As the Hart upon the forest floor appears out of nowhere, searching for a cool drink to revive himself from the dry thirst of the day; so does our soul cry out to our Lord for His reviving that brings us comfort in the Spirit. How often we have cried out, "Lord I cannot go on," only to find ourselves recipients of God's divine Grace and the encouragement from the Holy Ghost. There is that comforter, the Holy Ghost, that can heal hurt that seems to have no end in our life. We need to heed God's Word to partake of that power within us. When there is hurt, the Word tells us to forgive.

There are three words that can do more for healing hurt than anything else, and they are "I forgive you." There are, however, some prerequisites that even our Lord and Saviour asks of us when we go to Him asking forgiveness, which are a repentant heart and confession of sin. We cannot go to anyone, yet alone our Saviour, and say "I accept your forgiveness." Who of us would dare say to our blessed Lord when we felt convicted of the sin in our past, after all He went through to bring about remission of sin, "I accept your forgiveness." We believe the Lord wants the one who has committed sin to say, "I am sorry, will you please forgive me?" Have you ever had someone say, "I am sorry that you feel that way about me." Is that really saying "I am sorry" or is it saying "I am sorry that you feel the way you do."?

Forgiveness extricates us from someone else's nightmare and allows one to live in a state of grace. Why is it when forgiveness yields so much peace, that we find it so hard to forgive someone who may have hurt us deeply? Sometimes it may be pride on our part, or sometimes we may not feel the other party is repentant, or sometimes we may have a measure of wanting to get even in our heart. None of these are good reasons, however we should recognize that they are valid reasons, so we can take steps to correct the straying of our heart. If we judge the one who has hurt us and seek revenge, we are going up against the scripture. We read, "vengeance is mine, saith the Lord" (Romans 12:19). So a humble heart will strive, by the grace of God, to forgive without being told, "I am sorry," by the one who hurt. "So likewise shall my heavenly Father do also unto you, if ye from your hearts forgive not everyone his brother their trespasses." (St Matthew 18:35). We

know from experience and the Word that a lasting healing comes when both sides are repentant and ask for forgiveness.

Some may think forgiving means saying I was wrong and someone else was right. Just because we forgive someone does not mean that the Lord will excuse their actions if they indeed were wrong. Once we forgive, we have pulled the knife of hurt out of our side and then we can live in God's peace anew. As for the one who hurt, he or she will have to deal with their problem before God either here on earth or in heaven.

Forgiving helps us make peace with our past and helps us get on with life. While we are turning ourselves inside out with hurt and maybe bitterness, the one who hurt us doesn't feel a thing. If we would go to them and tell them about the hurt they inflicted in our life, they may turn around and say, "I didn't realize I hurt you." Sometimes hurt is accidental, but other times the hurt comes from betrayal, deceit, lies, and false accusations, which are all a lack of love. There should never be premeditated hurt in any life, such as thinking "I will get even with that brother or sister by committing a certain action or deed which would cause harm to come to them either physically or spiritually." Could it ever be named amongst the brethren that a loved one tried to sabotage another? We pray that there is more love in our hearts than that.

Forgiving is good for the body as well as the soul. When we relive past hurts over and over again, it is bad for our health. Simply remembering an incident that made us angry or hurt has proved to be stressful to the heart. Negative feelings that cause stress have also been linked to high blood pressure, coronary artery disease, and increased susceptibility to other illnesses.

While hurt can be inflicted in minutes, it often takes great lengths of time to forgive. When we are hurt, we initially experience anger, sadness and shame. Then we try to make sense of what happened or to figure out the mitigating circumstances. Ultimately, we need to learn to see the person who did the hurting through God's Word. Once we see the one who hurt through the light of the Word, the hurter becomes the one who is flawed, weak, sick, or ignorant.

To err is human, to forgive is divine. The act of forgiving is not something we can do on our own, rather we need God's divine grace to accomplish it.

We don't need to think that forgiving means forgetting. Sometimes forgetting comes with complete forgiveness, but it is not a prerequisite. There are acts of being hurt that should be remembered so we can plant them in the recesses of our mind and heart praying that we do not someday become the hurter.

If we think we have hurt our spouse or friend, it would be well for us to humble ourselves and admit our short coming and ask for forgiveness. That is the ultimate way to a mutual healing, for it is the way the Lord has taught us in the Word. "If we confess our sins. He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (I John 1:19). We surely err when we say to a brother or sister in faith, who has come to us with a heavy heart caused by hurt we may have inflicted upon them, "I am sorry you feel that way about me, I guess I will just have to carry it." That only casts the burden for hurt on the one who was hurt by us in the first place. The Word teaches us to say, "I am sorry I hurt you, will you please forgive me?"

We have a great responsibility to forgive as well as doing our part to be forgiven. The adversary is doing all he can to discourage us and sidetrack or even derail our precious faith in God. We need not let the old devil get the best of us, because we have grace from God and He promises to give more grace to the humble.

Pleasing Others for Their Edification

The idea of pleasing others for their edification covers a wide range of activities and brings to mind many different thoughts. The concept is simple enough for the most newly born to begin practicing, and difficult enough to drive the most mature and seasoned believer to his knees. The immediate rewards for pleasing others can be as small as a casual thank you, or as far reaching as a life-changing repentance. And, of course, we have no assurance of an immediate reward at all. Indeed, for the well disciplined believer, there should be no thought of reward, other than the satisfaction which comes from pleasing the Lord.

To gain a deeper understanding of the subject before us, a thorough definition of the word edification is in order. It refers to the process of spiritual growth or spiritual strengthening. To edify means to make one stronger in the things of the Lord. It also refers to building up, to instructing and improving, especially for good example.

