"IS LOVE MEASURABLE?"

We were studying the love of God and came upon the verse, "For the Father himself loveth you, because ye have loved me, and have believed that I came out from God." (John 16:27)

We had been reading verses which indicated that God loves the whole world when we came upon this verse which seems to inform us that God's love for us is conditional upon our love for, and our faith in, the Lord Jesus Christ. This made me reason that it isn't that God does not love the unbeliever but that His love for that person increases when he or she becomes a believer. Does that sound reasonable to you?

So far so good but this brings up the concept of measuring love. This is no simple matter. There are no scales for measuring love and besides it is not a tangible commodity which you can get a hold of to put on a scale even if you had such an instrument. What does this mean for us in our daily lives? It means we can no longer be concerned only with whether or not we love God and other people but with how much we love God and

other people. Love is quantitative but only in abstract terms, such as more, or less.

In John 15:13 the Lord Jesus Christ indicated there is a difference in the quantity or greatness of love. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." In Ephesians 5:25, husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it," the exhortation is for husbands to be willing to die for their wives. No one has greater love than that, according to the Lord Jesus Christ. It is not enough to love your wife, you need to love her more, and wives need to love their husbands more so that each will be very reasonable with the other.

Our prayer must change from, "God please help us to love everybody," to "God, please help us to love everybody more."

Light From The Word

GOD'S PLAN FOR FAMILY UNITY - III

This third in a series of articles on the family deals with the major impact of role models and peer influence on children. It also discusses certain key areas in the healthy emotional development of children and the long term consequences of their ability to make proper choices.

Parental influence by example can be either very negative or very positive. The sad account of a particular king of Israel was that he "did evil in the sight of the Lord and walked in the way of his father" (1 Kings 15:26). The evil influence of ungodly fathers was passed on from generation to generation.

Herodias' evil influence on her daughter caused her to ask for the head of John the Baptist in a charger when she was given the opportunity to ask whatsoever she wanted, even to the half of the kingdom (Mark 6:22-28).

On the other hand, the faith of the grandmother (Lois) and the mother (Eunice) of Timothy was so strong that Paul was persuaded that this unfeigned faith was also evident in the life of Timothy (2 Tim. 1:5). It is therefore vital that parents establish a strong relationship with God and that their faith and trust in Him be unwavering. Children need to see from the very beginning of their lives that God is in control and that His influence is evident in the lives of their parents. We simply cannot begin too early to teach our children of the love of God.

Most of the emphasis of the series of articles, "God's Plan for Family Unity" is focused on the parental duty to teach and to train children in the spiritual aspects of life and proper conduct of children. There are, however, other responsibilities of parents that are not totally "spiritual" even though the way we carry out these other duties will have a strong impact on the spiritual lives of our children.

Parents obviously have the duty to provide for the material needs of the family, "...for the children ought not to lay up for the parents, but the parents for the children" (2 Cor. 12:14). Yet we must not

overemphasize the material things of life by laying up treasures on earth and not treasures in heaven. Jesus said, "for where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (Matt. 6:21). If we place too much emphasis on the pleasures of this life, our children will not develop the proper priorities for their lives

Parents must also provide for the emotional and social stability that children need. Children must not feel forsaken by their parents. Parents need to spend time with their children, just as Jesus took time for children (Mark 10:13-16). Children must learn that they can depend upon their parents for emotional support and sound advice.

A child's relationship with his parents is usually his first exposure to authority figures. This makes a lasting impression on the child's attitudes toward all forms of authority. If the child experiences inconsistency, unreasonable demands, unnecessary harshness, or lack of praise for worthy accomplishments, he will fail to develop proper trust and may even feel resentment and anger toward his parents and other authorities. The Apostle Paul directed a specific warning to fathers: "Provoke not your children to wrath" (Eph. 6:4). Rather, parents should make sincere effort to establish reasonable, but firm and consistent standards for their children to work toward. They should try to always speak the truth in love (Eph. 4:15), and they should not hesitate to give kind words of encouragement and praise when they are due (1 Cor. 12:26).

