


In His Hand are the Deep Places of the Earth ...

Spur is about 20,000 feet above sea level and surrounded by only desolate, barren, and cold waste. Who would ever care if it "blew its top"? However, we know that the red hot amber ash traveled over 100 miles charring cars, planes and homes as the great phenomenon of nature occurred.

A volcano, like a man, has an inner core, which often goes unnoticed by the spectator.

It is well known that in the core of the earth is molten heat which at times blows its way out of core and can destroy anything in its path. Notice the molten path leading away from Mt. Spur. It is a scar that will last for timeless ages.

Anger is very much like the molten core in the earth. It can sometimes boil in us for years and heat up at a moment's notice. People around us may be totally unaware of the seething within and be so taken back when we "blow our top". Who cares if we blow our top? As long as I am not near anyone, who will know? Just remember, that as the molten rock of a volcano travels many miles, so does unbridled anger. Also, God knows.

An amusing story of anger traveling goes like this:

A husband, after a very frustrating day at the office and feeling the wrath of the boss, stormed into the house only to see a terrible mess. When his wife came out of the kitchen to meet him, he yelled, "Do I always have to come home to such a mess?" Hurt and frustrated, the mother turned to the eldest daughter and vented her anger. "If you would help me just once instead of being glued to that telephone, this place would look a lot better!" The sister then turned to her little brother and blew her top. "Why do you have to throw your toys all over? Because of you I always get yelled at." The little boy of six looked around, bewildered. He stomped out the back door and kicked the dog off the porch. "That will teach you not to get in my way," muttered the little boy.

While the story may be just a little humorous, it is so indicative of how anger can affect our loved ones.

First, when we lose our temper, we subtract years from our lives.

Second, when we are angry, we lose the respect of our loved ones or friends around us.

Third, our own anger may provoke anger in those we love, even our children.

There is no reasoning with an angry person who can rant and rave, even bringing destruction into heart and soul and never once listens to those round about them who are trying to settle them down.

An unkind word from an angry mouth is like lava burning its way down the mountain. It leaves a path of destruction that will last for years.

Just "keeping still" is one of the finest things we can do. It doesn't matter so much what someone says. It is what you say in reply, nine times out of ten, that makes a quarrel.

Beloved, not all anger is wrong. A little anger can hone our senses. It is wrong, however, when it is conceived upon slight and inadequate provocation and when it continues long. "...let not the sun go down upon your wrath."

A great President once lost his temper with a servant and spoke very unkindly to him. The next day he called his trembling servant into his study. "Here," he said, "take this silver watch and whenever you look at it, remember that your master, in a moment of passion, said to you what he now regrets and that he was not ashamed to confess that he had done so. I am sorry."

Yes, when we find that we are the brunt of anger, we do best to be still until the burning ceases. Then forbearance and forgiveness are the healing balm that can soothe the heart, the mind and the soul.

Light From The Word



We are surrounded every day by individuals and institutions who have a relative outlook on nearly every situation they encounter. God's Holy Word unfailingly holds before our eyes the truth, which sets us free (John 8:32). One of the keystones of our Father's message to us is obedience to His will for our lives. His repeated calls to obedience lamentably are frequently unheeded, and the consequences of the sin of disobedience fill chapter after chapter in God's Word, ever an example for us (I Cor. 10:11).

One of the most direct accounts of our Father's displeasure when His Word was not obeyed is found in I Sam. 15. God had commanded King Saul to destroy the Amalekites, a people who had repeatedly harassed the children of Israel over an extended time period. King Saul had fulfilled much of what God wanted him to be but had not completely carried out God's will. The prophet Samuel was made aware of God's extreme displeasure and was sent to Saul to pronounce judgment. When questioned, Saul maintained he had done God's will. Samuel asked why animals and the Amalekite king still lived. Saul's protestation that he and the people had saved the best as a sacrifice to God was met with the strong question "Hath the Lord as great delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices, as in obeying the voice of the Lord? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice and to hearken than the fat of rams" (I Sam. 15:22).

