"GOD LIGHTS OUR PATHWAY"

Sermon by Bro. John L. Steiner, Oakville, IA Ezekiel 28 and Acts 4

We could go on and on as this is a continuous story that is contained in the Acts of the Apostles, loved ones. As we read the Word of God, as we did in this morning hour, we have the privilege of again being reminded of the power of God that is able to work among the children of men.

We see the success of the Word of God as it went forth. We read that there were upwards of five thousand who responded to the message of salvation. We would say, "What is happening today? Why is it not that we have that response in our time?"

But we only need to read further in the book of the Acts and see that Satan was not going to let this success continue unhindered. We can see how, then, there were disputations, struggles and there were many trials that the believers had to endure. They were then dispersed and even the apostles themselves had to go from place to place struggling against the enemies of the Word of God.

Loved ones, as we consider this work of salvation and the fact that we do have an enemy of our soul who is seeking to hinder the work even in our individual lives, let us take courage from the faith of the early apostles who by the power of God were able to endure the onslaughts of Satan.

This apostle Peter, as often as we consider his life and think upon his experiences, walking with Jesus, being with Him in the very beginning, called to be one of the early disciples, and how he was so determined to walk in the ways of the Lord. Yet he was not able, in the early days, to be successful because he was not yet converted. Yet he had that determi-

nation. God permitted him to go through struggles and trials to fit him for this work and for this labor, even in that time when he denied the Lord three times. How distressful that must have been for his soul, and how refining was the fire that prepared him for the work that was ahead.

So it is in our individual lives, dear ones, after we have been converted and regenerated by the power of the blood of Jesus Christ, the Lord permits us as individuals to go through refining fire. We are told in the Scriptures, even in the beginning, not only would we be baptized with water but also with fire.

When trials come into our lives, if we are willing and submissive and permit it to have it's good work, He can bring us through to the extent that we might be able to meet the adversary and find victory, ever having the goal before us of heaven and life eternal.

We look forward to the time when we shall join there with the Lord Jesus Christ, and be among those who have been the victors after having gone through the strife.

Peter, in response to the elders and the rulers of the people, after they had healed the man who was impotent, they were being confronted by these powers of the time as to how they had the authority to do such things.

Loved ones, that power to heal that impotent man is perhaps not the very same type of thing that we see today among us.

But in the spiritual vineyard and the labor that the Lord sends forth, the call unto souls unto repentance and conversion, we see the healing power that comes into the lives of souls who find themselves in need.

This is the message that is the self same message that comes. He said "Be it known unto you all, and to all the people of Israel, that by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead, even by him doth this man stand here before you whole." (Acts 4:10). That is the same power that becomes evident among us when souls are called and drawn unto repentance.

This power unto conversion is yet working among us today and thanks be to God that we can yet proclaim this message to one and all and be reminded of the power that has been experienced in our lives in times past and to be reminded of the change that has occurred in our lives.

As we walk upon the way, as we day by day tread the path of life and as we have been upon the way for a number of years, we can sometimes become a little complacent and somewhat forgetful of that change that came about in our lives, that

The Possibility of Falling From Grace

A very deceptive and dangerous doctrine that is supported by many professing Christians is the concept that is referred to as eternal security or once saved always saved.

These terms refer to a spiritual guarantee that once we have "accepted the Lord Jesus Christ" as our personal Saviour, then we are secure for all of eternity, regardless of lifestyle. For a converted person, one whose life has been completely changed, there is, of course, a wonderful feeling of security as we think about eternity. That feeling of security in Jesus Christ will remain with us as long as we walk with the Lord and do His will. In that sense, we can find "eternal security" in our salvation.

However, it is very important that as children of God we recognize that we can walk away from our salvation. If we allow ourselves to go places or engage in activities that expose us to danger, we are tempting God and giving Satan an opportunity to cause spiritual shipwreck. These unwholesome activities can weaken our resistance and may cause us to fall.

Numerous passages of scripture state clearly that it is possible for a child of God to return to sin. "Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils;" (I Tim. 4:1). "Take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee" (I Tim. 4:16).

Paul was instructing Timothy to be watchful of the false doctrine he would encounter that could deceive him and cause him to be careless. Several words in these passages are especially important - "depart" and "continue". Clearly we cannot depart from something we never had, nor can we "continue" something we have not begun. Therefore, we are sure that Paul was speaking to Timothy about converted people.

