"SEEK RIGHTEOUSNESS"

Sermon by Elder Bro. Ervin Knecht, Eureka, IL

Job 7 and Romans 10

The apostle's first verse here says, "Brethren, my heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is, that they might be saved." (Romans 10:1). We well know that is God's desire, too, that all men will be saved. Paul was speaking somewhat to the children of Israel--to the Jewish people. He calls them Israel.

The last verse points that out when he says, "But to Israel he saith, All day long I have stretched forth my hands unto a disobedient and gainsaying people. (Romans 10:21). None of us would ever want to fit into that category. We believe that those of us who are converted that God has called us to be His, are much like the children of Israel who were God's chosen people.

We know that when the Lord came, He lived here upon this earth and shed His blood and died on the cross and arose. The people that were God's chosen people rejected Him. They didn't believe that this all took place and that He was the Christ. That is who Paul is speaking about. They did not receive Him even though they were God's chosen people. I think that tells us something, as we remember and now recall, that we are God's chosen people. We are really privileged.

A lot of us were brought up in this way of life--from little on up-that is all we ever knew. I know for myself, I was away for a couple years in the service and never saw anybody from this faith, but I knew in my heart where I would go back to, to find salvation.

There was never any confusion or doubt and God was good and merciful to me that He allowed me to come back and to become one of His. It wasn't that I was not exposed to other doctrines, because I was. I respected them, but I knew where I would find my salvation. So it is precious to us.

I think as Paul, in his writing, is referring to the Israelite people, and we think of how God delivered them from Egypt and from the bondage of slavery. For forty years they went through the wilderness until He brought them to the promised land. He did so much for them; yet, they murmured and complained and they wanted to go back where they came from. I really think that is an important lesson for us, beloved ones, that we be content with what God has given us and be thankful. The Word teaches us that we should be thankful to God and give Him thanksgiving and be grateful for what He has done.

What has He done? I guess that is the thing we have to think about: What has He done? For the friends that are with us today, what has He done so you can find something that the world doesn't offer? We know what He has done!

He has made it possible that our sins can be forgiven and be cast into the sea of forgetfulness. He has made it possible that we can live free from sin and no longer have that condemnation of sin. We can have that hope for life everlasting. That is what He has done. We might summarize it that way.

But we just need to stop sometime and think about that, I believe. To think of what He has done for you and for me individually, because that is where it starts, doesn't it? It starts on an individual basis.

When converts come in repen-

tance, they are concerned about one thing. They are concerned about their soul. Where is their soul going to spend eternity? That is their concern. So it starts individually with each and every person...each and every soul. There is a call by God to a higher calling, much higher than what they have experienced prior to that time.

Each one of us has to have that deep appreciation, like the children of Israel didn't really have. There were some that did, I believe. We think of Moses, Joshua and Caleb and we can probably name more.

But when we think about it, Joshua and Caleb--those two-were the only ones that were of an adult age when they left Egypt that were able to enter into the promised land out of six hundred thousand besides the women and children. That is a real small percentage of people that were faithful to God and obedient.

It gives us something to think about. It should not be something, beloved ones, that we throw up our hands in despair and wonder what we are going to do, but it should be

Light From The Word



Writings based on God's Word

"Am I my brother's keeper?" (Gen. 4:9). This question was Cain's defense when God asked him about his brother Abel. It is a question that has been asked for generations; it is a question that we often hear even today. Sometimes the question is asked by sincere children of God who are trying to do God's will and want to know what they can do to help their fellow men, but sometimes it is asked by those who are trying to avoid responsibility.

What does it mean to be our brother's keeper? Although the term is only specifically used one time in the scripture, the concept is referred to many times.

A "brother" as used in the scripture, is described as "...whosoever shall do the will of my Father which is in heaven..." (Matt. 12:50). If we are a child of God, then our brother would be all others who are truly the children of God. This certainly is a closer relationship than a neighbor as described in the account of the good Samaritan (Luke 10:30-35). Our neighbor can be anyone upon whom we can show mercy. Our brother, however, is anyone who does the will of God.

A keeper is one who is a guard or caretaker of someone. A keeper is one who has enough concern for someone that they will watch out for the welfare of that individual. A brother's keeper, then is one who has enough concern for a child of God to watch out for his or her welfare.

