"BE SANCTIFIED BY FAITH IN GOD"

Sermon by Bro. Robert Beebe, South Bend, IN

Job 1 and Acts 26

"Then said Agrippa unto Festus, This man might have been set at liberty, if he had not appealed unto Caesar." (Acts 26:32). Yet, Paul was at liberty, was he not? If you think of the situation Paul was in, he was the freest of all the names of all the people that we read up here.

Here we've seen the kings and rulers sitting upon the places of authority and, yet, the one that had freedom—the freedom that is going to really mean anything for all eternity—was Paul. He was the one who stood before them with chains about his legs. He was the one who was at liberty.

Do we understand, each of us who have been redeemed, and know that freedom comes only as we are humbled and repent as we turn to Almighty God? Certainly that is what the Apostle Paul is trying to share with those that were listening to him, that his life and all that he went through, all the times even when he was angry and trying to destroy other people in doing what he had a zeal for, did not bring him a joy and a peace like he was having even in this very time when he was talking to Agrippa and Festus, that he was the one who was free and at libertv.

They were the ones that were in bondage. It just shows to us that when we look about, we see other people. What we see on the surface is not the way they really are. It is not the way God sees them. Certainly there is only One that can really judge and can really determine what we are like.

We can be in America and have as much wealth as possible to gain, but we can be slaves and we can be a servant of Satan and we can be going to hell. Certainly that is the way it is for so many people in our country. Having all that could possibly be imagined by the rest of the world, and yet, be in such a despicable, such a despondent and such an awful way with no hope.

We could be the poorest person in the poorest country and have nothing, have an empty stomach and have such poor circumstances, and yet, be at liberty, have a hope and have an assurance of life eternal

When we look at those who we work with, and when we look at those about us, we don't know what is in their hearts, but God does. We can sense from this chapter that God was judging. God had judged Paul. God had shown to him that the way he was going was not right, and God had given him an opportunity to repent. How thankful we are that we can read and understand in God's Word that repentance is so important.

I have heard it said by someone not even of the Apostolic Christian Church that repentance is the bed rock of Christianity. Repentance is the bed rock of Christianity. Without a repentance, without a turning away from ourselves to God, there can be no hope. Repentance, though, doesn't save us, does it? It is the bed rock of Christianity, but it doesn't save us because nothing that we do can save us. Isn't that an irony? Isn't that a conflict on our lives?

We think—especially we here in America—that if we are going to have something or if we are going to get something, we have to do it ourselves. But when it comes to our faith and when it comes to understanding God's Word and God's way for logic to find it, we can't do it. There is nothing of our effort that can ever save us.

There is a song that says, "Could our tears forever flow or could our efforts no languor know." In other words, we could just continually work. We could have the zeal of Elijah. We could roll tears all our lives, but that is not going to pay for salvation. It could never earn us salvation. It could never build up an account for our salvation.

How thankful we are as we see here in this chapter, that it is what God did and what Jesus Christ did. We think of what Paul experienced that had life. When we think of how he started and how he was such a Pharisee, "...that after the most straitest sect of our religion I lived a Pharisee." (Acts 26:5).

Of all the Jews' ways and all their sects and all their different organizations, the Pharisees were the straightest. It was the strictest. It was the most determined to do that which was right by the letter of the law. That is the way he lived. But he was saying, "That didn't help me. That didn't save me."

Listening With the Heart

"My son, attend to my words; incline thine ear unto my sayings" (Prov. 4:20). In a world that is crying to be heard, the skill of listening is sorely needed. Much effort is put forth to try to teach communication skills but so often the need to listen is not emphasized enough.

To assure good communication, the first requirement, of course, is that the message being sent is crystal clear. "And even things without life giving sound, whether pipe or harp, except they give a distinction in the sounds, how shall it be known what is piped or harped? For if the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself to the battle?" (I Cor. 14:7-8). The message of salvation must be sent clearly and in a manner that it cannot be confused with the sounds of the world.

A clear message, however, is only the beginning. There must also be receptive, discerning hearers. We have a duty to learn how to listen to more than words. Effective listening requires us to try to understand the message that the speaker is trying to convey.