We know of God's love for us (I John 4:16). We know of His wisdom (James 1:17) and when He demands obedience, we know He unquestionably knows best and what He directs is for our good. We remember the apostles' words to the authorities in Acts 5:29 that "we ought to obey God rather than men" and we must unfailingly choose His will. Our Father makes it clear in His Word that often obe-

dience to Him means submission to authorities He has set in place. Whether to parents (Eph. 6:1) or church leaders (Heb. 13:17) or Christian home authority or governmental authority (Titus 3:1), there is eternal wisdom in God's Word that we obey His will.

As believers, we should never view these Godly directives to obedience as burdensome or oppressive; but rather, we should see His wisdom in structuring our lives so that we can most effectively live in harmony and peace with each other throughout the household of faith. In addition, we therein find freedom to better serve Him and carry out the work of His Kingdom here on earth, free from the incessant bickering and fighting brought about by lack of submission to authority and outright disobedience. Indeed, the scriptural concept of obedience rests firmly on our trust in God and our heartfelt belief that He knows host

In this day of grace through our Lord Jesus Christ, we do realize that the exact types of sacrifice that Saul had in mind are no longer a requirement in our worship of God. In Paul's first letter to the church in Corinth, there is the beautiful chapter about charity, or Christian love. In it there are numerous references to the things of sacrificial nature which without love would be hollow and without effect. We similarly need to understand that if we engage in conduct that we feel to be sacrificial in nature that is in disobedience to God or His ordained authority, we miss the mark and cannot rightly expect His blessing.

In order to obey, we need to be still and listen. God's words from Samuel were that "to hearken (listen)" was better "than the fat of rams". As believers, we love God's Word. We believe in the guidance and prompting of His Holy Spirit as we read His Word. Our sincere prayers to Him are answered through His Word and if we truly listen, the results are rich blessings for us and those we humbly serve.

Certainly, a most sobering aspect of the account of Saul and Samuel is the conclusion Samuel brought relative to the disobedience. Here is portrayed a willful disregard of God's Holv will and direction. Evident in Saul's actions and his stubborn defense of them is the all too human element of pride. In fact, he was so persuaded of the rightness of his action, he seems almost not to have realized he had disregarded God's will. Regardless of what God had said, he had selectively decided to disregard it. This is precisely the sort of deception Satan uses on individuals today. If God and His will are acknowledged at all, it is secondary (or worse) to the wisdom and purposes of men.

God, of course, was emphatic in describing the sin to Saul through Samuel, "For rebellion (disobedience to God's will) is as the sin of witchcraft, and stubbornness is as iniquity and idolatry" (I Sam. 15:23). How sad to be so deceived and face such judgment at the end. The consequences of rebelling against God-whether refusing His loving call in the first place or selectively ignoring His voice throughout our lives—are usually evident in our life but are much worse in eternity. We need only reflect on how abhorrent witchcraft and serving other gods is to our Heavenly Father to realize just how closely we should take His instructions to obey Him in all things. Saul ultimately lost his life and his kingdom, but for years he followed a declining path away from God's will that led him to turn from those who loved him and finally to commit the sin of consulting a witch.

God's Word is so very full of good and wholesome counsel. He promises to reveal His will to us and asks us to follow closely, listening each day as He speaks to us through His Spirit and Word. If we are obedient to His holy will, we will save ourselves much grief and heartache.

Report of Mission Committee Meeting November 14, 1995

The Mission Committee meets four times a year, coming together normally in a hotel near Chicago's O'Hare airport, a central location that is easy to reach. We hope this brief report will be of interest to you.

Financial Report

For the quarter ended October 31, we received contributions of \$61,072 to the Mission Fund, and \$27,842 to the Bible Fund. The total was about equal to the same period a year ago.

The major expenditure for the period was nearly \$30,000 for Bibles to be used in our distribution program. The Committee approved spending \$2,000 for Bibles in Yugoslavia, \$5,000 for Haitian Bibles in the Creole language to be distributed through Hospital Lumiere, and \$500 for Bibles in the native language of our Mission in India. It was also approved to provide hymn books for mid-week services which have started at Indiana University in Bloomington, Indiana. A contribution of \$20,000 was made to the Nashville congregation to help complete their remodeling project.

European Church Building Fund

As of October 31, over \$210,000 from 21 congregations and several individuals has been collected for this purpose. The following allocations were made.

