"WITH GOD ALL THINGS ARE POSSIBLE"

Sermon by Bro. Gary Brown, Forrest, IL

2 Kings 4:1-37 and Acts 3

We read about several things this morning. If we thought about them just as men—the way men would reason things out—the way as a mortal man, I would think about it and probably every one of us here today would think about it. Every one of us would say, "That is impossible!"

What does the Bible say about that? It says, "...with God all things are possible." (Mark 10:27). So there are lots of things that we would look at in life and say, "Well, I can't do that; that is impossible for me to do." I felt like that. I suppose many of us have felt like that.

Back to what we read in Second Kings, those things, we would have all said, are impossible. That cannot happen, but with God and a faith in God, a trust in God and following God's direction, it did happen.

So when we sit around God's Word, and here we read about another account in the beginning of this chapter about a lame man that was healed. We would say, "That is impossible." Would we all say that? Yes! Men can't do those things, that is right. Man can't, but with God it is all possible.

What did he teach them later on? We went on and read later that we should repent and be converted. Some of us, and probably I said that, and maybe every one of us said that. Maybe there is someone today that is saying, "I can't do that; that is impossible." But with God, it is possible!

It is in His power and in His command. He can do that. He can work with you. He can work with me as impossible as that seems. But He can work with us as people, individuals and humans that live upon this earth today. He can work with us. What does that mean? That means that it takes something from

us, too. It is not just latching onto His coat, so to speak, and just letting Him drag us everywhere He wants us to go. It is us making an effort.

Think about the two incidents that we read about in Second Kings. There were instructions. The woman with the oil. I'm not sure how much oil she actually had and I am not sure how much she ended up with, but I think the principal is there and I think we understood enough to know that she did not have very much, and she ended up with just pots and pots and pots full!

Think about this woman now because the Prophet Elisha had told her, "Go gather all these" (I'm not sure the word he used, but I'll call them pots), "go borrow all the pots that you can from all your neighbors." Now what do you suppose her neighbors were saying at this point? "What are you going to do with all those things? How do you expect to use all those things? What are you going to do with all of them?"

"Well, I don't know. This man of God told me I should go borrow a lot of these pots." Then he told her to start pouring the oil in. "I don't have much here; just this little bit. What are all these pots for?" Then she filled them all up! It took faith on her part. It took actions on her part. It took her to believe the instructions that she had received.

With the woman of Shunem, the same thing. When she was told that she was going to have a child, she didn't believe it. She had the child. Then it took faith to believe that this Prophet Elisha could somehow help her when her son was (as we would call it, I suppose) dead.

When we find ourselves dead in sin, it takes actions on our part. It takes faith on our part. It takes the belief that God can take care of it because, I suppose, most of us have found God as our King and Jesus as our Saviour. God is our Father, is what I wanted to say, the One who just knows us and sees us all. Jesus is our Saviour Who shed His blood.

We found ourselves lost in sin and we couldn't do it ourselves. We weren't going anywhere ourselves. I could not make myself good enough because we are human and humans are not perfect. But God can work and God can use those that have a simple, humble faith in Him and are willing to follow His instructions while they are upon this earth.

We read about Peter and John here putting themselves as servants of God and following Him. They went into the temple at the hour of prayer. They were putting themselves in the right place at the right time. They were wanting to be God's people and wanting to worship Him. They were wanting to do what He had instructed them to do and the things that were right for them to do that they might continue to be His people, and that they might continue to draw closer to Him. Resisting Secularist Influences

Since the beginning of Christianity, there have been philosophies and falsehoods that have threatened the Truth. Although the Word of God is inerrant, various thought processes have arisen to challenge true doctrine. As Christians, we know that the wisdom of this world is foolishness with God (I Cor. 3:19), and we must continually guard against the forces that threaten the Truth.

Satan is a deceiver. He roars as a lion seeking whom he may devour (I Peter 5:8). To resist such a force, the believer in Christ is to be "sober" and "vigilant". He is to "resist steadfast in the faith" (I Peter 5:9).

The enemy's tools have multiplied in the past generation due especially to increased communication capabilities. These faster and more effective means of communication make the believer more vulnerable to non-Christian thoughts. The proliferation of publishing and broadcasting can exert enormous influence over the unsuspecting believer. With the onset of the Internet, the potential for influence is magnified almost beyond comprehension.

One way Satan sets a framework for his negative influences is by using the trait of individualism which tends to exalt oneself over the Word of God or over the church's interpretation of the Word. When this occurs, unity of the brotherhood is threatened. When absolute truth is denied, a breeding ground for relativism is born.

