

"...God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace unto the humble." James 4:6

In some aspects, humility is more important in our life than anything else because we must be humble to receive grace as we find it written in I Peter 5:5 and James 4:6. Can't we just visualize James and Peter sitting together in that room, in Jerusalem, talking together about humility?

We may ask ourselves, what is it to be humble? None of us are perfect and if we could see ourselves through God's eyes, we would know just how much humility we lack. We are imperfect so it behooves us to strive diligently to be humble so we can receive grace sufficient to keep us free of sin.

What is humility? Webster tells us that humility is:

- 1. Being aware of one's shortcomings
- 2. Not proud
- 3. Not self-assertive
- 4. Modest

With that list we could work for the rest of our life on trying to accomplish perfection in those four items. Is it possible to be proud of our humility? Really, the answer is no. Once we become proud, we lose grace and we are no longer humble. That is simple deduction. So, if we are humble, we will not be concerned with the degree of humility we have because we will have no thought of self at all.

Nothing of self and all of God-that is true humility.

But how do we attain a closer walk with God? How can we strive to be more humble without thinking of self or whether we have made progress? In the world we are taught to make goals and when we attain the goal, we should be proud of our accomplishment. This is not the way of God and our Lord, for we can read in His Word, "Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time:" (I Peter 5:6)

True humility, therefore, is being satisfied to be under God's mighty hand. Where could we feel safer than under God's hand?

The Bible tells us how to be humble in Matthew 18:4, "Whosoever therefore shall humble himself as this little child, the same is greatest in the kingdom of heaven." The Bible teaches us to be as

a little child in all we do. Forgiving, trusting, willing to learn, hearing and obeying the spoken warning, and submission are a good place for us to start.

Humility will make us different in this world because the true nature of man is to be self-assertive, boastful and proud.

It can be likened unto a war in that we must war or fight against the enemy. which is pride and her various partners. If we defeat self-assertiveness, for example, we cannot sit down and review how good we were in that battle. If we do, the enemy will win back that which we defeated him in battle. So again, we learn the lesson to continue battling Satan and his craftiness, without trying to keep track of our wins over him. We can do that by being truthful, obedient. and submissive to instruction that is good for our soul, whether it comes directly from the Bible or from someone who has our best interest at heart.

If I am humble, I will wish for the ultimate good for my friend, neighbor, brother, sister, or anyone who puts the will of God foremost in their heart. That's a tall order because many times when we strive for others to have the ultimate good, we lose out or diminish.

Are we willing to decrease so others can increase? We probably don't know the answer to that until we are placed in the position of doing it. Good intentions are great, but defeating Satan and pride is better.

We can learn a good lesson from the small birds we see in our yards. They do not set goals and systematically try to accomplish the goal. The little birds just try to keep out of reach of the enemy, and trust that there will be food enough for them to sustain life. They never eat more than they need. They never get fat. They are always able to be satisfied. What a wonderful thing when we are satisfied to be under the mighty hand of God.

The Bible teaches us that a righteous man will not have to beg for food. The key to that, of course, is the word righteous, and with righteousness comes humility. We would be amiss if we "...for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble." I Peter 5:5

understood humility to the fullest extent and did not mention repentance. There is no greater manifestation of humility than that of repentance wherein we fall down before the Lord, a broken and emptied vessel, and ask for forgiveness, with a Godly sorrow.

There are two kinds of repentance: one is that of Judas, the other is that of Peter; the one is ice broken, the other is ice melted.

The ice that is broken still carries the same physical property and is not changed at all. There is no conversion. Ice melting, on the other hand, takes on a totally new property wherein the new does not resemble the old.

Repentance unto life will be repentance in this life.

Humility is indeed a far-reaching topic and deserves much consideration in our lives, for it is the key that unlocks the door to Heaven and eternity. Humility will not be assessed by us as it is manifested in other hearts. We can only strive to defeat Satan in our own lives and in the process, hopefully, God will be able to see that most precious humility in our heart and then grant us grace.

on God's Word

If the Watchman Blow not the Trumpet

The watchman on the wall is responsible for the safety of his people. The Bible is clear that this responsibility includes more than watching for an enemy who would destroy us with weapons of war. This responsibility also includes protection from an enemy who would destroy the unity of God's children and spiritually starve them by depriving them of the privilege of feeding on the truth of His Word.

