The waters are hid as with a stone, and the face of the deep is frozen.

"GOD'S WORD IS PRACTICAL"

Sermon by Bro. Robert Meyer, Bluffton North, IN Ecclesiastes 8 and Colossians 1:1-14

There is a lot of meat in what we have just read. There is a lot of things to be covered. "Paul, an apostle of Jesus Christ" not by the will of man as it says in some of the Gospels, but here it says, "by the will of God..." (Col. 1:1). When you think of God's will, it is something we all really want to know, don't we? We would like to be in God's will.

I am not certain if there is anyone in this congregation that says, "I don't care what God's will is." If that is where you are this morning, I venture to say you should take another thought at that—about whether you care what God's will is for your life. Because God's will IS for you to be saved. Not that your life might be filled with drudgery and have to, but your life might be filled with joy and abundance. He has that in mind, doesn't He?

"By the will of God," Paul is going to preach there. Imagine if we would have come to Paul, and said, "Paul, are you worthy?" We can read in Corinthians where he said, "For I am the least of the apostles..." (I Cor. 15:9). When Paul looked back over his life where he had come from, he said, "I am not even worthy to be called an apostle."

Now this morning, is that how we feel? When we feel unworthy to be in a certain place or a certain position in life, we work a little harder, don't we? We try a little more. We take another look at ourself and we say, "I want to be worthy." This morning if we are sitting here as Christians and say, "Oh, I am thankful God has me," we are in trouble!

But if we from the other perspective say, "I am the least of the brethren here. I am not even worthy to be called a brother, but only by the grace of Jesus, in whom we have redemption through His blood and forgiveness of sins, I am thankful to be a Christian this morning. I am unworthy but I am thankful and there is nothing that I can do even in comparison of what God has done for me. The hope that I have, I can't get anywhere else. The peace, the contentment, the joy, the love, I can't get anywhere else and I am grateful to be a Christian this morning." Is that how we are? Is that how we are on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday?

Once in a while it helps us to take a little look in the newspaper and see the havoc that Satan plays, the havoc that is in the world for those that don't know Jesus. They go from one thing to the next looking for contentment and cannot find it. We have very simple understanding and have come to believe that we have a home awaiting in Heaven. I am unworthy to be called a Christian, but I am thankful.

"To the saints and faithful brethren in Christ which are at Colosse: Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ." (Col. 1:2). When I think of that title, Lord Jesus Christ, we have something that is rampant over even the Christendom today that we must be careful of. Everybody wants to know the Saviour but not many want to live underneath the Lord. That comes together—the Lord and Saviour. Saviour is wonderful!

I loved to be saved, but do we want the authority of God over us? Do we want to do those little things? Do we want to love the unlovable? Do we want to maybe hold our peace when someone else is chewing us out? Do we want to be totally and utterly fair in all of our business dealings when nobody knows and nobody can see and it is just us and our books—it is just us and the deal? Or in school work for those of you in school and college, who is going to know if I "fudge" a little bit—a little bit here and a little bit there?

But our Lord says, "Be ye holy; for I am holy." (I Peter 1:16). Our Lord said, "Love thy neighbour as thyself." (Mark 12:31). Do I care enough about my neighbor that I would never even think of cheating him? Is that me? I want the advantages of being saved and the peace and the hope there is, but am I not willing to keep His commandments on a daily basis? That is something we need to think about. We can all apply it to ourselves. The minute we apply it to someone else, it loses its effect. It loses the message and it becomes judgment.

"We give thanks to God and the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, praying always for you," (Col. 1:3). Every one of these verses that we read have some wonderful teachings that we need to apply in our life. The gift of prayer. Do we give Him our best? Or do we give Him our sleepy times? Do we give Him what we have left over? All we have to do is put it in a human way.

We hear a great deal in the world today that reminds us to be careful that we do not cause an accident that brings injury to ourselves or to others. Businesses go to great lengths to try to make the workplace a safe place to be. Governments at all levels pass volumes of legislation to try to make the world a safer place to live. As children of God, we need to be careful that we do not do something that would cause injury to another person. In addition to physical injury, there is another area of our life that needs attention that will also help reduce the pain we cause others. Gossip, the spreading of hurtful information about another person, can cause pain that is at least as serious as the physical pain caused by many injuries. "The words of a talebearer are as wounds and they go down into the innermost parts of the belly" (Prov. 18:8). This concept is so important that the exact words are repeated in Prov. 26:22. The scripture uses a variety of terms such as "evil speaking", "tale-bearers" and "vaintalk" to warn us against gossip. All are utterly con-demned by the scripture. All of them are regarded so seriously that those who engage in them are in danger of spiritual destruction. "If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain" (James 1:26).

