Harvest Time - Send The Reapers Forth

... Pray ye therefore the Lord of the Harvest, that He would send forth labourers into his harvest. (Luke 10:2)

Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130).

COMPETITION

Competition normally exists either as rivalry between persons or as a driving force within one's self for personal achievement. Few of our ambitions or efforts in life are completely free from exposure to competition. An ideal competitive inclination was expressed by the Apostle Paul when he wrote, "...but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 3:13). However, not all competitive ambitions are that pure, and many are detrimental to virtuous conduct.

Our competitive inclinations likely have roots in our early childhood experiences when we were striving to learn to walk, talk and play with other children. Our parents and others who helped us in those challenges taught us that kindness, patience, and reason should control our competitive desires.

In school we were encouraged to be intensely competitive. This benefitted our progress as a student, but along with that striving for achievement, we had rules to guide us in the management of our behavior. Obedience to those rules helped us to build upon the fundamentals of sound social ethics that had begun in us through the exemplary teaching of our parents. A person with a regenerated heart uses that same principle of laying a foundation and then building upon it when he uses God's Word for the rule and God's Spirit for the power to gain control over all of his human desires: "Therefore leaving the principles of the doctrine of Christ, let us go on unto perfection" (Heb 6:1).

Believers in Christ should be motivated by the Holy Spirit in all their endeavors. This was true for Paul, who when heading for Jerusalem could say, "and now, behold, I go bound in the spirit. . ." (Acts 20:22). They should live by a higher and more perfect standard than either civil law or social ethics: "all things are lawful for me, but all things

are not expedient: all things are lawful for me, but all things edify not" (1 Cor. 10:23). Adherence to this divine guidance in controlling our competitive desires brings with it a divine promise: "But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed" (Jam. 1:25).

Inherent with becoming a believer is to have the devil as an adversary (1 Pet. 5:8). He is a master at promoting competitive indulgences. If Satan has success with this approach it will be manifested in a variety of forms such as strife between brethren (Gal. 5:20); excessive desire to increase personal wealth, prestige or power, "I will pull down my barns and build greater . . . (Luke 12:18); and competitive activities for personal entertainment, "ye have lived in pleasure on the earth, and been wanton [given to enjoyment of the senses]" (Jam. 5:5). To prepare us for this struggle, Christ has provided us with His very own mind by which we can discern between spiritual and carnal motives (1 Cor. 2:16; 3:3).


Competitive striving against others is evidence of pride as "only by pride cometh contention" (Prov. 13:10). Athletic competition generally requires that an opponent be defeated or suffer loss. The prideful motivation of excelling at someone else's expense is sternly warned against in the Word: "For we dare not make ourselves of the number. or compare ourselves with some that commend themselves: but they measuring themselves by themselves, and comparing themselves among themselves, are not wise" (2 Cor. 10:12). To present ourself to others as someone more worthy or more capable than they, reduces our own effectiveness and creates a burden to others. Rather, the Word teaches: "he that glorieth, let him glory in the Lord. For not he that commendeth himself is approved, but whom the Lord commendeth" (2 Cor. 10:17-18).

For us to humbly, rather than contentiously, make use of our personal abilities to serve Christ and His church is a delight to God: "...what does the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God" (Micah 6:8).

In occupational pursuits it is often necessary for us to compete in order to get the job, obtain the advancement, sell the product or get the contract, etc. Although this can be acceptable and may be expected in some instances, we must be very careful that it is done within the guidelines in the Word (Eph. 6:5-9). Paul expected Onesimus to be profitable to Philemon (Philmn. 11, 16). He also expressed his confidence to Philemon that he would be fair to Onesimus, not using his leadership role in the church (vs. 1, 7, 21) or his wealth to a competitive advantage aimed at making gain at the expense of Onesimus. Their spiritual relationship as peaceful brethren was greater profit to both of them than anything that could have been gained from their occupational relationship (vs. 16-21).