The benchmark scripture of our study is surely "Let every one of us please his neighbor for his good to edification" (Romans 15:2). Here the Apostle Paul focuses the teachings of previous messages of following the things which make for peace and things wherewith one may edify another.

This verse challenges the efforts of a Christian to be greater because the requirements seem to be a little higher. Now we are reminded that we must give up our own pleasure in order to please our neighbor, but this is where the demands of the scripture jostle hard against the selfish desires of human nature with friction as the likely result. Do we have sufficient grace in our lives to lubricate that friction? We who have put on Christ are now given opportunity to show just how much we appreciate what Christ has done for us by how willing we are to please others. Can we forebear with others or yield to their wishes at those trying moments when our desires clash with those around us?

Understanding that we are always to

edify or strengthen each other spiritually is really a cornerstone of our faith. All through the epistles the theme recurs. "Let all things be done unto edifying" (I Cor. 14:26). "Wherefore comfort yourselves together, and edify one another, even as also ye do" (I Thess. 5:11). We are reminded that not everything that is lawful is edifying (I Cor. 10:23). Knowledge tends to cause pride, but it is charity that edifies (I Cor. 8:1).

These scriptures all set the tone for a life of sacrificial yielding of self. But this tone reaches its highest pitch when the extra qualification "to please his neighbor" is added. This is where man's natural pride is most likely to come to the forefront because often we do not like to think that our neighbor has a right to interfere in our personal decisions. Those of us who are reared in a democratic society may, without realizing it, have accepted the notion that large areas of our lives are outside the proper domain of churchly influence. This is one of the chief reasons why church discipline and close brotherly concern one for another are so hard for some to accept. To those unfamiliar with the scriptural foundation for these practices, accountability to each other will seem like a license for busybodies in other men's matters. The scriptures, however, allow for no such confusion of purpose. In I Peter 4:15 a busybody is denounced on the same plane as a murderer or a thief!

In recent years, an increased emphasis has been placed on asserting our rights as individuals and being "true" to ourselves. Increased emphasis is placed on teaching that we should all "assert our rights" and "be true to ourselves." Acceptance of these concepts will bring us headlong into collision with our text "Let every one of us please his neighbor for his good to edification."

In this teaching there are two distinct areas of emphasis which can be overlooked in a casual reading. First, in using the word "neighbor", the Apostle points out the great likelihood that the person we must please

may not be our Christian brother or sister. This neighbor might be a very disagreeable person - one we would rather avoid as much as possible. It could be someone who delights in finding and broadcasting every real or imaginary fault in us, and it is almost certain that at some point in our lives, we will have extended contact with someone who makes it a point to belittle those things we hold dear. This type of person will scoff and scorn at every attempt to help himself come to a positive attitude toward the faith we love so much. Here, in our time, is the patience of the saints. This is where we must bite our tongue and suffer some of these indignities in silence. But there comes a time in such relationships that we must call to mind the other area of emphasis - let us please our neighbor for his good to edification. Perhaps after much longsuffering, there comes that point when we can no longer please our neighbor and have it be for his good. At this point, there can be no more attempt at merely pleasing our neighbor, if what pleases him is to get us to participate in activities that are unacceptable for believers. We have applications of Old Testament teachings dressed up in their New Testament exhortations. "Answer not a fool according to his folly, lest thou also be like unto him. Answer a fool according to his folly, lest he be wise in his own conceit" (Pro. 26:4-5). Through a proper understanding of our text and by God's gracious Spirit, we may understand when and where we answer a fool according to his folly, not by cleverly conceived one-line put downs, but rather, "For so is the will of God, that with well doing ye may put to silence the ignorance of foolish men" (I Peter 2:15). "But to do good and to communicate forget not: for with such sacrifices God is well pleased" (Heb. 13:16).

These last verses show us that a consistent practice of good works and good communications will enable us to fulfill our scriptural obligations of self-denial and pleasing our neighbor for his good to edification.

Helping Small Congregations to Grow

The primary purpose of the Mission Committee is to help spread the message of the gospel of salvation. Thousands of Bibles continue to be distributed for this purpose. In addition to Bible distribution and other means of reaching the lost, we assist in building churches, not only in the U.S., but also abroad.

Jesus left instructions Just before he departed this earth to return to heaven, Jesus left this instruction to his disciples...

"But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Acts 1:8

With this thought in mind, we seek opportunities to carry out our Lord's directive within our local church bodies first, and then as much as we are able to the rest of the world.

How congregations begin The first European brethren who came to the U.S. were mostly farmers. The natural result was that congregations grew first in rural areas. However, as technology increased over the years, many young brethren attended college to train them for the changing circumstances. Those with a college education often find employment within the corporate structure. This leads them to cities, some of which are apart from any of our churches.

In these circumstances, the Mission Committee supports services on a schedule, sending ministers from established congregations. The hope is that these groups would grow large enough to support a small church. This has happened a number of times through the years. We are supportive of these new congregations, and intend to run several articles on specific locations. The goal is to encourage singles and families seeking employment to become a part of one of these churches. The following article about Tucson, Arizona is one of a series of articles that we will print in this column.



Tucson, Arizona

In 1945 the first worship services in Tucson were conducted in a home by Elder Bro. Ernest Graf from Akron, Ohio. In the fall of 1965, a regular church was officially organized. A new church was built in 1969, with an addition in 1989. There are Sunday School rooms, and all other facilities necessary. In 1973 a new fellowship hall was built.

