"YOUR INNER SELF" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle Shioda, Japan

"Behold, the kingdom of God is within you." These are the words of the Lord Jesus Christ as recorded in Luke 17:21. What did He mean when He made this statement?

The Pharisees had just asked him when the kingdom of God should come, thinking it was something that they could see and observe. His answer indicated that there is within the heart or soul of a human being, room for a kingdom, God's kingdom. Every kingdom should have a ruler and it stands to reason that God should be ruler of His own kingdom. This kingdom within you I call "Your Inner Self."

Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

THE CHURCH - A LIGHT TO THE WORLD

The Lord's church is manifested today as closely knit bodies of believers with the mission of promoting the glorious cause of Christ. This involves proclaiming the Gospel of salvation to the unconverted and providing a haven for the nurturing and spiritual guidance of the believers. It is life's highest calling to be a part of the body of Christ, the church.

For a church to reflect the true light of Christ, its doctrines and teachings must be based on the Word and its members must be truly converted individuals, who are no longer living in sin (Rom. 6: 1-2, 11, 14).

According to the Word, Christ is the head of the church (Eph. 5:23), the chief cornerstone (Eph. 2:20), and the individual members constitute His body. The Head (Christ) and His body (the church) are inseparable. Individual members coexist symbolically within the spiritual body. Their similar spiritual understandings and exemplary walks of life allow the church to reflect the light of Christ.

Likemindedness (Rom. 15:5), unity of spirit (Eph. 4:13), and common observation of godly lifestyle standards (Phil. 3:16) allow the church to perform its mission in a gracefully coordinated manner, "fitly framed" (Eph. 2:21) and "perfectly joined together" (1 Cor. 1:10). This enables the church to be recognized as a "chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation" (1 Pet. 2:9), and as the "pillar and ground of the truth" (1 Tim. 3:15).

Christ's true church is to be kept free from sinful leaven (1 Cor. 5:7-8). Indeed, the Apostle Paul exhorted that the church should be one "not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish" (Eph. 5:27). This is a very high standard. Many times it is casually said that no church is perfect because it is made up of human beings. This may be true, but

it does not alter the fact that God has established a perfect standard to which we should aspire. Christ has given the church the authority to "bind and loose" (Matt. 18:18), which is a very great responsibility. When appropriate, admonition or discipline must be carried out, in the spirit of love, for the eternal welfare of the erring individual and the preservation of the purity of church.

As a church conforms to the biblical blueprint, it will shine forth to unbelievers. Its members will become visibly distinct from the world. Their attitudes and lives will exemplify the virtues of the Lord Jesus Christ. Themes such as "love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 19:19), "love your enemy" (Matt. 5:44), and "whatever you do to the least of these, ye do unto me" (Matt. 25:40) will draw attention. As believers show love and concern for the sick, for the grieving, and for the lost, indeed for all mankind, the Spirit's light will shine brightly and will glorify God. Compassion, forbearance, kindness and mercy should be hallmarks of every child of God.

By the same token, the practical application of the various principles of the Word by humble believers, will draw attention to Christ. Examples such as simplicity and moderation in the material aspects of life, modesty in outward appearance, and refraining from worldly entertainments often arouse questions about our faith. This provides an opportunity for expression of the hope that is within us (1 Pet. 3:15). "And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God" (Rom. 12:2).

The example of a humble, obedient Christian "lifestyle" is a type of evangelism whereby many unbelievers have been drawn into the faith. Consistency in visible holiness serves to reflect a bright and

clear light to the world. It gives identity to the fact that we are God's people and that we are devoted to obeying the Word as believed and understood by the Apostolic Christian Church family. Modesty and restraint in all aspects of life give a strong message of solidarity. This confirms that the believer's affection is for spiritual, not earthly things. "For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace" (Rom. 8:6).

Today, however, Satan is trying to dim the light of Christ as projected by our churches. The enemy, on a worldwide basis, is trying to diminish holiness and confuse unbelievers. Individualism, lukewarmness, and a lack of spiritual maturity are all factors which help to create a dim light. Sometimes brethren are unknowingly persuaded by Satan's trickery. By living an independent, nonconforming lifestyle they give a clouded message to those who are seeking spiritual stability in the midst of a "crooked and perverse" world (Phil. 2:15). The Apostle Paul wrote, "If the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself to the battle" (1 Cor. 14:8). The other extreme of placing unreasonable emphasis upon insignificant matters is also not profitable (Heb. 13:9). Each member should examine his heart to insure that he is adding to, not detracting from the church's light to

Someday the complete church of Jesus Christ will be revealed. This "mystical" body will consist of believers from all ages and all nations who have been found faithful. They will be joined as one to live forever with the Lord.