The technological advances we've become so accustomed to often make it difficult to fully appreciate some of the accounts and analogies from Scripture. With our nearly instantaneous access to news and weather reports, we can hardly imagine how critical the role of the watchman on the wall was as we read of it in the prophet Ezekiel, chapter 33. The situation in view was one of imminent peril because of invasion of the enemy. The responsibility required early warning to provide time for flight to safety or to make full preparation for the impending battle, thereby avoiding being overtaken by surprise assault.

We do not strain the interpretation of this vivid account when we compare the watchman's duties to the ministry of God's Word, especially as carried out by those who have charge over us. Indeed, "they watch for our souls, as they that must give account" (Heb. 13:17). Likewise, the responsibility for sounding the trumpet that rested with these ancient watchmen, also rests with those who minister the Word today and are exhorted in Paul's letter to Timothy to "reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine" (II Tim. 4:2).

In our denomination today we "take a man of our coasts and set him for a watchman" (Ez. 33:2). There is absolutely no question for believers today that there is danger at every quarter, a spiritual warfare of immense proportion, an enemy bent on destroying the faithful. Wherever practical, our elder brothers ordain other elders in every congregation (as the elders of the 1st Century did so from city to city). Without doubt, the individuals chosen as watchmen were aware of their awesome responsibilities, as we must be today. As the watchmen were set on the wall, they could see far greater distances. The Scriptures give account of those who seemed to have a gift of God to be able to distinguish even individual runners or chariot drivers (11 Sam. 18:27) (II Kings 9:20). We are often in awe of the many grave dangers that those who have watched for our souls have seen and have sounded the warning at a great distance (in our case, a distance of time, of years or decades). In both situations, the responsibility to sound the warning is emphasized. Failure to sound the warning brought stern judgment from the Lord, a fact that rests on the hearts and minds of our shepherds.

Perhaps more appropriate to the early church than to ancient watchmen with trumpets was a variety of trumpet calls. The ancient trumpet blasts brought quick response; the armies and cities of the 1st Century AD recognized a variety of trumpet calls indicating various alerts and necessary maneuvers. Regardless, the necessity for clarity of call and certainness (loudness) was imperative so all could hear and act accordingly. We are called upon as believers to pray and support those ordained of God to these weighty tasks (1 Thess. 5:25).

Ezekiel gave stern warning to the hearers also. It really didn't matter why they did not heed the warning. Excuses were irrelevant and unacceptable. The clear fact was that they heard the sound of the trumpet. and did not take warning. Their blood was on their own head, and the responsibility was theirs. It would seem that in so critical a scenario as portrayed here, no one would fail to take the warning. The very fact that our Heavenly Father chose to emphatically outline such a sad situation makes it clear that such things happened. We are not exempt from the very same admonition. If we think we are standing fast and firm, we should take heed, lest we fall (I Cor. 10:12). The dangers are real, the consequences for ourselves and those we love are tremendously grave. The ancient watchmen were set because the people were acutely aware of the presence of evil and danger around

them that was life threatening in most cases. As we pray for those faithful watchmen on our walls today, may we recognize just as acutely the spiritual danger and the eternal life threatening menace of Satan and his minions.

The ending verses of the 33rd chapter of Ezekiel are extremely sobering to believers today. After God had freed Himself and had shown them how they could serve Him and do His will, and had revealed the consequences of failure to heed His warning, the people essentially made light of the whole situation. They would turn out in goodly number to hear what the Lord had to say. They would whisper about the message bringer and poke fun or demean the message. Insincere as they were, they had no intention of following the Lord's directive. The whole situation became as one big entertainment, not to be taken seriously. They would hear and, lamentably, ignore. Sad to say, when the terrible consequences of their folly overtook them, when the clear warnings of the Lord were proven to have been on the mark and they realized how wrong they had been, it was too late. How very much of the work of the Kingdom goes undone because of the folly of the very people who should best know the clarity of the admonitions God unfailingly sends!

The sound of the trumpet must also include encouragement and admonition that God's people would be united as one, with God's Word as the foundation upon which the unity is based. Faithful shepherds (watchmen) must continue to sound the waming. Sheep that are not warned, or who do not heed the waming, will be scattered and destroyed by the enemy. The watchman who clearly sounds the waming, who feeds the flock and who strengthens the weak fulfills the directives that God places upon them. It then becomes the responsibility of the flock to heed the warning.

All of God's children would do well to study these scriptural accounts, heed the warning and fulfill our duty as watchmen on the wall.

Bible distribution is a major portion of Mission Committee activities

One of the primary purposes of a mission effort is to fulfill the command of our Lord that we send the gospel throughout the entire world.