Additionally James writes:

...the tongue is a little member and boasteth great things. Behold, how great a matter a little fire kindleth! And the tongue is a fire, a world of iniquity: so is the tongue among our members, that it defileth the whole body and setteth on fire the cause of nature; and it is set on fire the course of nature; and it is set on fire of hell. For every kind of beasts,...is tamed, and hath been tamed of mankind: But the tongue can no man tame; it is an unruly evil, full of deadly poison (James 3:5-8).

Our speech and our actions must be consistent. "Doth a fountain send forth at the same place sweet water and bitter? Can the fig tree, my brethren, bear olive berries?..." (James 3:11-12).

Gossip

Light From The Word

If we hear of someone who is the subject of a rumor and we spread the news of this situation, we can be guilty of keeping the unfortunate story going. If we keep the gossip to ourselves, we can help to put an end to it. "Where no wood is, there the fire goeth out: so where there is no talebearer, the strife ceaseth" (Prov. 26:20). We must be very careful that we do not add fuel to the fire.

Sometimes we are tempted to defend ourselves when we gossip by saying that the information that we spread around is true. That may well be the case but our speech need not be false to make us guilty of gossip or evil speaking. Anything that could be hurtful, whether true or untrue, can be gossip. The factor that determines whether or not a message is gossip is the impact that it has on the individual who is being talked about. When the scribes and pharisees took the adulterous woman to Christ, there is little doubt that what they said was true. They informed Christ of the sin of the woman and spread the news of the unfortunate woman. Christ did not defend her actions. He clearly referred to it as sin. But he also made the point very clear that the scribes and pharisees were wrong in what they said because their intent was wrong.

They were part of the problem rather than part of the solution. When we have some information about an individual or a situation, we need to ask ourselves why we are repeating the story. Are we repeating it just so someone else has the information or so they know that there is a situation that needs our prayerful attention?

We also need to ask ourselves what will be the likely result if we repeat an account of a situation. Will it edify or will it confuse and cause pain? Will it help the individual or will it hurt someone?

The closeness of the fellowship in our brotherhood affords us many opportunities to engage in fruitful spiritual conversation. We have many opportunities to uphold, encourage and exhort one another. All of these can be to our spiritual benefit.

We must, however, be so very careful that this extensive amount of time that we spend together does not give Satan an opportunity to cause division through gossip. Either within our local congregations or among the various congregations throughout our land, there are ample opportunities that Satan can use to bring pain or division. When an unfortunate situation occurs, we must use utmost caution in what we say, why we say it, how we say it or to whom we say it.

Certainly there are times when unfortunate situations must be discussed. In these times we should share just enough information so that the hearer has enough information to pray about the situation but does not have all of the unnecessary details. We must also be careful that we not add to the account by filling in details that may not be accurate.

Sometimes we are tempted to say something about someone in an attempt to make ourselves look better at their expense. We never make ourselves look good by making someone else look bad, "...but they measuring themselves by themselves, and comparing themselves among themselves, are not wise" (I Cor. 10:12). Also, it is the approval of the Lord that is important, not the approval of man. "For not he that commendeth himself is approved, but whom the Lord commendeth" (II Cor. 10:18).

Gossip can be very destructive and very hurtful. The wounds that it can cause can be very deep and long lasting. We can help avoid causing such pain if we weigh our words carefully and follow the Golden Rule. We are accountable for what we say. "But I say unto you, that every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment" (Matt. 12:30). If we would not want others to gossip about us, we must not gossip about them. "Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them: for this is the law and the prophets" (Matt. 7:12).

Mission Committee

December meeting

The Mission Committee held their scheduled meeting on December 16, 1997. All members were present, with Bros. Ed Schwartz and John Lehman representing the World Relief Committee.

It is our practice to have two elders from the other Committee to sit in on both Mission and World Relief Committee meetings. This makes it easier for each to understand the work in areas where the efforts of the two bodies overlap.

Financial report

The financial report for the quarter ending October 31, 1997 was presented and discussed. Contributions received for this period for the Bible and Mission Funds amounted to \$151,965. Disbursements for the three months included \$46,826 from the Bible Fund for the purchase of Bibles and postage for our own Bible distribution program.

