Forbearance

Being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus: Whom God hath set forth to be a propitiation through faith in his blood, to de-

clare his righteousness for the remission of sins that are past, through the forbearance of God:

Romans 3:24-25

Number 8

The act of forbearance is one of the kindest acts we can commit. It is an act of unfeigned love. Webster defines forbearance in this way-to abstain, controlling oneself under provocation and having patient restraint, extending the time of payment on a debt. What greater debt do we owe than the debt of our sins and the mistakes of life. God, through His forbearance, extended our debt to Him into eternity through the shed blood of Christ. God even goes one step further in His infinite mercy and cancels our debt through our faith in Him and the acceptance of His mercy through repentance. No greater example of mercy and unfeigned love has ever been given than that of our Father which art in Heaven.

For God so loved the World that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. John 3:16

We look to the Lord as our example and start to see the need in our life to come closer to His perfection. Do we jump in with both feet when we hear some gossip about a loved one? Do we hear the words slip from our mouth, "Where there is smoke, there is usually a little fire" or does the love of the Lord reflect in our reply, "I am sure that there is a good explanation for this or that" and then encourage the talking to stop. That is one small way we can show forbearance for those around us. We can never reach the Lord's perfection, however we should never slack in our reaching. We are blessed according to our willingness to extend our effort of reaching for a Christ-like attitude.

The lilies of the valley and the flowers of the field are a constant reminder of God's tolerance for us. As we behold their beauty, we feel a warm feeling which comes from the knowledge that God loves His creation and is tolerant and forbearing of the mistakes of men. Should we use

that forbearance for occasion to sin. God forbid. Should we consider God's forbearance as a reason to procrastinate in repentance, God forbid. We can, however, take that warm feeling of love we get from Him and make an extension of that love to others. Love and forbearance are a couple of things we can not give away, for as we attempt to give our love away or forbear one another, we receive more than we gave. In thinking about the flowers of the field, which was God's gift to us, we almost always have a warm peaceful feeling in return. Warmth generates warmth and cold generates cold. So it is in life.

We should ask ourselves, "Am I a lily of the valley, or a flower of the mountain; do I give forth gracefulness as water from a fountain? Am I an extension of God 's love to man who around me stand, or am I a lump of clay who only offers others the back of my hand?"

I can only speak of my imperfection, for it is in my heart that I can see clearly. I know where I can do better, and by God's grace, I will do better.

Forbearance is not apathy. How often do we hear, "You leave me do what I want and I will leave you do what you want." God did not leave us alone on earth to fend for ourselves. He did not create us and then disappear. Rather He created man in His image, instructed His creation in obedience, and made punishment for disobedience. All of this is because He loves us and wants our well being. If as we walk through the valley or field and we watch where our foot falls, we can miss crushing out the life of some beautiful flower, which in return leaves that beauty for the next soul whose journey is behind. It is the same with the beauty of God's instructions for a holy life. If we crush them out as we walk along, they will not hold the same value to the next generation that follows us.

Forbearance is tolerance. Not tolerance for sin or crushing the flowers of life, but rather tolerance for our

imperfection. We all have a tendency to tolerate the imperfections of our spouse or children because we love them so much. If God' s love is in our heart, we will also tolerate His children as they may appear to be unfair or hurt us. We will understand that there is no perfection in man. We will however "discern the spirits" and be willing to empathize with our brethren. God cared enough for us that He gave us His Word, the Holy Bible, to warn us of impending danger. We should do no less if we through love and forbearance can help an erring child of God.

In closing, let us consider the tremendous forbearance of Our Father Which Art In Heaven and then look into our lives. As we reach for His perfection, let us remember how much we can hurt others by not forbearing and forgiving. If you are walking down a street and everyone you pass is frowning, quickly seek out a mirror and check out the countenance of your face. Perchance your frown generated the other frowns. Then with a heart of love, journey on and with a smile from the Lord watch as the frowns of the passerby change to smiles of love. Seek not how you can hurt others, but how you can help others.

Light From The Word



"Judge not, that ye be not judged. For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again" (Matt. 7:1-2). "Therefore thou art inexcusable, O man, whosoever thou art that judgest...for thou that judgest doest the same things" (Romans 2:1).

