#### "SALVATION CAME TO ZACCHAEUS"

Sermon by Bro. Victor Bauman, Smithville, OH Luke 19:1-27

We have here an account where there was some direct teachings of our Lord. This chapter, for the most part, is in red letters, an account of what our Lord actually spoke when He walked here. I've come to appreciate so much over the years, the words that are in red.

It seems that the Lord had such a beautiful way of clarifying issues that were issues at that time. He made things clear to them, and for us, today, likewise. Certainly not taking anything away from the Apostles, as we also can gain an awful lot from their writings.

The Lord had supreme authority and the wonderful ability to be able to dispute with those that had questions and give them answers that they could not, as it says, "gainsay nor resist." They could not find the words. Many times they would leave the gathering after He would address a certain situation or problem or concern.

Many times they would come with an attitude trying to tempt the Lord or trying to catch Him at His Words. In some places, we read that they put a great deal of effort forth trying to find a mistake in what He said. They were dealing with a Perfect Man.

They were not going to find a mistake as much as they tried. A number of times, they were "straightened out," you might say, by our Lord, and the issues were clarified in their minds.

That is what the Lord's mission was as He walked here—to make the way clear. He made it plain so there would not be a lot of confusion. Today, there is confusion. There are a lot of people that do not understand the will and the plan of God.

I often think it would be so nice if we could again have this same experience where the Lord would be able to come into the midst of some of these gatherings where there is a lot of disputing, and just in a few short words, dispel and clarify all of that.

Those that tried to find different ways or tried to interpret the Word differently than what it was meant to be could have those questions cleared up to such a point that they would not even desire to try to take anything from the Word, except what is the absolute truth and the simple truth. They should not make it more difficult or try to make it easier in such a way that doesn't give us the reward that it is meant to give us.

There are always those who are looking for an easier way, a way that they do not have to quite follow the Word and the way that is laid out for us. Yet, as we look at the teachings of our Lord, it is not a difficult way. There are some difficult things that we must do along life's way.

As believers, we are called upon to do some difficult things. Our elder in Smithville often tells us that one of the most difficult things he feels that is in the Bible that a believer has to do is to be our brother's keeper. That could be difficult.

I think one of the other difficult things that we are asked to do is, "Take no thought for tomorrow." I often look at that verse and I wonder about that. How many of us can say that we can do either of those—that we can truly be our brother's keeper and that we, without fear of offense, can watch our brother, go and speak to our brother the way we know that we should? It is difficult.

How many of us can go through

life with enough faith that we don't have to spend so much time and effort planning for the future? It is difficult.

These are some of the things that Christ has told us that we need to do. So the life of a believer is not an easy life, but it is so rewarding. There is so much at stake and so much that we can have with a little effort on our part. Who of us would not be willing to put forth that effort, to give that much effort, if we had the faith to believe the reward that would come? Throughout the ministry of our Lord, He used examples, situations and physical situations that people could relate to easily, to help in His teachings.

We have here (as we began reading this morning together), the story of Zacchaeus. We might wonder, as we read this story, what is there in this story for me? What can I learn from the story of this short man that had to climb into a tree to see the Lord?

I think there are a number of things, as we look at this, that we can take from this story. Number

# Light From The Word

#### Be Still and Know...

We are living in a world that is begging for attention. Many people put forth much effort to find happiness, peace and contentment. In their search, they turn to a world that promises to fulfill all of their desires. Instead of finding happiness, peace and contentment, they find noise, confusion, violence, disappointment and loneliness. As these conditions intensify, it becomes more difficult for a child of God to shut them out and to focus on a life separated from the world.

Along with the volume and forcefulness that is so prevalent, there is also much frenzied behavior. The world is caught up in so much activity and entertainment that seem to have little purpose other than to occupy their time and their minds. Although a certain amount of activity is undoubtedly beneficial, the children of God must be careful that we do not get caught in the trap of becoming so busy and so noisy that we do not hear the voice of God speaking to us.

