Writings based on God's Word

Light From The Word

"The entrance of thy words giveth light; it giveth understanding unto the simple" (Ps. 119:130). 3

Parables are easily understood stories that use earthly circumstances to convey spiritual meanings. A parable may have one or more intended applications. Sometimes certain parts of a parable can also be used as teaching aids, but not every detail of the earthly circumstances in a parable has direct application to our lives.

The parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10) is an excellent model of a person's spiritual life. The believers make up the inn (church). The unconverted are on the road to Jericho in the form of priests, Levites, thieves, citizens of Jericho, or if they are fortunate, they are personified by the man who was robbed.

His point of origin, Jerusalem the holy city, indicates the innocent beginning that we all have. The direction of travel toward Jericho, the city of self-reliance (Num. 13:28,29), is symbolic of the path that we all place ourselves on as we grow out of innocence. On that path we yield to the temptations in the world around us, allow our sinful nature to take control and bring on full responsibility for our sin.

The thieves represent the deception of the world: "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ" (Col. 2:8) and "Let no man beguile (rob) you..." (Col. 2:18).

The brief duration of the assault in the parable doesn't always fit the reality of the assault of the world upon our faith (1 John 5:4). Instead, it is by Satan's design perpetual, sometimes subtle, and always attractive to our natural mind. The ruthlessness of the thieves, though, is a very accurate depiction of the tenacity of Satan, who never retreats from drawing as many people as possible into his clutches.

The victim's condition after the assault is

typical of our condition as we become choked by the "care of this world" (Matt. 13:22), still having some life (half dead— Luke 10:30), but being unfruitful (Matt. 13:22). We too are stripped when our innocence departs and is not naturally replaced by virtue, and we become wounded (afflicted) by a growing acceptance of, and cooperation with, the ways of the world. The Word teaches that "the friendship of the world is enmity with God" (Jam. 4:4).

The priest who looked on the victim and passed by could be seen as representative of the false doctrines and false teachers that exist in our time as well. The Levite could represent the masses that support and practice those false doctrines (Matt. 7:13). Since these men were not harmed by the thieves it seems that false doctrine (priest and Levite), worldliness (thieves), and unbelief and self-reliance (Jericho) all cooperate as arms of the adversary in ways that disguise their treachery. Together they pose an overwhelming force. Jesus, however, has never been overwhelmed by this worldly force. We are encouraged by the truth that "greater is he that is in you than he that is in the world" (1 John 4:4). Likewise, "thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 15:57).

The assaulted man should not be considered as one having no choice. He found the mercy of God and became willing to be healed. He submitted to the healing and cleansing (oil and wine) (Luke 10:34) of the blood of Christ (1 John 1:7). His change from serving the world to serving God occurred openly, for anyone to see. Likewise, conversion marks our beginning of publicly separating ourselves from worldliness and giving our lives into the service of the Lord.

The inn that received this sin sick soul is

a place that welcomes strangers (see Luke 17:15-18). The inn (church) must provide guidance through God's Word to help nourish faith in Christ and love for the Saviour and for all mankind. When the Lord brings any broken contrite soul to the inn, we dare not refuse him (Acts 11:9) but as workers together with Christ must receive him with tender care.

Each member is included in the work of providing care for needy souls. "Finally, be ye all of one mind, having compassion one of another, love as brethren, be pitiful, be courteous" (1 Peter 3:8). The Word also teaches "that the members should have the same care one for another" (1 Cor. 12:25). We cannot pass off the responsibility of the keeping of the inn to any one person or any group (such as elders and ministers). The host (elder/ministers) did accept on behalf of the inn the nourishment necessary for the church to grow in faith and number by "holding (fast to) the Head (Christ), from which all the body by joints and bands having nourishment ministered, and knit together, increaseth with the increase of God" (Col 2:19).

Part of our work in the inn is to maintain separation from worldliness. This provides many benefits to the believer. It also demonstrates to unbelievers a clear distinction from, and a rewarding alternative to, their current lifestyles. A member of the inn that becomes lax and reclaims some of the image of the world causes confusion in the brotherhood and makes it difficult for the seeking soul to identify the inn. The care that should be thriving in the inn is addressed in Titus 3:8: "This is a faithful saying, and these things I will that thou affirm constantly, that they which have believed in God might be careful to maintain good works." "And whatsoever ve do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by him" (Col. 3:17).