Relativism is a theory that holds there is no absolute truth. It asserts that meaning, truth and knowledge vary from person to person, culture to culture, and time to time. This, of course, is in diametric opposition to God's Word, which is truth (I Thess. 2:13), and is changeless.

Relativism can be ruinous, both for individuals and for society. It is especially injurious, and can cause havoc when it exerts influence among a body of believers in Christ.

In subtle ways, relativism and its corollary philosophies can seep unsuspectingly into the minds of God's people. If we are to resist relativism, we must be able to recognize its many faces.

Secular humanism, related to rela-

Secular humanism, related to relativism, is a worldview oriented to the secular rather than to the spiritual (or the supernatural). Concepts and behavior are rooted in this world, instead of in God's precepts. Ethics are seen from a human-centered outlook, rather than a God-centered one. For example, human cloning is often debated as a civil rights issue instead of a spiritual issue.

Individualism is also a trait that fits under the relativist umbrella. It is rooted in self-interest and self-centeredness. These instincts are naturally ingrained and can be a continuing battle for the true believer in Christ to overcome. Individualism sometimes shows its face when a soul arbitrarily exalts himself or herself to the point of dismissing sincere church guidance. Rather than submitting to a God-given authority, a soul tends to ignore it.

Another concept that promotes relativism is situation ethics, a philosophy that encourages every significant ethical decision to be made in the light of current circumstances. What to do or not do is determined by the present circumstances, rather than by the unchanging message of God and His Word. Situation ethics occurs when compelling "situations" cause a believer to leave the narrow way to adapt to a peculiar situation that has arisen. This exalts man's reasoning above God's standards.

Values clarification also fits under the umbrella of relativism. This outlook resists the absolutes of the Bible and asserts that values are individually "clarified"—that what might be seen as truth to one person may not be so to another person, and vice versa. "Truth" is seen as multidimensional and therefore is not really truth at all.

These relativist-oriented forces have exerted a significant influence over American life and are beginning to have a major impact within our brotherhood. The believer in Christ must resist influences that are inconsistent with, and destructive of, the Word's

teachings. We are to discern the spirits to determine what is true and what is false. Solomon prayed for an understanding heart so he could determine between good and bad (I Kings 3:9). The Church offers us help in avoiding false conclusions and beliefs.

In resisting relativist influences, we have the avenue of prayer. If we are fervent in prayer, we will be able to discern between the righteous and the wicked, between him that serveth God and him that serveth him not (Malachi 3:18). This is critical in these trying times. The Bible teaches us to be "wise as serpents, and as harmless as doves" (Matt. 10:16). The believer needs to be informed concerning the anti-biblical influences that surround him.

There is a very significant requirement that precedes our ability to discern good or evil. The Apostle Paul taught the believer to "be not conformed to the world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind" (Romans 12:2). For what purpose? "That ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable and perfect will of God."

If we are not conformed to the world, and our mind is transformed and renewed, we can see more clearly. We can discern between right and wrong and we can resist relativism and all its destructive influences. In doing so, our ability to overcome sin until the end will be greatly enhanced.

We, as a church body, are becoming more and more highly educated as the generations unfold. While knowledge can be very beneficial to society, the Word teaches that it "puffeth up" (I Cor. 8:1). Great care must be taken that all of us, whether students, parents, grandparents, etc., insure that we are both recognizing and avoiding the powerful forces of relativism that swirl around us. One of our founding church fathers once said, "A humble heart is an abode of God." If we can, by God's grace, remain humble in heart, God will surely direct us away from the onslaught of relativist falsehoods.

Two Thousand Years Ago...

...the early church in Rome was strikingly different from the pagan society that surrounded them. In his letter to the church, the apostle Paul commended the believers for their faith in Jesus Christ and their obedience to His teachings. Although he had never been to Rome he had heard of their witness everywhere he travelled.

...I thank my God through Jesus Christ for you all, that your faith is spoken of throughout the whole world.

ROMANS 1:8

Their primary distinction was the holiness in their life-style, the peace between one another and the love and compassion shown to their fellow man. They truly were the *salt of the earth* in a culture that was filled with every kind of wickedness, greed, evil, and depravity. Romans chapter one states that they were full of envy, murder, strife, sensuality, deceit and malice. They were gossips, God-haters, arrogant, boastful, faithless, heartless and ruthless. What a contrast was this peace-loving and kindhearted group of believers in their midst. Truly this could only be accomplished by the grace and power of God.