The scripture provides direction for God's people to deal with this unwholesome situation. It also offers an explanation for the failure of the world to achieve its goal of finding contentment in spite of increased efforts to do so. The scripture tells us "A soft answer turneth away wrath: but grievous words stir up anger" (Prov. 15:1). We are instructed to "...let our conversation be without covetousness; and be content with such things as ye have:..." (Heb. 13:5) and that "...godliness with contentment is great gain" (I Tim. 6:6).

Many passages in the scripture reinforce these concepts. When Elijah felt so alone and was seeking God, he was instructed to "...Go forth, and stand upon the mount before the Lord. And, behold, the Lord passed by and a great and strong wind rent the mountains, and brake in pieces the rocks before the Lord; but the Lord was not in the wind: and after the wind an earthquake; but the Lord was not in the earthquake: And after the earthquake a fire; but the Lord was not in the fire: and after the fire a still small voice" (I Kings 19:11-

When Elijah listened to this "still small voice", he was able to receive instruction from the Lord and was somewhat comforted to learn that there were yet seven thousand in Israel that had not bowed to Baal nor had kissed him. A similar message was given by Zechariah when he was exhorting the people about their sinful condition and their indifference toward God. They would not find contentment from their efforts "... Not by might, not by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord of hosts" (Zech. 4:6). Likewise, Solomon also understood the value of quietness and caution in speech. "He that hath knowledge spareth his words: and a man of understanding is of an excellent spirit. Even a fool, when he holdeth his peace is counted wise: and he that shutteth his lips is esteemed a man of understanding" (Prov. 17:27-28). Often Jesus sought a place of solitude for himself and for His disciples when they felt the need to draw closer to God. Immediately after His baptism "...Jesus was led up of the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted of the devil. And when he had fasted forty days and forty nights, he was afterward an hungered" (Mt. 4:1-2). Following this intense time of drawing closer to God, Jesus was severely tempted by Satan. The time that He had spent in quiet, fervent prayer may have left Him somewhat physically weakened but His faith was strong. He was able to face all the temptations that Satan could bring and to resist them by using the Word of God as His defense. Although the Scripture does not address this point specifically, we are left to ponder what would have been the result of those temptations if Jesus would have spent the previous forty days and nights in the midst of a loud and riotous atmosphere. Would He have been prepared to answer Satan with God's Word or would He have been defense-

Not only did Christ provide the example, but He also taught His apostles the value of solitude. When they were

less and, therefore, vulnerable?

in great distress following the death of John the Baptist, He said to them "...Come ye yourselves apart into a desert place, and rest awhile: for there were many coming and going, and they had no leisure so much as to eat" (Mark 6:31).

The gentleness of Jesus Christ and the effectiveness of His speech serve as models for us today. Although there were a few cases where Jesus spoke loudly, it was only done in unusual situations and in a very controlled atmosphere. He rarely wasted words and taught us to do the same. In teaching His followers to pray He said "But when ye pray, use not vain repetition, as the heathen do: for they think that they shall be heard for their much speaking" (Mt. 6:7).

Time alone with God is valuable time. We need to shut out the interference and distractions of the world so we can concentrate on our prayers. "But thou, when thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret: and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly" (Mt. 6:6). The distractions of the world can be so disruptive that if they are not eliminated, our minds can be drawn away from God and our prayers seem so ineffective.

Happiness, peace and contentment are available to the children of God. We can achieve these goals by separating ourselves from the world and drawing closer to God. Separation from the world requires a conscious effort. It will not happen if we do not make it a high priority in our lives. Often our work and other activities can result in much contact and too much involvement with the world. This gives Satan ample opportunity to deceive us. By setting aside some time each day to be alone in the quietness of God's presence and by consciously separating ourselves from the confusion of the world, we can "Be still, and know that I am God" (Ps. 46:10).

#### **Opportunities to Serve in Haiti**

Apostolic Christian Water Aid

WA started in 1985 by a group of brothers from Bluffton, Indiana, who became aware of the need for good drinking water in Haiti. One of the brothers read in a well drilling journal that some of the Haitian Christians were praying for help in getting clear water to drink.