In the last days, there will be believers who will be convinced to turn away from Christ and return to sin. There will also be those who grow impatient for Christ's return. They will be deceived and will try

to convince others that the promises God made about Christ's return to claim his bride, the Church, are false. "...there shall come in the last days scoffers, walking after their own lusts, and saying, where is the promise of his coming? for since the fathers fell asleep, all things continue as they were from the beginning of the creation" (II Pet. 3:3-4). We must patiently continue to "hold that fast which thou hast, that no man take thy crown" (Rev. 3:11).

In the Book of Revelation, John wrote about those who at one time had placed the Lord first in their lives but had allowed themselves to grow careless and were very much in danger of losing their place in God's favor. "Nevertheless I have somewhat against thee, because thou hast left thy first love. Remember therefore from whence thou art fallen, and repent, and do the first works, or else I will come unto thee quickly, and remove thy candlestick out of his place..." (Rev. 2:4-5).

We take great comfort in the promise that "He that overcometh, the same shall be clothed in white raiment; and I will not blot out his name out of the book of life,..." (Rev. 3:5). This would certainly indicate that the faithful, the overcomers, will retain their place in the Book of Life. The importance of this is emphasized when John wrote "...and another book was opened, which is the book of life, and the dead were judged out of those things which were written in the books,..." (Rev. 20:12).

Jesus explained to His disciples of the dangers and deceit that His followers would face before the end times. There will be false teachers and much sin in the world. "And many false prophets shall rise, and shall deceive many. And because iniquity shall abound, the love of many shall wax cold" (Matt. 24:11-12). The only way for love to wax cold is for it to exist. Again, clearly Christ was speaking of those who once loved the Lord but allowed sin to intervene and their love for Christ grew cold.

Jesus Christ did not leave His disciples without hope. He promised them "But he that shall endure to the end, the same

shall be saved" (Matt. 24:13). This beautiful promise would not have been needed unless there was a danger of falling away.

Not only do we need to be careful that we are not deceived by others, we must be careful that self-confidence does not cause us to grow careless. "Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall" (I Cor. 10:12). We must also remain dependent upon the Lord to keep us safe and in His love. "How excellent is thy lovingkindness, O God! Therefore the children of men put their trust under the shadow of thy wings" (Ps. 36:7).

In addition to the danger of putting trust in ourselves and losing our salvation, we must also not put our trust in riches. "...an heart they have exercised with covetous practices; cursed children:...following the way of Balaam the son of Bosor, who loved the wages of unrighteousness" (II Pet. 2:14-15).

Numerous other scripture passages could be cited that help us understand the false doctrine of once saved, always saved. Time and space do not permit a complete list but a few more are simply listed without comment. "And Jesus said unto him, No man, having put his hand to the plow, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God" (Luke 9:62). "But now, after ve have known God, or rather are known of God, how turn ye again to the weak and beggarly elements, whereunto ve desire again to be in bondage" (Ga. 4:9). "But it is happened unto them according to the true proverb, the dog is turned to his own vomit again; and the sow that was washed to her wallowing in the mire" (II Pet. 2:22).

In spite of the seriousness and frequency of the warning in the Holy Scriptures that those who have become followers of Christ would return to sin and lose their salvation, there is no need for a child of God to despair. To each of the seven churches that are addressed in Revelation, a promise of a secure eternity was made to those that overcome and remain faithful. That promise is still in effect for us today.

A New Church Develops South of the Border

Mexico, our southern neighbor

exico, the northernmost country of Latin America, lies adjacent to the United States, separated by the Rio Grande river along about two-thirds of its border. In the western hemisphere, only the United States and Brazil have larger populations.

Mexico City is not only in confidence of the post of the property of the post of the post

Mexico, one must look at its long history. Native

Indians had a sophisticated society in place many centuries ago. They built cities, developed a calendar, and had a written language. In 1512, the Aztec empire fell to the Spanish Conquistadors, remaining a colony of Spain for 300 years.

The Spaniards took away the wealth, leaving the Indians to degenerate into poverty with little hope of advancement. However, they did introduce many changes in farming, government, industry, and education.

During the Spanish colonial period, a mixed race of people developed with both Indian and Spanish ancestors. Known as mestizos, this group makes up the largest segment of the population today. Immigration has also brought in many other world cultures, including non-Spanish Europeans, Arabs, and Asians.

