TRIALS AND TRIBULATIONS OF THE SEARCH FOR A NEW HOME — AMERICA The Voyage and Shipwreck

Sometime in March of 1874, John Grimm Sr. and Fred Schupbach traveled through Switzerland and France until they arrived at the great seaport city of Le Havre, France. There they boarded a steamship named Europe that was bound for America. Elizabeth Gehring, Jacob and Elizabeth Hafely and their six children, Benedict and Mary Emch, Christian and Maria Kupferschmid and their four small children, and many others also boarded this same ship at this time.

The steamship, Europe, or Europa, as its Swiss passengers called it, was built in 1864 by Scott's Shipbuilding and Engineering Company, Greenock, Scotland. When first built, it contained two side paddle-wheels to propel it, but in 1873 the ship was completely remodeled and its paddle-wheels were replaced with single-screw propulsion. So many alterations were made on the Europe at this time, that its passengers who boarded it for the first time in March of 1874 though it was a new ship. It now contained an iron hull, two tall masts with large sails plus a smaller mizzen-mast in the back of the ship, two funnels or smokestacks set fairly close together in the middle of the boat, and its overall length was 394 feet. The Europe was owned by the shipping company of Compagnic Generalo Transatlantique (generally called the "French Line" in Britain and the United States), and it sailed regularly between Havre, France, and New York City until its reconstruction in 1873.

When the Europe left the harbor in March of 1874 with John Grimm and the other passengers aboard, this was its first voyage across the Atlantic Ocean to America since the ship's reconstruction the previous year. Miss Marion Klotzle, whose mother was on this voyage, wrote:

"After sailing for several days, the steamship struck an iceberg which knocked a large hole in one part. The water gushed in and with the aid of hand pumps, they tried to keep it from sinking. They shot cannons, which was the only means they had for calling for help. The crew told each passenger that they were going to shoot a cannon as a distress signal. They told the passengers that it would be very loud and would rock the ship, and if there was a ship in hearing range, it would come to their rescue."

It is thought that the passengers had to throw some of their belongings or, at least, some of the ship's cargo overboard in order to lighten it and, thus, keep it from sinking so fast.

During the next three days, the passengers on the sinking Europe were almost overcome with fear. The ship was filling with water, and some of the people "were praying, others crying, while others were sick with fear." At least one passenger, Elizabeth Gehring (who was going to America to visit her brother, Jacob Gehring, Sr., near Elgin, IA)_, suffered a nervous breakdown because of the cold and shock caused by the shipwreck. It is also very possible that John Grimm began repenting during this time because it is known for certain that several months later he had already begun repenting. Doubtlessly, his thoughts must have turned to God many times during the three horror-filled days

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

BIBLICAL BASIS OF TRADITION

At times the Apostolic Christian Church is criticized both from those within the church and by those from outside for placing too much emphasis on traditions. There are those who say that our traditions are simply an outward show designed to put on a good appearance, regardless of what is really in the heart; that they are legalistic; that they are mere externals and have no value on the path toward salvation. Such attitudes are clearly an indication of a serious misunderstanding of the role of traditions as outlined in the Bible.

From the Word of God it is quite evident that we are not saved by traditions. Many passages of Scriptures clearly state that "by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God" (Eph. 2:8), and "a man is not justified by the works of the law, but by the faith of Jesus Christ" (Gal. 2:16). The Bible provides instruction concerning both the positive and the negative potential that traditions may have in our lives. We can learn from the Word of God that traditions can either be very damaging or very beneficial spiritually.

Christ spoke a warning to the Pharisees not to make "the commandment of God of none effect by your tradition" (Matt. 15:6). He also warned of the dangers of "teaching for doctrines the commandments of men" (Matt. 15:9) and He clearly pointed out the unacceptable position of those who would "reject the commandment of God, that ye may keep your own tradition" (Mark 7:9).

The Apostle Paul wrote an urgent exhortation to the believers at Thessalonica regarding their attitudes about tradition. "Therefore, brethren, stand fast, and hold the traditions which ye have been taught, whether by word, or our epistle" (2 Thes. 2:15). The Word also instructs the believers to "prove all things; hold fast that which is good" (I Thes. 5:21) "be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may

prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God" (Rom. 12:2).

