I am the Rose of Sharon

"JESUS CAME TO GIVE US VICTORY"

Sermon by Bro. Douglas Wagenbach, San Diego, CA

Joshua 2:1-21 and Luke 4:1-22

This portion of Scripture that we read is the beginning of Jesus' ministry. This, being just after the holidays, we have read and thought about Jesus' birth, and His parents from Nazareth who made that journey to Bethlehem. Nazareth was perhaps not the seat of religion and for Him to come back to this hometown of His and to open up the Word, as He was given opportunity, to read that prophesy in Isaiah and then sit down, we can only imagine what the reaction was, as we read it here.

"Is not this Joseph's son?" (Luke 4:22). "Isn't this the kid we went to school with? Isn't this the kid that played in our back yards? Isn't this the kid that worked in the carpenter's shop? How could this be what He has just said?"

'We can' ιοόκ' back and nave some hind-sight because we are not there and we are not part of that community, and we can say, "Why didn't you accept? Why didn't you recognize the miracles? Why didn't you recognize the great things He has done and the prophecies that were fulfilled? If you would have gone back and read Micah, you would have seen that He was born in Bethlehem, as was told."

He didn't get it, and we are no different than this community of Nazareth and our response to Jesus. We often make excuses and come to conclusions that are not based on the truth.

We heard this morning: the truth is absolutely critical. Even the chapter we read this morning, my first reaction as we opened it was, "Is that the chapter we really want to read in church?" The truth, the whole gamut of God's instructions, is contained between the covers of this Book.

God has graciously shared it with

you and me so that we might understand, we might learn and that we might not walk without hope, we might not walk without purpose in our life, we might not walk without direction and that we would walk in faith so we can understand that Jesus came for you and for me. He went to the cross and shed His blood to fulfill the requirements of a Lamb to bear the sins of the world upon Him.

We can believe it with our heart and put our faith, trust and confidence in Him. If we can be as Rahab when we come to the point in our lives, there really is no other place to turn. She drew that conclusion because she saw the result of this group of people marching on. She saw the victories that they were experiencing and she saw her hopeless condition.

She saw it—in the only way she saw it—and hopefully that would be the same conclusion that we could draw as we read the Scripture where it says, "There is none righteous, no, not one:" (Romans 3:10). We are all sinners and if we ever have a hope—want to entertain a hope—of going to the Promised Land, we need to be reconciled to God. The only way is through Christ Jesus and His shed blood.

We can put our faith, confidence and trust in Him and look up to the cross and without doubt believe. Then live our lives based on that belief, and not do as these people from Nazareth did. The Word tells, "For the preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness;" (I Corinthians 1:18). It is foolishness to a lot of people, and that it seems foolish to think that two thousand years ago Someone died and that it is a defining moment in history and a defining moment in our lives. But as we come to know the Word, we

come to know more about Jesus.

We all had the opportunity this morning, and perhaps many times in the past, that as we come to know Him, we realize what He has to offer. We should not make excuses, but that we would do as Rahab, hear the Word, respond in faith, and take those steps of faith.

We read here of the temptation of Jesus. It is Scripture that we can take comfort in because who was it that tempted us, God's children? Satan. From the Book of Genesis we can read, he came to Eve and said, "Well, is this really so?" He is a master of deception. Jesus is teaching us how to respond when we are tempted.

First of all, He said, "It is written, That man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word of God." (Luke 4:4). The Word nas to be important to us. The Word should be our guide, the doctrine of Christ Jesus, and not something we want to lightly discard, or be casual about it. John wrote it this morning.

Confession of Sin

From the beginning of time, it has been the nature of man to try to hide sin. When man does things that he knows he should not do, he wants to be sure others do not know what he has done. Unconfessed sin brings guilty feelings and causes us to feel separated from God. Separation from God makes us more vulnerable to Satan's attacks. If this vicious cycle is not broken, we will spend eternity separated from God.

