I ask myself sometimes, "Is there more to suffering little children to come unto me?" What is it that tugs at my heartstring when the word "Grandpa" is heard? I am not sure if I have the answer to that question, although I did feel close to realizing the answer one very cold November morning.

In the early morning hour on that cold day, as darkness still covered the earth with its all encompassing blackness, my young grandson of seven came to me and said, "Can I go to the forest with you this morning?" Of course, there were many reasons why this was not a good idea and being very cold was one of them. I proceeded to tell him how cold it would be, but it seemed to fall on deaf ears. "Grandpa, I wasn't very sleepy last night and I was awake waiting for you to get up." How can one turn down those pleading young eyes so sad at the prospect of not getting to go along? "Well," I said, "I suppose we can put on enough clothes so you can stay warm." So off we went with anticipation showing from the gleam in his eyes. Not many words were spoken as we traveled.

Finally, we arrived and prepared ourselves for the trip into the forest. Still dark and very cold, we started our long walk into the deepness of the forest.

"You sit here and I will go on a little further," I whispered to him, as I felt his warm little hand slip out of mine. He sat down quietly, significantly hidden from view in the brush. I started to walk on when I heard a small quiet voice utter that precious word, "Grandpa". I turned quietly and returned to him. When I got by him he said, "Could you sit here? I'm just a little scared." So I snuggled in beside him realizing the rest of the morning was going to be dedicated to him.

The first rays of dawn shone in the east bringing the forest to life. Blue jays began to scream at each other as squirrels scurried around looking for nuts and acorns. A big screech owl swooped into a tree close by, unaware of those watching him.

As I sat there with this young man of seven snuggled into my lap, gaining warmth from each other, the spirit of memory flooded my soul. Almost six years before, his other grandfather (one of my dearest friends and brother in faith) said to this same young man so little then as he held him in his lap, "Oh, how I would have liked to take you fishing with me." This brother was terminally ill and was never given the opportunity that I had been given on this cold November morning to cradle him in my lap, hidden from the world, but yet safely in God's view. This young soul, our grandson, who someday will live to bring forth more life, Lord willing, had just given that precious gift, a memory, which will be with me for a lifetime.

I don't know if my grandson will have any memory of that cold morning, but I know this for sure--that had I not given him the gift of time, I would not have been given the gift of a loving memory. To me, that is a beginning to the understanding of those precious words, "Suffer little children to come unto me."

When we consider the giving of this season, consider giving that which is a part of you.

Time is the most precious gift and next to that would be something that takes time to create. Some of the most precious gifts I have received have been things made by hands of loved ones.

Building Up One Another In Faith

The fact that we, as believers in the Lord, exist in brotherhood supports the doctrine that we are to build up and strengthen one another as we strive each day to bring glory and honor to His name.

Individually, we are built up by His grace (Acts 20:32). We are to walk faithfully in His ways, "rooted and built up in Him, and stablished in the faith, as ye have been taught, abounding therein with thanksgiving" (Col. 2:7).

In considering "building up one another," one must remember that we as believers can become weak and vulnerable. We are in battle, daily, with the forces of darkness and spiritual decline. We live in spiritual peril wherein a raging enemy strives to undermine our faith in God.

Thus, it is to our advantage to live in brotherhood as "members one of another" (Romans 12:5). From brotherhood we gain added protection through spiritual insight, added strength because there is strength in numbers, added support in the form of encouragement, and added caution that we can do his good pleasure (Philippians 2:12-13). Our duty as a fellow-believer in Christ is to fortify, to edify (Romans 14:19) and to build each other in faith. Our lifestyle and our overall daily motivation should be to please God and strengthen each other (Romans 15:2-3).

We, as fellow-believers in the Lord Jesus Christ, should realize that to "build up" is to indeed fortify each other in faith and doctrine. We help each other when we provide support that will strengthen our resolve to fight the good fight, to emphasize and better understand our beliefs, and to assist one another in maintaining them by God's grace.

We must strive to be equally yoked together, pulling in the same doctrinal direction. As we do so, we encourage one another to be diligent and to inspire one another in a common outlook and

purpose. As we give a consistent witness to the world, it strengthens each believer, and it strengthens the witness we are seeking to portray.

The biblical concept of believers building up one another is manifested in Acts 20:32, "And now, brethren, I commend you to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified."

