There is a story about a conversation among farm animals. The cow said, "I give my master milk to drink:" the sheep said, "I give my master wool with which he can make clothes;" and the horse said, "I carry my master wherever he wants to go." The little dog felt worthless and discouraged, but when his master came home from the field, he jumped up and down wagging his tail, and licked his master's hand. The tired master was very pleased, took the little dog up in his arms and said, "I wouldn't trade you for all the other animals on the farm.

It is clear from this story that the love shown his master by the little dog was very important and very much appreciated. Each of us, also, desires to be loved and respected. The Lord Jesus Christ taught us, "And as ye would that men should do to you, do ye also to them likewise." (Luke 6:31)

Inasmuch as we each like to be loved and respected, we should try harder to show love and respect to others. If we like for others to take the first step to come and greet us, then we should try to take the first step to go greet them.

# **Light From The Word**

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

#### WHY CHURCH DISCIPLINE?

The Bible leaves no option but for true believers to practice a redemptive church discipline. The Word's foundation and the Spirit's direction are the keys that make kindly administered discipline a beneficial practice in the church. Although we as individual believers are not to judge one another, the church must make certain judgments when grievous sin occurs (1 Cor. 5:12-13).

Believers in the early church were commanded in the name of the Lord Jesus to withdraw themselves "from every brother that walketh disorderly" (2 Thes. 3:6). "And if any man obey not our word by this epistle, note that man, and have no company with him, that he may be ashamed" (2 Thes. 3:14). Such an act was to be done in Christ-like love, and only for the welfare of the erring soul.

Individual believers in Christ are united in His holy body, the church (1 Cor. 12:27) and knit tightly together in love (Col. 2:2). They are accountable to one another, and when "one member suffer(s), all the members suffer with it" (1 Cor. 12:26).

The church exists in this unique form to reflect light and virtue to an unbelieving world and to proclaim the glorious gospel of Christ and the teachings of the Apostles. Because the church preaches the messages of personal virtue and godliness, it follows that its members must live such a life, lest they are seen as hypocrites and Christ's message would appear to lack credibility. Thus, when sin overtakes virtue—due to the carelessness of the individual member of Christ's body—then corrective healing must take place.

Although the church aspires to perfection, it is not perfect. This is acknowledged by the fact that the Word gives instruction for discipline. The fact, however, that the church is not perfect, does not reduce its members inevitably to the status of sinners (Rom. 6:11). Although no sin can be

ignored nor taken lightly, there are greater and lesser sins and failures. The Lord Jesus clarified this when He said to Pilate, "he that delivered me unto thee hath the greater sin" (John 19:11). Minor, unintentional failures in daily life—mostly connected with temperament and stress—are not considered the same as gross, willful sins, and neither do they make a striving soul a sinner. Just as in the Lord's prayer, our daily prayers should include the plea, "forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors" (Matt. 6:12).

Yet, willful and gross sins, which reflect purposeful disobedience and a disregard for the Word's standards, require the scriptural remedy of discipline. This is for the benefit of the individual and to maintain the purity and holiness of the church. The church, ideally, is to be without "spot or wrinkle, or any such thing" (Eph. 5:27).

When gross, willful, and corruptive sin occurs, it must be confessed and eradicated from the church. The fallen believer becomes subject to the discipline of the church to help bring him or her back into relationship with Christ. Although there is initially a measure of suffering for both the individual and the church, discipline is a positive rather than a negative practice. "Now no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous: nevertheless afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness to them that are exercised thereby" (Heb. 12:11).

Ideally, the erring believer responds to the conviction of the Spirit, voluntarily confesses his sin and accepts the remedy of God's judgment through the church as a token of love and mercy. There are unfortunate instances of individuals who become hardened and apostate for whom discipline must also be applied, "Some men's sins are open beforehand, going before to judgment; and some men they follow after" (1 Tim. 5:24). It is far better

to confess and repent for sins in this life rather than to carry them into eternity where there will be "a certain fearful looking for of judgment and fiery indignation" (Heb. 10:27).