Spiritual deafness is the result of choosing to not listen to the voice of the Lord. Men have long refused to listen to the message that God has for His people. "Son of man, thou dwellest in the midst of a rebellious house, which have eyes to see, and they see not; they have ears to hear, and hear not: for they are a rebellious house" (Ez. 12:2). Zechariah reported a similar concern when he wrote "But they refused to hearken, and pulled away the shoulder, and stopped their ears, that they should not hear" (Zec. 9:11).

Spiritual deafness did not end with the coming of the Saviour. There were still those who chose not to listen to the message of salvation.

After Stephen gave his defense of the gospel to the council, those who heard what he said, chose to remain spiritually deaf. "Then they cried out with a loud voice, and stopped their ears, and ran upon him with one accord,..." (Acts 7:57). Paul, while in Rome awaiting his trial, reminded those to whom he spoke that Esaias prophesied years before that there would be spiritual deafness when he said "...Go unto this people and say, Hearing ye shall hear, and shall not un-

derstand; and seeing ye shall see and not perceive: For the heart of this people is waxed gross, and their ears are dull of hearing;..." (Acts 28:26-27).

The cure for spiritual deafness is faith in the shed blood of Jesus Christ. We need to be sure we do not intentionally stop our ears and deny ourselves the opportunity for salvation.

Refusing to hear the Word of God is only part of the problem. After we have heard the gospel message and to a degree understand it and apply it to our lives, we need to take the time to listen to those who are around us. We especially need to listen to those who are hurting.

Job's three friends did well by going to him and spending time with him at his time of extreme difficulty. For seven days they sat and mourned with him. This was undoubtedly a great comfort to Job as he tried to deal with his grief.

Although Job's friends went to him with the best of intentions, as soon as Job began to express his grief and to unload his burden, his friends began to accuse him of wrong doing. Although they may have heard the words that Job spoke, they did not listen with their hearts. The dialogue went on for some time throughout Chs. 3-15 in the book of Job. Job finally said "I have heard many such things: miserable comforters are ye all. Shall vain words have an end? or what emboldeneth thee that thou answerest? I also could speak as ye do: if your soul were in my soul's stead, I could heap up words against you and shake mine head at you. But I would strengthen you with my mouth, and the moving of my lips would assuage your grief" Job 16:2-5).

If only his friends would have taken the time to hear his grief. They would have been in a much better position to help him. When someone is in great distress, it is not the time to heap accusations upon them. It is the time to listen to their grief, to offer comfort and compassion and to listen with the heart. If in the course of listening it becomes apparent that there is sin or wrong doing in the life of the one who is sharing their grief, it must be dealt with at the appropriate time but perhaps not at that moment. If we can gain their confidence by showing we care, we will be in a much better position to help them.

Jesus taught us about the importance of listening with a discerning ear. When his disciples asked him why he spoke to the people in parables He said "For this people's heart is waxed gross, and their ears are dull of hearing But blessed are your eyes for they see: and your ears for they hear" (Mt. 13:15-16). They listened carefully to what the Lord Jesus Christ was saying and they listened to more than merely the words which were spoken. They listened to the meaning and to the importance of the message Christ was providing them.

Careless listening and the problem of hearing words but not the message is a frequent problem. "And lo, thou art unto them as a very lovely song of one that hath a pleasant voice, and can play well on an instrument: for they hear thy words, but they do them not" (Ez. 33:32).

Paul cautioned against just hearing what we want to hear. "For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine: but after their own lusts shall they heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears; and they shall turn away their ears from the truth, and shall be turned unto fables" (II Tim. 4:3-4).

When we listen to someone, we need to focus our attention on what is being said. Many times instead of really listening to the other person, we are trying to decide what we are going to say when they have finished speaking. As a result, we do not really know what they said and may respond in a totally inappropriate manner.

We can improve our listening skills if we listen actively. Look at the person who is speaking, if possible. Make sure they know we are listening to them. We may need to kindly ask a few questions to be sure we understand what they are saying. We may also need to encourage them to give more details and to reflect upon what they have said to be sure it accurately represents the situation. Above all we need to learn to listen with our heart, with compassion, with our minds focused upon what is being said so the one who is speaking knows we truly care about them.