The Mission Fund distributed \$199,516 during the quarter. \$76,536 was for projects in the USA with the remainder being used for eight foreign countries.

European church building fund

The balance in this fund as of October 31, 1997, was \$372,590. The projects for which this fund is used are first approved by our European Board and then referred to the Mission Committee for approval. The major portion of the above mentioned monies has already been authorized for church building projects in Yugoslavia, Romania, and Hungary. Details are available from Bro. Gene Marti if anyone would like to see the exact distributions.

We do not forward funds to our brethren in these countries until the actual building projects have started. We keep the funds here in the States so we can earn interest until they are needed.

Following are the church building projects that we are presently supporting in Europe.

Hungarian churches

On a recent trip to Europe, our brethren attended the dedication of the addition to the church in Hódmezövásárhely. This is one of the oldest congregations in Hungary and

Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye stedfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in Vain in the Lord. 1 CORINTHIANS 15:58

the addition to their building was sorely needed. The Hungarian brethren were able to provide the major portion of the costs of this addition, but our committee approved an additional contribution of \$10,000 for this purpose.

The situation in Hungary is such that rampant inflation is creating a real hardship, especially for families with young children. Hungary came out of the Communist system with perhaps the best opportunity to embrace capitalism, yet the struggle is real. We believe that we are doing the right thing in helping them in their efforts.

Approval was also given for a contribution of \$40,000 to the building fund at Bekassamson. This old church needs to be replaced. They have a building site, and have started

constructing a small but adequate house of worship.

Croatian churches

As one of the ancient countries recreated by the division of the former Yugoslavia, this is a land of great adversity and personal suffering.

We have three congregations in Croatia that were very adversely affected by the internal fighting in that country. Members numbered around 300 before the war. Most of them found it necessary to flee their homes and seek refuge in Hungary.

Our brethren who are acquainted with Eastern Europe have known and

loved Elder Istvan Szemmelroth of Pogany, Hungary, who has taken a real personal interest in these refugees. In their small village, they have a house which was used as a refuge for the unfortunate brethren who had to flee their homeland due to the civil war. Most of them lost all of the few possessions they had.

They are now returning to Croatia and attempting to

rebuild their homes as well as their lives. It is hard for us who have so much, to relate to those who have so little, but we wish to assure you that this is reality.

Their church buildings were damaged or destroyed during the war, and they need assistance to build these structures. The Mission Committee agreed to contribute \$40,000 to rebuild the Croatian churches. The World Relief Committee had previously agreed to contribute \$40,000 from their disaster fund and special contributions that have been made for Yugoslavia.

None of this work could go on without your prayers and generous financial support. The Mission Committee and the recipients of our aid all thank you from our hearts.

The Galilean Home

A special report

One of the projects here in the USA which has received much enthusiastic support from our brethren is the Galilean Home in Liberty, Kentucky.

This home is a result of a deep conviction on the part of Jerry and Sandy Tucker. Some time ago, they felt directed by our Lord to provide a home for children who were virtual outcasts from society, not only in the USA, but abroad. The result of this vision is a home in a rural area of Kentucky.

The beginning

In the early 1970's, the Tuckers started adopting children. Some of the children had mental and physical handicaps. They legally adopted many children, but have cared for many others who were not adopted.

The Home accepts no state aid. To be yoked with the state, they must accept some of the state's standards which they consider to be in conflict with the scriptures. They have an on-campus school through 12th grade, which is open for the children of the area to attend. For the children who are not residents of the Galilean Home there is a tuition charge for those who can afford it.

Our involvement

Our church's first visit to the Galilean Home ministries was in the summer of 1992. A couple of our brothers were inspired after reading the book, "Faith, Hope, and Room for One More." This book was written by Jerry and Sandy Tucker. It was through the interest of these brothers that a visit by a representative of World Relief first occurred.

A focus on other needs

Along with the many children they have cared for, something new was added to their ministry. In the early 1990's, they started caring for babies who were born to mothers in prison. There was a great need for a building to accommodate



these babies, and in 1995, World Relief built a dormitory to house those babies.

Galilean Home Ministries named this dormitory "Angel House". It is an attractive light blue vinyl sided building with a white front porch. There is a main floor and a walk-out basement. World Relief also provided a playground for the children of this house. Everyone who helped in the construction of this facility considered it a great blessing for them personally in addition to the blessing it brought to the Home.