Although we can hide sin from man, we cannot hide it from God. After Adam and Eve sinned, they initially tried to hide their sin by sewing fig leaves together to make themselves aprons. When they heard the Lord walking in the garden they "...hid themselves from the presence of the LordGod...". When the Lord called unto Adam and asked where he was, Adam replied "I heard Thy voice in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked; and I hid myself" (Gen. 3:7-10).

Achan, also tried to hide his sin and was told to give "...glory to the Lord God of Israel, and make confession unto him; and tell me now what thou has done; hide it not from me." He replied "I have sinned against the Lord God of Israel...when I saw...a goodly Babylonish garment, and two hundred shekels of silver, and a wedge of gold of fifty shekels weight, then I coveted them, and took them;..." (Joshua 7:19-21).

Solomon understood the seriousness of hidden sin. "He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whoso confesseth and for-saketh them shall have mercy" (Pr. 28:13). Isaiah also warned of the results of hidden sin. "Woe to the rebellious children, saith the Lord, that take counsel, but not of me; and that cover with a covering, but not of my spirit, that they may add sin to sin:" (Isaiah 30:1).

God has made it abundantly clear that sin will be exposed to the light. Man's efforts to hide sin will be of no avail. "But if ye will not do so, behold, ye have sinned against the Lord: and be sure your sin will find you out" (Nu. 32:23). "For there is nothing covered, that shall not be revealed; neither hid, that shall not be known" (Lu. 12:2). "Therefore judge nothing before the time,

until the Lord come, who both will bring to light the hidden things of darkness" (I Co. 4:5).

It is important that we understand that sin cannot be hidden from God. It is also important that we understand that Satan would like us to believe that sin can be hidden from God and from man. Satan tried to convince Eve that not only was it acceptable to sin but that it was a good thing. He told Eve "...ye shall not surely die: For God doth know that in the day ye eat thereof, then your eyes shall be opened, and ye shall be as gods, knowing good and evil" (Gen. 3:4-5).

Early messengers of the gospel of Jesus Christ preached repentance and confession of sin. "Then went out to him (John the Baptist) Jerusalem, and all Judea, and all the region round about Jordan, and were baptized of him in Jordan, confessing their sins" (Mt. 3:5-6). When the apostle Paul was preaching at Ephesus and the evil spirits tried to overcome the power of God, the faithfulness of the Saints was such that "...the name of the Lord Jesus was magnified. And many that believed came, and confessed, and shewed their deeds" (Acts 19:17-18).

We may ask the questions - "Why should I confess my sins? What good will it do to make a confession of sin?"

James wrote of the benefits of confession of sin. "Confess your faults one to another, and pray for one another, that ye may be healed" (Ja. 5:16). James was certainly referring to more than simply a physical healing.

Confession of sin is helpful to assure that the truth is in us and to obtain forgiveness. "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (I John 1:8-9).

Confession of sin, if undertaken in an appropriate manner, brings relief to the sinner. It is important to recognize that a humble confession of sin is more that a simple admission of having committed a certain act. It requires admission, with regrets, of having done the deed and an

attitude of submission to God with a commitment to not repeat it. To bring a cleansing, purified, forgiven heart, confession must be done in a repentant state of mind.

From time to time we hear of acts of terrorism or other sins for which some group "claims responsibility". Although these groups certainly have "confessed" their sins, there is no cleansing nor forgiveness. The confession is not done as individuals nor is it done with an attitude of sorrow nor humility. Thus, we can see that confession with an improper attitude is really boasting, not confession.

Humble confession of sin brings relief in a number of ways. The heavy burden of the sin is lifted. We no longer need to worry about having someone find out about our sin because we have removed that fear by making it known. If we have sinned in a manner that is harmful to another, we have the opportunity to gain peace of mind by going to that individual and confessing the sin and seeking forgiveness.

Confession of sin breaks the power of Satan. It brings to light those deeds that keep us in his bondage. Many times a soul will simply try to do better without acknowledging past sins. Rarely does this have long term benefits because, in the unconfessed state, sin is still our master. We must break the grip that Satan, through our sins, has

Confession of sins also puts Satan to shame, revealing him to be "...the prince of this world..." (John 12:31). Our goal is to escape the cares and constraints of this life that we might spend eternity with our Lord. Since we "...cannot serve God and mammon" (Matt. 6:24), we must completely separate ourselves from Satan.