But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth. Acts 1:8

We can interpret this to mean that our first efforts must begin at home, therefore we do encourage Bible distribution on a local level.

Following an exhaustive comparison of various translations of the Bible, we reaffirm our position that

we support distribution of the King James Version of the Bible exclusively. Bibles provided by the Mission Committee are available at distribution centers in Leo, Indiana, and Eureka, Illinois. Some of our congregations send their entire collections for Bible distribution to the Mission Committee, and others use some funds to finance activities on a local level. In either case, we appreciate learning about the ways our brethren handle these efforts. The following account outlines how two of our congregations in a rural area carry out this work. It is told in the form of a report from a sister who coordinated the efforts for several years.


An example on a local level

Bible distribution boxes were already in place in motels, restaurants, libraries, and businesses when we volunteered to manage supplying these points of distribution. Our church communities are separated by a major interstate highway, along which are the facilities where the travelers stop to refuel and refresh themselves. This did provide a natural outlet of exposure to a variety of people. Over a three year period, we placed about 3,000 Bibles in these establishments. The largest number of copies passed through fast food restaurants.

Almost all of our work was with the small New Testaments which we obtained from the Mission Committee. They are packaged individually in small boxes. We employed our young children over a onehalf hour period during the noon break in our church on Sunday. Setting up an assembly line, we stamped the name of our church in the front, and attached a fold out Scripture reference in the back. We were able to complete about two boxes (400 copies) during our work period.

The children looked forward to the work, and even after we passed it on to our neighboring congregation, they asked us when they could do Bibles again. Our feeling was that this experience created a desire to spread God's Word, as well as a sympathy in the hearts of our children for those who had not heard it.

The same type of system we used with children at church could be used in family gatherings, times when older brethren gather together, plus providing activities for young members. The potential is nearly unlimited, and the benefits ensuing from this work cannot be measured. **99**



Anyone can be involved

Using this simple system, Bibles can be prepared by nearly anyone, and it has become evident that when the books are placed in a public place, people accept them. We may never know the results of spreading God's Word in this way, but if one soul is worth the entire world, no price can be set upon the benefits.

Late Mexico November of last year, a work team consisting of 17 arrived in El Paso, Texas on the first leg of a trip into Mexico. The purpose of

this trip was to repair and build houses for poor families. The group came from various areas, and it was nearly midnight on Tuesday, November 28 until all had arrived and gotten settled for the night.

As previously arranged, they met Chito, their Mexican contact, at a site near Juarez on a beautiful Wednesday morning. After warm greetings, and a prayer, they loaded a truck and proceeded to the first site where half of the team began preparing to pour concrete. At this location, the house needed a concrete floor, all the walls needed to be replaced, and half the roof recovered. The other half of the team went to a site where an entirely new home was to be constructed.

After a day's work, and a night of rest, they assembled once more for prayer on Thursday morning. The women painted the walls on the outside of one building as the men labored in construction. By the end of that day, two walls were replaced, and part of the roof repaired at site #1, and two long walls and a roof nailed on the building at site #2.

Weary with the toils of the day, yet happy in heart with their progress, the workers refreshed themselves a bit in their motel rooms. They ate supper in a local restaurant, after which they shared several hours of spiritual fellowship, finally retiring about 11:00 pm.

The sight of the buildings taking shape increased their enthusiasm, and after Friday morning devotions, they set to work. The fellowship and brotherly love developed during these trips creates many precious memories. As Friday came to a close, the house at site #1 was ready for stucco, and the women did more painting as well as distributing clothing and kits furnished by World Relief groups in the USA. The new building at site #2 was nearing completion, with the walls and roof in place, and stucco on two of the walls. In the evening, the group evaluated efforts to date, and planned for future work.

By noon on Saturday, the new house had one complete coat of stucco everywhere, and two coats on some walls. House #1 had one coat of stucco applied by 3:00. Having completed most of the painting, the group traveled to the K-20 area where our teams had built two homes the previous year. The gratitude of the families who had received this help warmed their hearts. Realizing that there are no borders or limits on God's love, they ate their supper and retired looking forward to a day of worship on Sunday.

Sunday breakfast was at 9:00, followed by worship services in the motel at 11:00 am, conducted by Bro. Leland Plattner. Both World Relief and Mission Committees encourage a ministering brother to accompany these work teams, and invite brothers to make themselves available for this work when possible. Sunday afternoon was both relaxing and enjoyable as the team viewed the lovely scenery, seeing the cities from high up on a mountain. A time of singing, Bible reading, and meditation brought this blessed day to a close.