Present religious practices and living conditions

Over 90 percent of the Mexican people belong to the Roman Catholic church. This religion was introduced by the Spanish conquerors, but became mingled with tribal customs, traditions, and worship of nature. Superstitions also abound. Many poor people are deeply affected by these factors.

About two-thirds of the people live in cities, many of them in appalling conditions. While the rich enjoy their homes with all modern conveniences, the poor live in slums with few if any possessions. They struggle daily just to exist. The country has a wide range of landscapes, and people learn to live using the basic

available.

The Town of Ixtlan

With a population of

about 5400, Ixtlan lies about 75 miles south of Guadalajara. The roads are not up to our standards and it takes about two hours to travel that distance. It lies in a fertile valley whose soil produces corn, alfalfa, vegetables, etc. Dairy cows and goats roam the area which has few fences. Although electricity and other utilities are available, many cannot afford these services. Life is often hard for their large families.

Involvement of the Apostolic Christian Church (Nazarene)

Sometime about 100 years ago, a rift developed in the American Church, which resulted in a separation. The other church resulting from that division is named "Apostolic Christian Church (Nazarene)". Although

we who are active today had no part of this division, we must work with the existing situation.

The Mission Committee as well as the Elder Body feel that it is important to communicate to our brotherhood that we are trying to interact with the Nazarene church in a way which will be acceptable without causing confusion. Contact has been maintained between the two groups for many years. We all agree that it is not feasible to re-unite, but we want to keep an atmosphere where we can assist each other.

Services begin in Mexico

A number of years ago, members of the Apostolic Christian Church (Nazarene) began a mission in Mexico. They held services as often as they could, and there were some converts. Elders from their South American churches provided spiritual guidance. However, they experienced difficulties in maintaining and staffing this ministry. They did not wish to abandon the work, yet could hardly continue because of their own limitations.

Our brethren visit Mexico

Some years ago, Bro. Marshall Heinold and his wife, Sis. Jan, felt a calling to provide a boys' ranch for orphans in the impoverished areas of rural Mexico. Sis. Jan learned the Spanish language when they had Mexican exchange students living with them.

In 1989, along with Elder Bro. Wendell Gudeman and his wife plus five other brethren, they visited Mexico City and then Ixtlan. There they met representatives from the Nazarene Church and shared concerns with one another. At that time, they looked at a piece of property for a ranch, but felt the price was too high.

God's guidance continues

Through one of their exchange students, the Heinolds became aware of a possibility for a ranch in the state of Puebla. They made a thorough investigation of the feasibility of this project. However, the Mission Committee did not see an open way to pursue it.

A building is constructed

About the same time the Nazarene Church, with the assistance of some of our brethren, erected a small church building in Ixtlan in ten days. This is a very basic structure 30' x 26'. Services are held in a room about 30' x 14' with a kitchen at one end. The balance, 30' x 12' contains two bedrooms with a bathroom between them. It is very cramped at this time.

A spiritual beginning

After the building was up, the Nazarene Church still found themselves unable to maintain services. They made an appeal that we would consider sending someone there to assume responsibility for the entire project. The Heinolds visited the area and held services on four occasions each year in 1993 and 1994.

Late in 1994, approval was given by the Mission Committee as well as the Elder Body for them to move into the facility as permanent residents. While carrying on the ministry, they are also searching for a suitable location for a boys' ranch.

The Heinolds left home on January 16, 1995, with a small pickup truck full of essentials. They drove 2,195 miles in 6 days. By God's grace they arrived without incident or accident.

Regular services start

The first regular service was a Thursday evening service at 5:00 PM on January 27th. Since then, they have held services each Thursday evening as well as Sunday evenings. Service time is 5:00 PM.

The Lord blessed the work and in 1996 there were six converts. After much prayer and deliberation, the Mission Committee and the Elder

Body decided to ask the Nazarene elders to baptize these converts, and this was carried out. This decision was made because they already had two members in Ixtlan, and we needed additional time to consider our future spiritual involvement in Mexico.

We were trying to determine if the Lord was really directing us to make the commitment, as well as whether we were prepared and willing to accept the responsibility of establishing an Apostolic Christian Church in Mexico.



The current situation

In 1997, the gatherings grew, and the building became very crowded. Some Sunday School classes are being held outside. Also, there were five converts, two of which we have now baptized.