One could form the opinion that there is a serious contradiction between the teachings of Jesus Christ and those of the Apostle Paul. To resolve this seeming contradiction, it is vitally important that a child of God look carefully at several important issues. It must be understood that the contexts in which Christ and Paul spoke were vastly different. Also, it is important to understand both the potential value and the limitations of traditions in the life of a Christian.

The "traditions of the elders" and the "commandments of men" that Christ spoke of were rules imposed on the children of Israel that attempted to justify behavior that was ungodly, to nullify the commandments of God or to make a physical issue (hand washing) a spiritual issue. They were used by the scribes and Pharisees as a means of keeping the people in subjection, as a way of earning God's approval or as a substitute for the Word of God. These practices were utterly condemned by Christ because they were so distorted by the Pharisees and scribes that they prevented men from doing what was right-"Full well ye reject the commandment of God, that ye may keep your own tradition" (Mark 7:9). They were more interested in appearance than substance. "This people honoreth me with their lips, but their heart is far from me" (Mark 7:6).

Sometimes individuals use Paul's teaching that we "stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, and be not entangled again with the yolk of bondage" (Gal. 5:1) as justification for setting aside the traditions of the church and as a means of freeing themselves from what they describe as old fashioned, unnecessary "man-made" rules. Paul, however, admonished that we "use not liberty for an occasion to the flesh" (Gal. 5:13), and Peter warned against "using your liberty for a cloak of maliciousness" (1 Pet. 2:16).

The liberties we have in Jesus Christ and the freedom from bondage promised to Christians are liberties and freedoms from the grip that Satan has on the unconverted and should not be used to justify behavior that is offensive to our Lord or to our brethren (Rom. 14:15; 1 Cor. 8:12).

Why do we need traditions or defined patterns of holiness? Why are they so important to our brotherhood? The Bible does not expressly deal with every specific situation that may confront the children of God. As a result, over the years practices have developed based on scriptural principles that enable God's people to deal more successfully with many of these situations.

The instability that we see in the world today is partially a result of many years of gradually removing ancient "landmarks" that helped people make sound decisions. The ancient landmarks have been replaced with a do "what is right in your own eyes" (Judges 17:6) philosophy which has caused many to suffer spiritual shipwreck.

Nearly all institutions have their own set of traditions, including families, government, educational systems and many others. It is well known that these traditions provide a sense of identity and cohesiveness; they serve as a vehicle for continuity from one generation to another.

The traditions spoken of (2 Thes. 2:15) and taught (Acts 16:21) by Paul were practices that supported the doctrine of Christ, that gave direction to God's people where the Scripture was silent, that helped separate God's people from the world and helped promote unity among the brethren.

The traditions of the Apostolic Christian Church have proven over time to be spiritually beneficial to those who willingly embrace them. They have provided an element of protection from the world and have supported the precious doctrine of Christ.

in which the people's hearts failed them for fear that their food supply might become exhausted or that their ship might sink before another one could come to their rescue.

Finally, after three days, on April 3, 1874; a British steamship named Greece came to their rescue. When this vessel was first built in 1863 by Palmer's Shipbuilding and Iron Company, Newcastle, England; it was named Virginia. In 1872 this ship was lengthened to 391 feet was renamed Greece at that time. It contained compound steam engines, three masts, one funnel, and an iron hull, and it traveled regularly between Liverpool, England and New York City

At first, this ship tried to tow the Europe, but this plan was quickly abandoned when the two ships collided, causing the Europe to puncture and thus damage the Greece. So they began unloading the passengers, women and children first, by means of ropes thrown over the side of the sinking ship. The people either slid down these ropes into small lifeboats, or else they "were lowered into the lifeboats by putting ropes around their bodies below their arms. While doing so, the rope made blisters on the hands of at least one passenger and, perhaps, on many others also. Then from these lifeboats, the people were transferred to the Greece.