"Wherefore, brethren, look ye out among you seven men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business." Acts 6:3



- Our efforts need to be coordinated through established church organizations, providing a channel through which volunteers can perform services or help financially to alleviate human misery.







Church Dedicated in Szeged, Hungary

S zeged, a Hungarian city of about 200,000, is situated very near the point where the countries of Romania and Yugoslavia meet. Over the decades, many Nazarene congregations grew in the trination area, some in each country. Today, Szeged remains not only home to a growing congregation, but also a point of meeting for our brethren in Europe.

In the latter part of the 19th century, Hungary and Austria became equal monarchies in the same empire and our faith experienced very rapid growth. By the end of the century, there were over 200 congregations with tens of thousands of members, Szeged included.

The congregation in Szeged purchased property in 1860, and have used the building on this property until the present time. Two World Wars plus Communism caused much suffering, but today another period of growth and building seems to be evident. In recent years there have been many converts, and as the congregation grew, the church building became very crowded. With over 200 members, and large families, it became necessary to enlarge the facility. The old location did not lend itself to the needs of the new, plus it was in an expensive location. They were able to sell the old property to another denomination. As is often done in the USA, the brethren relocated on the outskirts of the city, still maintaining access to public transportation as many have no cars. Looking toward the future, they also decided to include a retirement and care center into the same structure. This large, well-constructed building was dedicated on the 13th of November, 1994.

Inasmuch as there has been considerable support from the brethren in the USA, an invitation to this event was extended to us. Brothers Ben Maibach, Andy Hunyady, and Wendell Gudeman, plus Bro. Wendell's wife, Sis. Marcella, left the USA on November 3 to attend this dedication and to visit churches in Hungary and Romania. A report of this visit will appear in a future Silver Lining article.

Breidenbach Congregation Gets a New Facility

N estled into the rolling hill country of west central Germany lies the village of Breidenbach. This thriving town has been home to a growing congregation of our brethren since about 1946. There are about 100 members, plus many friends and about 150 children. In the latter days of Communism, and since its fall, the World Relief and Mission Committees have worked very closely with the Breidenbach brethren to alleviate suffering and bring vital assistance to our struggling brethren throughout Eastern Europe.

Over the years, many refugees from Eastern Europe swelled the size of the congregation. In about 1991, they voted to build a new church, and at that time sent an appeal to us in America for assistance. Through the generosity of our brethren, we were able to share in its cost. Each time assistance arrived, tears were shed in the Breidenbach congregation as they felt and appreciated this great love offering. The new facility will seat over 400 people on the main floor plus the balcony. Current plans are to hold dedication services in December, with our brethren hoping to attend.

The lower level of the new building includes an apartment for the caretaker family, plus two large rooms for storage of goods for relief work. Each room will hold an amount equal to a full semi trailer. This provides a valuable base for our use in bringing assistance to brethren throughout Europe. The pews were purchased and shipped from the US, and we were fortunate enough to be able to fill the extra space in the pew container with new and used clothing which will be held in the church and taken into Ukraine and/or Romania in the Spring of 1995.

It has been a year of growth and building in Europe, and thanks are given first to God and then to all who helped make it possible. Your reward will be in eternity. 5

"GOD LOVINGLY FORGIVES" Sermon By Bro. Marvin Dotterer Of Forrest, IL Isaiah 6 and John 13

I think as we read an account like this, we can probably hardly understand or comprehend how the disciples must have felt. They didn't understand what was coming or what was before them, or what Jesus was facing. All the things that were to come to pass were written in the prophets. We even read in the sixth chapter of Isaiah of something that was prophesied and mentioned later in the New Testament. There were things that we read here today that were prophesied; yet, they really could not understand what Jesus really meant.

He said, "I am going to go where you cannot come." (See John 13:33). He did not mean that he was going to Heaven and none of us can get there. He meant that He was going to be crucified and they would not be.

He even told Peter here at the last, "Whither I go, thou canst not follow me now; but thou shalt follow me afterwards." (John 13:36). We know it doesn't tell us in the Word, but we understand from history that Peter was crucified at a later time. He was even crucified upside down because he did not feel worthy to be crucified in the same way that Jesus, his Lord and Master was.