There are varying degrees of discipline depending upon the nature of the sin and the circumstances involved. Determination of the appropriate steps is made by the prayerful consideration of the elders based on a number of scriptural teachings and examples. The forms of discipline range from an apology or short-term denial of church privileges such as the holy kiss and holy communion to excommunication from Christ's body, the church. Repentance, purification, forgiveness and redemption are always the foremost goals of every form of discipline.

"Verily I say unto you, whatsoever ye shall bind on earth shall be bound in heaven: and whatsoever ye shall loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" (Matt. 18:18). Thus, baptism and marriage (binding) and severance (loosing) are biblically rooted, and when carried out by a God fearing body of believers are duly recognized in heaven.

It is essential for the church to make a sincere effort to keep itself pure. The Apostle Paul taught, "Purge out therefore the old leaven, that ye may be a new lump..." (1 Cor. 5:7).

The church is charged to pray for erring believers and to forgive them and confirm their love for them (2 Cor. 2:6-8). When the Word permits, and the individual has regained peace and an overcoming life, he is to be restored by the church in the spirit of meekness (Gal. 6:1).

Church discipline must be viewed as an act of love, "for whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth" (Heb. 12:6). It is humbling for the entire church and should motivate all to a closer walk with God and a greater determination to resist temptation.

# RELIEF SHIPMENT TO UKRAINE IN 1992 Bro. Gene and Sis. Verna Lehman Wolcott, IN

Although few of our American brethren were aware of the fact, there have been groups of our faith in the country we formerly called "Russia" for almost 80 years. At this time there are 11 congregations with over 500 members, as well as converts and children totaling about 1,000 souls. These congregations have been visited in the past by our brethren, and communications are open. There have been goodly sums of money sent for

building churches, with one nearly complete, another fully framed, and a third beginning.


The church in Breidenbach, Germany, which we have also been aiding in building a new facility, has close contact with the Ukrainian brethren, and in January 1992, delivered 33 tons of food and clothing to them, financed entirely from Germany. Elder Bro. Ernst Pfister of that church has been coordinator of the efforts. Our brethren live in the Ukrainian state of Bukovina, near Chernovcy, a city of 200,000.

In June, 1992, we received an urgent fax message from Ernst stating that they had an immediate

need in Bukovina for another shipment of food, clothing, etc., and that sending money would not suffice, for there was nothing to buy in the stores. At that time, the Mission and World Relief Committees sent aid in the amount of \$30,000 very guickly, which allowed that shipment to take place. In October, 1992, another such request was received, and financed in like manner as before. The shipment was scheduled to take place early in November, and Gene and Verna Lehman were authorized to accompany it and submit a report.

At 5:00 p.m. Thursday, October 29, we left O'Hare Airport for a

# WORLD RELIEF COMMITTEE FORMS NEW U.S. BOARD



Recognizing the fact that sometimes needs in our own country arise which exceed the scope of a local congregation, your World Relief Committee has opened an avenue with which to deal with such. They have formed a subcommittee known as the "U.S. Board" for this purpose. Some examples of such circumstances are as follows: Building or renovating an Apostolic Christian Church; assisting in repairing damages resulting from natural disasters; distributing relief assistance to needy groups or individuals through reputable charitable organizations, and so forth.

Requests for World Relief assistance may be submitted to any of the above brothers, who will in turn review the project and submit it to the World Relief Committee if it meets the established guidelines. They will also assume the responsibility of carrying out the necessary approved actions in an orderly and brotherly manner.

We encourage our brotherhood to make use of this Board whenever the needs arise.

direct flight to Frankfurt, Germany, which is convenient for the Breidenbach brethren, as well as being normally the most reasonably priced, for it is a major hub in Europe. We arrived at 9:30 a.m. Friday, German time, after a good flight, and were met by Ernst and several of his 14 children. Twelve of them still live at home, so things are lively in the Pfister household. After lunch, we rested a few hours.

