## **Light From The Word**

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

#### THE ARMOR OF GOD

A believer's life is on the one hand an ongoing quest for peacefulness (2 Tim. 2:22; Heb 12:14) and on the other hand a warfare against evil that must be engaged continuously (1 Tim. 1:18). These seemingly contrary pursuits require strong determination and can be mastered only by the grace of God.

Our quest to maintain peacefulness involves our relationship with God and with our fellow man: "Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Rom. 5:1) and "If it be possible, as much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men" (Rom. 12:18).

However, our warfare (Eph. 6:12) is "against principalities [Satan's dominion as in Col. 2:15], against powers [worldliness as in Eph. 2:2], against rulers of the darkness of this world [ungodly secular leadership], against spiritual wickedness in high places [deceptive leadership in spiritual matters as in 2 Tim. 4:3]." The purpose of the armor is to ward off spiritual deception: "... that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand" (Eph. 6:13).

Preparation for a lifetime engagement in this spiritual battle begins when an individual repents and becomes a truly converted and dedicated soldier of the Cross. "No man that warreth entangleth himself with the affairs of this life; that he may please him who hath chosen him to be a soldier" (2 Tim. 2:4). The phrase "stand therefore" (Eph. 6:14) is indicative of a well grounded, fully prepared soul, unquestionably ready to put on the whole armor of God. Armor includes all equipment needed to win the battle, both protective elements (such as the breastplate and helmet) as well as an aggressive weapon (the sword).

To have the loins girded with truth signifies the strength which is derived

from truth (Eph. 6:14). One cannot "grow in grace" (2 Pet. 3:18) without building upon the solid foundation of biblical truth. This requires that we give diligence to "rightly dividing the Word of truth" (2 Tim. 2:15), which means carefully, prayerfully and correctly interpreting the Word of God.

Perversions of the truth include tactics that are within the boundaries of the civil law but are not altogether aligned with the law of righteousness (1 Cor. 10:23). We are not to give moral or financial support to those who pursue activities in the name of Christianity but whose doctrine is not altogether founded on the truth (2 John 10). The child of God is to practice total honesty in everything: "Provide things honest in the sight of all men" (Rom. 12:17). There is a saying that "honesty is the best policy." For the believer honesty is the only policy. Our behavior toward everyone should be Spirit-motivated, kind and without partiality: "The wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, and easy to be entreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality and without hypocrisy" (Jam. 3:17).

The "breastplate" (Eph. 6:14), consists of righteousness (right living, correctness) and is the major protector of the heart (the inner man). It is displayed in our personality, emotions and other aspects of our character. It is readily observed by others: "...let your conversation [behavior] be as becometh the gospel of Christ..." (Phil. 1:27).

A soldier in Bible times with "feet shod" (Eph. 6:15) had his sandals tightly bound giving him good speed and sure footing. This is figurative of the believer's readiness of mind and body to lay hold of the grace of God, to "stand fast in the faith" (1 Cor. 16:13), and "to be ready to every good work" (Tit. 3:1).

"The shield of faith" (Eph. 6:16)

denotes sincere belief that is firmly grounded in the truth of God's Word. The shield of faith has the capability to protect us from all tactics (fiery darts) which the evil principalities and powers would use against us. Since quenching the fiery darts doesn't diminish the source, the use of the shield requires persistence, alertness, and skill that can only come from unwavering loyalty to Christ and His Word. As Joshua of old, we must continually affirm that, "as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord" (Josh. 24:15).

"The helmet of salvation" (Eph. 6:17) is figurative of the preservation of our blessed hope: "If ye continue in the faith grounded and settled, and be not moved away from the hope of the gospel, which ye have heard..." (Col. 1:23).

"The sword of the Spirit" (Eph. 6:17) is the fulfillment of God's promise to give each believer aggressive power over sin. We use the sword (God's Word) to sever unfruitful and unholy things from our lives. There should be no ambiguity in our dealing with impulses to compromise with sin: "For the Word of God is quick and powerful and sharper than any two-edged sword . . . and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart" (Heb. 3:12).

Even after being wholly armed, full success will still require much prayer and watchfulness on the part of all the brethren. We should dedicate ourselves to praying for all the saints. We all deeply appreciate other's prayers and should be mindful of the fact that the fierce spiritual battle in which we are all engaged requires marshalling all of our forces in a united effort against the enemy of our souls. "Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints" (Eph. 6:18).