Membership has fluctuated over the years, and presently there are 21 members and 13 in Sunday School, with children ranging from infants to college age. The Tucson church extends a hand of welcome to anyone who is considering relocation. Also, if you have loved ones in the area, the brethren in Tucson would be happy to visit with them. Addresses and phone numbers to contact are listed at the end of this article.

Surrounded by a wealth of natural beauty in a high desert valley and ringed by mountains, Tucson has a warm, dry climate with comfortable winters. It is the second largest city in Arizona (after Phoenix). There are

fine educational opportunities, including the University of Arizona. The cost of living in Tucson is about average for the nation.

Because of the exodus from the industrial states to the sunbelt, the population has grown almost tenfold in the last 40 years to 405,000. In the last decade Tucson has added 20,000 manufacturing jobs. The city has industries based on regional mining (of copper and other minerals) and the manufacture of electronic and electrical equipment. It is also a market, processing, and shipping center for cattle and cotton raised in the area.

Some of the employment opportunities located in Tucson are AT&T, Rockwell, Microsoft, Phase Shift Technology, Maxserv, Matrix, American Transtec, Granite Construction, Borderland Construction, Asarco Mission Mine, Hughes, Three Five Systems, AOL, Vanguard Automation and Photometrics.

Health services are plentiful and include the University Medical Center, Tucson Medical Center, Carondelet Health Services and Columbia.

The Tucson congregation and the Mission Committee invite you to give this area consideration if you are seeking employment or contemplating relocation. The counseling elder for Tucson is Bro. Situation in East Europe continues to worsen

ur close relationship with the brethren in former Communist East European countries has helped us understand their past and empathize with their present situations. Communication today is enhanced by using improved phone connections and fax machines. What we are learning is not good news. Other charitable organizations say the same. The shift to a free market is very painful, and this has a direct effect on our brethren.

Austro-Hungarian empire At one time, the Austro-Hungarian Empire covered a large geographical area. It helped shape and influence what has become known as Eastern Europe. Over the years, borders often changed, and ethnic peoples found themselves living in nations no longer called by their former names. By way of contrast, as the USA expanded, each state became part of the union. The American experiment in free enterprise and democracy is unprecedented in the history of the world. Just as the Hungarian and East European peoples are a product of their history, we are a product of ours. It is impossible to understand one another without keeping this in mind.

The faith spreads East

In the middle of the last century, two Hungarian brothers became converted in Switzerland through contact with Bro. Samuel Froehlich. They returned to Budapest, spread the gospel message, and others became converted. From this small beginning, the faith we embrace spread throughout Eastern Europe. The number of brethren, called "Nazarenes", at one time was estimated at 80,000 souls. A book on this subject is being

published, and will be available to our brethren when finished.

Impact of Communism

Life has never been easy in these lands, but the years of communism were particularly hard. Many lost their lives to persecution, and although the flame of faith flickered, it was not extinguished. After the collapse of the system in 1989, interaction between countries became easier, and the brethren helped one another. The Mission and World Relief Committees are also assisting in this work.

Struggle for democracy

When governments changed, the entire system and life style also changed. Because there was no stable government, people lost faith in the value of their money. The result was rampant inflation. Recent information from Ukraine says it is 300% per year. Romania is also having serious problems, and the situation in Yugoslavia is far from settled. We have brethren in each of these countries.

Because the Hungarian people never fully embraced the communist system, this made their change to capitalism a little easier. However, even in this land, inflation is somewhere around 35% per year. In most European nations, families receive child support payments from the government. However, in Hungary this has not increased for over two years. There are many large families, and children are becoming more poorly clothed as time goes by.

Sea container shipment

This year we had a unique opportunity to assist the Hungarian children. Our church in Tremont, Illinois installed new furniture in the sanctuary, and the brethren in Forrest built a new facility. About 70 pews


from these two churches became available, and a need for them exists in Hungary. The Mission Committee agreed to pay the costs of shipping them to Europe. Fortunately, there was still a lot of room in the 40 foot sea container. Many brethren worked together to find items needed in Hungary to fill it. The Hungarians told us that their greatest need was for shoes and clothes for children.

The Lord opened the way, and we were able to purchase over 1,900 pairs of high quality shoes as closeout items from several sources. The average cost of these shoes was less than \$5.00 per pair. Such items would have cost at least 5 or 6 times that amount in Hungary, and would not have been of equal quality. We were able to buy children's clothing in much the same manner. World Relief works with a charitable organization in Illinois called "NAEIR", from whom we received over \$25,000 worth of new clothing at no cost. It is by God's provision that such a thing could happen.

Brethren loaded and shipped the container from the Goodfield Distribution Center on June 17. It should arrive at its destination about 4 weeks from that date. We thank God first of all, and then our many brethren who participated.

The Cost of Conversion

Separation From The World

At the end of his second missionary journey, the apostle Paul visited Ephesus. This strategic city was the commercial center of Asia Minor. Ephesus was a religious center as well, famous especially for its magnificent temple of Diana, a structure considered to be one of the seven wonders of the ancient world. The practice of magic and the local economy were clearly related to this temple. Paul's effective ministry began to seriously hurt the traffic in magic and images, leading to an uproar in the huge Ephesian theater.

Paul wrote the letter "to the Ephesians" during his first Roman imprisonment in A.D. 60-62. This letter focuses on the believer's responsibility to walk in accordance with his heavenly calling in Christ Jesus. Ephesians was not written to correct specific errors in a local church, but to prevent problems in the church as a whole by encouraging the body of Christ to maturity in Him. It was also written to make believers more aware of their position in Christ because this is the basis for their practice on every level of life.