Competitive entertainment such as athletic contests poses dangers to the believer in several ways besides the wasting of precious time. It promotes revellings, emulations, strife and seditions (divisions) (Gal. 5:20-21), all of which are to be crucified in those who belong to Christ (Gal. 5:24). To indulge ourselves in highly emotional events for fleshly enjoyment creates a filling of the heart with an "evil treasure" (Matt. 6:21; 12:35). If we sow to the flesh, we shall "of the flesh reap corruption" (Gal. 6:8).

Alternatively we should put our efforts into those things that fill our hearts and minds with good treasures, such as love, peace, long-suffering, gentleness and temperance (self-control), which are fruitful (Gal. 5:22). It is the grace of God which teaches us that "denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world" (Tit. 2:11-12).



As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. GALATIANS 6:10

New Church Building for Pogany, Hungary

s the year of 1994 draws to a close, many of our brethren in Europe have special reasons to be thankful. The small congregation in Pogany, a village in the southwestern portion of Hungary not far from the Croatian border, will close out the year with services in a new building. Dedication services were held on October 2 for a building begun in March of this year. The old building, replaced by the new church, stood on the same spot as the new edifice for many years.

Many of these brethren, including their elder, Bro. Istvan Szemmelroth, made personal experiences of sacrifice or imprisonment for their faith. The second World War took a heavy toll on them and was followed by years of Russian occupation. However, with the fall of Communism, they enjoy a substantial amount of freedom, and rejoice in being able to worship in a new building.

Some excerpts from a letter received from Bro. Szemmelroth follow:

"I am coming to you with love in this brief letter. We thank God for His blessings. The work is done on our new house of prayer and yesterday, October 2, we held the dedication services. We had a very blessed and beautiful day with many guests and the weather was beautiful also. Our thanks and praise and glory to God for this beautiful building. It exceeds our expectations and hopes, for which we are very unworthy. We acknowledge the receipt of funds from the Mission Committee. It came to 1,500,000 forint (\$25,000).

We thank you heartily." These funds were supplied by your gifts to the Mission Committee to assist our brethren in Europe. Without this support, work such as this could not be completed, and everyone involved, at home and abroad thank you for it.

RURAL GOSPEL AND MEDICAL MISSIONS OF INDIA (RGMMI)

here are all the people on the streets? Everything is so clean! These were the first observations made by Dr. Surendra and Mrs. Damayanti Parkhe upon their arrival for the first time in the United States. Dr. Parkhe is the Director/Administrator of RGMMI in India where his administrative and medical skills are well used. He and his wife had been invited to visit the USA for the purpose of bringing firsthand reports of the India Mission work and for exposure to the Apostolic Christian Church, including attending our annual Brotherhood Conference.

By the grace of God, Dr. Parkhe had experienced a full awakening and conversion in 1993 following the visit to India by four of our Apostolic Christian brothers. He was baptized in India last October. Another of his observations after his first Sunday here was: "You told me about it, but I didn't believe it until I saw it and heard it." He was remarking about our practice of preaching the Word from inspiration without prior preparation. Upon his return to California, having visited more than ten of our churches, his greeting was: "I am redeemed and I am happy," giving evidence of his reaction to our General Conference.

It is felt that their visit was a watershed event

for our involvement in India. Dr. Parkhe observed the witness of our brethren, the unity and consistency among our congregations, the outpouring of love and hospitality, and the caring and concern for others. This furnished evidence of the power of God through His Holy Spirit that should undergird, encourage and enhance the spiritual work in India.

In his talks to our congregations, Dr. Parkhe reported on the present conditions and activities in India and shared the testimony of his conversion. This was a special blessing and opportunity for our churches' awareness of and interest in RGMMI to be heightened.

As their visit drew to a close, the most notable experience of all took place. Dear Damayanti humbled herself before the Lord in repentance. Her remorse was turned to joy as led by the Spirit, she unburdened a heavy heart. They departed our shores with gladness and sadness; with anticipation and courage; with love and esteem; all reflecting the goodness of God and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

It is with new courage that we continue to seek God's guidance and direction in our shepherding His work among the believers in India. Your prayers and continued support of RGMMI has brought forth so many blessings!