Today the true light of Christ rises from within the individual sanctified hearts of God's people. When they are united and fully committed to the New Testament pattern established for Christ's church, this light shines forth as a powerful, visible force, piercing the darkness of the world.

Hopefully, all of us will take this seriously and help send the Word of God to these needy people. We look forward to hearing from anyone in helping in this work. We do want to thank everyone that has already helped in some way.

(Continued from Page 36) the first things where we failed our God was being disobedient to our parents. That comes at an early age, doesn't it, even before we are accountable? But as the years came and we grew into manhood and became accountable, that didn't feel very good, did it? It was charged against us... we were guilty... we were unhappy... we were without the joy and the happiness of the Lord. We were not walking with Him and felt so alone and miserable often.

Here it says, "That he no longer should live the rest of his time in the flesh to the lusts of men..." I Peter 4:2. Beloved ones, when we could once receive peace and our feet could be set upon higher ground and live to the will of God, then we could go onward and forward and fight the good fight of faith.

There is a battle on when we start to live for the Lord. Before that, the old devil had us and we were going down the stream and he was pretty content and happy and left us alone as long as he had us where he wanted us.

But when we start to live for Him, that is when the battle comes in, but the Saviour said, "My grace is sufficient for thee." II Corinthians 12:9. Grace is help in time of need and it is also a help that we are so undeserving of. So we have a lot going for us!

"Wherein they think it strange..." after you have made a change in life and you are so happy in a simple faith in Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour, we don't go to the same excess of riot or enjoyment that we did before. "Wherein they think it strange that ye run not with them to the same excess of riot, speaking evil of you: Who shall give account to him that is ready to judge the quick and the dead." I Peter 4:4,5.

I can remember when our son repented and he went to one of his school friends to talk to him. He said, "Well, what you are doing is probably all right, but I couldn't live that kind of life. It just isn't for me."

Salvation is for everybody . . . without exception! He is no respecter of persons! Acts 10:34. "I think sometimes we need to be real careful that we are not a respecter of persons, of this one or that one. In our Christian life form the youngest to the oldest, we should have a divine love and devotion for one another. Our prayers should go out from one another.

The brother in a small way tried to tell in part the length of eternity. I've heard another way . . . If a bird would come to a seashore and take one beak full of sand away and fly quite a ways away and come back, by the time it had that seashore carried away, it would be not as long as eternity. We just can't fathom

it!

Beloved ones, life is so short . . . life is earnest . . . life is real!

It becomes a little more real when you become a senior citizen and you wonder where all those years went. ..even in times of changes and transition.

I can remember Bro. Pete Bach in the north side church when changes first came in. I can remember our first Christmas program. We had it over the noon hour in the dining room and they had asked him if it was alright. It was just the beginning of these things. He said it was alright with him to try it, but there was one thing that he wanted to reserve. If he didn't feel good about it and if it just didn't seem right, that he could say "no" the next time.

Since that first one we had, there has been one every year, and it has brought joy to our youth and to our parents. Sometimes I think it is more interesting to watch the grandparents watch those little children and tears come down their eves. It is a blessing and has been ever since that first time. It has been good!

Life goes on for a number of years. My father had the oversight here and as he got older and saw the time really going, he thought someone younger could take hold and go on. Bro. Perry carried the mantle as the years have gone on. We are so thankful to the number of churches for the young elder brethren that are being ordained. It just goes to tell us that God is still carrying and providing for the church.

We pray for our younger ones that they can stand fast and bear the burden and heat of the day, the problems and cares. There is a lot of joy in it, too. It is a great joy when souls come to the Lord. That is a pleasant work and we hope it can continue.

It says here, "Live expectantly!" Live expectantly! When you expect something, you are looking for something beyond what you don't quite see yet, but you are hoping for it. That is heaven, isn't it!

But the end of all things is at hand: be ye therefore sober, and watch unto prayer." I Peter 4:7. This is one thing the Saviour gave charge to man when He was about to be ascended back to the Father. He said, "Watch and pray till I come back." He has left us now, but we can speak to Him in faith. We can pray. We can read the Word. The communication is wonderful, isn't

"Above all things have fervent charity . . . " Love for one another! Love will motivate our lives to do for others. There is no end to that and it says here, "... for charity shall cover the multitude of sins." I Peter 4:8. Or even as our children, if we give them a command or some small chore to do to carry out and we know real well that they are capable of doing it as they are old enough and can take a little responsibility, but maybe they failed and they disappointed us.

