GIVING FOR THE LORD'S WORKS Where Shall We Focus Our Efforts in Giving? By Richard Schmidgall, World Relief Committee

We are well aware that our mail is inundated with pleas almost daily to give to this or that cause. Some of these causes are very good and should have support. However, many more of these solicitations eat up 30-50% or more in their advertising, mailing, and administration costs. Some of these organizations have a staggering income. One example is a prominent boys home that has \$1 million in reserve for each child it houses and raises.

Members and friends of the Apostolic Christian Church are fortunate to have a World Relief Committee sanctioned by the elder body who meet three times a year. Their duties as well as expending the generous contributions of our people include a careful study of each organization who solicits funds, to see what their costs are and if they merit contribution.

We have not found any organization whose contributions are used as efficient as your own Apostolic Christian World Relief and Mission Group whose volunteer work expends almost 100% of your contributions to worthy projects. As near as we can figure, approximately 1% is used for administrative expense. So if you want the most for your contribution, your own Apostolic Christian World Relief, Mission and Works Project Volunteer Groups would be a good choice. If you know of work projects that you feel are worthy of your contributions, on page 70 of the Mission World Relief activities handbook there is a form on which you may submit the data or you may write a request letter to your area representative. The committee will review your request, and after prayerful consideration will submit it for allocation if they feel it is a worthy cause.

At our last national World Relief meeting in Minneapolis on August 17, 1991, it was made mention of a sizeable contribution that came in from a brother who, as a busy man, just doesn't have time to be actively involved in the many on-going world relief projects.

I believe there are many brethren who are in this position and how we appreciate them! For without their generous contribution there wouldn't be money for the many projects world relief is funding.

We have brethren who may not be able to give monetary contributions, yet they willingly give of their time in many ways. We have brethren who use their vacation time to travel to work projects such as building new churches in America, traveling to disaster projects such as Hurricane Hugo in the Carolinas, Mexico City's devastating earthquake, and on-going projects such

NOTICE OF A REVISED BOOKLET OF CHRISTMAS CAROLS

The paperbound edition of Christmas Carols that is currently available from the Apostolic Christian Publications bookstore in Eureka was first printed in 1955, and has remained largely unchanged during the previous 35 years. A revised edition, however, is in the process of being printed and will be available for the coming Christmas season.

This new paperbound booklet, entitled "Hymns of Christmas," will contain 36 songs selected from the Zion's Harp, Hymns of Zion and Gospel Hymns, as well as a few hymns from other books.

These booklets are expected to be available from the bookstore in Eureka around the first of November. As soon as they are available, a copy will be sent to each congregation, along with the cost and information on ordering. Individuals or families wishing to purchase them should contact the bookstore after November 1. as school house roofs in Haiti, fresh water wells providing clean water for approximately 200,000 people, refurbishing medical facilities and providing pharmaceutical supplies for the impoverished people of Haiti.

We have our wonderful Sewing Group sisters who make the many quilts, baby clothes, school kits, scratch pads, hospital gowns from used white shirts, homemade soap, do clothing drives, sort and pack at our material aid centers. They also tear, strip, and roll bandages from sheets which are used in Haitian hospitals. These sheets are provided by another group of volunteers who are willing to canvas motels, hospitals, and so forth for used sheets and soap.

Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

The Bible teaches that a long life can be a blessing. Children who honor their father and mother are given this promise: "That it may be well with thee, and thou mayest live long on the earth" (Eph. 6:3). Abraham was the father of faith and was greatly blessed by God. Among God's many promises to him was the assurance that he would go to his rest in peace at a good old age (Gen. 15:15). Our most important goal is to live in such a way that we may leave this life in peace with God and man and be with the Lord in all eternity. Reaching a "good old age" as a faithful servant of the Lord can be a special blessing, not only to the individual but to many others. It is not ours to choose how long we will live. but we should have the readiness of the Apostle Paul to go or stay (Phil. 1:21) and to always remember the Scripture: ". . . if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens" (2 Cor. 5:1).