Some of the key verses in Ephesians are found in chapter 4, "I therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you that ye walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called, With all lowliness and meekness, with longsuffering, forbearing one another in love; Endeavouring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

Most Ephesians considered Jews and Christians to be "haters of humanity" — anti-social. They refused to participate in any of the many festivals, games, and theatrical shows, for these civic events were usually in honor of some god and often included sacrifices.

When the whole town turned out to celebrate the anniversary of a temple with food and drink, dancing and flowers, Jews and Christians staved home. Furthermore. they would not eat with normal folk because all the meat came from temple butchers. They also liked to meet in small, private groups where "who knew what" went on. Jews were tolerated because they merely followed the religion of their ancestors, but Christian conversion was something that separated them from the rest of society.

A man with ambition could go only so far in sympathy with religions like these. No one who would not offer incense to the emperor's guardian, say a blessing over a civic sacrifice, or contribute money for a temple could hold public office. A meeting at one's trade association almost always included a rite for its patron god. And one could scarcely do business with a man while refusing to eat with him.

While Paul emphasized in Ephesians chapter 2, as he did in Romans, that we are saved by grace through faith and that it is not of our own works, he also stressed that this faith could only be maintained by making right choices in life. In short, conversion to the believers in Ephesus meant rejecting family, friends, business associates, and a whole way of life. Paul advised in chapter 5, "Be not ye therefore partakers with them."

Conversion was not to be undertaken lightly.

Two thousand years later, little has changed. We live in a society in America that is diametrically opposed to the Christian walk. We have an adversary who, "as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking

whom he may devour." We, like the believers in Ephesus, must make wise choices concerning our association with the world. In His Holy Word, from Genesis to Revelation, God has revealed His will concerning these choices. As he instructed his chosen people, Israel, to remain apart from the world, He also instructed His church in the New Testament to "come out from among them, and be ye separate." Following are several verses on this subject that may be of benefit:

Job 28:28 And unto man he said, Behold, the fear of the Lord, that is wisdom; and to depart from evil is understanding.

Psalm 1:1-3 Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful. 2. But his delight is in the law of the LORD; and in his law doth he meditate day and night. 3. And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper.

Psalm 106:34-40 They did not destroy the nations, concerning whom the LORD commanded them: 35. But were mingled among the heathen. and learned their works. 36. And they served their idols: which were a snare unto them. 37. Yea, they sacrificed their sons and their daughters unto devils, 38. And shed innocent blood, even the blood of their sons and of their daughters, whom they sacrificed

unto the idols of Canaan: and the land was polluted with blood. 39.
Thus were they defiled with their own works, and went a whoring with their own inventions. 40. Therefore was the wrath of the LORD kindled against his people, insomuch that he abhorred his own inheritance.

Matthew 16:26 For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?

Matthew 26:41 Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation: the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.

John 15:18-19 If the world hate you, ye know that it hated me before it hated you. 19. If ye were of the world, the world would love his own: but because ye are not of the world, but I have chosen you out of the world, therefore the world hateth you.

Romans 12:1-2 I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. 2. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God.

1 Corinthians 3:19 For the wisdom of this world is foolishness with God. For it is written, He taketh the wise in their own craftiness.

1 Corinthians 5:6 Your glorying is not good. Know ye not that a little leaven leaveneth the

whole lump?

2 Corinthians 6:14-18 Be ve not unequally voked together with unbelievers: for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion hath light with darkness? 15. And what concord hath Christ with Belial? or what part hath he that believeth with an infidel? 16. And what agreement hath the temple of God with idols? for ye are the temple of the living God; as God hath said, I will dwell in them, and walk in them; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. 17. Wherefore come out from among them, and be ve separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing: and I will receive you, 18. And will be a Father unto you, and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty.

Ephesians 5:6-8 Let no man deceive you with vain words: for because of these things cometh the wrath of God upon the children of disobedience. 7. Be not ye therefore partakers with them. 8. For ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord: walk as children of light:

1 Timothy 6:10-12 For the love of money is the root of all evil: which while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows. 11. But thou, O man of God, flee these things; and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness. 12. Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life, whereunto thou art also called, and hast professed a good profession before many witnesses.

2 Timothy 2:21-22 If a man therefore purge himself from these, he shall be a vessel unto honour, sanctified, and meet for the master's use, and prepared unto every good work.

22. Flee also youthful lusts: but follow righteousness, faith, charity, peace, with them that call on the Lord out of a pure heart.

2 Timothy 4:10 For Demas hath forsaken me, <u>having loved this</u> <u>present world</u>, and is departed unto Thessalonica; Crescens to Galatia, Titus unto Dalmatia.

Titus 2:12 Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world;

Titus 2:14 Who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works.

Hebrews 11:24-25 By faith Moses, when he was come to years, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter; 25. Choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God, than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season;

James 1:27 Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world.

James 4:4 Ye adulterers and adulteresses, know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God? whosoever therefore will be a friend of the world is the enemy of God.

1 Peter 2:9 But ye are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people; that ye should show forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into his marvelous light:

1 Peter 4:2-4 That he no longer should live the rest of his time in the flesh to the lusts of men, but to the will of God. 3. For the time past of our life may suffice us to have wrought the will of the Gentiles, when we walked in lasciviousness, lusts, excess of wine, revellings, banquetings, and abominable idolatries: 4. Wherein they think it strange that ye run not with them to the same excess of riot, speaking evil of you:

2 Peter 1:4 Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust.

2 Peter 2:20-22 For if after they have escaped the pollutions of the world through the knowledge of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, they are again entangled therein, and overcome, the latter end is worse with them than the beginning. 21. For it had been better for them not to have known the

way of righteousness, than, after they have known it, to turn from the holy commandment delivered unto them. 22. But it is happened unto them according to the true proverb, The dog is turned to his own vomit again; and the sow that was washed to her wallowing in the mire.