While the women and children were being unloaded from the sinking ship, John Grimm must have searched through some of the passengers' quarters to make certain that no one was left behind. In one of these rooms, he found Mrs. Maria Kupferschmid and her four small children: Rose, Lizzie, Katie and Chris. In all of the confusion, her husband must have become separated from his wife and family, and so Mrs. Kupferschmid apparently was not aware that the other women and children were in the process of being unloaded from the ship at that very moment. So John urged her to come quickly and then helped her and the children to get off the sinking vessel.

Fortunately, there was no loss of life. All the passengers on board the Europe were rescued.

No one was allowed to take his baggage onto the Greece because there was hardly enough room for the people, much less for their belongings. All they were allowed to take was the clothing that they were wearing. Thus, like everyone else, poor John lost everything he owned except the clothes he wore, and Elizabeth Gehring had to leave all the clothes that she had brought for herself and her brother, Jacob, on the sinking ship. When they were safely on the Greece, Fred Schupbach discovered that he had lost his hat sometime during all the confusion, and so John gave his own hat to Mr. Schupbach.

The passengers "saw the Europe for several days after boarding the British ship," and they watched it fade slowly out of their sight, with all their possessions.

At present, it is not known what

ever became of the Europe. Ironically, some of the crew remained aboard this damaged vessel even after the Greece left it. "Whether another ship came to their rescue and confiscated the cargo" is unknown. By naval law, the entire ship and its contents would belong to the crew or to anyone else who could manage to salvage it.

Miss Klotzle wrote the following about her mother's family:

"It was several days before the Hafely family all got together on the British ship. At first, Grandmother Hafely didn't know whether Grandfather had been rescue or not; but after several days, they had all found each other and their families, and you can imagine what a reunion that was."

The living conditions on the Greece were very poor indeed, because the ship was terribly overcrowded and food was very scarce. The passengers were given "a lot of rolled oats for their meals," and

However, Grandpa Grimm must have been an enterprising young man because he made himself a plate out of a piece of wood. The people could never change into clean clothes because the only clothes they had were the ones that they were wearing. Moreover, the passengers had to sleep on the bare floors because of the lack of beds, and they had to sleep close together so that they would not roll across the floor as the ship rocked back and forth. Nevertheless, the people bore these hardships patiently because they were all so thankful to still be alive and to have been res-

cued. One would have to experience the kind of tragedy that these people underwent to be able to fully appreciate the relief and happiness that they felt even amongst the privations they endured on board the Greece.

The last living survivor of this shipwreck was Mrs. Lydia (Hafely) Klotzle who died in Girard, OH, January 25, 1965, at the age of 91 years. She was born March 17, 1873, and so was only one year old at the time of the shipwreck.

In 1875 the Greece was transferred to London - New York service, and there it remained until 1896 when it was sold to ship-breakers and was scrapped.

After several more days, the Greece finally reached New York City. From there, John Grimm and Fred Schupbach traveled by train to Pittsburgh, PA, along with the Emch and Hafely families and others. Then this group of Swiss people traveled down the Ohio River by boat to Sardis, OH.

ment, your circumstances, and how the individual feels about what is right or wrong for him or her. We should all be happy to take a stand for what is right and wrong on the basis of the Ten Commandments and the New Testament. Our feelings, etc., are not the criteria to go by.

However, strong character is not synonymous with Godliness. In fact, people with a strong character must be especially careful not to lose their flexibility and ability to blend with others. In Philippians 2:3, we read, ". . . in lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than themselves." What this means in the long run is that we can only be adamant about what is clearly written in the Bible in so many words. What we are used to and what we feel is right are not the criteria upon which spiritual decisions should be made. Many spiritual attributes are not visible but have to do with an attitude of the heart. Flexibility is one of them.

We are taught in Ephesians 5:21, "Submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God" This is not always easy for a person with a strong character to do. Yet we must all learn to be flexible on things not clearly stated in the Bible. We can be ever so dedicated to God and to the Lord Jesus Christ but if we don't blend with the other brothers and sisters, it won't work.