North American Church Building Fund

Building Advisory Committee

Over two years ago, the Mission Committee appointed a National Building Advisory Committee (BAC), which was approved by the Elder body.

The purpose of the committee is to assist local congregations as they consider building projects. Members are Bros: Brad Eisenmann (Chicago) Chairman, Wayne Grimm (West Bend, IA) Sec.-Treas., Bill Masters (Bloomington, IL), Orin Rufener (Rittman, OH), and Bob Schieler (Goodfield, IL). Counseling Elders are Bros. Phil Stettner and Gene Marti.

Available to all congregations

These brothers have been helpful in working with small congregations such as Atlanta, Prescott, Kitchener, Portland, as well as several others. However, their guidance is not offered just to small or beginning churches, but also to assist in church building for the entire brotherhood, whether the congregation is large or small.

How does a

congregation proceed?

So often a new congregation begins when a few brethren move into a given area. This is quite consistent with the spread of our faith over many decades, and we do our best to support these groups as they grow and need a place to worship in.

Finally there comes a point where they need to provide a permanent place of assembly, and are faced with the problem of how they can pay for it. What should they do next?

Brethren counsel together

After discussion of this matter among themselves, the Mission Committee brought the subject to the entire Elder body. Their recommendation was that we should establish a North American Church Building Fund to further the effort.

Purpose of this fund

For many years we have used our European Church Building Fund to assist our brethren in Europe to finance houses of worship in several countries. Actually several million dollars have passed through this fund and without this help, church buildings could not have been constructed or repaired in these areas.

We are very thankful that the Lord has provided that assistance could be given in Europe, but we also feel there is a need here in the United States to assist our new or needy congregations. This is the purpose of the North American Church Building Fund.

The source of the money

In years gone by, our Brotherhood Assistance Programs were created and used to cover losses incurred from misfortunes. After prayerful consideration and much discussion, it was agreed that these programs should terminate. It was also agreed that \$4,000,000 from the reserves of these Assistance Programs be transferred to the North American Building Fund. The administration will be by joint counsel of the Mission Committee, BAC, and the Elder body.

Small congregations

The brethren hope to use some of this money as grants to small or needy congregations that need help in providing a place of worship.

Local congregations who feel they could qualify should proceed according to the following method. The information printed here is very general, and specific needs should be forwarded to the BAC at the address listed at the end of this article.

- The first step is approval by the local brethren and elder, after which the BAC can become involved. They will assist in developing a plan for building or remodeling a suitable facility.
- The BAC will assist in the development of a financial plan. Members and friends of the congregation will be asked to estimate the amount they hope to contribute over the next 5 years.
- The local congregation must be incorporated and legal documents submitted for approval to the Mission Committee.
- Approved projects will be financed from the Fund as needed to supplement local resources.
- As contributions come in after the project is complete, wherever possible, money should be returned to the national fund so that other congregations can also benefit from this program.

Established congregations

Loans from this fund may be approved for congregations that have a building or remodeling project but are not eligible for a grant from the fund. These loans should be of a relatively short duration, normally no more than 5 years. Loans must be approved by the above channels, with a reasonable rate of interest being charged.

In recent years, members of the European Board have been able, by God's mercies and the support of our American brethren, to visit our brothers and sisters in Europe. Through reports in this paper as well as in slide programs, we endeavor to keep you informed.

Letters from Romania

Each month as the food packages go out among the needy brethren in Romania, we receive letters of appreciation from those recipients.

We would like to tell our supporters that things are getting better, but the truth is that they are not. This is true not only in Romania, but across Eastern Europe. This is confirmed by other groups such

as Christian Aid Ministries and Iron Curtain Ministries who assist us in making the work possible. We grope for solutions to the great problems, but trust in God who is able to do all things through Christ who strengthens us.

A great many letters have come to

us as a result of the food packages. We want to print just a few of them here to let our readers know how great the need is and how it is received. Many Romanian homes have no indoor plumbing or central heat-

Then he was zealous. He took all these that were trying to undermine the authority of the Pharisees, and he was going to see that they were in prison. He was going to see that they were put away. Did that bring him hope? Did that bring him salvation? No. It took repentance on the part of Paul.