This weighed heavy on their hearts. After investigating possibilities and water records in Haiti, which were not much, they purchased a small trailer mounted rotary rig to send to them.

With our system of World Relief approved projects, it is necessary that we work with groups we can trust and in whom we have confidence. In this case, Tom LePage, a missionary in Haiti, took an interest and saw the need for wells. With his help, the Haitian drillers were trained along with our Apostolic Christian work teams.

#### Beginnings of AWA

After some delay they began their work in the village of Simon. It was completed in two weeks, and the people were delighted. This well is still operable today.

In 1992, the Bluffton brothers asked the Tremont brothers to take over the water project as they had a burden to help with a trade school in Port-A-Piment. This school is taught by German missionaries who come for two to three years at a time. They do an excellent job. Our brothers help with goods and tools.

Francesville, Remington, Wolcott (FRW) In 1992, the FRW brothers started making the hand pumps that Bluffton had been building. This was a good project, and by taking part in the work teams and visiting Haiti,



they started a trade school at Petit-Trou de Nippes. The people of this community needed a program to train their young people so they would live there rather than going to the larger cities. The community is very poor, and

our local churches cooperated to give them the necessary tools and expertise to start the program. It is difficult for the students to even pay their tuition to attend school. We are subsidizing the teacher pay at this time. They have 59 students in this first class which opened in the fall of 1996. They teach welding, carpentry, masonry, and tailoring.

#### Work team schedules

The Tremont brothers (AWA-T) usually have three work teams going to Haiti in December, January, and February of each year. The teams spend one week with the drillers, supplying parts, helping with maintenance, and doing general repairs.

#### Haitian efforts affect outcome

Regardless of how much help and support is brought into a country, the success of the project is largely determined by the manner in which the local group accepts and applies themselves to these efforts. This is true not only in foreign lands, but also in the local assistance given right here at home. The Haitian drillers are quite capable and show good skills in operating the rigs. Since they speak Creole, the local language, sometimes communications can become a problem. However, by speaking slowly, and drawing pictures, we can work with them without an interpreter. In 1993, we sent a heavy duty hammer-type rig which works well in the rocky soil of Haiti. However, it too needs maintenance and repairs.

#### God's blessings are felt

We feel the Lord has blessed these projects. The local doctors tell us that where there is clean drinking water, the parasite problems diminish. Ordinarily, the nationals drink from the rivers and streams where livestock are present creating all kinds of pollution.

AWA projects are funded from the national World Relief Committee. We appreciate your support.

#### **Evaluation team visits**

On October 20th, four brothers left for Haiti on behalf of the Caribbean Board to evaluate the projects supported by Apostolic Christian World Relief. All were reminded again of how the land has been devastated economically and politically. The Word says that the poor will be with us always. At home we can choose to ignore this, but not in Haiti.

#### New project supplies pure water

After leaving Port au Prince, the first stop was the projects at Palm Grove Mission. Going anywhere in Haiti means enduring punishing roads. You soon learn that they are a

fact of life and are thankful for safety and no break downs. Seeing the work at Palm Grove, one is reminded of the accounts in the Bible of the loaves and fishes. They were small and insignificant, but when Christ blessed them, they were multiplied. The work may seem small but God has chosen to multiply it and to bless many.

A new project in the Palm Grove area was especially impressive. Upon visiting a community in need of water, a decision was made to work together. A well was drilled and they agreed to dig a 2 mile trench to lay pipe in to bring the water for them. 300 people showed up for the work to dig through the rocky soil. Most of the trench was completed and the reservoir was being dug. Men and women worked together because of the common need. It reminded us of a group of people from our home church working, except there were no breaks for lunch. Most of them would be fortunate if they had breakfast and could only hope for an evening meal. We also visited some of the schools in the area.