Aren't the traits of flexibility and blending needed in all of our human relations? Would you like to be married to an inflexible spouse? Would you like to have an inflexible boss, fellow worker, teacher, or child? Isaiah 1:18 reads, "Come now, and let us reason together, saith the Lord." Not a bad idea. EUROPEAN UPDATE Andy Hunyady

Greetings Beloved,

Nearly ten years ago, my sister. Margit, visited our families in Ohio. It was her first visit in her native America since she was a little girl. Her home and family is in Transylvania, Romania. Her impression of America was like a dream, totally different of that she had experienced in Romania. I will always remember her coming with us to one of our super markets for grocery shopping. It was the first time she ever visited one. She kept walking along the meat counter, that stretched from one end of the building to the other; looking and admiring the beautiful, colorful labels on the food cans and packages, etc. Then puzzled, she stopped, kept looking at the wrappers on the cans with pictures of beautiful, household animals. Finally she asked, somewhat hesitatingly, not knowing what was on the labels: "Do people in America eat dog meat and cat meat?" We explained that this is food for household pets. Nearly crying, with tears in her eves she said: "Your small animals are fed better than children in our country!" This experience made us think. What can be done to help these people?

Knowing that Romania at that time was under strict communist control, and their postal service very corrupt, for often packages coming from abroad were opened and articles removed and delivered only what was left in them. But acting in faith, soon an attempt was made to try and see if it works. Six packages of food were ordered through an agency in Zurich, Switzerland. Each family was notified to be on the look-out for such a parcel, and be sure to check the contents against the enclosed invoice. Surprisingly the response came soon and all the packages arrived in good order. This was the beginning of a project that was expected to last for a short time, till things get better, say, within a year or two.

Unfortunately, now, ten years later, and two and a half years after the collapse of the Ploretarian System, conditions have become worse. No sign of any improvement in sight. Shortages of food, medications, clothing and shoes are all over the country. High prices, unemployment and disease cause much suffering for the people.

It is only through the mercy and grace of God that we, in America, can reach out and provide some relief for so many families in this and other former communist countries. Our church continues to send monthly shipments of food and clothing to Romania. Now the problem is the distribution of these packages due to fuel shortages. Because of this, deliveries are made every other month by the brethren responsible for the distribution. It came to our attention that diesel fuel may be obtained from Holland and delivered in 50-55 gallon drums. Brothers can pick it up at the nearest unloading point, used by the Christian aid ministries. This possibility is yet to be decided upon.

The Ukrainian brethren are receiving considerable supplies from Germany and Hungary. Another group of 3-4 cars are about to go from Hungary at end of May to deliver food and medical supplies as well as plumbing and electrical

The end result of the bloody fighting and devastation in Yugoslavia will not be known for a long time. According to daily media reports, millions of families have left their homes. Thousands of refugees, and among them are many of our brethren have found refuge in Hungary, Austria and Germany. There are about 15-20 congregations in the war torn Croatia and other parts of the country. Many of our brethren are still not heard from. Homes in cities as well as in villages have been demolished, farms left uncultivated, animals killed or died of starvation or neglect. The very dry, cold winter destroyed the wheat crop and most of it had to be plowed under. People in the cities are without food, stores are empty. Convoys be relief agencies of the European community were hijacked by the Serbian Army at gun point. Relief agencies from the free countries are waiting for the fighting to cease before any help can be taken into the country. We keep in as close contact as possible in order to send help, but it is too risky at this time. 3 or 4 shipments of food and some clothing were shipped from Toronto, Canada, on Yugoslav Airline, in the past few weeks, but the cost of the transportation is extremely high. The one possibility is to purchase food items in neighboring Hungary and send it in under the Banner of International or Yugoslav Red Cross. This too, is yet to be investigated. The Toronto shipments were intercepted by the Yugoslavian brethren at the Belgrade Airport who were informed in advance. They were successful in delivering the packages to the needy families. Our World Rrlief helped to finance part of this shipment. Refugees in Hungary, Germany, and Austria are well taken care of by the brethren in the respective countries. Much financial help will be needed once the refugees will be able to return to their homes they left behind, not knowing what they might find. Please, remember these suffering

brethren and their families in your prayers!