As children of God, we have the responsibility and the opportunity to watch out for the welfare of our brother. This requires us to be willing to do anything for our brother that would be necessary to help him to remain a child of God. Sometimes it means we will need to go and offer assistance or encouragement in time of need. At other times, it may mean that we will need to go and offer a word of caution or admonition if it appears that our brother is in spiritual danger.

At times such as this, it is very important that we approach the situation in the spirit of humility and with the sole intent of being helpful. We must be very careful

that we do not confuse the role of being our brother's keeper with that of simply finding fault. There is no room in the household of faith for activities of this nature.

How can we be sure we are being our brother's keeper rather than finding fault? The scripture provides us with much instruction in this matter.

In the Gospel of St. Matthew, chapter 7, verses 3-5 give us a very clear explanation of one step in this process. Before we remove a mote that is in our brother's eye, we must make sure that we remove from our own eye all obstructions that would interfere with helping to remove the mote from our brother's eye. Later in the same gospel we can read:

"Moreover if thy brother shall trespass against thee, go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone: if he shall hear thee, thou hast gained thy brother. But if he will not hear thee, then take with thee one or two more, that in the mouth of two or three witnesses every word may be stablished. And if he shall neglect to hear them, tell it unto the church: but if he neglect to hear the church, let him be unto thee as a heathen man and a publican." (Matthew 18:15-17).

These two passages established a procedure for us to follow that will help us fulfill our responsibilities as our brother's keeper. It assures us that we will go in humility and that we will go in a manner that maintains confidentiality. At no time does the scripture ever give us permission to allow these situations to be the topic of gossip. The only reason we should ever speak of the situation is if it is done in a manner that will help solve the problem, not spread it.

The scripture utterly condemns gossip and makes it clear that if we gossip, we are part of the problem. "Where no wood is, there the fire goeth out: so where there is a no talebearer, the strife ceaseth." (Proverbs 26:20).

Spreading unkind or untrue statements are very damaging and usually cause a great deal of pain. "The words of a talebearer are as wounds, and they go down into the innermost parts of the belly" (Proverbs 18:8). A child of God should surely not want to either keep strife going with a brother nor to cause wounds.

Just as we would not want to be guilty of gossip about our brother, we should not engage in flattery or insincere compliments. We need to offer encouragement to one another and we must be sure it is sincere. "He that rebuketh a man, afterwards shall find more favor than he that flattereth with the tongue" (Proverbs 28:23).

If we go about our daily tasks and include gossip and flattery, we place ourselves in a very serious position—one of being a busybody. This behavior is also condemned by the scriptures, listed in the same sentence with other very serious sins. "But let none of you suffer as a murderer, or as a thief, or as an evildoer, or as a busybody in other men's matters" (I Peter 4:15).

We give evidence that we are our brother's keeper by the love that we show toward one another. Space does not permit inclusion of all scripture references that demonstrate this but the point becomes very clear even with just a few references. When the Son of man sits on His throne to judge the people, those who are commended for doing right will be told "...Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me" (Matthew 25:40).

The Apostle Paul instructed us that "...ye have been called unto liberty; only use not liberty for an occasion to the flesh, but by love serve one another" (Gal. 5:13). The entire 13th chapter in I Cor. focuses on our opportunity and responsibility to show love one toward another and to be our brother's keeper.

As we go about our daily tasks in an impersonal world, we have an opportunity to demonstrate concern and compassion for those around us. We can put our faith into action as we very quietly and humbly fulfill the scriptural responsibility to be our brother's keeper.

Cemetery in Tremonton,Utah

The Present in Light of the Past

In the early part of this century, specifically from 1901-1910, there was a church composed of a small group of believers in Tremonton, Utah, a small town lying north of Salt Lake City, just east of the intersection of Interstate Highways 84 and 15. It was established and settled by families from the Midwest.

A backward glance

Looking backward through history, both of our church and our country, we find that brave and hardy souls worked their way westward in pursuit of a better way of life. Some of them were successful in achieving their goals, and some were not. Some of our brethren traveled west and settled in Utah.

Family names

included Winzeler, Getz, Baer, Imthurn, and Meister. As they tried to establish a life in the area, they also assembled together as a church. They buried their dead in a plot along a country road outside of the town. The last survivor of this church was Sophie Weisler, who was buried in 1978. The last person buried here appears to be Sophie (Woerner) Richins, in 1992. A record of this is found in Marching To Zion, pages 305-307.

