Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

MODERATION

It is important that children of God both understand and apply the biblical concept of moderation. your moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand." (Phil. 4:5). Moderation is defined scripturally as an attitude of gentleness, forbearance and fairness which will be manifested in reasonable behavior. Modern society defines moderation as simply taking a position on any matter which is someplace between the extremes. Obedience to the Word requires complete avoidance of some activities and wholehearted support of others. The carefully considered guidelines given by the church are to help brethren find a reasonable position on matters which are not specifically addressed in the Word. This will help to maintain peace and harmony within the brotherhood which is a vital scriptural principle (Rom. 14:19; 2 Cor. 13:11).

Consistency is a very important part of moderation. In many areas of our daily lives we may do as we should for a period of time, but lacking self-control we may slide back into the habit of doing something too much, too often, or not at all. We should follow the scripturally defined moderate pathway in our work, appearance, diet, rest, exercise, speech and attitude.

We should work hard but not so hard that we ruin our health or neglect our families. The Bible teaches, "But if any provide not for his own, and specially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel" (1 Tim. 5:8). However, in the same letter it is written, "And having food and raiment let us be therewith content" (1 Tim. 6:8). Therefore, each should do his best to see that his family has a reasonable measure of life's necessities. However, it is not of God to be driven to accumulate a great abundance of material possessions.

Moderation also applies to the outward appearance of believers.

Peter writes concerning wives, "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel" (1 Pet. 3:3). It is generally agreed that we should be neat and clean, and portray an appearance which blends in harmony with our brotherhood's standards. rather than following fads and fashions of our worldly society. To be well mannered, loving, and genuinely friendly dispenses with the need for all the camouflage and concern about worldly beauty (glamour). "Favor is deceitful, and beauty is vain: but a woman that feareth the Lord, she shall be praised" (Prov. 31:30). Sisters who follow the biblical guidelines radiate a natural beauty and serenity which the world cannot duplicate: "The ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price" (1 Pet. 3:4).

Hair style is an important part of our appearance. For sisters to have their hair long and gathered together in an appropriate manner is considered to be moderate in our brotherhood (1 Cor. 11:15). The same is true regarding brothers wearing their hair short and neatly trimmed (1 Cor. 11:14).

Eating moderately is important. There is a tendency to eat too much and then too little. This is not healthy for the body which is the temple of the Holy Spirit (1 Cor. 6:19). Moderation includes a sincere lifelong effort to eat the proper kinds and amount of food.

There is also a danger of pushing oneself too hard and failing to get adequate rest. Stress that is not properly managed can be very damaging. We can accomplish more in the long run if we discipline ourselves and take time for rest. This includes appropriate time for sleep as well as time away from the heavy demands of our routines. Jesus often went to a quiet mountainside or garden to

pray. Wholesome relaxation can help restore body and mind for more effective service. On the other hand, it is not becoming for a child of God to become slothful. Following adequate rest we should be thankful to get up each morning; we should pray, and enter heartily into the work of the day (Col. 3:23).

The Apostle Paul wrote, "For bodily exercise profiteth little: but godliness is profitable unto all things, having promise of the life that now is. and of that which is to come" (1 Tim. 4:8). The above verse teaches us that bodily exercise profiteth little spiritually compared with godliness, which gives promise of eternal life. This does not deny the fact that exercise (in moderation) can be beneficial. Although it is only a temporary vessel for God's spirit, regular, consistent, exercise such as walking is good for the physical body. Many people have bursts of too much exercise in their work or other activities followed by little if any exercise for a period of time. A consistent pattern should be followed.

Speech is another area in which we should practice moderation. It's good to be a fluent conversationalist but there should be a proper balance between talking and listening. "Wherefore my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath" (Jam. 1:19).

Moderation or reasonableness in our attitude prevents division. Maintaining an inflexible attitude on issues which are not clearly taught in the New Testament or by the church can be disastrous. We are taught in Ephesians 5:21: "Submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God." We need to recognize that our brothers and sisters also have the Holy Spirit and we are to learn together what God has to teach us.

Moderation with consistency is one of the hallmarks of a true believer, who seeks to pattern his life after the example of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Our nation set aside a day to honor our mothers this month. Many of us have memories of God-fearing mothers that are so precious. The Bible reminds us to honor our fathers and mothers, the first commandment with promise. Ephesians 6:2. Our oldest and a very dear mother, Sis. Marie Butikofer, was accommodating by continuing the story of her early years.