The first requirement for building up is not to tear down. We have an enemy who seeks to overthrow our faith and who will use a variety of subtle, hard to detect tactics. Among his strategies of deception are the traits of individualism, self-assertion, and cultural diversity. In this, Satan belittles the biblical concepts of humility, submission, and obedience. When worldly patterns of individualism and self-assertion begin to emerge in the household of faith, upbuilding is undermined. Unity and self-denial are the teachings we find in the Bible, not self will, self indulgence and such like.

Because we are waging a spiritual battle with the corrupt forces of darkness, we must labor diligently to strengthen and build up one another so each of us might become a more effected soldier for the Lord.

We build up each other in faith when we uphold common viewpoints pertaining to faith and life. Believers are instructed in the Word to be "perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (I Cor. 1:10). The prophet, Amos, posed the question, "Can two walk together, except they be agreed?" (Amos 3:3).

As we strive to remain united in common beliefs, if some brethren take exception to those beliefs, it begins to create division. It causes heartache for those who try to uphold the faith. Spiritual independence and variance can cause offense, wherein a brother or sister is made weak causing the opposite effect of

edification and building up.

The scripture for strengthening one another finds root in the verse that teaches us to please our neighbor for his good to edification (Romans 15:2). Even in our strongest state, we as believers are weak (II Cor. 12:10). We need daily strength, both from God's Spirit and in the form of encouragement from God's children. We are to exhort (encourage) one another "and so much the more, as ye see the day approaching" (Hebrews 10:25).

Again, because we are weak, we need the advice found in Hebrews 2:1, "Therefore, we ought to give the more earnest heed to the things which we have heard, lest at any time we let them slip." Our faith and our doctrine are important, and we should encourage one another in these beliefs.

Among the more practical aspects of upbuilding are friendliness and personal warmth. We should show these traits to each member of the body. In I Tim. 5:21 we read that we are not to prefer one before another, but we are to accord the same love and godly affection to each brother and sister in faith. To show respect of persons is sin (James 2:7) and can drag down, rather than build up, a fellow-believer.

In everyday life when we receive encouragement from others in earthly tasks, we are heartened and feel a sense of being built up in our endeavors. In our spiritual life, when we are encouraged in matters of faith and godly living, and upbuild one another in faith, we are helping our fellow believers along the road to the glories of Heaven, which is our goal.

We should not underestimate the value of encouraging, exhorting, and upbuilding one another. As we exercise these qualities toward one another, we do it unto Christ (Matt. 25:40). That is why we should love one another with a pure heart fervently (I Peter 1:22).

Caribbean Board Survey Team Visits Haiti


In October of this year, a team of brothers from the Caribbean Board visited Haiti for the purpose of evaluating the present situation and planning for future work efforts. In this article, they wish to share their findings with our brotherhood. Without your help, none of this would be possible.

Cite Lumiere Outpatient Clinic

The clinic continues to function with nurses and paramedic personnel seeing most of the patients. Physicians come when they can, but the staff shortage is critical. The dental clinic is active, but no dentist is available. However, a Canadian dentist has expressed interest. They need more Creole Bibles which have already been approved by the Mission Committee. (See Summary of Requests on next page.)

Asile Dorcas

The team visited Asile Dorcas Nursing Home, noting many of the same elderly people as in the past. They are enthusiastic, seem happy, love to sing, and are more communicative. A live-in resident couple takes care of them, and both nutrition and health appear good. This is a positive change from years past, demonstrating good use of our monthly support. The overall condition looks good, but the new building is waiting for windows and doors, and thus is unoccupied. We are investigating whether money or a work team could complete the project.



Hôspital Lumière at Bonne Fin

The facility continues to function adequately, but with much stress on the staff due to shortages of personnel and upcoming turnover.

Among the greatest needs of this ministry are people, Bibles, and supplies. The new administrator, Joe Morotta is coping with the inevitable problems of such a facility and people, and we hope that his enthusiasm will bring everything together.

Two doctors and several other employees are leaving in the next six months, with one returning in December of 1996. Three new Haitian physicians have been hired. The new minimum wage laws have resulted in discontent among the nurses, and some are leaving. The surgical department is full, and they work together when emergencies occur, such as a recent bus accident which is reported at the close of this article.