There are many differing attitudes which individuals adopt as they grow older. Some foolishly try to deny the reality of aging by using artificial means of looking younger or by simply not "acting their age." For some there are fears of failing health or loneliness. Some become discouraged because they feel they have lost their usefulness to others. On the other hand there are those who adjust to the "golden years" in a constructive manner and welcome the many opportunities unique to this phase of life. Rather than denying the reality of the aging process. we should apply a scriptural outlook which is very positive. "The hoary head (gray hair) is a crown of glory, if it be found in the way of righteousness" (Prov. 16:31).

For the believer the greatest joy of reaching the older years should be the awareness that the heavenly goal is approaching. In His times of heavy trial, the Lord Jesus was lifted up and strengthened by the thought of the

"joy that was set before him" (Heb. 12:2). God has given many wonderful promises to those who reach an old age as his faithful servants. "And even to your old age I am he; and even to hoar hairs will I carry you: I have made, and I will bear; even I will carry, and will deliver you" (Is. 46:4). David prayed to God for sustenance in his old age: "Cast me not off in the time of old age: forsake me not when my strength faileth" (Ps. 71:9), and his prayer was answered. Essential attributes of a wholesome outlook on aging include patience and maintaining trust in God's faithfulness. "Cast not away therefore your confidence, which hath great recompense of reward. For ye have need of patience, that. after ve have done the will of God. ye might receive the promise" (Heb. 10:35-36).

Many gratifying opportunities present themselves in the golden years. It is often possible to spend more beneficial time with grandchildren than was possible with one's own children. Those who are older are to serve as teachers and role models for the younger (Tit. 2:2-4). The years of experience and the wisdom of the elderly should be highly valued and heavily utilized resources.

Retired individuals should take advantage of the numerous opportunities for volunteer work. If we feel we are not needed it may be because we have simply failed to take the initiative to make ourselves available to help others. The Psalmist wrote, "Those that be planted in the house of the Lord shall flourish in the courts of our God. They shall still bring forth fruit in old age; they shall be fat and flourishing" (Psa. 92:13-14). Those who are blessed with good health and strength into a high age should maintain an active life of service to God as long as possible. When Moses came to the end of his days "his eye was not dim, nor his natural force abated.

The Word also explains how we should adjust to the more common

experience of eventual decline of human strength and health. "Though our outward man perish, vet the inward man is renewed day by day. For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory; while we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal" (2 Cor. 4:16-18). We should always make effort to care for the health of our bodies because they are temples of the living God (1 Cor. 3:16; Eph. 5:29). Nevertheless the time usually comes when we must make appropriate adjustments in our activities and our living arrangements because of advancing age. How reassuring to know that when these times come, the Spirit of God within us remains as a powerful, unwavering source of guidance and help.

In our beloved fellowship there is no lack of loved ones who are ready to lend a helping hand and an encouraging word to those who are no longer able to lead an active life. Excellent homes for the elderly have been established in a number of our communities. These provide a wonderful spiritual and physical haven for souls who need special care. The pathway of life includes both giving and receiving. Although "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:25), if we have served others while able, we can receive help gratefully and joyfully like the Apostle Paul, who described this as "fruit that may abound to (the giver's) account" (Phil. 4:17).

Above all things, may we be found faithful in the end, declaring like Paul, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing" (2 Tim. 4:7-8).

UNTIED AND TURNED LOOSE Elder Bro. Willis Enhle Shioda, Japan

Recently in our church services here in Japan, I have been intrigued by the Japanese word, KAIHO, which is written with one character for KAI and another character for HO. This word is used in Romans 6:18 which reads, "Being then made free from sin, ye became the servants of righteousness." After reading the Japanese, I expected the English to read that we had been acquitted of our sin but I found that our King James Bible used the words that we had been set free from sin. In my mind, I had always translated that Japanese word to mean acquittal but now I had to consider the matter further.