1 John 2:15-17 Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. 16. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world. 17. And the world passeth away, and the lust thereof: but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever.

Friendship with the World.

Friendship is a choice, and the act of choosing is a sword that cuts two ways. We cannot choose a friend without at the same time choosing an enemy. If we choose holiness, we reject sin, and vice versa. We understand now what James meant when he said, "the friendship of the world is enmity with God? whosoever therefore will be a friend of the world is the enemy of God." (James 4:4)

The Jews said to Pilate, "If you release the man (Jesus), you are no friend of Caesar" (John 19:12). We are known not only by our

friends, but also by our enemies. Pilate and Herod were bitter enemies until they both rejected Jesus; the rejection of their common enemy, Jesus, forced them into each other's arms of friendship (Luke 23:12).

We see now why God becomes so heated when His people get chummy with the world or idols or with the mammon of unrighteousness. To accept them is to reject Him. Friendship by its very nature denies a universal, all-inclusive embrace. Friendship is selective. It thrives on exclusive choices. So it is natural that God, who desires the warmth and love of our heart, should become "jealous" when He sees us consorting with those who hate Him.

Jesus Christ is constantly looking for friends. When He called Judas "friend" in the moment of his betrayal, He was revealing an innate yearning. Even for those who oppose Him, the door of friendship is always open, but always, of course, on the conditions He lays down. Judas was a friend in invitation only. I must go beyond; I must be a friend to Him in reality. The condition of being Christ's friend is to "do whatsoever I command you." (John 15:14). The honor of being His friend is to talk to Him "face to face" in sublime intimacy (Exodus 33:11).



"THE JOY OF FORGIVENESS"

Sermon by Bro. Pat Zaugg of West Bend, IA Isaiah 59:16-21 and Luke 17

We, dear ones, in the day and time that we live, we have that desire from within to be with the Saviour, to be gathered together around our precious Christ, the One who went to the cross of

Calvary and brought salvation to each of us and brought salvation to mankind.

That same salvation still is available today to those who would seek it and would desire it. The scripture that we read together in this morning hour touches many different subjects, really. I had to think of two things that stood out as I went through—faith and forgiveness.

Sometimes, when we come to the pulpit and a particular scripture or a particular subject would open, it really doesn't come as a surprise for those of us who would happen to be parting the book. I had a real feeling that forgiveness would be something that God wanted us to read and talk about today.

How important is it, dearly beloved, that we as the household of God are able to forgive each other? How important is it, dearly beloved, that we as the household of God are able to forgive others that would not be of the household of God, but would somehow be a thorn in our side or be a trouble or a torment to us?

If we are going to be Christians, if we are going to be children of God, if we are going to have a home in Heaven someday, dear ones, there can be no other way, but that forgiveness will be a part of our life. It would be real

and true and not something that we would practice just with our lips, saying that we are able to forgive.

But, it would be something that would come from the heart...a willingness. Maybe that willingness to forgive would come from a desire from within so that we would want to be able to forgive.

Being children of God, sometimes, it is hard for us to even forgive ourselves whenever we would fail and whenever we would fall short. Something that we maybe need to keep in mind is that whenever God forgives us, we have to be willing to accept that forgiveness and to carry on.

We have to be willing to allow God to grant a peace unto our heart. We have to be willing to humble ourselves enough to know that there is nothing that we can do that we would ever deserve to be forgiven, but it is just by the great mercy and love of God that He is willing to.

Let us talk a little bit about one another. It says here, "Take heed to yourselves: If thy brother trespass against thee, rebuke him; and if he repent, forgive him." (Luke 17:3). There are times when this scripture is fulfilled. Sometimes someone would be in error and we would visit, kindly, and there is the saying that they are sorry and there is forgiveness there.

I think, dear ones, that it is more important that we understand that if we are the individual that did the trespassing, that we would have a heart within us and we would be willing to ask for the forgiveness.

You know, it is really pretty simple if someone comes to us in a repentant heart and asks for forgiveness. It is pretty easy to forgive them, isn't it? There is not a problem there.

How about when someone comes to us? We have maybe been cross, maybe been short with our words, maybe have not been as kind as we should have been and not as Jesus would have been. Maybe when just a little something is mentioned to us, do we repent? Are we sorry? Or do we say, "That is just kind of my nature; I am just kind of that way."? Dear brothers and sisters, this scripture speaks to me.

Then, how about if the individual never says that they are sorry? Was Jesus here saying that we do not have to forgive those individuals? No, there is no license, dearly beloved, given here for that. Those are the times that maybe are even more precious to us as believers, when someone would hurt us or trespass against us and would just go right on their way. Maybe they even understood that they hurt us, but would never come and say anything to us. Oh, when we can forgive them, that is when the true blessings begin!

Do we have a choice whether to forgive or not? No, we do not. If we do not forgive, then we are not God's children. If we do not forgive, then we do not have a home in Heaven. If we do not forgive,

then our sins come back upon us and we become as unconverted people.

Then how do we forgive? How did God forgive us? How did Christ go there to the cross and pay the debt that we owed?

You know, when we think of all that God has forgiven us, it becomes a lot easier to forgive one another. When we remember that we were out there on Calvary and we were nailing those nails into the hands of Jesus and into His feet, and as they were being driven in, Jesus was repeating, "Forgive them; for they know not what they do." (Luke 23:34).