They have a new Toyota vehicle for transportation, which was needed and is appreciated. By God's mercies, we were able to get a sea container of medicines worth over \$300,000 into Haiti at a cost of \$15,000 through Christian Aid Ministries who help us in other projects.

Touring the outdated, poorly equipped laboratory, the team sees vital needs for \$20,000 to equip a new lab, and \$15,000 for another container of medicines. The roof is leaking, and after discussing alternatives, the team feels it would be cost effective to search out possibilities for sending a work team in to do repairs.

A staff member reported that the single most revolutionary contribution to their facility has been the 20-kilowatt generator installed by World Relief several years ago. There is a new outpatient area, which allows them to see some patients here instead of sending them to Clinic Lumiere. The surgical and pediatric departments are full, with the medical division a bit slow.

Community Health


In December, USAID redirected its funds through the Haitian government, which cut off funds to this organization. They have 22 staff members now salaried, and will lose nearly all of them. Haitians will be required to come to a central place rather than furnishing health care in the rural areas. They will continue to offer vaccinations, but are concerned that many people will not be motivated to come.

The Poor Fund

There is always a need for the poor fund, financed mainly by staff, and used for people otherwise unable to pay for surgeries or services.

Grace Children's Hospital

We met with the administrator and the director of nursing. The hospital seems to be operating smoothly as always. Their ICU was full of young children acutely ill with TB. Malnutrition is more prevalent, and the incidence of AIDS has increased. Needs continue with emphasis on cough syrup, clothing kits, baby gowns, vitamins, small bars of homemade soap, cleaning supplies, and canned meats. The only request was to decrease the rolled bandages, of which they have enough for now. They requested that we send a sea container exclusively for them, perhaps once a year.



King's Clinic

We met Dr. Morquette and toured King's Clinic. Several doctors have their private practice in King's Clinic, which they operate for their living. At one end they have the free clinic for the poor. Items furnished by World Relief are used specifically for the poor. They have no requests at this time.

Hospital Albert Schweitzer

Albert Schweitzer continues to function well. We had lunch with Mrs. Mellon who continues to participate in the administration of the facility begun by her late husband in 1955. A recent reorganization brought them a new executive director, administrator, and pharmacist. They have a full MD staff, with no current problems with the nursing staff. Their annual budget of \$2.5 million comes as follows: 10% from patients, 30% private donations, and 60% from their endowment. They have a strong emphasis on community health and are anticipating being able to go on in spite of USAID shutting off current funds.

Touring the warehouse, we saw the supplies shipped from World Relief, and heard their expressions of gratitude for this effort.

Summary of Requests:

• PA System - \$2,000

• Key making machine - \$700

- X-Ray machine for outpatient clinic at Cite Lumiere \$25,000
- Sonogram/Ultrasound equipment
- Salary for interpreters \$200/month

• Telephone system - \$4,000

• Bibles - \$5,000 was appropriated by the Mission Committee for Bibles in the Creole language.

The Caribbean Board thanks all our brethren and friends for their loving support, and plans to continue this assistance to the desperately poor people of Haiti.

Report of Bus Accident

Excerpts from a letter received from Hôspital Lumière

...On October 4, 1995, an overloaded bus rolled down an 150 foot embankment about two miles from Hôspital Lumière, which has no emergency room, and all of whose 200 beds were full. There are only 3 doctors on the staff, but it happened that 4 doctors and one nurse were visiting that day. More than 60 victims came to our facility that afternoon, lying everywhere, on porches, in the aisles, on tables, and on walkways outside. There was lots of blood, for many were seriously injured. Perhaps the USA hospitals practice and plan for such incidents, but the question at our hospital was how an understaffed, underequipped, and under-supplied place could cope with such great needs on a remote mountain top in Haiti.

The answer was that through God's mercy, all pitched in, and the injured did receive medical care. It was an extraordinary miracle to the staff, who worked through the night into the early morning of the next day. Surgery went on for two days, but as of now, only one person died. World Relief support of this hospital enabled this to occur. The inventory which was consumed, we know will be replaced. Even now we have two containers on the dock at Port au Prince. We who serve the hospital thank you very much!

Please keep sending supplies!! Your support enables us to carry on our ministry. Enclosed is a list of needs. Send what you can and know that we at the *Hospital of Light* echo the words of the Apostle Paul,

"Wherefore I also, after I heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus, and love unto all the saints,

Cease not to give thanks for you, making mention of you in my prayers;

That the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give unto you the spirit of wisdom and revelation in the knowledge of him."