Beginning the new week on Monday with prayer, they gathered together at building #1 to plan their day. The group at site #2 completed the simple house by adding a second coat of stucco to the outside, and a wall on the inside. These houses are the most basic of structures, with none of the conveniences we enjoy here. However, they are far superior to the cardboard shacks lived in by hundreds of Mexicans. The house at site #1 was also completed that day, and by evening they could see that their goals had been accomplished.


Seeing first hand the rewards of ministering to the poor and sick, the group gives honor to God and thanks to the brotherhood for providing opportunities such as this one to serve.

For about three years, Jesus traveled through Judea, Samaria and Galilee teaching and healing. Even though He had presented himself to Israel as the Messiah, He did not use all of His time and energy healing and teaching. Many times Jesus left

the crowd to go spend time with just His disciples even though the needs of the multitude were so great.

Why would Jesus not have used more of His time to keep trying to heal everyone and to teach more wisdom to the thousands who only got a glimpse of Him? One of the reasons appeared to be that Jesus valued the time that He spent in preparing the disciples for their future ministry. Large portions of the Gospels are filled with accounts of Jesus spending time teaching some or all of the disciples with precepts, parables and His own example about His Father, prayer, worship, how to live and serve, etc. Jesus also split them into groups of two and sent them on at least one "practice" mission to cities where He did not personally go. Jesus constantly discipled, trained, taught and prepared the disciples for the hardships that they would encounter as they fulfilled His mission.

Are we allowing God to prepare us for the work that He will have us to do next year or in five years? Are we actively cooperating with the discipling and training that the Father wants to work in our hearts through His Word and Spirit so that we will be more prepared for the service He calls us to next year? Soldiers would not think of going into a battle without putting in a lot of time and energy into preparing for battle through discipline and training of their bodies and minds because their lives and the lives of their fellow soldiers depend upon it.

Here at Gateway Woods we know the realities of the preparation that we went through before we came here (just as many of you know the realities of preparation for the ministry that God has called you to). The circumstances that God sovereignly engineered in our lives, the hours of searching for God's will, and the agonizing over the thoughts of the big changes that would take place in our lives. For most people, the whole process took many months.

However, even for all of that, if you were to ask people after they worked here a year or two if they now felt that they had been prepared, you would probably get a resounding "No". After you are submersed into the lives of these children and their families, you realize how much more preparation vou should have had. More time and energy building a solid relationship with your spouse characterized by understanding and communication that can weather the heat and pressure. More time and energy building an understanding of what God's Word says about human nature and how to change and how to communicate God's love and holiness. More time and energy in understanding and practicing compassion, tough love, and sharing His truths in practical every day ways. More time and energy into daily worshipping the Saviour and practicing His presence.

Obviously, God's preparation for your life may not take three years (as with the disciples) or the forty years in the desert that it took Moses, but we can say for sure that if it has not started already, God wants to start now preparing

"A POSITIVE ATTITUDE IS GOOD" Sermon by Bro. Kenneth Dietz of Bradford, IL II Samuel 23:1-17 and Matthew 11

I have read to the end of the chapter and truly that last verse is very true. The Lord's yoke is easy and it is light. If we are in the right standing and the right heart and the right mind with our Lord and Saviour, we can go through life, beloved ones, when very difficult things come before us and come upon us. If our heart is right, pure and holy and if we are trying sincerely to serve the Lord in the right mind and the right spirit, even difficult things can become somewhat light and easy.

But on the reverse, isn't it true that if we are not in the right mind and the right spirit, even when little things are asked of us—small and trivial things—maybe what the Lord asks us to do or to bear, if we are not in the right mind and the right spirit, it becomes a mountain to us? It becomes very difficult and we can hardly do it.

So, beloved ones, it is so important that daily we pray to the Lord and say, "Oh, Lord, make my heart, my mind, my attitude right, pure and holy in Thy sight." Truly, beloved ones, our attitude makes all the difference in the world of how successful we are going to be in life. That holds true to a large degree, even in outward things, but even more in spiritual things.

I am reminded of attitude, and of a little account I heard one time about a man who took a job. He was going to sell shoes. The company that he was with (he was a new man) sent him to a far away place, to the back sticks or the back woods. They sent him out there and said, "Sell shoes." That man became discouraged very quickly. He got in touch with the company and said, "You've got to get me out of here. I can't sell shoes up here. Nobody wears shoes. How can I sell when nobody wears shoes?"

