"OUR COMPASSIONATE GOD IS PATIENT"

Sermon by Bro. Steve Gutwein of Francesville, IN Psalm 67 and Luke 13:1-17

As we are reading the continuing account of the last years of Jesus Christ as Luke recorded them in His Gospel, to Luke it was more than just history that he was giving an account of. He sets the stage so well. In the beginning, he was writing to some high authority, possibly in the government, Theophilus, and just keep in mind what we have read together in Luke thirteen.

Then as we read the preface of this chapter, it tells us: "Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us, Even as they delivered them to us, which from the beginning were eyewitnesses, and ministers of the word: it seemed good to me also, having had perfect understanding of all things from the very first, to write unto thee in order, most excellent Theophilus, That thou mightest know the certainty of those things, wherein thou hast been instructed." (Luke 1:1-4). That thou might know the certainty of the things we have been instructed in.

We read the account of Jesus Christ and the words He has spoken. How most surely these things were spoken as we have read together that what Luke gives account of God has permitted it to be recorded in His Word, and to be maintained until this present day, which is a great miracle. Satan couldn't hide the gospel that he bound that woman for eighteen years. God loosed her through Christ. Christ through God loosed her of her infirmity, but Satan was unable to bind the Word and hide it from the hearts of men to this present day.

We have the freedom to enjoy the Word of God and to read the accounts that was most surely believed among those who were eyewitnesses of Jesus Christ. That sounds wonderful to believe and to enjoy when we are hearing the things that we want to hear.

Men in this day and time receive honor and reverence because they do the things, and they say the things that we like them to do that we feel are beneficial to us. Throughout history it was that way. Men were praised of high honor because of doing those things and saving those things that the people wanted to hear, and were helpful in this walk of life.

Jesus Christ talked about repentance. His cousin, John the Baptist, came and he actually had a baptism of repentance. When he baptized, he baptized those who were acknowledging and sorrowful for their sins and then he said. "One will come after me and I am not even worthy to unloose the latches of His sandals. He is going to give you a different type of baptism, one that is a result of a life that is dead to sin and alive to God. but you must repent."

Now as these people came to the Lord Jesus, and as He had spoken in the previous chapter here, He said a lot of things that were deep thoughts and the people didn't understand it all. Bless their hearts for continuing to inquire about the Lord Jesus Christ even though they didn't understand it all.

They saw what He could do. Some were so impressed by His ability to take a few fish and loaves of bread and cause it to multiply to feed thousands and then to have it

left over. They were impressed! They crossed the sea to find where He was, and they listened to Him!

We came to this that people wondered who He was, and today people are still trying. People of the world, those that are not born again in Jesus Christ, are still saying, and what they are really saying is, "I really don't believe that He is who the Bible says He is." Because if they really believed, they would be like Luke, and would say, "...most surely believed among us." (Luke 1:1). They would believe the gospel, and that is the only response that we can have to believe, and that is with action and obedience, isn't it? Belief in faith and obedience to the commandments of Jesus Christ.

His commandments were offensive for those who were looking for their own self preservation, who were looking for their own enjoyment in life, and to make their own decisions. His commandments were offensive to them. Many of those who were impressed by His ability to do miracles, to heal, to break bread and multiply it,

Discerning Between Flesh and Spirit

A believer in Christ Jesus should be skilled in discerning the difference between the flesh and the Spirit. It is important because, in addition to the Spirit of God in the believer's heart, there also exists an enemy of the soul who daily works to subdue, undermine and eliminate the Spirit's presence. If the believer is careless, the flesh can gradually become more and more prominent. This reduces resistance to the enemy and invites spiritual destruction.

As followers of Christ, it is a striking reality in our lives that we have a devious and sly enemy who seeks to prevent our overcoming sin and remaining faithful until life's end. Because Satan is so cunning and heartless toward our spiritual welfare and because he's not impressed with the Spirit's virtue in our hearts, it is essential that a child of God learns to recognize his tactics. Before we can resist the enemy, we must first recognize him. Failure to identify the enemy makes it almost certain that we will experience spiritual failure.

One of Satan's ploys is to advance against the believer in unexpected ways. He will not always tempt us with the major, visible and heinous sins. Rather he often uses erosion, weariness and deception to weaken our faith.

He seeks, ever-so-slowly, to wear down the believer's resolve. Worldliness begins to creep into the believer's life. Little by little a broader and more worldly-oriented lifestyle ensues. Many times this leads to a perilous pathway and ultimately to sin.

Satan also uses fatigue to reduce our resolve to press toward the mark and to finish our spiritual race. His continual pressure on God's children sometimes causes weariness which makes resistance to temptation more difficult.

In addition, Satan seeks to disturb true godliness through wayward teachings and inadequate or unsound doctrinal interpretation. Such tactics give a false assurance to those who follow scripturally unsound doctrines. As part of his pattern of deception, Satan has diluted the Word of God through a host of watered-down versions of the Scriptures.

In all of the patterns that Satan uses, the true Christian must be alert and discern between the Spirit and the flesh in order to gauge what is right in God's eyes and must separate what is true from what is not true. In today's highly technical culture, with a multitude of powerful means of influence, the matter of correct discernment becomes vitally important.

Having established the need for spiritual discernment in each converted soul, we seek biblically-prescribed prerequisites to gain discernment. Without these, the potential for clear distinction between flesh and Spirit is reduced.

The Apostle Paul wrote, "And be not conformed to the world; but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will, of God" (Rom. 12:2).

The criteria for discernment are obvious: (1) The believer is not to be conformed to the world. (2) He or she is to be transformed by the renewing of their minds. What promise does this bring? We are promised that the will of God may be proved. It is thus wise to resist conformity to worldly ways and to strive for a transformed mind. Defining the difference between the Spirit (God's ways) and the flesh (man's ways) is fairly simple if one is serious about following God's counsel.