Work projects at Cayes

In 1992, brothers from Bluffton started a trade school at Cayes. This school is funded by World Relief. Tuesday and Wednesday were spent in the Cayes area with the MEBSH organization. There are many parts of this work



which are inspiring. World Relief has supported several of them and we were moved to see how God has taken the gifts which have been sent and blessed them for the people. The well drilling has been a very active project and is going

very well. It is especially encouraging that there are Haitian teams who are well trained to drill on their own. In a land with inadequate water and disease from contaminated water, having the ability to drill good wells is a special blessing. There are many schools in the area which we have helped construct and medical clinics we have supported.

We took time to visit Asile Dorcas, a nursing home run by the organization. Although short on time, our group made a brief visit. They were so pleased to have visitors which proved we needed to take the time. True charity is to visit the fatherless and motherless, the poor and the needy, and we thought we didn't have time. It was God's time, and a blessing resulted from it.

A work of hope

A stop was made at one of the vocational schools. They are truly a work of hope. The people must find a way to make a living and they know the best way is by receiving training in a trade. These are very practical schools and

appear to be well run. The students seem motivated and eager to learn. They know that it is a privilege to be able to attend and they do not take it lightly. Our schools of higher learning could be improved if they had the same emphasis on God that we observed in Haiti. Their students felt it was a gift from God to be able to attend instead of something they are entitled to.

Medical care is important

On Thursday, the area visited was the beautiful area of Hospital Lumiere at Bon Finn. It is up the mountain and rainfall is more abundant. We had each been there before and it was just as beautiful as we remembered. It is difficult to staff, and the needs of the people are very great. They are able to give quality medical care with few resources. We were reminded again how much they appreciate the supplies we are able to send. The people they serve are often not able to pay for services, and their resources are very limited. They are truly not for profit and depend on charity to operate.

Grace Children's Hospital

Friday's schedule took us to Port au Prince to visit Grace Children's Hospital and the work of International Child Care. They are also deeply appreciative of the supplies and equipment we are able to send. They reach hundreds of the poorest of the poor in the community. We also visited the King's Clinic and King's Hospital.

#### Godliness with contentment is great gain

Each visit to Haiti teaches new lessons and makes a deep impression. One is reminded again of how much we have

and the heavy responsibility of answering to God for how we have used it for His good. Haiti is just one of the ways we have an opportunity to be good stewards of what we have been given. We are also reminded that we love our material things too much and need to examine our lives. We see that it is possible to be content with little and we need to examine ourselves to see if our faith in God is strong enough that we would be able to be content without the abundance we have.

Above all, the message is clear that the gift of eternal life is extended to all mankind. Because of His

love, men and women across

the world are answering that call. We are grateful to God that He has given us a church through which we can serve Him and be obedient to Him.

one, we need to have some zeal in our life. We need to have some interest in our life. You know, a lot of times, we hear the saying, "If you don't succeed, try, and try again." It is an old saying that we used to hear many times.

It is a little bit like Zacchaeus. He was short. He could not accomplish, because of his height, what he wanted to accomplish. He wanted to see the Lord, and he couldn't see because he was short. At that point, he had an option in his life. He could decide that it really wasn't worth the effort to see the Lord or he could use his imagination and find a way to see the Lord.

Perhaps there are times in our lives when we face a similar situation. Perhaps we have a concern that we bring to the Lord and want an answer. Maybe the first time, we do not seem to get an answer.

Then, we are presented with an option. We can stop there and assume that the Lord didn't hear or didn't care or it was too small for Him to address. Or, we can try again. We can try a little harder and a little more diligently.

It took Zacchaeus a little more effort to go up in that tree. But it was an effort, in his mind, that he felt was worthwhile. Indeed, as we read the account, it was worthwhile!

Jesus came to the place where Zacchaeus was and He noticed that effort. He didn't just make a note of that or make an account of it to those around him, but we know Jesus knew what Zacchaeus had done. He told Zacchaeus to come down and He acknowledged him and wanted to go to his house.

That probably surprised Zacchaeus and it probably surprised those around him just as much. Those around him knew that Zacchaeus perhaps wasn't the kind of man that he should have been.