Jesus was trying, maybe in some way, to tell them a little bit more of what His mission really was. He wanted to wash their feet, and Peter said, "Thou shalt never wash my feet." (John 13:8). Peter probably felt like he was more the servant and Jesus the Lord and Master, and Jesus should not be washing his feet.

What did Jesus tell him? "If I don't wash you, you are going to have no part with Me." (See John 13:8). That is the way it is today. If Jesus doesn't wash us, we will have no part with Him. He is not going to literally wash our feet like He did for Peter and the other disciples, but we are washed by the blood that He shed there upon the cross for each one of us--for you and me-and for the sins that we committed. If we don't let Jesus wash us with that blood that He shed. we will never have any part with Him. That is really what He was saying to them.

He knew what He was going to have to go through, but His disciples did not know. He was trying to tell them what His mission really was. We have no cleanness of ourselves. We can go back to the chapter that we read in the forereading, the sixth chapter in Isaiah, and how Isaiah felt his own inadequacy and his own uncleanness. God came to him and He cleaned him and purged him from his sin with that hot coal. (See Isaiah 6:5-7).

A little earlier in the chapter, it said, "Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord God Almighty." (See Isaiah 6:3). God is such a perfect God, a Holy God, and an Almighty God and this is really what He expects of us. He expects us to be like Him. Now we know that we carry flesh and blood and none of us can be perfect, but that does not excuse any of us for trying to be perfect or trying to be like God. I think sometimes maybe we use that as a crutch or as an excuse thinking, "Why, I could never be like God; there is no use to even try. I have too many weaknesses and too many failings." We do, but that doesn't excuse us from striving to be like God.

I think Satan is so successful many times to those who are unconverted and those who haven't given their life to God and how he can tell them it is just not worth trying because we can never do it. By ourselves, we cannot do it.

I know we have said this many, many times; it is nothing new, and yet maybe we need to be reminded of it again this morning that it is only with God's help that we can do anything, that we can serve Him at all. We could not do anything good of ourselves, but only with God's help. We cannot come to Him, we cannot serve Him, we could never repent for our sins without the help of God.

How thankful we are that we have the promises in His Word that God will give us this help that we need, whatever it is. For some of us, it is probably a lot more than for others. We might think that because of the sins that we have committed, God could never forgive us. Where we feel in our own mind that we are a lot worse sinner than what somebody else might be, and God would not forgive us. It doesn't make any difference, does it?

In one place, we read in His Word, "Whoever is forgiven much, will love much." (See Luke 7:47). God did not send Jesus down here for the righteous: it says that He came for the sinners. (See Matthew 9:13). How often Jesus went to the house of the sinful people. His disciples and those did not understand that, how Jesus who was God's own Son and a righteous person could go and have a meal in a sinner's house, sit with them, talk with them and spend time with them. But that is who He came for.

That is the people that He provided this plan of salvation for--for those that are sinful and those that need a Saviour. I think all of us would feel like that is where we fit in.

It says, "For I have given you an example...". (John 13:15). That is why He washed their feet. I guess I think of that a lot of times and I am often so thankful for that when I read it. You know, Jesus did not ever ask us to do anything that He did not first do Himself.

The temptations that He faced were almost no sooner than He was baptized. He went out into the wilderness for forty days and forty nights and He was tempted of the devil.

So He knew what it was like to be tempted. In another place we can read in Hebrews, it said, He "was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin." (Hebrews 4:15). He went before to do everything that He asks us to do. There is not one thing that we are going to be asked to do that Jesus did not first do Himself. I think maybe sometimes we see things as great mountains before us, walled cities, or however we might want to look at them; things that would prevent us from getting where it is that we want to go. There are things that we can look at like that.

Jesus also said in another place, "...greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world." (I John 4:4). John wrote that in one of his letters. We have to understand that God is so much greater than any power or any force that is in the world.

We read in this chapter this morning about Judas. There is probably a lot that we can talk about Judas. We could maybe think of a lot of questions---maybe unanswered questions---about the role of Judas and how he fit into everything here. He was one of Jesus' twelve disciples. Those twelve that He chose were the very, very closest to Him. God knew and Jesus knew that Judas was someday going to betray Him.