It is that way in our spiritual life, too. We should not do it grudgingly, but we should do it with love and devotion in our hearts. When we can do it in that way, then we can feel happy about it and we can even be glad to meet our parents when they come home, if we had the things done that they told us to. Maybe sometime we had all the experience when we didn't fulfill our duties and we didn't want to see them when they came home.

It is a little that way with the Lord and Saviour, isn't it? When we don't do His commands and know that we aren't doing right, if He would come, we wouldn't be able to look Him in the eyes, would we?

"As every man hath received the gift, even so minister the same one to another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God." I Peter 4:10. Every man, it says here, has received the gift. We can minister in a lot of ways. It isn't the minister alone that speaks off the pulpit. "Our actions speak louder than words," often that old phrase is told. Our walk and conduct of life is a ministry and we should be ambassadors for Christ. We should not be that they can put a blame on us or maybe question, "Are you a member of the Apostolic Christian Church?" Sometimes to our regret, we hear this, "Are they?" Where there is a question, there is something wrong.

"If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God; if any man minister, let him do it as of the ability which God giveth..." I Peter 4:11. This is comforting to know that we can give no more than what God gives, but I believe we need to be careful as ambassadors of Christ not to stand in our own light or our own way. Sometimes our life can maybe hinder us from God working within us and then maybe the church suffers. It is a responsibility.

"That God in all things may be glorified through Jesus Christ, to whom be praise and dominion for ever and ever. Amen." I Peter 4:11. Amen means "be it so."

Then it tells us as we go in life and maybe we think we are getting along pretty good and we have some fair-weather days.

"Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you." I Peter 4:12. Beloved, when we come to this place. I believe if we are honest, we have all experienced this. But it tells us that even when we go through some hot trial or some fire, even as the gold is purified, the hotter the fire becomes, the more pure the gold gets. The hotter the fire becomes, it takes off that dross and scum off the top and it becomes more pure. That is a process, beloved ones, and that is what our life is really all about.

"But rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings..." I Peter 4:13. Sometimes we have to feel a little odd with the world, maybe a little "square," or maybe they think that we go beyond. I sometimes have to feel this in public where we maybe not know their first name or know them as an associate or town people and maybe they won't quite just come to me, but if I say the first word or two, then they open up. They kind of wait.

Beloved ones, I think we need to be friendly, we need to converse one to another and to visit with one another. It tells us here, "... rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings; that, when his glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy." I Peter 4:13. When His glory shall be revealed! When His glory will be re-

vealed that will be when He gathers in His own and we will be glad also with exceeding joy!

Joy to meet the Saviour that did so much for me! He heard my prayer that lifted me up, and then we can say, "Thank you, Lord," when we enter into those realms.

We had a brother from our congregation who had a terminal illness and went through a real test and fire. Just before he died, when we could hardly understand what he was speaking, he was saying, "Thank you, dear Jesus. Thank you, dear Jesus." He just kept saying that over and over. Isn't that a pleasant thought to have, to be able to thank Him and not to be wishing for the hills and mountains to cover or for the fear of the Lord, but to thank Him? I really believe that when those last hours come, they can visualize and see their Lord and God when they thank Him like that.

We had a brother in our congregation and awhile before he died, he said, "Earl, I had a vision when I was in the chair looking up. There was Christ up there in the corner of the wall in that room, and I looked right at Him." He thought then, "I don't think I will be here long any more now." But it went quite awhile . . . He wasn't quite through with him yet. But the testimony!

This is what we need. We need testimonies, and we get them, beloved ones. When souls get into different situations, the testimonies are that God was near, right in the room, or He was about as close as you can get, beloved ones, without seeing Him with a natural eye, but with the eye of faith.

It says here, "But let none of you suffer as a murderer, or as a thief, or as an evildoer, or as a busybody in other men's matters." I Peter 4:15. If we suffer for those kind of wrongs, we have it coming.

"Yet if any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed..." I Peter 4:16. They weren't ashamed, beloved ones. Daniel wasn't afraid to open his window and pray and let the king hear where he put his hope and trust. He just about knew what was going to happen.