As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. GALATIANS 6:10

#### A Special Report

In April of 1994, four brothers visited the Galilean Home in Liberty, Kentucky for the purpose of evaluating the work and reporting to the World Relief Committee. Following is a condensation of their findings.

Galilean Home Ministries are run by Sandy and Jerry Tucker, for the purpose of caring for homeless, abandoned, and handicapped children from around the world. The couple shared their purposes as well as their financial status with these brothers.

Many of the residents have severe mental or physical impairments. At any one time, 70 to 80 special children are being cared for in the home. Some of these babies were born to women in prisons and could not remain with the mothers. It is the need for a facility for these children, termed *Born Free*, which is the subject of this report.

The brothers were impressed by the loveliness of the early spring morning, the rustic surroundings in the beautiful hill country, but most of all by the circumstances of the little tots who had no other place of refuge, that received care here. The buildings range from old to new, good and poor conditions, but all with only the very basic support systems. Poorly insulated, they can be quite cold in the winter months.

Jerry and Sandy Tucker embrace a doctrine similar to our own, and have a goal of teaching the children Biblical truth while ministering to their human needs. The children in the home are in four categories:

- 1) Normal children.
- 2) Severely handicapped.

Born Free children.

 Children from foreign nations who could not receive medical help at home, and are kept here until fit to return to their country.

Their private school, as well as daily needs, are supplied by a large staff of paid and volunteer workers sensitive to and capable of meeting the special requirements. It was obvious that the entire operation is run in a very frugal manner. The stock of food in the warehouse made it clear that the menu of the day was determined primarily by what was available, not necessarily what they would like to serve.

Many of the crowded bedrooms are in violation of Kentucky building codes, but the inspectors, knowing there is virtually no place else to care for these children, simply look the other way. Sleeping in one room, are 20-24 children on bunks three feet apart. Some of these need care virtually around the clock. The brothers were impressed by the many acts of kindness and devotion of the people who provided this special care.

The recommendation from this group, which was presented to and approved by the World Relief Committee, was to provide a dormitory for the Born Free children. Estimated costs are \$80,000 for the materials, with drawings and permits covered by a special donation. It is intended that our brethren will construct the building.

To coordinate this project, it will be necessary to have brethren volunteer as on site construction managers.

They would need to stay throughout the project. Daily workers could donate time as they are so moved and able to do. Target dates to do this construction are presently in the spring of 1995. Any brethren having an interest in responding to this appeal, kindly contact:

s the faith initiated by the fiery young evangelist Samuel Froelich spread across Europe in the middle of the nineteenth century, congregations sprang up in many areas. Most of these "Nazarenes" first met in homes, building assembly houses as funds and circumstances permitted. For

most of these pilgrims of the faith, life was difficult at its best. Our European brethren today are products of their heredity and culture, as each

of us are also.

The boundary lines across Europe were far different a century ago than today. The relocation of borders with dramatic changes in government is having a major impact on our brethren at the present time. It is apparent that we have reached a turning point in the history of the world. As old orders pass away with new ones taking their places, only God knows what the future holds for His people. The relaxing of the stern discipline and oppression of former regimes has given our brethren the opportunity to work with and assist one another in ways that did not exist just a short time ago. The brethren in the USA are trying to respond to these opportunities in a manner acceptable to God and one another.

The most recent change in the country formerly known as Czechoslovakia has been the peaceful division into the Czech and Slovak republics. Although both are made up of ethnic Slavic peoples, each has an individual history. The Czech portion was formerly Bohemia, where few Nazarenes settled. There have been members of our faith in Slovakia for nearly 150 years, stemming from the efforts of brethren who moved from Switzerland into Hungary, bringing the faith with them. As time passed, believers moved across the area, establishing 10 or 12 Slovakian congregations. The 20th century brought with it the impact of two world wars followed by many years of Communist rule, which took a heavy toll on these struggling souls.



All religious groups were required to register in order to qualify for permission to hold services, but doing so involved compromises with their faith that our brethren were not willing to make. With no official status, they had to assemble in secret, and when discovered, as they often were, imprisonment resulted. Members were jailed for 2 years, with ministers receiving 5 year terms. Many brethren suffered several terms over the years. Scars from these experiences, both physical and emotional, will remain as

long as they live.

