entertain, but to enrich and to glorify God. All parishioners sing. There are no individual soloists and no choral groups during the worship service so that all honor and glory can focus clearly on God, and not man.

In the sanctuary, prayer is offered to God while kneeling. This prostrate style symbolizes fallible mankind "bowing" in heart and mind before an all-powerful, merciful, and infallible God and Father. Prayer language such as "Thee, Thou, Thy, and Thine" -- both in prayer and song -- intends to offer a deeper reverence in the minds of the worshippers as opposed to the more informal and contemporary "You and Your."

Female members wear a veiling over their head during prayer and worship according to Scriptures (I Corinthians 11:5) This reflects the order of God. (I Corinthians 11:3-13) Male members pray with their heads uncovered. (I Corinthians 11:7)

Men and women sit separately during regular worship services. This is sometimes relaxed, however, during special occasions such as weddings and funerals. Although no Scriptures reflect this practice, both Jewish and Christian tradition do. This practice was universally observed in both faiths beginning with temple worship until the late 1800's. Separate seating during worship contributes to better "a cappella" singing, and it helps widows, widowers, and single members feel more comfortable by sitting with believers of their own gender. It also contributes to less gender distraction.

During the first part of the worship service, prayer is offered by the minister conducting the service. Near the end of the service, however, any brother from the congregation may be asked to pray. All male members may participate in praying and the announcing of songs. This is done because the church believes in the "priesthood of all believers." (I Peter 2:5, I Peter 2:9)

It is customary to have two worship services on Sunday. Following a morning worship service, a noon lunch is served, followed by a period of fellowship. Another worship service then follows.

Everyone is welcome to have lunch, including visitors and guests. Members attend both worship services and everyone -- friends, visitors and guests -- are encouraged to attend also.

Charitable collections are not solicited by passing a collection plate after worship services. No one is pressured or should ever feel compelled to make financial contributions. Instead, when collections are taken for special projects they are announced from the pulpit and donations are placed in "charity boxes" which are located in the church hallways. Brethren and friends give on a free will basis as they feel led by God's Spirit.

At the Apostolic Christian World Relief/Work Projects Committee Meeting held in Champaign, IL, August 11, 1990, the Apostolic Christian Caribbean Board requested an invitation be extended among our brethren to obtain a volunteer to serve as a Haiti Liaison Coordinator. The World Relief Committee unanimously approved this invitation. Preferably a couple or two brothers would help with various duties during the time our work teams are in Haiti -- October 1990 through March 1991. Helping with school roof installation, material procurement, water aid, well drilling, pump installation, hospital and agricultural assistance programs.

The length of stay would be five months, with compensation to provide wages, travel, and living expenses. A combination of several persons, each staying a shorter term would be acceptable. Any interested brethren, please address all inquiries to:

Fellowship, while not a formal part of the worship service, is nonetheless complimentary to worship. Brethren, when they come together for worship, have a warm Christ-like feeling for one another. Members thus greet with a holy kiss (within their own gender). This is taught five times in the New Testament (Romans 16:16, I Corinthians 16:20, II Corinthians 13:12, I Thessalonians 5:26, I Peter 5:14) It is a blessing for the humble and converted heart as it is an expression of love and kindness toward others in the household of faith.

Likewise, believers are to be "perfectly joined together" (I Corinthians 1:10) and "fitly framed." (Ephesians 4:16, 2:21) They are to keep the same spiritual judgements, and walk according to the same rule.

Following this Biblical pattern of godly order results in a great measure of love and unity. In Christ and His body, the church (which we are inseparable), the believer finds comfort, contentment, inspiration and unity of the Spirit.

VII MISSION

The mission of the church is to spread the Word of God through preaching, teaching and by a living

example. By preaching the Word, the church and the individual can better "contend for the faith once delivered unto the saints." (Jude 3) The motive of each individual member is to reflect the Light of Christ, to obey the Word, and to witness the message of Christ, both by good works (I Peter 2:12) and by being ready to give verbal expressions of their faith when asked. (I Peter 3:15)

Missionary efforts have seen the opening of many new churches in America together with preaching and teaching sessions among church brethren on university campuses.

Following World War II, missionary efforts resulted in the establishment of a few churches in Japan. Recently, church elders have traveled to India to exert doctrinal influence among a gospel and medical mission in that country over which the church has trusteeship.

Missionary efforts are most prominent, however, on an individual basis by bringing acquaintances to church and letting them hear the Word and observe the Christ-like love and godly order found among the brethren. Parents recognize that one of the greatest missionary fields is in the home with their children. Specific groups mission work is channeled through a national missionary committee.