Now Jesus, the One whom they respected and revered, was going to

go to this man's house. He was going to be a guest of a man that was a sinner. I don't know what those people thought they were, but it seems that they were quick to acknowledge that Zacchaeus was a sinner.

Then we have another beautiful teaching in this short story. Zacchaeus, all of a sudden, realized some of the things that he had done in his life were not right. He realized that there must be some undoing and some making right of those things.

Again, he was probably faced with a decision and an option. He could decide that it really didn't apply to him, or he could have chosen not to even say anything and just go along with Christ when He was at his house to whatever He said.

But Zacchaeus came under conviction for some of the things that he had done. He wasn't asked by the Lord, but he willingly offered recompense for some of the things that could have been a problem in his life

Jesus appreciated that so much and this came from Zacchaeus willingly. Without giving him an ultimatum, telling him that he had to do this or else, this came from the heart of Zacchaeus. He would give half of his goods to the poor, and if he had been dishonest, he would restore that.

Jesus said, "This day is salvation come to this house." (Luke 19:9). A beautiful end to a beautiful account of a man that was no different than many of us. He was a man that at one time was not right with God and came seeking help. He acknowledged his sin and wanted to make it right. Jesus simply said, "Salvation is come to this house today!"

Many times we have to go back to that time in our lives when we followed a similar path. We came and acknowledged that something wasn't right. We wanted to see the Lord. Maybe we wanted to see the Lord for a number of times, but there was a time in our lives when many of us were determined at all cost to see the Lord.

We were not going to let little things get in our way. We became very determined, even as Zacchaeus did. Then, we put forth that effort, we showed our determination, and that allowed our faith to grow and perhaps show a little, and salvation came to our house. It was a wonderful day!

Then we have a beautiful account here. "For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which is lost." (Luke 19:10). Jesus didn't come only to try to save the house of Israel. He certainly tried to clear them up in a lot of their thinking. He tried to, with authority, cause them to think in a right way.

He came and He reached out to everyone. He didn't come as a king and He didn't live as a king. He was never too much or too good for anyone. Even as a number of times we have read how He would reach out to those who had needs—those that He felt had a real need in their life for Him. That is where the Lord could really work.

That is when He worked in our lives—when we acknowledged that need. The need was always there, but we did not always acknowledge it.

We read together of another parable that He spoke about here—the parable of the pounds. We have several similar accounts in the Word of God that tells us a little bit about the message He is trying to bring out when He speaks of these accounts.

It says here that a nobleman "...called his ten servants, and delivered them ten pounds, and said unto them, Occupy till I come." (Luke 19:13). Then he went away. He distributed to each the same.

In other accounts, as the account of the talents was a very similar parable, to some he gave more than others. The end result of both parables is very similar.

Whether we are given much or whether we are given little is not the important thing. We read this account here, that when the nobleman came from his journey to visit those whom he had given his pounds or his money to, there was quite a difference in how they used those pounds.

He told them when he left, to "occupy". Perhaps that was a word that meant different things to different people because some occupied very well. They took and used what they had been given, and gained some on it and got some return on it.

It is always refreshing to note that Jesus didn't really take into account just how much each one had brought. He didn't say that the one who had gained ten pounds from the one pound was any different or any better, more or less, than the one who had gained five.

In this particular account, He tells them that they had a little different authority over the cities, whatever that might mean. But the real teaching comes when he came to the servant that only brought the one pound that he had been given.

He said, "Lord, behold, here is thy pound, which I have kept laid up in a napkin: For I feared thee, because thou art an austere man: thou takest up that thou layest not down, and reapest that thou didst not sow." (Luke 19:20-21).

I guess sometimes when I read that account, in my own weak way of thinking, I say, "What is so wrong with that? What is so wrong with at least preserving the one that we had—saving it, keeping it wrapped up and clean and being able to at least produce it when the Lord would ask?"

But I think we have to look at the whole story, or the whole account here. I think we have to put our lives into play here and see where we fit.

It appeared that the one who brought one pound simply was afraid to put forth any effort.