Confession of sin brings a cleansing of the soul, helping us to remove the vessels of dishonor from our lives and making us fit for the Master's use. "If a man therefore purge himself from these, he shall be a vessel unto honor, sanctified, and meet for the master's use, and prepared unto every good work" (II Tim. 2:21). Only those with a cleansed and purified heart, freed from the burden of sin, can have peace with our Heavenly Father.

Planning for Future Work Teams in Jamaica

World Relief has worked for many years in the island of Jamaica. This work falls under the jurisdiction of the Caribbean Board. Work teams go to the island nation throughout each year.

Caribbean Christian
Center for the Deaf (CCCD)

Most of the work we do is assisting in building trade schools for CCCD, which has four Jamaican locations. Their focus is providing opportunities for deaf children to learn skills which will enable them to earn their living and function in society. Our brethren have learned to appreciate this organization, and we support the work they do.

Evaluation teams visit the area each year to assess needs

For the purpose of evaluating past efforts of our work teams, as well as to plan for future work, representatives of the Caribbean Board travel to Jamaica on a regular basis. It is important that our funds are used wisely and that we are demonstrating good stewardship before the Lord in meeting needs. A team of four brothers visited there in March of this year.


Arrival in Montego Bay

Team members flew from their various locations into the Montego Bay International Airport. Going through customs in developing nations is always interesting, and often a challenge. As is usual, the team rented a car since they travel long distances to the various locations. Traffic runs on the left side of the road, not the right as here in the U.S., so our brothers have learned how to cope with driving on the opposite side as well as with traffic conditions which can become very difficult.

Expediting a container

Several times each year, we ship sea containers from our distribution centers to CCCD. Many faithful sisters, brothers, and friends work hard to provide consumer items which are not available locally.

Gordon's Agency, a local freight expediting firm, does the paper work necessary to get these containers cleared through customs. One often wonders why there is so much bureaucracy, which seems to hinder instead of help. But it exists in every nation in which we work.



Final approval from Kingston

Most of the time our evaluation teams fly into Montego Bay because it is close to the docks where the ships unload our containers. However, they must make a four hour trip across the island to the capital city, Kingston. Approval comes from several agencies, and this can take a long time.

The team left at 5:00 A.M. on Thursday, March 26th. First stop in Kingston was at the Coconut Industry Board, where permits were waiting at the desk. When the brothers went to the Tax Compliance

Office, there was a mix-up with some documents, but when the officials found the container listed in their computers, things cleared.

By 11:30 they had what they needed, and then visited the CCCD school in Kingston. After taking a few pictures, they returned to Montego Bay.

Additional delays are no surprise

Although it appeared that everything was in order on Thursday, March 27th, it was not possible to unload the container until Monday due to typical delays. Even though it seems to happen each time, it still is frustrating. Another problem was that the truck needed for delivery to the various locations was broken down. It finally reached the docks about 9:30 on Monday.

Visited various locations

The team used the rest of the week to visit the locations in which we work. This includes not only the CCCD campuses, but also Falmouth Hospital, their infirmary, and a school for troubled girls. There are several projects in the planning stages which the brothers evaluated during this time. It appears that there will be plenty of work for our volunteers in the coming months.

Mission accomplished!

At 10:30 A.M. on Monday, the officials finally approved the shipment and the race to deliver the goods was on. Supplies for Montego Bay and another location went in a Gordon truck. Other goods were loaded onto and delivered by the truck which was repaired over the weekend. By this time it was past 5:00 P.M.

Tuesday was spent in delivering goods and settling up with the local people hired to do the work. The brothers were thankful, and had a little time to relax before the trip home on Tuesday. Thanks be to God for His care and direction!