In Paul's letter to the believers in Rome, he encouraged them to "follow after the things which make for peace and things wherewith one may edify another." He instructed them that the "strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves." Because of their steadfast faith in Christ and their obedience to His word, the church was filled with grace and power and joyfully lived above their circumstances, their hearts filled with hope. Toward the end of his letter to the church in Rome Paul encouraged the believers...

Now the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that ye may abound in hope, through the power of the Holy Ghost.

ROMANS 15:13

As we consider the example of early believers, we think of the church in America. In a society similar to ancient Rome we have countless opportunities to be a witness for Christ and to "provoke one another unto love and good works" (Hebrews 10:24). In this context, provoke means to stimulate to action.

This was the vision of World Relief when it was formed. Believers found benefit in meeting together on a regular basis. This has provided an opportunity to encourage one another in a closer walk with Jesus Christ and to organize activities to meet needs in the church, our local communities and as far as possible.

Charity begins at home

On these pages devoted to the activities of the World Relief and Mission Committees, we try to keep our readers informed of work at home and abroad. God has opened the way for us to serve many people in various locations. However, it is evident that not everyone can travel to distant places or serve on work teams.

There are many ways that one can witness for his faith and Lord. Those of our faithful brethren and friends who do so much on a local level are witnessing for Christ in a way that is just as vital as going to other countries. We have asked a number of our local congregations to share with us the activities of their groups, not to boast, but to encourage. We recognize that if they did not patiently toil to prepare the necessary items, those who do travel would have nothing to distribute. We want our brethren to know how much their local activities mean to the program.

Sabetha-Bern, Kansas

Volunteers meet on the 2nd Tuesday of each month during the afternoon and evening at the Fellowship Center from

September through April.

The primary activities are making quilts and comforters. The quilts are donated to the Home or other organizations where they are usually sold at an auction. The comforters are given to a local organization where they are distributed to the needy in our five-county area.

Workers also make bibs for Lakeside Terrace, the handicapped facility in Sabetha. In the past, volunteers have made bibs for the nursing home, but they are now receiving them from another source. Other items made include wheelchair restraints and arm caddies.

Akron, Ohio

Networking, or telling others, has reaped many blessings, and we have received many donated items for the needy. Some of the things received are listed below:

• Talking to dentists and their assistants resulted in receiving dental and office equipment from dental offices.

• A medical supply company gave thousands of dollars worth of medical equipment, mattresses, gauze, etc.

- Sales people have donated dozens of rubber gloves from over stocked or oversized gloves that would have been discarded.
- Auxiliaries and their friends have donated beds, wheelchairs, etc.
- Retailers have donated toys, balls, and cash.

Most of the items were delivered to the Bluffton Distribution Center (BDC). Beans and other food were brought back for local distribution in the Akron area.

Special clothing project

This project began several years ago when a sister looked for fabrics at a Wadsworth, Ohio thrift store for the Akron World Relief Group. She told the saleslady about our making drawstring bags for school and health kits. The thrift store owner offered to give our group used clothing. Here's how it works:

The store color codes all clothes received using a different color for each month. They receive the clothes on consignment for sales, sharing the proceeds. If not sold within three months, the clothes may be either taken back by the consignor or donated to the store. Clothing is put on special racks for us and two other groups. They rotate turns so that each group has a chance for first choice of the available clothes.

These donated clothes are then picked up and sorted by our group. At first they were taken to one of our Sunday School rooms in the church and sorted into groups for boxing by men, women, and children. Seasonal clothing was grouped together.

After a while, more sorting room was needed and the clothes were taken to a storage building for boxing. Two Rittman brothers donated the use of the storage facility. Presently the clothes are being taken directly to a home for processing. Their children help to transport the clothes to their home. Usually Akron sisters take turns helping her sort and pack the boxes each month.

Shipping boxes are donated by an Akron brother who works for a grocery store chain. The packed boxes are taken to the BDC for further distribution. From 8 to 22 boxes are packed monthly, which makes this a very worthwhile project. Also, one other Wadsworth store donates used children's clothing.

Other group projects

The Akron group is involved in preparing health and school kits, knotting blankets, making quilts, and other activities. A highlight is "Family Night" once a year where children and men join in the work. This has generated interest and enthusiasm for the work.

Rittman and Smithville, Ohio

The local groups are involved in many varied activities of service. Ongoing projects include:

- Sewing group activities.
- Clothing collection each year.
- Annual collection of medical equipment and supplies for Hospital

Lumiere in Haiti.

- Groups participate in meat canning projects by the Mennonite Central Committee annually.
- ♦ Groups help stuff envelopes for mailings from Christian Aid Ministries in Berlin, Ohio.
- Our local brethren participate in approved work team projects at home and abroad. Everyone who participates feels they receive a blessing.