From these passages of Scripture, we receive strong admonition that we are not to judge one another. Yet these questions often arise in the mind of a child of God, "How do we deal with inappropriate behavior if we are not to judge? What authority, or responsibility, do God's people have concerning matters of behavior?"

It is very clear in the Word of God that sin cannot be tolerated in the house of God. "If any man defile the temple of God, him shall God destroy; for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are" (I Cor. 3:17). From the very beginning, Satan tried to convince mankind that God did not mean what He said and that sin was not something to be avoided. In the garden of Eden, the serpent told Eve, "Ye shall not surely die: for God doth know that in the day ye eat thereof, then your eyes shall be opened, and ye shall be as gods, knowing good and evil" (Gen. 3:4-5).

To understand our duties in the area of judgment, we must understand that judging has a variety of meanings. Our responsibility is dependent upon the particular meaning of the word that is used. Among the meanings of the word judge are: to condemn; to give sentence; to assume the office of; to undergo the process of a trial; to be involved in a lawsuit, to administer affairs, and to form an opinion or to make a resolve.

The responsibility to judge, depending on the meaning that is used, seems to fall into four distinct categories: 1) the responsibilities that are reserved to God and to His Son, 2) the responsibilities that are assumed by government, 3) the responsibilities that are placed upon the church, and 4) the responsibilities of individuals.

Clearly in the first category the JUDG-MENT OF THE HEART OF MAN IS LEFT TO GOD. "But after thy hardness and impenitent heart, treasurest unto thyself wrath against the day of wrath and revelation of the righteous judgment of God; who will render to every man according to his deeds: (Romans 2:5-6)." "...Behold, the Lord cometh...

to execute judgment upon all, and to convince all that are ungodly...of their ungodly deeds...and of all their hard speeches which ungodly sinners have spoken against him" (Jude 14-15). The reader can gain additional understanding in this area by reading Jude 16-25; Matt. 25:31-32; Heb. 9:27; II Peter 2:9 and 3:7; and I John 4:17. The judgment which is the final rendering of the fate of the soul of man must be left to the Lord. Man has no authority nor responsibility in this decision as the Word makes clear.

Secondly, to maintain civil order, CER-TAIN AUTHORITY HAS BEEN PLACED UPON GOVERNMENTS and we are instructed to obey them.

"Whosoever therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation. For rulers are not a terror to good works, but to the evil...For he is the minister of God to thee for good. But if thou do that which is evil, be afraid; for he beareth not the sword in vain; for he is the minister of God, a revenger to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil. Wherefore ye must needs be subject, not only for wrath, but also for conscience sake.

(Romans 13:2-5).

Unfortunately, governments have not always done what is right. A child of God has the duty to obey governments, even those we may not like, as long as we do not disobey God in being obedient to government. "Render therefore to all their dues: tribute to whom tribute is due; custom to whom custom; fear to whom fear; honor to whom honor" (Romans 13:7). See also Eccles. 10:20; Acts 23:5; J Peter 2:17.

THE CHURCH IS ALSO GIVEN CER-TAIN RESPONSIBILITIES AND AUTHOR-ITY in the third category of judgement. "And I will give unto thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven: and whatsoever thou shalt bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatsoever thou shalt loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" (Matt. 16:19). A similar statement occurs in Matt. 18:18. Ultimately, the church and the authorities who have been placed in positions of leadership must carry out responsibilities according to the Scriptures. We are advised in Proverbs 11:13 that "...in the multitude of counselors there is safety." Decisions made by church authorities certainly must be made in the fear of God and with the advice of counselors. Therefore, our brethren do well to meet and discuss these weighty matters that confront the church.

Furthermore, we are taught to "Obey them that have the rule over you, and submit yourselves: for they watch for your souls, as they that must give account, that they may do it with joy, and not with grief: for that is unprofitable for you" (Heb. 13:17).