As behind every dark cloud there is a silver lining, so it is in most parts of the former communist countries. Suffering and persecution brings on a spiritual hunger and thirst. There appears to be a revival in most of these countries, especially in the Ukraine and Romania. More and more young people and those of middle and old age are seeking their souls salvation. Now that the freedom of worship and the opening of the churches are legally permitted, attendance has increased. The number of new converts also has increased. Many new churches are being built, old ones are being restored and made fit for worship after many years of neglect. The churches in the United States through the mission fund has provided great sums and is still sending funds regularly to carry on the building program in each of these countries in the Ukraine 13, in Romania 38 congregation are getting either new buildings or restoring the old ones with up-to-date improvements. Two churches are under construction in Hungary, one in Szeged and the other one in Ersekcsanad. Breidenbach, Germany, is about to build a new larger building to replace the several times enlarged, yet still too small church.

Funds were sent to Czechoslovakia to refurbish three old buildings for church use and to purchase a mini-bus for use by the elder and ministering brothers to visit and serve those living in isolated areas, where public transportation is not available.

All these projects are moving ahead with the generous support of you, the dearly beloved brethren and friends. May God bless and reward you richly for your unselfish love, your prayers and generosity!

Marching To Zion

A History of the Apostolic Christian Church of America 1847-1982

ALTADENA, CALIFORNIA

ALTADENA, CALIFORNIA 2243 North El Molino Street

The first new church established within the denomination in the 1950's was at Altadena, California. Located on the northern edge of the Los Angeles metropolitan area between the city of Pasadena and the southern portions of the San Gabriel mountains, Altadena was typical of many western spots in California which drew families from the "East."

Persons of Apostolic Christian background, too, were lured to the area by the favorable climate, beautiful terrain, and general economic opportunity, Initially, brethren at Altadena were a part of the church at Maywood, California, a small suburb of Los Angeles, located seventeen miles directly south (or twenty-five miles by freeway).

Because several members and friends lived in the Altadena-Pasadena area since 1944, consideration was given, beginning in the late 1940's, to establish a congregation in that area to better accommodate those believers living there. These wishes came to fruition in 1951 when services were begun in



Pasadena with Joe Klotzle as minister. Worship services were held at rented quarters in the Knights of Pythias Hall and at the Pasadena Women's Club.

Among the first families comprising the church at Altadena were those of Simon Bahler, Joe Klotzle, Carl Kinsinger, Bill Schwartz, Joe Traub, and Clarence Graf.

After approximately one year, the congregation purchased a large residence at 2243 North El Moline in Altadena. It was remodeled to make it serviceable as a church. First worship services were held at the new building the Sunday prior to Thanksgiving, 1952, although the church was not completed until the following summer.

A Silver Lining article described the church: "Our church is a remodeled home, with an assembly room, three Sunday school rooms, a kitchen and dining room, nursery, and entrance on the first floor. Upstairs we have four bedrooms, a complete kitchen and dining roomliving room combination."

Through the years many visitors from the other churches have stayed at the rooms upstairs and have enjoyed the hospitality of caretaker Elizabeth Feldman who has lived in an apartment over the church.

On February 12, 1952, Carl Kinsinger, formerly of Pulaski, Iowa, was chosen to assist Joe Klotzle in the ministry. In 1954 Kinsinger assumed the duties of deacon and on February 20, 1955, was ordained as elder following a church vote in September, 1955. Interestingly, all his church offices—minister, deacon and elder—were placed on him in the month of February.

The Altadena church was never formally dedicated.

By 1980 the Altadena congregation consisted of thirty-six members.

(The Altadena congregation is presently in a new church building project.)

(Continued from Page 40) when men will say to the mountains and the rocks, "Fall on us, and hide us from the face of him that sitteth on the throne, and from the wrath of the Lamb: For the great day of his wrath is come; and who shall be able to stand?" Revelation 6:16-17. The only way you and I will be able to stand is if you and I have the blood of the Lord Jesus on our hearts.