In our everyday life, anything we see or perceive stems from one of two roots: the flesh (man) or the Spirit (God). "That which is born of the flesh is flesh; and that which is born of the spirit is spirit" (John 3:6).

The Spirit of God "...will guide you into all truth" (John 16:13). The Spirit's presence will allow us to discern between flesh and Spirit. There are certain traits that will allow for a higher degree of discernment if we humbly submit to these

patterns.

Several lifestyle characteristics found in Ephesians 5 will aid us in effectively discerning between the flesh and the Spirit. As we follow God, we are to walk in love. We are to avoid all uncleanness and covetousness, not allowing ourselves to be deceived with vain words. God's children must not have any fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness. Further, we are to prove what is acceptable to the Lord and to walk circumspectly and not as fools, redeeming the time because the days are evil. Finally, we are to submit one to another in the fear of God.

Because in this life "...we see through a glass darkly..." (I Cor. 13:12) and often find difficulty in discerning God's will, we can benefit by strengthening one another in the faith for we are taught that "...in a multitude of counselors there is safety" (Prov. 24:6).

Thus, if we are willing to listen to and obey the authority placed over us in the Lord (Heb. 13:7, 17) we can benefit greatly. We will be able to more effectively separate the Spirit from the flesh and follow the Spirit's pathways more clearly.

In following collective discernment (i.e., the Church's guidance), we must realize however that it is not all encompassing but only covers some of the vital pathway endeavors and warns us of danger. Personally, on an everyday basis, we as individuals face a multitude of occasions whereby we must discern between the flesh and the Spirit.

If we are humble and submissive to God, His grace will actively flow into our hearts. With an abundance of God's Spirit, we will be able to discern between the flesh and the Spirit.

"Now we have received, not the spirit of the world, but the spirit which is of God; that we might know the things that are freely given to us of God" (I Cor. 2:12).

Mission Committee Met in February

In this issue, and in subsequent issues of this paper, we want to communicate the deliberations and decisions made by the Mission Committee. A meeting of this body was held in Chicago, IL on February 4, 1997. A condensed report follows.

Financial report

The financial statement for the six months ended January 31, 1997 indicated contributions as follows:

Mission Fund\$272,861	
Bible Fund101,562	
European Building Fund 61,480	

In addition, we had interest of \$8,204 for the six month period. The Committee approved a new reporting format for the Financial Statement in the future. It will show expenditures and activities by countries, and we hope it will be more easily understood by our supporters.

Bible distribution

A major expenditure for the period was for Bibles and other expenses relating to their distribution in the amount of \$151,029. An allocation was made for the distribution of Bibles and Hymn Books in India, Yugoslavia, Mexico, and other foreign countries.

East European Harvest

One brother recommended that we consider a contribution to East European Harvest, an organization which distributes Bibles in many of the former communist nations. After an investigation of their activities, it was agreed to contribute \$1,000 for their work. We want our readers to know how much we appreciate their suggestions on matters such as this, each of which we do consider.

Christian Aid and Iron Curtain Ministries

Approval was given for a contribution of \$2,500 to Christian Aid Ministries in Berlin, OH. Brethren from the European Board meet with this Mennonite Group as well as with an Amish Group known as Iron Curtain Ministries each year.

Iron Curtain Ministries covers onehalf of the cost of the monthly sea container shipments sent to our brethren in Romania, and Christian Aid Ministries acts as forwarding agents. We have learned to have respect for both of these organizations, and feel that our cooperation has been mutually beneficial. We hope to continue the same arrangement in the future.

Yugoslavia

Expenditures for our Yugoslavian brethren amounted to \$162,334 for the six month period. As reported earlier, several of our Elders visited this land of turmoil last year. Using their input as a basis for our decisions, we appropriated the above sum for vehicles for use of ministering to the believers as well as for aid in building or repairing churches.

Activities in the U.S.

We sometimes think of Mission activities being carried out in foreign countries, but \$67,441 was spent for a variety of activities here at home. This included \$20,000 for the purchase of a church building in Atlanta, GA, and \$10,000 for the National Good Will Fund, which is used to assist our brethren and friends who have unusual expenses beyond their control and resources.

Meeting needs in Ukraine Because of the very unstable economic and political situation in this troubled country, the Committee feels it is important that some of our brethren meet with their elders and deacons this Spring. We want to encourage them in these trying times and assess how we might assist them.

Due to the political and social conditions in Ukraine, coupled with corruption in high places, it seems as of this writing that it would be best for this meeting to take place in Arad, Romania instead of in Ukraine itself.

Bros. Nathan Steffen, Phil Stettner, and Gene Lehman were authorized to undertake this trip.

European church building fund

This fund is used to assist our brethren in Europe to repair and construct houses of worship. We really appreciate the excellent support given to this fund by our brethren and friends here in the USA over the past several years.

However, the fund is now depleted, and the Committee approved a letter to be sent to all of our congregations giving them an opportunity to contribute. This letter was approved by the Elder Body at their conference in Bay City, MI. It has been mailed to all of our congregations.

Our brethren who visited Yugoslavia last Autumn found a great need for rebuilding churches there. We trust that the Lord will work in the hearts of our beloved brethren so that we will be able to give them the further assistance we feel they need.



Agriculture Work Team Visits Haiti in February

In February 1997, our first agricultural work team of 11 brethren went to Haiti for 8 days to help a local organization build a new school building and a poultry house. God blessed us with a safe trip and the energy to accomplish everything we had hoped to do. We assembled a chicken coop and shed, assisted in preparations for building a concrete roof for the new school, taught a poultry production course, conducted a veterinary clinic, toured the farm, and farmed in the Haitian manner.