1. Paks, Hungary was given \$30,000 for their new church building, planned for construction next year. Due to soaring inflation, it was felt best to purchase materials as soon as possible.

2. \$50,000 was sent to Yugoslavia for remodeling of old churches in need of repair.

3. On the last trip to Romania, it was apparent that there is need for a building to store the food packages coming monthly from our Bluffton Distribution Center. Presently they are stored in an inadequate and very inconvenient garage on the property of Elder Vertaci. His health is not good, which adds to the problem. The Romanians proposed that an old building adjacent to the new Arad church be razed, with new construction accommodating the storage needs. Included in the new building will be a small apartment for a caretaker couple, which is a common practice in Europe. Since the present usage of the church is only one day per week, the Romanian officials have threatened to cut off the gas supply. For this reason in addition to security, it is best to have someone living on the premises on a permanent basis.

After approval of this by the European Board, the

Mission Committee allotted \$30,000 for this project and the World Relief Committee also appropriated \$50,000 for the same purpose. An additional \$50,000 was appropriated for the construction and repair of other Romanian church buildings.

Pews to Hungary

Our brethren at Tremont, Illinois recently replaced the pews in their church building with new ones. They have decided to send the existing pews to Hungary to be used in one of their churches. Many congregations throughout Eastern Europe use roughly made benches with no backs, sitting through long services on them. There is no question that these pews will be much appreciated. The Mission Committee agreed to cover the costs of transportation to Hungary. The brethren in Breidenbach, Germany did the same with the pews and other furniture from their old church building.

Vehicles in Eastern Europe

There is a need for several vehicles in East European countries. These are used by elders and ministers who travel to scattered congregations to carry out their duties.

The vehicles serve to bring people, few of whom have their own transportation, to services. They are also used to distribute medicine and supplies. Approval was given to allocate \$20,000 for vehicles in Yugoslavia and \$10,000 for a vehicle in Ukraine. The World Relief Committee approved matching funds at their last meeting. In the USA

Over the years, hundreds of our people, young and old alike, have gone to disaster sites to help rebuild what has been damaged or lost. Projects are ongoing, coordinated by our US Board. We are prepared to respond very quickly, having done so often when storms or floods occurred. On these projects, volunteers can work on a daily basis without having to commit themselves

to a week or more away from their own jobs. Often projects involve erecting or repairing buildings, and we try to get the message out in time that one's involvement can be scheduled in advance. Teams have always responded to the call, and your support is greatly appreciated.

A great part in helping the unfortunate is through sewing groups who work at this

time of the year preparing varied kits, bandages, gowns, blankets, etc. Soap making groups are also a very important role in assisting the poor in other lands.

In Mexico

Since 1989, Over 150 brethren and friends from 34 congregations have seized the opportunity to be a part of one of twelve medical-dental teams going to this impoverished country. The mission is to give care and education in the name of Christ. Although few know Spanish, many have witnessed joy in faces of those who have received medical or dental care, supplies, and Bibles. Seeing the white lab jackets on our volunteers often brings people who request Bibles, considering them as important as physical care.

The mobile van with supplies and equipment winds its way over dirt roads past cardboard shacks, and sets up clinics in poor areas. While early teams served around 500 people in one week's time, current teams are now serving that many patients per day. As they work amidst poverty and sickness, each day they can view the skyscrapers of El Paso, Texas, only miles away, yet a world away in their lifestyles and human need.

It never fails that volunteers say they find these opportunities rewarding and fulfilling. It is an experience that changes lives and develops perspective for our purpose on earth as believers. We would encourage anyone who is able, to become involved in some program here or elsewhere.

In the Caribbean

Last month we printed the report of an evaluation team who visited Haiti. Hundreds of brethren, friends, families, couples, single persons, retirees, and Bible School Classes have lent their assistance to the many work projects in Haiti and now in Jamaica. Honor is always given to almighty God, yet still He works through people who show their love for mankind through their words and actions. The message from the recipients is that, "Apostolic Christian World Relief is making a difference."