Caring for the burial sites Some time ago, the Elder Body of our Church agreed to accept a deed to the cemetery property, and to assume

responsibility for its upkeep. A descendant of the families living in the area named Fred Eggli was willing to provide for the ongoing maintenance. This consisted mainly of mowing and trimming around the graves. He did this for a modest fee. His son, Richard Eggli, has taken his place in recent years.

Establishment of a fund

Some time ago, our brotherhood set aside a special fund for the purpose of keeping up this cemetery. The earnings from this fund just about equal the maintenance expenses. Three trustees

were appointed to administer the fund and maintain the oversight of the property.

Trustees visit the area

In August, 1997, two of the trustees visited and inspected the cemetery site. They found that the mowing and trimming has been attended to, but with the passing of years, some more serious maintenance work is needed. Of particular note is the deteriorated condition of the old fence. It is made of wooden posts and wire netting. In addition, the earthen bank along the roadway needs attention. Some of the gravestones are askew, and some plot borders need to be retrofitted. It was the observation and recommendation of the trustees that a work project be organized to provide this rehabilitation. This was reviewed and approved by both the World Relief and Mission Committees as a joint effort.

Coordinator appointed

Bro. Mike Leman of our Denver congregation has kindly agreed to coordinate this work project. A number of our brethren have ancestors buried in this isolated place. Some of the family names include: Funk, Gassner, Eggli, Schrenk, Feucht, Weisser, Kupfer, Vierling, Meister, Imthurn, Boering, Brenkmann, Sommer, Wagenbach, Schmutz, Dainiger, Storrer, Getz, Cartner, Kauber, Sorg, Kleinknecht, Trunkenbrod, Woerner, Baer, and Sinn. Some of our readers may want to take this opportunity to be near some ancestors, and to respectfully participate in this work project.

Lovely natural area

Traveling to and through Utah presents many beautiful sites of nature. The Salt Creek flowing alongside the cemetery ultimately empties into the Great Salt Lake. The land is fertile and the people are friendly. There is local interest in the preservation of this country cemetery, the last vestige of our Apostolic Christian Church in Tremonton, Utah. "O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?" 1 CORINTHIANS 15:55

Rural Gospel and Medical Missions of India (RGMMI)

A point of clarification In the February and March, 1997 issues of The Silver Lining, the background and history of our church's involvement with RGMMI were reported in some detail. This relationship continues to be strengthened, especially as we make occasional visits to inspect the work in India and as Director/Administrator, Dr. Parkhe visits our churches in the USA.

As mentioned in the articles, our church has full authority and control through spiritual counseling, administrative assistance, and financial support of RGMMI. In fact, this is the only mission activity or organization in India that has the Amadabad Indore approval of our Elder Body, Mission, and World Relief Committees.

In response to a number of questions that have been received, and hoping to clarify some misunderstandings regarding another organization in India called "Christian Love in Action" (founded by Lazarus Padale), there is no connection nor affiliation between the two. It is hoped that this distinction will be understood. Your questions are always appreciated.

Nurses' visit to India

On August 29, 1997 with the support of the Elder Body, we began our two week visit to India. This trip was to explore the possible future involvement of American medical staff to assist the Rural Gospel and Medical Mission of India.

After joining with Dr. and Mrs. Parkhe at Altadena, California, we flew 23 hours to Bombay, India. Nothing could have prepared us for the sights and the smell of India, yet we knew that God had brought us to this place, and we were excited to see what God had in store for the trip.

Treating the whole person

As we traveled to the rural areas, we could see how RGMMI is meeting the needs of the "whole" person both physical and spiritual. We were privileged to visit many of the congregations, boarding hostels, and medical clinics.



We observed the RGMMI medical staff provide healthcare without the "basic" technology that, as nurses here in America, we take for granted. We were privileged to see a nurse deliver a healthy infant boy in a tiny "birthing" room, separated from other patients by just a curtain.

It was easy to see how much the people of the rural areas need this medical care; many very sick patients walk for miles to see the doctor and receive medical treatment. It was so touching for us to see how by meeting these needs an opportunity opens up to bring the Gospel into those villages.