Children must be taught that their friends have a strong influence on their lives and they should be careful with whom they associate. The prodigal son would have had a much better life had he not spent time with those who influenced him to do wickedly. The impact that sin has on a person's life may extend far beyond the specific sin itself.

The consequences of sin can last a lifetime, even though the individual repents of the sin and is forgiven. Sin can ruin a

person's health, can bring permanent injury or some other lifelong consequence. God's people would do well to teach this very important fact to their children.

The prodigal son repented of his sin and was forgiven by his father, but after returning, he was more like a servant than a son in certain aspects of life. His father said to the older son, "all that I have is thine" (Luke 15:31). The younger son was forgiven but his earthly inheritance was not restored. Peer pressure is powerful and this influence can last a lifetime. Parental influence, however, is more powerful and can last throughout eternity. Parents need to be ready and willing to combat peer pressure and to give their children a foundation that can help them overcome any negative impact their peers may have on them.

Parents need to control the activities of their young children and exert more influence than their friends. The Lord said of Araham, "For I know him, that he will command his children and his household after him, and they will keep the way of the Lord, to do justice and judgment" (Gen. 18:19). As head of the household, fathers should gain the respect of their children through God-given strength, wisdom and tender affection which they convey to their children through unwavering love.

There is a very important lesson for fathers in the parable of the prodigal son. Even though the wayward son was a great disappointment to his father and no doubt caused much suffering, there was an abiding love which endured this difficult trial. Our children should always be assured of our unconditional love, even though they may at times fail very badly. Just as in the case of our beloved Saviour, such love reaches out in a special way to those who seem to deserve it the least. The Lord Jesus spoke of a man leaving ninety and nine sheep to find the one which had gone astray (Matt. 18:12). If we are guided in our parenting by constant awareness of our own desperate need for the Saviour's love. we will bring much comfort and assurance



As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. GALATIANS 6:10

On the 27th of May, 37 members and friends from 15 congregations arrived at the airport in Montego Bay to participate in the seventh World Relief work team in Jamaica. This is another step in our continuing program of assisting a Christian center with facilities to educate and care for deaf children.

All arrived safe and sound, although the same could not be said for their luggage. However, within twelve hours the airlines did deliver, the group had their belongings and they were ready to go to work.

After breakfast the next day, they boarded a van for the two and one-half hour trip to their home base. The accomodations were adequate, includ-

ing a conference room which allowed them to have quiet time, and provided a place for worship and fellowship. The Jamaican cooks prepared mostly American dishes, mixing in enough Jamaican entrees to provide a flavor of their country.

As is typical of believers working together, singing became a natural part of everything they did. The local folks commented often on the blessing the


singing was to them.

Devotions every morning preceded their travel to the work sites in two vans. Upon arrival, before beginning actual labors, a prayer was offered seeking the blessings and protection of God. With only minor scrapes and bruises quickly attended to by the nurses who were a part of the team, these prayers were answered.

The site of the center consists of about 100 acres on which up to 200 homes, several light manufacturing facilities, day care facilities and a church, are part of the projected plan. A big concern is that once the children complete their schooling, there is a place for them to go. Unemployment is very high, families are poor, and they have no place to worship. This forces them to take to the streets, a social problem existing in many third world countries.

During the week they spent at the site,

the group had the opportunity to work on the four buildings currently under construction, each in a different stage. The house most complete is occupied by the on-site project manager and his family. Cleaning and arranging rooms, sanding and painting of doors and walls, grading, forming and pouring a sidewalk, and painting of exterior objects were all part of their work. Most of this was completed with simple tools and methods. The next building had rafters in place on about half of the structure. The team cut and fitted more rafters to complete the roof structure, and began installing soffits and stringers for the metal roofing. Also, much chipping and hammering was



needed to fit conduit and electrical boxes in the block and concrete walls.

Most of the footings and several of the walls were in place on the third building. The team laid several courses of blocks and poured two bands of concrete around the cistern. Water is collected from the roofs of buildings as ground water is deep and expensive to obtain. Bucket brigades were deployed to get the concrete to where it was needed. Although effective, it was a very labor intensive process.