In addition to volunteer labor, we are supplying Bibles through hospitals, schools, and clinics. An extensive program of drilling wells and education about clean water is a very vital part of the work. By the grace of God, we were able to furnish over \$300,000 in pharmaceuticals through another organization at a cost of only \$12,000. The need is immense, and our brothers saw the medicines in place.

Food, clothing, sewing machines, medical equipment, and many other items are shipped through our distribution centers, using volunteer workers there also. Work teams are scheduled to accommodate all ages. Contact Bro. Harold Witzig at 309/ 266-6263 for more information.

In that place between wakefulness and dreams. I found myself in a room. There were no distinguishing features save for the one wall covered with small index card files. They were like the ones in libraries that list titles by author or subject in alphabetical order. But these files, which stretched from floor to ceiling and seemingly endlessly in either direction, had very different headings. As I drew near the wall of files, the first to catch my attention was one that read "Friends I Have Made". I opened it and began flipping through the cards. I quickly shut it, shocked to realize that I recognized the names written on each one. And then without being told, I knew exactly where I was.

This lifeless room with its small files was a crude catalog system for my life. Here were written the actions of my every moment, big and small, in a detail my memory couldn't match. A sense of wonder and curiosity, coupled with horror, stirred within me as I began randomly opening files and exploring their content. Some brought joy and sweet memories; others a sense of shame and regret so intense that I would look over my shoulder to see if anyone was watching. The file



named "Friends I Have Made" was next to one marked "Friends I Have Betrayed". The titles ranged from the mundane to the outright weird. "Books I Have Read", "Lies I Have Told", "Comfort I Have Given", "Jokes I Have Laughed At". Some were almost hilarious in their exactness: "Things I've Yelled at My Brothers." Others I couldn't laugh at: "Things I Have Done in My Anger", "Things I Have Muttered Under My Breath at My Parents".

I never ceased to be surprised by the contents. Often there were many more cards than I expected. Some-

times fewer than I hoped. I was overwhelmed by the sheer volume of the life I had lived. Could it be possible that I had the time in my 17 years to write each of these thousands or even millions of cards? But each card confirmed this truth. Each was written in my own handwriting. Each signed with my signature.

When I pulled out the file marked "Songs I Have Listened To", I realized the files grew to contain their contents. The cards were packed tightly, and yet after two or three vards, I hadn't found the end of the file. I shut it, shamed, not so much by the quality of music, but more by the vast amount of time I knew that file represented. When I came to a file marked "Lustful Thoughts", I

felt a chill run through my body. I pulled the file out only an inch, not willing to test its size, and drew out a card. I shuddered at its detailed content. I felt sick to think that such a moment had been recorded.

An almost animal rage broke on me. One thought

dominated my mind: "No one must ever see these cards! No one must ever see this room! I have to destroy them!" In an insane frenzy I vanked the file out. Its size didn't matter now. I had to empty it and burn the cards. But as I took it at one end and began pounding it on the floor, I could not dislodge a single card. I became desperate and pulled out a card, only to find it as strong as steel when I tried to tear it. Defeated and utterly helpless, I returned the file to its slot. Leaning my forehead against the wall, I let out a long,

self-pitying sigh.

And then I saw it. The title bore "People I Have Shared the Gospel With". The handle was brighter than those around it, newer, almost unused. I pulled on its handle and a small box not more than three inches long fell into my hands. I

could count the cards it contained on one hand. And then the tears came. I began to weep. Sobs so deep that the hurt started in my stomach and shook through me. I fell on my knees and cried. I cried out

of shame, from the overwhelming shame of it all. The rows of file shelves swirled in my tear-filled eyes. No one must ever, ever know of this room. I must lock it up and hide the key.

> But then as I pushed away the tears, I saw Him. No, please not Him. Not here. Oh, anyone but Jesus. I watched helplessly as He began to open the files and read the cards. I couldn't bear to watch His response. And in the moments I could bring myself

to look at His face, I saw a sorrow deeper than my own. He seemed to intuitively go to the worst boxes. Why did He have to read every one? Finally He turned and looked at me from across the room. He looked at me with pity in His eyes. But this was a pity that didn't anger me. I dropped my head, covered my face with my hands and began to cry again. He walked over and put His arm around me.

