When we partake of holy communion, we drink from the cup which symbolizes the blood of Christ. But what is so important about the blood?

In Exodus 12:13 we read, "When I see the blood I will pass over you." The blood was a token or symbol of saving faith in that house.

Matthew 26:28 tells us, "For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." This makes the blood very important because we thereby are forgiven and made right with God.

But what is so important about being forgiven? "For the wages of sin is death." (Romans 6:23) Death refers to spiritual death in hell. Hence, forgiveness of sin is a must in order, to escape that death.

Jesus said, "If I wash thee not, thou hast no part with me." (John 13:8) It stands to reason that unwashed feet on earth will not keep us out of heaven. Jesus was no doubt talking about being washed spiritually, which requires His blood to be shed.

Peter writes that we were redeemed "With the precious blood of Christ." Again the blood is emphasized. In a physical sense, blood is not something pleasant to think about. Yet when we think about the blood of Christ, let's think about it as the medicine for our souls. It makes our souls completely healthy.

The fruit of the vine, of which we partake in holy communion, symbolizes the blood of Christ. When Christ shed His blood, He suffered hell (the wages of sin) for us. Blood represents life, for without it no physical being can live. Christ's blood is important.

Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

Each believer in Christ is an ambassahimself friendly" (Prov. 18:24). Along with

dor (2 Cor. 5:20) whose mission in life includes radiating Christ's love and spreading His good will to others.

The Lord Jesus taught, "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your father which is in heaven" (Matt. 5:16). Indeed, God's children are the "light of the world" (Matt. 5:14) as described in the Sermon on the Mount.

A major aspect of a believer's general manner in everyday living is the virtue of friendliness. A friendly manner is one of the most positive lights one can beam forth for Christ. If a person is genuinely friendly, he draws positive responses from others.

Friendliness probably does not come naturally to many people. It must be cultivated. In the Old Testament, Ezra the priest "prepared his heart" to study the law of God. Likewise, we as individuals must prepare our hearts to be friendly and to reflect a pleasing and positive personality as we seek to be a "light" for Christ.

Many people today are nearly overwhelmed by stress and the frenzy of activity in their lives. Interpersonal relationships are very often strained due to the estrangement and bitterness which have arisen from broken homes and shattered lives. Into such a setting the bright light of friendliness can offer a welcome ray of encouragement. Each and every believer in Christ has an opportunity (in fact an obligation) to be friendly, cheerful and courteous to everyone. To do less is a failure to imitate Christ.

Teachings in the Bible explain the root of true friendliness. From this immortal book people have learned throughout the ages the principles of civility, restraint, discretion, decency and consideration for others. If obedient to its teachings, believers will display the virtues of warmth, love and friendliness.

Solomon said it quite plainly when he wrote, "A man that hath friends must show

himself friendly" (Prov. 18:24). Along with this, he also said, "Pleasant words are as an honeycomb, sweet to the soul, and health to the bones," (Prov. 16:24) and "a merry heart doeth good like a medicine" (Prov. 17:22).

Ruth, the Moabitess, was gleaning ears of corn in a field when Boaz came and impressed her with his friendliness and compassion. He said, "The Lord recompense thy work, and a full reward be given thee of the Lord God of Israel, under whose wings thou art come to trust" (Ruth 2:12).

Ruth replied, "Let me find favor in thy sight, my lord; for that thou hast comforted me, and for that thou has spoken friendly unto thine handmaid" (Ruth 2:13).

When the Apostle Paul was in bondage under the supervision of Julius, the latter allowed him liberty "to go unto his friends to refresh himself" (Acts 27:3). The friendliness of Paul's companions "refreshed" him. It is no different today. Our friendliness to others can be very refreshing to them.

Friendship and friendliness were displayed in the close relationship between David and Jonathan. When Saul was conniving to kill David, young Jonathan went and told David to hide; he even went to his father, Saul, and "spake good of David" and temporarily calmed Saul's enmity. Later, the friendliness between Jonathan and David resulted in a covenant because "Jonathan loved him as his own soul" (1 Sam. 18:1).

The Apostle Paul gave very descriptive advice to those who are risen with Christ and who daily seek those things that are above: "Put on therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness (friendliness), humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering" (Col. 3:12).

Opportunities abound for true Christians to extend the beam of friendliness. Every believer should be aware of the daily opportunities that present themselves to portray friendliness. Jesus said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me" (Matt. 25:40). The Apostle Paul wrote, "As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith" (Gal. 6:10). This could apply to friendliness because that virtue is a part of goodness.