Let us go back to that story of the children of Egypt. When God called them out that night, they prepared each household to be ready for the death angel to come. Unless each one acted and believed and obeyed, they were taken. The death angel would not pass over.

So it will be on that day that is coming. Unless we have the Lord Jesus' blood on your heart and on my heart, we, too, will be consumed because of His wrath upon us, His creation.

John had the vision on the island. Each one of us has had dreams, each one of us has had a vision . . . maybe at night, maybe about how the Lord will take us. We cannot comprehend death even though it has been so close to some of us as loved ones – fathers, mothers, from our own families – have

been taken.

We do not understand death, but it is real. It is hard to speak about death, but we do not have to be afraid of dying if we have the Lord Jesus within us, if we are obeying the truth of His Word, if we are measuring up ourselves with His Word, and if we judge ourselves every day to see how we fit in.

If we have that still small voice whispering sweet peace in our life and mind, we have opportunity then that you and I can be comforted no matter what happens in life, and we can be forever with the Lord.

I think we read this morning, "Fear not the kings and the rulers of the land that are able to persecute you or punish you and put you in jail or burn the body. Do not fear that one as much as the great God that is able to kill the body and then cast the soul into hell fire forever and ever. I tell ye, fear ye Him." (See Luke 12:4-5).

May we all take warnings . . . the wonderful warnings that come from God. May we realize we are just passing through as pilgrims and strangers. What you and I have, we have not gained. Naked we came from our mother's womb and naked we shall go to the ground and return to dust. As we have come from dust, so shall we return.

When we hear it is his possessions or their possessions that they have gained, loved ones, it is what the Lord has blessed. There are many responsibilities that come along with those blessings.

We should be a peculiar people when we realize all these little things that God has been good to us in our lives. The talents that have been given to you and to me, are we doing what we should? Or are we like that one servant that took that talent and buried it because he feared God? Was that all bad? No, but the Lord saw he was lazy, slothful, and not diligent in doing what he really had ability to

We can look around and say, "Well, the brother has failed, but it is the minister's duty to go and see the individual." I encourage each brother and sister as I believe we

have been encouraged by our elder brothers and by ministers, too, to at least one time in your life go visit one that you love and that you are concerned about. One time in your life, go and see such an individual and see how it will turn out. We know that God is all-powerful and all-knowing. If you and I have a fervent love for the brethren, it would be an easy task to do.

"And I saw when the Lamb opened one of the seals, and I heard, as it were the noise of thunder, one of the four beasts saying, Come and see. And I saw, and behold a white horse: and he that sat on him had a bow; and a crown was given unto him: and he went forth conquering, and to conquer."

Revelation 6:1-2

We believe that the Lord Jesus, someday, is going to have a reward for everyone. It will be either one of two things. Brothers and sister and friends, it is one of two:

"Enter into a mansion that is prepared for you, and blessed are your works and your deeds." Or it will be, "Depart from Me, ye worker of iniquity. I know ye not."

The latter, as we read in the New Testament, said, "Lord, Lord, we did this and we did that." We have to believe that that was the account of a Pharisee, a scribe or one that puffed themselves up in the street corner and one that liked long prayers and one that liked to be seen of men of the good that they had done.

I believe that in the spirit of meekness and humility as God motivates your heart and mine, that in the secret hour and secret moment of the day, if you have a prayer of a concern for a brother of sister and have it laid upon your heart to go visit that one or give a cup of cold water, unbeknown to anyone else, God will surely bless that deed.

I am confident that the goodness of God will look down upon us and see those things that you do unbeknown to anyone else. In the Scriptures, it talks about not letting the left hand know what the

right hand giveth. (See Matthew 6:3).

Isn't it a blessing when you and I have the opportunity to give and to share? When we really feel motivated of God to do it and not because of others seeing or knowing, don't we really (all of us) entertain precious moments in our lives when He gives us the ability and desire to serve Him with all our heart, mind, and soul? That reward is coming for each one.

"... and he went forth conquering, and to conquer. And when he had opened the second seal, I heard the second beast say, Come and see. And there went out another horse that was red: and power was given to him that sat thereon to take peace from the earth, and that they should kill one another: and there was given unto him a great sword."