He could have said so many things. But He didn't say a word. He just cried with me. Then He got up and walked back to the wall of files. Starting at one end of the room, He took out a file and, one by one, began to sign His name over mine on each card. "No!" I shouted rushing to Him. All I could find to say was "No, no," as I pulled the card from Him.



His name shouldn't be on these cards. But there it was, written in red so rich. so dark, so alive. The name of Jesus covered mine. It was written with His blood. He gently took the card back. He smiled a

sad smile and began to sign the cards.

I don't think I'll ever understand how He did it so quickly, but the next instant it seemed I heard Him close the last file and walk back to my side. He placed His hand on my shoulder and said, "It is finished."

### "MAKE HEAVEN YOUR GOAL" Sermon by Bro. Mark Ramsier of Sardis, OH Acts 15:1-31

When Jesus Christ walked upon the earth, when the disciples had a question, they just asked, didn't they? They could just say, "Master, what about this?" and He could answer them.

There are a lot of times we long for that same privilege, don't we? Whenever some question comes up, and I believe they come to all of us, and we want an answer, we wish we could just say, "Lord, what about this?" He could just tell us plainly how to handle this situation or what to do or what the right decision is.

But somehow, it hasn't been in His will to make things quite like that for us. We are creatures of choice, we are creatures of minds and creatures that if we seek God's will, we could achieve wisdom and we could make decisions. God asks that we seek Him, and we will find. If we knock, it will be opened, but it takes a little effort on our part.

It seems that Paul, Peter, Barnabas, these men should have had all the answers, but there should not have been questions. But it wasn't so even in that first century church. But every question that came up could be answered. God gave a method to reveal to them of how they could get together and they could reason things out and they go on further carrying out the work of the church.

What is the work of the church? It is to spread the Word, isn't it? If God's people are disputing and arguing and not coming to any agreement in peace among themselves, how can the Word be spread? Of course, it cannot.

So we be known as Christians by our love. Part of that love is reasoning, isn't it? Getting together and telling both sides of the story and just calmly coming to a conclusion that everyone can agree with or can live with that the work of Christ might go on.

"And certain men which came down from Judaea taught the brethren, and said, Except ye be circumcised after the manner of Moses, ye cannot be saved." (Acts 15:1). We can imagine the problem that caused, can't we? If someone comes up to us and tells us, "If you do this or you don't do that, you are going to lose your salvation," what a problem that would be because salvation has to do with eternity.

We are concerned about eternal life, aren't we? That is why we are here tonight. We are concerned about eternal life. This Word at times can make so much sense about life that we turn it into a philosophy instead of into a faith because within it are all the answers for how we can walk and how we can walk successfully.

But in the end, it is because of eternal life that we seek God's will and we look into the Word. These men came and said, "Unless you are circumcised, you cannot be saved." That was something that had to be worked out.

"When therefore Paul and Barnabas had no small dissension and disputation with them, they determined that Paul and Barnabas, and certain other of them, should go up to Jerusalem unto the apostles and elders about this question." (Acts 15:2)

We read that in the multitude of counselors there is safety. (See Proverbs 11:14). Only in the multitude of experienced counselors, there has to be more safety, isn't there? They knew they had to go to those with the most experience and those who had spent the most time with the Lord. Among those men, if anywhere, this weighty question could be answered.

"And being brought on their way by the church, they passed through Phenice and Samaria. declaring the conversion of the Gentiles: and they caused great joy unto all the brethren. And when they were come to Jerusalem. they were received of the church, and of the apostles and elders, and they declared all things that God had done with them. But there rose up certain of the sect of the Pharisees which believed, saving, That it was needful to circumcise them, and to command them to keep the law of Moses. And the apostles and elders came together for to consider of this matter." (Acts 15:3-6)

I guess it really behooves us to pray, doesn't it? We believe that prayer is not in vain, and that prayer is heard. We think of that beautiful prayer of Solomon when he beseeched God to look down from heaven and to keep His promises. He asked Him to look after him, to look after his people, look after his nation, look after the kingship and he believed that God would hear those prayers and answer.

We have to have that same faith as we think of those common men meeting and trying to discern the answers to questions when obviously there isn't an easy answer for.