BIBLES NEEDED NOW

In November of 1989 we began our work in sending used Bibles to foreign countries where the Word of God is very scarce. We have received used and worn Bibles and Bible Story Books in the past, but not near enough. After making the needed repairs, we then package and send them by surface mail to Africa and the Philippines.

The response so far has been somewhat discouraging. If we consider the number of churches we have in our faith and all of the homes and families involved, there surely has to be a lot of used or worn Bibles that could be donated to this work. Right now we need over three hundred Bibles and have less than twenty.

We have been getting letters from individuals from these countries very often. Sometimes three a day which say, "Please send us a Bible." We have already bought "new" Bibles from the Leo, IN, Bible Distribution Center. But that is far more expensive than donated ones.

Hopefully, all of us will take this seriously and help send the Word of God to these needy people. We look forward to hearing from anyone in helping in this work. We do want to thank everyone that has already helped in some way.

VIII PURPOSE

The reason for a believer's existence is to glorify God. The major objective of a believer's life is to follow God and to do His will. A true believer lives and walks in the Spirit and has crucified the flesh with its affections and lusts. (Galatians 5:24, 25)

A believer's motive and purpose is to engage in edifying activities that upbuild the inner and spiritual man. He further works to enhance and further the kingdom of God, and to strengthen the church in love. (Ephesians 4:16)

"Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh. For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die: but if ye through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live." (Romans 8:12, 13)

"I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me: and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me." (Galatians 2:20)

"Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world." (James 1:27)

IX GOVERNANCE

The church body recognizes Christ as the head of the church, firstborn among the brethren, and the chief cornerstone. Yet, in an earthly sense, a group of approximately fifty local elders comprise a national Council of Elders who, in the form of a servant leadership, exert doctrinal guidance and authority for the benefit of the various local congregations. The leadership committee of this council serves on a rotating basis so no ongoing authority will be vested in any one person or small group.

X HOPE

The prime motive of the Chris-

tian is to achieve the goal of reaching the portal of heaven. The believer sees himself as a "pilgrim" and "stranger" (I Peter 2:11) in this short earthly life who is walking on a "narrow" (Matthew 7:14) pathway to eternal life in heaven. The Scriptures use explicit adjectives such as "pilgrims", "strangers", and "narrow way" and the church takes them seriously.

As a child of God, one's focus is on the unseen things of the Spirit. Only spiritual things will last forever. A believer's value system lessens the importance of material and earthly things -- such as wealth, status, and ease -- because they will

eventually fade away, and they could erode one's spiritual resolve. A believer has a scope and spiritual insight that is not limited to this present life, but encompasses those things that have eternal value. One's affection is set on the things above, not on the things of the earth. (Colossians 3:1, 2)

The blessed hope of heaven is made possible by the death and shed blood of Jesus Christ. As man yields to Him in true repentance, becomes converted (by His grace), and then obediently follows the patterns of godly living, he can entertain the hope of eternal life in heaven! The delights of heaven are so great that

"eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things that are prepared for them that love him." (I Corinthians 2:9)

The doctrine of the church and its subsequent lifestyle standards are all designed to assist the pilgrim believer in reaching the beauties of heaven.

"For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

John 3:16



destinations - heaven or hell. They have one similarity . . . they both begin with "h" and the second letter is "e". Dear ones, that is where the similarity stops. From there on, there is contrast for heaven or hell. Hell is where the worm dieth not and the fire is not quenched.

But in heaven, dear ones, are those who have gone on before us . . . those that finished the race. . . those that have laid down their armour and crossed that valley and shadow of death. For them, there is a crown awaiting them. Dear ones, it is how we finish the race that is going to determine our destiny. We need to make a good beginning, but, dear ones, it is our standing with Jesus Christ when we breathe our last. Tomorrow may never come for some of us, or if the Lord should return.

But today, dear ones, we have the opportunity to serve Him and to serve Him with all of our heart. Even as we were reminded in that first reading, that we should keep His commandments and His statutes altogether, not just some of them.

We think of the rich man that came to Jesus. He asked Him, "What must I do to be saved? All those commandments have I kept to this day." It was a notable thing, dear ones, and it was tremendous. Probably not too many of us could give an answer like that man gave.

But the Lord said, "One thing thou lackest: go and sell all that thou hast and deliver it to the poor and come follow Me." (See Mark 10:21). We read where he hung his head and he left in sorrow. His heart

hung on his riches. There is where his heart hung, dear ones. He couldn't do that. We don't know what happened; we don't know how his end was. Hopefully maybe he did do that, but we don't know.

But the Lord says, "How hard it is for the rich to enter into the kingdom of heaven." (See Mark 10:23). Dear ones, what is our heart set on today? Is it set on the Word and His commandments and His statutes altogether? Or are we trying to serve two masters? Dear ones, we can't serve two masters. We serve one or the other. We can't serve the Lord on the Lord's day, and the rest of the week do as we please.