Although present requirements for registering religious groups are acceptable to our brethren, they are still having a difficult time doing so. They have been told that they must have at least 20,000 members to qualify for registering. They are now appealing this regulation by using the record that their faith has existed in this land for nearly 150 years. It is important to gain full recognition, otherwise church buildings must be titled to individuals, which is undesirable for many reasons.

The instability resulting from the breakup of Communism is a real fact of life in this work. Property ownership is not always clear, and because of inflation, often families are not willing to sell anything. This makes it hard to find places to build churches. In February, 1992, the sum of \$34,000 was transferred to the Slovaks from Mission Committee funds. In our meeting in July, 1994, they gave a full account of this. At Malinec, three rooms of an old house were remodeled providing an assembly room for 30 people. An older sister also lives in this house. Although hampered by the difficulties stated, the brethren are trying to purchase the entire property, which they hope to achieve by year's end.

> In Zemberovce (20-30) persons) and Selice (10-15 persons) brethren are gathering in private homes, with attempts for purchase of

property under way in each place. The instability of both society and currency is causing delays. In the mean time, funds are being held for use when the way opens. \$10,000 of the funds were used to buy a new van and a used car. giving them means to get people to services. An excerpt from their report is printed below:

"We would like to assure all (US) brothers that we use and will use offered help with God's will as a gift of love from believers in USA. as modestly and as sparingly as possible in holy Godly awe for needs to the Church of believers in Christ Nazarene in Slovakia. Through our prayers we thank the Lord God and all believers in USA and also all brothers of committees for demonstrating to us love and solicitude with appeal, that Lord God would return your blessing and give all of you everlasting peace."

The U.S. brethren working with these projects also extend sincere thanks to everyone for your love, prayers, and support of these efforts. Only God knows how long it will be possible to continue the work, but while the way is open, we hope to be a support and encouragement to fellow pilgrims struggling for eternal rest.

## GATEWAY WOODS APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME Jeff Schumacher

As I sit down to write this month's Silver Lining article for Gateway Woods, I struggle because I personally have not been around much to know what has been going on. As a few of you might know, I had back surgery on September 2. This was quite an ordeal for my wife and I. But I also found out what an ordeal it was for my oldest son and what he saw my role as in our house.

One night as Jonathan was getting ready for bed, my wife went in to pray with him because I was in quite a lot of pain. At the end of his prayer he spoke these words, "Dear Jesus, please come into my heart so that I may have a light heart. And Jesus, please heal my daddy's back; will you please do that for me Jesus, so that me and Zachary and mommy can jump on him again. Thank you Jesus." A toy. That is what my son missed the most. Well, needless to say I was just a little let down, but we got quite a chuckle out of that prayer. We were later able to give Jonathan a very good lesson from this prayer.

Our sons have a children's tape that recounts the story of the centurion soldier (Matthew 8:8-10):

"The centurion answered and said, Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof: but speak the word only, and my servant shall be healed. For I am a man under authority, having soldiers under me: and I say to this man, Go, and he goeth; and to another, Come, and he cometh; and to my servant, Do this, and he doeth it. When Jesus heard it, he marvelled, and said to them that followed, Verily I say unto you, I have not found so great faith, no, not in Israel."

One night after my surgery, Jonathan came up and asked how my back was doing. When I responded that it was getting better, he gave me one of his big, ear-to-ear grins and said, "Jesus did answer my prayer". Remembering the song and his prayer, we discussed that fact that he had asked Jesus into his heart and requested that Jesus heal my back. I was able to show him that as a child under Christ's authority, Jesus was sure to answer his prayer.

As I thought about this in a larger context, I was amazed at how often I, as a child of God, often forget that I am a man under authority, and just how important it is to show that to my wife and children. They need to see that I am under the authority and headship of Christ so that they have a model of submission to follow and model their lives after. This is especially important for my sons to see this modeled.

Being under the authority of Christ is not always an easy task. Sometimes He may request us to do something that is not comfortable (like confront another brother or sister, go and ask forgiveness where we have fallen short of His glory, etc.). When we have Christ in our hearts, serving and obeying Him are an option. It is my deepest wish that no one choose not to obey, but it is human nature to avoid doing things that are uncomfortable for us (author included). God does not

call us to strive to perfect humanness, but He calls us to strive to be Christ-like.