In the Old Testament, Job longed to be acquitted, if he had committed any sins for which he was being punished. In Job 10:14, he states, "If I sin, then though markest me, and thou wilt not acquit me from mine iniquity." At that time, he was at a low and felt that there was no way out of his trouble. Later in 19:25, his hope and confidence in God was restored when he stated, "For I know that my redeemer liveth."

The word acquittal is used in the court room to indicate that someone on trial was found not guilty. I like to think that Christ is not only our Saviour but also our defense lawyer and on the basis of His atonement we are found to be not guilty.

I was struck with the fact that the translators of the English version in Romans used the words "made free" rather than "have been acquitted." My mind turned to the meaning of the two Japanese characters which from the word KAIHO. The first character means to untie and the second character means to turn loose. I was elated and remain so. Can you imagine anything so wonderful as being untied and turned loose? It reminds me of a colt which has been kept in a barn for a long time and then turned out to pasture to romp in the grass. That's us, only we must remember that we are now "servants of righteousness."

Shortages are creating inflation so that construction such as ours is more costly. World Relief aid such as medical, water wells, material aid and school support is therefore much appreciated.

It is a remarkable circumstance that the most brilliant colors of plants are to be seen on the highest mountains, in spots that are most exposed to the wildest weather. The brightest lichens and mosses, the loveliest gems of wild flowers, abound far up on the bleak, stormscalped peak.

One of the richest displays of organic coloring I ever beheld was near the summit of Mount Chenebettaz, a hill about 10,000 feet high, immediately above the great St. Bernard Hospice. The whole face of an extensive rock was covered with a most vivid yellow lichen which shone in the sunshine like the golden battlement of an enchanted castle.

There, in that lofty region, amid the most frowning desolation, exposed to the fiercest tempest of the sky, this lichen exhibited a glory of color such as it never showed in the sheltered valley. I have two specimens of the same lichen before me while I write these lines, one from the great St. Bernard, and the other from the wall of a Scottish castle, deeply embossed among sycamore trees; and the difference in point of form and coloring between them is most striking.

The specimen nurtured amid the wild storms of the mountain peak is of a lovely primrose hue, and is smooth in texture and complete in outline, while the specimen nurtured amid the soft airs and the delicate showers of the lowland valley is of a dim rusty hue, and is scurfy in texture, and broken in outline.

And is it not so with the Christian who is afflicted, tempest-tossed, and not comforted? Till the storms and vicissitudes of God's providence beat upon him again and again, his character appears marred and clouded; but trials clear away the obscurity, perfect the outlines of his disposition, and give brightness and blessing to his life.

Amid my list of blessings infinite Stands this the foremost, that my heart has bled:

In Repentance - All this time. prayer is playing a great role in the work of regeneration. Many of us were taught from childhood to pray, but as long as the soul is untouched by the divine life, our prayers are mostly an empty form, mere words and phrases rendered largely through habit and a sense of duty. How futile are such prayers! But a change is taking place. The divine light is dawning in the soul. The conscience is quickened and condemns pitilessly, not only our past transgressions, but such new transgressions as are still committed, as long as the soul has not laid hold in faith on Christ as its Saviour. Now the souls is truly under conviction and is lashed by the accusation and condemnation of the Law. Having not vet laid hold on faith nor received the strength which comes only through faith in Christ, the crucified and risen Lord, Who is the victor over the power of sin and death, the situation seems hopeless. Doubt, fear and despair torture the soul.

Now prayer partakes of a differenc nature. It becomes a yearning, a crying, a sighing to God for help. The fine phrases are forgotten. Sometimes without words the soul sighs to God, and sometimes with such simple words as, "O Lord help me, O Lord be merciful to me and forgiven me my many sins and make me free from sin." (Romans 10:13)

These are days of darkness and despair, but Oh, how healing are they if we allow them to serve the purpose for which they are sent; namely, to lead us to truly and earnestly seek the Saviour. These days make it possible for the soul to bring to God the one offering which He will not despise, a broken spirit and a broken and contrite heart. (Psalm 51:17) This is repentance in the sense used in the gospel. It is a deep feeling of remorse and regret for past sins, a struggle to become free from sin and a reaching out to God for help. It is born out of a realization that God is holy and righteous and that those who would stand in his presence must be purified and sanctified in order to be acceptable.