Every item in the packages is good and useful, especially the medications, rice, oil, and all else. Again we thank you for all you do for us. KM

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN HOME FOR THE HANDICAPPED

At our larger facility, we have experienced a significant change in residents within the past five years. A fairly large group of residents have moved to one of our five homes in the Morton Community. Many residents who have taken the place of those who moved from the larger facility have been individuals with greater challenges and needs. Also, back in the early 1970's we had some residents who came to live at ACHH that were between 40 and 60

years old. Because of these factors at ACHH, we have recently been confronted with resident aging issues and individuals who have become terminally ill. We are learning some new concepts about our developmentally challenged residents and death and dying, particularly at our larger home. For most of our people. we see the love of Jesus communicated in a variety of ways. We know that Jesus sees into the hearts of our residents as well as into all of our hearts. We are thankful to be able to say with the Apostle Paul, "O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?" (I Cor. 15:55). We try to let our hearts not be troubled and know that there are mansions prepared for all of us who love Him with all of our heart. (John 14:14). Thanks be to God that Heaven is prepared for all, not only those who can fluently communicate their spiritual relationship with Jesus.

Interestingly, however, we are finding that many of our people go through a variety of levels of acceptance with death, just as the cognitively normal population does. The manner in which individuals communicate their fear of dying, the emotional and physical pain they are feeling, and their insecurities expressed at these times run a wide range. We also notice our lovely Jesus is totally involved in each step of this process. It is so true that every hair of our head is known by Him and not even a sparrow falls without His knowledge (Luke 12:7). We see His hand with interactions we see around a bedside, just as we would with someone without challenges who is dying. Tender words, families pulling together, a vision past earthly concerns to eternal and spiritual plains, and camaraderie with staff involved often show His love to those of us who observe these moments. We are grateful for a God who is involved in all aspects of our

What do we expect from God? Do we really believe that He can do the impossible? Recently, we heard a talk on allowing God to do the impossible. Sometimes things in our lives seem terrible. We are going through a trial that we don't think will ever end or end in a good way. If we trust in God, these are the times that God can show himself powerfully.

Actually, it is when our resources are exhausted and there is nothing more we ourselves can do, that God often chooses to work in a mighty way. When Elijah was prophet in Israel, God showed Himself powerfully when He caused fire to come down on an altar that Elijah had soaked with water. God showed that He can do what men think is impossible. Be encouraged! God is working in our lives. Are we willing to put aside our own ways of trying to do things, and to allow God to work in a mighty way that only He can? He is our all-powerful God. We are not to encourage anything that would not be the simple gospel or we are partakers of the sins. Jesus did this because Satan tempted, "If thou be the Son of God, command this stone that it be made bread." (Luke 4:3). Certainly we are tempted by many things and some of them can be perhaps even those aspects of physical needs that we need. Yet, for Christ to be receptive to the encouragement of Satan here, the devil would have reflected his willingness to be tempted and to do this.

Did Satan give up? No. Did Satan give up with you or me? Not usually. Oh, he may for awhile, but there would be other temptations. Jesus teaches us that we should know the Word and that we can respond to it.

Same here, another temptation says that the angels will help Him and he misinterprets a previous writing, or earlier recorded words. Jesus said, "Get thee behind me, Satan: for it is written, Thou shah worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve." (Luke 4:8). Part of being victorious is understanding the conditions or situations we are in.

To do that assessment that we were encouraged to do this morning, to recognize the conflict that we might find ourself in, the spiritual conflict, the temptation, so we recognize temptation, we can respond in the way that is consistent with Scripture.

It has been said that when Daniel and his friends responded, they said, "No, we don't want to have this food that has been offered up to idols." This wasn't something that he had not thought about or reflected upon earlier, or perhaps in his home where his parents had taught him. The understanding of the will of God, prior to temptation helps us to react appropriately at the point of temptation rather than coming up to the point of temptation and then wondering, "What

does God's Word say about this? What does God's Word say about that?"

One thing for sure, Jesus taught us, "Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve." (Luke 4:8). Satan is vigorously attempting to obscure that and causing us to divert our attention, to divert our affection, to divert our energies away from the worship of the true God and to misdirect our lives. Jesus is telling us here that there is only one true God.