The fourth site is going to be a large two story dormitory which when complete will initially house work teams. With the footings already dug, our team spent the week cutting, bending, and wiring reinforcement bars for the footings. A shelter was built next to this site for cover from the sun and rain during construction. A trench was cleaned out and a water line run to the site. Finally, the tool trailer was left clean and well organized for the next work team.

Tired, but content after each day's work, the group looked forward to cold showers and good meals, plus more singing and fellowship. Each member of the work team could testify of the nearness of their Lord. They were impressed with the evidence they saw that these people in another culture were also recipients of the grace and mercies of our Heavenly Father. Jesus Himself referred to sheep which He had who were not of this fold, and them also He must call.

Two side excursions completed the intense experiences. One was a visit to a small hospital for elderly and severely handicapped poor who often find themselves lonely, rejected and starved for attention. The work team was inspired by the simple faith, and the love of God shown by the fact that they knew scripture and hymns by heart.

The second visit was to one of the schools. Although the latest in materials and techniques was not always present, all was clean

and neat. Trades are taught on site, and some graduates find employment at the school. The faculty and administration were clearly committed to their work.

The time spent working together in this labor of love was fullfilling and uplifting. Every experience left an impression which will long linger. Each felt they took something home with them worth much more than they brought in to these dear people.

... The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few; Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest. Matthew 9:37-38

...Go Ye Into all the World



...Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned. St. Mark 16:15-16

After the ascension of Jesus into heaven, the apostles began in earnest to obey His last words of instruction. In the course of this effort, the Apostolic letters were written, eventually being compiled in the volume we know today as the Bible.

Through the centuries, the faith spread across Europe, and as time passed, serious apostasy and doctrinal error occurred. In reading history, one finds accounts of corruption and practices far removed from original apostolic intent and doctrine. This gave rise to evangelists and reformers resulting in the numerous denominations which exist today, the Apostolic Christian Church among them. In order to understand the present, it often helps to review the past.

Samuel Heinrich Froelich (1803-1857) is known as the founder of the Apostolic Christian Church in America. Born in Switzerland, he was the son of a sexton, descended from a French protestant family. Although trained for the ministry in the Protestant state church, he was awakened to scriptural truth and repentance in a manner far different from the lukewarm state church teachings. The story of his life is quite interesting, as the birth struggle not only of a single soul, but a movement which finally reached those of us living today. Even during his training, he wrote of the

attitude of his heart as follows, "In the meantime the might of sin and the power of death had grown up hand in hand with unbelief, since it cannot fail that where the head of the old serpent rises, its members also rise, and of necessity stir. I became enwrapped and entangled in such a horror of sin that I shudder now when I think of it, and the saddest of all was that in accordance with my very principles I could pass over it so lightly and so easily quiet and deceive myself, that I could even formally say to myself, That which I am doing is not sin."

With praise to Almighty God, the time came when this struggling soul came under conviction of the Holy Spirit, and experienced a true conversion, a process which took about eight years. During this time, he entered the ministry of the state church, and was later removed from it because of his doctrine. The breach became total with young Froelich's excommunication from it in 1831. The concept of repentance and conversion, which is the heart of our faith, was strange and foreign to the established church.

He became somewhat of a traveling preacher, and served various groups who were dissatisfied with the state church and had no spiritual leadership. Bro. Froelich had no intention of starting a denomination. In his heart was a burning passion for the purity of the Gospel and bringing it to the lost. Like the apostle Paul hundreds of years before him, he wanted to learn "how with simplicity and shrewdness the Gospel might best be spread." What had began as an individual search for truth, because of his tireless efforts, became a movement that spread throughout Central Europe.

As emigration from Europe to America began in great volume, it was inevitable that the faith of our fathers on that continent would take root and develop in this country. It was in 1847 that a group of farmers in upstate New York had written to Froelich's group,

known as "Evangelical Baptists" in Europe, requesting assistance in spiritual matters. Unable to go himself, Bro. Froelich sent a young man recently ordained an elder. His name was Benedict Weyeneth. This was the beginning of the Apostolic Christian Church in America. The story of these pioneers of faith are well documented, and books are available through Apostolic Christian Publications in Eureka, IL (309/467-3611). The Mission Committee encourages our people to read and learn more of their heritage, which came about through intense struggles and persecution.