GATEWAY WOODS APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME Tim Sauder

Change is happening all around us whether we know it or not. Time marches on; our children mature; we age; saints die and infants are born. Sunrise---sunset; the ebb and flow of life. Change is always present but not always welcome. Our flesh likes security and predictability but sometimes God brings it about to stretch and refine us. We are awakened from a complacent slumber. We are shaken loose for service. We are plucked like fruit, not to rot on a tree, but to be used and multiply.

There are changes happening in the field of child care like none I've seen in my 15 years of experience. Of course, many of these are the result of a decaying culture on a downward slide, while others are legitimate and reasonable attempts to determine what works and what doesn't in serving and healing the lives of troubled children and families.

The very nature of residential care is being examined and disputed. We are seeing new initiatives such as family preservation efforts including in-home martial and family counseling, parent training and family finance. Specialized treatment foster homes for older children are taking the place of some classic "children's homes". Some homes now serve as day treatment centers and send children back to parents each evening. Everyone is looking for something better, more efficient, and in some cases, "a quick fix".

Also, we are seeing more private families seeking help on their own without the assistance of public agencies or funds. Governments are stretched farther with their dollars and are seeking to shed themselves of previous responsibilities and financial commitments. The

churches and private donors are needed increasingly to support what was supposed to be God's work in the first place; that of helping the poor, broken and fatherless.

In addition to the changes and pressures in the field, we also are experiencing the cumulative stress of having several staff positions remain open for longer than is healthy. Currently, we have openings for a single sister Houseparent, an Alternate Houseparent couple, an Education Coordinator and a Child Care Supervisor. Over the past six months, we have each faced and absorbed new tasks to fill the gaps and maintain continuity. but even the most resilient rubber band will snap if taken beyond its limits. We are now inspired to prayer and action to petition God and to challenge our fellow believers to sincerely consider the Lord's leading to the Lord's work. Please help us.

In the midst of the dangerous and dynamic circumstances that swirl around us, there is an undercurrent of anxiety and anticipation but also a peace in the eye of the storm because we stand on a rock and that rock is Jesus Christ, "the same yesterday, today and forever". In uncertain times we need (and have) a certain God, a certain Word and a certain future.

The growth of the Conference during the span of 13 years was both surprising and encouraging. At the 1959 Gridley, IL General Conference a total of 270 brothers were present, including 22 Elders, 106 ministers, and 142 lay brethren from 52 churches in 12 states. Several churches sent only one representative. There were no sisters listed as present; at least in the written statistical report.

The totals from the 1972 Conference were strikingly larger. The total reached 916 plus the Gridley brethren, which likely would have put the total close to 1,000. This included 38 Elders, 135 ministers, 163 sisters, and 580 lay brethren from 66 churches in 14 states and Japan.

The annual Church Conference is a wonderful blessing and a unifying force among the brethren. May God continue to bless these annual efforts, and may our love and unity glorify God.

"ACHIEVE ETERNAL LIFE"

Sermon By Bro. Bruce R. Hohulin Of Goodfield, IL Luke 10:17-42

As we started reading in verse 17, the very first part of this reading says, "And the seventy returned again with joy, saying, Lord, even the devils are subject unto us through thy name. And he said unto them, I beheld Satan as lightning fall from heaven." Luke 10:17,18.

As we would look at that very first verse that we read, we would see, beloved, that these disciples that returned to Jesus were amazed at the power that He had. I would liken that, brothers, sisters and friends, as to us. Oftentimes we doubt the power that Jesus Christ and our Lord holds.

As we go through our daily walk of life and as we would travel to and fro here on earth and try to accomplish things, we in our weak humanness, would try to do things on our own. We would possibly believe that we would have faith, but as we look deep within our soul, we realize how weak we are and how much we lack trusting in our Saviour.

As we think about that and each one individually realizes how weak we are, we should take courage. We should understand that we are simply like the disciples and when we realize that we lack faith, we should think of our Lord and think of those many years ago when He walked here on this earth. Then we can understand, brothers, sisters and friends, that Jesus Christ realizes that we as humans are very, very weak, and

that we are nothing.