Participation in a seminar We were privileged to participate in a seminar with the three doctors. nurses, and lab technician that make up the medical staff of RGMMI. In this seminar, we shared some of our modern "basics" of health care and they shared with us some of their most common medical problems (malaria, leprosy, tuberculosis...). We learned so much from these seminars, and from all of our experiences in India.

Living with the people

We saw, did, ate, and smelled many new things in India, but of all these

things the spiritual darkness of the country was by far the biggest "shock" to us. Yet the light of God's work through RGMMI shines out so brightly. At every congregation we visited we were greeted by warm smiles and sincere love and gratefulness for the Apostolic Christian

The personal impressions

We are humbled and convicted to fervently pray for these believers as they strive to serve God in the midst of this very idolatrous nation.

We also want to express our sincere appreciation to you and for your prayers and support. We truly felt the Lord's protection and faithfulness throughout this trip!

HUNGARIAN CHURCH HISTORY

A new book is available through Apostolic Christian Publications, Eureka, Illinois, that depicts the development of the Froehlich-like church in Hungary.

This book is an account of how young Hungarian apprentices came under the preaching influence of Bro. Samuel H. Froehlich in Switzerland. They repented for their sins, became converted, and returned to Hungary and began teaching and preaching.

The book is entitled *The Nazarenes* (the name of the church with beliefs like ours in Hungary). It is an inspiring account of deeply devoted brethren who, amid much persecution, persevered in their beliefs and a new church was born. This church emphasized repentance, conversion, and godly order.

In the late 1800's, Karoly Eotvos, a native Hungarian, wrote the original manuscript. It was translated into English in 1965-66 by Joseph Csaba, a Hungarian professor who had spent a year or so in America teaching at Lincoln, NE.

The English translation, however, was difficult to read and existed for many years in only typewritten form. It had been translated into "broken-English", and proved to be hard to comprehend for today's reader.

Because the book's substance was so inspiring (and it was evident that

Details are given about Bro. Froehlich's life and ministry. Accounts are listed of how young men walked from Hungary to Switzerland and met with him.

It is a story of devotion, faithfulness and reverence for God. By relying totally on the Holy Spirit, and obeying the Bible's messages, humble brethren in Hungary were able to establish churches in the face of firm opposition from the state and the state church. It tells of how people were converted and thence used of God to promote the faith.

The fact that today we are having more correspondence and a greater connection with those of like mind and faith in Hungary makes this book compelling reading.

something to encourage us. It is a warning, yes! A chastisement, yes! It could be all those things, but it should also be an encouragement, because we have everything at our disposal to get to the end of the journey safely. We have everything we need and there's nothing left out! Again, so many times I think of that.

We, as human beings, try to do the best we can by the grace of God. We have various responsibilities in the church and in our work places. In our best intentions, it seems like we inevitably forget something or overlook something. We don't quite get the job done like we would like to do it. I apologize to you, as a church, because I know I do that. Never intentional, but it happens.

But when we think of God, that doesn't happen. It just doesn't happen, it hasn't happened. The plan is perfect and everything is in place. But it depends on us, doesn't it, as to whether we will take full advantage of what God has to offer us. We don't have to worry about any disappointments.

I think of a song, it is an old hymn, There's No Disappointment In Heaven. It just comes to my mind. How many times here upon this earth are we disappointed with things? Maybe sometimes we shouldn't be. I'm not saying it is always justified; perhaps, maybe a lot of times it is not. But there are times when we are disappointed in things, whether it is a product we buy or a service we get. We are disappointed.

There again that goes back to the human aspect of it because even though it may be a business, or whoever it is that is trying to do their level best, they still can't please everybody all the time. It is a human element that enters into the picture. On the other hand, maybe we are hard to satisfy. Maybe we just can't be satisfied. We've heard that before, too. Somebody will say, "Well, you can't satisfy them."

Again, that human element entering into the picture of disappointment and dissatisfaction. I guess there are lessons that we can learn, too, while we're thinking about that. You know the question we may have to ask ourselves is, "Am I hard to satisfy? Do I drive a hard bargain?" Then on the other hand of the picture, "Am I always trying to get the maximum out of my dollar?" There is a lot of things we could think about here and I didn't really think about speaking of that.