Revelation 6:2-4

We live in a time and a land of peace and safety. As it has been spelled out, such a tremendous effort has been given to those that rule over us for peace in the land. Yet you and I know how shallow that peace really is. In the hearts of men today, when there are men after men and country after country, there is no peace. Yet the world is somewhat satisfied and content with what is going on because of the global situation.

May we be wise in our salvation, loved ones. May we not be deceived, for God is not mocked. You and I know through how we have been raised, through our Sunday schools, through the preaching of this precious Word over this pulpit, that you and I who have been given much, will be required

of much.

Money and responsibilities are ours. We believe that in the world we live in, there are others that might not be living up to what we think they ought to be living up to. I believe there is a Righteous Judge that will judge us according to what is required of you and me.

When the Lord Jesus gave those three servants talents, the one gained ten talents, another gained five talents, and one hid it in the ground. There was no difference between the one that gained five and the that gained ten. The Lord was pleased with those two.

But with the one that did not gain any, the one that was lax, He was displeased. He said, "Give it away to the one that has ten." (See Matthew 25:14-28). We believe there will be a Righteous Judge and a righteous judgment someday.

We do not know the little details between one man's life and another man's life, and how we judge by the fruits, but let us be careful for the Lord will be a Righteous Judge. May we not be concerned about the things that will take place on that great and notable day.

"And when he had opened the third seal, I heard the third beast say, Come and see. And I beheld, and lo a black horse; and he that sat on him had a pair of balances in his hand. And I heard a voice in the midst of the four beasts say, a measure of wheat for a penny, and three measures of barley for a penny; and see thou hurt not the oil and the win."

Revelation 6:5-6

I do not understand his vision, but what I get out of this verse is that a balance is coming for you and me. When we are weighed in the balances before God, I believe we all are going to be short. We all come up short of the glory of God. No, not one has been good. The Scriptures tell us that.

But when the Lord Jesus puts His grace – a certain amount of grace – to each one, and the Lord Jesus knows that particular amount that you and I need, we will be weighed in the balance. It is only by that grace and the Lord's goodness toward us that we may inherit life eternal and be weighed in the balance and not be found wanting.

"And when he had opened the fourth seal, I heard the voice of the fourth beast say, Come and see. And I looked, and behold a pale horse: and his name that sat on him was Death, and Hell followed

with him. And Power was given unto them over the fourth part of the earth, to kill with sword, and with hunger, and with death, and with the beasts of the earth."

Revelation 6:7-8

There is coming a day when men will be no more. His creation will be terminated. We have to believe. I remember a question in Sunday school one time was, "How will God treat the animals and the beasts of the field?" When we were little, we had the question of, "What about the soul?" This poor dog and pet that we had, and how we were concerned.

When you and I were born and given that breath of life, God breathed in us a living soul. We cannot put our finger on it, but loved ones, when we as parents were able to see birth, we could see that poor little soul take upon itself that first breath, and God gave that breath, did He not? Was it not a miracle to come to life?

There is coming a day when death and hell are going to prevail. "And Power was given unto them over the fourth part of the earth, to kill with sword, and with hunger, and with death . . ." Revelation 6:8. I hope, brothers and sisters, that we are not around. We do not know what John is getting at here, but there is going to come a time when there is going to be torture and weeping and gnashing of teeth forever and where the worm dieth not.

Such a torment and anguish that the hearts of men will have to endure if they do not make the proper preparations in their lives today, while we have life and breath. You and I, it is your choice and mine whom we will serve, not just today, but in that long and endless eternity.

Will we be the one that will hear the saying from God, "Depart from me ye worker of iniquity...I know ye not?" Or, "Enter in, thou good and faithful servant, into the joys of the Lord?"

May all of us take warning. You and I do not have to look at the brother or the sister on the right or left, or the minister behind, but may the Word speak clearly into each one of our hearts.

Prepare For God's Judgment Revelation 6

In the world that we live in today, we do not want to judge anybody or our faith. It says first the judgment should begin right here in the house of God. (See I Peter 4:17).