"HIS GLORY HAS EXCEEDING JOY"

Sermon by Bro. Steve Martin of Eureka, IL Jude 1:17-25

As we consider these words, we find that the author was greatly concerned and anxious for the believers. How do you and how do I find the Spirit working in our hearts today? Do we find it any different? Absolutely not!

We find that the Spirit of God, when we allow Him to be free, has one purpose, and that is to keep us where we belong. So we ask ourselves, "Where did God set us in the beginning when we came?" First of all, we know, as we look back whether we have been in the faith for just a few years or many years, we found out that He put us in a blessed way.

We want to remember that, dear ones, that the way where God has put us, which is spiritual, even as He is Spiritual, it is a blessed way. We found out that God gave unto us a responsibility for our own soul. We read about that here, as Jude wrote to the believers. He was writing here to the believers. He was warning them. We could go back into the first sixteen verses and find that he very expressly, very specifically, warned the believers against the dangers and the evils that would try to come upon them.

We read here in these last few verses that it is really a personal responsibility concerning our salvation. We have to recognize that, and we have to apply ourselves in that way. We have to realize that we have been given a real responsibility and, we can also say, a great privilege. It is an honor. Really, God blesses us with an honor when He is satisfied there in that initial process which we can read and know in the four Gospels. It is laid out very clear and plain.

Thanks be to God that in our faith, we hold this dear, that there

is to be a repentance, that there is to be a conversion, that there is to be a confession of sin before God in the presence of man. We are to become a changed person by the grace of God. By surrendering to His Word that the Spirit of God begins to dwell in our heart and we find that we become different, but it is His doings.

We find then that God instills in our heart a desire for something in the future that is yet to come. The Bible tells us that it is a rest for our soul—a home in Heaven. As we ponder over these things and as we go along in life, we find that there becomes a responsibility to the soul before God. Once He has set us upon the way, we must continue and the Spirit of God, which He pours into our heart that He cleans, reminds us of this.

We read here in these verses that it really is a very serious personal responsibility, where he says, "building up yourselves" and then he says, "keep yourselves." We have to realize that it is serious and vet, it is joyful. We need a proper balance of the two. If there is that proper balance, we will not take chances. We will not do the things that are questionable, whether it is seen or unseen. But if there is that proper balance of sobriety, and the Bible tells us that, we can't by-pass that. But if there is that proper balance of sobriety, joy, and peace, we will not miss the mark. We will be on the safe way.

He says here some very helpful things. Really, these things are so simple, but they are lifelong principles. We find out we first learn when God works in our heart in that initial process when we come to Him that the Gospels lay out of repentance and conversion.

He says here again something that we want to remember for ourselves, which will be very helpful. Sometimes we have to willfully do this. We have to want to do that and it is very simple. He says here, "But, beloved, remember ye the words which were spoken before of the apostles of our Lord Jesus Christ;" (Jude 1:17). We need to put forth effort to remember what the Bible says, and to ask ourselves when we are filled with emotion and desires to do various things or to have certain things. What would the Bible say about this?

Then if we can have this initial thought, it is an open way for the Spirit to work further and actually draw us to the Word of God. The Bible tells us, in one place, that we are to prove out the things that are good. If our heart is right, we will see the value in it. But it is contrary to the flesh because our human nature is to hurry up and to want this or that or to do this or that right now.

If we see the value in this very healthful thought, then we would remember the words which were spoken before of the apostles. What kind of words were spoken? They were inspired words—words of inspiration that came from the Spirit, the Spirit of God. That is where the most value comes of words that are spoken if they are inspired by the Spirit of God.

Dear brothers and sisters, I believe that each of you can go back into the archives of your spiritual life and remember when you were filled with joy and gladness and you came to the Lord through His Word and prayer and you remember how God spoke to your heart. What a comfort! What a confi-

dence it brought to your heart!

If there were other times when you were distressed and troubled or in despair, and you came to the Word of God because the Spirit moved you, you read and God spoke. What a joy, comfort and assurance the Word of God brought forth!

We want to remember that we need the Word of God. There is no substitute. There is simply no substitute and the best part of it all is that God has given His Spirit to interpret the Word for us as to how it applies to our daily walk of life. Then when that is done, if it is coupled with faith, faith of us in the Word of God that is revealed and action comes forth and we do, it becomes oil in our lamp. We become more assured God is with me, like we sang.