Is God asking you to do something that is challenging? Uncomfortable? Uncertain? Different than what you are used to? Are you obeying His call? Do you have the faith that the centurion had, that God will supply all your needs? If not, I strongly urge you to pray, have patience, listen and heed His calling to the vineyard so that His work might be furthered through you, His child.

My son had the faith to believe that Jesus would answer his prayer and supply his needs. Do you have the faith to believe that Christ can answer your prayers?

Very often, my reactions are totally negative, as was that of the barbarians to Paul. I know who should listen to what part of what sermon. I know who would be better off if they would only...and the list continues. What is worse, is that I sometimes verbalize my reactions and speak to others about someone I am judging. Also, in like manner, I seem to be no wiser than the barbarians if I change my mind and think a person can do no wrong, that his/her life is easy, that I should pattern my life in that same direction, forgetting my God's example.

"What is man, that thou art mindful of him?"

Psalm 8:4

Dear Lord, protect me, please, with the reminder that my words must pass through more than one filter before I speak: not only is it true? but also is it kind? and is it necessary? Once Thou hast helped me control my tongue, let me know, Lord, that my thoughts must yet be purged.

The billboard said "Through Unity is Power". We are not engaged in a political process; however, the sign has meaning for us as Christians, especially as a member of the part of His body called Apostolic Christians. We need to be more united. I didn't mean to write this, but I spent part of my afternoon with four fifteen-year-old girls. They had had words about each other because "someone said you said...". I tried to suggest to them that remembering last year's statements was unproductive nor did they need to listen to someone else's current words, supposedly said about themselves or about others. Yet, these kinds of human relations problems are sometimes a major factor in students' inability to concentrate on their real tasks. learning and studying. Have we been guilty of such disunity within our body? Have we been distracting one another from our true mission, that we show our love one to another, that day by day we are reflectors of Christ's truth and goodness and oneness with the Father, that we are willing witnesses to others of His Word and Spirit?

As I visited with a young friend in prison, he mentioned how the Lord had been teaching him about the feast prepared for us all---but that we have the choice to be ready to partake of the Lord's bounty or to refuse the invitation.

## SERMON BY BRO. WILLIAM J. DOTTERER OF PHOENIX, AZ

"Be Merciful And Judge Not" Luke 6:20-49

Perhaps it has occurred to you as it has often occurred to me, what must have it been like to have been in the presence of the Master as He was bringing His good message---His new Gospel---as He was bringing the Word, which the Heavenly Father had Him to bring. It must have been a very strange message to many, a comforting message to some, and a condemning message to some. But it was certainly very different from that which they were used to.

I don't know how it is for you, but I can say that for myself, I find that continually over and over again, I need to be reminded of the truths of the message of Jesus Christ. Because it is a message that is so contrary to my flesh, it is so contrary to my nature, but yet, it is the Word of Truth and the Word of Life.

Certainly it behooves us to very seriously consider the words of the Master. The setting here, as we mentioned, was He had chosen His twelve special disciples, and He had come down with them. He was on the plain, there was a great multitude there, it says, and they came to be healed of diseases. Many were healed! It even says, "The whole multitude sought to touch him: for there went virtue out of him and [He] healed them all." Luke 6:19

He did not stop there, though. They were very interested, no doubt many were, in being physically healed, as it is not pleasant to be sick. It is not pleasant to have a physical infirmity or a mental infirmity, but Jesus did not stop there. Jesus could have healed and can today heal all the illnesses of everyone in the world, but Jesus came for a higher mission. Because if our body is healed and if our body is healthy and if until the end of our

days here upon the earth we have a healthy body and a pleasant life, and spend eternity separated from the eternal God, then it has been a waste. It has been a loss.

Jesus was interested in more than just healing their physical bodies. As He began to teach them Words of Truth and Words of Life and He taught them things which, as we look at them at first glance today, the natural inclination again can be that this is almost nonsense. Perhaps many of them at that time thought the same thing, but as we recognize that these are Words of God, we recognize that it is not nonsense. It is Words of Truth and Life.

But He began by speaking to them, "Blessed be ye poor...". Luke 6:20. If we were to go out on the street corner today, or go into an area where there are people who are financially poor and say, "Blessed are ye poor," they might really wonder what we are talking about. Maybe many of those at that time also wondered what He was talking about.