As He understands that, He shows His mercy to us. As we walk this life and as we falter, He is there to pick us up and to show us His love again if we will again trust Him.

We think of repentance and as we brothers and sisters look back, we realize that we were weak and failed to trust in God. Friends of the truth, as you think of yourself and think about the difficulties that Satan would put before you in finding your repentance, you should realize that even in those days, that as this verse says, the disciples found that they had disbelief. They were amazed at the power of Jesus Christ!

As you look at it, friends of the truth, you must realize that it takes faith. You must throw yourself literally at the foot of the cross. You must allow Jesus, our dear Lord and Saviour, to take over your life.

We brothers and sisters, even today and you can see the failings of many of us that oftentimes we will falter and we will fail, but the love of God is there to pick us up, to carry us through, and to lead us to our Heavenly Kingdom.

It says here in the following verse (and I read it already), "I beheld Satan as lightening fall from heaven." Then it says, "Behold, I give unto you power to tread on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy: and nothing shall by any

means hurt you." Luke 10:18,19. What a powerful verse, brothers, sisters and friends; what a powerful saying that Jesus Christ said! Let's think about that and discuss that for just a moment. It says that those many, many years ago, Jesus Christ gave the disciples power over Satan.

I submit to you that those disciples of years ago were our brothers. Jesus Christ today is giving us that very same power. The responsibility that He gives us to walk the way of a Christian is an awesome responsibility. But He does not give that responsibility without giving us the tools to accomplish that. That is what He is saying here in the Word; that He gives us power to tread upon scorpions and serpents. He gives us power over the Devil!

I have to think about that for just a moment and think of the power that the Devil has and think of the many times that he has entered into my heart personally. That is how weak I became when I lacked faith. We all know, brothers and sisters, that He can carry us through—through faith and through His grace. He will allow us to enter His Heavenly Kingdom.

We have this Word before us and I think often of myself and how sometimes I do not read as I should. I do not follow the Word of God as I should and I have a tendency to take a look at myself sometimes. Something will happen, as I know it hapbens to you, that will quickly lraw you back to Jesus Christ.

We think of our trials and we think of the trials that others nave and we know that those rials are for a reason. They are to strengthen us. They are to nelp someone else see what God an do. There are many reasons for them and we know not what they are. The Lord knows only. know that in your congregation, as in Goodfield, and as in every congregation that I have ever been familiar with, you have those who are going through these trials that we talk about. I know that you look to them for strength in your own nearts.

Dear friends of the truth, there is nothing like this Word of God to strengthen you. There is nothing like Jesus Christ and His love to carry you through. There are hills and valleys for us also but the Lord is there to smooth the way. He is there to take out the bumps and He will lo that as He did here for the lisciples and for the loved ones in those days.

It says, "I thank thee, O Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that thou hast hid these things form the wise and prudent, and ast revealed them unto babes: even so, Father; for so it seemed good in thy sight." Luke 10:21. Another powerful verse here! Let us look at what it says. It is saying to us as we would come to the Lord in repentance, as we would try to understand the way that we should go, that these things of salvation and that these things of eternal life are nidden from the wise and prudent, and are revealed unto babes.

I think in this morning hour of something that happened in our family this week. I don't know why it has come to me, but as we think of our children and as we as parents tell them things that they should or should not do, they trust us fully. As they grow older and older, they trust us less and less, and they must have proof. The Word of God is like that...the Word of God is exactly like that!

As we grow in earthly knowledge, brothers, sisters and friends, we rely on ourselves more and more and that is contrary to what God would have us do. God expects us to rely on Him. He wants us to rely on this Word of God.

Often, as you take your children swimming, especially when they are small and you are trying to teach them, you will stand in the water and ask them to jump in your arms. They will easily and eagerly do it because they know you will catch them. As they become older and you ask them to do these things, they hesitate. That is what this verse is talking about when it says that things are revealed to babes.

Dearly beloved, we must become as a babe in Christ. Then, brothers and sisters, as we look at our spiritual life as our spiritual soul, we must examine ourselves and we must wonder within our hearts, "Are we still a babe? Are we still a babe in Christ?" That is a question that Jesus has asked here and Jesus is bringing forth unto us. Have we, brothers and sisters in faith,

remained as babes?