It says here, remember that you have been warned and have been told before it comes how that "...there should be mockers in the last time, who should walk after their own ungodly lusts." (Jude 1:18). That is what we have been delivered from, and we don't want to return back to that.

I wonder here, dear ones, if he is not talking within the flock of believers itself, that there would be a difference. Somehow, some way there came to be a difference, that there would be those that would walk after their own. See, here is self again, and we found out what our own self did for us. It brought us a burden and we felt guilty and unacceptable before God.

Again, a good little thought that we want to tuck away. We can go back into the Old Testament and read the examples where the self of the individual was the greater between self and submission. When self ruled, it brought heartache and disappointment.

That is a nice little thought we want to tuck away and trust that

the Spirit will remind us that we are really not anything of ourself. But it is God, Who is in us, through His Spirit that can bring us glory and blessings and delight.

So we see here those that "...should walk after their own ungodly lusts. These be they who separate themselves, sensual," satisfying the desires of the flesh, whatever it might be, "having not the Spirit." (Jude 1:18-19). Did you note that? That flesh and the Spirit, they just don't mix. If they would mix, we would have had the Spirit before there was any spiritual experience that we made. But it didn't happen that way, did it?

It was when self died and was crucified by the power of the Word and the Spirit of God, but then, we finally had and received what we were looking for, and that was a settled feeling in our heart. Isn't that a beautiful way to live, dear ones, to live with a settled, calm feeling in your heart? How did that get there? It got there when we surrendered and gave ourselves to God and let Him make us as He wanted to.

He says here that we should not be surprised. He says that in the last times there would be those that would mock, and where self would rise. The apostle warned there in the group of elders (I believe we have that account in the Acts), he says, "I am alarmed!" That may not be the exact words that he used, but he was alarmed. He said how that even among yourselves, there will rise up men of their own self.

Dear ones, let us be warned. I have to warn myself. I need to be warned. We all need to be warned. We cannot trust the flesh. We cannot trust ourself. We cannot let our own self will come to pass again, like it did before. We must live a humble and surrendered life. We must live to the glory of God and not to the glory of self.

He says, "But ye, beloved, building up yourselves on your most holy faith..." (Jude 1:20). We need to look at our faith as being a holy faith—individually and collectively. We need to come to church with that type of attitude that here is a place of holiness on earth, where God has drawn hearts together and bound them with His Spirit and His love and keeps them by His Word.

We need to come to church with that thought in our mind, that here is a holy place and it is holy because God is holy and He is here. We believe that. That is our faith that we feel His presence through the Spirit.

He says, "...building up yourselves on your most holy faith, praying in the Holy Ghost," (Jude 1:20). Very essential. It is a must! We cannot bypass this principle that we pray in the Spirit. Again, we need to approach prayer in this way. This is the right way to approach prayer, whether we are brothers or sisters. We want to pray as the Spirit would move our heart.

We found and we find on a continual basis that the Spirit is like the Saviour Himself, for He said, "I am meek and lowly in heart:" (Matthew 11:29). The Spirit does not demand, but He entreats...gently entreats praying in the Holy Ghost.

He said, "Keep yourselves in the love of God..." (Jude 1:21). Here we see again the personal responsibility. There is a certain place we need to keep ourselves, and we have to want to do this, and that is within the bosom of the flock.

We read in Ephesians that the church is the habitation of God. It is the dwelling place of God through His Spirit. Here is where we want to keep ourselves in the spiritual bosom of the church where there is love, devotion and the zeal that is always all of it

directed by the Holy Spirit. We will not miss the mark if the Spirit is in control of our life, in every aspect.

He says, "...looking for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ unto eternal life." (Jude 1:21). Yes, we cannot lose focus of the great importance that the Saviour plays in our life and what He means to us. We cannot ever lose focus of that. Hopefully, we know that God has designed the experience that He brings us through when we first came to Him that it will leave a lifelong impression on our heart that we will never forget the importance of our Saviour. It was through Him that we found remission of our sins, through His shed blood there on the cross.

We just simply have to believe it. If our belief is true, we will live according to the Word. So he says that we should look "...for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ unto eternal life." (Jude 1:21). We want to continue. We don't want to give up and think that the trial is too great, but He says unto eternal life.