A land of contrasts

Our brethren who have worked in Haiti have found it a land of extreme contrasts. There are so many poor and yet some with wealth; there is so much ugliness and yet beauty can be found; and there are so many who live ungodly and selfishly and yet others are seen to be so giving and so faithful to God.

S.E.E.D. Ministries

S.E.E.D. Ministries was started in October 1992, as a contrast to the Haitian "standard" of the meager farm plot and malnourished farm animal, in contrast to the Haitian principle that "nobody does something for nothing."

S.E.E.D. Ministries was started by Mr. Frantz Clotaire, a Haitian who studied Bible and agriculture in America for 11 years. He came close to receiving a Ph.D. in agronomy, but felt led of God to return to his country in 1992 to help his own people. Some of our Apostolic Christian elders and other brethren have toured his school and farm. Through these tours, and visits with Frantz and his wife Doris over the past 2 years, we have come to appreciate the work of their staff. Through its school, farm, and especially its people, S.E.E.D. is having an impact on the agriculture of south Haiti. We now see much opportunity for our church and brethren to help the needy of Haiti through working with them.

The S.E.E.D. School

Presently, the school has 53 students in the 3-year course of study. During the first 2 years each student takes Bible, agricultural, and veterinary technology courses. The Bible courses are usually taught by a MEBSH pastor. The agricultural courses are comprised of training on soil types, composting and fertilizers, crop rotation, insect control, plant genetics, grafting, and marketing. The veterinary courses are taught by an American veterinarian living in Haiti. Other training courses the school offers its students are the opportunities to learn to work hard with their hands and to give to others. A shock to many students when they start school is the requirement to collect their own manure for fertilizing their farm plot. Each student must donate at least 2 hours of work time each week to the demonstration farm.

The third year of schooling takes place in the field (called the Extension Program). Each third year student is sent out to a rural village to live. Here they are given a place to sleep and a

plot of land to farm. During the school year they work and teach local peasant farmers how to raise more productive crops. They also offer better seeds and seedlings, and vaccinate and treat local ill livestock. At least once monthly, an instructor from the school comes to evaluate and advise the student. World Relief funds are used to cover much of the expenses for this third year of schooling.

The Farm

The S.E.E.D. farm is a 15 acre rented plot of level land across the road from the school property. It is near the ocean just southwest of Les Cayes, 5 miles south of the MEBSH compound. On the farm are grown vegetables such as tomatoes, beets, carrots, eggplant, cabbage, and onions. Mango, banana, orange, grapefruit, and tangelo trees, as well as lumber trees, are also on this farm. Produce is grown for sale, both wholesale and retail. Applied research is also conducted in the raising of varieties of tropical corn and soybeans. Many Haitian farmers and school students tour the farm to observe how produce can be more productively grown.

The farm also has one-half acre plots for their students. Each first and second year student of the school has a plot for raising a vegetable crop as part of their schooling.

In retrospect

We were very humbled, not so much for what we were able to do, but for what God is doing for the Haitian people through S.E.E.D. Ministries. We learned that there is a special blessing when efforts are expended for others. And we learned that this ministry is a worthy organization for those of us in agriculture to "do good to all men."



This item has already appeared in a previous Silver Lining (November 1995). However, with the world pressing in upon the Church on every side, it does us well to be reminded about our reasonable service. Let us be counted worthy to suffer for Christ's name sake. If we feel we are suffering too much, we need to read about our forefathers and the early martyrs and perhaps then we will begin to realize that not much is being asked of us in this day and time.

"...For if they do these things in a green tree, what shall be done in the dry?" Luke 23:31.

Sermon continued from page 2 turned their backs upon Him because His way was offensive to them.

Jesus said, "Whosoever will come after me, let him deny himself..." (Mark 8:34). That is offensive to the natural man. To my natural man, that is offensive to me because the natural Steve does not want to deny himself, and take up the cross. There are a lot of other things we would rather take, and then follow me.

It starts with repentance. If we come after Him, we have to deny ourselves. (Step 2), take up the cross; and then (Step 3), follow Him. In the end thereof is life eternal, the Bible tells us. Life along the way is really wonderful. I wish I would have understood more about life in Jesus Christ before I gave my life to the Lord; it wouldn't have been such a struggle to decide to repent. It is revealed by the Holy Spirit of God when we make the decision of our own free will which God has given us to come and follow Him.

The Bible doesn't use, and Jesus doesn't use the word except too often in the Bible, but when He does, we need to take note. It is not an option. To be a child of God, to be saved and go to heaven, enjoy the beauties of heaven and peace with God, repentance is not an option, because Jesus said, and Luke has told us, "We were eyewitnesses of these, we heard these things, they are most surely believed among us."

He said, "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." (Luke 13:5). In another place, Jesus said, "Except a man be born again out of water and spirit, he cannot see the kingdom of God." (See John 3:3). It is not an option.

Being born again is more than accepting or acknowledging that there is a God and even acknowledging Jesus Christ. It is taking up the cross, denying ourselves, following Him and be willing to lose our life so that we might save it and find it.

I am sure the people might have been disappointed at the response Jesus Christ had. He preached the message of repentance in what we have read this morning. To our friends, if the word repent is offensive, we understand. There was a time when it was offensive to me. Our children at home really don't like that word that well. I am not saying that they dislike it, but they really don't like it that well. It is not an option in the eyes of God, or the way of Jesus Christ.

These people came to Jesus. You know there are a lot of ways to get peace and feel good. A good day at work, a day when things go right, when nothing breaks down and we are working well with our co-workers, (maybe we say in the business place now), we just feel good about it, don't we? It gives us a peace.