I believe that if he would have taken that one pound and if he would have put forth a very whole-hearted, diligent effort, by the end of the term that he had, he some-how, by circumstances, he would have ended up with only a half of pound. I believe he would have had a better standing with the Lord than what he did. He lacked effort. He lacked diligence. He lacked the ability to try.

We all started out somewhere in life with a number of pounds. Whether many or few, no one is keeping track, I don't believe. No one really cares what another person has as far as what they have been given in pounds or talents. A lot of times we read into the account of the talents as abilities. It could very well be abilities. It seems to make a lot of sense.

The Lord doesn't want us to stay as babes all our converted life. There is a time when we will only have one talent or one pound. When we begin in our walk with the Lord, most of us probably wondered if we even had one pound or if we had a talent.

There is going to come a time when the Lord is going to ask us to give an account of just what we have done with what He has given us. If we go back to what He has given us, most of us are pretty appreciative of what we have been given.

But there was a time in our life, when we felt pretty unworthy. It seems that we were given so much. Then certainly the Lord is not out of place in asking that we do something with what we have been given, and that we bring some return on what we have been given.

He does not require that our one pound brings ten or that it might bring five. But I believe He does require that we prove our love to Him, that we show that we do love and appreciate Him and His sacrifice that was made in our behalf. We are not worthy.

We can go back to that many times throughout our lives. All that we have is out of the goodness of the heart of God. Not in any way could we ever be worthy. All that we can do in our life is just our reasonable service, and that is always humbling.

We don't really accomplish much in the eyes of God. When we have done our very best and come to the end of our life, we have accomplished only what was required of us, nothing more. The Lord may require from some of us more than others. He may require something of you that He would not require of me.

So we want to avoid looking at other people's lives. Rather, we want to look at what the Lord would have us to do. We want to be careful that we do the very best and the very most that we can. When we get done with this life, all that we can bring the Lord is just a little over a pound so we can prove we did everything that we could do.

If we had some unfortunate situations and circumstances, I don't think that we are going to be in danger of judgment. Maybe I read that wrong.

This was a horrible judgment that this one man had to face. They took away even that which he had. In other places, we read that he was cast out into outer darkness. But it causes us to realize that life is serious. Our walk here is one that we need to be very careful in.

Certainly, we want to do all that we can for the Lord that at His coming, we might be found worthy and acceptable and even welcomed into that reward that is prepared for us.

#### An Analogy from the Corn Plant

We are like the plant of corn in so many ways as it grows "...for dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return" (Genesis 3:19). First just a young sprout emerges out of the soil and is so fragile to the elements of the weather. Storms press hard upon the young tender plant and the rains from above as well as the sun give forth the nourishment to grow. The young tender plant becomes a stalk, which can grow straight and true. As in our hearts, there comes a time when the ear shoots forth and that which makes the increase in our soul is ready to be pollinated by the small still voice of God's Spirit and Word. As we grow older, the "ear" or our soul grows and matures while the stalk or our body gets weaker. Finally, at the end of our days the stalk gets dry and dries up, however the ear gets more and more beautiful. It is in the ear that we find value. The stalk is nothing after it serves it's purpose and is cast to the ground from whence it came. The ear, on the other hand, is harvested and stored until it is used for it's intended purpose. Maybe God will use of our increase, one kernel, to bring forth another plant to His Glory and Honor.

Let us consider this ear, our soul, and see how the corn plant can teach us a lesson. When the plant is going through the conversion process and is producing an ear of value that will last, many things can happen. First, if the plant was not well rooted or grounded, the stalk (our physical body) may grow crooked and be very difficult to be pollinated (receive God's Word). Second, if the tender stalk would not receive the needed nourishment. (God's teaching from parents and Church), we would not expect a very healthy plant and thus it would be likely that the ear (our soul) would lack quantity and quality. Third, if there would not be exposure to the rain and sun (Word from God), we could expect no ear at all. How will it be when we are harvested? After the husks of life are pulled away, will the soul that we are, bring forth an hundred fold just like some beautiful ears of corn that are filled to the tip? On the other hand, it is possible that when we are exposed to the Harvester's (God's) hand, we will be an under-pollinated, crippled ear with little or no increase. We, as God's children, do have control of the increase we as a soul bring forth and we thank God that we have the Word (King James Bible) to teach us how to bring forth that increase.