Ernst had received two urgent appeals from Bukovina, one for 1,000 pairs of stockings, and one for 1,000 mousetraps. He and Gene picked up the traps that Friday evening, taking them to the church which was rapidly filling with used clothing, etc.

On Saturday, the two went to a store which handles distressed merchandise where they purchased 1000 pairs of good stockings in assorted sizes for 65¢ per pair. At the outset of the trip report, we will include a few of Ernst's own words concerning our involvement.

"Beloved brethren in America! We have just returned from our trip to Ukraine with assistance for the brethren there. The loved ones there were overjoyed with this aid, which was possible with your assistance. We took in over 26 tons of foodstuffs and more than four tons of clothing. They wept over it. Bro. Gene will give you a full report of this. Beloved brethren, without

your assistance, it would not have been possible to provide sufficient assistance to our brethren. We also must support them in like manner in the future. We thank you from the depths of our hearts for your help in these shipments."

We attended Sunday services in the familiar environment of the Breidenbach church, receiving a warm welcome. Once more the strains of "Christian greetings" touched our hearts.

On Monday, we did miscellaneous chores, while the men prepared Ernst's van for our long trip with nine people on board. It is a Volkswagon with three bench seats, and when all of us plus our luggage were aboard, it was plumb full.

On Tuesday, we got up at 3:30 and loaded our van as traveling companions arrived. The group was: Ernst, his daughter, Katja, Michael Gruber, Arpad Bodo, Sandor Albert, Lena Nitz, Gene, and Verna. The eight of us left at 5:30, traveling to Adolzfurt where we ate breakfast at the home of Elder Bro. Hans Heer, who also went along.

Traveling along the Autobahns through Germany and Austria, we reached the Budapest church around 7:30 p.m., where a singing was in progress. Afterwards, we spent the night in apartments provided for guests, and on Wednesday morning, went to a mill where

we met the semi to be loaded with flour and sugar purchased there.

The other goods had been loaded in Breidenbach while we were traveling on Tuesday. We waited several hours, but finally saw the welcome sight of it coming down the street. During this time, Verna worked on the notes which formed the basis for these reports.

The men set to work rearranging the load to get the heavy weight above the axles, and finally the truck was loaded. Among many other things, we had 9,000 pounds of rice, 6,600 of sugar, 11,000 of flour, etc. Elder Bro. Hans Heer has a few words for us. "This was very interesting for me, in my whole life I have never seen such a load for the hungry. But what is this among so many in Russia? We are glad we can do this, and hope that God will give the people in Russia a better situation as soon as possible. We thank the American people, especially our brothers and sisters for the help for the people in Russia.

Laslo Keyneres, the truck driver, paid \$180,000 for his rig, and has taken this trip to Bukovina three times totally at his own expense. He won't even take anything to pay the relief driver. He's a friend

We went to the police station where the truck was resealed, leaving at 4:50 p.m. Darkness began to settle over the land as we took the last leg of our trip to the border between Hungary and Ukraine. We all realized that we were venturing into the unknown, and the mood was sober.

At 11:30 p.m., we reached the Hungarian border. we had filled our fuel tanks at a station just prior to this. We also carried drums of fuel, for none is available to us in Ukraine.

We cleared the Hungarian border with few problems, but there was a long line on the dark and gloomy bridge which spanned the river dividing two countries. Since the language at the Ukrainian border was English, Gene made the arrangements for our visas. It took 1½ hours.

Driving through mist and a bit of snow, we crossed the Carpathian mountains in the darkest hours of the early morning. The roads were simply terrible, with tops speeds of about 40-45 miles an hour at best. Potholes and broken pieces were everywhere. Along the way, many people were walking, even in the dark hours before dawn, others rode bicycles, and horse drawn wagons were common. As it grew light, we could see many animals being grazed along the highway, watched over by old women and children for the most part.

About noon, we reached the home of Micha Kartscha, brother of Elder Bro. Peter. They took us to the church building under construction, where they intended to stow what we brought.

When the truck arrived, we saw

it was not possible to back up to the building without getting stuck, so young and old formed a human chain up to and inside the building, passing goods from hand to hand. 65 people were ultimately involved, unloading 66,000 pounds in  $2^{1}/2$  hours!