When does eternal life come? We know that it comes after death. At least, for now until the Lord returns, and that could be (we don't know), we believe, it will be soon. But the point is we want to continue. From whence God has set us and started us, we want to continue on.

He says, "And of some have compassion, making a difference: And others save with fear, pulling them out of the fire; hating even the garment spotted by the flesh." (Jude 1:22-23). Dear ones, this will take the Spirit of God in my heart and yours to do this. If the Spirit can enlighten us on these two verses, we will not go beyond the bounds that the Word sets. I must confess that I don't fully understand these verses.

But he does say of some have

compassion. If we are Christ-like, we will be willing to have compassion when compassion is necessary, and that we would have a sympathetic understanding of another's problems with the desire to help. That is what compassion is. Isn't that what Jesus had when He walked here upon the earth? That is what He had with us. He really did have a sympathetic understanding of our problem, and our problem was that we had a burden on our heart and He had a desire to help.

He had already gone to the cross. But then individually and for us personally, He had that desire to help us in our generation almost two thousand years later. He saw us in our plight and He had that desire to help and when we expressed that need, He came and delivered us.

He says, "And others save with fear, pulling them out of the fire; hating even the garment spotted by the flesh." (Jude 1:23). Hate is a strong word. It really is, but he says, "...hating even the garment spotted by the flesh." We need to hate sin. We really need to hate worldliness because worldliness leads to sin.

Many times, many times that is the way Satan approaches to every one of us, that we would partake of something that is worldly. Not necessarily sinful, but worldly. If that worldly partaking is unchecked, it will for sure lead to sin. How are we going to know what is worldly, dear ones? Here again, it goes back to the Spirit of God and a closeness to His Word, for God will reveal what His limits are. It is within His limits that we need to be.

He says, "Now unto him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless..." (Jude 1:24). Isn't that comforting to know that we have a Shepherd, we have a Father that is able to keep

us from falling and to present you faultless? Why right here it casts out the idea of once saved, always saved.

It is impossible to reach Heaven without having any sin. That is not true. It says right here that there is One Who is able to keep us from falling and to present you faultless. Nobody should ever use that as an excuse, but it says here that there is One that is able to keep us from falling and to present you faultless. To be without sin, that is what it means. To be faultless without any blame and without any sin. There is One that is able to do that, and we believe that, don't we, dear ones?

We believe that we can live a life here upon the earth by the grace of God according to His Word with the Spirit indwelling our hearts. We can live a life that is free from sin so that we can be faultless before Him.

He says, "...before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy," (Jude 1:24). I have to believe this way exactly what it says here, that that will be a time of exceeding joy when we shall be, if we have been faithful by the grace of God, presented before the Father with exceeding joy.

He says, "To the only wise God..." (Jude 1:25). To the only wise God. We read in another place one faith, one Lord, one baptism. He says, "To the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever." (Jude 1:25). Why would anybody want to choose a different way? Here is safety. Here is comfort.

Then, that blessed reward!





How the renewed gospel spread from Switzerland into Hungary is a marvelous account that testifies to the power of the Holy Spirit. It was His work!

In the summer of 1839, two locksmiths—John Denkel and John Kropacsek—returned from Switzerland to their native Hungary. They had spent time in Switzerland learning their trade.

They had met Bro. Samuel Froehlich. He explained the plan of salvation to them, and they became believers. In time, Denkel was accorded authority to preach and baptize in Hungary.

While Denkel and Kropacsek brought the revived faith into their native Hungary, the way was not open for them to widely open the door of truth to this nation.

It was God's will that this would fall on a young shop apprentice, and an unlikely prospect, named Louis Hencsey. He was a kindhearted young man. Both Denkel and Hencsey worked in the same shop. They were both poor and had few resources. At this time, the Roman Catholic church was very dominant, both in the Hungarian state church, and in political circles. Their financial resources were plentiful, and they had a presence in Hungary that was centuries old.

The probability was feeble that these young, uneducated, and financially poor men could instigate a religious awakening. The state and the state church was often harsh, and could quickly stop any type of evangelism outside its jurisdiction. The confiscation of Bibles, of property, and the imposing of jail sentences curtailed most anyone who proposed to compete with the established church.