Finally, what RESPONSIBILITY DOES THE INDIVIDUAL HAVE IN THE AREA OF JUDGING? All of us must make decisions in matters of right and wrong. We are confronted daily with many of these decisions, and we are called upon to make them in the light of God's Word. We must make decisions that help us discern between good and evil.

Likewise, if we make judgment concerning our behavior and if we allow ourselves to be chastened of the Lord, we will spare ourselves of the condemnation of the world. "For if we would judge ourselves, we should not be judged. But when we are judged, we are chastened of the Lord, that we should not be condemned with the world" (I Cor. 11:31-32).

We will be judged as we judge, but this is not to say that we should never have concern about the behavior of our brother. In chapter 7 in the Gospel of Matthew, we are clearly instructed that we should be concerned about one another; however we are instructed that we should first remove the beam from our own eye so we can see clearly to remove the mote from our brother's eye (Matt. 7:3-5). James 2:13 instructs us that we must also shew mercy.

If we judge ourselves properly, we will have a charitable attitude toward others. "We then that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves" (Romans 15:1). A godly concern for others will enable us to respond appropriately to the concerns we have about the actions of others.

Judging in a biblically sound manner is sometimes a difficult task. We do not want to be too harsh lest we weary or antagonize nor do we want to irresponsibly ignore those behaviors that could lead someone into sin. The proper balance between compassion and watchfulness is necessary. We are our brother's keeper, but not our brother's spy. In the church our judgments are based on our Lord's words "...That ye love one another; as I have loved you..." (John 13:34).

Brighten the corner where you are

Just before Jesus ascended to heaven, he left these instructions to his followers.

As we apply these words to our present day world, we can see some clear instructions for us. Jerusalem can be considered our own home town and congregation, Judaea the rest of our nation, with the uttermost parts of the earth being obvious. A verse which is a guiding light for the World Relief Committee is Galatians 6:10, where we read,

"As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith."

Begin at home

With this thought in mind, we will share with the brotherhood some of the activities of our local congregations in carrying out the directives of the above mentioned scriptures. We want to emphasize that the purpose of this is not to bring recognition or honor to men, but to inform our brotherhood of opportunities to serve anywhere there is an interest in helping the unfortunate.

In preparation for these articles, both in this publication and in our "Update" newsletter, the Chairman of our USA Board, Bro. Arnie Gerst of Taylor, Missouri sent a form to each World Relief representative asking for their projects. The replies have been randomly selected, because space does not permit printing them all. We will work them into space available in the coming months.

Local Church Projects

Listed below is the local church and various projects that are being done.

Lester, Iowa

During the 1994-96 period we have made quilts and comforters for various homes for the aged. Clean up teams went to storm and flood damaged areas. We cooperate with those who assist the homeless. We collect used clothing and food which is distributed to needy people,

and make school bags for inner city schools.

EUreka, Illinois We assist the Christian Aid Ministries clothing center at Roanoke in collecting and shipping clothing to Romania. Brethren assist in the Woodford County Heart House in the evenings and on weekends. Our sewing group meets the

third Thursday of each month to make quilts, kits, etc. We try to show the slide programs as they become available. Brethren went to the Galilean Home in Kentucky on a building team.

Valparaiso, Indiana

We make comforters and blankets, collect Campbell's labels, plastic bags, coupons, hearing aids, eyeglasses, etc. We also make school bags and health kits, work at the Bluffton Distribution Center one afternoon and collect used clothing.

Junction, Ohio

We put a roof on a home where the resident furnished the materials, and helped remodel a home for a local brother. We sort and load pallets of Campbell's Soup, which are taken to the Bluffton Distribution Center. We roofed a house and repaired plumbing for a local widow in cooperation with our Latty brethren.

Sardis, Ohio

We gave financial assistance to families whose homes burned. Our children do crafts and projects and sell food at auctions to raise funds for World Relief.

Bay City, Michigan

From January through April we sew comforters and make bandages. We distribute soup and beans to local food kitchens and pantries. We bag beans in packages from 2,000 pounds to 5 and 10 pound bags. We distribute about 3,000 Bibles to prisoners and in local offices.