#### Thanksgiving in our Heart

Even though Thanksgiving is past for this year, we still want to thank God in all things. The word says, "Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ; submitting yourselves one to another

in the fear of God." Ephesians 5:20,21

How do we thank God? Do we only thank God in prayer? When do we thank God? Can we thank God in all things? Let us address the last question first because it is the most difficult to answer.

There are two stories that need to be shared at this point on this written page. The first is about a Kansas family.

On a peculiar day in July, many years ago, a young family stood outside their home, which was about a mile from the lush wheat fields. watching the skies getting dark with thunder clouds. The father of four children, stood with his arm around his son, who was now old enough to help plant and tend the crops, while he held his little daughter in his other arm. The other two children could sense that there was trouble coming as they gazed first at the dark clouds and then at the worried expressions on the father and mother's faces. The heavy storm clouds predicted earlier in the morning were surely on their way.

"Children," said the father, "I believe it is time we go to the house." One of the little children began crying as they ran for the protection of the house. Once inside, father said, "Children, God has taught us in the Bible that he will let nothing come over us that we can not bear and what ever happens in the next few hours, we can rest assured that God will take care of us."

The storm broke with a fury and

hail came down in such abundance that it drifted against the barn and machine shed. In some places it was a foot deep. "Oh," cried the mother, "our crops are all gone." Tears streamed from her eyes as she wept over the storm, which was past as soon as it had come upon them. The children were scared and crying when father said, "Now children, stop your crying, for the Lord has taught us to be thankful in all things. That means good and bad alike." He got down on his knees and thanked God for the ice, he thanked God for their protection and safety and he thanked God there on the kitchen floor for his wonderful family. After that prayer everyone felt much comfort. One of the little children looked up at her father and said, "Are you really thankful for the hail?" Father looked down with a wide grin and replied, "Sure my love, let us go gather some up and make ice cream."

After they finished gathering up the ice and the ice cream was made. they again sat down at the table and prayed, thanking God for the many blessings they had so bountifully received. There never was such sweet ice cream and even mother, for just a moment, had forgotten about the devastation outside. She glanced at the sweet corn in the garden as they had been gathering up the ice and was pummeled into quiet depression as she seen nothing left but foot high stubs. Inwardly she sobbed, but did not want to spoil the children's anticipation of the ice cream treat. In her heart she wished for the strength of her husband, however she just could not find the peace that he seemed to have. (Beloved, it is that way at times. Wives are sometimes strong and sometimes it is the father who is strong. Whatever the case, at such times we must pull from the strength of the other rather than becoming bitter at each other because one seems to have more peace about a particular trial.)

When all had finished with the ice cream treat and the children had gone off to play, father beckoned to his wife and said, "Come, let us go to the wheat fields and see the damage." As they traveled about three quarters of a mile down the gravel road, a miracle seemed to be materializing before their eves. The tall grass in the ditch, which had been crushed by the icy hail, was beginning to grow before their eyes. On second glance, they could see that the hail had not dropped here and their wheat fields were safe. A little tousled by the wind but safe. Tears streamed down their eyes as they again looked to heaven with thanksgiving in their hearts. It was a thankful household that laid their head upon their pillows that night.

#### **A Midwest Storm**

Sometimes the ending is not as good and we struggle, even though we shouldn't, with the reasons why. At another time in another place a family watched the storm clouds form as silent lightning betrayed the fact that a horrible storm was coming. The family took shelter in the basement and huddled together as they could feel the pressure change from the tornado that was predicted to head their way. In this case it was not the father that

prayed aloud for his children, but rather the little 8 year old son. "God, save us," came the quivering little prayer from his youthful lips. There was a lot of damage to the farmstead, however the house did not lose a shingle from the roof. Forty three trees were twisted off at the roots, however the trees close to the house were spared. When the family went to bed that night, there was a prayer of thanksgiving that should have come much earlier in the evening.