From their newsletter

The following excerpt is from the December 1997 newsletter published by the Galilean Home. We print it in order that our own brethen can derive therefrom the purpose and goals of this ministry.

"This is the purpose of the ministry, serving children whom God directs, not having geographical boundaries, not judging the color of their skin or religious preferences. We have 70 children, give or take a few, who continue to need shelter, love, medical treatment, and spiritual nurturing. We continue to fulfill this mission without state support and as long as you, our sponsors, continue to have faith in our vision, we will not waiver in our work. Even if we, someday, stand alone, we will continue to stand for God and maintain our convictions."



An invitation to visit

Some words from the Home in a recent correspondence to the Apostolic Christian Church were: "You have made a difference in the lives of many children. May God bless you one hundred-fold for reaching beyond your fences." The staff of the Galilean Home wishes to invite all of our brethren to visit them. As you travel to the hills of Kentucky, you can visit this unique home. They are doing an interesting, rewarding work.

Future plans

At a recent meeting, the World Relief Committee approved funding for erecting a building to be used as a wood working shop. Meanwhile, the Home received a number of commercial grade wood working tools as a donation. The proposed building will provide a working shop area while also serving as a training area for those who have an interest in wood working.



"Would you give your blood to Mary?" the doctor asked.

Johnny hesitated. His lower lip started to tremble. Then he smiled

and said, "Sure, for my sister."

Soon the two children were wheeled into the hospital room — Mary, pale and thin; Johnny, robust and healthy. Neither spoke, but when their eyes met, Johnny grinned.

As the nurse inserted the needle into his arm, Johnny's smile faded. He watched the blood flow through the tube. With the ordeal almost over, his voice broke the silence. "Doctor, when do I die?"

Only then did the doctor realize why Johnny had hesitated, why his lip trembled when he agreed to donate his blood. He'd thought giving his blood to his sister meant giving up his life. In that brief moment, he'd made his great decision.

Johnny didn't have to die to save his sister. Each of us, however, has a condition more serious than Mary's, and it required Jesus to give not just His blood, but His life.

house and it was late and I am the type of person that likes to go to bed a little bit early. We had come a lot of miles and I love to be with my family and I love to talk. I got the pillow out and started slumping over and pretty soon I was missing some of the conversation. I know how that probably made them feel because I know how it makes me feel when somebody falls asleep. How do you think it makes our Creator feel when we don't give Him the best of our day?

At the time when we are crisp and the time when we are fresh, give Him the first fruits. It says that in the Word. It says, "Give Him the first fruits." He doesn't want what is left over of our money. He doesn't want anything that is left over. He doesn't want the sheep that are left over. He wants us first and the first fruits of our prayers, of our love, of our time, and of our material wealth. Because if He knows He has our first fruits. He knows He has it all. May we do that for Him? The blessings would be out of this world!

"Since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus, and of the love which ye have to all the saints," (Col. 1:4). Again, that commandment of love. I saw a sign coming into church this morning, and I think it said, "Love is the complete answer. Love is the total answer." You have probably seen the bill board many times. It is on Route 40 coming in before you get to War Memorial Drive. It's on the right side, but I'm not sure.

I had to think about that thing of love. Yes, true love is the answer to everything. It solves all the problems. In fact, there was a song back in the seventies that said, All We Need Is Love. I think it was sung by the Beatles. All we need is love, and that is true if we define love in the proper way. But if we define it as total acceptance of everything you do is okay, everything that everybody does is okay, we just all love one another and we accept everything that everybody is doing, I don't see that as Jesus' love.

If I do that to my children, they would be absolutely and utterly destroyed; if everything they did, I said, "Oh, that is wonderful for you! That is just great." There are times when I have to tell my children, "That is not in the standards of God's Word. I don't see it in the Good Book here, and I don't see any examples of Jesus ever making any compromise in the Word." Jesus did not compromise; yet, He is the essence of love.

So love is the answer, but the love of Christ is the answer. Let's make sure that we don't redefine what love is into apathy. If we accept anything and everything, pretty soon we don't care about anything any more, and our love has turned to a lukewarm apathy—"I'll accept you but I don't care about you, but I accept everything you are doing."

In fact, the opposite of love in my book is not hate at all. There is at least some emotion there, but that we have a problem with in the United States; well, I have a problem maybe in my own heart sometimes.