But He said, "...for yours is the kingdom of God." Those who hunger are blessed for they shall be filled. If they weep, they are blessed because they are going to laugh. (See Luke 6:20-21). As we think about these words, we just can ask ourselves the question, "What was Jesus talking about?" What kind of "poorness" was He talking about, and what kind of hunger was He talking about, and what kind of weeping was he talking about?

As we read further in the Scriptures, we consider the life of Jesus and the life of His apostles and their teachings, and the things that they did and things that they did not do and the things that they valued and those things they found to be of little worth. We find that if we are poor in heart and recognize the poverty of our heart and our spirit, that that poverty can be filled up to overflowing by the blessings of the Almighty God.

If we hunger and thirst after righteousness, we can be filled. If we weep because of sorrow for disappointing our Lord for sins we have committed or for a lack of love for Him, and if we truly sorrow for that and ask His forgiveness, we can receive a wonderful peace. Even as He says, "For you shall laugh."

Then He gets a little bit deeper into it when He pronounces a blessing upon those whom men shall hate and "shall separate you from their company, and shall reproach you, and cast out your name as evil, for the Son of man's sake." Luke 6:22. Now it is not blessed to just be plain separated from the company of men. It is not blessed to just being reproached, or having our name cast out as evil, but if it is for the Son of Man's sake, then it is blessed.

If it should be our lot that at some time or other, or maybe even often, in some cases it may be often, if we are reproached for the Son of Man's sake, then we can recognize that we are blessed by the Heavenly Father. We should even rejoice and leap for joy.

Then we might wonder, does He really mean what He is saying here, or is it literally true that we are supposed to rejoice and leap for joy? We can think of the lives of the apostles and how it was that the Apostle Paul and the Apostle Peter and John and many of the apostles were mistreated by men. They bore

reproach and their name was cast as evil for the sake of the Son of man.

What did they do? We have an account of Paul being in prison, and another disciple being with him in prison. They had been beaten and they were in a miserable place. It was not a nice place to be. It may have been damp and it may have been in a hole someplace. I suppose there were roaches around and flies and mosquitoes and maybe there were rats there. They had been beaten so I suppose there were open wounds on their body and probably the insects were biting them and their feet were in the stocks.

But then He pronounced a woe. Over and over again, as we read the Scriptures, we find it so contrary to that which the natural man would expect. We would expect that those who were poor are disadvantaged and those who are rich are blessed. But He said, "But woe unto you that are rich! for ye have received your consolation." Luke 6:24. That is a topic that is talked about much in the Scripture--the topic of money. Jesus Himself said, "It is so difficult for those who are rich to enter into the Kingdom of Heaven." Here He pronounced a woe because they had received their consolation.

Woe unto those who were full for they were going to hunger, and to those who laugh now for they would mourn and weep. (See Luke 6:25). If we have the choice of living a pleasant life for sixty, eighty, or one hundred years, and then spend eternity in separation from God, or live really a persecuted life in this flesh, and then forever be with the Lord, it is a simple decision, isn't it, as to which is the better deal? It is far better for us if it is the Lord's will if we would have things not nice at all in this lifetime, that we might be with God in eternity.

Then, it almost seems as He continues to teach here and to speak that it just gets deeper and deeper.

After having told them, and told us of the blessings of being deprived of what the world calls good, He tells us of the way that we should treat those who are our enemies and who use us despitefully. Not only should we rejoice if we are found worthy to suffer for His name's sake, but we should love our enemies. He said, "...do good to them which hate you. Bless them that curse you, and pray for them which despitefully use you." Luke 6:27-28.

As we progress down these teachings, at least it occurs to me, it is drawing us closer and closer to the pattern to which Jesus Himself lived. Because in terms of material wealth, Jesus did not claim it. He could have, but He did not. In terms of being accepted or rejected, He was accepted by some, certainly, as many received Him and were glad to hear His teachings, but those who were in authority at that time, by and large, rejected Him.

Jesus did love His enemies. He loved those that hated Him. He did good to them that hated Him. He blessed them that cursed Him, and prayed for them which despitefully used Him. He did offer the other cheek. When He was smitten on one cheek. He offered the other cheek. His cloak, also, was taken away from Him and that, of course, was most dramatically done and most powerfully done at Calvary where Jesus, in the supreme demonstration of love, one which never has nor ever will be surpassed in this earth, Jesus gave His life.

