Light From The Word

on God's Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

As believers we all experience times of severe trial and tribulation. We try to cope with these struggles, but sometimes we fail. We are taught in the Word that our faith which is more precious than gold, must be "tried with fire" (1 Pet. 1:7). We have been given a perfect example in our suffering Saviour to help us understand the purpose of trials and to reap their full benefit.

On the surface, it appears as if some believers have few afflictions and others carry a disproportionately heavy load. No believer is spared, and many times one's trials are not evident to others. When we "take up the cross" of the Lord Jesus Christ we make a life-long commitment to deny ourselves and share in His sufferings. These sufferings may include loss of loved ones, health or possessions; failure and disappointment; harm or hurt inflicted by others; as well as many other difficulties.

Sometimes we are able to bear our burdens well by trusting in the Lord and promptly casting our care upon Him (1 Pet. 5:7). In other instances we may experience trials which press so heavily upon us that we are overwhelmed. Our entire outlook on life can be altered, causing difficulty in carrying out our daily responsibilities. We struggle to overcome, but sometimes it is like crawling up a steep and slippery slope; we gain a little ground and then fall back again. When loved ones offer their comfort and prayers this is of great help. Yet Satan tries to make us feel hopelessly bound or trapped by our trials. We must remember that no individual, event or evil spirit can keep us bound any more than the jailers could restrain Paul and Silas. Even though they beat them and fastened them in stocks, Paul and Silas prayed, sang praises to God and saw His miraculous intervention as an earthquake loosed their bands (Acts 16:22-26)

But what about when after much prayer and pleading the trial does not

pass? We know from God's Word that nothing is impossible with Him (Luke 1:37). We must claim this scriptural truth, but we must also believe that the most important goal is that His will is done. It is essential that we hold to a thread of hope, even in our darkest hours. Job was able to cry out in his wretched condition, "When he hath tried me, I shall come forth as gold" (Job 23:10). Isaiah was moved by the Spirit to record this beautiful promise of God's faithfulness: "Fear thou not, for I am with thee: be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen thee: yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness" (Is. 41:10).

There may be periods when it seems as though we just cannot find help. Perhaps these are the very times when we should give help. The turning point from our despair may come when, with thankful hearts, we reach out with determined effort to lend our feeble hand to lift another's burden. The intensity of our trial will become less if our focus is on others, not ourselves.

Another great source of courage is the assurance that God in His own good time will bring forth the fruit of suffering. Learning to wait patiently on the Lord is one of the great benefits of trials. "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint" (Is. 40:31).

There is divine purpose in every trial of our faith. Jesus said that every fruitful branch would be purged (pruned) so that it might bring forth more fruit (John 15:2). The Lord Jesus suffered incredible agony in Gethsemane as He struggled with the bitter cup of sin and shame which was held before Him. "Though he were a Son, yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered; and being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salva-

tion unto all them that obey him (Heb. 5:8-9). The Lord's suffering brought Him to the point of total surrender, where He was ready to submit to any outcome. He was able to endure the shame and torture of the Cross because of His faith in the "iov that was set before Him" (Heb. 12:2). The Apostle Paul wrote that we as believers can claim the same glorious hope. We are "joint-heirs with Christ; if so be that we suffer with him, that we may be also glorified together" (Rom. 8:17).

When we fully surrender to God we are in a position to be released from the grip of despair. Joy can be restored whether or not the trial itself has passed. This brings into focus the beautiful truth that "all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose" (Rom. 8:28), even though it may be beyond our comprehension at this point to grasp the full meaning of what has happened.

If we reap the intended benefit from a fiery trial we will find ourselves less dependent upon the things of this life for our joy and peace. Perhaps we will have made vows to the Lord in our dark hours. Like the Psalmist we will declare, "I will go into thy house with burnt offerings: I will pay thee my vows, which my lips have uttered, and my mouth hath spoken, when I was in trouble" (Ps. 66:13-14)

Additionally, we will be far better equipped to help others who are suffering by reaching out with true Christ-like compassion. We will be more appreciative of our Saviour's sufferings and His resultant ability and desire to help us (Heb. 2:18). Above all we will share in the special blessing which is reserved for those who endure the fire and come forth as the gold: "for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord has promised to them that love him" (Jam. 1:12).

assembled by the Canadian churches with the support of our Detroit church, is still being held in Windsor as no air lines would take it due to the sanctions imposed by the Canadian and the United States governments against "Serbia and Montenegro," formerly Yugoslavia. We were successful in obtaining a "license" from the U.S. Treasury Department, Foreign Assets Control Office, to allow us to send the shipment to Budapest. But the International Red Cross in Washington would not cooperate. They asked that we turn the goods over to them and they would dispose of it as they see the most urgent need for it. Our next step was to contact the Salvation Army in Washington. They have a branch in Budapest, but must work through Switzerland and currently we are waiting for clearance from them.