I don't even want to put enough effort into somebody that rubs me wrong to even hate them, much the less love them. I don't even have enough effort; I just have apathy. I don't even care about them. That is not what Jesus wanted.

Jesus wants us to look to the well-being of all those around us, not just our friends, not just our family, but most of all, the unlovable. Those that rub us the wrong way, those that are inconvenient to minister to, that is when the test is on of the love of Christ.

"For the hope which is laid up for you in heaven, whereof ye heard before in the word of the truth of the gospel;" (Col. 1:5). That is where we learned it, isn't it? Have you heard it anywhere else of an eternal hope, anywhere other than the Word of the Gospel? That is why we must keep coming to the Word in our church settings, and in our personal meditations each week.

I need to hear the story over and over and over of how if I have faith in Jesus' shed blood, I will live like I have faith in Jesus' shed blood. I will be thankful and righteous in a holy life, not out of guilt, not out of "I should have" and "Do I have to?" But I will live a righteous life because I am unworthy to be called a Christian. I am so thankful!

If we live that way and we have that hope, there is nothing better than hope! Have you seen someone that has lost hope? Have you seen the runner that gives it all he has and tries to get to the front to keep up with the front pack? Maybe towards the end of a race and when he knows it is hopeless, he lets down and he coasts in. He decides second place is good enough. That is losing hope, isn't it?

May we not be the Christians that lose hope. May we always have our sights on Heaven. I think when we look at this world, we get too massive of doses of the hopelessness of this world, without the offsetting massive doses of the hope that Jesus Christ would have for us, we could lose our hope.

Let's surround ourselves with people. Let's surround ourselves with the setting. Let's surround ourselves with the Word of hope, the Gospel. Let's don't stray from it.

"Which is come unto you, as it is in all the world; and bringeth forth fruit, as it doth also in you, since the day ye heard of it, and knew the grace of God in truth:" (Col. 1:6). Another concept. Another concept that is tough to handle is bringing forth fruit. That pleases God when His children bring forth fruit!

The end of religion is not coming to church. That is not the whole duty to come to church. To come to church we would say, "I gave God my Sunday; that is enough. I'll go with it from there. I gave Him two hours on Sunday." No, He gave us two hours today, or three hours. This is for us. We didn't give Him anything this morning. He gave us everything. What we can do through the week is bring forth fruit.

Is there any other way for people to know that we are Christians if we don't bring forth fruit day in and day out? I have a heart that is filled with love and thankfulness.

"For this cause we also, since the day we heard it, do not cease to pray for you, and to desire that ye might be filled with the knowledge of his will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding;" (Col. 1:9). It talks of two concepts there of not ceasing to pray. Sometimes, I think, we feel like our prayers are not answered. We feel like maybe God doesn't even hear our prayers, but we have to believe.

If we look in the Book of Revelation, it says that the prayers of the saints are like incense that rise up to the Father (see Revelation 8:4). But He smells that incense and He smells that fragrance of our prayers, but the time is not right. It is not time to fulfill the prayer. Let's don't cease praying. Let's don't give Him up. He hasn't given up on us, and aren't you glad that there are those who never gave up on us?

When we were in our unconverted state, those of us that are saved, they didn't give up on us. Our grandparents kept praying and our parents kept praying and, dear friend, we are not giving up on you either. We love you. We want you to experience the peace that passes all understanding. We want you to experience a hope in the midst of a hopeless world when there is not a lot of good news.

We are living in the good times. All we have to do is wait for the bad times. One of these days, it will turn and we will not be in this prosperous mode that we have enjoyed. I hardly know anything else other than prosperity. My generation hardly knows anything other than prosperity and it only got better the next year. There are a few dips.

Dear friend, there is hope beyond anything you can ever imagine in being saved and having reservations in Heaven. Make yours today.



Haith of our Hathers

Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world. I John 4:1

The caution of John, in those latter days of his life, still ring in our ears yet today. The truth does not change and the truth of the Holy Word of God teaches us in these dark times as well as it has taught mankind throughout the ages. There are spirits and there is a Holy Spirit of God. We first have to be aware of the Holy Spirit before we can "try" the spirits of deception.