So the company pulled him out of there and sent another salesman. It wasn't long and he called back and said, "Send me shoes. Send me every color and every size for men, women and children." Do you know what his reasoning was? He said, "Everybody needs shoes up here." That was his attitude. This man was successful because his attitude was right. He could sell shoes. He said, "Everybody needs shoes up here."

So, beloved, isn't it true that it holds true to a large degree in outward things, but even more so with spiritual things? Our attitude needs to be right, pure and holy and that we have the right mind and the right attitude. We ought to have the attitude of sacrifice and service.

I had to think about our first reading. To me it really goes along with this thought right now about David and his faithful soldiers. We read of the soldiers and the great and heroic things that they were able to perform. Beloved ones, the things that made these soldiers right, great and courageous was because their attitude was right and pure. They did it out of love.

We can see here what a relationship these men and their leader had. David was a good soldier and a good man. Not that he didn't make mistakes...he made some serious ones in his life. We can see here the relationship that these men and their leader had.

David one time made the remark and said, "Oh that one would give me drink of the water of the well of Bethlehem, which is by the gate!" (II Samuel 23:15). As they were out in the wilderness, David got to thinking about that water in Bethlehem and how good, cool and refreshing it was. "Oh, just to have a drink of that water," he remarked.

What was that result? He did not ask the men to do it. They heard him say that. Their love was so great toward their leader that they rose up with great hindrance and danger. It says that three of them rose up and broke through enemy lines and went to the well at Bethlehem.

They got that water and brought it back. Not because they had to, but because they wanted to. That is the key, beloved ones—they wanted to do something for their master and their leader.

Then we can see the attitude of David. He had a thankful attitude! He was moved when they came back and handed him that water. They said, "It is from that well in Bethlehem." David's heart was moved and he said, "I cannot drink this." He said, "Be it far from me, O Lord, that I should do this: is not this the blood of the men that went in jeopardy of their lives? therefore he would not drink it." (II Samuel 23:17).

These things he did and poured it out upon the ground, not because he disdained what they did, but he was so moved and so thankful. He said, "I cannot drink this; this is too wonderful," and he poured it out upon the ground.

Beloved ones, that is the attitude that we need to have one with another, with our God and with our fellow brethren. We want to serve one another, do what we can, and do it because we want to, not because someone is making us or forcing us to serve the Lord. It is because we want to serve the Lord. He has been good, kind, compassionate and gentle with us. We can all say that, can't we?

Friends and brethren alike, we really look at it right. We can say that the Lord has been good and patient with us and compassionate. We want to thank Him for that and serve Him with all of our heart.

Then, on the other hand, beloved ones, if we are on the giving part, we want to do it with all of our heart. We want to do it cheerfully because we want to. Then, on the other hand, when someone does something wonderful for us, even small things, we want to be of a thankful and a grateful attitude. We want to express it.

When the Lord does something for us, we want to thank Him and praise Him for what He has done. Even one among another, as brethren and sisters together, we want to express our thankfulness. That goes a long way...just a simple "Thank you, I appreciate what you have done."

I want to tell you a little experience we had in our family quite a few years ago, but it still comes to my mind at this time. We raised several children, but I am thinking now of my youngest daughter. She was a little girl in school, in one of the low classes. In school, there was a program and they had to have costumes made for them.

It fell upon my wife to make that costume. Time got away and it got down to the time when the costume was not made the day before. It was not done. It was getting urgent, so my wife worked on it through the night. She said by the time that she got it done, she was almost beside herself—so wore out and almost emotional. But she got it done.

She told me this. The next morning when our youngest daughter got ready to go to school she came up to my wife

and said, "Thanks, Mom, for doing my costume for me." You know, my wife said that made it all worthwhile. She almost had to cry with just that simple "thank you". She said, "Thanks, Mom, for making my costume for me." That is all it took—a simple "thank you". She appreciated it and my wife appreciated it so much.

So it is, beloved ones, in our relationship one with another. We want to express our thankfulness; just a simple "thank you" in appreciation. We want to do that for our God, too, as we go through life. Thank Him for all that He has done, for He has truly done so very much for us all.

I have to think, when we read in the Old Testament, we read of the people of God...God's chosen people. God did so many things for them. When they were down in Egypt in great oppression and great distress, God led them out by the hand of Moses for a mighty deliverance.

Beloved ones, it is so sad with us if we fall into the same thing. It seemed like those people, though God was so good to them and helped them in such mighty and miraculous ways, so often and so regularly, whenever they got in a little bind and little trouble and were dry or hungry, what did they do? They so quickly began to murmur and complain.