There is no significant change in the Romanian situation, except for the tightening the border crossings. When attempting to deliver some building supplies and fixtures for the new buildings in Romania, the Hungarian brothers were denied entry and were turned back on two separate occasions and

They tried to explain that these items were gifts, paid for with monies contributed by the churches in America, but of no avail. Now, I was informed that Elder Bro. Alex Virtaci (Arad, Romania) plans to visit Bucharest and file a complaint and request permission to allow these goods to be delivered. Otherwise, the work on the church buildings is progressing as can be expected.

A generous supply of food and clothing was delivered unto the brethren in the Ukraine. Bros. Ernst Pfister (deacon at. Breidenbach, Germany) and Janos Namenyi (minister at Budapest, Hungary) were working together to assemble a large shipment of requested food and other needed items. Both brothers sent reports of their trip. Bro. Namenyi wrote, among other things, that their trip was successful, without any problems at border crossings. The elder brothers asked them to relay their thanks and heartfelt greetings to the American brethren, with best wishes that God would bless and reward each giver for their generosity. He reports that Bro. Octavian Kozak, the veterinarian, finds the medications very helpful in caring for the livestock, horses, sheep, goats, swine, rabbits and poultry. He expressed his hope that additional supplies will continue in the future. Because of large numbers of mice and rats, they ask for some poison to help control their population.

Bro. Ernst sent a more detailed report of their trip.

URGENT NEED! Apostolic Christian Preschool Athens, AL

We have started our new school year and currently have about 35 students (2-5 year olds) registered. It has been approved by our school board to hire a new teacher. We need a sister who has a degree in education or child development, and a desire to serve the Lord in Alabama. We will provide salary, health insurance and housing. Bro. Gene Lehman (Wolcott, IN) was kind enough to translate it from German. One large semi, one medium-size truck and a VW minibus were used to deliver the goods. They started out on Monday, July 27, by way of Lintz, Austria, where others joined with a Mercedes truck carrying 2.5-3 tons of supplies. Traveling separately they met at the Hungarian-Ukrainian border. From there they traveled together. Several brothers were waiting their arrival at the edge of Chernovic. On Thursday they had the 28 tons of supplies unloaded. On Friday, the brothers visited the churches under construction. "We went to a store to see what goods were offered for sale. There were indeed many things available, but certainly at no affordable prices. For example, a pair of good shoes cost about 4,300 kopon, the Ukrainian currency, while the monthly income varies between 1,000 and 2.000 kopon . . .

On Saturday afternoon we had a conference with the beloved elder brothers concerning the shipment of aid for them. We made it clear that the groceries for the greater part were a gift of the American brethren and friends, and we merely the transporters of the gifts."

"We also delivered to the elders the \$40,000 which came from the U.S.A. for new buildings which is about 64,221.41DM. We requested an acknowledgement and thanks to the proper brothers in America ... We begged the brothers to feel free in the future to share with us when there is a need, and what goods are needed at that time. Their opinion is that it would not be good to help too often, for the people would eventually become accustomed to it ...

On Sunday early we took part in a funeral for a sister 92 years old. The services were held in the apartment house of the deceased and lasted 3 hours. From there we went on foot 3KM (1.8 miles) to the cemetery. The entire affair took 5 hours, and during this time the assembly of about 300-350 who were also very old, followed the proceedings with great patience and attention. In the evening we were in Ostrica in the assembly, where we spent a few blessed hours together

On Monday, early we began our homeward journey through Romania, where we hoped to visit a few lonely brethren. For lack of time, we turned back at the second stop. The balance of food, designated for Romania, we unloaded in Mescshiide. On Tuesday noon we traveled on to Budapest where we stayed overnight. In the morning we continued our trip, through Lintz, and arrived home again in Breidenbach in good health about 8:30 p.m.