We have to pray when the Lord lays that on our hearts what we are really trying to do, and what we really have been called for. Help us all to grasp eternal life is what we are all seeking for.

and He asked a question, "When I return, will I find faith upon the earth?" It is a question that we, perhaps, think often of today. Will He find faith or will He just find a lifestyle? Will He just find a philosophy when He comes back? Or will He find faith in what He did upon the cross?

To think that we need to discern truth requires prayer. May all of us just take a little extra time in the next few days to pray that God in His mercy will look down from heaven and reveal His will to those who seek Him and ask for His will to be revealed.

We have children, don't we, most of us? We have children that we are concerned about and our prayer isn't just for us, just for now. It is for time that goes on, isn't it? If we lose just a little bit here, or we lose just a little bit there, time goes on and soon, we wonder what is left.

We are accountable, aren't we, for what comes after? Just like those before were accountable for what has come after them. If things need to be put into check, or held in place, it is up to us right now, isn't it, to be good stewards of what God has placed in each one of our hands? We need to live beyond ourselves, beyond what we need, beyond what works best for us. We need to live for faith and for the future. Again, have that faith that if we just trust God, He is going to provide.

It is the Father's good pleasure to give us the kingdom, isn't it? It is His good pleasure to give us the kingdom, but it has to be our lot and our desire to seek Him that He might find us worthy to give us that kingdom.

"And when there had been much disputing, Peter rose up, and said unto them, Men and brethren, ye know how that a good while ago God made choice among us, that the Gentiles by my mouth should hear the word of the gospel, and believe. And God, which knoweth the hearts, bare them witness, giving them the Holy Ghost, even as he did unto us; And put no difference between us and them, purifying their hearts by faith." (Acts 15:7-9)

"Now therefore why tempt ye God, to put a yoke upon the neck of the disciples, which neither our fathers nor we were able to bear? But we believe that through the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ we shall be saved, even as they." (Acts 15:10-11)

They had to deal with the law, didn't they? They had to deal with generation after generation of discerning the law and living the law. They turned that law into a way of life, didn't they, into more of a way of life than a way of faith because it was all they knew?

But when Jesus Christ came, He made a difference. He showed them that the law was a school master to bring them to Christ, and the law was that which should reveal sin, but it might lead them to Christ.

The Apostle Peter here could say, "Let's not put that yoke back on them which they were not able to bear and which our fathers nor we were able to bear."

He could instruct them that it wasn't necessary for the Gentiles to follow that law. He could show them what was really important. He said, "But we believe that through the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ we shall be saved, even as they." (Acts 15:11)

That is why we gathered this evening, isn't it? Because of the Lord Jesus Christ and the grace that is available to each one of us, we might be saved. What are we going to be saved from? We are going to be saved from a poor life, we are going to be saved from not knowing how we should live, and we know we are going to be saved from eternal death.

That is the purpose of the gospel — that we might be saved and kept for eternal life. It is through the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Do you ever think of that eloquent prayer that Solomon had? It is beautiful to read, with all his wisdom, how he turned to the Lord to express his thoughts and express his heart. I believe it was with a humble heart that he prayed at that time, but somewhere down through the years, he got confused, didn't he? That humble spirit that he had got lost.

If we just read through the Book of Ecclesiastes, we read a troubled, confused man, don't we? He strayed. He did not seek counsel evidently, did he? He did not use the counsel that he had been given and it seemed to be a bitter and sad end that Solomon, the son of David, came to.

I guess it is a fear that we have, too, isn't it? God has given us much. He has given us the Word to read. He has given us brethren to assemble with. He has given us a good land to live in. He has given us a place to worship, and many of the same things that Solomon had. I guess that we have that same fear that somewhere, somehow down the line, with all the blessings that we have, we might slip.

But if we can just remain in the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, it won't happen. So we believe that through the grace and the Lord Jesus Christ, we shall be saved even as they. Again, it is going to be through our prayer and through our humbleness that God can speak to us as mere men.

He said that God had chosen, when Jesus Christ died and made some changes, to show them that there was no difference, he said, between us and them. There was no difference. There is no difference between us either, is there? I heard recently that the ground at the foot of the cross is level. There is nobody higher than anybody else there. We can come humbly to seek God. He is going to provide our needs, putting no difference between us if we just humbly seek His face.