In the home, when things are going well, the children are being obedient and are being the helpers for their mothers, it just seems like we are getting our projects done and the things we want to do, and all is in good order, it gives us a peace, doesn't it?

That is a peace that is good for us, because it motivates us to do well in this life, and God wants us to have that. That is different from the peace of God. Another way we can get peace is to justify the things we do because somebody else is doing something worse. We have heard it before, it is nothing new, but there are times when we evaluate our Christian walk of life, brothers and sisters, on the fact that such and such is struggling out there. Even though I have some problems in my life. I have some habits that need to be taken care of, I have an attitude problem at times, but such and such is having more problems than me, so on a relative scale, I am justified, and therefore. I have a measure of peace as a result of that.

God doesn't work with relativity. He works in absolutes. The Bible says, "...let your yea be yea; and your nay, nay," (James 5:12). It is either yes or no. It is not maybe. It is not, "Well, depending upon this." It is not the situation, ethics, or mind set that we see in the world today around us that doesn't want

to recognize Jesus Christ as King. It is not that at all.

But we do get a measure of peace from that. That is not the peace God gives; that is the peace the world gives.

So when these people came to Jesus, they told Him about these Galilaeans—these terrible sinners whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. Jesus said, "Do you suppose that these Galilaeans were sinners above all other Galilaeans?" Do you suppose the other Galilaeans kind of justified their way because these people were off the deep end? But Jesus told them here, "I tell you..."

Did you ever try to get a point across to someone and before you say it, you say, "I am going to tell you...?" We do it sometimes to emphasize a point. It is a pointed expression, and maybe not received that well, "I tell you." We do that with our children sometimes.

Jesus said, "I tell you, Nay: but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish. Or those eighteen, upon whom the tower in Siloam fell, and slew them, think ye that they were sinners above all men that dwelt in Jerusalem?" Because they received this judgment for their sin? He said, "Nay: but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." (Luke 13:3-5).

Jesus was classifying the world that he came to save, letting them know that they were lost. We have got to realize that we are lost before we can ever be found, before we can ever be saved. If we have never been to the cross and repented for our sin, and we don't really feel like we are lost, we have been deceived. That is the first step in that process.

That is what John the Baptist was trying to share to the people, that you have to recognize that you are lost. Without God, we have nothing...no hope! Then when we recognize we are lost, we start dealing with that big problem of sin.

Only through the blood of Jesus Christ can we be cleansed from our sin. That's a powerful message, the Easter Story! When they took the spear and pierced His side, it says, "Blood and water came forth." Blood is symbolic of the atonement, and water is for cleansing. Some of us have been washed in the blood of Jesus Christ. There is no other Name under heaven whereby we can be saved, and there is no other place to go.

We have atonement, and we have been reconciled to God. He doesn't see our sin like it was when we were born in the earth we live in, because His blood covers that sin. Then the cleansing of the Word, the washing of the water by the Word, is that which causes us to walk in fellowship and harmony with one another and above all with Jesus Christ.

Jesus went on further, and as He was teaching here, He spoke also this parable, "A certain man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came and sought fruit thereon, and found none." We read back in Psalm 67, verse six, "Then shall the earth yield her increase; and God, even our God, shall bless us." It is something that is expected, isn't it? When we plant something, then there should be some fruit.

"Then said he unto the dresser of his vineyard, Behold, these three years I come seeking fruit on this fig tree, and find none: cut it down; why cumbereth it the ground? And he answering said unto him, Lord, let it alone this year also, till I shall dig about it, and dung it. And if it bear fruit, well: and if not, then after that thou shalt cut it down." (Luke 13:7-9).

Patience is a tremendous virtue, but no person on earth begins to have the patience and mercy that God has. Patience is what we are looking at here...how patient God is! I believe that Jesus is portraying how much mercy He has upon all mankind and that sin is going to be judged according to Jesus Christ because He is the Son of man. A righteous judgment, but it doesn't matter as we can get into those difficult situations in life, but we can be saved from those situations because of the power of Jesus Christ.

Then He is talking here about the mercy of God. This fig tree was

planted in the vineyard. We could liken it unto many things. It could be in our Christian walk of life when we make a beginning with Jesus Christ, but there is not a lot of fruit there. We see the dresser of the vineyard says, "These three years I come seeking fruit on this fig tree, and I don't find any. Let us just go ahead and start over again and get rid of this." Or, it could be the calling of God, I believe unto those of our friends. Let us use the number three here because that's what is spoken of in the parable. Three times and no response, no fruit, and not the fruit of the repentance, so as a result of that, let us just forget about it. God doesn't look at things that way.

Did you ever feel like God is giving you another chance? Brothers and sisters, do you feel like God has given you another chance? Is there anything more humbling and thankful? Let's say we have done something foolish in life, say it is a relationship with our children, and we say, "Please, God, give me one more chance to make this right." God gives it to you, and it is one of the most humbling things we can go through.

The patience of God, or maybe it is the calling of God to our friends. "Lord, please call me one more time." You know our human nature loses patience quickly. There are times sin will result because we're not patient.

Saul was an example of that. He saw the battle was going to be great and he didn't know how he was going to win the battle. I am thinking of the time when he conferred with the seer, the witch of Endor, the total lack of patience on his part. He wouldn't wait upon the answer from God. As the result of that, he suffered miserably. We do, too, many times suffer because we are not as patient as we should be, maybe with our children or with one another.

We see the patience of God here. When there is a fruitless tree, He says, "...cut it down; why cumbereth it the ground? And he answering said unto them, Lord, let it alone this year also, till I shall dig about

it, and dung it." (Luke 13:7-8). Give it another chance, let grace, let the Holy Spirit either convict or bring back and then see if there can be fruit. Then He said, "If it bear fruit, then wonderful." It was just like it was always a fruit bearer.