The believer should show friendliness to all men, but especially to his brethren in faith, because together they are the bride of Christ, the church. A true and abiding relationship should exist among the brethren which can be compared to none other on the earth.

In the home, and among family members and siblings, friendliness is a must! Parents, are you friendly to your children? Are you too busy, too stressed and too preoccupied to show friendliness to your children? It is possible that many parents do not seize opportunities to be especially friendly to their children. Studies have shown that on an average day, a father spends only 19 seconds, one on one, with his individual children. How friendly can a father be in only 19 seconds?

In our churches during Sunday and Wednesday evening times of fellowship, are we doing our best to be friendly and cheerful to everyone, without preference? The spirit of Christ will shun no one. An important goal in coming together for worship is to encourage and edify one another. Kindliness and friendliness are traits that help to build up inner strength. It is required that we be consciously friendly among God's people.

The believer's efforts to achieve friendliness will not be forgotten. Even those who give a cup of water in the name of the Lord will be rewarded (Matt. 10:42). Likewise, as true believers extend cupful after cupful of friendliness in the name of Christ, the blessings of fellowship will abound here on this earth and there will be great rewards in heaven.

COLORADO, DENVER Jamie Grant

Christian greetings to all, from beautiful Colorado! It is fall once again; the forests appear to be dripping with honey, as the Aspen leaves have matured to various shades of yellow and are slowly descending on their habitual journey back to the ground. From time to time, we behold a fresh blanket of snow recapping the top of Mt. Evans, and during the next few weeks one can give audience to the wild elk: An exciting annual event for we Coloradoans known as "elk bugling." I must admit, this was the first time I have been acquainted with the word "bugling" aside from the description of a "brass instrumentation." Traditionally, once a year the elk move down from the higher elevations to graze, as well as to mate. Each herd is led by a bull. The bull is mostly responsible for nurturing the group with food, and warding off predators. As I surveyed one particular bull and his herd, I watched how occasionally he needed to call one of the cows back to herd because she was drifting away and opening herself up for danger. At other times, the bull bugled to a stalking bull in the distance; encouraging him to take on his challenge.

You see "bugling" is simply "Elk lingo," but to me it was a unique scenario of the responsibilities our ministers and elders have for our precious church. HAITI - JAMAICA WORK TEAM NEWS

Due to political instability in Haiti, the Caribbean Board has decided to cancel the first of this work season's teams, scheduled for December 10 - 18.

Clearance will be sought for each of the other four projects in Haiti six weeks before time of departure through the usual U.S. State Department advisors and missionaries.

The Caribbean Board further agreed to seek a deferred date rather than cancel any of the other four Haiti teams, if the Board does not clear them for travel.

In summary, all of the remaining seven dates in Haiti and Jamaica are open to volunteers except January 27 to Haiti, which already has a full team. Please contact the area representative for the particular project date you are interested in for information. Your local representative can also help give you direction.

Jamaica continues to be very hospitable to those led to volunteer at C.C.C.P. This Third World Christian school is expanding its facilities for deaf children. Apostolic Christian World Relief has sent material aid to the school for a number of years. Last year we responded to their request for volunteers to help in an expansion program, and sent three teams. We have again scheduled three teams for this work season.

(Continued from Page 36) fect, will of God." (Romans 12:2) Those things are good, perfect and acceptable.

"For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think." (Romans 12:3) This is another way. How do we do this? Don't think of yourself too highly.

If we understand who God is, and if we have a fear of God, that will help us get a sense of perspective on who we are and what we can really accomplish, which is virtually nothing.

"... but to think soberly, according as God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith. For as we have many members in one body, and all members have not the same office:" (Romans 12:3, 4) He said, "You're going to find yourself in a position and you may question, 'Am I doing enough?' or 'I am not as good as someone else." What He says is, "Each one of us have our job to do." He has given to us something to work with.

We think of the parable of the talents. When He went away, what happened? When the Master went away, He gave to them different amounts, different responsibilities. But they had responsibilities to perform.

"So we, being many, are one body in Christ, and every one members one of another. Having then gifts differing..." Let us just read through what some of them are. "... . according to the grace that is given to us, whether prophecy, let us prophesy . . . Or ministry, let us wait on our ministering . . ." (Romans 12:5-7).

Now prophecy, here, would probably more properly be preaching, in the sense that it is given in this scripture. Ministering, which we think of as preaching, would really be more of service. There are some people, and you know who you are, and we know who you are as well, as we work together. There are some people who are very good in the work of service.