Winthrop, MN

We take clothing and other useful items to a state hospital. We collect baked goods and sewn items for a gift shop for needy families. We have provided quilts for fire victims through the Red Cross, as well as have collected money for victims of fires, etc.

Goodfield, Illinois

We have built wall panels for Habitat for Humanity, loaded sea containers, and assisted as needed at the Goodfield Distribution Center.


Silverton, Oregon

Last year we coordinated many volunteers who helped build our new church. We provided assistance to local flood victims by cleaning up and rebuilding damaged homes.

Mission Committee Meeting Report

A regular meeting of the Mission Committee was held on May 21, 1996, at Rosemont, Illinois. We appreciate the Lord's guidance and direction on an agenda with 30 different items, and would like to share with you some of the matters which were discussed.

Financial report

The financial report for the nine months ended April 30, 1996 indicated the following contributions:

Total receipts	\$913,014

Contributions to all three funds increased as compared to the same period last year. One of the reasons for this was a receipt from an estate in the amount of \$83,137, which was very much appreciated.

European church building

We have agreed to assist the Banatsko Novo Selo, Yugoslavia congregation to build a new house of worship and a total of \$145,000 has been sent to them during the past nine month period. The old building was over 100 years old and needed to be replaced.

They have a congregation of nearly 130 persons, with many young people. Although the economic and political situation in this troubled land is difficult, the future of this church looks good. The Yugoslavian elders have extended an invitation requesting that some of our elders visit their country this year. Bros. Phil Stettner, Jon Kokanovich, and Gene Marti were given support to travel to Yugoslavia in September. They plan to meet with the elders of that country to discuss spiritual matters, church construction and humanitarian aid. This will then be discussed at the midwinter elder conference.

The balance in this fund was \$277,689 at the end of April. Nearly all of this amount has been allocated for church construction and remodeling in Yugoslavia, Hungary and Romania. We do not send these funds until they are needed. There is a great need in these countries and we trust the Lord will continue to provide funds to assist these brethren.

U.S. church building

We allocated \$20,000 to the Nashville, TN church building fund to be used in remodeling their building. This project is underway at the present time.

Bible distribution

A major expenditure for the nine month period was for Bibles used in our distribution program. This amounted to \$99,137. We also contributed \$20,000 to Gideons International and \$10,000 to the Braille Bible Foundation. We are thankful that we now have our own distribution program, and appreciate the involvement of our brethren which is helping this effort to grow.

Ixtlan, Mexico

During the nine month period, \$7,479 was distributed to the ministry at Ixtlan, Mexico. The Committee reviewed reports which we receive from Bro. Marshall Heinold each month relative to the activities there. It was agreed that two or three elders should travel to Ixtlan to review the situation and counsel with individuals that have a concern for the salvation of their souls. Approval was also given for Bro. Phil and Sis. Jennifer Kellenberger from Washington, IL to visit Ixtlan this summer to assist the Heinolds with their Sunday School children.

RGMMI

We continue to support the Rural Gospel and Medical Mission of India, for which \$13,500 was allocated during the past nine months. \$7,000 was approved at this meeting to help fund the spiritual work of the mission.

Jamaica

We discussed a request from sisters who are interested in spending a year or more in Jamaica to teach at the Caribbean Christian Center for the Deaf where World Relief has building projects. Several concerns were expressed regarding the spiritual and physical safety of young sisters who would be removed from their families and churches. It was agreed that further investigation was needed before approval could be given. We would like for the Caribbean Board to give this further study and develop a proposal for sending teachers and/ or work team coordinators.

It was agreed that individuals considering cross-cultural work should be given sufficient training and counseling before going to a foreign land. The success of our endeavors will be greatly enhanced by our preparation to deal with language and cultural differences. As in this country, communication of the gospel message and assistance with material needs is more effective when a relationship has been established and friendships have developed.

All profits from the sale of these tapes go to Europe, where the money is distributed among our very needy brethren in the Eastern European countries of East Germany, Hungary, Romania and others.

The Heft or Long Book tapes were recorded by Bro. Josef Farkasch, who is a music professor near Salzburg, Austria. He plays the classical guitar and many other instruments on three tapes of songs from the Long Book. Some include singing.