The true believer, who has received the Holy Spirit of God into their soul, can with little difficulty try the spirits, providing that the Holy Ghost is not quenched.....If any man thirst, let him drink. He that believeth on me, as the scripture hath said, out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water. (But this spake He of the Spirit, which they that believe on Him should receive: for the Holy Ghost was not yet given; because that Jesus was not yet glori*fied.)* Believing that the KJV is indeed the infallible Word from God, the question might arise as to the reference of God's Spirit that indwells the soul of man as the Holy Ghost, rather than the Holy Spirit as it appears in all other versions of the English language. The answer may be very simple, however very important.

The Holy Spirit of God and the Holy Ghost are the very same Spirit and yet the usage of the word Ghost instead of Spirit is quite noticeable in the KJV Holy Bible and implies an important message. (All other versions of the Bible, written in the English language, remove the word "Ghost" and replace it with "Spirit.") We are aware that the Holy Ghost is a part of God, which if provided a cleansed place to dwell, will indwell that cleansed place in the soul of man. God the Father, the Son Jesus Christ, and the Holy Ghost are three in one. As to the change in the term from Spirit to Ghost, it may be simple and yet important as to remind us that when a "Spirit" leaves the body it is referred to, in the dictionary, as a "Ghost." How humbling it is to see how clearly God planned His usage of terms in the Holy Bible. God the Father is a Spirit, Jesus Christ the Son is a Spirit, and the Holy Ghost that God gives to indwell the soul of a cleansed, converted man is a



And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them.

Spirit. Can we even comprehend that the Spirit of God actually dwells in us as the Holy Ghost?

A guide, a comfort, a chastiser, a small still voice dwelling in us that will lead us through the trials and tribulations of life. This most wonderful gift, the Holy Ghost, is truly a part of God in us creating it's own seal upon us, that nothing can remove it from us except our own willful sin or carelessness. If the Lord

God has provided us with a part of Him in us to live faithfully upon earth, what more could we ask of Him? Surely with the unction of the Holy Ghost, one would think that we could not stray from God's Holy Will, however it does happen. It happens out of the natural lust within the physical body; the lust of the eye, the lust of the flesh, and the pride of life. What it takes is a desire on our part to strive toward perfection and with God's grace we can find the way in this life to be pleasing to Him.

To help in the warfare with Satan, God gives us a whole arsenal of weapons. Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand. Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with **Truth**, and having on the breastplate of Righteousness; and your feet shod with the preparation of the Gospel of Peace; Above all, taking the shield of **Faith,** wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked. And take the <u>helmet of</u> Salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God: Ephesians 6:13-17 After reading this scripture and visualizing the powerful weapons of God that we can use in our warfare with Satan, we really have no excuse not to please God except for our desire to do what is right and holy.

We can not comprehend how much God wants to help us. The Holy Ghost, Grace, and the Word of God are all directed toward building our faith in our great God and helping us with our walk of faith. The Word of God, the KJV Bible, has led the people on earth for almost 400 years. It must grieve the Lord when He hears the world saying that no one understands the old fashioned language of the KJV Bible. The world would set about to change the Bible and with that change lessen the impact and power of the Word of God. If the Holy Ghost has sealed itself in our soul, we will have no problem understanding the unction of the Holy Ghost through the

reading of the Living Word of God. It is also very difficult for us to comprehend the unseen Angels and the Spirit activity around us. There is a whole dimension or spiritual realm beyond our clouded eyes, which sees things as through a veil. The Word of God mentions numerous times about the work of the Angels to help, protect, and intervene in the lives of God's children. The Angel that opened the prison door for Peter, the Angel that smote Herod, and the Angel of the Lord that appeared unto Mary in a dream are just a few mentions of this spiritual realm beyond our clouded eves. Our Lord God wants to give us every advantage possible to defeat Satan. (We must be very careful, however, to worship God and not the Angels.)

Let us consider the example of the power of God as revealed to Elisha's young servant in II Kings 6: 11-23. Here was an impossible situation for man to understand. The King of Syria was sore displeased with Elisha, for he had revealed to the King of Israel every move of the Syrian King. So the Syrian King ordered his army to go to the location or city where Elisha dwelt to surround the city and kill him. When Elisha and his young servant went out early in the morning, the servant was astonished and afraid when he saw the great Syrian army surrounding them. He cried out, Alas, my master (Elisha)! how shall we do? And he (Elisha) answered, Fear not: for they that be with us are more than they that be with them. The Lord heard the prayer of Elisha and opened the eyes of the young servant. What the servant saw was the tremendous spiritual world of God. And he (the servant) saw: and behold, the mountain was full of horses and chariots of fire round about Elisha. The army of Syria could have been annihilated by God's army on the spot, but Elisha was directed to handle the situation different than someone with less faith might have done.