It said they had much disputing. I really don't know how strong that disputing word is, but they gave their points of view, didn't they?

They explained their sides why they thought this was right or whether they thought that was right, but they were able to come to an agreement without any kind of split, weren't they? They could come to a general agreement and take that word then back to those that had an interest in it.

There was a blessing on this meeting, wasn't there? We are going to encounter differences in our lives. God has put that mind in us and He has put that difference in personalities and He has asked us to work things out. He provides His grace so that it might be so.

Let's use the example of this meeting as a pattern for our lives, too. Just calmly talk about the differences and work them out.

There is no blessing in disagreement. There is no peace in separation and bitterness. God cannot work, can He, in a situation like that?

But if we seek Him and just calmly reason the problems we have, reason them out with each other, God will honor that if we follow His Word. He will provide what we need — provide a solution if both sides are humble and can be lived with on both sides.

We look at the end of this chapter, and we see that there is another discussion between Paul and Barnabas. Barnabas wanted to take John Mark with him on a missionary journey.

Paul was a little upset with Mark, evidently, because of his actions on a previous journey. Paul thought it was not good to take him with them as he departed with them previously and went not with them to the work.

"And the contention was so sharp between them, that they departed as under one from the other: and so Barnabas took Mark, and sailed unto Cyprus; And Paul chose Silas, and departed, being recommended by the brethren unto the grace of God." (Acts 15:39-40). We think if any two men could try to sit down and reason something out, it should have been those two men, shouldn't it? Two men that were given a lot of power by God.

It said that they had a disagreement so sharp that they split up. I think it is easier when we are first converted to be agreeable and to listen, but as time goes on and we gain some experience and we learn some things from God's Word, we make a little progress and then somebody disagrees with us, perhaps it is not so easy then, is it?

We have an example in this chapter of the way to handle things and a way not to handle things. Let us not let our age and our experience turn into pride that we can't still reason. Remember still, there is no difference between us. Again God is going to honor that and bless that.


There is so much work that needs to be done. There are so many souls that need to know about the Lord Jesus Christ. There are children that need to be raised. All those needs need confident Christians to carry out — Christians that dwell in peace and live the Word.

If we cannot work out the disagreements among ourselves, how can we take this message to the world? That is called hypocrisy, isn't it?

May the Lord allow us to remain humble and may He allow us to continue praying and seeing the importance of prayer. May He allow us to grasp that the path we are on is concerned with eternal life, and not only this life. We understand all those things and we are going to have priorities that are set in the proper order.

God has called us to walk in a path that follows the cross, but it is a path that leads to heaven where we will be able to see Jesus Christ face to face. Whenever we lose sight of the goal, our priorities change, but if we can just keep that goal in sight, we are going to live differently than the world. If we can keep praying and we can stay humble, God is going to take us home.

Along the way, we are going to spread the wonderful message of Jesus Christ. We can live above the world and above the way the world lives, but then in the end, there is still eternal life.



The establishment of the Nazarene church in Hungary is worthy of remembrance. Under the influence of Samuel H. Froehlich, young Hungarian shop apprentices returned to their native land to preach and witness a new Bible-based faith.

Miraculous incidents reflect a Godgiven legacy. The manner in which souls were drawn to the new faith are inspiring. One such example is that of Joseph Kovacs who lived in a village called Nemes.

Kovacs was an educated man of the lesser nobility. He farmed and attended to his vineyards. He took a partisan interest in government and politics. Eotvos, in *The Nazarenes*, describes him as high strung and "a man of vehement and choleric temperament." He was sometimes thrown into jail for his aggressive outbursts.

One day a young fox got stuck in a ventilation hole in Kovac's cellar. He caught him alive. After keeping the fox for several weeks, his wife took it to market and sold it. On walking back home, she met Louis Hencsey, the devout protege of Samuel H. Froehlich. She told him the story of selling the fox at market.

Mrs. Kovacs indicated her failure in obtaining the price her husband wanted for the fox. She said she would lie to him so he wouldn't get upset. At this, with a sincere earnestness, Hencsey responded, "My sister, in our Lord Jesus, you must not do that. To tell a lie is a sin. It is not right for a wife to behave like this."