We read in the prophets and talked about those that were even for this reason, that He was raised up. Maybe that is something that we have a little bit of a hard time sometimes understanding that we might think, "Well, He really didn't have any choice about what He did because He was chosen to do that." Just like it makes a comparison of Pharaoh. We can read about Pharaoh in the time of the plagues of Egypt and how God hardened his heart so he could even show his power, and how many people had to suffer and to die because of the hardness of Pharaoh's heart. God raised him up to be that way, or caused his heart to be hardened.

God is not an unrighteous God. He is not an unrighteous Judge. He knew the heart of Pharaoh and He knew the heart of Judas and He knew that was the kind of person they were and therefore, He used them to fulfill His purpose. They were willing to be used by Satan to fulfill the purposes that they did.

So really, I think if we look at it in that respect, it was really their choice to be that kind of a person. So Satan used Judas, but Judas had to allow himself to be used by Satan. Afterward, he was sorry for what he did. I think sometimes in all fairness to Judas, (maybe I am wrong about this because it doesn't really say it this way, but I have to wonder) I really would doubt in my mind that he really wanted to see Jesus crucified.

Just like none of us would want to crucify Jesus. But why did Judas do what he did then? He wanted that money, didn't he? He coveted those thirty pieces of silver and I think maybe he thought in his mind that he could go to the High Priest and he could get those thirty pieces of silver as a promise to betray Jesus.

As many times before, when they went to stone Jesus or do something to Him, He slipped through their hands and got away because His time wasn't yet. Maybe Judas thought in his

mind that now he could get the thirty pieces of silver and he would betray Jesus, but when they would come to get Him, He would slip on away and nothing would happen to Him. He would have this money and Jesus would be free and nothing bad would happen.

When he found out that really was not what happened, that Jesus really was crucified, he was sorry and he took the money back. He didn't want that money, but he couldn't be forgiven anymore, could he? He went and hung himself, it said.

How many times, maybe do we betray Jesus by the things that we do in our life---the greed that we have or the desire to fulfill the fleshly lusts that we have in our heart and in our life? By those things that we do, we really crucify Jesus, because it is our sin and our iniquity and the failings that we have that really is what crucified Jesus upon the cross. So it is those things that we do that crucified Him; so we really are no different than Judas, are we? If we place those things in our life as to be more important than serving Him, we are in just the same way that Judas was.

I have heard a song sung about the nail. "Who put the nails in the hands of Jesus?" If we are still serving Satan and not serving God, then it is us who have put those nails there. We are no better than Judas was and we can be so critical of him and wonder how could he have done such a thing. How could he have betrayed his Jesus Christ, the Son of God? But how many of us might be guilty of the very same thing thinking that we are not really doing it or that it is not anything personal between us and God, but all of us have a very personal relationship with God. We think of how many billion people are in this world and have lived and yet every one of us someday are going to stand as individuals before God...one at a time and give an account and an answer for the life that we have lived, things that we have done, or not done.

We just really, really need to think about that. What kind of an answer are we going to give when God asks us why we did this or why we didn't do that? Because we are going to have to do that someday. In the fourteenth chapter of Romans, it tells us that every knee will someday bow before God. (See Romans 14:11). Every one of us are someday going to repent to God. We are going to be sorry for what we have done wrong.

But today we have an opportunity to be forgiven for that. Someday we won't be given that opportunity. Someday it will be too late, but it is not today. We have His Word and we have His promises and we have the mercy of God. It tells us in His Word that it is not God's will that any be lost or perish. (See II Peter 3:9). He doesn't want any not to get to Heaven, but yet He can't do it for us. He did everything that He could do. He provided the Supreme Sacrifice for us so that we could be forgiven, but we have to do it.

Sin cannot enter into Heaven. It tells us that so many places in His Word. God, as we mentioned earlier, is a Holy God and He cannot tolerate sin. He hates sin and He cannot tolerate it and sin cannot enter into the Kingdom of God. Yet, we are all sinners because of the sin that Adam committed there in the Garden of Eden and we might think that is somewhat unfair because Adam sinned, we are all sinners.

But I don't think we can blame Adam, can we? If we honestly assess our own lives, and the things that we have done, we would see that we really were not any better than he was, are we? We have all come short of God's gory and what He would have us to be. So we can't blame him for the sin in our life and the separation that we have from God.