The Heft (Long Book) tapes include three volumes. Volume I includes songs 1-11, 13-18; Volume II includes songs 12, 19-31; Volume III includes songs 33-48. Each tape costs \$8.00. Sermon

Surely, loved ones, these are words of good counsel, encouragement and great truth. The church tonight is nearly full. The voices blended in harmony and with the feeling of love, devotion and thanksgiving as we could stand in the back and hear the inspiring words and melodies of our precious hymns that you dear brothers, sisters and friends sang together in unity.

Loved ones, can we imagine if we had sang together with each one choosing a different melody and different words, the confusion and stress that we would have felt trying to sing and follow our own melody or our own words? It seems rather silly, but loved ones, even in this day and time, you and I are clothed with flesh and blood.

Again and again in this day we were reminded, admonished, and encouraged unto unity. Even the Scripture that has fallen open, loved ones, was not chosen. Surely I can confess to you I would never have chosen it.

It came to me today as I was amongst the brethren there in Princeville. I don't know the number, but I know that the roof was vibrating with the singing, the presence of Almighty God, the inspiration of His Spirit, and the worship of His Son.

So, tonight, as we would draw to the close of another day, God has called down to all who would show interest and concern. Do we want to find consolation? Do we want to be comforted? Do we want to have fellowship? Do we want to have bowels and mercies given to us? Do we want to have joy? Do we want to be likeminded? Do we want to have the same love? Do we want to be in one accord? Do we want to have one mind?

May it be then, loved ones, that we consider each other. God will look down upon the humble hearts gathered together to worship God and to serve each other.

He will provide what you and I will never be able to do without Him. He will provide grace and favor that someday, and it may not be far away, we will awaken. It will hardly seem like life has started when it will be over. We will awaken and we will see Jesus in the clouds of glory.

Oh! How thankful we will be to have been likeminded...to have the love of Jesus Christ...to have been in one accord...and to have had the mind of Christ as He comes from the four corners of the earth. The Word tells us that there will be a trumpet sound and there will be a shout of the arch-angels! They will be shouting victory! They will be shouting welcome!

We will be so thankful, brothers and sisters, that we were united and strong in Jesus Christ and we did not let Satan rob us of the blessings which God has intended for us to enjoy.

May He bless each one of you. We have felt the presence and the love of Jesus Christ in your midst.



A TRANSLATION OF A REPORT RECEIVED FROM ELDER PHILIPP RITZMANN OF BALINGEN, GERMANY —

REPORT OF THE HUMANITARIAN AID SHIPMENT FROM BREIDENBACH, GERMANY, FOR OUR BELOVED BRETHREN IN CHERNOVIC, BUKOVINA, UKRAINE -MAY 30 UNTIL JUNE 7, 1996

We departed from Breidenbach about 8:10 in the evening of **Thursday**, May 30 with the brethren Arpad Bodo, Paul Petras, Helmut Steinke, Vasa Sfera, and Philipp Ritzmann.

About 5:00 AM, we arrived at the rest stop along the autobahn at Donautal in Germany, not far from the Austrian border. Here the semi truck was already awaiting us. About 6:00 AM, we crossed the Austrian border at Passau, where the trailer was sealed after about an hour wait. We were finished about 7:00 AM.

About 12:15 on **Friday** we arrived at the Hungarian border. With God's help, we passed through with little delay, and arrived safely about 4:30 PM at the Budapest church, where we enjoyed an evening meal, and a few hours of rest with Br. Peter Gal and his family.

We left about 8:00 PM (Friday) for our destination in Oradea, Romania. Our beloved brethren. Janos Namenji and his wife accompanied us for the purpose of visiting their son in Bukovina. About midnight on Friday, we arrived at the home of our dear brethren Zoltan Bodo in Saretudwari. After a couple of hours rest, we set forth on our journey to the Romanian border at 7:00 AM on Saturday. (The semi was to meet us there at 6:00 AM). When we arrived at the border crossing at 8:30, the truck was not there. We turned around and drove to try to find it, and shortly found the truck. It was 8:30 AM, and we were very thankful to God that He had led and protected us so far upon our journey. It was 10:15 AM until we were finished with the formalities at the border.