Let us examine ourselves in this day. Are we still at the same point as we were the evening when we gave our testimony here in the front bench? Are we still in that state as we look at ourselves and ponder that question? We must realize that is the point that we have to be at to enter the Heavenly Kingdom.

There are many who have gone on before us whom we loved very much and that we would like to see in that Heavenly Kingdom. As we think about them and the humbleness that they had, we must be that way ourselves. We must have the faith to understand and the faith to love our Lord enough to totally trust Him. That is what He is talking about when we talk about babes.

I know our small children totally trust us. But as I said, as they grow in earthly knowledge, they seem to change. But one way or another, we will all become babes. We will all face that opportunity of turning to the Lord, or turning to Satan. To accept Jesus Christ, we must be as a babe.

As He talks here in verse 23, He is talking to the disciples, and He said, "Blessed are the eyes which see the things that ye see: for I tell you, that many prophets and kings have desired to see those things which ye see, and have not seen them; and to hear those things which ye hear, and have not heard them." Luke 10:23,24.

Again, brothers, sisters and friends of the truth, there is only

one way to enter the Heavenly Kingdom. There is only one door to the sheepfold.

As it says here, it talks about kings and prophets and them desiring to have the things that we have, and to have the opportunity that we have here in this day. It says that they desired to see the things that we see. As we think about that, we wonder why they are unable to see the things we see.

It is the same reason that we must become babes. As we think of a king (or at least as I think of a king), we think of someone who is on a pedestal who is high and mighty, and who has the power over many things. They trust in themselves.

That is what the Word says that those who trust in themselves cannot enter into the Kingdom of God. Now you and I, brothers, sisters and friends, must realize that the Lord does not want us to be in control. He is in control and has the power!

We read on further here and it talks about a lawyer. This lawyer was tempting Jesus Christ and he said here, "Master, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" Luke 10:25. Today is the day to truly, friends of the truth, read this and ask ourselves, "What shall I do to inherit eternal life?"

The Word of God is dovetailing itself in this morning hour. We knew not what we would read when we came here, but it says here very clearly that we must become as babes. Here this lawyer who was doubting Jesus Christ and did not have the faith to believe was tempting Jesus

and asking Him what he must do to find eternal life.

You and I, brothers, sisters and friends, have this Word of God before us. Oh, it is such a wonderful thing to pick up the Word and read it and understand bits and pieces of the Word and understand what God would have for us. Let us read how the Lord answered him.

It says, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all they strength, and with all thy mind; and thy neighbour as thyself." Luke 10:27. It is very definite what we should do. Jesus Christ quickly answered the question to the lawyer and in one short sentence He said, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart...". Luke 10:27.

Let us look at ourselves. Do we love the Lord our God with all our heart, with all our soul, with all our strength and with all our mind? How do we fare today? Can we answer "yes" to all of these questions? Are we able to look within our heart and say all of our heart is for the Lord? Or must we look and say, "I'm holding out just a little bit for myself?"

The Lord knows. The Lord can see within our heart and He understands this very moment where we stand. The Lord and us know. The Lord and we individually know what is in our heart. No one else does, only we individually. Our Elder or our ministering brother, no one knows what is in our heart but us and God.

I tell you, brothers, sisters and friends, as that final day comes

and we stand before our God there will be nothing hid that will not be revealed. Let us think about that. I know this morning my wife said, "Do you have your seat belts buckled kids? Your dad is driving fast.' I think about that and as we are driving down the road, friends of the truth, think about this; as you are driving down the road, you are about two or three feet away from eternity. I submit to you, as you drive your car today, tomorrow or the next day, and every time you pass a car, do you think about your salvation? Do you think that somebody is coming the other way and you could be immediately face to face with eternity?

We hear of accidents and we hear of terrible accidents where people lose their life. The first thing we wonder is, "Were they ready to meet the Lord?" It says here, and it is very clear here, friends of the truth, that that can only be answered by you and God. But I guarantee you that it will be answered when you face your Lord. None of us know. I also guarantee that none of us know when our personal eternity is coming.