Smithville Sunday School

Before Christmas, about 15 youth from Smithville's high school Sunday School class gathered at the Fellowship Hall to repair toys. The items had been donated

to a local charity, "People to People Ministries." The toys and games had to be checked to verify they weren't broken and were complete. Later, the students helped move the toys to the distribution area where needy families could choose gifts for their children.



Our groups delivered 849 Bibles during the year from February 1997 to February 1998. 419 went to bus depots, and other public places. We place ads in free papers, but have not purchased advertising for the last two years.

Major house renovation

In the early Fall of 1997, we received a call from a young girl living in Rittman asking if our church might be able to help rebuild her mother's house in a nearby community. The house had been condemned by the city and vacant for several months.

The mother had previously hired a contractor to repair the house, but this firm bought some materials, tore the aluminum siding off the house and left. She had contacted about 20 churches in the area and found no one willing to

help. We were the last church she said she intended to call.

After looking at the house, talking to the city, and conferring with our local ministers, we agreed that we should try to make it livable again. We announced the project to the local churches and soon had many volunteers offering to help. The work included excavation, masonry foundation work, framing, roofing, plumbing, heating, electrical, insulation, drywall, cabinets, trim, concrete, vinyl, carpet, and plenty of cleaning.

Volunteers helped in every area, and many expressed interest in our church becoming involved in a local work

project. The house was torn down and hauled away on a Friday and was framed up on Saturday, plus the roof was shingled and the plumbing, heating, and electrical were roughed in.

Siding, drywall, cabinets, and trim followed the next Saturdays and evenings. In about three months, the house was approved by the city inspector. The family appreciated everything and offered

to help numerous times. They did their own interior painting.

The complete project involved approximately 50-60 volunteers and much donated material. All involved had a good feeling of being able to share some of our resources with those in need. Neighbors on the same street shared words of support and helped financially.

GATEWAY WOODS APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME Tim Sauder

I keep a Rolodex card file on my desk that includes all present and former Gateway Woods residents and foster children along with basic information like birth dates, admission and discharge dates, relatives, etc. After a child leaves our care, my secretary sends me, via our office e-mail system, information on where they have moved and the date of their departure. Once I've transferred that information to the file. I hit the "delete" icon on my computer screen. Delete and the message is gone at the speed of light. During the past year, each time I hit "delete" there is pain, emptiness, sometimes guilt and always questions. How can I just delete a child from my life, our program or our care? I can't. But other questions remain: How will Jesse handle his new foster home? Can Samantha and her parents get along? Can Penny make it on her own? Have we equipped them well for the next stage of their future? Will they remember us, our program, our Jesus? Will some other laborer in God's harvest build on the spiritual foundation we have laid in their short (12-18 month) stay? Or will Satan take those seeds and choke them out? All of these take us to prayer that God will continue the work even when it seems beyond our reach. "So neither is he that planteth any thing, neither he that watereth; but God that giveth the increase." (I Cor. 3:7) In addition to prayer, we are also motivated to continued involvement if we're able and allowed. Former residents often call, visit and write. Some are regular while some are on infrequent, hit or miss basis. Some call us only when things are going very well or when crisis occurs. Some just disanpear. Some we have helped through college and others we have helped out of debt or out of jail. But the prayers never stop for all of them.

At our recent Recognition Dinner where we express our appreciation for board members, staff and foster parents, there were some significant milestones acknowledged. Our fifteen foster families were honored, the most ever. The longest standing Houseparent couple in the history of our program, Bro. Kevin and Sis. Brenda Fiechter (6 1/2 years), and most experienced Houseparent, Sis. Carol Schrock (8 1/2 years), were honored.

Sis. Carol, who also received our Proverbs 31 Award as a virtuous woman, came first as a single Assistant Houseparent and later after marrying Bro. Todd Schrock as a Houseparent. This is unprecedental longevity, not only at Gateway Woods, but also in the field of residential child care where the average is around two years on the job.

However, the inevitable is happening. The Schrock's have announced plans to leave in November and so we are seeking a couple to serve as Alternate Houseparents as a step toward regular Houseparents. Please consider this opening. Please pray that a brother and sister will respond to the Lord's call and to a child's needs. We also have other openings at this time, including female Counselor and Secretary. See ads in this issue.

Each summer we hire some extra help. This year Bro. Jeff Waibel (Bay City, MI) is our Volunteer Coordinator, Sis. Kim Plattner (Leo) will help with independent living training and children's activities and Sis. Holly Beer (Milford, IN) will help with curriculum development for our new on-grounds school. Our school has accomplished it's goal this semester of preparing and equipping all four of our students to return to public school in the fall.