Rahab came to that point, didn't she? She came to that conclusion, "Your God is the God of heaven." She responded because she saw no other plausible way to escape the certain destruction that she faced.

We are so thankful that Jesus was committed to His Father's will. I often wonder as we interact, we sometimes lose patience one with another. The Word tells us that very few would give their lives for another. Jesus saw the response and He saw the response of His community when they rejected Him. How did He go on? How did He keep going along that path that led to the cross?

We believe that He looked down to the time when He saw your life and my life and saw our great need. He saw our absolute hopelessness and He was willing to be that Sacrificial Lamb.

Certainly the saying here presented an alternate, a path of least resistance when it would have been easier for Him to not have to go to the cross. But He was willing and He was committed. We can contrast that with the nations that we read of this morning how they were unwilling to commit their lives to God's will and to the instructions the prophets had given them. For a short time, it appeared to be the best approach for them.

We read about those letters. We read about the description that it was good or it seemed good that it seemed appropriate to them. That is the way temptation often is. Satan doesn't really come out and say, "Well, the end result will be this." When you think about that, there's really no decision at all.

Go back to Adam and Eve. If they would have had time to reflect on what that meant—that decision that faced them—would they be willing to disobey God? I don't think so for a moment.

In fact, we must reflect often on why were we not just willing to take God at His Word? Why were we not just willing to, even though maybe we didn't understand, just take Him at His Word to worship Him only and not be distracted by temptation, and to not follow the encouragement that was in direct violation to our Creator's instructions?

We are so thankful that even then God promised the Saviour. One of the blessings is that even Christ is His model, His role and even His willingness to experience temptation as you and I have experienced it, and to show us how to react when we are tempted. We are to draw upon the Word of God. To resist Satan, the Word tells us, "Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you." (James 4:8)

When He began His ministry here, "Jesus returned in the power of the Spirit into Galilee: and there went out a fame of him through all the region round about." (Luke 4:14). We look at how things were done back then. The synagogues were set up and they had visiting rabbis, if you will, or they obviously visited in-between and had an opportunity for visitors to come and speak.

He took opportunity there in Nazareth. As His custom was, He went into the synagogue as He was faithful in His worship. Given that opportunity, He opened the Book of Isaiah. He said as plain as anyone could ever say what His purpose in life was...what His purpose and His

role was.

He was the One Who said, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, To preach the acceptable year of the Lord." (Luke 4:18-19). This was His purpose and this was His role to share with us the wonderful opportunity, the examples, the teachings, the instructions, and the way that we can be victorious.

As the two scribes described Rahab what she needed to do, Jesus shared with us. We heard it this morning and we heard it over and over that we are responsible and we are accountable to our Creator, and to our God. Unless we are reconciled through His Son, Christ Jesus, there is no hope and that it is really up to each one of us individually.

As clear as Rahab was instructed, "If you are not in that house, you will bear full responsibility for yourself. Your father, your mother, your brothers, your sisters, if they are not there, they had the choice to make."

You wonder what she did to convince them to be there. They could have said, "How could this possibly be to go into your house, and it will save us?"

Today, there are many that doubt the role of Christ Jesus. The same as those Nazarenes said, "Is He really the Son of God?" Why should I recognize Him? But let us look at His works. Let us look at His life. Let us look at His teachings. Let us believe! Let us have faith that He is the One that became poor that we might be rich. He came to give us the victory!

You sons and daughters who have left home should not forget that Dad and Mother get homesick for you.

You may think that because they live in a small town and know everyone and have many friends that they do not miss you so much.

But friends nor relatives can take your place with your parents. If you are a short distance from home, you might run down Sunday afternoons. Many a time when you go, you choose to go elsewhere.

Never a Sunday passes that Dad and Mother don't think and talk of you.

Never a Sunday that they do not hope against hope that you will come.



Excerpts from the diary of Elder Henry Geistlich, Meilen, Switzerland, continue. He visited all the American churches in 1866.