Down memories lane . . . "Just a little more of our childhood . . . Thinking back, we indeed had a happy home life; never a cross word between my parents. We were reminded by our dad to never talk back to our mother or it would not be well with us. We had lots of good times (there were seven of us, five girls and two boys). Sad to say, only the two oldest are still living. My sister, Rose Steffen, is in a nice

home in Elgin, IL.

We all had our tasks when we were young. After school the wood box had to be filled, water pumped for drinking and to fill the tank on one side of the new stove. What a luxury to have hot water to wash dishes. It was supposed to be our job to do them in the evening, but when Grandma Burki saw we were not too happy at times, she would do them. There was a running spring on our farm which never ran dry, which also served as our refrigerator to keep our milk, butter in jars, and evening milk from twenty-five cows. My dad also made cheese for twenty-eight years. Our cellar was ideal for cheese to cure. It was Mother's job to wash and salt them. Dad had regular customers and it was no trouble getting rid of "Grimm cheese". Since the four girls were older, we also learned to milk and feed young calves. We never lacked for anything we needed. Mother raised chickens and ducks. We learned to pluck their feathers and make pillows and mattress pads. We had two and one-half miles to walk to a one room school house. One teacher taught all eight grades. Everyone at school spoke Swiss so the poor teacher had a time to get us to talk English at noon so she could understand us. My folks boarded the teacher and mother had time filling all the dinner buckets. The teacher usually got pies and we had cake or cookies. I realize more and more what a happy home we had. There were prayers and Bible readings every day. What wonderful training, even though we often would rather have ran out to play. We realized later how good it was for us. There are other things that come to mind, but I had better tell you a little about our move from Elgin. IA, to Missouri.

Sometime in 1925, my dad felt he would like to move some place where a minister was needed. He had a call to go to Winthrop, but mother did not want to go further north. Then a letter came from Bro. Henry Gerst saying there was a need for a minister at Taylor and LaGrange, MO. Some came down and decided to buy the buildings and forty acres at the Red Barn, which seemed to be a landmark for miles around (and still is). At that time we had been living with the folks, helping dad. The first part of January, 1926, we loaded the belongings of the folks, my sister, Sarah, my brother, Leo, Elizabeth and Eli Sutter and their two year old, Edward, Will and I, and our four children, into a boxcar for the move to Missouri. We loaded our cars and left, along with John Frieden, who was also going to Missouri. There were very few hard roads, mostly mud, so traveling was slow. It took us three days to reach Quincy and cross the only bridge. We stayed that night with Bro. Otto Gerst's who had a small log cabin in West Quincy. They put us up several nights until our box car got to LaGrange. The weather turned real nice and warm and we all were so happy we came to a warmer climate. We needed no heat, which was good as there was no furnace, no electric lights, and no running water. Within a week or more, we had a severe blizzard. We did get some heating stoves to keep some rooms warm. We all lived together there by the red barn for a couple of months until Eli's house was ready. In a short time Eli's little Edward started coughing. There were no antibiotics and no one went to hospitals. Inside of the first month we lost both boys. Edward in the morning and our Joel in the evening of the same day. We had not known our neighbors until then. They came and helped all they could. Until then we had been having church in the homes so the Baptist church at LaGrange offered us theirs to use for the funeral. Elder Bro. Noah Schrock had the services and since there was no cemetery, the boys were buried in our yard. Some time later, the men bought a cottage a short distance from where our church is now and also an area for the cemetery. (The boys were the first ones buried there.) A petition was removed to make an assembly room. The other two rooms were used for a men's and a ladies' dining room. Later the upstairs was fixed for Sunday school. My dad used to come early to start the furnace so it was warm when the people came. It was one of those mornings he wrote the words to "The Little White Church on the Levee."

Fred finished high school in the spring and he and Elizabeth Frieden (now Hoerr) came down to get jobs in Quincy. Fred was struck on the head by a pipe where he worked, knocking him unconscious for several hours. He later had severe headaches and then a stroke and so was taken to the hospital. My mother was in Elgin, IL, to help sister, Rose, with her new baby. She came home. Sis. Anna, an R.N. from Chicago, IL, came to help take care of Fred because he was in serious condition. Many prayers were made for him. He was a very sick man for many weeks. It was during this time he realized he needed a Saviour. During his repentance, one after the other of his friends and sisters repented until there were fourteen. These were Elizabeth and Eli Sutter; Anna and Sarah Grimm; Anna, Elizabeth, Lydia, and Phillip Hoerr; Leslie and Christ Gerst; Tillie and Carl Gerst; and Clarence Yackley. When Elder Bros. Winzler and Shubert baptized them May 25, 1930, it was a big addition to our church, and there was a real rejoicing."...