Jesus did not give His life for good people. He gave His life for sinners. Jesus was willing upon the cross to not only bear the physical reproaches of men, not only have His head hit by a rod when it had a crown of thorns on it, not only be spit upon and be mocked, but He was willing to go far beyond that and He was willing to take our sins upon Himself.

Perhaps we often thought about that and maybe tried to think what it would be like and recognize that we just can't come close to thinking of what it would be like for a perfect God to take upon Himself the sins of wicked mankind. But that is what Jesus did. So it is helpful to myself to be reminded that, yes, Jesus did mean what He said. He showed, if by no other way, He showed He meant it by what He did.

It has been said that really the only way we can demonstrate how we believe and the faith that we have, is the way that we live. If we believe that a given food is really poisonous for us, we will tend not to eat that food, unless maybe we are mentally ill. If we eat that food, it kind of demonstrates that we really don't think it is poisonous for us. Jesus demonstrated that He loves not only those who were His friends, but He loved those who were His enemies because He died for the vilest sinner.

The Word instructs us that we shall love those who despitefully use us. I don't find that at all easy to do. I don't do a very good job of it, but the Scripture tells us that it is important for us to do it.

"And as ye would that men should do to you, do ye also to them likewise." Luke 6:31. Then He talked about love. He said if you just love those that love you, you really aren't doing any better than the sinners do. We want to do better than the sinners do. If we just do good to those that do good to us, even the sinners do that. If we just lend to those of whom we hope to receive again, even sinners do that. We want to do better than the sinners do.

But Jesus said, "But love ye your enemies, and do good, and lend, hoping for nothing again: and your reward shall be great, and ye shall be the children of the Highest: for

he is kind unto the unthankful and to the evil." Luke 6:35. He is kind to them and we should be also. I think it is a natural inclination for us, but if we do help someone and they are very appreciative, it makes us feel good. If they are unappreciative, there is a tendency for many of us, at least, to think, 'Well, I guess I'm not going to help them again." But that is not what the teaching of Jesus is. He said here that the Heavenly Father "is kind unto the unthankful and to the evil." Luke 6:35. What a contrast to what our natural inclinations would be!

He tells us, "Be ye therefore merciful, as your Father also is merciful." Luke 6:36. If we ever wonder just how merciful ought we to be, we have the instruction here, "...as your Father also is merciful." We can ask the question. Maybe each one of us can ask ourselves the question, "How merciful has God been to me?" We recognize that God has been very merciful to us because we didn't deserve the goodness that God has given to us. We don't deserve the close fellowship that we can have with Him. But His mercy is such that He permitted it. We should be thankful and we should also be merciful.

He then speaks about judging and He told the people there, "Judge not, and ye shall not be judged: condemn not, and ve shall not be condemned...". Luke 6:37. That is a teaching which has often been a confusing teaching, and the word "judge" apparently has several different meanings in the Scripture. We can read in some places in the Scripture where judgment was taken away and it was not a desirable thing that judgment was taken away. It even speaks prophetically of our Lord and Saviour. In His humiliation, His judgment was taken away. It was not pleasant for Jesus to have His judgment taken away.

Yet, the Word teaches us about judging very sober teachings. It indicates in several places about not judging. Also, it indicates in other places that we must judge and judge righteous judgment.

I think that at least one understanding that we can have of judgment is that we are all going to be judged. That is just part of God's plan. He could have set things up a different way, but the way it is set up is that we are all going to be judged. Those of us who have been privileged to hear His Word, to have faith, and to have some understanding of His way are privileged to receive that judgment in this lifetime.

I very desperately desire to be judged and I want it to happen in this lifetime. Now it is best, if I understand the Scriptures correct, that I judge myself; that I be not judged, if I judge myself. I can look into the Word and ask the Holy Spirit to reveal to me the things that are wrong in my life and thereby judge myself. I think that is the best way if I follow the Scriptures correctly.

But if it doesn't happen that way and I am in need of judgment, I desire that my brother or my sister help me to receive judgment. They may come to me, hopefully not in a condemning way, but in a true demonstration of love and help me to realize my necessity for judgment. If I don't listen to my brother or my sister, if I understand the Word correctly, then the church has the obligation to help me to receive judgment, because I am going to be judged and I want it to happen in the flesh.