We drove through Romania, reaching the Carpathian Mountains late in the evening. Although we had come a long way over the mountains, we learned that there was a tunnel ahead of us through which our semi could not pass due to the fact that it was too high. In the middle of the night, we had to turn around and find another route, which was much longer. After driving the entire night, we arrived at the Romanian-Ukrainian border about 7:00 on **Sunday** morning.

We had expected to be at this border crossing on **Saturday** evening, and had informed the brethren in Ukraine accordingly. However, unfortunately, it was far different than we had planned. We had to wait a long time on the Romanian side of the border because the shift of workers was changing. There was an hour wait during which nobody at all worked.

Finally we cleared the Romanian border, and came to the Ukrainian side. There it was much worse. This was especially difficult since our manifest showed that we had medicine in the load. The border officials said this required the approval of a doctor.

Br. Namenji's son, Janos, Jr., and other brothers from Bukovina had come to the border and had waited on us since Saturday evening. After hours of waiting, more border officials came along with a doctor, to examine the load. The driver was very patient, but he finally said, "I have never seen anything like this before!" He had to take off the tarps covering the trailer on the side and back so that the officials could find the medicine. After searching, they found one small and one large carton with medicine inside. I can see them yet standing there around the boxes. There were four men there, but we could not approach them. Finally, after an impossibly long wait, they prepared papers, and we could proceed. We finally arrived at 4:30 on Sunday afternoon at the church in Korovia. (This is where we have unloaded all previous shipments in which we have been involved. Gene L) There many brethren were awaiting us, and the joy was great. Here at Korovia, the semi had to wait for a release from the customs officials.

On **Sunday** evening, we had services in the church at Dimka, where there were about 130 members. The joy was great, as the hymnwriter has written, "Joy and peace, thy blessing give us, joy the world cannot obtain." It was very late until the last farewell was said at church, and we could go home with Br. Peter Karcia, and at last get a few hours of sleep.

On **Monday** morning, June 3, a brother came and said the customs officials could not work that day, because it was a holiday. In the evening we had services at Ostrica, the home of Elder Vasile Paladean, where over 200 members plus friends attended. After that, we visited the site of the sewing machines. We stayed overnight in the home of Br Vasile.

Tuesday, the customs officials came, and we unloaded the truck. Since there were about 50 people to help us, the work was finished in about 45 minutes. The storage room was completely full. However, at the end, the officials resealed the trailer, so that a doctor could come and approve the medicines. In the evening, we had services in Korovia. All three services were conducted in the Hungarian language, and translated into Ukrainian. Also in the Serbian language.

This was the last night we spent in Bukovina, and about 6:10 on **Wednesday** morning, we took our leave. With the best wishes of farewell from many of the brethren, who committed us to God, we began our return trip on June 5. Br. Mischa Karcia accompanied us over the Carpathian mountains to a small assembly of about 16 members in Hischa, to Br. Ivan Pelechac, where they rejoiced in our short stop. Then we set forth to the Hungarian-Ukrainian border.

About 10:30 PM we arrived in Sarretudvar, at the home of our beloved brother Tibi Dirici, where we spent the night. On Thursday morning at 11:00, there was a funeral for a 92 year old sister. In the afternoon, we drove to Budapest. where we left the Nameniis plus a sister from Bukovina who is to have surgery on her ear in Pecs. Hungary, and another Ukrainian sister who was her companion. We got to Budapest just in time for evening services, where the brethren rejoiced over our coming. Afterwards. we had supper with Gals, and slept a few hours.

About 4:30 in the morning of **Friday**, June 7, we resumed our homeward journey. About 11:30, we passed through the last border crossing at Passau, between Germany and Austria, and hoped, that if the Lord so willed, we could arrive in Breidenbach in the evening.

We dare say with thankful hearts, "The Lord gave us grace on this trip, and to Him be the glory."

The following articles were taken into Bukovina on this shipment.

About 10 tons of clothing and sewing fabric. Used shoes. Items necessary for the sewing machine project. Thread, buttons, rubber bands, sewing needles, etc. Electric heaters for the Old Folks Home, used auto parts, medicine, two electric hospital beds, and two wheelchairs.