In November, 1997, Elders Roy Grimm and David Wiegand visited the Ixtlan area and evaluated the status of the entire situation. By mutual agreement of our elders and those of the Nazarene Church, the eight original believers and two recent converts were accepted into our church as members in full standing.

For many years, the leadership of both churches have agreed that in such situations each soul appears individually before the elders and the church, and is accepted as a member upon his or her testimony of faith. They must also be at peace with the members of each church. During this same visit, for the first time, a Holy Communion service was held.

A new facility

Approval was given by the Elder Body at the August 1997 Conference to build a modest church building next to the existing one. The World Relief Committee also has given approval to sponsor a work team to assist with this construction.

What does the future hold?

As we stand on the threshold of another year, none of us knows what it holds. However, the Mission Committee as well as the Elder Body stand united in our support of the Ixtlan project. Everyone is aware of the great cultural and social differences. We have exercised great caution in arriving at this point, and intend to be very cautious as the future unfolds.

As the work in Ixtlan has grown, some of our brethren have expressed a desire to visit the area. Due to the lack of accommodations there, we request that before anyone goes, they contact Bro. David Wiegand of Champaign/Urbana, IL, who is Chairman of the Mission Committee.

It is also extremely important that any of our brothers or sisters who go to Mexico for work or a visit remember that they are recognized as representatives of the Apostolic Christian Church of America. The converts in Ixtlan have been very submissive and willing to embrace the doctrine and practices of our brotherhood. We are responsible that we do nothing that will confuse or discourage these babes in Christ. Our appearance, conversation, and actions should be in accordance with the Holy Word and accepted church practices.

GATEWAY WOODS APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME Jeff Schumacher

Recently I was talking to a man who had spent some time in the hospital because of heart problems. He told me that as he lay in the hospital bed, he remembered the passage in Romans 8:28-29 that reads: "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose. For whom he did foreknow, he also did predestinate to be conformed to the image of his Son, that he might be the firstborn among many brethren." He said that these verses were comforting to him because he knew that God had His hand in this trial.

As he lay there, he prayed to the Lord asking what lesson He was trying to teach him. He told me that he felt the Holy Spirit prompting him with questions. He said the first question was, "If this was a serious heart problem, how long would you survive without your heart?" He told me that he realized how fortunate he was that it was not a serious problem, and that he could not survive very long without his heart pumping life-giving blood throughout his body. He said the next question from the Holy Spirit was even a little more strange: "Could you leave home without your heart?" The man replied, "no".

This man said that the Holy Spirit then started asking questions

in a different way: "As a Christian, how important is your spiritual heart?" Well, the answer seemed so clear to this man that it rolled right off of his tongue, "Vital, you can't live without it either." "If it is so vital," the Holy Spirit asked, "do you take care of it by exercising it and eating a healthy diet?" This man had to admit at this point that he was a little huffy because he read the Bible most every day. The reply was short and to the point, "Do you really study it?" He had to admit that this part of his life had diminished to the point that he just read and didn't really apply himself to studying.

My friend said that by this time he was very convicted. He knew that Lord was aware of his lack of Bible study and his lack of exercising his "spiritual" heart by not standing up for what he knew was right and not confessing "small" sins in his life that were well hidden to all (except God). He realized through the questions that there were days that he would "leave" his "heart" at home and try to get through the day without it.

My friend challenged me at that point, and I bring that challenge to all of us: Do we leave our "hearts" at home? Do we "forget" to use it when we are unjustly treated? He challenged me about reading and studying the Bible. He said that as he lay there in that hospital bed, he became aware of how similarly our physical heart was related to our spiritual heart and our spiritual walk.

Some other questions I have thought about since our conversation were: Do we demonstrate our "heart" when we are at work, or do we leave it at the door? Do our coworkers see that our "heart" is in "good health"? The Holy Spirit reminded this man that just as hu-



Sermon continued from page 2 entrance in of the power of the Spirit that came into our lives at the time of our conversion. We need to be reminded of it, loved ones, that it is nothing that we could have done by ourselves.

Just as we were reminded there in the prophet Ezekiel when Ezekiel was told of God to say unto the prince of Tyrus, "Thus saith the Lord GOD; Because thine heart is lifted up, and thou hast said, I am a God, I sit in the seat of God, in the midst of the seas; yet thou art a man, and not God, though thou set thine heart as the heart of God:" (Ezekiel 28:2).