Confession - A new important need is now experienced in the soul - a need which is quite the opposite of what the soul previously desired. The natural man, in darkness, is not very much concerned because he has sinned, but he does fear that he might be found out by his fellow men. Therefore, to keep his sins under cover of darkness is one of his chief concerns. Now that the soul is enlightened, it is tortured by the consciousness of its guilt before its Maker and has an actual desire, even a deep felt need to make confession of its sins.

It is like the impurities of the body gathering into a large, painful boil. The pain becomes very severe and the sufferer longs for the time when the boil becomes "ripe" so that it may belch forth its pus and impurities and allow the healing process to begin. So the soul in repentance has an increasing desire to "open up" and pour out a confession of its past sinfulness. David experienced this after he once forgot God and fell into a great sin for which he afterward repented so contritely. His confession of repentance was made openly and written into a psalm of instruction and published, even printed into the Bible, where you and I may read it until this very day. It is recorded in the thirty-second Psalm, where he says: "When I kept silence, my bones waxed old through my roaring all the day long. For day and night Thy hand was heavy upon me; my moisture is turned into the drought of summer, I acknowledged my sin unto Thee and mine iniquity have I not hid. I said I will confess my transgressions unto the Lord; and Thou forgavest the iniquity of my sin." (Psalm 32:3-5)

Apologies — When a repentant person becomes convicted in his conscience of wrong doing against another person, it is essential to confess and apologize and where possible make restitution to that person. Sometimes this is not so easy because it involves personal pride. In such cases, it is all the more necessary and wholesome that it be done. Not only is it very helpful and healing to the confessor, but it gives the very best kind of testimony to the wronged person of the changed which the Grace of God is accomplishing in the repenting person. There have been cases where a person to whom the apology is made by a repenting person was so struck and impressed by the humble and penitent attitude of the confessor that it caused that person also to turn to repentance and thereby became the direct means of saving a soul.

But there are sins which are against God and His law only and involve no other person. In fact, all sins are primarily against God and only secondarily against our fellow men. The truly repentant person will feel the need of confessing these also. (Such confessions are made to elders and occasionally to ministers when an elder is not available. Such confession is made with the confidence that the elder will understand and will know how to counsel the confessor, and will keep such confession confidential.) Of course, such a confession is always to be made in sincerity and uprightness

That confession of sins is an essential fruit of true repentance is evident in many places of the Scriptures. Even of John the Baptist it is written, the people "were baptized of him in Jordan, confessing their sins." (Matthew 3:6) When the gospel of Jesus Christ was brought to the Ephesians and accepted by them, we also find that confession was the fruit of repentance. We read: "And many that believed came and confessed, and shewed their deeds." (Acts 19:18)

When unrepentant people came to John the Baptist for baptism, he refused them with these cutting words: "O generation of vipers, who hath warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bring forth therefore fruits meet for repentance." (Matthew 3:7-8) Undoubtedly an essential part of the fruit consistent with repentance, which John missed in these insincere candidates for baptism, was a readiness and willingness to confess their sins as the others had done, to whom John's baptism was administered.

That confession is an essential part of the cleansing of the heart, not only in the original cleansing during repentance, but also in after life, if a Christian should again through unwatchfulness commit sin, is shown by the following Scripture texts: "Confess your faults one to another and pray one for another that ye may be healed." (James 5:16) "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (I John 1:9)

Experience — Not only is the confession of sins as an essential part of the Cleansing of the heart in repentance thoroughly established in the doctrines of the Holy Scriptures, but the experience of those in our days who have attained regeneration through repentance and faith confirms the absolute need of confession as a means of unburdening the heart and of obtaining the strength to resist and throw off the power of sin.