If I understand it right in all of these situations thus far, we have the option individually of receiving the judgment or rejecting the judgment. We have a lament in the Scripture in the Old Testament where God said, and I can't quote it exactly, but something to the extent that God was lamenting the fact that the people had not received His correction. He had corrected them in vain. We individually can choose to reject the judgment of God in this lifetime.

But if we do, the Bible tells us that we are all going to stand before the judgment seat of Christ and I certainly don't want myself nor any of us to have to be judged there because the judgment there is an eternal judgment, and an eternal separation from the Heavenly Father.

So let us desire for ourselves judgment as we need it to the end that we might be purified and be able to escape having to have our sins judged on Judgment Day. Then with respect to each other, let us be careful that we are not quick to condemn one another. It is only God that sees the heart and it may well be that an action that I do or that you do might look to someone (let's just put it this way), maybe an action that you do might look to me like it is something which is really off target. Now, what should I do? Maybe the natural inclination would be that I am going to think condemningly of you. I should not, if I understand the Word correctly.

But then, neither should I ignore that because I believe the Word teaches us that we are our brother's keeper. The Word gives us instruction. In fact, we read it further in this chapter that the direction that we are to follow is, as we observe (and of the example given in the Scripture by the Lord and Saviour), was that if we behold a mote in our brother's eye, what should we do?

Now a mote is probably not very big, but yet it doesn't take something very big to impair our vision or to be uncomfortable to us. Or, maybe even to cause blindness. So what do we do?

Well, we first examine ourselves

because it may be there is something bigger in our eye. If our vision is impaired, we should not expect to have very good success taking a mote out of our brother's eye. We certainly would desire that any surgeon who would perform eye surgery on us could see pretty good himself.

So what we are first to do is to be sure there is no obstruction in our own eye. So we are to examine ourselves. We ought to seek to be judged. If we find something in our eye, what we are supposed to do is remove it. Get it out of our eye that we ourselves might see clearly.

Now I think it is worth noting that Jesus did not say to stop at that point. The instructions did not stop. He said, "Thou hypocrite, cast out first the beam out of thine own eye, and then shalt thou see clearly to pull out the mote that is in thy brother's eye." Luke 6:42. The motive that which we should have, should be love...that we love our brother and we desire that our brother see clearly.

There can be a fleshly desire to kind of set things straight...to straighten up our brother or our sister. I don't believe that is the kind of desire the Scripture is approving of. What it should be is that our brother might see more clearly. Our brother, if necessary, might receive judgment in this lifetime but he does not have to receive judgment in eternity. So our motive should be the well-being, the eternal well-being, of our brother or our sister.

It has often occurred to me that, perhaps, is among the best explanations of the kind of love that Jesus wants us to have. A love which is not a love that brings pleasure to ourself, and there are kinds of love that can do that, but the kind of love that seeks the welfare of the object of our love.

Now certainly we have people that we love; mothers, fathers, grandparents, aunts, uncles, or children, or spouses or grandchildren that we love very much, and the love that we have for them usually makes us feel good. We enjoy being with them, and that is good, but I believe the kind of love that the Scripture speaks most highly of, and is most important, is the love that desires the well-being of the object of our love. I think that is borne out by the Saviour Himself.

The Bible tells us "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son...". He gave His Son! "...that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3:16. That love which God had for His fallen mankind was then most perfectly demonstrated at the cross.

Certainly it was demonstrated by Jesus leaving Heaven to come here upon this sinful world, but it was demonstrated most perfectly when Jesus, there upon the cross, did bear our sins, and He who was with God in the beginning and thought it not robbery to be equal with God was willing to allow Himself to be separated from the Heavenly Father. That was not pleasant for Jesus. The nails in His hands were not pleasant. The crown of thorns on His brow was not pleasant. Being mocked and spit upon and rejected by men was not pleasant.

But it often seems to me what was most terrible was being separated from His God. At the time when He bore our sins there, He became sinful in the eyes of God, and He who was without sin became the most sinful creature that ever walked on the face of the earth. If my understanding is wrong, I hope one of these brothers will correct it, but it often seemed that way to me.