They were reminded that they were just men and it was not their power that enabled them to be in their position of great honor. So it is in a different way, yet in our humble state of life, loved ones, we are walking this way and sometimes we tend to go on our own way and on our own power and abilities. We need to be reminded of who we are and that we are just men.

We need the in-dwelling of the Holy Spirit to guide us, that we of ourselves, this poor mortal vessel that we contain, has the same ability to sin and to walk in the worldly ways as we did before. We have the same capacities and faculties wherein we served Satan, but now it has been changed into a vessel to serve the Living God.

Yet we know that the apostle Paul himself said, "I have no confidence in the flesh." (See Philippians 3:3). We need to be reminded at all times of our frailty and our inability to please Him of ourselves. That is why it is so important that we understand and are reminded. I know we all know and are aware of it, but isn't it good to be reminded of our need for this power that does not come from within us?

We are living in a time when there are many theories, philosophies and ideas about the human family, who we are and what we can do with our lives. There is that false doctrine and theory, that we have the power within us that needs to be unleashed to do whatever we think we ought to be doing. Loved ones, it is obvious and important that we understand that for us to please God and to serve our Creator, we must have His in-dwelling power and guidance to lead us every day.

That is why it is so important why the apostle Peter could say here: "Be it known unto you all, and to all the people of Israel, that by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead, even by him doth this man stand here before you whole." (Acts 4:10). Can we say it this way? Even by Him, does this brother and this sister and each one of us have our being and we walk in His service and in the light of His gospel. We have been regenerated from a sinner into a saint and a servant of God.

We have been born again out of water and Spirit and it is only through Jesus Christ and Him crucified and the power of His grace that we are successful overcomers.

He said "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." (Acts 4:12). Now that is nothing new to any one of us. You have heard it from this pulpit many times. You have read this same Scripture in your own homes many times and you have heard it preached upon.

We bring to you nothing new, but as poor, frail human beings and forgetful people, we need to be reminded and rekindled in our love for the Lord Jesus for what He has done for you and for me.

This power is yet available today almost two thousand years since this miracle was done in this man.

This message of the gospel of salvation is yet available today and whosoever will may come. If there would be any among us this morning, beloved friends, pondering upon your future and thinking about what life has in store for you, or young people on the threshold of life, or if there are any among us this morning who is teetering between the choices of continuing in the life you are living or casting your lot with the Lord, we want to remind you that each one of us has an appointment with God some day soon or late.

We have seen it happen in our congregations. You have had it happen here and we have had it happen at home that young people can be snatched out of life in an instant of time. There is no continuing city offered to any one of us. So we want to encourage and remind you out of love and desire for you that you would have this living hope.

For the believer, that we might be reminded of our high calling and of the greatness of the love of God that has come into our lives.

The wonderful, unbounded privilege that you and I have, particularly in this time in which we live in this land of freedom where we have always had the opportunity to come to the house of worship, never have we come to church on Sunday morning and the doors were barred. We have been able to sit among the brethren and we have had the blessing upon our beloved household of faith.

I want to remind all of our hearts, myself included first of all, that we have had immeasurable blessings come upon us as a household of faith and a body of believers from coast to coast. We have our struggles and concerns in the Apostolic Christian church for the stability of the faith and the maintenance of the way of truth, but we have been so abundantly blessed.

As I read about the five thousand who were brought to the knowledge of the truth at that time, I had to think of a conversation I recently had with a dear brother who met in another area recently. He was a refugee after World War II and was driven out of Yugoslavia with his family.

They were German people of the Nazarene faith and came to this country in his teenage years. We visited about the land of Yugoslavia and it is amazing as I think of it.

We are such a few in number,

relatively, and there was a period of time in the early part of the century when there were between forty and seventy thousand believers in the land of Yugoslavia. I am not sure, but well over one hundred churches, or more. He was aware that there was a church perhaps in almost every village. It's almost unimaginable in our country of America that there was that type of expansion of the Word of God in such a land.

Here in central Illinois you have it almost that way where there is a church in a lot of the towns, but it doesn't go very far. But in that little country, there was almost in every town at least a small gathering of believers.

As I thought about this number of five thousand, they became quite concerned. The leaders became quite concerned as to where this would lead. What happened in the land of Yugoslavia was that the believers there, of course, were those who would not take arms or who would not be of any value to the armed forces of the land. The leaders became concerned and an oppression began.