I believe in our Christian life, some of us, and I probably speak from my own experience, but it seems like if you drew a graph of Christian growth in the life of Steve Gutwein, you would see some acceleration. Then you would see some peace, see some valleys, and sometimes it gets kind of low, then it goes back up again, up and down, back and forth. We see sometimes the result in our life of bearing fruit.

There are times when we bring forth a lot of fruit, our enthusiasm is great and our love for the Lord is great, then we get bogged down from the things in this life. A lot of things distract us, and we go down and we go into those valleys again.

David went through it, some really deep valleys, almost reached bottom. I believe he did reach bottom, but he was able to come back. Peter, the Apostle Peter, reached bottom. He denied the Lord, but he wept and came back. He became a useful source.

Judas reached bottom, but never came back. He is just like that tree that was given a second chance. When he went out and if he would have said (we don't know for sure the life of Judas, it is fresh in our minds from the past weekend), but if he would have said, "Lord, give me one more chance," do you suppose God would have given him the chance? After he betrayed the Lord of glory, do you think God would have given him another chance? He did not have to hang himself. He repented, but he never brought any fruit of repentance. God is really patient.

So, on this growth curve, as believers, we are kind of in the valley right now. Are we heading up or do you think we are heading down? Let's stop and take a good look. Prayer really helps us do that.

"Lord, let me know where I am. Then mold me and make me do what is necessary so I can be steadfast, and so I can enjoy being a fruit bearer in the vineyard of the Lord."

We see the patience of God as we look at our friends. It is interesting. The calling of God, to me is one of the most intriguing, wonderful, glorious things that ever happens in a person's life. How strong it is to some, and how revealing it is to some, but to all, we are sure that God has called us when He has called us.

It can be something very simple. I believe God uses some of the real little simple things of life. He might use children, or He might use an everyday occurrence that just happens to stand out someday to cause us to recognize and acknowledge God. We accept God when He calls us. We are accepting that He is calling us, then we listen, and take the repentance step.

With our teenage children, we see that they wonder about the calling, and then we ask them. Some are called at young ages, very young, and some can go through high school, and maybe beyond and they can't really say they have had a strong calling. The question is, how does this work.

We don't understand that in fullness, but one thing we know that the gospel of Jesus Christ that is preached and even more so, the gospel that is lived in the life of believers, I believe is the greatest calling to the unsaved world. There is more to life than just the life they are living. As a result of that, this becomes a calling unto those that are yet unsaved to come and follow Jesus. God is patient in His calling.

Did you ever wonder why things have progressed to the state that they are in right now? We are talking about the world, and of things that are going on around us. You wonder sometimes. It seems like God could have sent His Son Jesus Christ a while back, and maybe the previous generations felt the same way.

When you have the conviction

that sin is so overwhelming in the lives of those who are unsaved, and even the test that we as believers have, due to the struggle of sin and temptation being very great, what is it that causes God to wait? We know one thing—that everything God does is well done, so His time is going to be perfect.

We should not be frustrated by that, nor should we be discouraged by that because if we have another day to live, it is a day of grace regardless of how dark things get around us. It is a day of digging around the fig tree and of fertilizing that fruit tree. Every day of grace is just that kind of a day. What we want out of that day is entirely up to our attitude, and it is entirely how we submit ourselves to what grace really is.

Remember what Paul said. He said, "Where sin abounded, grace did much more abound." (Romans 5:20). It is like running a race of sin and grace. Sin accelerates, it builds up momentum. Grace abounds, at least a step ahead.

Who are we pulling for? Who do we root for? Whose side do we want to be on when that day comes for us and we have to give an account of the life that we lived?

I want to close with one of my favorite verses of Jesus Christ. That is compassion. Some were offended by the fact that He told them, "Deny yourself and take up the cross and follow Me." (See Luke 9:23). Let us look at compassion. Remember many of these people were steeped into the law of the Old Testament, and of all of the intricacies of the law, they kept the law.

Jesus was bringing in the new day of grace, and they were offended by Him. I believe they couldn't see the mercy that He was trying to share unto them. When we see the compassion of the Lord Jesus, how much compassion was under the law? How would we like to live under the law? It is not that God is not compassionate; He was compassionate, but the purpose of the law was not for compassion. The purpose of the day of grace was mercy and compassion.

Let us use an example. Under the law, I believe, if the sin of adultery was committed, if there were two or three witnesses, the stoning took place. That person faced the judgment of death as a result of that sin. Where would the world's population be today if God dealt with us under the same circumstances and situations?

Let us look at the life of Jesus Christ in the New Testament. These same ones who knew the law so well and tempted Him, they brought unto Him a woman that was taken in the same sin, the sin of adultery, in the very act, and what did He do? He said, "He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her." Then He looked up at her and said, "Neither do I condemn thee: go, and sin no more." (John 8:7.11). Is that compassion?

Sometimes we are so critical and we judge so harsh one another, even between husbands and wives, and within our family circles. We are so hard on others that we forget about the compassion of Jesus Christ.

He looked over the city where He was going to be crucified, and wept, the Bible tells us. He wept. He saw the city that hated Him and the people of that city was going to cause him to suffer, and He wept upon those. He said, "How oft I would long to gather you unto Me, but you wouldn't come." His compassion never ceased and it has not ceased today.

If we are struggling in our Christian walk of life, we have a friend in Jesus Christ because He has compassion upon us. He will never compromise sin, but He has compassion on us. Jesus Christ is the intercessor who said, "Let's give it another year, maybe two." Let us let grace abound. Where sin abounds, let's let grace abound because He has compassion.