Hencsey's gold retort led to questions about his faith. She invited him into their home where Hencsey explained his faith and the brotherhood concepts to Joseph and Anne Kovacs who were devout Roman Catholics. In this, the seeds of faith were being planted, and the Kovacs pondered Hencsey's words with an unexpected sincerity.

The culminating incident, however, that drew Joseph Kovacs to repentance is of enormous interest, and reflective of the direct hand of God.

Hencsey was a marked man in the eyes of Hungary's religious officials. His preaching, and gaining converts, drew the wrath of the state church (Catholic). A parish priest (of Pahok) came to his home and without mercy, began verbally abusing him. At one point the priest sternly slapped Hencsey's face and threatened to jail him. The priest's brother stood behind and supported this tongue-lashing. Hencsey placed his walking cane against the wall so he would not be emptied to strike back. He took the priest's outburst in humble, meek silence.

Later, the priest went to Hencsey's parents' home to search for his Bibles and books. He ransacked the cottage. Again, Hencsey remained passive. When Joseph Kovacs heard of Hencsey's nonresistant behavior toward the priest, he said, "I cannot accept your new faith! Do not try to change my mind."

Eotvos writes, "The young Hencsey answered him in a quiet, gentle voice, 'Don't be foolish. A purified soul knows no hatred or revenge. It is our God who performs justice. The priest and his brother will be judged very soon. You will see it, dear friend, very soon.'

Hardly had he uttered these words

when a messenger from Boldagasszonyfa appeared and entered the house hurriedly and said, 'Have you heard the great news, sir? Something horrible has happened. The parish priest of Pahok died suddenly. God has taken his life. At noon the high reverend fell dead in his armchair. His brother died also when a rafter from the ceiling fell and struck him in the head.'

Mrs. Kovacs began to pray. Joseph Kovacs, this fiery nobleman, expressed on that very day he would like to join the new community of believers if the brethren would be willing to receive him."

The Kovacs were later baptized. They, too, became devout in faith and practice, and helped to draw many others to repentance and conversion.

The young Hencsey later traveled to Switzerland where he worked in the shops. He met Brother Froehlich. He became ill and died unexpectedly. Joseph Bella, who later emigrated to America and is buried in the South Side cemetery south of Fairbury, IL was present at his death. Hencsey was buried in a pauper's cemetery, but his few short years of evangelism reaped big dividends.

"Humility in 1996" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

It was October 14, 1995, and we were having our Wednesday evening Bible Study in a classroom of our church. Our text was Luke 18:9-14 where Jesus tells a parable which begins as follows: "Two men went up into the temple to pray; the one a Pharisee, and the other a publican."

Jesus ended this parable by saying, "I tell you, this man (the publican) went down to his house justified rather than the other."

The question arose as to why the Pharisee was not justified, or made right with God. I asked Dr. Furuya, who attends Wednesday night regularly with his wife, Junko, whether or not the Pharisee had faith. His response was immediate—surely the man had faith, he was in the temple praying. We thought about obedience and had to conclude that surely this Pharisee was very obedient, so much so as to put most of the rest of us to shame. At that point, it dawned on me like a light from heaven that faith and obedience are not enough, although I have long taught that we must believe enough to obey and then we are all set. My theology has to be revised.

We quickly realize that the missing ingredient in the life of the Pharisee was humility, but what is that? I have thought that a brother or sister who is very obedient is almost sure to be humble, but now I must think again.

According to this parable, humility is not synonymous with obedience, although obedience is very important and desirable for serving the Lord. Further, humility precludes the notion that we are better than others, even when we are exhorting others to be more obedient. At the time I gave my testimony in the Princeville church prior to baptism, a brother who was concerned for me said we all have

reason to be more humble. Some time later a brother told me that the way I walked into church was unbecoming. One of the passions of my life is to prove what humility is, although I may never be able to explain it completely satisfactorily.

Humility includes a brokenness which makes one willing to serve at any time, at any place and under any circumstances, with no thought of giving credit to "self", which has been crucified with Christ.

Let's all pray for more humility and brokenness while rejoicing exceedingly in God's great omnipotence and grace. Please join me in 1996 in trying to prove what humility is.