Certainly we look at Paul's experience at not only being blind, not only being stopped in his way, but spending those days in blindness in Damascus. Then having to humble himself before the other brethren and going there to live in Arabia for up to two years to be taught and have his mind prepared for the work that he was going to have to do, that is repentance, isn't it? I guess, you might say, it took Paul a long time to repent, didn't it?

Some go through it in a two, three, four or six month period. It took Paul maybe almost like two years before he was really ready to do God's work. It kind of scares us, doesn't it, and humbles us? It scares us and makes us really want to do what God would have us to do.

We are so used to looking at, sometimes, such a big picture that we forget to see that He just wants us to take a step, Today just take one step. One step and then another, then another, then another and pretty soon we have a life of faith committed to Him. It comes by just taking the step that He wants us to take each day.

That certainly was what Paul was sharing with Agrippa and Festus that the first step we need to do is to repent. We need to be broken. We need to be humble. We must be willing to shed tears for what we have done to hurt God, and what we have done to hurt Jesus Christ. We really hurt Him, didn't we? We hurt Him badly. We hurt Him so bad that He died. Our sins nailed Him to that Cross.

I have heard it said that when you go to Heaven, we are going to have

glorified bodies and we are going to have no scars. The only scars that we will see in Heaven are the scars upon Jesus Christ.

That is going to humble us even there to think that because of those scars in His hands, His feet and His side, because of those scars, we are there. Because of those scars, we are permitted to be there in His presence...to be there in the choir and sing with the angels and do whatever we want to do or we are going to do in Heaven. Because, of the scars, we have a hope that we will be there. We hurt Him. We need to repent. We need to picture Him and we need to visualize all that we have done.

The Apostle Paul had a lot to remind him of how sinful he was. He was even willing and able to tell those there that day, Agrippa and Festus, what he had done. It really had to hurt, would it not, to say, "I punished them oft in every synagogue, and compelled them to blaspheme;" (Acts 26:11). Can you imagine Paul saying that? Imagine us saying what we have done wrong to our elder. We have to do it if we want to be cleansed and we want to be free.

"I...compelled them to blaspheme; and being exceedingly mad against them, I persecuted them even unto strange cities." (Acts 26:11). Before that, he said, "...when they were put to death, I gave my voice against them." (Acts 26:10). He was able to say that even though it hurt. It hurt deeply because he knew that Jesus had forgiven him. Jesus and the Almighty God had forgiven him for all he had done.

The same forgiveness is available today. How do we receive the forgiveness for all we have done...no matter what it is...no matter how extensive our sin has been...no matter how wrong we've been...no matter how it hurts us and how it embarrasses us...no matter how it just causes such an uncomfortable

feeling that we don't want to think about it?

We know that God loves us so much that He will forgive us all of our sins if we come and confess them and say we are sorry and repent. Repentance is this very bed rock of our conversion experience. That is to say we are sorry. That repentance and that confession is so vital! It has to be! Anybody in any church in any faith that would try to say that we can't and we don't have to do it, is going to lead that soul and lead those souls to sin and to hell.

Because if Satan's power is not broken in an individual life, there cannot be a hope. There cannot be freedom or liberty. The Apostle Paul was at liberty, yet in chains. He was at liberty because he had confessed, because he repented, and because he had been converted.

Oh, we would like to make it easier and make it different. We would like to do it our way, but it doesn't bring the freedom and repentance. It doesn't bring the liberty of God's way for us.

How thankful we are that if we follow God's plan, we will be blessed by God. If we follow man's plan, we are blessed by man, and look what kind of blessings we have in this life. If we call them blessings, we almost wonder how can it work out so poorly?

Last night we talked about Haiti. This morning there was an article in the paper about Haiti. I was kind of shocked because as I read it, I found out that Haiti is worse today than it was three years ago. Our government, the United Nations, went in and said, "We are going to try to make things a little better. We are going to bring back a democracy." Today there is more unemployment, there is more starvation, and the roads are worse. Our country has pumped in one billion dollars into that nation; but the people are worse.