In Romans, it tells us just by as one man's sin entered into the world, by one Man, salvation is come into the world by Jesus Christ. (See Romans 5:12-15). It wasn't easy for Him. Maybe sometimes we think, "Well, He was the Son of God; therefore, it was a lot easier for Him than it would be for you or me to do what He did." But it was not. He took on Himself flesh and blood just like you have and I have so that He felt the same thing. He hurt just like you and I hurt. He felt pain just like you and I feel pain, and He felt the ridicule of man just like you and I feel. It is not fun, is it, to be made fun of, to be ridiculed, or to feel guilt? We think sometimes how it feels to feel guilty, like even we spoke of Judas there how when he felt that guilt of what he had done, he wanted to take the money

back and he went out and hung himself because he felt this terrible guilt. That was for just one thing that he had done.

Think of how Jesus must have felt when He had to feel the guilt of every sin that everybody ever committed. It felt like He really Himself had done that and He had to be sorry for it because He felt that guilt as He hung there on the cross. I don't think we can imagine what that must have felt like.

It says at that time when He hung there upon the cross, He was separated from God. That is the only time that He referred to God as God, I think. I think every other time He referred to Him as His Father, but at that time. He was totally separated from God and He couldn't even feel like God was His Father. He was totally separated and He called Him, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Matthew 27:46). He had to be forsaken for that short period of time so that He could take the sins of everybody and bear them upon the cross so that they could be forgiven---each one of us could find forgiveness.

Jesus told them in this chapter, "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them." (John 13:17). I think maybe that is another misconception that Satan might put in our minds sometimes, "...happy are ye if ye do them." Maybe Satan tells us that it is not any fun to serve God. There is a lot of fun in the world. I probably have to say that all of us, maybe at some point in time to a greater or lesser degree, enjoyed the things of this world because that is our nature. We have a desire to fulfill the lust of the flesh.

John writes about the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life. (See I John 2:16). These are the things that lead us away from God and the things that we have a desire for. They feel good to us and we enjoy them, but they don't give us any lasting benefit or any lasting pleasure or joy. I know we hear this often when we interview converts how they say that they could never imagine that going to singings every Saturday night or being a part of going to church could be fun or could get any enjoyment or any satisfaction out of that. But we don't understand the satisfaction of having a peace with God. This is something that we cannot understand.

There is just no better feeling that we could ever have within us than the peace to know that we are at peace with God.

The fourteenth chapter in this Book of John, if we would go on to read the next chapter, it speaks of that peace. "Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God. believe also in me." (John 14:1). Then He goes on in that chapter and says, "...my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you." (John 14:27). This is the kind of peace that we can get from God. That is why He said, "...happy are ye if ye do them." (John 13:17). A peace to know that maybe we are not perfect and there are a lot of things we don't do right, but we are doing the best we can and we have been forgiven. We think sometimes of our life as we mentioned about

standing before God on the Day of Judgment and all those things that are written there, but when we can find forgiveness, we read in His Word, "Those things are cast into the Sea of Forgetfulness to be remembered no more."

How thankful we can be that God is willing to do that for all the things that we have done. We might think again of how many things we have done and how impossible it might be for God to forgive them, but we have the promise that they can be cast into the Sea of Forgetfulness, not to ever be remembered again.

Just this morning at home, I read about forgiveness. I don't think we can understand, really. how God looks at forgiveness. We think of forgiving one another and we need to do that. The Word tells us that if we don't forgive one another, God is not going to forgive us. But how many of us can really forgive like God forgives? When God forgives, He forgets. Pretty hard sometimes for us, isn't it? We might say we forgive someone. but to really and truly forgive, it means to forget that they ever did that and not to ever bring it up again or not to even think of it again. That is real forgiveness! That is what God asks us to do. That is what He did. That is what He is willing to do for us to totally wipe our slate clean and to totally forget what we ever did.

We read in Ezekiel that we need to continue to live for God, though, once we have been forgiven and once our sins have been forgotten. It says that in a *Continued next page...*

day when a righteous man sinneth, all his former righteousness is forgotten. (See Ezekiel 3:20). So it is very important that we continue in the righteousness that we have been brought into. But God is willing to forgive us and there just isn't anything that could be more uplifting than that, to know that God provides for us.