To the soul in repentance who is not yet ready and willing to make confession of its sins we can only say, "The fruits of repentance are yet incomplete. Press forward until you have grace to pour out all filth (be it much or little) of the old life." It is no disgrace for a repentant person to confess sins, but an honor. It marks definitely the end of the old life of uncleanness and the beginning of the new life in Christ in righteousness and purity.

Wrestling With God — In this state of repentance, the soul must wrestle with God and Christ in praver as did Jacob who wrestled with an angel of God all through the night, seeking a blessing. The angel said to him, "Let me go, for the day breaketh. Jacob replied, "I will not let thee go, except thou bless me." Jacob prevailed and received a blessing and a new name; "Thy name shall be called no more Jacob, but Israel, for as a prince hast thou wrestled with God and men and has prevailed." (Genesis 32:26-28) So may the repenting soul say to the Lord, "I will not give up. Thou hast promised to help me and forgive me. I hold Thee to Thy promise.

It is not hardness nor unwillingness to forgive sins that causes God to allow the soul thus to suffer and struggle in the slough of despond. This experience is necessary to bring about certain changes in the heart. Willfulness and stubbornness must give place to obedience to Christ; pride and arrogance must be displaced by humility and meekness, and doubt and unbelief must yield to faith. The will and determination to serve God only must become overwhelming. Those in repentance, who ask God's forgiveness, must learn to forgive, where others have offended against them.

The love of things sinful must be changed into a loathing of them and the power of sin over us must be broken. The love of vain things must perish out of the heart. These are fundamental changes which are the real essence of conversion – of being born again.

Superficial evangelists often speak lightly of "accepting Christ as our Saviour." That of course is necessary. But our marriage to Christ the heavenly Bridegroom, like all marriages, must be a mutual affair. It is not only a question of whether we accept Him, but much more of whether He accepts us. He will accept us; He is bound by His Word and His promises to accept us and His love prompts Him to accept us when we meet His conditions and come with the true fruits of repentance, asking to be forgiven by Him and to be accepted of Him. It is while the fruits of repentance are being developed and ripened that this struggle must go on. The length and fierceness of the struggle does not depend nearly so much upon the degree of our sinfulness (for the sacrifice of Jesus Christ upon the cross is sufficient to atone for all sins, though they be as scarlet), as upon the stubbornness of our will and the tenacity with which we cling to our old life.

Repentance, then, is not merely remorse for past wrongdoing but a struggle within ourselves, a struggle between the forces of good and evil, a struggle in which our will plays an important, but not the decisive, part. Our own will unsupported could never overcome the evil in our nature, not only for lack of strength, but because it, itself, is not perfectly pure.

As the struggle goes on, the soul becomes more conscious of its need, of its complete dependence upon the grace of God, in short, of its lost condition without Christ. It wrestles with God, pleading to be forgiven, pleading for strength and victory, pleading for peace, and vowing over and over to God, to obey and serve Him unto death if He will only help and receive it.

The soul becomes more and more ready and willing to yield itself to Christ and to believe and accept God's way of salvation; to believe in Jesus Christ as the Son of God and to believe in His atonement for sin through His death upon the cross and in the shedding of His blood, as a blameless, perfect Lamb of God, for the atonement and the forgiveness of the sins of all men who believe and (receive) His salvation.

Accepted By The Saviour -But the climax comes, not when we accept Him, but when He accepts us. When He sees the fruit of repentance ripened, the heart purified, the will subdued into obedience to Him, then He changes our hope and belief that He can and will forgive our sins and accept us, into a conviction, into an assurance that He has accepted and forgiven us. Thus the struggle ends. Peace and joy fill the heart. An all-consuming love fills and overwhelms the soul. This love knows no bounds. It embraces all men-friend and foe-and burns with a desire to tell all men of the life-giving, soul-saving, healing and liberating power of God in Jesus Christ.

That soul is converted!