If we want to know how to live the Christian life, let us just try to live like Jesus did because He was the perfect example. He said, "Follow me." He doesn't lead us into grace without giving us the wonderful opportunities to walk close to Him,

and share in His love.

As we see this compassion, we see this woman here and it was on the Sabbath day. God caused it to be a Sunday that He did this healing because He was trying to get those under the law to see what compassion was really all about, and what Jesus Christ was about. He said, "This woman was bowed for eighteen years and she couldn't lift herself up." A pathetic situation.

We see these situations in life, and I believe every Christian who sees those that maybe don't have the mental or physical ability or are handicapped, I believe every Christian, those of us who are walking with God, our spirit pours out a prayer to have compassion on them. It is Sunday today, and we can't have that kind of compassion because it is the Sabbath. You don't do anything on the Sabbath.

Jesus took that woman and He laid hands on her and immediately she stood upright and glorified God.

He did more then lay physical hands upon her, He touched her with His love, and with His compassion, and she glorified God. As a result of this, things are building up here to the hatred of Jesus Christ by the leaders of the Jews, the Scribes and Pharisees.

Every time Jesus did a miracle, He was taking Himself one step closer to the cross, because these were the things that caused them to deliver Him. Why did they deliver Him? It was for envy that they delivered Him. When He did a good work, He was taking himself one step closer to the cross. He suffered for you and I, even in the things that He did good. Virtue left Him, and He suffered. He went on to teach a lesson. Now if your donkey gets loose, you water your

animals on Sunday, and then He saw the compassion. Sometimes we have more compassion on animals than we do for people.

I believe we are living in a world

with the day and time that we have more compassion for "Mother Earth" than we do for the souls of people. This woman had the opportunity to be healed on Sunday. We can water our animals on Sunday, but we can't heal; that is distorted religion. False religion. Unbelief in Jesus Christ.

He said, "Ought not this woman, being a daughter of Abraham," she is one of you, have compassion, "whom Satan hath bound, lo, these eighteen years, be loosed?" It says, "...all his adversaries were ashamed." (Luke 13:16-17).

The adversaries were ashamed and the people rejoiced for all the glorious things that were done by Him. Common people rejoiced. They really saw something in Jesus. Those that wanted to do it their own way, were His adversaries. They were ashamed. They came back later again and again, taking him one step closer to the cross.

Faith of our Fathers

As the Faith of Our Fathers is so important to our faith, so also is the lack of our obedience and the consequent punishment of God. God is loving, kind and merciful to His creation and we know this without any question in our mind. As we think upon the message in John 3:16, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life," we feel a certain comfort from God's spirit, the Holy Ghost. However, God reveals His omnipotence in Genesis 6:3 where He states His disappointment in mankind. My Spirit shall not always strive with man, for that he also is flesh. God witnessed man get more and more wicked and His Word, the Bible, states rather clearly that there does come a time when He will bring down His mighty hand in punishment. God seems to forebear long and is longsuffering, however there is a limit to that forebearance and then comes swift and sometimes deadly punishment. We are never going to be able to reason in our finite minds what is the infinite working of God.

We are told what we need to do to find Salvation in the Word of God: therefore we must not struggle with our finite minds to attempt to "out think God." We simply need to accept the fact that we do not always know what is God's infinite plan. Sometimes many events take place simultaneously, which in the end bring about the will of God. Years after the fact, we can look back and understand the wondrous tapestry of God's infinite will, which sometimes is merciful and sometimes it brings about terrible punishment. Thus it behooves us to remember the lessons of history so we do not fall into the same judgment of God.

The Flood: was God's punishment of His Creation because of their total disregard of His will.

This for the most part took place with old patriarchs still living and warning and conversing. "God will not always strive with man," came the word from God to Noah. God is not pleased with mankind came the warning from Methuselah, who was present on earth right up to the flood. Nobody listened until the flood came.

Sodom and Gomorrah: was another incident of unbridled wickedness, unheard of again until our modern time, which ended in a very destructive punishment.

Eli: was a good example of one who undoubtedly spoke the right words, as he was the teacher of Samuel, but did not carry through requiring obedience. Eli's sons were wicked and he may have thought his sons were too old to correct or for whatever reason he just did not restrain them from their iniquity. Because Eli did not take God's desire for obedience serious enough, Samuel, as he was shown in a vision at the age of eight, told Eli that the iniquity of Eli's house would not be purged by sacrifice or offering forever. Many years later Samuel would tell King Saul that obedience is better than sacrifice, which he undoubtedly learned when Eli fell backwards from a rock and died upon hearing the news that the enemy had killed his sons and taken the Ark of the Covenant. The punishment came in the time frame God chose.

Numerous incidents through the old testament, such as David at the threshing floor, the captivity of the people of Judah, and many others mentioned throughout God's Word, the Bible, are all historical lessons of God's forebearance, which ended in judgment and punishment. It seems that historical lessons in the Bible have amply taught us of the importance of following through on the written or spoken Word of God.

The most vivid lesson of God's delayed punishment came upon the Jews after they rejected the Lord as their Saviour. We might think, how could they not have believed in the Lord, with all the miracles He done in their presence? He fulfilled the prophecies of the old prophets, He healed the sick, the maimed, the halt and gave sight to the blind. How could He not have been accepted as the Saviour considering all the wonderful miracles He performed? Was it not jealousy? Was it not a lack of faith?

The account of what happened to the Jews after the Lord's ascension is well documented in history and is preserved for us that we might benefit from it. May the Lord let us learn the importance of obedience to God's divine will through the lessons of history that God has given.