Elder Bro. Peterbachi spoke thus, "First of all, I cannot find words to thank first of all, God, and then to all the brothers and sisters who were thinking of us. Thank God, and all of you." He said they are not able to repay us, and stated over and over that they are not worthy of such a great fight. We assured him that is true, no one is worthy. The grace of God is a gift to those who are not worthy, but we are brothers, and the scripture is clear about our duty to one another.

The nine of us then went with Peterbachi to his home. After supper, they laid mats on the benches used for church, and the brothers slept there. Five of us had beds. It had been nearly 40 hours since we saw one, so we were grateful for much needed resting places.

On Friday, and again on Saturday, we went shopping in Chernovcy for the express purpose of discovering what was available, and at what cost. Most stores were nearly empty, the fullest having perhaps 15% of an inventory.

Ernst figured that using prices we saw it would cost 1500 kopon, their money, per day to feed his family of 12 children. Wages are between 5,000 and 8,000 kopon monthly, so in five days the entire sum would go for food. A pair of men's shoes cost 12,000, a sweater 6,000, a child's coat 4,000, etc. We have much data on prices.

There are open places where those who have items to sell can do so, like a big flea market.

We also saw a prison in which many of our brothers spent 25 years. Hundreds were taken forcibly from their homes never to be seen or heard from again, for the sake of their faith.

We also visited the churches being built with funds provided by our brethren, and were very much impressed with the quality of the workmanship.

On Sunday, we took part in services at the church in Ostrica, where about 300 assembled. Hans spoke in German, translated into Romanian, their language. Gene had the evening service, translated into Romanian by Janos Mamenji. All told, the morning services lasted nearly five hours, and evening about the same. 300 voices raised in five languages singing our old familiar hymns touched every heart. The emotion of the moment cannot be described, it must be experienced.

God alone knows how it was possible, but through all the years of oppression, even though the flame of faith grew dim, it did not go out. Today it is burning brightly.

At the end of the evening services, they had all nine of us stand in line once more near the exit hall.

Greetings Beloved!

It is with a very heavy heart that we share the following report with you, as very sad news came to our attention recently. A well beloved Elder Bro. Rudy Metzger and his wife, Sis. Danica (Matrovica, Yugoslavia) were found brutally murdered in their home. Here is the article that appeared in a Serbian language newspaper in Belgrade June 29th: (translated).

"Mysterious murder in Mitrovica, massacre for hard currency?"

"Rudolf Metzger (62) and Danica (64) pensioners were found brutally murdered".

"Mitrovica, June 29.

A retired married couple, Danica and Rudolf Metzger of Mitrovica, were slaughtered in their own home under unsolved circumstances. It is assumed that the murder was carried out about three days earlier as the bodies began to decompose.

As of yesterday, the office of the district investigator did not give out any details of the identity of the perpetrators. It is not known for certain the manner in which the murder was committed, but it is believed that they were stabbed.

Several pieces of foreign currency were found at the site leading to the suspicion that robbery may have been the motive.

Before their retirement, the couple worked in Germany and it leads to the conclusion that they may have had a large amount of money in their possession. In addition, it was reported (by word of mouth) that Rudolf Metzger served as the honorary treasurer for the local Nazarene sect."

The report of Bro. Rudy's tragedy came to us from reliable sources

and it does not fully agree with the newspaper report.

A farewell song service in the Novi-Sad Church Sunday, June 27, for one of the young brothers who was to enter the military service the following day. Many brethren came from the area churches for this occasion. Elder Bro. Metzger was expected to be there also, though he lived in Mitrovica, about 40 km. from Novi-Sad. Several phone calls to his home by the Novi-Sad brethren with no response was of concern, so they called one older brother in Mitrovica who in turn sent one young man to go the Metzger home and investigate. When the young man arrived he found the gate, from the street to the courtyard wide open. He began to look first in the garage and there he found the blood covered, badly slashed body of Sis. Dana. He called the police and searching through the house they found the body of Bro. Rudy on the basement floor. His head nearly severed, and legs broken and his body brutally slashed.