This week I traveled alone with my job. I flew but I don't fly that much. As you fly (I know many of you are the same), but as you fly, you think about that more than maybe when you are driving a car. But as you are driving your car, statistics tell us it is more dangerous. Have you thought recently as you drove your car, "How far away am I from eternity?"

Friends of the truth, if you have not thought about that, it

s time that you do. It is time hat you understand where you tand with your God. That does not go just for the friends of the ruth; we all who are within this hurch in this day must know every moment of our life what our lot will be if our eternity omes.

To believe in Him and that we are doing the very best we can. We are all given many, many lifferent talents. That is why we have the body of Christ so that our talents can dovetail one with another. But we are each one accountable for those talents that we have. God knows what hose talents are and we must use them.

As we talk about those talents, t brings me here to the end of our reading. It talks about Mary and Martha. Martha was troubled because her sister was not preparing food or something here. It says, "Martha was cumpered about much serving, and same to him, and said, Lord, dost hou not care that my sister hath left me to serve alone?" Luke .0:40. Martha was concerned and felt like she was doing it all. As we consider our talents, I mow that you (as I have) have

sometimes felt in life that the burdens of the earth are on us and somebody else is getting away scot free.

That is kind of how Martha felt here, I believe. It is not that way at all. We all have our burdens to bear. Friends of the truth, you look at brothers and sisters in faith and you see and believe that many of them are getting off scot free or have had it made, or do not have the temptations that you do. Just like Martha and Mary here, that is wrong.

Each of us have our own special burden to bear. Martha's and Mary's were different. But it says here that Jesus Christ said back to Martha, "Mary hath chosen that good part, which shall not be taken away from her." Luke 10:42. I would guess the message from that sentence is very clear.

What part have we chosen today? Where do we stand with our God? Have we chosen God or have we chosen Satan?

I have said this many times before and many of you have heard it and others have said it. My daughter was at an ACYF day and came home and told me that here at Normal it was said, "How much of your heart does God want?" Everybody answered, "God wants all of your heart." Then it was also said, "How much of your heart does Satan want?" Everybody said, "All of your heart." I don't know who it was, maybe it was one of these brothers but that brother that led that class said, "No, you are wrong; Satan only wants one percent of your heart, because if he has that, God doesn't want you."

So we all here today have to look at ourselves and see where we stand with our God and if we are totally pure. See if we are like Mary and have chosen the part that will not be taken away from us that will last for in eternity. If we have not chosen that part totally, today, not tomorrow, but today is the day that we should choose that part, that we should all renew ourselves, that we should all understand and realize and be happy that if we would stand before our Lord today---if our eternity would come today---that we would be ready to enter that Heavenly Kingdom.

So we'll follow wherever He leads us, Let the path be dreary or bright, For we've proved that our God can give comfort, Our God can give songs in the night. Author Unknown


If I Should Die

Among the blest, among the blest.



At a church conference in the early 1970's an Elder once spoke with great conviction about reaining a loyalty to our brothernood as it exists with Christ as the Head. He urged his listeners to teach their offspring about the strengths of our church as it seeks to center all its beliefs on the Word of God.

He relayed that his wish was hat his children, his grandchildren, and his general posterity would embrace the richness of our faith. He told of once driving past our Apostolic Christian Church in his locality on a weeklay and telling his little grandson, "There's our church." He hen pondered when his grandson grows up and drives past our church, will he say, "That's my hurch," or "That's grandpa's hurch."

This story is reflective of the leep appreciation that exists for our faith in Christ as understood and lived out in the Apostolic Christian Church. Positive stories and a legacy of appreciation for the brotherhood, and positive attitudes toward its benefits abound across the churches.

From this, we can ask the folowing questions: How did it all begin? How did a church such as ours find an origin? How did our church come to be?