The War on Jerusalem

"But Jesus turning on them said, Daughters of Jerusalem, weep not for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. For, behold, the days are coming, in the which they shall say, Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bare, and the paps that never gave suck. Then shall they begin to say to the mountains, Fall on us; and to the hills, Cover us. For if they do these things in a green tree, what shall be done in the dry?"

Luke 23:28-31

Jesus looked down in pity upon the Jews who were crucifying Him. However, even though our Lord's death was a part of the plan of Salvation, we can believe God's anger was kindled. God waited for a generation to pass before He started to put things in order for the severe punishment that was due upon the Jews for crucifying the Lord of Glory. Let us now look at some of the events recorded for us in the history written by Josephus who

was born in 37 AD.

The citizens of Israel, the Jews, were a proud people who wanted independence from Rome. They wanted a national identity not too unlike what they wanted in the days of Samuel and Saul. They were not content to live under the supreme rule of God and thus were continually in contention with God's will. They were not content to "wait upon the Lord."

The leaders of the various sects of the Jewish religion united and inspired a rebellion against the Roman government. Josephus writes that, "he too put on the armor and joined the rebellion" until he was captured and taken to Rome. He was so overwhelmed with the Roman power and splendor, that he was inspired by God to return to Jerusalem and warn the Jews, much like the prophet Jeremiah, to cease the resistance to Rome. This is one of those places where it is too much for our finite minds to understand and we leave all the events, reasoning, and otherwise will of God in His almighty hand.

Whatever the reason, the Jews would not listen to anyone and continued the rebellion against the occupational armies of Rome. Finally after some time, the Roman Emperor Nero sent an army, led by Titus, to suppress the uprising. However the Roman army met such resistance that the effort turned into a full scaled war and the city of Jerusalem was besieged.

The atrocities of war are never fair and are so cruel. It is disheartening to read of those harsh days that the Jews endured, however we can believe again that God in His infinite thinking was molding the future and at the same time bringing forth the prophesied punishment. Perhaps it would do our soul good to know just a few of the atrocities of the besiegement of Jerusalem so we can relate to the importance of following God and our Saviour Jesus Christ obediently.

There are many accounts in the Bible concerning the judgment and punishment of God, but nothing like what happened at Jerusalem starting in the year 66 AD. There was not a time in the history of Israel that such terrible destruction and punishment came upon them. During the four years of war, as hunger set in upon the Jews trapped in Jerusalem where they fled for safety, the Jews ate all the food stored in the city and ate anything that could be chewed including shoes, belts, harnesses and so forth. The people became weak and died even as they tried to bury their loved ones. Food became an obsession and the Jewish soldiers would have to march over and around the stacks of human carcasses as they would go out of the city to fight the Romans. It is written that they did not look upon the dead as human, but only were directed to fight on. Disease was rampant and slowly through the four years of fighting they became weaker and weaker until finally the Roman army broke into Jerusalem and the destruction began.

Probably the most well known story of that time was of a wealthy Jewess who, traveling to Jerusalem for the Feast of the Passover, was trapped in the siege of Jerusalem. The Roman soldiers, bent on destruction, were attracted to the place where she took residence, because of the aroma of roasted meat. After breaking down the door and taking entry, they demanded her to relinquish any food or meat she may have left. The despairing Jewess went to the back room and returned


carrying half of the roasted body of her son. The soldiers shrank back in horror and left the house. It was this incident that revealed to Titus how far down the Jews had sunk and declared that all men, women, and children should be killed. People were crucified until no wood could be found to make crosses. The Jews would swallow their jewels and gold in hopes of concealing them from the Roman soldiers. Somehow they were found out and the Roman soldiers would cut open live people in search of jewels and gold. It was a horrible time of confusion and atrocity.

When no one was left alive, Titus ordered the destruction of the city save three towers. We can read how the Lord's prophecy was fulfilled when He said no stone of the Temple would be left upon another. Gold wedged in the mortar joints became the incentive to tear everything apart. The half has not been written for history and on this written page is only a glimpse of the omnipotence of God.

During this time, 70 AD, many of the disciples of Jesus were killed. The accounts of Luke being hanged in Rome, Onesimus, Dionysius, and many others died and were scattered, never to return to the destroyed Jerusalem. It was the just punishment of God! We who can learn from the lessons of history would do well not to let history repeat itself.

We, as a Church, the bride of Christ, must maintain a separation from the world and remain true spiritual virgins awaiting the time of the Master's return. We will do well to look to the Saviour to lead us and give total obedience to His Word.





Diligence and DevotionPart IV - Spreading God's Word

While Christianity had existed in America for two centuries, the presence of the Froehlich churches took place with little notice.

Because of persecution in Europe, our brethren were content to remain distant and largely unnoticed by state authorities. For years, the church had no official name and no records were kept due, in part, to caution toward the state.

The early brethren were full of zeal but careful not to labor and plan ahead of what God wanted. Having been inspired by Bro. Samuel Froehlich in Europe, and heartened by the successes God allowed on that continent, our early forefathers proceeded with optimism in America.

While we often think of our forefathers in faith as old men, it is instructive to note that when the American churches were established, most of them were young men. Elder Benedict Weyeneth was only 29 when he first came to America. Bro. Isaac Gehring (at Sardis, OH) was 28. Bro. Samuel Froehlich was 44 when the brethren came to America initially in 1847. Although Bro. Froehlich never came to America, he surely helped to offer advice (and influence), either via letters or in meeting with brethren who returned from America to visit in Switzerland.

The little church in Sardis, OH became an important central location and embarking point for early brethren who emigrated to America from Europe.

Located on the Ohio River, it was an ideal place for immigrants to stay for a period of time before deciding where to finally locate in America—usually in the rich farmland areas of the midwest. In a historical sense, Sardis became known as the "mother" church here in America.