Tuesday, June 19. Mansfield, OH: The weather is pleasant. Today we went from Mansfield to Archbold, where the dear brother Braun lives. We took the train from Mansfield to Monroeville, then to Toledo and from there to Waseon, where Brother Braun really lives. At Waseon we visited Brother Weber, who is a watchmaker and a lovable brother. He has a house in which he has a special place to have church. This pleased me very much. Brother Braun came to Brother Weber's where we had church in the evening, although only a few were there.

Wednesday, June 20. Waseon, OH: The weather is pleasant, but hot. Today we went from Waseon, OH to Archbold by train. At Archbold there are several families from Switzerland, the brethren J. from Schaffhausen, also Brother G. Schelt from Butterhart. Brothers Bella and Braun accompanied me here. Archbold is a nice place, new and just being built up. I liked it here. The brethren here also raise some grapes. Here I saw the first grapes in bloom though I was told that the raising of grapes does not pay very well here, mostly on account of the late frosts. The potatoes were in bloom here.

Thursday, June 21. Archbold, OH: Weather hot. Today Brothers Bella and Braun and myself went from Archbold to Fulton to visit the brethren F.M., she being a sister of Brother A. from Schafhausen. In the afternoon there was church. From there we went to Brother J. He was busy putting up masonry in his cellar. These two villages, Waseon and Archbold, are close together. The climate is healthy here but very warm. The land is fairly good and cheap although there is some timber land and swamp. The wages are also good. There are many brethren living here. All in all, I liked it here very much but it suits me best in our own dear Switzerland. Many brethren do not like it because I feel this way, yet there are some who feel as I do. The homesickness in many is yet strong for their fatherland. They will take it with them to the grave. The best

homesickness is, if we carry a longing in our heart that we find in II Corinthians, Chapter 5. This reads "For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." The 4th verse also speaks of it: "For we that are in this tabernacle do groan," etc. Yet often there are days when a special longing for that heavenly home overtakes us, so that we would sooner be at home than to journey further in this world, but we must wait until the Lord calls. This waiting takes all our patience to task, and more so, if many trials and provings come over us. In this we learn to be patient.

Friday, June 22. Waseon, OH: Weather very hot. Today accompanied by Bro. Joseph Bella, I left Ohio for Peoria, IL leaving here at 2:30 in the morning, arriving at Chicago, IL at 11:00 where we had to wait until midnight to get a train for Peoria. While waiting in this city I had many thoughts, thinking how far I am away from home and from my dear ones, thinking I have chosen myself all this trouble and worry which I have had on my trip. And I was also very tired, being unable to sleep during the past night. However, I consoled myself with our dear Saviour, Who in the place of the joy which He could have had, chose to carry the cross patiently and did not mind the shame, going through pain and suffering, often not knowing where He should lay His head. This all He did for the love He had toward us, and therefore, we are indebted to Him, that we can become worthy of Him and His kingdom.

Saturday, June 23. Chicago, IL: At midnight we left Chicago for Peoria, arriving at 8:00 a.m. Peoria is an orderly city, built up new, but unhealthy. After arriving, we came first to the brethren B who are from Baden, Germany. Brethren A and the brethren K who are from Switzerland also came here, weeping as they saw us. They were all homesick for Switzerland. One could see that they would like to go back. The brethren B were very kind to us.

Sunday, June 24. Peoria, IL: The weather is very hot. The past night we

stayed by the brethren B, but it was so hot that I could hardly sleep. In the daytime the heat penetrates the houses so that one is unable to sleep at night. Today there was church by Bro. John F. Hartman, who is at the head of the church here. We had a blessed day. For my text I read in Galatians, Chapter 4.

Monday, June 25. Peoria, IL: In the late Civil War, 800 men fell from Peoria alone. Today a brother named P. from the country came and got us. We visited Sister R., who is from Bern. Bro. P. took us to the brethren Bittner at Partridge. The brethren Leuthold also came to Partridge today.