Most interesting to note, that searching through the house, the police found a suitcase with a large amount of DM., undisturbed. The billfold on the person of Bro. Rudy, with money in it, also undisturbed.

According to the latest information, several persons were arrested as suspects, but again, no official reports have been released, so it remains a mystery.

It is a tragedy that really shook the whole community of believers both in Europe and America.

Our elder brethren who visited in Yugoslavia knew him. He was active in relief work and several years ago, while visiting with relatives in Canada, came to Detroit, MI, and attended the World Relief Committee Meeting. He was also at the Szeged meeting April 24. Upon hearing the sad news, Elder Bro. Ben Maibach wrote a letter of condolence addressed to the Yugoslavian brethren. It reads in part: "It is difficult to put in words how grieved and shocked we were to hear of the tragic passing of our beloved Bro. Rudy Metzger and his helpmate and wife. We hope that you will share with his family our

sympathy and concern and especially the assurance to all of them as well as to the beloved church that we will certainly remember them in our prayers that the comfort of the Holy Spirit through Jesus Christ our Redeemer can sustain us in this hour of need . . . On behalf of all of us in the fellowship here in the United States, we want to share our condolences and also a word of encouragement that we must continue to labor together for the time is certainly short and the needs are great. May our heavenly Father, who is rich in mercy and filled with compassion, watch over and between us when we are absent one from another.'

This letter was transmitted to Novi-Sad by fax June 29. Burial was held Wednesday, the 30th. The Metzgers had no children, but leave a brother and two sisters who live in Canada.

Another setback affecting the Yugoslav food package program is due to failure by the United Nations Relief Mission in New York to issue a permit to the Hungarian Red Cross which would allow the delivery of the 200 parcels now at the Budapest Church. The first delivery was made in April, with some obstacles on the part of certain groups in order to prevent total loss. The remaining parcels will be divided and delivered to Croatia and Bucovina. Future shipments will be suspended except for certain medications and money. Hard currency is needed for it is the only means whereby our people can buy the badly needed items in order to

The government urges the public to build up their supply of heating fuel, coal, oil or wood, during the summer months. For this reason the Yugoslavian elders sent a letter to the elders in the other countries, asking for financial help, to enable the families to stock up on these fuels, which are very scarce and can be obtained with hard currency, to heat their homes and the churches in the coming winter. The whole situation is very critical and needs our urgent at-

tention and support, both prayer

and material.

Our brethren in Bucovina. Ukraine, continue to struggle as before, economics and high inflation, scarcity of most essentials still exist. At our international relief conference Elder Bros. Karcia and Paladean asked the brotherhood to give them permission to allow them to use some of the church building funds be used to buy food to support some of the families with young children. On our trip to Bucovina last April a large semitruck-load of food and clothes was delivered, but it is not sufficient to support all the people there. As we visited some of the stores in the area, we found very little food, mostly alcoholic drinks and cigarettes in good supply. On the open market we saw freshly butchered lambs, pork displayed openly on car hoods or trunk lids with flies and dust in the air, few buyers, costs very high, so with other merchandise, except for a long line of customers behind a large truck, selling vodka, our American and German brothers pointed out to the local brethren that it is necessary now for them to start farming to raise their own crops and be able to support themselves and perhaps later on support others too. But first we need to help these people to buy farm tools and equipment and teach them how to operate the farm, raise livestock and become self sustained. rather than expect to live on help coming from abroad. This also applies to our brethren in Romania, where the conditions are very similar. It is very heartwarming and a joy to see the many young people gathered at the church. There is a good hope for the church's future in this area. The only problem is that the elder brothers have not made the necessary steps to apply at the government for official recognition as a legally registered religious body. Though proper instructions and information was provided and sent to them by way of Washington, D.C., all church owned properties are registered on the name of individuals.