He wants each one of us to someday come and live with Him. He has a home prepared for each one of us. In that same fourteenth chapter that we made reference to, it says, "In my Father's house are many mansions:". (John 14:2). He is going there to prepare one for each one of us...for you and for me. Hard to think of that, isn't it, that God would go there and He would prepare a mansion in Heaven for each one of us? That is where He wants us to be, each one of us, but we have to make some effort to get there.

We have to have faith in God and we have to be obedient to Him. We are saved by grace, not by any works that we do. (See Ephesians 2:8). It says that in His Word, and yet we also have to say there is work that we need to do. There are things that we have to do.

The twenty-fifth chapter of Matthew speaks of the judgment of the sheep and goats and one be put on the left hand and one on the right hand. How were they judged? By things they did or did not do.

In the seven letters to the churches in Revelation, it says, "I know thy works." (Revelation 2:2). They are important, aren't they, also? There are things that we need to do to be pleasing to God and to live a life for Him. There is action required on our part. We spoke of God being a Holy God and we need to be like Him. What does the word 'holy' mean? It means to be set apart---set apart from the things of this world.

We were reminded yesterday of how John (who we read about here this morning) who wrote this gospel, that he was the only one of the twelve disciples who was not required to give his life in some way as a martyr. He was exiled to the Isle of Patmos and he was alone on that island...all alone! God gave him the revelation of what was to come---the account that we can read of --- the many precious things that are written there. He was completely set apart from the world all alone.

That doesn't happen to any of us. There are two ways we can be set apart. We can be set apart physically as John was, which probably is not going to happen to us. Or, we can be set apart, you might say, in our mind spiritually as it were by being different from those around us. That is how we can set ourselves apart from the world.

In the seventeenth chapter of John where Jesus prayed His high-priestly prayer and Jesus prayed for every one of us--those who were living then and all the ones that were ever going to live. He did not pray to take them out of the world, but that God would keep them from the things of the world. (See John 17:15). We know that as we are living today and serving God, we have to live in the world. We are part of the world. We live and walk here, but we have to be separate. We have to be set apart from the things that are of this world. We cannot partake of the things of this world. It just isn't possible.

We have heard it said here recently that we cannot walk with God and walk with the world because the world doesn't walk with God. That is just the way it is. The world doesn't walk with God. so we cannot walk with the world in one hand and God in the other hand. They are going two separate ways and it is just an impossibility to do. Sometimes maybe that is a little hard for us to accept, or to think about being set apart. We don't want to be set apart. Really, deep down in, we don't want to be different from the world. Being set apart can be how we look, the things we do, the things we say, and how we do business.

There are so many ways that can set us apart from people in the world. This is what God expects of us. He expects us to be a holy people, set apart from the things of this world. That is the kind of people He is looking for. It really is not hard to do if we just go back to the forereading chapter that we had, in the prophet Isaiah, and have that willingness that he had to be willing to be and to do whatever it was that God wanted him to do.

If we are converted, God has work for us to do and we have to be willing to do that. If we are not converted, God wants us to come to Him. We have to be Silver

willing, just as Isaiah was, to say. "Lord, here am I; send me. Do with me whatever it is that You want to do with me. Reduce my will to where it is less than Thy will, so I will be willing to do whatever you want me to do." (See Isaiah 6:8). This is the way we have to be. It is the only way that we can please God because if there is any of us here today that are not serving God or not serving Him as well as we should be, it is only because our will is stronger than God's will and we are not willing to be submissive to Him. We have things yet that

we would like to do and things that are more important to us than serving God. As long as there are those things in our life, we are not serving Him, are we? We might think, "Well, we are not serving God, but we are not really serving Satan either." But the Bible tells us that we are serving one or the other. We have to be serving one or the other because if we are not doing God's will, then we are doing the will of Satan. I don't think any of us here would want to think of ourselves as being one as doing the will of Satan. So if we

are not doing that, we need to do God's will.

So may we be encouraged this morning as we read these things together to be even as Isaiah was. It just comes back to me over and over again because I think of it so much in my own life and how it applies to me and how maybe unwilling I am sometimes to be like Isaiah was. But yet, we all need to be if we are really going to please God and if we are going to someday occupy one of those mansions in Heaven that God has told us He has gone to prepare for us. We need to be willing to say to Him, "Here am I: send me."