In about 1850, another church near Sardis was established. This was across the Ohio River on Limestone Ridge, eight miles east of New Martinsville (a river town).

A diary entry by Emma Riggenbach Barth noted an experience at Limestone Ridge:

"One Sunday morning, Isaac Emch, who was one of the ministers at that time, was preaching. My eyes were opened while he was preaching, God touched my heart, I felt I was a sinner, and the tears flowed freely. I repented, and on April 4, 1897, I was baptized. When we got home that evening, my husband started to repent, and it wasn't long until he was baptized. That was the happiest day of my life."

In a vivid portrayal of the early days, Sis. Barth further wrote:

"We looked forward to those blessed Sunday mornings. We had a hill to climb and dirt roads to travel. If it rained on



Saturday night or on Sunday morning, the girls would walk to church in their bare feet and carry their shoes and stockings. We always kept a basin under the church and we would take rags with us and they would wash their feet and put their stockings and shoes on. When we started home, they took them off again and went home barefooted. We always took our lunch and stayed for the afternoon service."

Elders Isaac Gehring and Joseph Bella were instrumental in spreading God's Word here in America. They were tireless, and very willing to exert themselves in God's vineyard.

Elder Gehring walked 140 miles from Sardis to Wayne County (Rittman, OH) to preach. He "had a feeling some fellow believers could be found." Indeed, he was "able to find some people who were interested in their soul's salvation."

It was an incredible incident. The first convert at Rittman, OH was Anna Steiner, wife of the Chippewa Mennonite Church Bishop. Her sister, Elizabeth, also became a convert. Bishop Steiner did not take kindly to his wife's conversion.

From this seed of belief, a large community of faith was developed. By 1996, Rittman, OH had 419 members and Smithville, OH had 197. This reminds us that diligence of one or two people can result in a host of eventual believers.

Bro. Gehring walked the rigorous route from Sardis to Rittman many times. Later in life in one of his letters, he indicated his legs were giving out like an old horse's.

Elder Bella, a single man all his life, traveled widely on behalf of the Faith. He would always return to his "home base" at Sardis. He lived humbly in a woodshed "lean-to" attached to a two-room, two-story house. He repaired watches for a living.


As our brethren came from Europe and fanned out into the vast regions of the midwest, a need for preaching the Word and nurturing new believers took place. With zeal and sincerity, our early ministers went into the harvest.

New beginnings took place as these ministers stayed with the literal messages of the Bible. Using God's Word as the only text for their sermons (as now), a positive response took place. The church grew from within. Another source of converts (which added to the church) was from Amish and Mennonite groups. They spoke the German language and many were receptive to our ministers' German sermons.

The entry into our church of various early Mennonites had an affect, historically, on our general order and lifestyle. But our final guide for faith and life, then and through the subsequent generations, has been the Bible. It is God's truth of salvation which allows our church to prosper.

"A Soft Heart"

I've been pondering the idea that it is the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ that really motivated the early disciples. They weren't motivated immediately as we can see by Peter's statement, "I go a fishing," (John 21:3), after having seen the risen Christ several times. Peter was saying in effect, "I can't figure out what's going on. I need to do something that I understand better."

By the time Jesus ascended to Heaven in His resurrected body, Peter and the other disciples had pretty well gotten the picture that the Kingdom of God that Jesus brought was not a material kingdom but an eternal and spiritual kingdom. That made the things of this earth seem strangely dim, in the light of His glory and grace. After that, there was no stopping the early disciples. They were filled with the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost and thereafter devoted themselves to spiritual things. Their philosophy was, "Forget the material things, they don't amount to much, except to

the extent necessary for human life."

It was not the resurrection alone which so motivated the early disciples but also the miracles which continued to happen in their midst. This resulted in a rapid growth of the church as people felt the power of the Holy Spirit, repented, believed, and obeyed. We must never put a limit on God's power—He is the Creator and can still perform miracles today. We should cooperate with the Holy Spirit by having much love and respect for one another. In order to do that, we each need to be dead to self.

During the ministry of the Lord Jesus Christ here on earth, the early disciples saw many miracles. Why weren't they motivated then as they were later after the resurrection? Our first response to that question is that they had it in their heads that Jesus was definitely from God and that He was going to set up His kingdom here on earth, here and now. They were mostly concerned about who among them

would have the preeminence. "By the way they had disputed among themselves, who should be the greatest." (Mark 9:34). They each thought that they were on the inside track and were better than the others.

The other day I found a verse which gives a clue as to what was different about the disciples after the resurrection. It is Mark 6:52. where it is written, "For they considered not the miracle of the loaves: for their heart was hardened." In those days, the miracles which Jesus performed didn't change them much. Why? Because their hearts were not soft. If that is true, we are in dire need of soft hearts. How is your heart? Is it soft, hard, or medium? I'm not sure what a soft heart is but I think it has something to do with being dead to self. The Apostle Paul wrote, "I am crucified with Christ." Crucifixion of self makes our hearts soft, and a soft heart is a prerequisite for genuine spirituality.

The first Church at Tremont was built in the Dillon area, but soon proved too small with the large amount of emigrants that came to Illinois looking for fertile farm ground. The second Church was built in 1881, located about a mile and a half from town. The Church that is pictured here was built in 1910 and became the focal point of the Tremont congregation. In 1962, a new brick Church was built and serves the Tremont congregation yet today. From the pioneering days, when families would have to live for a while with neighbors, until today where large farms stretch out over the acres, the Tremont brethren have always been known for their hospitality and humble attitude. Even though there were troublesome times around 1908, the Lord has surely blessed the Tremont congregation through the years.

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