We return thanks to God, our Lord for His protection throughout our travels, and for the abundantly rich blessings which we received, along with our brethren while we were together."

EASTERN EUROPE TRAVEL INFORMATION GUIDE

Many of our Eastern European brethren have struggles, are materially poor or are in need of encouragement. Hence, we are awed by the loving spirit, kindly attitude and willing hearts of those who travel and/or intend to travel to Eastern Europe to visit, fellowship and share in humanitarian ways with brethren and friends of like mind and faith.

As with all aspects of life and living, there are areas of caution, along with the fruits of our labors. It behooves all of us to act and conduct ourselves in a manner that glorifies God, provides peace with mankind and enhances the image of our brotherhood.

The following comments are not meant to dictate one's travel plans, but only to be helpful to travelers who may not be familiar with conditions in Eastern Europe. Perhaps unknown to many are difficulties in cultural practices, national customs and human traits; along with the general volatile and unsettled conditions prevailing in Eastern Europe. Unfortunately well-meaning U.S. brethren have innocently brought problems to our loved ones in Europe which has resulted in confiscation of funds, imprisonment of brethren, as well as strong disapproval and restraint to the activities of the local church.

Observations from individuals, both civilian and governmental, indicate some restraint should be exercised in certain practices while in Eastern Europe, in particular when visiting brethren and friends.

Travelers should note the three following objectives:

1) What is to be accomplished spreading of love and good will.

2) What is to be preserved peace, hope, understanding and harmony.

3) What is to be prevented - discord, jealousy, offense or confusion.

The Apostolic Christian Church subsequently offers the following recommendations:

I. Preparation

A. Kindly notify the local elder or church leadership for direction in contacting members of the Mission or World Relief Committees. With European unrest, boundary changes and need for updated information, kindly inform or inquire of the Committee brothers for direction.

B. Exercise caution in solicitations for contributions from individuals or churches on a private basis, as this diminishes the National Apostolic Christian scope of purpose. It is not the intent to restrict giving; we need to work together as a National Church, rather than a splintered group of believers. All major contributions should be handled through the National Apostolic Christian Mission or World Relief Committees, as banking and monetary channels are already in place with European banks for transferring of funds. In all European countries church leaders have pleaded to please observe proper established channels.

C. Travelers will be representing the Apostolic Christian Church of America in one way or another. Discretion needs to be exercised, lest our record within a given country or church community be tarnished. Appearance, conduct and business practices must be done decently and in order.

II. Function

A. Visitors should contact the

local deacon or elder in the country visited and seek out recommendations for visits and/or giving and distribution process.

B. Monetary gratuities for the hosts who feed, house or transport visitors is appropriate but must be discreetly administered. However, in some cases money just cannot purchase or replace hard to acquire articles as toiletries, rationed fuel and foods that are in short supply.

III. Accountability

A. As children of God, we represent Him and the American Apostolic Christian Church while abroad. When returning to the States, it is appropriate to offer a written report or verbal expression of experiences, either to local church leadership or to the National Mission or World Relief Committee. The experience would include recent developments, updated notice of needs, opportunities or conditions.

B. Having felt the atmosphere in Eastern Europe among brethren, perhaps the returning visitors (brethren or friends) can further assist in promoting distribution of goods from American brethren through our distribution centers; and encourage monetary giving through special collections and contributions to the National Apostolic

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN HOME FOR THE HANDICAPPED

ITS MISSION, PHILOSOPHY, GOALS AND ORGANIZATION

"As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith."

Galatians: 6:10

Nowhere is the mission of the Home better stated than in this passage of Scripture. The Home's bylaws state that: "It is organized to provide facilities for disabled and to equip, contact and maintain on the broadest humanitarian principles, as espoused by the Apostolic Christian Church, those facilities for handicapped, to obtain, receive and disburse funds, personal and real property, by gifts, grants, etc., to the end also that fellow human beings may be helped." The Home helps not only the handicapped individuals for whom it provides a permanent residence with all the necessary personal care, but also the families of these individuals who are relieved of providing care that is, at best, difficult and gives them a peace of mind knowing their loved one is receiving good care.