Yet, the Holy Spirit's glow that drew Bro. Denkel was now beaming out to hover over Louis Hencsey, and beckon him to a mighty calling in which he would eventually begin to preach and establish churches.

Hencsey's heart yearned for the truth. Already in his Catholic youth he was impressed with anything associated with faith. In The Nazarenes, author Karoly Eotvos writes, "Day by day he became more and more communicative by opening his heart to Denkel. His sincere attitude made Denkel disclose to him the sacred doctrine and introduce to him the great mystery of salvation."

It was after the day's toil in the shop that John Denkel and Louis Hencsey met to talk about faith, and Hencsey turned his heart totally to God. They met in the workshop in secret after the other workers left for their homes. There was nowhere else to meet.

Eotvos continues, "A snowstorm was raging outside and a strong wind was lashing against the windowpanes of the workshop. The crackling flame of the tallow candle was dimly blinking and the dying sparks of the foundry twirled now and then. Yes, it was a great moment. The two young men stood there speechless, as if in a dream. They looked into the fire with overflowing emotion. This is how Hencsey describes that evening:

"My loving heavenly Father created me as a powerless being. When Brother John Denkel threw light into my agitated soul, the words stuck in my throat. I was overcome by silence, my soul grieved me, and my eyes filled with tears. I went up to my dear Brother, flung my arms around his neck and kissed him. From this moment on, I began to feel a special strength and peace."

John Hencsey, having begun his repentance, was eventually converted and baptized. He remained single during the remainder of his short life.

A frail man possessed of enormous spiritual zeal and devotional energies, it was his lot to lead the establishment of the new faith in Hungary. It was an outgrowth of the Froehlich movement in Switzerland where the new believers were called "Evangelical Baptists". In Hungary they were referred to as "The Nazarenes".

At first it was one convert at a time. Hencsey had to speak one on one in order to explain the tenets of the Bible. Because he and his early cohorts were so poor, and had to work long hours in their shops, they had no meeting room. Gathering together was a problem, and especially so because of the wrath from the state church.


Finally, the owner of a shop, Anna Nipp, became converted, and the early believers were able to meet in her living room. This was greatly beneficial to the new believers, and this was a springboard to establishing outlying congregations.

The massive resources of the Hungarian state and the state church were not obstacle enough to turn back the tide of a new faith that arose in Hungary in the mid-1800's.

It is ironic that while the faith established by Brother Froehlich spread westward into North America, it found constitutional protection, and was welcomed, it found the opposite as it gravitated eastward into the nation of Hungary. But state power could not stem the power of God.

"The Virgin Birth"

The question about the virgin birth of Christ arose and was discussed among the small number of students in our class. One American girl said that the virgin birth was not essential to her faith. I wondered how that could be if we have faith in Christ as the Son of God and as our Saviour.

When I objected to any questioning of the miracles recorded in the Bible, Professor Iino explained to the rest of the class that it seems sacrilegious to some people to question the miracles. He could sense that I considered it to be preposterous.

Now it is time once again to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, the Son of the Creator God. Do we ever ask ourselves whether or not we believe in the virgin birth? I think not — we take it for granted that we all believe in the virgin birth. Nevertheless, it might be well for us at this season to ponder the miracle of the birth of Jesus Christ.

"Now the birth of Jesus Christ was on this wise: When as his mother was espoused to Joseph, before they came together, she was found with child of the Holy Ghost." (Matthew 1:18)

We ask our converts if they believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, that He died for their sins and for the sins of the whole world, that He arose again, and that He is coming again. We do not ask them if they believe in the virgin birth. We hope this is covered in believing that He is the Son of God and it should be, but depending on your definition of the Son of God, it may not be covered. It is possible to think of that terminology to simply mean that Christ was a great prophet who had power from God to perform miracles. Words sometimes mean different things to different people.

The virgin birth is the focal point for remembering the birth of Jesus Christ. Because of our background, we will probably continue to assume that our converts believe in the virgin birth. However, not all converts entering our churches have our background and we probably should not assume too much as to what they believe. In Japan we are delighted if we can find a person in the general public who really believes in the living Creator God. To think of there being many, many gods is the norm.

This Christmas, among other things, let's emphasize the virgin birth of Jesus Christ. If His birth would have been like other human beings, He, like the rest of us, would have been under the curse of sin and could not have become our Saviour. He was born of a virgin.