The trip to Bucovina was made by 20 persons, 6 from the U.S. and 14 from Germany, and in addition, the truck owner and driver. The truck was followed all the way from Budapest to Chernovtsy by the two vans and one car, with a number of stops for brief rest, food and fuel. A very long and exhausting ride indeed, but a worthwhile one, long to be remembered. Those making this trip were: Elder Bro. Nathan Steffen, Andy Hunyady, George Hunyadi, Gene and Verna Lehman and Andy Demrovsky (Akron, OH).

The second International Relief meeting was held at Szeged, Hungary Saturday, April 24. Nine countries were represented with about 40 in attendance. Elder Bro. Nathan Steffen, Andy Hunyady, Gene Lehman, George Hunyadi and Andy Demrovsky (Akron, OH), represented the U.S. churches. Elder Bro. Janos Pap was the moderator. First the representatives from countries receiving assistance spoke of conditions within their own country and churches. Each one thanked God and the supporting countries for the generous help that is being sent to sustain them in these difficult times and shared information as to the current needs that cannot be obtained locally.

It appears that the Yugoslavian situation is the worst due to internal conflict and the isolation from the other countries due to the tight U.N. imposed embargo. Romania and the Ukraine also suffer as their economy, instead of improving, is getting worse week by week. Workers' salaries or pensions are inadequate to support individuals or families, prices of goods are extremely high and they still depend on outside help.

The U.S. and German brothers made the recommendation that the families in the Ukraine and Romania, should start to work on their farms and try to produce the necessary food supplies rather than depend on outside help. Of course, it is very necessary, first need to buy tools and equipment to have the proper tools to work with. Also needed are tractors, or horses, oxen and, as we had seen, water buffalo in certain parts of the Romanian countryside to pull the plow, etc. It is almost impossible at present for most families to acquire such necessities without outside help to get off to a start. In addition, most of them need training as how to farm,

operate a dairy or other related chores.

Need for church buildings also was discussed. As we know, in the past 31/2 years about 20+ churches were built or purchased in Romania which are in use but some have vet to be finished. One is under construction and 18 more are needed. In Bukovina, currently the Korovia is under construction, the one in Dimka is nearly finished. the Ostrica congregation is in need of a larger building for the one in use is overly crowded. In Slovakia the brethren are searching for suitable buildings in two locations. In Hungary, the Szeged Church is under construction and expects to have the roof on it before the fall. The congregation at Pogany will need a new building to replace the existing, about 100-year-old building. The Ersekcsanad building is finished and we received the invitation at the meeting to attend the dedication scheduled for May 16.

After the meeting ended we all drove to the site of the new church and were pleased to see the working brothers, full of enthusiasm building the masonry walls. Following our trip to the Ukraine, we returned to Hungary and spent Sunday at the Budapest Church. We met Elder Bro. Albert Szabo (Romania), attended the funeral of his sister in Hodmezovaarhely. He served as our driver through Romania. We travelled in the new VW van that was purchased recently for his use, to travel and carry passengers to church functions and also to deliver some of the food parcels to people in isolated areas.

We visited about 16 congregation and we could feel the love and the deep appreciation of the brethren. They are most grateful to God and the American brethren for the help received that made it possible for them to have their own houses of prayer. There are still about 18 smaller congregation in need of church buildings and, with God's help, it, too, will come about, hopefully in the not far distant future. Some folks told us how thankful they are for the food shipments they receive. They just don't know how to exist without it. Prices on certain food items, when available, are

too high and they cannot afford it. They keep thanking God continually for the thoughtful brethren in America for their love and compassion. Families who are getting their land back from the state are also in need of assistance as they have no proper tools to work with. Very few can manage to keep on going. This summer the weather has been very hot and dry, and now are concerned about the winter months for food. both for humans and their livestock.

The closed bodied truck and trailer that was purchased with World Relief funds for food parcel distribution is working well and now they can deliver and make the distribution as soon as it arrives.