The part that I think is important is that with God there are no disappointments. I'm not saying things are always going to go good. Look at Job. We read about Job. We know that Job, even as we read in the Word, it says, "...that man was perfect and upright, and one that feared God, and eschewed evil." (Job. 1:1). He hated evil. In God's eyes, he was a perfect man. I don't know exactly to what extent that was, but God was satisfied with him. We can feel sure of that. God was satisfied with Job. We know the story well.

The devil said, "Sure he will be faithful to you because you protect him." God allowed the devil to bring those plagues upon Job. He allowed him to do that. Yet, Job, even though he went through very difficult times, in the end we know he was blessed even more than at the beginning.

So even though, beloved ones, there will be no disappointments with God, that doesn't mean we won't have to go through some difficult times in our lives. There are some very deep valleys sometimes and maybe some extremely high mountains that are very difficult to go across. But we have to remember. Christ went through those times, more than we could ever imagine. Christ went through those times. He went through the low places and He went through the very difficult places to get across. But, yet, He was faithful. He wanted the Father's will to be done.

Even though, as a human being, and we know it well where He prayed in the garden, He pleaded that this cup be removed from Him. Yet, in the same breath, He said, "...nevertheless not my will, but thine, be done." (Luke 22:42).

Beloved ones, I hope we can encourage each other to that end. You know, we are our brother's keeper, and there again, I hope I can be that to the whole body of believers and to the friends. I hope I can be that shepherd of all the sheep...the little, the big, the strong, the weak. It doesn't matter. Once we have made that commitment to walk with God, beloved ones, may it be that we will do this.

May it be that we will encourage each other in a loving way...that when our life is over, we can all be together in Heaven...that our life on earth won't have been in vain...that the grace of God won't have been in vain that He has given us...that our Lord's blood that He shed on the cross won't be in vain...and that there will be some return from that.

Would not that be terrible? When we think of Christ giving His life, shedding His blood, and when everything comes to an end, there would only just be a handful of those who had taken advantage of it. We know there are those already today that have gone before us many, many years ago, and many of the martyrs, and we are just confident that they will be in Heaven. Our race isn't run yet. It would be sad if there would just be a real small handful that were willing to deny themselves, to pick up their cross and follow our Lord.

He speaks here of Israel and he said: "For I bear them record that they have a zeal of God, but not according to knowledge. For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves unto the righteousness of God. For Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to every one that believeth." (Romans 10:2-4).

We have to be careful, don't we, that we don't establish our own righteousness? Because it tells us in the Bible that "...all our righteousness is as filthy rags." (Isaiah 64:6). What would we do with filthy rags? There is probably only one thing we can do with filthy rags. We can wash dirty ones, but filthy ones have to be cast into the fire; they are of no value. That is our own righteousness. That is what we can do. It is not nearly enough, is it?

It says here, "We have not submitted ourselves, (if that is the case), to the righteousness of God." I can just feel the righteousness of God and of Christ Jesus. I long for that full measure of righteousness of Christ. I hope we all have that longing, and we pray for it, and we accomplish that in our life. When we think about it, that is pretty much the final analysis of it_that we can be like Christ. He gave Himself for us. He died for us. He overcame the world. In Him, we can overcome the world.

When I speak of the world, I am speaking of all the things that Satan has to offer. Everything. Because it is not good. Everything that Satan has to offer is bad, evil and destructive. Beginning from the thoughts that Satan may have in our life and try to put in our mind, the evil thoughts, negative thoughts, the thoughts about other people, the conflicts, the strife, the worldliness that is around about us, anything, the snares that Satan has to offer, these are the things that by God's grace, we want to stay away from and overcome, so that we can have the mind of Christ.

It says here, "But the righteousness which is of faith speaketh on this wise, Say not in thine heart, Who shall ascend into heaven? (that is, to bring Christ down from above:)" Romans 10:6. I don't know exactly what this means, but I think sometimes as I look at our lives today, in society, there seems to be a tendency to bring Christ down to our level. I'm not sure exactly what this means here, but surely it can mean that, that we would bring Christ down to our level.

"Or, Who shall descend into the deep? (that is, to bring up Christ again from the dead.)" Romans 10:7. Christ is already arisen from the dead and dwelling with God in Heaven. I wonder here if this Scripture, as it speaks of faith, that we have faith in God to believe things the way they are, that we don't change things.