They were murmurers and complainers and the Lord hates that, beloved ones. He hated it with them. That was one of their great sins—their murmuring and complaining against the Lord. It is no different today. Let us not be a murmurer and a complainer.

I had to think that our second reading refers to this, too. It says, "But whereunto shall I liken this generation? It is like unto children sitting in the markets, and calling unto their fellows, and saying, We have piped unto you, and ye have not danced; we have mourned unto you, and ye have not lamented. For John came neither eating nor drinking, and they say, He hath a devil. The Son of man came eating and drinking, and they say, Behold a man gluttonous, and a winebibber, a friend of publicans and sinners. But wisdom is justified of her children." (Matthew 11:16-19).

What does this say? To me, this Scripture (I think it is correct) says that those people were not satisfied with anything. We read where it says that they played a joyful and merry music to them, and they were not satisfied. They did not like it. On the other hand, they played some more sad and more mournful music, and they were not satisfied with that either.

John the Baptist came neither eating nor drinking. They said, "He hath a devil." The Lord came eating and drinking and they said, "A winebibber." They were not satisfied with anything. So it is. The Lord was dissatisfied with them. He is dissatisfied with us today if we fall into that same trap. No matter what may come our way, let us receive it right. Even difficult things that come into our lives, if we receive it right, God can make a blessing out of it, and He will.

Just this morning, as we sat on the front bench there, I was so pleased to be able to come into church. We don't always get in that soon at our church in Bradford. But here they were in close to 9:30. I mentioned to Brother Wayne, "Do you always come in at 9:30 to sing?" He said, "Well, pretty nearly."

Then he mentioned the reason why. One of the reasons is because they are so crowded that people tend to come in. Really, it has become a blessing. Something that is a little unhandy, a little difficult to be crowded; yet, God can make a blessing out of it.

It is that way with so many things in our life. No matter what we are called upon to go through, if we receive it right, God will make a blessing out of it for us...some way or another.

What is a blessing, beloved ones? The people in this world and time probably view a blessing differently than it really should be viewed. I think so many people, and maybe even us, think that a blessing is anything good that comes our way and makes it easy for our life and joyful that we can be of good cheer. Many people think that is a blessing. It can be.

But, beloved ones, I read a little definition one time that I think is more correct. It said, "A blessing is anything that makes us to desire and to long for heaven." Anything that increases our longing and desire for heaven, that is a blessing! So, beloved ones, God can make a blessing for us out of anything in life if we receive it with the right mind, the right attitude and the right spirit.

"Now when John had heard in the prison the works of Christ, he sent two of his disciples, and said unto him, Art thou he that should come, or do we look for another?" (Matthew 11:2-3). Isn't it encouraging, beloved ones, that we can read the Bible and we can read accounts like this that we can identify with?

This man, John the Baptist, the Lord said he was the greatest prophet of them all. He was a humble man. Isn't it wonderful that we can identify with him? Even as great and faithful man as he was, there came a time in his life when he began to doubt.

He said, "Art thou he that should come, or do we look for another?" (Matthew 11:3). Faithful man as he was, doubts came into his mind. So it is with us. We should not think it strange when the devil would come and try to make us to doubt and to fear. I am sure we all go through the same things. The devil tries to make us afraid and fainthearted.

As I sat there singing this morning, hymn number 157 was sung. It is wonderful to come to church and sing these hymns together. They bring thoughts in our minds and experiences we have had along life's way. That one really prompted a thought in my mind.

The first Sunday that I ministered, I felt totally unable and impossible, but the Lord helped me. I was not eloquent when I was first put into the ministry. You know, the very next time I had the service, do you know what that devil said? He said, "The Lord was with you last time, but will He be with you today? He probably won't help you today!" Then that hymn opened up that day. "As a hart for water panteth..." and it expresses that.

That is the way he likes to work. I think we all experience that. Even great and faithful men like John the Baptist went through that same thing. Doubts and fears came into his mind; but the Lord helped him. He restored his faith and brought it back and recouped it for him. It will be that way for us, beloved ones.

It is not wrong, it is not an evil if we have a doubt or a fear in our minds, but we do not have to leave it there because we can pray to the Lord to help us to restore our faith and to increase our faith. If we really ask Him and are sincere about it, the Lord will certainly do it.

"Jesus answered and said unto them, Go and shew John again those things which ye do hear and see: The blind receive their sight, and the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, and the poor have the gospel preached to them. And blessed is he, whosoever shall not be offended in me." (Matthew 11:4-6).