Returning to Hungary, the third time, we attended the dedication services at Ersekcsanad. What a beautiful church! And what a nice group of brethren! It was a most blessed day as about 750-800 persons gathered from the area, as well as several foreign countries. A most blessed day for all, long to be remembered. We bring many heartfelt greetings from many beloved brethren of like faith to our brethren in the United States! We also wish to thank everyone for your continued prayers for our safety and we thank God for His marvelous love and the opportunity to visit the many brethren in the different countries. May He bless you all!

Before I took my college algebra class this summer, I was rather disdainful of the answers in the back of the book. I had had four years of high school math and even my college physics class did not take from me the notion that the answers in the back were for those who did not understand the problems. Since then it has been twentysix years, and getting reacquainted with the world of mathematics has taught me a great deal, not all of it math-related. I have listened intently to my instructor and gone to every class without fail, even when there were other activities and compelling reasons to be elsewhere. This summer I have also checked my answers extensively in the back of the book. The answers have helped me to understand my work better, to compare the results of my work, and to focus my work towards the correct process and solutions. Spiritually, I have been very slow to understand. Only yesterday (after I had attended over 80% of the class meetings) have I seen the spiritual relationship. First of all, there is only one Book, the Bible. All of us know we have work to do, but we do not always check the Book. For myself, I have seen the number of errors I have made in the simple, automatic mathematical computations within the more difficult problems that have hindered me from matching the book's solutions. I have had to take much time to retrace my steps and to correct my thinking about positive or negative signs or other parts of the computation in order to come to the right answer. I need to understand, to compare, and to focus my spiritual walk in the same way, even when it takes time, even when I thought I was right the first time, because I so often err in small ways, in the "easy" work within the bigger picture the Lord has. And I need to check and beg forgiveness from Him and learn to go more carefully, more prayerfully the next time. I also need, as I found for my class, that I need to be "in class" whenever the Word is preached, for there is help and understanding expounded through the Spirit of God, and it does not matter what else may be going on or vying for my attention: if I am in His House, listening to His Word, I am doing His will.

(Continued from Page 40) ery one of us has our problems . . . some, it seems like, more than others. Sometimes, I guess maybe this is a confession also, I feel that maybe I do not rejoice enough, because I kind of take things for

granted . . . and that bothers me. How many of us are that way? How many of us do not rejoice the way we should?

"Let your moderation be known unto all men." (Philippians 4:5) He is talking to the Philippians here and he is telling them goodbye. He is telling them some important things. As he was writing to have this letter written, he wanted the basics laid down, didn't he? "Let your moderation be known unto all men." (Philippians 4:5)

In today's society, it seems like moderation is a thing that is not even in style anymore. It seems like many denominations want to entertain people and pack the balcony and they want it full with only

folding chair room.

You know, I wonder about moderation. Paul wanted the Word preached. I do not believe anywhere we can read where he suggested that we do things to be real attractive to the world. "Let your moderation be known unto all men."

(Philippians 4:5)

I refer to a person who told me that they do not understand this next part, verse six, "Be careful for nothing;" (Philippians 4:6) I am not a very smart man, and sometimes I have to pray to God, "Help me understand this." Sometimes I understand it when I read it and sometimes the next day, or the next hour, or the next week, it will pop into my mind, "That is what God means!"

But when he says, "Be careful for nothing," does that mean to go out and just don't care, and just have fun, and lay back and do whatever feels good? No! No! No!

In my simple way, I like to say, "Be full of care for nothing." Don't get all worked up. Do we let the things going on during the day at work or at home or wherever get us so worked up that we don't even think to rejoice or thank God? Sometimes I do. Pray for me.

We should have our mind set on our heavenly goal. That should be number one. We should be rejoicing and telling others about the

great love that God has.

"... but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God." (Philippians 4:6) We have a privilege. We have a communication line to God that is unreal.

When any one of us gets depressed, we can talk to God. Then sometimes, when we get to feeling pretty tall, pretty good, and pretty successful, God talks to us, doesn't He? He knocks us down a level or two. Are we thankful for that? I hope so.

"And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding . . ." (Philippians 4:7) That really says a lot. The peace of God that passeth all understanding, and we cannot

explain it.