The primary goal of the staff is to provide the best possible level of physical care for the Home's residents. Another primary objective is to maintain an atmosphere of Christian virtues that encompass the Scripture's fruit of the Spirit. This, along with various religiousoriented functions, fulfills the objective of meeting the spiritual needs of residents. Scheduling physical and educational activities that raise the ability of the residents to function at their highest possible level is a continuous goal of the Home's staff. Individual attention by staff members to the needs of residents is a high priority at the Home. Another major objective is to comply with all the laws and regulations of the State of Illinois and the federal government concerning licensed facilities for the developmentally disabled. The care, comfort and training of residents comes first; but beyond that, the Home has the objective of providing a desirable place of employment for its many employees. These are some of the major goals and objectives of the Home from which arise many more specific goals.

The ultimate authority over the Home resides with the elder body of the church. Three or more guiding elder brothers are designated to represent the elder body in matters concerning the Home. Authority is delegated by the elder body to a board of directors for overseeing administration and operation of the Home. The board consists of nine brothers with four officer positions and a number of standing committees. The administrator of the Home reports to the board and directs a staff that is divided into nine departments. The assistant administrator presently serves in a dual capacity as social services department manager, and each of the other nine departments is directed by a manager. The Home is currently most ably managed by the administrator and staff.

Each church has a designated representative for the Home. Communication of information about the Home is accomplished through these representatives.

The fun activities planned here at the Home bring much enjoyment to our residents. It makes an ordinary day exceptional, and don't we all like that now and then? (Continued from Page 36) eases or in terms of feeding the people. In fact, He told them one time, "Ye seek me because of the miracle of the fish and the bread and so ye come so ye can be filled with the physical food and the miracles that I do."

He saw in their hearts that they were not seeking Him and thronging Him, in some cases, because of recognizing Him as the King of kings and Lord of lords. It is not a whole lot different today, is it?

Jesus Christ is not so thronged. If He walked on the earth today, I wonder if He would draw great crowds. I wonder if He would draw more mockers and scorners and those who would look to find fault with what He practiced and what He taught. People do not seem to be hungry, do not seem to be searching, do not seem to be anxious to meet someone like Jesus Christ.

He can look through the shroud of mystery that we sometimes put in our lives, or the covering of our smiles. He can see deeply into our hearts and He knows exactly what is in every crevice of our mind. What is tucked away in every recess of our mind, He knows and He sees.

I do not know about you, but sometimes that is a little uncomfortable when I know that there is some thought or I know that there is some feeling that He would not approve of . . . some feeling, some grudge, or whatever it may be. He knows it is there and His Word says it should not be there.

These people came to Him and thronged Him and came about Him, and yet this Man had such a compassion for the people, even though perhaps He did not see what He would have liked to have seen in their hearts. I am sure there were some there that genuinely believed and genuinely trusted, but probably not all.

When it came right down to the point where He told them who He was and what was going to happen, they realized that Jesus Christ was not going to march into Jerusalem and throw the Romans out and set up an earthly kingdom. But, rather, He was going to a cross to hang and die. All those who ate of His flesh, as He told it, or drank of His blood could be part of His kingdom. It says, "Then many turned and walked with Him no more." (See John 6;66)

They wanted the physical healing and they did not want the spiritual. Even in this case in the group that came to Him, It says, "And they that were vexed with unclean spirits: and they were healed." Luke 6:18

Jesus Christ in His compassion for mankind looked at those at that point and time who carried various infirmities and various problems and He was able to reach out and touch them and heal them. It says, "And the whole multitude sought to touch Him: for there went virtue out of Him, and healed them all." Luke 6:19

There were great miracles of healing that He performed on the face of the earth. We can look at that and say,"Why doesn't it take place today?" Let us back up a couple paces and let us take a look at how things were back then.

Has God forgotten us or changed? I do not believe so. Back then, with many of these infirmities and diseases, there was no cure. There was nothing that could be done. The lepers had no hope whatsoever for any kind of a medical treatment or any kind of a cure from the doctors. The technology was not like it has become today. God has allowed us to learn. God has allowed man to accomplish some fantastic things and changes. Do we take the credit for it and say that God does not have a hand in it?

Why for all the years and times that Christ walked on the face of the earth until this century were men not able to accomplish some of these things? Because they were not smart enough?

It still defies men to understand how they really built the pyramids of Egypt hundreds of years ago. Man has been smart enough. Man has been intelligent enough all along. It is simply one generation has built on another's research as God has allowed it to happen, I believe.