SILVER LINING

The circumstances that led to the Froehlich family leaving France and settling in Switzerland are interesting and nearly incomprehensible as seen through our outlook of religious freedom today.

The fact, however, that they arrived in Brugg (canton Aargau) is a blessing to us who are Apostolic Christians because God eventually lifted up a young man from this family who became diligent in faith, and who followed God's will in re-establishing a church based on the Scriptures.

The Reformation in 16th century Europe, while an improvement over the corrupt aspects of Catholicism, did not bring a sense of kindly peace across the states of Europe. Largely, the opposite was true.

The sword and warfare became the norm by which Catholic and protestant camps both defended and promoted their religious views. The Anabaptists were an exception to this tendency and their ranks suffered brutal persecution.

Most "religious" leaders of that time sought the protection of a prince or other state leaders as they sought to promote their doctrine. Thus, religious wars were not uncommon in resolving points of religious doctrine. In fact, Ulrich Zwingli, a protestant leader in Switzerland, met his death on a battlefield as an opposing soldier crushed his head with a large stone.

It was in this unfortunate context that the Froehlich family fled France and moved to Switzerland. They were Hugenots, a nickname for French protestants (or Calvinists).

Calvinist tension with the French monarchy (which was Catholic) was fierce, and resulted in war and much political intrigue. In 1598 the Edict of Nantes was signed which gave full religious toleration to the Hugenots. It lasted less than eight decades, being revoked by King Louis XIV in 1685. At this time, hundreds of thousands of Hugenots fled France for other countries. It is likely the Froehlich family participated in this mass exodus.

In Switzerland, the Froehlichs became part of the Swiss protestant state church. As an infant (born July 4, 1803), Samuel H. Froehlich was baptized into this tradition---one from which he would later depart when he repented for his sins and became converted at age 21.

At the dawn of 19th century Europe, the Reformation (and Anabaptism) had subsided. The Enlightenment had spawned attitudes of relativism and rationalism in theological circles; and these outlooks tended to undermine Christian truth.

A great thirst for Biblical truth thus developed. In a few decades, Samuel E. Froehlich would try, as God led him, to respond to this thirst for truth.

At Christmas we celebrate the birth of the Lord Jesus Christ. The spirit of the Son of God inhabited that little body. Angels announced His birth, shepherds went to see Him, and wise men traveled far to worship Him. This all took place in rather humble circumstances, yet there was an air of optimistic expectation.

About 700 years before Christ was born, the prophet Isaiah wrote, "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given." This is not a simple statement that Christ was born but that He was born "unto us" and given "unto us". In Japanese it reads that He was born for us and He was given to us. The point is that we are important participants in this event. It is not something in which we have no personal involvement. The gift of God's Son is given to us.

Like any gift, you can put this gift in the attic and forget it, or you can treat it as a treasure to be enjoyed every day. It is through this gift that we have redemption and it is through this gift that we have at our disposal, the power to withstand and to win over Satan's works of darkness. In Colossians we read, "Who hath delivered us from the power of darkness." I don't like to be in Satan's camp---that's darkness. I like to be in Jesus' camp---that's light. "The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light." (Isaiah 9:2).

The statement in Isaiah, "Unto us a son is given," matches the statement in John 3:16, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son." To whom hath God given His Son? He gave Him unto us. To what extent do we realize that He was born for us and given to us? Have we appropriated Him and all His power? Have we taken possession of Him as our very own? Perhaps we hesitate to go that far. We know that we should belong to Him 100% but it strikes us as being brazen to claim Him and His power as our own. Yet the Bible says, "Unto us a Son is given."

In thinking and praying about taking more complete possession of Christ as my very own, it is comforting for me to realize that this in no way implies that I am in a position to tell Him what to do. It is not that kind of possession. We should possess Him as our Saviour, Redeemer, Lord, and King, and avail ourselves of everything He has for us. He must have for us a lot more joy and peace and spiritual power than we have so far assimilated.

At this Christmas season and always, let's remember, "Unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given." Since the Lord Jesus Christ has been given unto us, we are more spiritually wealthy than we may have realized. It is something to celebrate with prayer and praise.