Any accurate historical source in this realm must be rooted in the events associated with the Lord Jesus' short three-year ministry, his subsequent suffering, shed blood and death at Calvary. From this marvelous act of atonement for sin, a new church was initiated by his apostles. The gospel of Christ, and the writings of the apostles constitute the root and foundation for all that we as a church believe and practice today. We rely on the Old and New Testaments for Godly direction and recognize the Authorized King James Bible as the final rule for faith and life; and as a people we have not fallen prey to the tendency to let rationalism and an elitist theology undermine the Bible's intent. In this, it is God's grace that has preserved our literal beliefs found in God's infallible Word.

Over the many centuries since the time of Christ, a true church has existed, although it was never one of great numbers or stately power. A remnant of faithfulness found a presence in the catacombs, in the caves, and often in the hills and mountains. Larger, monolithic church organizations did indeed come to exist, but many of their beliefs and practices failed to coordinate with Scriptures.

Tendencies of unfaithfulness resulted in much spiritual unrest in the 16th century in Europe. The writings of Erasmus helped pave the way for those who later opposed the excesses of the Roman Catholic Church. In 1517, a priest, Martin Luther, posted his "Ninety-Five Thesis" of criticism against the church. This "revolt" lodged a protest against the monolithic church and a "protestant" Lutheran church was born in Germany. A protestant church in Switzerland was formed by theologian Ulrich Zwingli in 1519.

Yet, both of these reformers, while initiating improvements compared to the Catholic Church, were still lacking in a total return to the Word. For instance, infant baptism still remained, and the new church continued implementing the sword in warfare. In fact, religious wars were common.

It was not until 1525 that a group of dedicated people broke

away form Zwingli's group of "reformers" and adopted the Bible's doctrine of adult baptism based on a profession of faith in Christ, conversion, and winning the victory over sin. They became known as "Anabaptists", which means to re-baptize. Their opponents mockingly referred to them in this manner because their baptism (based on their faith and conversion) actually resulted in a re-baptism-since they had previously been baptized as infants.

The Anabaptists advocated an unconditional return to the Scriptures. They were the first group of that era to believe in the separation of church and state. They were brutally persecuted for their adherence to the Bible's directives. But, by God's grace, they were willing to suffer for Christ as they endured beheadings, drownings, and having their tongues ripped out, etc. Yet, their numbers grew and a Spirit-led fervency prevailed.

The Anabaptists's principles centered around an attitude of "sola Scriptura", a Latin phrase meaning "Scriptures alone". The Word of God, not man's reasoning or experiences, or the power of the state, was the final

rule of faith and life. They stressed self-surrender which was personified in the German word, "Gelassenheit", which means annihilation of self. Thus, the Bible's themes of humility, submissiveness, and yieldedness were central in lifestyle.

For the next three centuries, various categories of Anabaptists existed across Europe; particularly in central and eastern Europe. Groups with Anabaptist beliefs came to be known as Mennonites, Amish and Hutterites; all, incidently, named after important leaders: Menno Simons, Jakob Ammann, and Jakob Hutter.

As time wore on, and the decades and centuries passed, the initial zeal and fervent spirit--and the conversion process---beamong gan to wane Anabaptist-related groups. renewed spiritual thirst for the true Word of God, and the unadulterated Gospel, arose in much of central Europe by the 19th century. In time, Brother Samuel Froehlich of Switzerland established a new church based solely on the Word. Next month's "Remembering" will focus on this beginning.

In this historical description,

we refer to the Anabaptists be cause their early biblical belief and church structure were ver similar to our church today. It is a historical fact that our early brethren were influenced by the Anabaptist movement. Indeed the seven articles of the Schleitheim Confession (drawn up by Anabaptists in 1527) which helped to define certain portions of their beliefs, are arti cles that are treasured in the Apostolic Christian Church They were listed in Marching to Zion: (1) Baptism, (2) the ban (3) holy communion, (4) separa tion from the world, (5) duties of Elders, (6) non-resistance, and (7) oath-taking.

By the early 1800's, Europe was ripe for a revival of faith. A way was opening up whereby God would soon raise up a young man, along with zealous followers, and a church would be established based totally on the Word of God. Repentance and conversion would again be preached with fervor. God would be honored by fidelity to the Scriptures.

will be "LIFT OFF", and we'll be on our way.