Fear not: for they that be with us are more than they that be with them. II Kings 6:16

Elisha prayed for blindness to come over the men and then Elisha told the Syrian leaders that they had the wrong city and he would lead them to the correct city. What Elisha did was lead them right into the capital city of Samaria and into the presence of the King of Israel. The King of Israel asked if he should smite them? Elisha, directed by God, showed mercy and said to feed them and let them go. Was mercy the right thing to follow? Without any question it was. After they were fed with great provisions, they were sent home never to return. So the bands of Syria came no more into the land of Israel.

As we war against Satan, let us remember that the Holy Ghost that is in us is far greater than he that is in the world. Man's inventions, as mighty as they are, do not come close to the power of God and what He could unleash if He desired. Smart bombs, missiles, radar technology are nothing compared to the help we get from God if we are faithful and humble. God will "lead us not into temptation" if we have a desire to remain free from sin and pray for the grace to accomplish His will.

Pilate was proud of his power when he spoke to the Lord in John 19:10,11. Then saith Pilate unto him (Jesus), Speakest thou not unto me? knowest thou not that I have power to crucify thee, and have power to release thee? Jesus answered, Thou couldest have no power at all against me, except it were given thee from above: therefore he that delivered me unto thee *hath the greater sin.* From there on Pilate was humbled and tried to release him, however the Jews prevailed and our Lord was crucified according to God's plan. Again it was said that Jesus could have called out ten thousand Angels to annihilate all of the Roman soldiers, but He willingly bore the cross of Calvary and died for us as the propitiation for our sins.

Spirit, by whose operation faith and hope and love are given, source of holy conversation, bearing seed and fruit for Heaven; Spirit, by whose inspiration Prophets and Apostles spake, visit us with Thy salvation; Dwell with us for Jesus' sake! It is our constant prayer that God will lead the true believers in such a way that the Church, the Bride of Christ, will remain pure and unadulterated by the world.

The Spirit of God in us, the Holy Ghost, is what we need to have our heart in harmony with, in this day of turmoil, in combination with the Word of God, so we do not stray from the truth, which we know will set us free.



SILVER LINING

The visit of Elder Henry Geistlich of Meilen, Switzerland (a contemporary of Bro. Samuel Froehlich) to the newly-established American churches took place in the late spring and summer of 1866. This ongoing series contains excerpts from that historic diary.

In the second installment, Bro. Geistlich has just left the ocean liner (from Europe) and is entering the New York City area to begin his American visit.

May 28 (Monday): I had to hire a rig (which cost me \$3.50) to take me to the home of Bro. Hornef, who lives in Williamsburg. I was able to find him. It is very dangerous for an immigrant to go about in New York because there are many vagabonds. A person is unable to trust anyone unless he is accompanied by an acquaintance who looks after him.

The city on the inside is just the opposite as it looks from the outside. Coming in from the sea, the region looks wonderfully nice, and although the climate seems pleasant, the people are more rough, and have less feeling than those in Europe.

May 29 (Tuesday): At Williamsburg, New York. The weather is rainy. Today I began to write a letter home, but could not finish it. On Monday evening I went with Bro. Hornef and Anna to get our trunks. We had some trouble getting them. Ships are always arriving. It was reported that 1,300 immigrants had arrived since Saturday.

June 1 (Friday): At Williamsburg, New York. Today at noon I read a chapter (Genesis 22) concerning the act of Abraham offering his son Isaac. Never before today did this chapter affect me so greatly. It touched me so much I had to weep. How must Abraham have felt, as on the third day, he raised his eyes and saw the place before him, where the Lord told him to offer his only son, whom he loved, as a sacrifice to the Lord.

Because Abraham was obedient to

the Word of God, it was counted to him for righteousness. Through this he (Abraham) became a father and a model to all the faithful here on earth. I thought, O that the Lord would give us such a faith and such a heart that we would be as faithful and as obedient as the heart of Abraham was.

June 2 (Saturday): At Williamsburg. The weather is pleasant. Yesterday I sent two letters, one to Basel and one to Zurich; and today one to Bern, and one to Elder Josef Bella. I wrote this morning and this afternoon accompanied by Sister Wink, lately of Basel. We made several calls on the brethren.