You know the story how so many had to either leave or experienced great suffering, even death. In World War II there was a terrible amount of suffering that came upon those believers, and now the numbers are so small and so few, relatively.

We see how Satan cannot stand the success of the Word of God. He cannot abide this motivation that comes into the lives of believers who respond to the call of salvation. Does that explain to you and I, loved ones, why we have a struggle in our spiritual life?

Does that explain to you why, and you all know it already, why we are fighting this fight of faith and why we are encouraged to this spiritual warfare to be overcomers? We wonder why has it been our privilege to live under such relative freedom for all of these generations? So it is that we need to stop and to count our many blessings and to also encourage one another upon the way that we would not give up in the battle and in the struggle, but that we would be courageous.

There is so much more to consider here, but I see time has slipped away and I want to leave time for another brother.



Faith of our Fathers

Faith: Now Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. Hebrews 11:1

Faith: Unquestioning belief that does not require proof or evidence. *Webster*

Faith: Unquestioning belief in God. Webster

Faith: (Amman, Chaldean) believe; to be firm, faithful. *Strong's Concordance*

We have no end to the resources that can be sought out to help us understand what we believe. There are convictions and there are opinions, which everyone has a portion meted out to them. We can be faithful in great things and we can be faithful in little things. One of the best lessons on being faithful in small things is in the scripture, He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much: Luke 16:10 Doesn't it seem to us that everything is getting so complicated? Sometimes we long for the simple faith of our fathers.

Our Fathers had a simple faith centered around the Word of God. That Word of God has been written down on everything from parchment leather to laser paper. Why, we might ask, has God inspired men to write down the Word of God and record it for future reference? So then faith cometh by the hearing, and hearing by the Word of God. Romans 10:17 It is not possible to please God except we have faith, and it is not possible to obtain faith unless we have heard or read the potential of the matter. But without faith it is impossible to please Him: for he that cometh to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him. Hebrews 11:6 We can see by these few scriptures that God has a great concern that we know what His will is and therefore has given us the written Word so we can discern the spirits from the true Spirit of God. Are we willing to be obedient to the Truth? Are we willing to live the truth? Do we want to compromise with the "modernist" who would even go so far as to say we should accept other versions of the Word of God (of which there are over 24 versions of the English language Bible today) so it would be more understandable in these modern days?

Faith cometh by hearing and how shall we hear except the Word be spoken. ...and how shall they hear without a preacher? Romans 10:14 Do we limit the definition of preacher to the formal meaning or can we see that anyone, parent, son, daughter, brother, sister or friend who speaks the Word is a preacher. In the fifteenth verse we read a very important qualification to the speaker of God's Word and that is, And how shall they preach, except they be sent? Romans 10:15 A parent is sent to bring up their children, Lord willing they are blessed with children, in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. It is our faith that we need to equip our children with the truth, so they can face the onslaughts of Satan. Sometimes it is the son or daughter who is sent to speak to parent, which it is surely sad when parents cannot lead children to the Father which art in Heaven. The important thing for us to remember is that we rely on our Heavenly Father to send us. through the movement of the Holy Ghost, verified through the Word of God.

When we consider speaking the Word, do we again limit our speech to words and syllables? What about

our everyday living style? Actions speak much louder than any words. There is an old saying that one must believe to be very detrimental to those who really live by it. It goes something like this, "Do as I say and not as I do." Can we believe that results can be obtained by simply telling someone to do something and at the same time be living a life style that is totally opposite. How can one teach his children or any others to be honest if that person in turn is cheating others out of money or time or life. Our faithfulness to God should be so strong that we would not even consider doing anything that would be a bad example to those who may be watching us.

Many of our forefathers led an agrarian life style and the only means of travel was by foot or horse and buggy, which allowed people to travel maybe up to 30 or 40 miles a day, if the going was good. Now we fly to Europe and Asia and all around the world in hours with meals being served as we fly. Today the record land speed in a vehicle is 300 times faster than a walking horse. Our forefathers were simple people because they were limited as to their knowledge of surrounding events. News increased dramatically after the printing press was invented and awareness level of the common people right along with it. Today we are rather non-chalant about satellites, airwaves communication, wire communication, fiber optics and electronic mail. We get food from the store instead of from the forest or barn lot. We spend \$300 for a suit of clothes that we wear two times a week. News is delivered in detail, live as it happens anywhere in the world with only seconds delay. Where does this all leave our faith compared to that of our fathers? Could it be that we are shifting more and more to having more faith in ourselves and our abilities? Do we more and more want to assert our opinions onto others, partly because we are lacking dependence on God and our Saviour Jesus Christ. Do we think that we are mightily endowed with knowledge because of our education and higher learning? Don't we wonder how God views the inventions of man? Some have been to our good like pasteurization of milk and penicillin, while others have been to the overall detriment of all of us. Because of these inventions and high technology, we are left with a large number of people who lack the proper faith in God to be pleasing to Him.