I think moms and dads, if they could, would just like to take their son or daughter that is out in sin and set them down and say, "Look! This is the way it is! Taste it! See it!"

We cannot even understand it ourselves, can we? We cannot even understand it ourselves, it is so great. Oh, we have so much to rejoice for.

As Paul went on here, he built them up. "Brethren, whatsoever things are true," what is really true, "whatsoever things are honest," truth, honesty, "whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report; if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." (Philippians 4:8)

He is instructing the church. Those are the things that count. Be in moderation. Keep your values based on the World The peace of God which passeth understanding.

Many times I marvel!

At home, I am involved in court situations many times as a volunteer, as an advocate for children, and I have gotten to know a lot of different people really down in sin.

One person, in particular, I look at her and talk with her. She is a mother of nine children, from five fathers. It is a sick situation. Today she is awaiting trial on child molesting charges that make me bawl. When I look at her, I think of God's great love. I said, "Kathy, you know, until you get your life right with Christ, it is not going to go." She agreed. She knows that.

When I look at her, she seems about low as life can sink. Then I think of God's great love. I think about Jesus Christ hanging on the cross and shedding His blood. He shed His blood for her as well as He did for you and me. Someday, if she would just accept and believe and live what the Word says, she could walk down those streets in heaven, just like you can or just like I can. The past does not matter. He died for all sins.

Sin is sin. It does not matter if it is a little sin or a big sin. Can you understand that? Can you believe that? How do you explain that to

someone? It is so great!

Oh? We have much to rejoice for!

Then Paul told them something that I think probably a lot of us have problems with. Living sounds good. "I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content" (Philippians 4:11) What a blessing! What a great feeling that must be!

I think that every one of us is striving for that and every one of us has that as our goal, but how many of us are not quite content? How many of us want a little bit bigger home? How many of us want a little fancier care? How many of us want to make ten thousand dollars more this year than we did last year? All at once, those wants become a big thing to us.

Whatever state we are in, let us be content. Let us work toward that.

Maybe there is one place where we should not be content in the state that we are in, and that is in our spiritual life. I think we should be challenged to improve that every day, and every hour — to work better, and work harder to be a servant of Jesus Christ . . . a good, willing, humble servant.

Paul says, "I can do all things..." and he did not stop there. "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." (Philippians 4:13) That is the bottom line – Jesus

Christ.

That is the bottom line. We cannot, we must not think that it is ourselves. We are just a vessel, we are just a servant. It is Christ that is doing it. Let us give Him a little more room.

Let us pray just a little bit harder. "Jesus, help me. Make me more dedicated. Make me improve. Help me improve." You know, I would imagine that if we really strive and really work on improving our spiritual walk, then our wants will start to be more content with what we have.

God's plan of salvation is so marvelous. The more that you dig in the Word and the more you read and the more you think about it and the more that you pray about it, for me anyway, it becomes greater and greater and greater.

My respect for the Word and my respect for God's plan of salvation is so much greater than it was a year ago. I sure hope it will be even greater in a year. Let us keep striving and striving and striving.

We were talking about our fellowship, our Apostolic Christian fellowship. Then we have to think as we were reading here where he was thanking the Philippian church for sending him some money and helping him where there was a need. Do you think that is kind of the way it is with our church?

He was saying that is good. That is the way it should be. We are talking about sacrificing. He says, "But my God and his God is your God. It is my God who is everybody's God if they would just yield."

"But my God shall supply all your need according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus. Now unto God and our Father be glory for ever and ever." (Philippians 4:19, 20) Let us rejoice!

Then, before he closed this book, Paul said, "Give them greetings." Can't you just see him standing there and saying, "Give the brethren greetings"? Let us not quit giv-

ing greetings.

I am sure that everyone of us look at some things and think, "Well, this could be a little different or that could be a little different." But it has been proven over time.

Rejoice evermore in Christ Jesus. He died for you and He died for me. I do not understand that great love, but I know that it is real. Certainly, brethren, we have much to rejoice for.