Over the years, the faith spread across the nation, and from small beginnings, flourishing congregations grew. This process is continuing today. One of the purposes of the Mission Committee is to encourage and assist new congregations in this country and around the world. Most of our churches begin with just a few members who move and assemble in homes or hotels for a period of time. Ministers are sent on a rotating basis to help them grow. We must recognize that the world begins at our doorstep. As Jesus said to his disciples, "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the labourers are few...'

In keeping with the directives in the Scripture, we encourage one another to lives of godliness and holiness, and a sharing of the Gospel with friends and neighbors. Through the years, seeking souls have been brought to repentance, faith in Christ and a hope for eternity, initiated by an invitation from a friend or neighbor to come to church. These souls found an interest by observing the walk of life of those whose faith was shown by their actions.

The final instructions of Christ to His followers, just before He returned to heaven, were sincerely and seriously given. Today, perhaps as never before, believers should take them to heart and put them into practice. We surely wish to be found working for our Lord when He returns to claim His own.

I fumbled for an answer, not wanting to admit that I habitually send cards that arrive two weeks late or use the telephone instead. Looking at the number of cards in her basket I wondered

(Continued from Page 40) ally wonderful. Needless to say, it contained a blessing that they all needed - the water of life for the natural person.

We also know the record of the king who inherited a vineyard and the rich king wanted to take it away from Naboth, but he refused to do it. Because of that, he got into a very embarrassing situation. Even the king's wife entered into it and tried to lie about the situation and finally did give a false record and so forth. But he felt that he should not give up that parcel of ground because it was given to him, in a sense

In a spiritual sense, we, too, dear ones, especially those who had fathers and grandfathers ahead of us, by the same faith and same mind, that is an heritage to us.

Don't forget that their life, their record and their gift of grace was a help to us, so to speak. The inheritance, even though everyone must need to confess that if we have found grace and faith to believe, it comes from God the Father. But the Lord uses help as He did in Scriptural teachings many times over.

So this parcel of ground was one that was cherished and loved. People came down there to meet and they could fellowship. This woman was one of those on this day that had to come so we could get this lesson. Jesus, being wearied of His journey, sat on this well. Then there came this woman of Samaria and she, of course, was in opposition to the Jewish nation. Everything had to be arranged just this way so that the Lord could perform His work and miracle and prove again that God is no respecter of persons. (See Acts 10:34).

Jesus saith unto this woman, "Give me to drink." (John 4:7) No doubt, that was the natural procedure. But the woman, being one who loved to build on technicalities and respected her nationality, the Samaritan faith, and recognizing Jesus as a Jew, said, "Don't you realize and understand that the Samaritans have nothing to do with the Jews?" (See John 4:9). Now there a technicality was permitted to stand in the way. If the Lord Jesus had listened to her. He could have even withheld His blessings and His teachings, which was so necessary for her, as well as neces-

sary for us.

'How is it that thou, being a Jew, askest drink of me, which am a woman of Samaria?" (John 4:9) She was making an issue of a very small insignificant thing. In religious life and in the life of faith, it meant nothing at all. "How is it that thou, being a Jew, askest drink of me, which am a woman of Samaria? For the Jews have no dealings with the Samaritans." (John 4:9) She was right and she was wrong. That can happen to us, too. We can be right on certain phases of our ideas and our faith and still be very, very wrong in the sight of our God according to Scriptural teachings.

"Jesus answered and said unto her, If you knew . . ." (John 4:10) Now that is putting it squarely, isn't it? That is when people had better wake up. When someone in high authority, in this case it was our own Saviour, Who said, "If you knew the gift of God . . ." That is something again, isn't it? "If you knew the gift of God and Who it is that says to thee, 'Give me to drink,' thou wouldest have asked of him, {instead of thrusting Him away, as to say}, and he would have given thee living water." (See John 4:10.)