Just another token and another

example. A man does it man's way and it isn't going to work out. Individually, if men do it men's way, it is not going to work out. It is not.

If we do it God's way and if we do it according to God's Word and we do it according to the Spirit of God leading us, it will be that all our efforts will be blessed of God. That certainly does humble us, does it not, because how many of us think that we are doing God's way? "Well, I am going to do it a little bit my way because I think He is leading me this way."

How many times have we heard. "God told me this. God has told me that." You say that to somebody and they might say, "Tell me how did God speak to you. How did you know that was God's way? How did you sense that was God's leading?" Listen to the answer of those people and dwell upon it and weigh it according to God's Word. Weigh it according to God's Spirit leading you. How blessed we are, each and every one of us, brothers and sisters, that we have God's Holy Spirit to help us to discern the spirits and help us to discern all that is going about us.

If we really realize what a blessing we have and really realize what a talent God has given to us to discern the spirits, we would use that Spirit more and listen to that Spirit more. We would rely on that Spirit more and we would be blessed more of God.

I can't help but think that as Paul is speaking here to Agrippa and Festus, God's Holy Spirit is leading him to share how he had been wrong and how he had done that which was wrong and it had led to madness. Now here they are telling him that he is mad because he learned so much.

Agrippa couldn't discern. Agrippa didn't have that discernment of the Holy Spirit, did he? Paul is telling him earlier that he was exceedingly mad against the believers of the gospel. Later on as he is

sharing the gospel and of Jesus Christ coming and of all that Christ had to suffer and that there is salvation through Christ, Festus turned to Paul and said, "Paul, thou art beside thyself, much learning doth make thee mad." (Acts 26:24).

That just shows to us how we cannot rely upon the discernment of others about us that have not been converted. We would often like to have people give us their claim and give us their comments and give us their acknowledgments, but let us be very, very careful if it is people who have not been converted. Their discernment is very likely to be very, very wrong.

Certainly we see that as nations are trying to come to grips with all kinds of problems in other nations. We see the world is in such a turmoil and we see our leaders and other leaders trying to solve these turmoils. Does it work out usually? No.

I just remember a few years ago when these two leaders in the Middle East were shaking hands and our president was right there and we thought maybe this was going to be the start of the end of the age when there is going to be this peace in the Middle East, in Israel. But we see it is not working out because man is doing it.

In so many of our domestic situations and problems, when man tries to solve it, it doesn't work out. You would think by now with our minds, with our abilities and with our technology, what can we do? Just think of what we can do! In science, medicine, and space exploration, we can't solve the very basic problems of life. In fact, it seems that we are going the wrong way, and we are if we don't have the Spirit of God to lead us.

So let us even realize and learn from this and be encouraged that we have, if we have been redeemed, the Spirit of God within us to help us to discern the spirits and help us be the kind of person we should be. When we are confronted with others that have differences with us, how do we handle it? How do others handle it? We can sense there is so much we have to grow into, don't we? We have to learn to be able to discern. We need to pray for discernment. We need to pray for the spirit of Elijah.

Certainly the Apostle Paul as he was preaching and talking, I probably wouldn't consider it a sermon here, but he was talking to Agrippa and Festus. It got to the point where this King Agrippa was under such conviction that he turns to Paul and said, "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." (Acts 26:28).

Certainly those are very sad words, aren't they, to be convicted but not act upon the conviction? We look at this and think, "Yes, isn't that the way the world is? Isn't that the way the world has been so many times for so many people?" There are people here today. There are those of you, ladies and gentlemen. that are like this. You are convicted. You know that you have sin and you know that you need to confess it. You know that you need peace of heart and mind. You know you need to break through and you know you need to let go and let God.

You are almost there. Maybe next week. Maybe this week sometime I will talk to the elder. Maybe next week. Maybe after school is done. Maybe when my children are raised. Maybe whatever. Yet, if you don't, you are lost. If something happens today, none of us know even in the future of a second from now, you would be lost in eternity. You would be lost into hell. It was designed for Satan and not for you. Not for mankind, but for Satan. You think about what kind of a person Satan is, and the kind of personality Satan has.