When we have faith in God, faith in the Word, faith in our Lord and Saviour and faith in His blood, then we know what is in place is right. We wouldn't change it. We wouldn't want to change it, would we? I hope not. I hope we wouldn't want to change anything that is in place from the Word and from the Spirit of God.

"But what saith it? The word is nigh thee, even in thy mouth, and in thy heart: that is, the word of faith, which we preach;" (Romans 10:8). Now, that is putting things in order. That is taking the Word and we are acknowledging the Word is the truth. It is infallible, it doesn't change, and within the Word is the key. The key to joy, and happiness, peace and life everlasting. It says here, "The Word is nigh." In other words, it is close to us and that is important. How can the Word be close to us?

First of all, we go back here to the second verse where it talks about the lack of knowledge. We need to read it, don't we? We need to read the Word. We need to apply the Word. We need to know what it says, but that is not enough.

We heard that in our Conference tapes a couple Wednesday evenings ago, that just knowing the Word is not enough. We can know the Bible from cover to cover and know exactly what all is in it, but, beloved ones, if we don't apply it, it is of no avail.

When you brothers who are farmers own a brand new piece of equipment, but you never use it, it is not going to do you any good for any of you. If we have something that we don't use, it is not going to do us any good. The Word is the same way. Yet, we need to know what it tells us. Why? Well, for one thing, so that we can have it established in our hearts and minds what is right and wrong, and the Spirit will help us in that--the Spirit of God. Because the Word and the Spirit are the same, they don't conflict. So we need to know what is right and wrong.

So, what else? I think an important thing, and no doubt it is important, because Christ used it in times of temptation. He actually, verbally, and mentally used the Word to overcome temptation. That is why it says here, "The Word should be nigh thee." It should be "...even in thy mouth, and in thy heart." (Romans 10:8). God's Word should be deeply implanted in our heart so that we know what we should do and shouldn't do and so the Spirit can prompt us and can tell us.

That is the faith that we speak about here...the righteousness which is of faith. So can't we really see what the difference is between our own righteousness and the righteousness of God? The righteousness of God is from the Word and the Spirit that dwells in our heart. It is not what we do. Sometimes it might be what we don't do, by the grace of God. It can be what we do, but it is by God's direction. That is the righteousness of faith based on the Word of God and on the Spirit of God. In what areas? All areas. I think that is the part, beloved ones, that becomes difficult. I really do. You know, I have mentioned that before, but I think that is the part that becomes difficult. When we think of the righteousness of God, it isn't only a pick and choose situation, but it encompasses everything.

We read in Ephesians we are to walk circumspectly and with a vision around us. We read we are to watch and pray. We are to apply the whole council to our life, every bit of it. That is the righteousness of faith. That is the righteousness of Christ. That is a real job, isn't it?

It really is, because we are all different. By nature some of us have virtues in this area or that area that are better than some of our other areas. We are all different. But to be able to take the whole council of God, to be able to apply it to our life and be able to be Christ-like, then that fulfills the righteousness of faith. May we be encouraged to do that.

We go on then here and it speaks of confession with the mouth, and the Lord Jesus. It says, "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." (Romans 10:9-10). Again, it goes to the heart, doesn't it? Every one of our hearts, and for the dear friends, it seems like we have read things in the past that has really brought this out.

When Christ said we need to deny ourselves, pick up our cross and follow Him, there are steps that need to be followed. For the dear friends today, there are steps that need to be followed. You can't follow Christ if you don't deny yourself. You can't follow Christ if you don't become one of His. You can't become His unless you repent and become converted.

So, as we read here, it is important that with the heart, man believeth. How can we believe with a heart that has not been cleansed? Christ has made that way possible that our heart can be cleansed so we can believe. We can have that Word in our heart and we can have the righteousness of Christ. So may it be, beloved ones, that we would all be encouraged to put on the Lord Jesus Christ. We read that. It simply says, "Put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ." (Romans 13:14). All of us. Brethren and friends alike.

Friends, if you haven't done that yet, it can be done. I just wish that the friends who walk yet, and I believe that there are many who are miserable and don't know what to do and which way to turn, I wish you would come to the foot of the cross. You will find the Lord Jesus is a merciful Saviour. He is a loving Shepherd and He just wants to take care of you. He wants you to be one of His sheep.

Haith of our Hathers

On a recent trip, a brother photographed a scene that is not often captured in a spontaneous photograph.