Did you ever find that person who can just absorb things? You give them a job and they take care of it. What happens to those people? Who always gets the job? The same person. You notice how that always happens? They get a job, do it well, and we keep looking to them. Our head always swivels to them, when there is a job to do. That is the ministering spirit, or servant. That is what ministering means, to be a servant.

"Or he that exhorteth, on exhortation: he that giveth, let him do it with simplicity; . . .' which means not making a big deal out of it, but we just give simply, ". . . he that ruleth, with diligence; he that sheweth mercy, with cheerfulness." (Romans 12:8) Forgiveness with cheerfulness. Having mercy with cheerfulness.

Too often, we try to say that we are going to show that mercy or show forgiveness, but we really are not forgiving. What we are doing is saying, "I want you to pay a penalty... pay the price. I want a little pound of flesh here or there before I am really willing to forgive."

That is not forgiveness. We are going to read about the instruction that God gives us about what forgiveness is really like a little bit later in this scripture. That is not really true forgiveness, but you are to do it with cheerfulness, to have mercy with cheerfulness.

"Let love be without dissimulation." It is to be shared without judgment. Love is to be without dissimulation or choosing. "Abhor that which is evil;" (Romans 12:9) Here is a way to live our lives.

He is giving us directions, and

He is giving us simple instructions on how to live. "Abhor that which is evil." Abhor is a pretty strong word. This is the kind of thing where you flee from it. It says, "Abstain from all appearance of evil." (I Thessalonians 5:22) "Abhor that which is evil." Cringe at it. We should have that attitude and not just accept it. Because what do we know happens, when we start to accept those things, partially? When we don't abhor those things that are evil, what happens?

We start to become a little calloused and we accept a little more. Pretty soon, it does not even seem evil anymore. "Oh, well, that is just the way the world is." We say that all the time. We become calloused to it. We need to abhor that which is evil, so that when it shows up again, we can recognize it for what it is, because sometimes we fail to recognize evil for what it is, and because we have not had that abhorrence for evil.

"Cleave to that which is good." (Romans 12:9) Draw near to it. He is giving us instructions. When we are around things that are good, we should be cleaving to it. That is why we give instructions to our converts as they come.

When the church doors are open, they should be there. We should cleave to that which is good. That versus the other choice, which is to abhor that which is evil.

"Be kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love." These are simple instructions. Sometimes they pass right by us because we don't pay attention. "In honour preferring one another." (Romans 12:10) Do we really do that?

I must confess to you sometimes even as we work together, as Bro. Ed and his son, Gary, and I work together, when we were on a little trip together and as we were going through a door, we would say, "You go first." "No, you go first, because I esteem you higher than myself."

We do that, but we have to be careful with that. I am saying that to myself, "I need to be careful with that," because we really need to be sincere that we esteem our brother higher than ourselves, or our sister higher than ourselves. It is all the same. We need to have that esteem for one another. That is seeing the value in the other person. Do we do that? When we are saying that we esteem someone, that is what we are doing. We are seeing the value that is in them. They have within them the same spirit that God gave to us. We should be esteeming that spirit higher than ourselves, because of ourselves we are not worth anything.

"Not slothful in business; fervent in spirit; serving the Lord." (Romans 12:11) He puts those together, which is always interesting to me. "Rejoicing in hope; patient in tribulation; continuing instant in prayer." (Romans 12:12) Simple instructions.

Don't be slothful in business. It doesn't tell us to be greedy, it just says, "Don't be slothful." Be a good steward. That is what he means. Fervent in spirit. We should be excited about the spirit that God has placed within us. Continuing instant in prayer. We should constantly be in prayer. Too often, what happens? We fall into this all the time.

Decisions need to be made. We make decisions day in and day out. Decisions are made, but are we making those decisions through the use of prayer? Are we communing with God, asking for His guidance, asking Him to open the way?

We have all had great experiences when we ask for God's help. We pray that God would reveal to us what we should do. He opened the way. Then what happens the next time? We don't ask. We want the help, but we don't ask. It is silly, but we are human and so we forget.

I think that God is forgiving and He places in our hearts the remembrance that we need to ask and come to Him in prayer. That is what being instant in prayer is about.

"Patient in tribulation." (Romans 12:12) Can we be patient as tribulation comes upon us? It is just another instruction from Him.