What did the Lord do to help John?

He reminded him of what was being done and that restored his faith and helped him. So, beloved ones, if we at times have doubts and fears, what shall we do? If we become fearful and doubtful or maybe discouraged, what shall we do? We read in the Bible and see how the Lord helped the people in days gone by, and how He stood beside them!

It reminds us of this. That is how we fight the devil. Why do we come to church? Not because we hear something new every week, but it reminds us of what we already know. It brings it to the forefront of our minds. We think upon it and it recovers our faith. Beloved ones, we need to do that. We need to read the Bible. We need to come to church. We need to think of that heavenly home.

I am reminded of the account of an army that one time was out many years ago. They were footsoldiers from Italy and they were on a war campaign. They were victorious and coming back home. To get home, they had to cross the Alps, the mighty Alps. Those mountains are tremendous from fifty to one hundred fifty miles wide and up to ten thousand feet tall. That army of soldiers had to cross those mountains in the middle of winter to get home.

They came to the base of those mountains and their courage began to fade. They didn't think that they could do it. They didn't think that they could cross them. It was the middle of winter, and they didn't think they had the strength to do it. They were tired and weary. They were victorious, but they had to cross those mountains, and they didn't think they could do it. Their courage began to go down. The commander (I don't know if he was a religious man) knew how to inspire men. He saw what was happening and he got up in front of those soldiers and spoke to them. He said, "Soldiers, comrades, don't look at those mountains before us. Don't think on them." He said, "Think what lies over those mountains. Think of home."

Those soldiers did that. They began to think of home and their mothers and fathers, their wives and children. They thought of those beautiful fields of grain, the beautiful vineyards, and as they thought on those things, it was not long when their courage began to revive. It wasn't long and they were up and on the march. They marched right over those mountains in the middle of winter into their homeland.

Think of home, beloved ones; think of what lies beyond this life. Think of that heavenly home that God has prepared for the true and faithful. We ought to think of that and our courage will revive and we will be able to go onward and forward. Those of us who have made a beginning with the Lord, we want to be faithful. We need courage to be helped in that way.

Now we want to speak to those who have not yet made a beginning to serve the Lord. We want you to think, too, of what is coming in the future. Think of eternity and what lies beyond this life. Beloved friends, think of that. Think of eternity.

We can't hardly comprehend eternity, can we, any of us? We really can't comprehend it. It is just almost beyond what our minds can think on. But I like to think of a little example that our Sunday School teacher in Princeville told us. That must have been over forty years ago but I still remember it today. He tried to convey to us young students what eternity really is so that we could think on it and comprehend it somewhat.

He said eternity is somewhat like this: If there would be a solid rock one mile wide, one mile high, and one mile deep—solid rock—and once in a thousand years a little bird would come and brush it's wing over the top of that rock, in the process of time, that rock would all be worn away from the wing of that bird brushing over it. When that rock is entirely worn away, then eternity will have just begun. Think of it, beloved ones, eternity is a long time.

Friends, think of what lies for you in eternity. Where will you spend eternity? This I ask you, and today when you think of that, if you think of it with a right mind and right attitude, you will do something. You will do as the Bible says to repent and to become converted and serve the Lord faithfully until you die.

May it be that all of us would do that—repent. If we have failed, brethren, repent, turn from our ways, do better and be faithful all the days of our life. Then when we leave this world, we can go to that home that God has prepared for the true and faithful in the heavens above.

Humility makes a man peaceable among the brethren, fruitful in doing good, joyful in suffering, and constant in holy living.

Humility makes us fit for the highest service that we owe to Christ and at the same time is not negligent of the lowliest service to the humblest saint.


Humility

In one of our most gorgeous Zion's Harp hymns we sing, "Meekness is the noblest virtue, every Christian's honor bright." (p. 186) The trait of humility finds its root in the Scriptures. Its presence is unmistakenly woven throughout the old and new testaments.

It is of great interest to see how humility and humbleness were practiced in Bible times; and also historically as time transpired over the ages.

In our denomination we have benefitted by an emphasis on humility. It has contributed greatly to warm Christian fellowship and to our biblical sense of brotherhood. As we look back over the ages to see how humility was practiced, it helps to reinforce our present-day sense of humility.