"Art thou greater than our father Jacob, which gave us the well, and drank thereof himself, and his children, and his cattle?" (John 4:12) His faith points didn't mean a thing, did they? Because now Jesus again, in a sense, started to open her eyes, spiritual-wise, when He said unto her, "Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again." (John 4:13) She did that. too, didn't she? Time and again, the woman's problem and chore was to come to the well, draw water. take it home on her shoulders, and provide, evidently, for her household and friends. Then she knew she had to drink over and over

"Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again: But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst: but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life." (John 4:13-14) What a wonderful, wonderful promise it is! The Lord Jesus giving water whereby we can drink and not thirst again to those of us who have tasted of the love and goodness of the Father through Jesus Christ! Also for having been forgiven for our sins, having made confession of our sins, having received the peace of God in our hearts, we know what that means.

To be sure, the Christians have their troubles. The Christians have their cross to bear, but so does everybody else. The Christians have their trials and their disappointments in Christian life. They have their problems. They have, so to speak, many other things that bother other people, too.

But they do not thirst after that

type of water that will be their safe and salvation in Jesus Christ, because if they have faithfully been forgiven, they have a promise of life eternal. That is the greatest gift of anything! It is the greatest gift under heaven, and it is filled with blessings from the Lord Jesus.

Now then, the thing about it is this: each one must search their own hearts. Have we believed in Jesus Christ, in the blood of the Saviour for the forgiveness of sin to the extent that we received this great gift that we do not thirst after that? Are we free? Is our conscience free? Is our heart clean and pure in the sight of God? Have you received the fullness of the blessings of this Living Water of God... this fullness of the Holy Spirit?

Now it is one thing to receive the Holy Spirit, but it is still another thing to keep it. Because we are living in a world that is not fit for the kingdom. It is easy to again to get out of the way and into error to receive the gifts of the world out of this time and forget the gifts of the heavenly Father, this Living Water. It must be kept within the heart and within the soul and then we will not thirst after this Living Water, but we will have it.

That is where again the Word comes in and the holy church comes in. When we gather together, like on a Sabbath day or otherwise, or even our own homes, if the blessings rest upon us, we can receive a great lifting up through our cares and override the disappointments of this life just by the Word of God, and by the blessings that we receive from Him.

But if we are careless in our Christian life, and, in a sense, let the Holy Spirit again depart from us, it is very disappointing and very easy to see that we do not receive the fullness of it. If we are not careful in our prayer life, which succeeds this very thing, in fact, the Living Water comes only after prayer and after complete submission to the will of the Lord and to yield to Him. If our will, our heart and our mind is yielded to the Lord and to His teachings, then we can day by day drink of this Living Water and enjoy the fullness.

Now many people do not enjoy

the fullness of a yielded and surrendered life, both converted and unconverted, if they lack in prayer and in deep gravity of prayer and earnestness of faith before the Holy Father. It will show itself even in our everyday life, if we are really in subjection and leading a Godfearing prayer life. It will show itself in our very eyes in our conduct and character. But the greatest thing is each one enjoys the best blessing himself if he lives in that kind of faith and constantly daily drink of this water and life.

That is the way the Lord teaches His children to be clean, unstained, unspotted from sin and the world. The church helps. The Word helps. The fellowship and association of faithful brethren all helps us to

bring this about.

In the days of King Hezekiah, it took sixteen long days to clean the temple because it had been neglected and was not daily cleansed. Our hearts must be cleansed daily by this Living Water, by eating of the Bread of Life, the Word of God, and drinking of the Water of Life. Then, that kind of believer, who is filled with the Holy Ghost and whose heart is carrying about the Holy Ghost wherever he goes, conscience of it, mindful of it, drinking of that Living Water day by day, even hour by hour, if that is possible, he receives the fullness of the blessing of something terrific . . . something wonderful!

That kind of a Christian will also confess the Lord Jesus, and the Lord Jesus Himself said, "He who will deny Me, I will deny before my Father in heaven. But he who confesses Me, I will confess before my Father in heaven." (See Matthew 10:32-33). So, beloved, this wonderful Living Water that the Lord gives us, is something

marvelous.