Look back at the first chapter in Job and doesn't it just make you so upset to think of what a personality he has. Just think how he is sneak-

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ing in there when God and His angels are there. "Now there was a day when the sons of God came to present themselves before the LORD, and Satan came also among them." (Job 1:6).

So God said, "Where did you come from?" "Oh, I am just walking around on earth." Can't you just picture that is what is happening today? First Satan says, "I am going to and fro in the earth, and from walking up and down in it." (Job 1:7). Can't you just imagine that is what is happening today? We can just picture it so clearly. It is so evident that Satan is going to and fro and up and down and he is going to see whom he can tempt and destroy.

Just think what type of personality he has. We need to consider Satan. When we are thinking of these messages and this chapter, we see the love of God. We see the plan of salvation. We see the steps we need to take. We also need to see the enemy of our souls. We certainly see him going to and fro. God said the same thing, "Have you considered Job how good he is?"

When we think of Job as being perfect and upright and he fears God and eschews evil, we think, "My, that is not me. So maybe God would not tempt me like He did Job." Well, the lesson is for us to realize what Satan has done.

Here he is and says, "Oh, yes, Job is good because You have built a hedge about him and You have honored all his efforts and You have given him all kinds of substances.

He would curse You. If You took that away, he would curse You to Your face." Just think of the evils of Satan to say that. He said, "Job isn't any better than anyone else. He is just good because You have given him so many things."

God said, "That is not really so. You can test him if you want, but it is not so." Just think of Satan willing to test him. Think of all he did then to Job through the book of all the things that Satan did to Job.

Let us stop and think of what Satan is doing today to you and me. If you haven't been redeemed, you are a servant of Satan. If you haven't been redeemed or repented, you are a slave and a servant to that personality, to that being, to that power. You might think, "Oh, no, I don't have that kind of personality to control me." Yes, you do.

He is the prince of the power of the air and you don't recognize him as being all this evil that we read in the book of Job. He is going to be showing you all kinds of things that seem good. It will seem right. We have shared in the Word of God that he is like an angel of light. He is like a wolf in sheep's clothing, but he goes about like a roaring lion seeking whom he can devour.

At the conference this year, one of the elders shared how if there was a lion out in the parking lot, if there was a roaring lion out there, we would not just walk out to our cars. We would find out where he is and make sure we were away from him and try to get him captured. We would be afraid. We would have a

reason for adrenaline and for fear. Satan is out there and he is just like that roaring lion; he is going to devour you. He is going to destroy. He wants to.

That is the kind of personality and power that Satan has. How could any of us want to live under his power? How could any of us want to live in that danger of being destroyed and being tormented in hell because of him? Yet, we go about doing it if we don't repent now, if you don't repent today, if you don't turn to God, if we just say, "Almost I am convinced. Almost I am afraid of Satan. Almost I want to turn to God." That is not going to do it.

It has to be that we completely do it. That is what God honors. God honored that in Paul. God honored the ability to humble Himself to Job. God has honored that in so many thousands and hundred thousands of millions of people, and He can do it for you. Anyone that will repent and turn to God with a humble and a contrite heart, God will not turn away from you because God loves you, each and every one of us.

Certainly we see in this chapter the love of God and the mercy of God. How could we not want to come to Him? Run to Him and be thankful to Him because we are not going to find any help or any hope in this world, in man's devises and man's ways. It has to be according to God's plan.



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

Then the strangers heard the man of agony say in such a loving tone, "Verily I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with me in paradise."

As the strangers stood and lis-

tened, they began to doubt if this kindly man was guilty of anything. He did not struggle at the cross, which was slowly crushing the breath from His lungs. That man of agony hung from the cross for a greater purpose than punishment it was sure, they thought. And then their hearts were crushed as they seen Him look down upon His mother. There was someone about His age standing by her with a great love for the one who hung upon the cross and the man of agony said, "Woman, behold thy son!" Then He said to the young man beside her, "Behold thy mother!" In that day and time it was not known to those



who did not know the Son of God, that John, who stood by the Lord's mother, should take care of her until she should pass on.