On a high hill stood a lone thistle that overlooked a pasture filled with sheep. In this photo, the shepherds, on horseback, were heading out to bring in the sheep.

The photo reminds us of the importance of acting upon our faith and how quickly we can become a thistle.

Beloved, a thistle has a very pretty flower and from a distance appears to be filled with natural beauty. However, we all know the nature of the thistle and why it stands alone, untouched and by itself in the pastures. No animal or human wants to encounter a thistle because of the tiny thorns. Is it possible to develop thorns in our lives, which would leave us standing alone on judgment day as the sheep are gathered into the fold?

So much is heard today about how we need to strive for unity in the Church. We all hope and pray that individual opinions will not become thorns and separate us from each other and the Word of God. We all want to be in the fold as it is gathered into Heaven.

Differing "opinions" can indeed become thorns, which stick and prick those that are around us if the opinions do not promote kindness, love, peace and unity. Opinions arise from our independent nature, and can be used to develop good trends as well as causing disunity. However, when we get stuck on promoting our opinions in the face of opposition, we create disunity and discord. Usually it is pride that causes us to vigorously promote our opinions.

One certainly can recognize opinions because most of them open like this:

I believe we should...

I don't care what anyone else says, I think...

No one understands the old way, so it stands to reason we should...



It would be best to ...

On the other hand, it is pretty easy to recognize a submissive, earnest opening to an expression. Some of those expressions may sound like this:

Here are some facts that I have laid out for us to...

In the Word of God we see a real good example of...

There is a higher power that outweighs my thought...

I yield to the superior thought of my colleague, however I do want to make this point...

Opinions are very often self serving and cause hurt even as the thistle with its thorns. As we view that thistle on a hillside, stop and consider the hurt if that thistle would represent you or me. With the different "opinions" comes the thorns. Is that being our Brother's keeper? Do the different opinions promote love and unity? We have the Word of God and we need to use it in all seasons. If we compromise with opinions, we will eventually affect convictions and that may lead to disaster within our faith and the Kingdom of God, which is within the converted soul.

One has to consider the faith of our fathers of the 1860's when the Civil War was devastating our "One Nation, under God," leaving many trials for those who lived during that period of history. It was this time frame wherein we seen brethren being invited into an area or location where maybe only one family had a desire to learn more about the truth that would set them free. Do we think that our old forefathers went into those future Church communities with "opinions" or "Biblical facts" as weaponry for the condemnation of Satan and sin?


No Man Can Serve Two Masters

REMEMBERING Our Spiritual Heritage

Excerpts from the Geistlich diary continue. It describes the visit of Elder Henry Geistlich to America in 1866.

Wednesday, June 6: At Croghan, N.Y. The weather is pleasant. Last night I slept good although I was awakened in the night by a heavy thunderstorm. We visited among the brethren today, among whom was Bro. Vetter, who used to live in Zurich. We found him and his wife and their four or five children in good health. We enjoyed seeing each other, talking about many things and happenings of the past in the old country. From there we went back to Peter Virkler, who is a brother of Joseph Virkler. There were quite a few brethren assembled here. We brothers talked about many things, our conversation going from one thing to another. Also, our song books were discussed and Bro. Joseph Virkler brought up the fact that some notes should be corrected and that there are also some misspelled words, especially in the new edition. We also talked about gross sinnings, about which I gave the brother a letter to read from B.M.B. of Switzerland. He recognized the spirit that was contained in the letter, as unclean and the writer of it impure. How good it is if we stay by the clear word of godly truth and daily gain through it with the godly grace, which in us and through us, serves our own, and to others salvation.

Thursday, June 7: At New Bremen, N.Y. Today I wrote a letter to Bro. Reuter. There was church both Wednesday and Thursday evenings in the church house which belongs to the congregation. The members here are quite numerous, living in a circle of about ten miles. It seems to me there is an active spiritual life among the brethren here. Much earnestness and zealousness can be seen among them, not only in the evening at church, but also in their doings from morning until night.

Friday, June 8: At New Bremen, N.Y.

The weather is cold and rainy. Today there was church at Naumburg, a place where there are many Germans. There is a nice church house here and they have a large assembly. However, to get here we had to go through a wild country through timber and woods. This region is like a wilderness with many log cabins yet standing, which the early settlers built. At the church services I had for my text (II Timothy, 1:5-12). With the help of the Lord it was given to me to speak with much joy. I had a good feeling in the spirit among these brethren. There is church every day. During the entire day there is church here and there in the houses.