Tuesday, June 26. Partridge Prairie: We stayed by Bro. Bittner. Bro. Bittner is a rich farmer. Here there are some wealthy brethren, owning lots of land. The land here is fertile and productive. Bro. Bittner owns about 800 acres of land. Today I met the brethren R. from Eglisau.

Wednesday, June 27. Partridge Prairie: Today we came to the new settlement of Roanoke. Bro. Bittner took us first to the brethren B. who live on Bro. Bittner's place. There we enjoyed our visit very much but were almost overcome with homesickness, they weeping day and night. Well, what is to be done? They are here and should make the best of it, but I thought that many are deceived as to America. We also visited Bro. F. and they were very glad to see us. They are getting along fairly well, having a place of 120 acres which they rent. From here we came to Metamora, then to Bro. Benedict Weyeneth's home, where we stayed.

Thursday, June 28. Roanoke with Bro. Weyeneth: Weather fair. Last night I had a dream, which was: I ate black cherries and I saw my relatives clothed in black. In the morning after I awoke I was worried, thinking that perhaps one of my relatives had died, yet there was nothing to be done. I was satisfied with whatever the Lord does, doing that which is pleasing to Him.

"A Mother's Instinct"

Mothers are wonderful, especially mine, although she has already passed on to the really beautiful world called Paradise. or Heaven. You probably think that your mother is wonderful, too, but I don't mind. As far as I'm concerned, all mothers are wonderful. But what makes them so wonderful? At first I was going to say that it is a mother's love, which resembles God's love, which makes them so wonderful, but suddenly I find myself thinking about a mother's instinct, that built-in mechanism which causes a mother's love to spring into action spontaneously, especially when it comes to protecting her children, or her husband.

Birds and animals also have this mother's instinct. Jesus said, speaking to Jerusalem, "How often would I have gathered thy children together, even as a hen gathereth her chickens under her wings, and ye would not!" (Matthew 23:37). I remember as a boy on the farm in Illinois, seeing a mother hen call her chicks to come in under her wings if there was any danger, including a sudden thunderstorm. She would spread her wings and with a "cluck, cluck, cluck", call her chicks and they would come and tuck themselves under their mother's wings. I can relate to the analogy that Jesus used.

In Deuteronomy 32:11 we read how the Lord treated Jacob, "As an eagle stirreth up her nest, fluttereth over her young, spreadeth abroad her wings, taketh them, beareth them on her wings: so the Lord alone did lead him, and there was no strange god with him." I have been told that an eagle pushes her young out of the nest on a high cliff and lets them fall, and then swoops down under them, permitting the young to fall onto the mother's wings. That's like faith—we plunge and are confident that God will more than take care of us and we will surely land on something safe

and secure.

It is touching to read how Hannah, Samuel's mother, wanted to do something nice for him, after lending him to the Lord to serve with Eli, in accordance with her vow, before Samuel was conceived. "Moreover, his mother made him a little coat, and brought it to him from year to year, when she came up with her husband to offer the yearly sacrifice." (I Samuel 2:19). This is typical of a mother, always thinking, "What can I do for our children and grandchildren, something which would be good for them and which would make them happy?"

Mothers, you are wonderful. God has put into your heart and soul something of His own love and instinct. And all you ladies who have not become mothers, even as single maidens you will always have that love and instinct which you may demonstrate to many children who are not your own.

The area around Latty is very flat and at one time was known as the Black Swamp due to poor drainage. As was the situation in so many areas at the turn of the 20th century, land development companies came to a particularly promising area and developed it with the thought of reselling farms to other farmers from other States where the price of land had reached very high levels. The hand of God moves in mysterious ways, for through indirect means, the way opened for brethren to move to the Latty area and homestead new farms. A very large number of brethren moved to the Latty area during the period of 1911-1920.

In 1915, a building, in much need of repair, was purchased. Through the dedicated efforts of the brethren, the Latty Church was remodeled and worship service established.

In 1951, the new Latty Church was dedicated and later in 1978 an addition was added, which serves the Latty congregation today.