June 3 (Sunday): At Williamsburg. Weather rainy. Today there was church, both in the forenoon and afternoon. It was given to me to speak, yet I was somewhat occupied, as I did not find the real spiritual association among some here...not the real earnestness or seriousness. I found too little hunger and longing for the Word of God. There are, however, several lovable brethren here. A special one is Bro. Hornef. He is a pattern and model for the church. But they regard him too little. How good it is if we have a hunger for the Word of God.

In the evening there was a singing which was followed by reading a chapter, and a prayer.

June 4 (Monday): At Williamsburg. The weather is fair. Today we left Williamsburg accompanied by several for New Bremen (i.e., the Croghan-Naumburg area). Our trip from New York City was by railroad over the Hudson River. The railroad went over much water and swampy land. The larger villages through which we traveled were Roseville, Hudson, Shoreliede and Judiken. From there we took a stagecoach to Lowville, arriving at an hour past midnight. We went to bed and had good lodging. From there we went to New Bremen and Croghan. June 5 (Tuesday): At Lowville, New York. We hired a rig to take us to Croghan. It cost \$5.00. On the way we met dear Bro. Virkler, whose home is some distance from home. This is the "Virkler" area with a large church here. The country is quite hilly, although it has been settled for quite some time. It looks rather wild, containing much timber and brush land. The thought came to me, surely people cannot make a living here as I had not yet seen any nice meadows or farming ground.

I said to Bro. Virkler, "If one looks at this region, one cannot see how the people can make a living."

He laughingly replied, "Yes, my brother, the people here are prosperous. Here it is as with Jacob as they stood before Pharaoh, who asked what his occupation was, and he replied, 'Thy servants are shepherds.' The raising of cattle is a chief occupation here. There is much cheese made, and the returns are good."

A brother from New York City who accompanied me here asked Bro. Virkler how much land a man must have to make a living for a family. He replied, "It might make a big difference what kind of man he is."

"There were two men in Israel, in the Old Testament, the one being satisfied with very little and lived an orderly life. The other had much and wanted to add more to it. These men were Naboth and Ahab. And so there is just much difference yet today."

This conversation was a blessing to me; also important concerning the brethren here and the condition of the church. I felt inwardly good. I could feel happy among the brethren. They live close together and through raising cattle, have a pleasant and quiet life.

"Is It Essential?" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

The first time I ran into this question was when I was asked if confession of sin is essential (for salvation). Of course, we all know that to unburden ourselves to God and to someone else in whom we have complete trust for confidentiality, is a very good thing, both for our spiritual life and our mental health. However, the thief on the cross was short of time so he didn't get a lot of things done that the Bible teaches and suggests for the believers to do. Nevertheless, Jesus told him, "Today shalt thou be with me in Paradise." (Luke 23:43)

Speaking of what is essential, Jesus said to Nicodemus, "Ye must be born again." (John 3:7). This sounds very essential. For salvation we need to have spiritual life, not just physical life. In Romans 8:6 we read, "For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace." It follows that the spiritual mind is essential for life and peace, although it doesn't say to what extent our minds must be spiritual. Some believers think about spiritual things more than others, partly out of fascination with the unknown, perhaps.

In I John 2:4 we read, "He that saith, I know him, and keepeth not his commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him." That hurts. After teaching us, "For by grace are ye saved through faith," (Ephesians 2:8), we are now taught that we must keep His commandments, in effect, that it is essential that we do so. The Lord Jesus Christ Himself taught the importance of obedience when He said, "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven: but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven." (Matthew 7:21). I don't mean to scare anyone unnecessarily, but doesn't this sound like if we have true faith, we will at least try to be obedient to what the Bible teaches, especially

in the New Testament? Please correct me if I'm wrong. I, too, want to know what the Bible teaches on this matter of what is essential.

What are His commandments spoken of in I John 2:4 quoted above? The New Testament is full of commandments, albeit, not with the consequences for disobedience which were experienced in the Old Testament. Then, in many cases, it was physical death.

Some scriptures which sound like commandments to me are "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world." (I John 2:15). Also, "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning..." (I Peter 3:3). Surely we should at least try to be humble, Godly, and modest.

Let's think about what is essential for salvation, what is essential for obedience, and what is essential for attaining to the really abundant spiritual life, and do them all.