QUESTIONS AND AN-SWERS TO THE UKRAINIAN ELDERS

1. In September of last year, American brethren brought in about 60,000 Deutschmarks (\$35,000). Is any of this money available?

This money has been completely spent, there is nothing remaining. We need more money.

2. Is money available for wages for the sewing workers? Has the rent on the room in which the sewing takes place been paid? (This is a Breidenbach project)

For over two months no wages have been paid, because no money remains. The widowed sister who owns the building has given us the facility without cost. She wants do to a good work. The costs of heat and electricity are being paid.

3. What is the present situation in Ukraine? What goods are available, and what do they cost?

Inflation is rampant, about 300%. When we compare wages and pensions with prices everything is impossibly expensive. Besides this, pensions and child support are not being paid. For example, in Mahala, pensions have not been paid for a year. Pensions are now about \$3.00 to \$11.00 per month. A worker earns between \$15.00 and \$40.00 per month. If one can work for a private building firm, he can earn \$5-6.00 per day, but only if work is available. Child support is about \$5.00 per month.

Following are costs of various goods:

1 kg. flour = \$0.50 - 1 kg rice = \$1.00 - 1 kg meat = \$3.00 - 1 kg salami = \$2.00 - 1 litre of oil = \$0.50 - 1 kg margarine = \$1.00 -4 litres of milk = \$1.00 -2 kg bread = \$1.00

Fuel for winter: 1 ton of coal = \$85-90 - 1 cubic meter of wood = \$16-17 -

One household needs about 3-4 tons of coal per winter, which would consume an entire year's wages.

When we look at costs of bread, according to our brothers, 3 loaves cost \$1.00. If a large family needs about 4 loaves per day, the entire month's wages would be gone before the end of one month, with nothing left for anything else.

The brethren tell us that almost every Sunday, beggars come into the church and ask for something to eat. They are invited to stay for services.

Therefore, it is obvious, that living from day to day is a difficult struggle just for food and drink.



The Simplicity of Worship

The gathering together for corporate worship has been a very important aspect of our faith, and of our weekly church life. As we collectively draw nigh to God's presence, we have done so (over the years) both with a high degree of sobriety and simplicity. The coming together of the saints and their families to honor, praise and seek God is indeed an ongoing blessing.

Central to our worship order has been an emphasis on the importance of God and His Word, rather than on man. The Word is seen as "quick and powerful and sharper than any twoedged sword." (Hebrews 4:12). We come together to focus on God and his messages to us, rather than on an intriguing or contemporary "performance" that might better appeal to our fleshly inclinations. The intent of worship is to inspire, not to entertain.

Similar to the patterns of the first century church, our brethren have attempted to keep their worship liturgy very simple. It has remained consistent through the generations since 1832 (when Bro. Froehlich began establishing churches). The Reformation attitude of "sola Scriptura" (Latin for Scriptures alone) has been, and continues to be, a significant attitudinal precept concerning our form of worship.

The Scriptures comprise the core of worship. Because of their inerrancy (without error) and infallibility (without failure), their messages per the "forereading" (the first reading of the Word) and the "text" (the second reading) comprise a crucially important part of the worship liturgy. As they are read through without interruption of man's comments during the reading phase of the liturgy, it draws the congregation's undivided focus to God's divine, enduring and undiluted message(s).

A special phase of worship is when God's servants (humble men of good report) stand to meditate on the Word and proclaim the gospel. They do not come with their own message, but through the collective prayer(s) of the congregation, are empowered by the Holy Spirit to utter God-inspired words to the hearers.

Our ministers, over the years and today, do not prepare their sermons ahead of time; neither do they select their texts from the Word (other than for special occasions such as funerals, weddings, etc.). Instead, they rely on God, who knows (far better than they) what the congregation needs to hear during any given worship service. Accordingly, the Bible is opened at random (both for the forereading and the text) and the minister reads where he has opened. During the subsequent meditation (preaching) phase he relies on God's Spirit to inspire/inform the listeners.