Now then the woman got a great surprise when the Lord Jesus told her, as He did to us. We had lived in sin and unbelief or at least were careless about our Christian life if we did believe. Many of us were fortunate to have been brought up in Christian homes where we always believed that God was in heaven, the Holy Father. We always believed that Jesus Christ

was the Son of God and that He was the Saviour of the world, that He shed His blood for the forgiveness of sin, but we drug our feet, as we say in everyday language, and hesitated to come to the Lord because we had to yield or surrender certain things that were joyful to us.

But once we saw and once we believed when the Lord pointed out that we were sinful and that we were headed for destruction if we did not repent and conform to the Scripture teachings, we let the Lord look into our hearts, just as He did in this woman's heart here.

No one came to the Lord Jesus and told Him that this woman was an evil and sinful woman, but He had that gift to look into her heart. That is an all astounding thing!

Even today, many of you here believe and many a child, many a Christian, nominal Christians, have been spared, at least, from major sins because they believed that God and the Saviour sees everything. How true it is!

Those very same eyes that saw Eve wrap her hands around the forbidden fruit, and those very same eyes that saw Ananias and Sapphira conspire together to lie, as Peter said, to the Holy Ghost, and those same eyes that looked into the heart of this woman, also looks into our hearts. That is, of course, a shielding thing. That is a wonderful thing if we just keep con-

science of that faith so that we are

very careful in our Christian life.

But when He said to her, "Woman, you don't have a husband. You had five and they are not your husbands." She said, "I think you are a prophet" (See John 4:17-19) "Our fathers worshipped in this mountain, and ye say, that in Jerusalem is the place where men ought to worship. Jesus saith unto her {this truth}, Woman, believe me, the hour cometh, when ye shall neither in this mountain, nor yet at Jerusalem, worship the Father. Ye worship ye know not what: we know what we worship: for salvation is of the Jews. But the hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth; for the Father seeketh such to worship him." (John 4:20-23)

In this generation, we especially have to be thankful. Suppose it would still be like in Old Testament days when we had to go a certain place to worship, to the temple, I would say. There were not too many temples. Or go to the mountainside to worship and build a little altar and bring a sacrifice, an animal or dove, what would happen to millions and millions of people? This is God's world. He foresaw it as we see it today. He even sees the end from the very beginning. He knows that man has to come and worship in faith and in spirit, that we do not have to go to yonder mountain nor to the Wailing Wall of Jerusalem like the Old Testament people had to.

But we can in our own faith and in our own home, according to our dictates but according to the Word, worship God so that He is at least satisfied with us. If our faith is a weak faith, if our prayers are weak prayers, if our understanding is a weak prayer, God knows it, too. He asks sincerity. He asks faith and He asks love. If we have that, then God will surely carry us and give us the needed grace to see and believe because He said.

"God is a Spirit; and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth." (John 4:24)

Now then, when He said to her, "You don't know how to worship," He meant to say, "You don't know how to pray." How true that is. We certainly would have to confess if we found ourselves in that same situation. We prayed at times and simply asked for things that suited our fancy or for our own selfish gain and benefit, and that was not a prayer in the sight and judgment of God nor the Saviour.

But when we once came to light and understanding and prayed for those things for our salvation, that brought light to us. That now even the church is a help to us to be submissive to the Lord. The Apostle Paul said in a defense before the Governor Felix one day, he said, "I exercise myself to be at peace with God and to offend neither God nor man. So the Christian, after all, has a tremendous responsibility and a tremendous thing to keep

himself squared and faithful according to the Word of God.

God is a spirit. We all realize that fully. I think nearly everybody does regard God as a spirit, seated in heaven on His throne as Majesty and the Saviour, Jesus, by Him. But one of the miracles that will still come to pass, as it did when Jesus was upon the face of the earth, they demonstrated His power, not only to call the dead, but He Himself did rise. He said, "No man took Me out of the grave." He was the power of God and lifted Himself from the grave and was transformed into a spirit.