When we think of that kind of forgiveness and that we are supposed to have the mind of Christ, then it should be so easy for us to forgive one another. But, sometimes it is not quite as easy as it should be. Dearly beloved, let us be diligent.

The scripture started out by saying, "It is impossible but that offences will come: but woe unto him, through whom they come! It were better for him that a mill-stone were hanged about his neck, and he cast into the sea, than that he should offend one of these little ones." (Luke 17:1-2).

If I am not mistaken, dearly beloved, the scripture as it is put forth here, the word offences, I believe, means that we would cause someone to fail. Let us read that again and think about it. "It is impossible but that offences will come." (Luke 17:1).

There are different kinds of offences, dear ones, but if we would cause another brother or sister to fail, or if we would cause, even as it says here, one of the little ones to fail, what would our lot be? It says, "It were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and he cast into the sea." (Luke 17:2).

So our little ones that have gathered with us today, the little ones that are down in Sunday School, what do they see when they see the church? What do they see when they see the body of believers?

Hopefully, they see a body of believers that is walking heavenward. Hopefully, they see a body of believers that are willing to separate themselves from the world and from sin and live in righteousness.

As this scripture goes on to say, do they see a body of believers that is willing to say they are sorry and repent to one another? Do they see a body of believers that is willing to forgive? That is really what the scripture is about here this morning. Do they see a body of believers who can live in love, harmony and unity? They should! They could! I certainly hope that they do! Do they see a mom and a dad that work together as a godly team? The scripture really speaks to all of us, and especially to me.

Then He went on talking about faith. It is going to take faith to be able to forgive. It is going to take faith to walk as we should walk. Oftentimes, we plead with God that He will increase our faith. How much faith is it going to take?

It says here in the scripture, "If ye had faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye might say unto this sycamine tree, Be thou plucked up by the root, and be thou planted in the sea; and it should obey

you." (Luke 17:6). A mustard seed isn't very big, but how big is our faith, dear ones?

As we live, Satan would continually try to destroy our faith. We understand that faith cometh by humbleness and submission. Faith cometh and it grows by being diligent in service.

Faith isn't one of those things where we can get a whole bunch of a commodity and tuck it away in our back pocket someplace and pull it out whenever we need it. No, that isn't the way it works. Faith is acquired day by day as we walk here below. It depends on how diligent we are, how faithful we are, and how sincere we are.

Faith is something that, as unconverted individuals, we had almost none of, but as God began to work in our lives and in our hearts, we really do not know how it happened, but our faith began to increase.

So many of us who have been converted for some time fall into kind of a rut that things are okay now. We have reached this certain plateau and this certain place in life, so, spiritually, we can kind of just sit back and watch the world go by and do our little bit now and then and everything will be okay. Then we find ourselves slipping backward if we fall into that line of thinking.

Our faith—Jesus said here if we have just a tiny, little bit of it, we could command a tree to be plucked up by the root and planted in the sea. If we had just a tiny bit of faith, forgiveness would come automatic. If we had just a little tiny bit of faith that God would provide for us each

day, our walk would be really quite easy. But our faith is weak. We need more faith and we need to be diligent that God would increase our faith.

We have then the account of Jesus talking about the servant that plowed in the field and was feeding the cattle. When he would come in, I am sure that he had toiled a long time out there that day, he probably was really ready for a little rest. But the master wanted this individual, who had worked all day, to prepare some food and then serve him so he could eat and drink.

Jesus asked, "Doth he thank that servant because he did the things that were commanded him? I trow not. So likewise ye, when ye shall have done all those things which are commanded you, say, We are unprofitable servants: we have done that which was our duty to do." (Luke 17:9-10).

Oh, dear ones, this is such a precious scripture. How do we look at serving the Lord? Do we think that we do a lot for God? Do we think that this last year we just went out of our way in servitude to our great God? Do we think that we have been just pretty humble and just pretty obedient to God and He should really be pleased?

I hope those are not the feelings of anyone here today because we are unprofitable servants as we live here below. Even if we try as hard as we possibly can, we're still going to fail. Even if we put forth the utmost of effort, we are not going to walk in the way that God would really want us to walk completely.

Whenever we have given our

all, dear ones, we have only given that which is our duty to do. We are God's. Remember, dear ones, the day when you knelt there at the cross and you laid down your life as a sacrifice to Him? We didn't give just part of ourselves, did we, dearly beloved? We gave our all. We told God to come and live within us, work with us and to make us something that He would be pleased with.

Do we remember, dearly beloved, that nothing was too great on that day? He asked many of us to do many different things and we went about our way diligently seeking out the will of God. Is it still that way, dearly beloved? Is our all still on the altar? Do we still feel that we are just unprofitable servants even after we have done what is our duty to do? I feel, dearly beloved, that we have come into a time when for most of us, we have a hard time even doing that which is our duty to do.

There is the human side of us that maybe is always looking for just a little easier way to try to get to the kingdom of God. As the world around us seeks a much easier way to serve God (I do not really want to go into that), I think that it has an effect upon the church and upon us as God's children as we would, from time to time, think, "Do we really need to do this or do that?" "Do we really need to unconditionally forgive?" "Do we really need to follow after our Saviour exactly in His footsteps?" Yes, dearly beloved, we do!

We have here the healing of the ten lepers. I believe that another great affliction of our society—and it has a little bearing on the church—is thankfulness. How thankful are we, dear ones?

How thankful are we that we are children of the King? How thankful are we that our names are written there on those pages white and fair?

How thankful are we (as we read the scripture in this morning hour) of the coming of the Son of Man when two shall be grinding together and the one shall be taken and the other left? When the two men shall be in the field and the one taken and the other left? When two are in the bed, the one taken and the other left? (See Luke 17:34-36).