It was almost noon when something strange started to happen. It was getting dark! Everyone was fearful and all the railing upon the man called Jesus stopped. He was so weak and slowly dying. But for what did He die the two strangers thought as they watched the man of agony stand for a while with the

SAKEN ME?" And the stranger said, "Is God forsaking Him?" "No," said the bystander, "it is the fulfillment of the Holy Scriptures that all of this had to take place." By this time the strangers were weeping and felt so sorrowful for the Christ of Calvary. And then Jesus spoke one last time, "Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit," bowed His head, and gave up the Ghost.

The next thing that happened, in the darkness of the mid afternoon, was almost more than the strangers could withstand. Since the next day was the Sabbath, the Jews did not want the bodies hanging, so the soldiers were ordered to break the legs of those hanging on the cross, which in turn brought about their quick death, since they

could not raise themselves to breathe. But when they came to Jesus, He was already dead. To make sure, they pierced His side and out flowed blood and water. This blood that flowed from the body of Christ was for the healing of the nations and the remission of sin for all mankind.

The strangers watched as a rich young man who also was an honourable counsellor, Joseph of Arimathæa by name, come and receive the Lord's body and walked slowly away to the burial place where never was man lain.

Who were these two strangers who looked on as the events of Good Friday unfolded and found themselves believing in a Saviour who was willing to leave the splendor of Heaven, take upon Himself flesh and blood, preach the doctrine of

salvation, die upon the cross, enter into the bosom of the earth, preach to the captives of time past, and rise to Glory and Majesty on the right hand of God. Yes, those two strangers were you and me as we strive to take our heart and mind to the Cross of Calvary.


To finish this story, could we join with the two men, who traveled on the road to their home in Emmaus, and imagine that we are walking beside them. And, behold, two of them went that same day to a village called Emmaus, which was from Jerusalem about threescore furlongs.

And they talked together of all these things which had happened. And it came to pass, that, while they communed together and reasoned, Jesus himself drew near, and went with them. But their eyes were holden that they should not know him. And he said unto them, What manner of communications are these that ye have one to another, as ye walk, and are sad? And the one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answering said unto him, Art thou only a stranger in Jerusalem, and hast not known the things which are come to pass

there in these days? And he said unto them, What things? And they said unto him, Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, which was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people: And how the chief priests and our rulers delivered him to be condemned to death, and have crucified him.

But we trusted that it had been he which should have redeemed Israel:

and beside all this, to day is the third day since these things were done. Yea, and certain women also of our company made us astonished, which were early at the sepulchre; And when they found not his body, they came, saying that they had also seen a vision of angels, which said that he was alive. And certain of them which were with us went to the sepulchre, and found it even so as the women had said: but him they saw not.

Then he said unto them, O fools, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken: Ought not Christ to have suffered these things, and to enter into his glory? And beginning at Moses and all the prophets, he expounded unto them in all the scriptures the things concerning himself. And they drew nigh unto the village, whither they went: and he made as though he would have gone further. But they constrained him, saying, Abide with us: for it is toward evening, and the day is far

spent. And he went in to tarry with them.

And it came to pass, as he sat at meat with them, he took bread, and blessed it, and brake, and gave to them. And their eyes were opened. and they knew him; and he vanished out of their sight. And they said one to another. Did not our heart burn within us, while he talked with us by the way, and while he opened to us the scriptures?

And they rose up the same hour, and returned to Jerusalem, and found the eleven gathered to-

gether, and them that were with them, Saying, The Lord is risen indeed, and hath appeared to Simon. And they told what things were done in the way, and how he was known of them in breaking of bread.

Today yet He cries out even as He did in that day and time, "He that believeth on me, believeth not on me, but Him that sent me." And again He calls to all mankind, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand: repent ye, and believe the Gospel."



Excerpts from the diary of Elder Henry Geistlich, Milan, Switzerland, continue. He visited all the American churches in 1866.

Monday, June 11: New Bremen, NY. Today we had a conversation. Several brothers and I visited about the order of our church. We also talked about Matthew 18:5-7. Of these things I cannot write here.