"Yet if any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify God on this behalf." I

Peter 4:16. Glory and praise to God! There is often a short time, when something happens in life. I have to think of the time a soul was driving the car down the road and had an accident and was going into a deep ditch. She said the only thing she could think of, "Lord, here I come." That's wonderful, isn't it? She said, "Here I am, Lord." If it would have been death, "Here I am. You called me home." But not to be prepared, it would have been otherwise.

"For the time is come that judgment must begin at the house of God: and if it first begin at us, what shall the end be of them that obey not the gospel of God? And if the righteous scarcely be saved, where shall the ungodly and the sinner appear?" I Peter 4:17, 18. It is going to take all we have to enter into those portals.

I have to think of the ten virgins . . . five were wise and five were foolish. The five wise had oil in their lamps and they were trimmed and burning. The foolish asked for oil from them, but they said, "Not so, lest we don't have enough." (See Matthew 25:1-13). It is an individual thing. One can't do it for the other, but we all have the same opportunity and time to gather. Let's do it in the opportune time.

It says, "Wherefore let them that suffer according to the will of God commit the keeping of their souls to him in well doing, as unto a faithful Creator." I Peter 4:19. The One that created heaven and earth and all things, we should commit it all unto Him, beloved ones, even our being here today and as we go about. We might commit our day at the beginning unto Him and let Him lead, guide and direct, and then at the end of the day, we have so much to thank Him for.

Even as being together today, setting in heavenly places from far and near, we will go home to our respective places of abode, we will remember these moments, won't we? Precious! Let it be faith strengthening as we were together today. That is what it is all about... to strengthen us in faith, to lead and direct us. The Word is as a lamp unto our feet (see Psalms 119:105) and we need it in this dark and dreary world we live

Salvation Is A Free Gift I Peter 4

The heading of this fourth chapter says, "Glorifying in persecution." When we glorify, we praise, don't we? There are songs, happiness and joy, and then it says, "in persecution!" Now that goes against human nature, doesn't it? Human nature doesn't want to be under persecution.

I have to think of the faith of our fathers that have gone on before and what many of them endured. They did it with a joy in heart and a happy feeling, that come what will, they couldn't take it from them. We can remember where it could have been that they were down cast and so discouraged and said, "What is the use, if this is what the outcome of it is? After all, we have tried to do what is right, and what do we have before us now?"

I so often have to go back to the Apostle Paul when he had to give an account to King Agrippa for his faith and for what he was doing. They didn't want him to spread the gospel, but the more they suppressed them, the more they went ahead and would not relent. Even though they knew that there was going to be some results that were not going to be pleasant, they would not shrink back.

Beloved ones, when those times came, we can think of some of them, how they could go the way of the cross of suffering and self-denial with a joy and a happiness in heart.

I have to think of Stephen at the time he was being stoned, he looked up and his face shone as that of an angel. What a demonstration that was for those that could behold him with no fear! Love casteth out fear! (See I John 4:18).

They had the love of God in their hearts and it cast away all fear and they were glad to suffer and die for their God and their Maker... willing to pay the price!

Beloved ones, here it says, "Forasmuch then as Christ hath suffered for us in the flesh, arm yourselves likewise with the same mind: for he that hath suffered in the flesh hath ceased from sin." I Peter 4:1. Even Jesus Christ when He went the way of the cross, and even prior to that, when He was looking over the city of Jerusalem and saw the wickedness there, and how His chosen people were not accepting Him, He wept. He wept for that city! He didn't weep for Himself that He soon would suffer and die, but the love that He spent as He walked the paths of life here below!

Now today He is not with us. He fulfilled the Father's will and he went back to the Father, but He is looking down upon His creation in love and mercy.

When we think of mercy, anyone who has mercy and is merciful, they are willing to be spent and to share and to give. It has been this way since the time when He was here on earth. I knew in my unconverted state what He had done for others and I saw their walk and conduct of life. they were a witness and a testimony.

We hear this as so often souls will say, "This is something that I wanted for a long time." Now why is it that way? It is a free gift for the asking! Why is it? If we want something that is temporal, we will work hard for it and save money so we can achieve it and have what we would like to have.

Salvation is a free gift because Christ paid the price! It was a high price! The Father gave His best... His only begotten Son to come down here and suffer the way He did to bring salvation.

"That he no longer should live the rest of his time in the flesh to the lusts of men, but to the will of God." I Peter 4:2. We know how we were enslaved by the evil one and were in bonds. The things that we didn't want to do, we did; and the things that we wanted to do or to please our parents, we couldn't do.