He has opened the minds of men and the understanding of men and allowed them to begin to learn some of these things. Let us not forget to give God the credit. Today, when sometimes we are sick, we do not have to go to the Saviour for a miracle healing. We can, through the technology that is available to us, receive some healing.

We need to give God all the credit. He allowed it to happen. he could very well have kept the blinders on men and kept all these things from happening.

The whole multitude sought to touch Him. I think that there is another lesson in this. I think that sometimes we dwell too much on the physical. I have a tendency to do that. I think we all have a tendency to do that. We dwell on the physical.

Jesus Christ came to bring a new message of healing to the people. The healing that occurred under the Old Testament was not a healing as much as it was a sacrifice for sin. It was a reminder over and over of giving a sacrifice as a recognition of their sin.

The Word tells us that the blood of bulls and goats could never make the hearts of man pure and clean. I think sometimes the physical healings that were done by Jesus Christ were symbolic (there is a lot of symbolism in the Scripture) of the spiritual healing that He was on earth to perform. It says here, "And they that were vexed with unclean spirits: and they were healed." Luke 6:18. The ones that asked. In fact, if I do not error, as we look at the New Testament and look at the times, I do not think that there was a time that someone came to Christ with an illness of some form or another that He did not touch them and heal them.

We can look at that and become puzzled today and say, "What is wrong? I have interceded, and medically there is not anything the doctors can do. What is wrong that I could not be healed?" Let us understand that maybe this was symbolic of the spiritual healing.

Christ forgave sins in many cases, didn't He? That was His response when they came for physical healing. He said, "Your sins are forgiven." (See Mark 2:5) Let us look at these healings that took place as those spiritual healings that were really His purpose.

Then when we read that they were healed, have you ever known anyone -- anyone? -- who went to Christ and to God through the shed blood of Christ for spiritual healing that He denied? Ever? I do not!

The Word of God promises, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." I John 1:9

So if we look at it from a spiritual standpoint, it puts it in perspective and we do not struggle with that because spiritually, when we deal with the issue of sins as an illness, Jesus Christ makes us whole.

How long do we continue to limp along and struggle with that sin as a burden on our back and drag it through our lives? No. He changes.

"Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." II Corinthians 5:17

If there is anyone in this assembly this morning that is dragging a load of sin through your life, there is a promise in this Word. It's just like those who came and touched Him, as He walked on the dusty trails, as He stood on the mountain tops, as He stood by the sea side, and had their infirmities

cleansed and purified so that burden of sin could be lifted.

How can it be lifted? He goes on, "And he lifted up his eyes on his disciples, and said, Blessed be ye poor: for yours is the kingdom of God." Luke 6:20

Poor in spirit . . . those who recognize that their own ability to control and order their lives was nothing. Just as a poor person from a monetary standpoint does not have a lot of power, does not have a lot of control, is not able to do much directing and is not able to control a lot of events in their lives as it comes to the material things in life.

So the poor spiritually understand that they have no control. It all belongs to God. When we become poor that way, when we become poor, when we become bankrupt spiritually, we recognize that we are lost in sin. We cannot pray the debt. It is impossible.

How much poorer can you get than to go bankrupt? Not a lot. Spiritually, when we become bankrupt we understand that we have a tremendous debt. A debt that would require, in the sight of God, eternal death. That is the Word!

It tells us, "The wages of sin is death . . ." Romans 6:23. That is what we have earned. We become so poor that we become spiritually bankrupt. We go to God and say, "Lord, I cannot pay this debt. Will you take it? Will you forgive it? Will you dismiss it?"

Then what happens? He says, "Yours is the kingdom of God!" Luke 6:20. That is the promise! That is the invitation, and really it is the only way. It is the only way to become a part of Him, because later on He says, "But woe unto you that are rich! for ye have received your consolation." Luke 6:24

The spiritually rich are those who would think they have their life together. "I have done all these good things. I have walked according to the Word of God. I have kept the commandments of God. I have given to charity. I have done this and I have done that." He said to them, "Ye have your consolation."

"Blessed are ye that hunger now: for ye shall be filled." Luke 6:21

We do not have to go searching

someplace else. There is not the void and the emptiness that existed within us before. But we need to continue to have a hunger for the Word of God so that we can learn.