"Distributing to the necessity of saints; given to hospitality." (Romans 12:13) I want to make a point about hospitality, if I could. Hospitality is different than entertaining. Those two things are different. Entertainment focuses on the host. The house has to be clean. We go through this at our place when we have company. How long does it take to get ready for company that is going to come for onehalf a day? A week. You know how that goes. At our house, it is not stacked with things all over the place. It stays very neat, and I appreciate the way my wife keeps the house. But, we are going to be entertaining company!

There is a difference between entertainment and hospitality. Hospitality can occur when all you have on the table is macaroni and cheese. It focuses on the guest. Why are we concerned about what our house looks like? We do not want to look bad. Let us focus on the guest. That is hospitality. To bring them in and to share . . . to talk. You can talk across a dirty table just as well as you can talk across a clean one. You can share things.

You have probably done that. I have had some of the best conversations with our family, when we were growing up, when we were in the middle of a mess. We went out and camped and stuff was a mess. Other families would be there and they would come over to our campsite. There would be stuff strewn all over the place. But that was hospitality.

That is what the scripture means. It means to share those times, those special times that you can look back on when no one remembers how clean the house was or how spick-and-span something was. Let us not worry about entertaining, but let us look at hospitality. Let's focus on the guest, not on ourselves. That is what this is all about.

He says we have to get the focus off ourselves and focus on others.

That is the key. If we focus on others, things will go really well.

"Bless them which persecute you: bless, and curse not." (Romans 12:14) Times come when we are persecuted. God's direction is this. "Bless those people who persecute you." We sit here and say, "I can't do that. I am not very good at it." When someone persecutes me, like they call me on the phone and I feel like I am being persecuted. They are wrongfully accusing me on the phone, I can tell you the back of my neck gets pretty red and I flare. Now, Lord willing, you don't have those problems, but I sure do. I am not feeling very much like I should bless them. But that is what God tells us to do.

Do we have wisdom, the ability to apply God's Word to our daily walk of life? Can we do that? Do we think about it? Do we exercise it? If you are like me, probably what I need to do, is put up a sign in my office that says "Bless them that persecute you. Bless and curse not."

Get that up in front of you, so you can remember when the times comes so that God's Word is right there, so you can exercise it. It is a difficult thing to do.

I'm sure if something happens and we fail in this, what is our choice? Our choice is then to what? To make a phone call . . . to call afterwards and say, "I apologize, because I didn't handle that the way I should have."

What is that? That Is esteeming others higher than ourselves. That is reaching out and be willing to lay ourselves down, to sacrifice . . . the living sacrifice that God requires.

"Rejoice with them that do rejoice, and weep with them that weep." (Romans 12:15) Have empathy. That is what He says. Be sympathetic. Feel for others. When others have those deep feelings, then our spirit reaches out to them. Simple instruction on how to live.

"Be of the same mind one toward another. Mind not high things, but condescend to men of low estate." (Romans 12:16) God knows the confusion that is created by the world. The world says, "This person has a high position, and we should really esteem the person of high position." God says what? "No." It is as simple as that. Do not do it. It is backwards. Rather, look to those men of low estate in simplicity to learn.

"Recompense to no man evil for evil. Provide things honest in the sight of all men." (Romans 12:17) Honesty. It is simple instruction. If we are honest, if we are unfailingly honest, things will go well for us, even in this life. It serves you well to be unfailingly honest. Sure, sometimes it hurts in the short run, but it definitely is God's way and therefore it pays in the long run.

"If it be possible, as much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men." (Romans 12:18) I enjoy this verse because of the "if it be possible." God recognizes that we have this weakness and we cannot always get the job done. He says, "As much as you possibly can, through the use of the spirit, live peaceable with everybody, with all men." Not just among our group of believers, but with all men. He includes everyone to live in peace as much as possible.

"Avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath: for it is written, Vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord. Therefore if thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst, give him drink: for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head. Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good." (Romans 12:19-21)

When things happen and we are mistreated, and we take this verse and we use it, what is accomplished? There is a possibility of many things. In fact, instead of persecuting in return, what does He ask us to do? To give gifts to those who persecute us.

If you have an enemy, you are supposed to do what? If he is hungry, feed him. If he is thirsty, give him something to drink. That is God's instruction. What will happen when that occurs? What are the possible events? They may ignore it. They may abuse you and take advantage of you. So? You presented yourself that living sacrifice to God.

What else may happen? You may have heaped upon him the coals of fire of personal conviction. Because he sees your actions, your life acted out, what is in you acted out, it will heap upon him the coals of fire of conviction and from that he will be saved.