(Continued from Page 36) boys, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. The time came when this king set up this golden image and when the music played, everyone was supposed to bow down to it and worship it. Not these three boys, they had faith in God. They believed in the true and living God. And they would not bow to anything, and after he warned them and gave them another chance to bow down, they said even though you cast us in the fire, we cannot worship any but the true God. And you well know they were cast into the furnace of fire. But there was no harm done to them. There wasn't even a smell of smoke on them if you will read in the 3rd chapter of Daniel, you will find it so. And thus were the words fulfilled that God spoke in Isaiah. You see, He doesn't bring it in fulfillment to multitudes of people, but if He brings His Word in fulfillment in just a few, yet God's Word is fulfilled and we find it then here, dear ones, that we can go on and on throughout the scriptures. We can find where this very fire which was used in that way to fulfill

God's Word, that it was also used in the time with Moses, in a way that it didn't consume the bush, but it burned and burned. When he came near to it then the voice came out of it saying take off thy shoes for this is holy ground and he did and it was God speaking from the bush. We can remember the time when He led the children of Israel with a pillar of fire, a cloud by day, and a pillar of fire by night. Yes, God did this and then we can go to the time of Elijah when he was on the top of that hill and the king sent out a captain and 50 men to apprehend him and he said if I am a man of God, fire will come an consume thee and it did. The captain and the 50 men and this happened twice, but the third man that came to get him bowed down and said have mercy on me and on my men and they were spared. And yet dear ones, these were only things that happened in the time of old that should increase our faith. Now what of today? What does the New Testament speak of the fire? You know already this John the Baptist, when he came he spoke of the Lord's coming and he said that someone will come whose shoes I am not worthy to unloose, and He will baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with fire. Perhaps you will say I have never been baptized with fire. let's go on then to the other writings of the apostles and he said that we should not fear or be so concerned of the fiery temptations and trials which confront us for they are for our good.

Now dear ones, we day by day, have our problems and cares, we day by day have these things which come upon us and those who are tried the hardest must admit oft times they are as a fiery temptation and trial but let us remember also that which is recorded in I Corinthians, the third chapter, for it says that the time will come when perhaps even the works will be burned, but we should be saved and while it doesn't refer to every individual in this way, this is more so for the leaders of the church. Yet we find that we ourselves must be able to let these things which cling to us, yet today we are not fit for the kingdom of heaven, that they must be burned away. Yet they will be hard to bear sometimes but it is for our good. It is for the good of the hearts that must be cleansed and dear ones, they time, how long? We do not know. Each one's life is only known unto God, but the way is open. There will be no excuse for the way it made for generations for individuals. The day of salvation is when you feel convicted in your heart, when you feel that there should be something done that I am not prepared to meet my Lord. That is the time then to do something.

That is the beginning of this burning away that is needed to cleanse the heart, and dear ones, it isn't so hard. We found it that way, didn't we? Yes, there were many stumbling blocks. There were many things that were shackled to us, holding us, but when the time came that we were willing to, in humbleness, bow in repentance, then how easy it was and it's just as easy for anyone else. But the humbleness is necessary. Paul was humble. He so often wrote as he did in this chapter, that he had to endure many thing, but he says we have received this ministry and we faint not. They had so much more to endure than what we do today and yet dear ones, it has come to the point where the criticism is often great, but there is but one way and that is to speak the word of the truth. There is no other way and it is an unchanging word and even though it is brought perhaps, in just a little different way, oft times yet as often as you are concerned, try and search it yourself; you don't have to take the individual's word for it. It's here and we only try to use what is written, for it's for you and it's for me.