Baptism — The man of sin has perished in the heart, has been nailed to the cross with Christ; "old things are passed away; behold all things are become new!" (II Corinthians 5:17)

The man of sin, the Adam nature, being now slain, crucified with Christ, that soul may now be baptized into the death of Jesus Christ and arise with him to "walk in newness of life." (Romans 6:4) Thus baptism is not the means of obtaining forgiveness of sins, but is the ensealing of an established fact, of a conversion that has gone before. By immersion into water, the burial of the Adam nature is symbolized; by arising out of the water the resurrection to a new life of godliness and holiness is symbolized. The bath in water symbolizes the cleansing of the heart, which cleansing, however, is not done with water, but by the atonement in the blood of Christ.

The Holy Spirit — Now, the heart, being cleansed, is prepared to receive the Holy Ghost as a permanent tenant. He shall be, and is needed as a comforter, as a guide through life, to guide us into all truth. (John 16:13) Jesus said, "He shall teach you all things and bring all things to your remembrance whatsoever I have said unto you." (John 14:26)

The anointing of the Holy Ghost is an essential part, without which no converted soul is fully furnished and equipped for the journey and battle of life. A solemn rite is ordained in the Word of God which, when accepted in obedience and faith, and after proper preparation, becomes the means by which this precious gift is received, namely by the laying on of hands, with prayer, after immersion.

The writer of the Epistle to the Hebrews includes this rite, along with repentance and baptism, as among the **principles** of the doctrine of Christ when he says, "Therefore leaving the principles of the doctrine of Christ, let us go on unto perfection; not laying again the foundation of repentance from dead works, of faith toward God, of the doctrine of baptisms and of laying on of hands, and of resurrection of the dead and of eternal judgment." (Hebrews 6:1, 2)

Also we find that the Apostles, Peter and John, when they went to Samaria, having heard that Samaria had received the Word of God through the preaching of Phillip, practiced the laying on of hands for the giving of the Holy Ghost upon those who believed and were baptized. We read: "Then laid they their hands on them, and they received the Holy Ghost." (Acts 8:17)

While this rite is ignored or neglected by most denominations

of nominal Christianity, it is well established in the Holy Scripture and should be gladly embraced by all true believers who desire to accept the whole counsel of God.

What A Blessing - What a wonderful experience, to be led out of darkness into light! To be led by God's goodness into repentance; in repentance to be led to faith in the Son of God; by Him to be freed from the power of sin: by Him to be washed and cleansed of our sins that are past, to receive forgiveness of sins and peace with God: to be clothed with the white garment of justification through Jesus Christ; to receive baptism in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit; by the laying on of hands to receive the gift of the Holy Spirit; to have the love of God richly poured out into our heart !

What A Responsibility — What an experience! What a blessing! Also what a responsibility!

Henceforth we are no more our own, but are betrothed as the bride of the Lamb, to Jesus Christ the Lamb of God, the heavenly Bridegroom.

Henceforth we may no more live unto ourselves, but unto Him who lived and died for us.

Blessed are we if we continue in this faith and in the love all our days, being faithful unto death, bearing fruit of the Spirit, (Galatians 5:22) serving God and our fellow men in love, keeping the commandments of Christ, growing rich in good works, done in the Lord. "For so an entrance shall be ministered unto you abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ." (II Peter 1:11)

But woe unto us, if, after being saved, and having vowed to serve God and to keep the Commandments of Christ, we fail to do so; if we content ourselves, merely because we no longer live in sin, and neglect to labor in Christ's vineyard and harvest field; if after having said, "I go, sir," when the Lord called us to labor for Him, we neglect to go and neglect to labor.

Woe unto us and double death, if after we have been "once enlightened, and have tasted of the heavenly gift, and were made partakers of the Holy Spirit and have tested the good word of God, and the powers of the world to come, if we shall again fall away, and crucify the Son of God afresh and put Him to an open shame." (Hebrews 6:4, 5) There is no second regeneration of such. "But beloved, we are persuaded better things of you, and things that accompany salvation, though we thus speak." (Hebrews 6:9)

(Continued from Page 36) that cannot be forgiven, we find also that we can come asking Him to forgive us for our sins and mistakes and He will help us.