#### XII - Preserving the Faith

The purpose of studying history is to learn from the past and then apply those insights for a better future so long as the Lord tarries.

To be informed about the past helps us avoid mistakes. It also allows us to glean the positives of yesteryear in order to make our spiritual pathways more steady.

The matter of commenting on the future of the church—and its preservation—is speculative. We see through a glass darkly. But vision and casting our glances forward are done with the intent of keeping the faith intact; and by looking back we can enhance our ability to look ahead.

In preserving the faith we can take heart in the scripture that says (regarding the church), "...and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." (Matthew 16:19)

The Lord Jesus also said, "...and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." (Matthew 28:20)

The Lord's words are very comforting as we ponder the church's preservation. Surely we can become energized and vigorously hopeful—and indeed positive—when we rest our forward glances on the foundation of those two promises.

And yet, we must also consider some sobering warnings from the Word. The Apostle Paul wrote, "This know, also, that in the last days perilous times shall come" (II Timothy 3:1). He also decried the condition of those "having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof" (II Timothy 3:5).

Paul further taught, regarding the end, "for that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first..." (II Thess. 2:3).

It is in such a context that the future welfare and preservation of the faith must be considered. It suggests that although perilous times will come (indeed are here), the evil of the times will not prevail against the church. In this there is a beckoning call of optimism.

The Word also teaches that "all who will live godly in Christ Jesus will suffer persecution" (II Timothy 3:12). Yet, in all of this, the Apostle Paul in commenting on the worsening conditions of evil said, "But continue thou in the things which thou hast learned and hast been assured of, knowing of whom thou hast learned them." (II Timothy 3:12,14).

In the future, the church will prosper if our collective attitude of reverential fear of God remains intact—and is enshrouded with humility. The prophet Isaiah described the heart that God fa-



vors: "...even to him that is poor and of a contrite spirit and who trembleth at my word" (Isaiah 66:2). Lowliness of mind should never be absent in the church!

We live in perplexing times, and often can become almost overwhelmed by the evil around us. We can become discouraged and sorrowful in witnessing the nation's moral decline. We must, however, keep our perspectives (and concerns) in a proper context. History provides a context.

Christian pilgrims of ages past faced far greater evils and many stayed true to God. In the early church, believers were thrown to the lions. They met in the catacombs. Yet, they held fast to their faith.

History further informs us of the brutality of "Christian" wars, the Inquisition, the Crusades, and the suffering of the Anabaptists (who endured burnings, beheadings, drownings, and having their tongues ripped out).

Today, we have it far easier; and our

beliefs are protected by the nation's constitution. Freedom of conscience renders this era as the golden age of the church. Our resources, both secular and spiritual, have never been greater. The fields are white unto harvest. We should seize on our plentiful resources and maximize our efforts for the glorious cause of Christ.

In the future, we should promote the gospel without compromise. Nonconformity to the world and separation from sin should continue to be upheld. We should beseech God for zeal to draw souls to the truth, and do so without compromising our high standards of sanctification.

For the welfare of our beloved faith, we should not lose sight of our historical context. And yet, as the generations come and go, an awareness of the zeal of our founding forefathers tends to grow dimmer and dimmer.

Let us re-acquaint ourselves with the God-given fervor of Bro. Samuel H. Froehlich and his early associates who, in fleeing religious falsehoods, set out to sincerely re-establish a church based on the Word. They went out and preached an uncompromising, undiluted message and a religious awakening occurred. In 35 years, 110 congregations were formed—or, an average of a new church every four months for 35 years. A historian from Bluffton College (Ohio) said, "The Froehlich movement was like the time of the apostles." That is our legacy!

To preserve the faith, let us remember an important scripture: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye stedfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord." (I Cor. 15:58)

To preserve the future, we must preserve the past.