Then he says, "But we have renounced the hidden things of dishonesty, not walking in craftiness, nor handling the Word of God deceitfully." He tried to bring it in the spirit and in the truth, too. And he said, "but by manifestation of the truth, commending ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God." Now this is the part where often there is a failure. Dear ones, it gives us courage and strengthens us, when there is someone that will say "well is this a member of your church or who is this person" that by their walk of life I can see something different. This is the kind of a life that Jesus, our Lord, expects to shine out in you and me. This is the way we must walk, in joy in the spirit, but how sad it is when again we must hear that the dollar means more than anything else to someone. This is not the light that our Lord expects to see. This is not one of those things that is of a benefit to God's children, not even to their own soul, let alone to the Lord Who expects us to walk as He walked. Stop to think for a moment dear ones, did He try to lay up any treasure while here upon earth? Did He depend upon anything, that He had one garment He wore? And he said that the foxes have holes, the birds have nests, but He has no where to lay His head. Yes, the Lord depended only on the goodness of others, and of course, on God, more than any, but He went through life in that way, not that He was affectionate of the things of life, for they were nothing. He knew that this was not for Him, that He was here to prepared a way of salvation, and He did fulfill it. And then after He fulfilled it, after He showed us that we must believe upon Him and upon His atoning blood, and that there must be a repentance and conversion, then even then He showed us of the things which were to come. He fulfilled it in such a wonderful way, dear ones, and that then we can consider it as a time which is drawing so near. We spoke of the fire, yes, and it spoke of fire in here so many times, but it didn't mean the fires of rioting and arson which we must see and hear of so much today. This isn't the work of the Lord, this is done by hatred between man. This is done by violence and it is the work of the unrighteous men, not of the Lord. That isn't living according to the Spirit, and we must flee from such things and never take part in them, but today, it is prevalent in our time. In quietness, the Apostle Paul tried to bring the Word and as a light to all men.

SILVER LINING

SERMON BY RETIRED ELDER BRO. PERRY ZIMMERMAN OF FORREST, IL

II Corinthians 4

Paul gives us comfort in these words, does he not, dear ones? He brings us to the same level that he found himself in because he brings our hearts and minds to realize that this is all done in the mortal body. But he also brings us to understand that it must be a spiritual undertaking, also now when we read here the 7th verse, how much it can prove to us this very thing. "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels that the excellency of the power may be of God, and not of us." We can truly say this dear ones, that we ourselves have not accomplished this thing, we ourselves, even though desiring it oft times, we were in bondage to the world and to the evil one. Now what do we mean by this thing? It is something which cannot be hid. It is something which should grow, dear ones, while the mortal body decays and declines in health, strength and in age, the spirit and our faith toward our Lord should increase; do we find it so? It is whatever will be accomplished through the effort that we make and yet this faith, this very faith which he speaks of here, it cannot be seen dear ones, in the way that we look for something in a material way. No, the heavenly home, we have not seen. But stop to think for a moment, the very Son of God, Who hung upon the cross and died there. Who had no beautiful vision but He didn't need it, did He? Because He came from heaven, He knew what was there and even though He had to die this cruel death and needed some comfort at that time. He was

left all alone for He felt that even His Father, God, had forsaken Him. This then should cause us to somewhat review or understand our own life that even though we don't see things and have it to encourage us so greatly, yet we have this Word, dear ones, and if we treasure peace within our hearts, what more do we need? It seems that it is as many gifts lightly accepted, as gifts are in this our time, lightly accepted and not treasured enough until it has been taken away and then it is so sad. Let us hope and pray that his would never happen to us, dear ones, that the precious pearl of peace with God would be taken away. Paul left this invitation, now not only to those who have it, but it is open for all today, again is the day of salvation and while some may say again and again, that has been for centuries. Yes, it has but remember while we speak of eternity, while as the Apostle Paul wrote in another place that a thousand years is as but one day to God, and one day as a thousand years and this is exactly as it is, dear ones, time doesn't mean anything to God. But your conduct and mine does, for I believe and within myself that this will have a greater bearing on when God will let the end come than what it will according to just a measurement of time.

Now we read together here in the fore reading already of the coming of our Lord. This is Isaiah's writing so many hundreds of years before and I had to notice then when he spoke of it, "For every battle of the worrier is with confused noise and garments rolled in blood, but this shall be with burning and full of fire." And he spoke of it later on then again of the fire. Have you ever noticed how often this is mentioned in the Bible? Now there were times when it was for the comfort and the good of man and there are times dear ones, when it should cause fear within the heart of everyone for the fire that it speaks of in the Revelation, where the false prophet and Satan will be cast into that lake of fire, but I'm reminded then of the words that Bro. Loren Strahm read when he was here a number of weeks ago and it too has to deal with this fire.

Then yet the reason I bring it out is because it should remind and bring us greater faith in God for this is the writing of Isaiah too, in the 43rd chapter, when he said, "When thou passeth through the waters, I will be with thee, and through the rivers they shall not over flow thee; when thou walkest through the fire, thou shalt not be burned. Neither shall the flames kindle upon thee." Now these are the words that the Lord spoke through Isaiah and then already we can go on just a few books farther and in the 3rd chapter of Daniel, this very thing took place, dear ones. After the children of Israel had been taken into captivity and taken to Babylon under the rule of King Nebuchadnezzar and if you will remember, the three who were taken and raised up to serve in his kingdom, even though they were Jewish