Music also comprises an important aspect of worship. Again, it is carried out with simplicity and reverence. There are no musical instruments in the sanctuary to accompany the singers. There are no special choirs during worship. Rather, the entire congregation participates in singing. "a Capella" singing encourages participation by all worshippers.

The absence of instrumental accompaniment gives a natural richness to the songs, and is further reflective of the intended simplicity of worship. The praise is indeed comely as it flows naturally from the God-given talents of voice. It is a very simple phase of worship, yet it is a glorious way of praising God.

During prayer, the faithful kneel and bow humbly before God. The quietness and reverence of the sanctuary during prayer enshrouds the words of the brother who leads the congregation in a "from the heart" prayer.

Our simple worship liturgy—which has been followed without significant change for many generations—is free of special attention-getting effects, of trendiness, and of flesh-pleasing patterns that potentially focus on man, and draw attention away from God and His holiness. In our worship services there are no "surprises" to distract us from God. In this, we can direct all our attention to Him, and not become distracted by unexpected liturgical variances.

Our worship patterns are best defined as having a high degree of simplicity, reverence and sobriety. The intent is to recognize the divine presence of God, and to adore and exalt the precious name of our Lord Jesus Christ!

In the past, and still today, we have been richly blessed as a church by our simple worship patterns.

"Evil Spirits" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

Evil spirits are looking for people to enter and control. There is evidence that people who are emotionally ill or unstable are susceptible to evil spirits. Evil spirits try to at least influence all of us but they have a hard time of it if we are emotionally stable and are walking with Jesus. "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind." (II Timothy 1:7).

We must recognize that evil spirits have supernatural power and if they possess a human body, take complete control, and they can transfer that power to the person they possess. We read in Mark 5:3 concerning a man with an unclean spirit, "No man could bind him, no, not with chains." The power to break the chains came from the evil spirits, not from that man's body.

Evil spirits have not only superior strength but also superior knowledge. As recorded in Mark 1:24, a man with an unclean spirit said to Jesus, "I know thee who

thou art, the Holy One of God." This statement came not by observation, he simply knew it.

In some cases, the evil spirit not only uses the human body to reside in but also as a mouth piece, as in the above case from Mark. It's not the person speaking, it's the evil spirit, and we may wonder "What kind of talk is that?"

Now, what about the effect of evil spirits on those of us who are surrounded by angels trying to protect us? About the best they can hope to accomplish on us is to sow discord. We find in Proverbs 6:19 that one of the seven things the Lord hates is "He that soweth discord among brethren." Any church that tries to live by the Bible, has had or will have, splits or divisions. Any kind of reason will do, if the evil spirits can get the church to split over it.

Evil spirits also have the power to foretell the future such as in fortune telling or divination. Acts 16:16 reads, "A certain damsel possessed with a spirit of divination met us, which brought her masters much gain by soothsaying." Soothsaying is the art or business of fortune telling. Sorcery or witchcraft is the practice of dealing with evil spirits.

Evil spirits may have a part in breaking up marriages by causing very nice marriage partners to be unable to stand each other. Each of us should be willing to do anything, so long as it's honorable, to make our marriages blossom.

In II Corinthians 2:11, the Apostle Paul writes of Satan, the boss of evil spirits, "We are not ignorant of his devices." We should know as much as possible about how he operates so we can better take counter measures. If we all obey the Holy Spirit and show much love and respect toward one another, we can nullify the effect of evil spirits.

The beautiful land of Michigan offered a new location for brethren to purchase land. Much like the work place of today and its calling for brethren to go to new locations, so was the need in the early 1900's to find new farm ground that was more affordable. Families from Illinois, Indiana, and states started to homestead the area of Kawkawlin.

In 1907, a church was built after much planning. Continual growth necessitated an addition which was put on in 1919. In 1954, services were held in the new edifice, which was built but a few feet from the old building. Again, in 1982, extensive remodeling occured which changed the entrance and added two Sunday School rooms, remodeled kitchens and a car port. Step by step, as the Lord led the way, the little congregation grew from the small roots of the early 1900's to the beautiful

flower of a church today.