We certainly don't want to fall into the trap whereby we would be like those children of Israel where one day they were okay and the next day, they fell into sin. Then the next day, they would beg for forgiveness and on and on and on. We don't believe that God is well pleased with that kind of life. Certainly it is for that reason, then, that we gather to exhort one another that we be true and faithful each day. We should take heed to these teachings and follow them as God gives us the Spirit to direct us.

What are these things? What are the reminders we have here? It is general here in the first verse or two, "Furthermore then we beseech you, brethren, and exhort you by the Lord Jesus, that as ye have received of us how ye ought to walk and to please God, so ye would abound more and more." I Thessalonians 4:1. There is growth here in this first verse. He is saying, "We have taught you what you are to do and now we want you to walk that way and even walk so that you are abounding more and more."

The Lord has just called us unto His service . . . unto His walk and expects of us to grow and to be more faithful and more honorable to Him.

"For ye know what commandments we gave you by the Lord Jesus." I Thessalonians 4:2. He begins to reiterate some of those commandments. He said, "For this is the will of God, even your sanctification, that ye should abstain from fornication: That everyone of you should know how to possess his vessel in sanctification and honour; Not in the lust of concupiscence, even as the Gentiles which know not God:" and he goes on. I Thessalonians 4:3-5.

We are cautioned to be careful of lust and that which could lead to fornication, and to know how to possess our vessels...know how to take care of ourselves so we would not be enticed or drawn into these things. The world is drawn into them, and which we could be tempted into also if we are not careful and if we are not obedient to the will of the Spirit of God and not prayerful even in asking Him to help us.

The last part of that sentence seems to change the subject a little bit. He said, "That no man go beyond and defraud his brother in any matter: because that the Lord is the avenger of all such, as we also have forewarned you and testified." I Thessalonians 4:6.

This is the matter of being honest in all aspects of life, even toward our brother, even toward all people on the earth!

"For God hath not called us unto uncleanness, but unto holiness." I Thessalonians 4:7. Again, thinking of those children of Israel, it was the same for them. God had called them to be a chosen people but they had fallen even to the point where they were unclean and had grieved God in their actions.

"He therefore that despiseth, despiseth not man, but God, who hath also given unto us his holy spirit." I Thessalonians 4:8. We are reminded here that if we do not keep these commandments, we are working against God or being as though we were despising some man, but actually we are against God. We are doing these things contrary to God and then God becomes even hurt by this because He has given His Holy Spirit unto us so that we might be overcomers.

Then he speaks of love, brotherly love. He said, "But as touching brotherly love ye need not that I write unto you: for ye yourselves are taught of God to love one another." I Thessalonians 4:9. The first commandment and the second, like unto the first, gives us this requirement. They must have had love for each other.

They must have had brotherly love even to all those brethren that were in Macedonia. Again he said, "...we beseech you, brethren, that ye increase more and more" I Thessalonians 4:10.

In the first part of the chapter, it was that they should abound more and more, and now he says that they should increase more and more. So we can see what we are called to, also, that we might grow and prosper in those things which are pleasing to God.

Then just some general reminders are here about their life. "... study to be quiet, and to do your own business, and to work with your own hands." I Thessalonians 4:11. We are called to be a people who are quiet.

We are called to be a people to mind our own business, that is, that we don't gossip or seek out to know everybody else's business.

Furthermore, we are asked we would work even with our own hands to lay up those things which are necessary to sustain us in our families.

"That ye may walk honestly toward them that are without, and that ye may have lack of nothing." I Thessalonians 4:12. It is so important, I believe, that we walk honestly toward them that are without. There are people who don't know the way of salvation. There are people who are looking to us to show them the way. There are people who are looking to us to show them the way. They are people who are looking to us as an example of the way. It is very important that we walk honestly towards those and show a good example.