Tuesday, June 12: Naumburg, NY. Yesterday there was a burial of a person who did not belong to church. Here in America people who do not belong to church are buried in the cemetery of the faithful which is either beside or nearby the church house. Both members and unbelievers attended the funeral. The church house was filled. The brothers told me that the unbelievers came mostly out of curiosity because they know there is a preacher here from Switzerland. There are many settlers who are German. There was a church service before the burial and as I preached the sermon. I opened for my text to I Peter 1:24-25. "All flesh is as grass and all the glory of man as the flower of grass, but the Word of the Lord endureth forever." The Lord inspired me to speak. After the sermon was the burial, along with singing and praying.

Wednesday, June 13: Croghan, NY. I was surprised at the eagerness which the brethren showed, the church house always being filled. In this manner the brethren here have it much nicer than we in Europe. They are able to assemble through the week, as they are less pressed with timely things. For the most part, they have lived here for a long time and are now nearly all well to do, having made good, as in earlier times the land was as low as \$5 an acre and now it is about \$20 or more. They also have a good market and get a high price for their produce.

Thursday, June 14: Croghan, NY. Today at noon a sister was taken up.

There were many brethren present, as well as others who have made a beginning in working out their soul's salvation. It pleased me very much that one could accomplish such a thing in broad daylight, which we in Europe cannot do. The brothers demanded of me that I execute the baptism, so I baptized the sister in a nearby stream, praying over her in the water. Something I had not done for a long time, it being a special blessing for me. How wonderful it would be if we in Europe could enjoy this blessing. The sister who was taken up had to go through very much, first belonging to the English Baptist Church in New York, later to the Jean Ashman Church in New York and now at last the Lord brought her to the right church, because she was sincere. Those that are sincere, the Lord will let suc-

Friday, June 15: Croghan, NY. This morning at Croghan, I left for Mansfield, OH accompanied by two brothers and a sister. At 4 a.m. the brethren took us a short way, until we came to a river, where we boarded a steamship. We went through an unsettled region. I had to think of what a wilderness this is compared to Switzerland, one seeing only timber and brush, much swamp land and many log houses. After leaving the steamboat, we took a stagecoach to Bonville, where we boarded a train (on the New York Central RR) going through the State of New York to Buffalo and then on to Cleveland. OH: Erie. PA; and Mansfield. These were the most important places through which we went. The entire trip took us through a rather wild country. I thought that I would not care to live here. In Cleveland, there was alot of noise.

Sunday, June 17: Mansfield, OH. Today I am in Mansfield. Dear Bro. Joseph Bella was here in Mansfield. He met us Saturday evening at the depot. I had to weep as I saw him; I was so stricken. There was church in the forenoon and

again in the afternoon. For my text, I read St. John 4th chapter. We stayed by brethren Muller and Sorg, from Sunday until Tuesday. These were blessed days. How precious it is if the hearts find themselves in the love of Christ, especially in a strange land as this is. Here I met several brethren from Bern and other places in Switzerland. I was able to enjoy myself very much. Bro. Land reminded me of the time when the church in Bern was first established. We also talked about Bro. Hine, who at that time had to go through much suffering in Bern. O, how one can enjoy himself in the midst of brotherly love. It does not extinguish the love one has for his earthly land of birth for we all love to talk of our old earthly fatherland, as America is America and not Switzerland.

Monday, June 18: Mansfield, OH. Weather rainy and cold. Today I wrote a letter home to my dear wife and brethren. I must think, how long must I wait until I receive one from them. Mansfield is a city which is just being built up. The brethren here have their own nice church house. The world people here call them the "stupid Swiss" and their church house the "Swiss church". There is a rather small congregation here with plenty of room in the church house. I had for my text this afternoon Isaiah 61, which saith, "the Spirit of the Lord is upon me because he has anointed me to preach the Gospel to the poor."

"The Resurrection and Wealth"

Every year the richest person in the world is announced. It used to be a Japanese person, but all that has changed and it is now Americans who top the list. I don't expect to be a candidate to be named the richest person in the world because they mistakenly figure in dollars. If they were figuring spiritual treasure, I would announce my candidacy. You, too, should be a candidate.

No doubt about it, we are rich. The Bible says so. "For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich." (II Cor. 8:9)