"Blessed are ye that weep now: for ye shall laugh." Luke 6:21. There is weeping in this life. Some people go through periods of time of heartache and burden. Then when it is lifted, they can rejoice again.

Some people have burdens and cares that will go on forever in this life. If you are struggling with those things and you struggle with that verse, bear in mind that someday could mean the eternal day. Maybe Satan has such an opportunity to test us and try us that we just struggle, struggle, struggle, struggle in this life.

Read the Book of Revelation. Read chapter nineteen and what is going to take place in heaven, where it says the saints will rise up from the throne of God with a roar of the people as the sound of many waters as they sang praises to God when finally He executed His judgment on Satan.

There will be a day that maybe it won't be laughter as we think of laughter in terms of "ha-ha," but there will be that lightness of heart and that rejoicing that will come.

"Blessed are ye, when men shall hate you, and when they shall separate you from their company, and shall reproach you, and cast out your name as evil, for the Son of man's sake." Luke 6:22

Make sure that we get that in there. It does not mean that we go through life being obnoxious and being not liked by people. When we are not liked for the Son of man's sake and because we refuse to be involved in those things which would not be good and those things which would not bring glory and honor to our Saviour and to the Master, then He says, "Blessed are ye."

There are a lot of other teachings in here. Some very difficult. Verse twenty-seven, "But I say unto you which hear, Love your enemies, do good to them which hate you." SILVER LINING

Frequently in the Old Testament, we can read the accounts where the people rebelled against God, but I marvel at the mercy of God. Here was a king that evidently had reached out to touch the man of God. He did not like what he had to say. He wanted to destroy him and take him and do harm to the man of God.

As he reached out, his hand became withered. In other words, God intervened and God refused to allow him to carry out a purpose that was contrary to the will of God. His hand became withered and immediately he changed his attitude and he said to the man of God, "Cry to God that my hand can be restored." God in His mercy, restored Jeroboam's hand and made it whole again. (Luke 13:6)

I just marvel at the mercy of God, don't you? He can be so kind and so patient and so gracious to mankind!

We can go, sometimes, so contrary to His will, so contrary to His purpose and yet He reaches out and draws us to Him. He can take a life that has been stained with sin and make it pure and whole again. You can look at Jeroboam's hand and you can look at our lives and say, "We were like that." At one point, we were pure and we were whole and in innocence we grew up as a young child.

We can to the point in our life

God's Lovingkindness Lasts Forever I Kings 13:1-10 & Luke 6:17-33

when we rebelled against God. We did things contrary to His will and contrary to His purposes. Our lives became withered as God would view them. They became useless to God.

But when we came to that point when we cried out, he changed us. he made us whole again. it did not make any difference how deep we were in sin. It did not make any difference what we had been involved in. Oh, the mercy of God! As human beings we judge differently.

I read an account awhile back in a book about a young man. As I looked at his life, which was terrible and horrible, I was somewhat repulsed by it. Our human tendency is to look at it and say, "Why would God care? Why won't He just say, 'Let us just forget that person." God does not work that way, not with anybody on the face of the earth.

The Word says that He would have all men come unto Him. That means every being regardless of how deeply they have gotten their lives messed up or how useless they have become to God. He can turn them around and into a vessel just like He did Jeroboam's hand.

He made it well again. he made it whole. He made it useful to Jeroboam. God can take the life of man when they simply surrender to Jesus Christ and make it useful again for His purpose.

I think we have plenty to con-

sider in those verses. There are certainly other wonderful teachings in the remainder of this chapter.

It seemed like when Christ walked on the face of this earth and He was in the prime of His ministry, so to speak, He was surrounded by multitudes of people, wasn't He? Every place He went, he was thronged by multitudes.

The only people today that we see walking the face of this earth thronged by multitudes seem to be the celebrities of the world . . . the movie stars . . . the sports heros . . . those who are identified for their great accomplishments and the things that they have done. The names in the limelights are the people today who are surrounded by a crowd every place they go.

I think to them it is perhaps a bit frustrating with no privacy, and no time alone. I wonder, when Jesus Christ was on the earth, if sometimes, although He had a great compassion, if sometimes it became a little wearisome to be so surrounded by people. I believe if He could have looked and seen in the hearts of men a true desire, a true recognition of who He was, He would have been thrilled to have been surrounded by throngs.

I think maybe He looked upon some of these people and saw those that were there for what He could do for them in terms of curing dis-