The patriarchs endorsed the concept of humility. Moses was referred to as the meekest man on the face of the earth (Numbers 12:3). The prophet Isaiah described the temperament to which God would look approvingly: "...to him that is poor and of a contrite spirit." (Isaiah 66:2)

The Lord Jesus said, "And whosoever shall exalt himself shall be abased; and he that shall humble himself shall be exalted." (Matthew 23:12) The apostles continued to emphasize humility. "Put on humility" (Col. 3:12) and "be clothed with humility for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble." (I Peter 5:5)

After the time of the apostles, the church over the ages saw humility as the power of powerlessness. Lowliness of mind personified Christ and was a pre-condition to God's presence in the heart. The abandonment of self created a fertile abode for God's power to work within one's heart.

In encouraging the virtue of humility, a second century Christian leader wrote that the believer "voluntarily humbles himself, not under anyone at random, but under 'the mighty hand of God.'" He then cited the words of Jesus, "Learn of me, for I am meek and lowly in heart and ye shall find rest for your souls." (Matthew 11:29)

During the time of the radical reformation (1525), an attitude of humility found expression in the German word "Gelassenheit". Born out of the intense martyrdom and suffering of that era, Gelassenheit meant the annihilation of self as one submitted to God's will in service to others. In this, he was willing to suffer—indeed to do anything—to fulfill the will of God.

One believer of that era wrote, "Only as a man relinquishes his selfwill may he be an instrument of God." The attitude of Gelassenheit was found in a letter by a believer soon to be burned at the stake in 1527: "In this peril I completely surrendered myself unto the will of the Lord and prepared myself even for death for His testimony." (from Martyr's Mirror)

In the era after the radical reformation, where the concepts of brotherhood and godly order among the saints found a resurgence, the attitude of "Gelassenheit" was present. Unity in the church and among believers thrived amid a high degree of humility.

From 1832 on, the benefactors of the spiritual revival in Switzerland led by Bro. Samuel Froehlich (and later in the United States) thrived by an emphasis on humility. It is a blessing today that in a culture that dismisses humility as a positive virtue, God's people nevertheless cling to this essential Bible trait.

Samuel Froehlich wrote about humility: "Humility makes a man peaceable among the brethren, fruitful in doing good, joyful in suffering, and constant in holy living. Humility makes a man willing and ready to bless him who curses him and to pray for him who persecutes him; a humble heart is an abode of God, a disciple of Christ, a companion of angels, a preserving-vessel for grace, and is prepared for glory." (from *Mirror of the Soul*)

It is good to remember, and to be encouraged by, the fact that our predecessors in faith practiced humility. In the spirit of "Gelassenheit" they could endure persecution, suffering, privation, and cultural turmoil. Humility helped them find a high degree of peace and harmony as they practiced the biblical precepts of true brotherhood.

"For whosoever exalteth himself shall be abased: and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted." (Luke 14:11)

"Time and Distance" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

Soon we will be commemorating the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ, God's Son, our Saviour, which occurred about 2,000 years ago according to our calculations concerning time. However, in Revelation 13:8 the Lord Jesus Christ is spoken of as "The Lamb slain from the foundation of the world." Evidently, God does not figure time as we do. This is borne out by II Peter 3:8, "One day is with the Lord as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day."

In Acts 4:12 we read concerning the Lord Jesus Christ, "There is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." In the case of Abraham, who lived long before Jesus Christ was born as a man, "He believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness." It appears that Abraham and all others who lived before Christ, who believed, obeyed and were humble, were saved by the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ, the same as we. We know that the animal sacrifices could not save but only pointed to the Lamb of God, the Lord Jesus Christ. "For it is not possible that the blood of bulls and of goats should take away sins." (Hebrews 10:4)

After the Lord Jesus Christ was living in His resurrected body. He suddenly appeared at different places. "And as they thus spake, Jesus himself stood in the midst of them." (Luke 24:36). Distance meant nothing to Him after He had completely entered the spiritual world. Philip, also, disappeared suddenly after having baptized the eunuch, evidently being able to transfer back and forth from a mortal body to a spiritual body. "And when they were come up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord caught away Philip, that the eunuch saw him no more." (Acts 8:39)

Have you heard how far re-

cently discovered galaxies are out into space? There seems to be no end as to how far you can go and still find matter; things which are not of the spiritual world, at least not as far as we know. I can see that once we transfer to the spiritual world, we've got to have a different system. If Heaven is beyond the farthest galaxy, it would take too long to get there.

In Revelation 2:2, the tree of life near the throne of God "Yielded her fruit every month." This indicates that time is of some significance. The tree probably has blossoms for us to enjoy and these change into fruit, which takes time, even in Heaven. However, I believe we can say that both time and distance are measured differently.