We are going to be brought into judgment for everything. We can read in Ecclesiastes, "Go out, young man, and do that which seemeth good to thee, but remember this, for everything you will be brought into judgment." (See Ecclesiastes 11:9).

Dear ones, if Christ would come today and we would stand before His judgment seat today, how would we fare? Would we welcome Him? Would we be ready? Would we say, "Lord, I have kept Thy commandments . . . I have kept the faith . . . I have walked the narrow way?" Or are we trying to satisfy the flesh and the carnal desires in all that Satan would have to offer us? Of ourself, it is impossible.

We read this example where this man brought this son to be healed and His disciples came and asked why they couldn't cast him out. Jesus said, "This kind can come forth by nothing, but by prayer and fasting." Mark 9:29. We have a wonderful, beautiful lesson here of this man. When the Lord asked this man, "How long is it ago since this came unto him? And he said, Of a child. And oftentimes it hath cast him into the fire, and into the waters, to destroy him: but if thou canst do any thing, have compassion on us, and help us. Jesus said unto him, if thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth." Mark 9:21:23.

Friends, may this be an encouragement unto you. All things are possible to him that believeth! Of ourself, we cannot do it. We could not serve Christ another day if it wouldn't be for His help, His strength and His grace!

If we would just believe, He will be with us. He will share abundantly, pressed down, running over! That is the goodness and the mercy of God!

But we were reminded in our first reading of the severity of God is we do not keep those commandments and statutes.

"If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him that believeth." Mark 9:23.

This man came back with a beautiful answer. "And straightway the father of the child cried out, and said with tears, Lord, I believe; help thou mine unbelief." Mark 9:24. Don't we all feel that way? We believe but we just pray that the Lord will help us in our unbelief. We just can't grasp everything. We just pray that the Lord will help us and that He might be compassionate with us and that we would just give our all.

"And he came to Capernaum: and being in the house he asked them, What was it that ye disputed among yourselves by the way? But they held their peace: for by the way they had disputed among themselves, who should be the greatest. And he sat down, and called the twelve, and saith unto them, If any man desire to be first, the same shall be last of all, and servant of all. And he took a child, and set him in the midst of them: and when he had taken him in his arms, he said unto them, Whosoever shall receive one of such children in my name, receiveth me: and whosoever shall receive me, receiveth not me, but him that sent me." Mark 9:33-37.

Christ had so many beautiful teachings that he gave. We are reminded here that if we don't receive Him, we can't receive the Father. There is where we just need to have faith, even as a little child. We took our children and read those Bible stories when they were little and they didn't question that at all. They believed it with all their hearts. They didn't doubt or challenge. They didn't say, "Prove it."

We are living in a society today where they want everything proved. Dear ones, with Christ, all we have to do is believe, be humble, be faithful, and believe as a little child!

I heard a saying once that if we have to believe before we can have

faith, we will never have faith. Because believing is a reward of faith, and how true! If we can have faith, we can believe. But if we are going to have to believe before we can have faith, we will never have faith. Because believing is the reward of faith.

"And John answered him, saying, Master, we saw one casting out devils in thy name, and he followeth not us: and we forbad him, because he followeth not us. But Jesus said, Forbid him not: for there is no man which shall do a miracle in my name, that can lightly speak evil of me. For he that is not against us is on our part." Mark 9:38-40.

Beloved, we have all work to do. "For he that is not against us is on our part." Mark 9:40. May it be, dear ones, that we be on the Lord's part . . . that we are willing to take a stand . . . that we are willing at whatever cost, whatever persecution, whatever ridicule it might be, we would be willing to take a stand for Jesus Christ and Him crucified, and that we would be faithful because there are only two ways.

Where will we be one million years from now? Dear ones, eternity is time without end. Everything that we can touch, and even our life has an end. But eternity is time without end. Can't we just grasp, dear ones, the importance of being faithful? Is it really asking too much when we think of what Christ has done for us?

We spoke of Abraham earlier and how God tried Abraham's faith. I think Abraham was around one hundred years old when this son, who was promised, was finally given. No doubt Abraham just cherished that little boy. Finally God came one day and said, "Abraham, I want you to offer your son as a sacrifice." We don't read where Abraham questioned God once. We read that he got up and saddled his ass and they took fire and wood and some servants. I believe they rode for three days before they ever saw the mountain where he was supposed to offer his son.