Today we depend upon science in so many things. Science has identified the elements and thus gives the ability to fertilize properly. Science has proven that the world is round. Science tries to prove everything with fact and proof. This is completely opposite of faith, which is belief without proof. Therefore we have a tendency to depend more and more upon our fellow man instead of God. Wisdom and knowledge are again almost opposites. "Knowledge is learned and Wisdom is earned." God given wisdom is a precious commodity that is obtained through faithful living. There is no science or proof when it comes to God. It is by faith that we can come to Him and through that faith we can believe all things in Him.

There is a war that Satan is waging against faith. Satan is waging that war and we are caught in the middle if we allow ourselves to be persuaded by the world. Along with the new technology we see new religions, and new versions of the Holy Bible that are surfacing at a record pace. Satan is encouraging



each one of us to look more and more to a watered down life style and justify unholy actions by others. We cannot be sure how many religions there are upon the face of the Earth, however we do know that Satan tempts man to believe the broad way is going to be all right, since Jehovah is a forgiving God.

Satan is waging that war and we are caught in the middle if we allow ourselves to be persuaded by the world.

We have raised a lot of questions with concern to our faith and by no means is there a simple answer to inform us why there is so much question today of things that were not questioned years ago. One can be very appreciative for the infallible Word that is written down in the King James version of the Word of God. It has been this written Word that has kept the truth at our fingertips and brought salvation to so many people.

The issues of 100 AD were centered around the persecution of those who believed in Christ and in about 1500 AD the issue at the forefront was The State Church and the faith of our fathers, which involved

repentance by faith and conviction from God. These issues made strong convictions in the heart of the believer and there was unification of mind and spirit. In 1847 AD the Apostolic Christian Church was founded and many were converted at that time through the "preaching of the potential of the matter" or in other words when the Spirit of God moved the heart of man to conviction. When the true Word was spoken or prophesied by parents, children, brothers, sisters, friends, and the Church, loved ones developed faith in Christ our Saviour and in the Power of His Blood. Our brethren grew in faith and, as brethren have so aptly recorded, spread through Germany and Switzerland, then to America and on to Japan. Many hardships faced the early Church brethren, which in turn matured their faith in God. Blessing upon blessing was bestowed upon the Brethren as faith in God seemed to remain secure. Can we who are considered the forefathers of tomorrow hold fast to the faith that God's Son will want to be present when He comes to claim His Bride?

Is the sacrifice today worth the reward of Eternity? If God's children are wrong in having their faith in Jehovah, they will have still lived the better on earth because of their faithful lifestyle and will have lost nothing. However, if the children of God are right and there does prove to be a Heaven and Hell, the unbeliever will have lived a life of turmoil and self degradation while on earth and will have lost everything in eternity.

Will Christ find faith when He comes again. ... Nevertheless when the Son of man cometh, shall He find faith on the Earth? Luke 18:8 Let us pray that He will find it in our hearts.



During the next several issues the "Remembering" column will carry excerpts from the diary of Elder Brother Henry Geistlich of Meilen, Switzerland who visited the new United States churches in 1866. Historically, this is known as the "Geistlich Diary", and gives a unique perspective concerning our early American congregations. Little is known about the life of Elder Geistlich other than his ordination in 1852, and his death in 1884. His ordination date informs us that he was a contemporary of Bro. Samuel Froehlich (who died in 1857) and was a part of the diligent zeal that existed among the brethren at that time. In reading his diary, it is evident that he was a deeply spiritual

On his arrival in America, there were 17 congregations in 6 states. The faith of our fathers had arrived here only 19 years earlier in 1847 (in upstate New York). The American venture (as viewed from Bro. Geistlich's European perspective) was still new, and he was eager to examine the quality of faith and practice that existed in this new, progressive nation. His stay in America was from May 27 to September 7.