How thankful are we this morning, dear brothers and sisters, that we are ready to go? How thankful are we that we are redeemed?

It would have been very easy for God to not have granted us the grace that He did grant us on that day when we started to repent. We could still be languishing in sin without hope. We could still be in the position where we would know that damnation and hell would be our lot.

How thankful are we that we are redeemed? Our actions show forth our thankfulness. Lot's wife really wasn't very thankful for the deliverance from Sodom. She didn't make it.

If we are not thankful for the deliverance that we have received—the deliverance from sin, ungodliness and hell fire, then we are not going to make it either. We pray together that God would put within us a great thankfulness for what He has done for each of us.

"And when he was demanded of the Pharisees, when the kingdom of God should come, he answered them and said, The kingdom of God cometh not with observation: Neither shall they say, Lo here! or, lo there! for, behold, the kingdom of God is within you." (Luke 17:20-21). The kingdom of God. Does Jesus Christ dwell within our hearts?

There are different kinds of kingdoms that we can talk about. We can talk about a kingdom where there is a king and then there is the people who are under him that exists on the earth to-day—an earthly kingdom. We can talk about faithful servants of the king and those who serve the king half-heartedly. When we apply that to our spiritual walk of life, what kind of servants are we?

Then we can talk about the kingdom of God that dwelleth within us as believers. We did not put it there. We did not say all of a sudden one day, "I am going to go out and acquire the kingdom of God and bring it to me." But we did put forth some work and effort to become servants of the king.

That kingdom, dearly beloved, will follow us wherever we are upon this earth. That kingdom within us will be something that will bubble up and grow. We will become more fervent in our service to that King. The kingdom of God that is within us here upon

this earth, will someday be changed and we will be part of the heavenly kingdom—that kingdom eternal around the throne!

How is it going to be in Heaven, dear ones? I love to think about that. It seems like the more that I think about how it is going to be in Heaven, the less I really know about how it is going to be. We know that there isn't going to be a need to have faith anymore because there will be sight. We are going to meet our Saviour and bow down before our great God.

There is not going to be any tears in Heaven, because God is going to wipe them away. I think even more than that, there isn't going to be a need for any forgiveness in Heaven. Think about that, loved ones.

How often as we live here below, do we need to be forgiven? How often do we, as weak individuals, fail our great God and one another? In Heaven, we will never have to get down on our knees at night beside our bed and pray that God would forgive us where we failed in that day, because when we get to Heaven, dearly beloved, we are not going to fail anymore.

We are not going to have to make use of that shed blood of Jesus. No, God is going to make us as the angels. We will not only, dearly beloved, be likeminded on that day, but on that day God will give us a robe of righteousness and we will shine. We will shine from within a purity and a holiness.

We think about the thankfulness we have sometimes here upon this earth. We think of the thankfulness of the leper that we read about this morning hour. I don't think any of us know what thankfulness is about here upon this earth, but I think that when we gather around that throne someday, we are going to be so thankful.

We are going to know that the few things that we have done here upon this earth that have been commanded us, they are going to seem as nothing. We are going to know that we are unprofitable servants here upon this earth for our God. We are going to be so glad that we have done that which was our duty to do. We are going to be thankful, rejoicing around the throne.

May our thankfulness grow here upon this earth that our faith would be increased and our holiness would become more perfect. Remember, dear ones, we are not searching for an earthly kingdom. On that day, when Jesus comes, we want to be ready.



SILVER LINING



This is the final article concerning the Zion's Harp hymnal. The following includes the entire first chapter of "A Treasure of Praise" which depicts the simple splendor of the songs we sing each Sunday and Wednesday evening during our worship services.

It is a beautiful Sunday morning. The sky is sunny and clear. The springtime air is mild and mellow, and together with nature's fresh, appealing fragrance, it creates an atmosphere that invigorates one's soul and being.

Such a setting is often evident when driving to the house of God on a Lord's Day morning. And while the richness of God's handiwork—in the form of the air, the sky, and the sun—is readily manifest and a delight to behold, yet another wonderful experience awaits the child of God upon entering the sanctuary of the Apostolic Christian Church.

Hymn singing has already begun and the time soon elapses to nominally four or five minutes prior to the beginning of the morning worship service. At this time, nearly all the people are very orderly seated in their places. It is peaceful, solemn, and quiet. The heart takes on a calm repose as the assembly centers its thoughts on the sublime and the divine—on Almighty God.

Often, at about this time, a beautiful song is sung which succinctly depicts the essence of the day and sets the stage for the ensuing worship service. It is entitled, "Morning Hymn" and is also known as "Oh, How Lovely Is The Morning". This beauteous song begins in resonant splendor as brothers and sisters in Christ unite their voices in praise to God—and an obvious joy fills the heart. Not only are thoughts of God conjured up within the mind, but the beauty of the day serves as a poignant reminder of the presence of God's love and power. It is a moment when one is truly glad he is in church on Sunday morning.

Adding to the beauty of the moment is the fact that the singing is done in "a cappella" fashion, that is, without accompaniment of musical instruments. The natural beauty of the voices which ripple across the auditorium are blended together in a mellow, four-part harmony and this truly sets the tone for a worship service that is both dignified and eloquent in its simplicity.

The overall atmosphere is one of holiness and reflects the calmness, gentleness, and richness of God. The absence of instrumentation, in this particular instance, tends to symbolize a relationship to God that is best nurtured when lacking the weight and clutter of material things. In this case, the lifting of voices are completely natural as God gave them, and are not necessarily made comely by a material object.