Do you know the happenings at the grave that morning? With tear-stained eyes, Mary was there, and when your eyes are flowing with tears, you don't see very plainly. She could not see though He looked like a man. She said He looked like the gardener, and yet it was Jesus, until He said, "Mary!" Then He was a spirit and He said, "Don't touch Me." Just look at that power!

Here is a human being, as Jesus was, and in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, He is transformed into a spirit! He demonstrated it over again when He came several times to where the apostles were, then He transformed Himself into a spirit. Coming to a closed door, a living person can't come in through locked doors and windows, but the Saviour came in through closed doors. He transformed Himself into flesh the morning they ate breakfast of bread and fish together.

But one day, when the Christians shall be exalted, the saved and believed who are ready to appear at the first resurrection, shall be transformed in the twinkling of an eye. That is going to be one of the greatest miracles that heaven and earth have ever seen or witnessed! Now the great thing, are we going to be among the saved and among the fortunate who also will be among those who will worship Him in truth and in spirit?

May God give everyone the needed light, the strength and grace to believe to serve God the short time that is allotted us that we will be among the fortunate ones to arise in the first resurrection.

SERMON BY DECEASED ELDER BRO. JOE A. GETZ OF MORTON, IL

"God Performs Miracles" John 4:1-26

Many are the examples where the Lord Jesus used different methods of love, shall we say, or to bring people to light and to understanding. This is one of those unusual cases. Now many of them, we might say, are all miracles, from the hand of God to His loving Son, Jesus.

The various apostles touch on it differently. The Lord Jesus, by the touch of His hand, would cure or heal or straighten out many people. For others, He would just look into their hearts and still others, we might say, by remoteness He would be able to correct them.

In this case, He needed to touch the woman with His hand, as He did in the case with the young man who was deaf when He put His fingers in his ears and put His finger on his tongue and said, "Now your ears and mouth will be open in the manhood." He listened and he could talk again.

In the case of the blind man, the Lord Jesus could again just say, "Now you see." But in that case, again the Scripture says that He took His fingers upon those blind eyeballs and touched them. Momentarily, the sight did not come back to the man, and the Lord said to him, "Do you see?" The man said, "I see men as trees." (Mark 8:24) The Lord again gave him further strength and power so he could see. Then he could see beautifully and wonderfully and see the light of

By the word of mouth, the Lord Jesus helped many men. Take Lazarus when he was sleeping in his grave, the Lord did not touch him. He simply called, "Lazarus, come forth." In the case of the storm upon the sea shore, when His own apostles were fearful of losing their lives, the Saviour simply said, "Peace be still." Again, in other cases, He would talk to people as He did to this woman, and it is recorded for us. How the Lord uses various methods of bringing about people by His love and by His sympathy!

In one place, one of the apostles said that He touched many people, but He would not do everything to everybody that came because there was unbelief here. When people rushed up to Him and thought they would be cured of an ailment or a sickness or suffering, He did not always help them because they simply wanted relief from their suffering and did not have faith. In that case, He would do nothing.

On the other hand, when people believed that He was Messiah, as this woman classified Him, or believed He was the Son of God, then the Saviour wanted to do good. But always, not only because He had a heart of love and sympathy, but largely because He wanted to use

the means of sympathy to open the soul and the spirit as He did with this woman.

So often we have heard this passage of Scripture, but there must be a lesson in it again this morning that it fell open for us. So let us systematically again review it. He had to go through this city – an act of God. Those things were not accident, but again, God led Him so this particular passage of Scripture and this miracle could be recorded for us . . . for you and for us . . . and that it would be of a help to us and to help somebody today that they can come to light and come to understanding.

He cometh to this great city which was recognized as a parcel of ground that Jacob gave. Of course, Jacob was one of the patriarchs of faith that many of them loved and that many even, so to speak, worshipped him because of his record of faith. He gave this ground to his son, Joseph, and he gave the well on it. In that generation, like it is today, when one receives inheritance, it is especially cherished, particularly so if it is something tangible, like a piece of property or a piece of land - acreage, so to speak. It is true that many inheritances cannot be cherished to this extent, but in this case, this well was something re-