We know that we can't be perfect and we should not try to be something we are not. But at the same time, I think it is very important that we can show forth honesty and we can show forth the example that our word is good. What we say is what we mean and when we make a promise, that we fulfill our promises.

In general, we should be true to our word and to those we come in contact with. There ought to be a difference in our lives. There ought to be a ring of honesty and truth and sincerity in each of our lives.

We believe there is. Yet, how good that we have been reminded here this morning that we should increase more and more and that we should abound more and more. Everyone of us here in this room has that which we can do better. Everyone of us has that which we can be more honorable to God and be more respected by those who are around us.

Again, if we just think about the last part of the chapter, it will help us to want that more and more. It will help us to want to strive so we can be more faithful, if we just think what it will be like if we are called out of this life before we die. If Jesus does return again, what will it be like on that day when we can be taken up to be with Him forever? What will it be like when we pass from time into eternity and then wait the time in which He will choose us?

We cannot comprehend the blessings of heaven. We cannot comprehend the terribleness of hell. But we can comprehend the blessings of heaven. We want to be among those who are chosen, and we want to escape being among those who are not.

May the love of God and may His Holy Spirit ever come over us each day so that we might then strive to do those things which are written here in the beginning of the chapter. "Abound More and More in Jesus" I Thessalonians 4

If we would read on in the next chapter, we would find that the holy Apostle talks about the coming of our Lord Jesus again. He says even the day of the Lord shall come as a thief in the night to receive those of His own. (See I Thessalonians 5:2).

We believe that believers throughout the ages, between the time this was written and today, have all believed and all have had the thought that perhaps in their time, the Lord Jesus would again return. Here we are, some two thousand years later, and we are still waiting for His return.

None of us know when that shall be. None of us know whether we will be those who are asleep in Jesus when He comes, or if we will be those who are alive and be caught up, even as we have read here in this last part of the chapter.

Really the end of this chapter is quite a comfort, isn't it, when we think about those who passed on before? When we think of those who are indeed sleeping in Jesus and who indeed lived their lives so they were prepared to meet their God, they will be the first to be taken up. Then those who would yet remain on the earth and be alive, will follow after.

"For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the arch-angel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord." I Thessalonians 4:16-17.

How fitting that the Apostle closes this chapter yet with the thought, "Wherefore comfort on another with these words." I Thessalonians 4:18. We need comfort and we need this assurance, not only when we think about our loved ones who have gone on before, but when we even think about ourselves, our children, and our friends.

We need to be able to comfort each other with the thought that we can be among those who are to be caught up with the Lord forever.

I believe it means that when it says, "... so shall we ever be with the Lord." I Thessalonians 4:17. So shall we ever be with the Lord. We shall forever be with the Lord.

It sounds so easy, doesn't it? Yet, the first part of this chapter is a warning to us and it has many, many teachings unto us to help us so that we can have this privilege, and so we can have this eventually happen to us.

I believe he was speaking here to believers. He reviewed here at one point that they had become converted. "For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with him." I Thessalonians 4:14.

Just before that, it says, "For God hath not called us unto uncleanness, but unto holiness." I Thessalonians 4:7. He is speaking here to those who were called by God and who had accepted the call and who believed that Jesus died and rose again. That faith and belief was unto the saving of their souls.

We believe yet today that the only way that we can be saved is through faith and through acknowledgement of that faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Through repentance and conversion, we then can be saved . . . through being born again, as the Word teaches us, out of water and of Spirit.

Then the charge he gave these people was that they remain faithful . . . that they take heed to the teachings and strive to do that which would be the will of God.

He is giving them warnings here that they would not be like the children of Israel, that they would not forget what God had done for them and revert back to doing things which were not pleasing to God . . . only to find that God would have to punish them and then feel kind of sorry. As we read it together, it gives us that impression, at least, for what he had done for them. They would come begging and He would come forgiving.

So it is with us, too. When we find ourselves in sin and when we find ourselves even as lost, we can come begging to God and He will forgive us. As long as we don't fall into deep sin again . . . into a sin