It must be recognized that Bro. Geistlich labored with Bro. Samuel Froehlich. He had been under the strong zeal factor that existed during the early founding of the new church (in Switzerland) when brethren attempted to re-establish a church that followed the Word's instructions.

This first issue focuses on his trip across the Atlantic Ocean.

May 13 (Sunday): The weather is nice. We were required to stay in Southhampton (England) overnight. We had a good bed which cost 16 francs. In the morning we read a chapter, also prayed. After breakfast, we boarded the ship. Fear and trembling overtook me as I entered the ship, seeing the immense mass of people. It was said there were 1175 passengers aboard, with music and dancing.

May 14 (Monday): We are on the sea.

The weather is rainy and the sea is quiet, although more windy towards evening. Last night I slept well despite a considerable shaking of the ship. In the Spirit I was home with my loved ones. I turned my heart toward God and His help. It is the easiest for me when I am thinking of my dear Saviour, as no matter where we may be—on land or on water, He is close and nearby to all who call upon Him. Today we caught sight of three other ships. We traveled 134 miles.

May 15 (Tuesday): The sea was quiet in the forenoon, but strong winds came in the afternoon. Today I did not feel very good, having had to vomit, and was dizzy. I had no appetite. Today we overtook 13 sailships, the wind being against them. In our spiritual thoughts we also have winds against us. For if the power of God was not with us, our Ship of Faith would not move or get to the end of our journey. Our ship made 229 miles today.

May 16 (Wednesday). Today I did not feel well, particularly in the afternoon. Later in the day, I did feel somewhat better. I was, however, very lonesome, often moaning but there is nothing to do but wait patiently. I thought of a beloved hymn:

"I now have found the firm foundation where evermore my anchor grounds. It lay there ere the world's creation.

Where else but in my Saviour's wounds."

Today we made 226 miles.

May 17 (Thursday): Often the ship will rise high on the waves and then suddenly dive down into the deep. It is terrifying to watch the storm...the waves coming as small mountains and there is much noise when the waves beat against the ship. In this we can see God's Almighty Power. We made 227 miles today.

May 19 (Saturday): Today I asked the Captain how many passengers were on board. He said the exact number was 1125, including 202 children. Our ship was rocking so bad that it threw our food and dishes from the tables to the floor.

Our ship made 226 miles today.

May 21 (Monday): Oh, if we could only long for that Fatherland as a man longs for land. I often think of Noah, saying in my heart, "Noah's ark long drifted on the surging flood, but with eyes uplifted, trusted he in God."

May 23 (Wednesday): The weather is nice and the sea is quiet, but foggy. Today is a pleasant day. Everyone seems happy. I also was glad and thankful to the Lord.

May 24 (Thursday): One passenger who became unruly was tied by the sailors, with hands and feet, high up on a ladder. Often my heart trembles as I see what some people do to others; how they are rough and ungodly, having no fear of God. They don't know the way of peace.


May 27 (Sunday): Today we reached the last day of our trip on the vast sea. About 5 o'clock this evening we could see land off to the left. There were hundreds of ships and vessels, coming and going. I have never seen anything like it before. I feel it's my duty to thank God with all my heart that He brought us so safe across the sea and shielded us from all dangers. I suppose it will be the same when we reach that eternal shore, with the help of the Lord.

May 28 (Monday): This morning at 6:30 a doctor came on board looking to see if there was any sickness on the ship. Afterward, the ship sailed into the New York harbor to its landing place. After this the customs inspector examined our belongings. Then, the first and second class passengers were allowed to disembark.

Serenity should be one of our goals in the new year. The word serenity is not found in the Bible but one of its synonyms, tranquillity, is. The New Martinsville Church probably found it's origin during the moving of settlers down the Ohio River. Some brethren settled on the West side in Ohio and some on the East side in West Virginia. Due to hard economic times around the turn of the century, brethren moved to areas with more economic opportunity. The final termination of services in the little country church on a hill came in the late 1950's.

A dear sister wrote: "One of the saddest things in my life is that our Church has decreased in place of increasing like the Churches in other places. There is where my Mother carried me in her arms; there is where I went to Sunday School and Church all my life; there is where I found peace with my God and where my husband and I took our children every Sunday morning. To me it is the dearest spot on earth. It grieves me very much to know the door of that dear little old Church will soon be closed. I have had many happy days there. The Church used to be filled every Sunday. Those were the happy days and I will always love the little humble Church on the West Virginia hills."