Saturday, June 9: At Naumburg, N.Y. Bro. Vetter talked with me today concerning the Lord's supper and Holy kiss to them that are set back. Now concerning my spiritual work. God let me feel my poverty and my helplessness. I often felt weak as I saw the brethren assembled and fear came over me, but never did the Lord allow us to come to shame. If we recognize our nothingness and our infirmities, He then lets us see how rich and helpful He is, to all who call to Him. This I could feel when I was in doubt about what to speak, when the brethren were assembled. I opened the Bible and read a chapter. It came easy for me, as the Lord granted me to speak His Word abundantly. Therefore, God's Word is an unknowable treasure, a precious spring, from which many thirsty souls have drunk and refreshed themselves on the riches of His house and Holy temple. It is as St. John writes, "We have taken from his abundance grace for grace." It is and will be an abundance. It is an invisible stream of godly blessings. They are gifts and graces concealed in Christ. In all eternity this tree of life will not wither.

This godly wealth will not end for ever and ever. We can find in Revelation, Chapter 21, that the Holy City has an unmeasurable amount of wealth and riches, where the street is pure gold and its doors and gates are all garnished with all manner of precious stones such as jasper and sapphires and emerald, sardonyx and pearls. And that its glory and light is the Lamb, and the city has no need of the sun, neither of the moon to shine in it, for the glory of God does light it and the Lamb is the light thereof (verse 23). This is the land of which it says in a song:

"There is a pure land of wonder

Where the real joy exists

- Where hate and quarrel surrender
- Because there the love is."

By all this I thought that the new world, America (where I am now and for which many eagerly long for), is not that glorious land of wonder. But we shall rejoice in hope, for that new Jerusalem which is above.

Sunday, June 10: At New Bremen, N.Y. Weather fair, although somewhat cool. I was reminded today of my church at home, thinking of my dear ones, and how my brethren are getting along, both in body and soul. "God Washed My Feet" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

It was an ordinary Sunday morning, February 1, 1998, and I was reading from John 13 about Jesus washing His disciples' feet. It was our Sunday morning worship service. I was sailing along all right until I came to verse 8 where Jesus told Peter, "If I wash thee not, thou hast no part with me." Then I began to think, if that was true for Peter, it must be true for me, too. But when did Christ wash my feet?

In meditating on this scripture that Sunday morning, I concluded that Christ washed my feet when He died on the cross for me. Washing another person's feet is an act of humility and servitude. Christ, not being in human form at this time, can't very well wash my physical feet, unless He would do it vicariously through another human being. That might be, since we are to be His ambassadors (II Cor. 5:20), "Now then we are ambassadors for Christ," but I concluded that Christ Himself washed my feet when He died on the cross for me, since that is the extreme form of humility and servitude. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." (John 15:13)


Having concluded that Christ did indeed wash my feet, spiritually speaking, I was consoled that I do indeed have part with Him, I am associated with Him, and I belong to Him. Then, for some reason, the idea, "God Washed My Feet" popped into my mind. This seemed even more amazing than to say that Christ had washed my feet, since God the Father is the One to whom Christ prayed and He is the ultimate.

In Corinthians 5:19 we read, "To wit, that God was in Christ, reconciling the world unto himself." Therefore, God was in Christ, spiritually speaking, and I can say that God washed my feet, that God, when in human form, died for me. This is impressive, this is overwhelming. What can I give up and what can I do, to show appreciation? It's a question which confronts us all, if we really believe and aren't just going through the formality of being a Christian, or a child of God. At least for me, it is an important question which must be answered. Will you help me find the answer?

Jesus said, "Ye also ought to wash one another's feet." Then I should be willing to wash your feet, or I should be willing to die for you. Is there anything I can do for you which would help me fulfill my calling? The Bible teaches that we should be willing to die for one another. No more of this self-centeredness. After all, God washed my feet and I am to follow in His footsteps. We are all in this position.

On the surface, to be in this position of needing to follow God to such an extent, sounds like a heavy burden, but it is not. To be in this position and to go this way is to attain to the abundant life which Christ spoke about. "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." (John 10:10)