In that sinful condition, God forsook Him. I believe I have been told that the only time Jesus addressed God as God was there upon the cross. When He cried out in anguish and agony, He said, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" Mark 15:34. But God, of course, did not utterly forsake Him, and when Jesus paid the price and was able to die, then He, of course, was resurrected and is now with the Heavenly Father.

I believe a point that we should not forget is that the motivation for our interaction with our brothers and sisters and the friends of the truth and those who are enemies should be a sincere desire for the eternal well-being of their neverdying soul.

He talked about a tree bringing forth fruit and that we know a tree by its fruit. I know there are some people who are very well educated in what kind of tree the various kinds are. But a pretty easy way for many of us is to look at the fruit for what kind of tree it is. Is it an orange tree, or an apple tree, or is it a pear tree, or whatever it might be? That is the way we are known also.

As we desire to be known of men as being followers of God, it is a lot more effective for us to bear fruit that demonstrates that we are believers than it is for us to tell them that we are believers. But seek to bear the kind of fruit that the Master would be pleased with.

Finally, He said, "And why call ye me, Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I say?" Luke 6:46. Over and over in the Scriptures, we find how important it is to do what the Word tells us to do. It was true in the Old Testament and it is true in the New Testament also that we must do what God tells us to do...what the Lord tells us to do. If we do it, then we are like a man that built a house on a good foundation and when the storm came, it did not fall.

The goal is to help keep alive--for this and coming generations, so long as the Lord tarries--the deeds and the dedicated pursuit of godliness of those dear souls who have gone on before us in faith, often amid much trial and privation.

Our brethren, over the years, have attempted to keep a true doctrine despite being surrounded by other shades of belief. Mead's Handbook of Denominations in the United States includes a general list of 220. The Encyclopedia of American Religions more specifically lists 1,200.

Included in these listings is our Apostolic Christian Church. With approximately 12,000 members and 10,000 children and unbaptized adults, our church comprises a thin slice-about 1/100th of 1 percent of our nation's population. Today we continue on, by God's grace, with 86 churches in 23 states, 2 in Canada, and 3 in Japan. Worship services are also held on several university campuses.

Our doctrinal depth, and devotion to faithfulness, while not reflecting great numbers, is nonetheless worthy of note. The root and foundation from which our beliefs have grown is worthy of our special focus. A famous statesman once said, "The further back you can look, the further ahead you can see." In this, we are wise to examine the past and the development of our church, both in Europe and in the United States. We have much to learn, both from the victories and the setbacks of our foreparents. If we fail to examine the past, we can perhaps fall prey to many of the religious falsehoods that surround us. The old adage that "history repeats itself" is a true one.

In pursuing the history and godly deeds of our predecessors, the intent is not to lift up any one person or persons. Some of our leaders performed wonderful deeds, and labored with a strong sense of sacrifice and diligence; and we as readers can often become very impressed with what they did. Yet, in "Remembering", a sincere effort will be made to focus on what God did through men and women, rather than what they as humans accomplished. It is through God's power and grace that we, as His weak and unworthy servants, can do His work and fulfill His will.



Some people think the Christian life is hard. What do you think? The Lord Jesus Christ said, "For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." Matthew 11:30. The Apostle Paul wrote "Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice." Philippians 4:4.

When I repented it was hard for me to make the break---I even cried about giving up some of my activities with farm youth organizations. I do not wish such a struggle for anyone else, but for me it did help in the process of becoming broken. Things that are hard can have spiritual benefits if we can endure it with courage and optimism. If we become bitter and resentful, the spiritual benefits are lost.

The early church had a conference concerning how hard it should be to become a Christian, and to live a Christian life. There were strong feelings on both sides of the issue but Peter said, "Now therefore, why tempt ye God, to put a yoke upon the

neck of the disciples, which neither our fathers nor we were able to bear?" The issue at that time was circumcision and keeping the law of Moses.

We come now to the matter of obedience, which is important. The Lord Jesus Christ said, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven." Now then. how hard is it to do the will of our Heavenly Father? There are many New Testament teachings, some of which may be hard for some of the believers. To live for self and the devil can be hard, too; terribly hard with more dire consequences. What we should do is avoid laying unnecessary burdens on one another while rejoicing in living the surrendered life. Jesus said, "My yoke is easy, and my burden is light."