What else might happen? If we actually act like, if we are honest with ourselves, if we at least act like we are forgiving, maybe we will start to become forgiving. If we start to do things for someone else who we would consider to be our enemy, if we start to do things for them, even though it may be an act at first, what? Actions can start to become a part of us, and then we will start to have the feeling. It is a possibility. He says to at least make the effort in that direction.

To do what? Throughout all of it, He says to do what? To overcome what? What does it say in the last verse? Remember the last verse of what we read in Proverbs? I wanted to tie these two together.

Let us look again in Proverbs just briefly. I will turn again and read it. "But whoso hearkeneth unto me" wisdom "shall dwell safely," the fear of God "and shall be quiet from fear of evil." (Proverbs 1:33) Be quieted from the fear of evil. Evil will be defeated through this fear of God, through the knowledge that He can give us and the actions that we can take in our life.

What does that last verse that we read here say? "Be not overcome of evil." Through that fear of evil, the thing that disquiets us, the thing that gives us ulcers and causes our insides to be churned up, but overcome evil with good. He says, "Take action and present yourself living, as a sacrifice unto Me."

If there is any piece of advice that we can give to those who are going on, let us talk specifically of that for just a second. If there is a piece of advice that we can give, It is just that: to take the Word of God and to apply it to your life each and every day. To do that, you have to read it. It is as simple as that. You have to read it and study it and begin to understand it, so that you can apply it.

If you ever find yourself drifting along in the sea of life, in the stream of life, and you start to hear the roar of the falls, remember that God's Word and then the fear of Him that comes from the reading of His Word, is the beginning of wisdom. It will help you to find the way to apply His Word to your walk of life.

That is the best advice that I can give you and that God can give, because that is what He tells us. In His Word He tells us, "Fear Me, and wisdom will begin." It is simply that. Fear Him. FEB 02602 LK CHARLES WALDER PO BOX 96 EAST LYNN IL 60932

These are simple instructions. Let us review briefly as we go back through it. Let us review the steps that God gives us, the simple instructions that He gives us through Paul of how to live and how to handle situations as they come.

This is the ability to apply God's Word to our daily walk of life. He said, "Here's a situation in your daily walk of life. Here is what to do. Here's another one and here is what to do." We think sometimes that God's Word is not current enough and does not handle the current affairs of today. That is nonsense. It will handle every situation, but we have to use it. Too often we are lazy and we do not want to try. At least I am. You may not be like that.

In verse one, "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." (Romans 12:1) "A living sacrifice." God made a change at the time when He sent Jesus Christ and He sacrificed Him there on the cross for our sins. Do we relate to that as an individual experience?

Jesus Christ, when He hung on the cross, looked across time and space and He saw us – as individuals, you and I. He looked at me and saw me for what I was and He was

willing to sacrifice Himself for me. If I understand that, if I truly understand that, am I not willing to give Him this life? Holy and acceptable unto Him? A living sacrifice. Each day. Day in and day out. Remember? Applying it to our daily walk of life . . . living the Word. Not applying it every once in a while when we think about it, but living the Word.

In ancient times they would take those sacrifices, and do what? Kill them, cut them into pieces, and burn them on the altar. They were not living anymore, were they?

God wants a different type of sacrifice today. He wants us to take our lives to live them for Him and to be alive in His service. We are much more effective alive, than we are dead.

He wants us to live spiritually. To live so that other lives may be touched, so that they can see in us that living thing that is the Spirit of God, so they can understand that there is an escape from the river that is plunging toward destruction. Many find themselves on that river and they cannot figure a way out. They just don't know what to do. Their thoughts are tangled.

You know, our mind is an amazing thing. You are probably like I am and your mind just races at certain times. Thoughts come from here and from there and our friends are that way. Their minds are racing, and they have so much more to be fearful of. Remember that fear of evil?

They know they are in it and they are trapped by it and they don't know how to get out. Their mind is racing, trying to use their own ability to escape. The Word says what? The fear of God is the beginning of wisdom, the beginning of real knowledge. (See Proverbs 1:7)

So if they begin to fear God and know who He is and understand His Word and believe it, then they must turn and become a living sacrifice, giving their body and their mind and their spirit each day in His service. He says, "How do we do this?" You know, we can say that is what we need to do, now how do we do it?

First step, do not be conformed to the world. Don't be like the world. We must dwell in it, but we do not have to be like it. "But be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind . . ." (Romans 12:2) To be changed. Instead of having your own knowledge and relying on yourself, rather to rely on the Spirit of God to give us direction.