Then Abraham told his servants to stay that Abraham and Isaac were going to go make a sacrifice. Then they started out for Mount Moriah, and can't you just wonder

what was going through Abraham's mind? Can't you just wonder what was going through Isaac's mind? Finally Isaac couldn't hold it back any longer, and said, "Father, here is the fire and here is the wood, but where is the sacrifice?" Isaac knew how Abraham served God, and that for a sacrifice, blood had to be required. They had no sacrifice.

Faithful Abraham said, "God will provide." God did provide, dear ones, but Abraham had to go to the point that his son was laid upon the altar and the knife was drawn when God called him, "Abraham, Abraham, do not touch your son." There in the thicket was that ram. (See Genesis 22:1-13).

Dear ones, when it comes to Christ, there in the Garden of Gethsemane, He took His disciples, Peter, James and John, and told them to watch and to pray. The Lord, as He walked up the mountain, told them that His heart was heavy. He was sorrowful for He knew that was in that cup. He knew what His mission was. Then He prayed so fervently that His sweat was as drops of blood falling to the ground. "If it could be possible, that this cup might be removed from Me," He said, "nevertheless not My will be done, but Thine be done." (See Mark 14:36).

He thought of you and He thought of myself . . . poor lost sinners. Dear ones, we can't see the seriousness of sin. There in the Garden, it would have been such a small matter for God to have looked the other way, or to pass it off. But sin had to be dealt with. For that ransom, blood had to be shed and Christ had to drink that cup.

SERMON BY BRO. DONALD GUDEMAN OF LACROSSE, IN

Blessings Unlimited For Obedience Deuteronomy 28:1-28 and Mark 9:14-50

We have some beautiful teachings here this morning and we really wouldn't expect anything else, would we, when we think that these are the very words that Christ Himself spoke? We are so thankful today that we live in the post-Christ era. We have the Word.

We think of those patriarchs of old. We think of Abraham there in the land of the Chaldeans. God saw that man . . . a man living among heathen people and God saw that in his heart was the desire to serve God Almighty. God called him out and said, "I want you to leave this land and thy brethren and I will take you to another land and I will make of you a great nation." (See Genesis 12:1, 2).

We can see that God looks, and He knows every one of us. It is an individual basis, dear ones, with Jesus Christ. The Word tells us He even knows how many hairs we have on our head. That is how well Christ knows us. He knows us individually. He knows just exactly what kind of week we have just had. He knows whether we have come to church this morning because we might be afraid what someone might think if we don't go; or if we have come with a desire to be refreshed, to be renewed, and to be reminded of the love of God.

We were reminded so vividly in this first reading, "And it shall come to pass, if thou shalt hearken diligently" dear ones, this is the Word of God, "if thou shalt hearken diligently unto the voice of the Lord thy God, to observe and to do," not only to observe, but to do! "all his com-

mandments which I command thee this day, that the Lord thy God will set thee on high above all nations of the earth." Deuteronomy 28:1.

He went on and told them that their bodies would be blessed, their land would be blessed, their fields would be blessed, their baskets, their gardens, everything would be blessed. Their enemies would come in one way and flee seven ways. His blessings were innumerable! We read fourteen verses here of all the blessings that God would shower on His people if they would just be obedient . . . if they would just keep His commandments and His statutes! Those blessings would be innumerable!

But the fifteenth verse begins, "But it shall come to pass, if thou wilt not hearken unto the voice of the Lord thy God, to observe to do all his commandments and his statutes which I command thee this day; that all these curses shall come upon thee, and overtake thee." Deuteronomy 28:15. From the sixteenth verse to the sixty-eighth -- to the end of the chapter -- God reminded them of the curses.

We can see the severity of God. We can see the mercy and the goodness of God in the first part of this chapter. But, dear ones, in the remainder of the chapter, we are reminded of the severity of God if we do not keep His commandments . . . if we do not keep His statutes . . . if we do not walk the narrow way. The Word tells us steep and thorny is the way. But, dear ones, let us look beyond.

Where is that steep and thorny

path going to lead us?

It is going to lead us to life eternal!

We were reminded here in the last portion of this chapter, "If thy foot offend thee, cut it off." "If thy hand offend thee . . . if thy eye offend thee . . ." (See Mark 9:45, 43, 47). This is a spiritual teaching here, dear ones, this is an analogy. We are of the body of Christ and that is why discipline is so important. If we error . . . if we fall and if it is severe enough, we have to be dealt with so that the church might be preserved . . . that the whole church would not have to be cast into hell.

There were three examples given here and everyone ended up, "If it better for thee to enter into life maimed, than having two hands to go into hell, into the fire that never shall be quenched: Where their worm dieth not, and the fire is not quenched." Mark 9:43, 44.

There is a song that goes, "Where will you be one million years from now? Will you be happy? Will you be singing?"