The particular song mentioned is both inspirational and devotional. *It goes:*

Oh, how lovely is the morning, When it is begun with God.
Joy and thanks our hearts adorning, As behooves a child of God.
Waking after night so fair,
In the Maker's gentle care,
Rising without grief or sorrow,
To a new and joyful morrow.

Then, in verse two:
Let our eyes be raised to heaven,
Where the sun is shining bright,
And on hill and dale and meadow,
Is dispensing life and light;
But far more than sun in space,
Beams the Saviour's kindly face;
Truth and kindness, peaceful nearness,
Shine out in eternal clearness.

The above song, so complete in depth and substance, is an excellent example of the overall beauty of the songs contained in the Zion's Harp. "Oh, How Lovely Is The Morning" has always been a favorite. It is especially cherished on mornings of clear and sunny skies, but equally so perhaps on each and every day. Why? Because a morning is always lovely "when it is begun with God".

Countless other songs in this hymnal provide rich lyrical phraseology that have

served to inspire the brethren during worship services. Some of these phrases go:

"He reconciled my wayward spirit Through His own blood and gave me light", No. 220

"My Lord, an offering do I bring; My heart I give to Thee", No. 163

"Rise, oh soul, and break the bondage", No. 183

"Who is Lord like Thee, sweet repose for me", No. 19


"Our song of praise to God ascend, And there with angels voices blend", No. 7

These verses are typical of many others appearing in the Zion's Harp. Strong, vivid, and meaningful lyrics are the rule rather than the exception in this songbook, the official and cherished hymnal of the Apostolic Christian Church. It is a book that is deeply appreciated.

To say the least, the Zion's Harp is a classic. God is to be praised for allowing and preserving such a noted collection of songs for the brotherhood. The many words and phrases were written by men who had, not only a close relationship with God, but a keen insight into everyday life, and into those things which tend to inspire and uplift the seeking soul.

Too, this songbook is comprehensive and provides songs for all occasions: not only for joyful and happy times, but for times of sorrow and gloom as well. It also provides for reverent and serious times such as repentance, baptism, and holy communion. The verse and prose are ideally suited for whatever situation arises.

The historical background of this hymnal is a firm testimony to the talent that lies unseen behind the composition, both in the hymn texts and hymn tunes. Even though today's brethren know little about the back-

"A Borrowed Axe"

Do you own the Holy Spirit? What is your relationship with the Holy Spirit? This question has arisen in my mind since I read II Kings 6:1-7 in our Tokyo church last Sunday.

The sons of the prophets were cutting down trees along the Jordon River in order to build a more suitable dwelling place. They were using an axe and unfortunately, the axe head fell into the Jordon River. Elisha cut down a stick and cast it into the river where the axe head had fallen, and even though it was made of iron, the axe head came floating to the surface of the water.

I reasoned that this axe head can represent the Holy Spirit who works through the Word of God. An axe can be used to cut down and clear out a jungle, the underbrush and all. Likewise, the Holy Spirit works in our lives to cut down and clear out everything which is not for God's glory nor for our spiritual

welfare. Such things include whatever is not good for our minds and bodies, as well as the sins with which we are all familiar. The Holy Spirit would like to cut out a self-righteous attitude and a lack of respect toward others. Selfishness should also get the axe.

What happens if we are careless and neglect the Holy Spirit? He drops out of sight and it takes a miracle to get Him back.

One of the purposes of the Holy Spirit is to build us a better dwelling place. now and in eternity. We are not supposed to do anything that might harm our body, and to do everything we know which would be good for our body. I Corinthians 3:16-17, "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you? If any man defile the temple of God, him shall God destroy; for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are."

II Corinthians 5:1 speaks of our present house and our eternal house. "For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." We conclude that the Holy Spirit is in the construction business.

The sons of the prophets were using the axe to build themselves a better dwelling place and things went along well until one of them was felling a beam and the axe head fell into the water. This would be cause for alarm under any circumstances but it was doubly bad because it was borrowed. II Kings 6:5, "He cried, and said, Alas, master! for it was borrowed."

It can be said that God has loaned us the Holy Spirit and He should be treated with great respect and with great care. We don't own Him, but rather He owns us, if we permit Him to take possession.

ground and development of the Zion's Harp, nonetheless a rich and full history surrounds this great book.

The Zion's Harp covers a span of five centuries, from the 15th to the 20th. Aristocracy is included in its history. In fact, the person leading the initial effort to collect the first hymns was a Baroness. Moreover, a noted hymn writer whose hymns were included was a Count. Many other hymn writers were devout men of God trained as theologians in leading German and Swiss universities.

Also, a few of the tunes included in the hymnal were composed by such musical lu-

minaries as Beethoven, Mozart, Handel, and Rousseau (however, they did not compose specifically for the Zion's Harp). But, perhaps the greatest thing of all is that a good many of these authors were men who surpassed the banal plane of nominal Christianity, had repented of their sins, and were converted men in the truest sense.


Interestingly, this hymnal contains a song written while the author was in a prison cell. Lacking adequate paper, he wrote on the prison wall. Moreover, another song was allegedly written during the culminating phases of the Thirty Year's War in Germany, and it graphically depicts the spiritual feelings of that era.

In essence, the Zion's Harp hymnal has an expansive lore of history, and was made possible by men with a wide and notable array of talent. It is a book of measureless depth, written by the best of musical scholars and it serves very well the singing needs of the Apostolic Christian Church. It is deeply cherished.

The early fathers of the brotherhood many times simply referred to this book as "hymns for meetings of believers". It is nothing less, and nothing more. It is a sea of musical eloquence.