Sermon continued from page 2 wanted to be close to Him so they were going to the temple at the hour of prayer.

Isn't that for all of us who want to be close to God? We want to be in His house. We want to be close to Him so we come together to worship Him. Today, we have drawn together. It is the Lord's day here, the day of worship and to draw together so we can sing, pray and read together and think together a little bit about what God has opened up to us.

If the Holy Spirit will be here in our midst, we hope and trust as we have prayed, to speak to every one of you through one simple voice and simple readings that we had together with the Word of God and the Spirit here to interpret and apply it to all our hearts.

As men, we would reason that out and say it is impossible, but with God, it is possible!

Then there was this lame man who was there by the gate and we read about his being healed. I don't know how much to make of some of these things, or how much it all means. Peter was talking to this lame man, and he looked up to them expecting to receive something. As I understand it, the custom was or what he probably would have expected would have been money at that point. One who was lame and destitute, that would have been a way for people to help him. That would have been a way for people to share of what they had for him to help him out. Sure.

But Peter and John came along and that isn't what they shared. They shared more than that, didn't they? They shared something far more valuable than that to this man. It wasn't just a temporary fix, or something that just temporarily would help him out.

"Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee:" is what Peter is saying unto him, "In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk." (Acts 3:6). Then he took and stretched out his hand to him. Now what is this lame man thinking at this point as Peter instructed him? He talked to him and he had the opportunity to stand up and walk.

"I am stretching out my hand. Here is the help." Is he going to believe it? Is he going to put his hand out so that he can be helped up?

I know I found myself in a spiritual condition like that once. God was reaching out and He was telling me, "There is help." He has probably told us many times and instructed us many times. Probably just most every time we sat under the sound of God's Word, we could hear that, if we wanted to. It was there. He reached out His hand probably many times to us, but how about those times when we didn't put out our hand and accept the help?

But here is this lame man. "And he took him by the right hand, and lifted him up: and immediately his feet and ankle bones received strength." (Acts 3:7). Probably most of us, many of us anyhow, just don't really realize what that means right there, when it says, "...immediately his feet and ankle bones received strength."

It takes some personal experience—and some of us have probably had that—that if you do not use your muscles or legs, as this man who was not walking, you do not just stand up and take off walking and praising God. It says, "...walking, and leaping, and praising God." (Acts 3:8). Some of us know that humanly that is impossible. You do not do it that quickly when you have not used your legs for that period of time

But God healed him in that way, and God worked another miracle—worked it in a physical way. He will work for us physically, and He will work for us spiritually. God will do that for us in the spirit when we say, "There is no way I can be of a spiritual mind right away. There are too many things in my life."

But when you put your hand in God's hand when God has told you to come, "I am going to help you and I will offer you everything you need by the name of Jesus Christ," you can be healed. Then He stretches out His hand. Put your hand in His hand and follow Him and walk with Him and immediately we can do

things that we would have thought were totally impossible!

Do you know what? Just like that, "All the people saw him walking and praising God: And they knew that it was he which sat for alms at the Beautiful gate of the temple: and they were filled with wonder and amazement at that which had happened unto him." (Acts 3:9-10). There have been and there will be as long as God tarries and continues His work, there will be people that will notice God's work, when we as individuals trust as much as this lame man did.

There will be many souls that notice God is working because they recognize that it is a work of God. not a work of man. That will always be impressive to all people who walk upon this earth. I think to every one of us especially and I just wonder if it is not to most all human beings. I won't just say everyone (and I am not even sure if I know what the right words are), but I don't know if there are many individuals that would not recognize a work of God when that is what it really is. I am sure every one of us would. Every one of us know when God works.

We can see it to recognize that He can work with us, too. Not only just to repent and be converted, He works with us after that. He continues to help, to lift up, to grant unto us and help in those times of need. He continues to give us direction and guidance. He continues to lead us upon the paths that are right and true. Sometimes it is through the shadow of the valley of death. Sometimes it is beside the still waters, but He is leading us!

He is the Chief Shepherd and He knows what is best for us. Are we willing to follow? Sometimes it is on pastures that aren't so lush and prosperous. This just came up. I don't know why I am thinking like that this morning. I started some of the twenty-third Psalm. Could you understand what I was talking about?

If you let sheep out on something where there is too much to eat, they will eat too much. A good shepherd

watches things like that. Sometimes you don't take them to just the places that are the most lush things to eat, so you don't overfeed them. I am only talking about sheep that I know of here upon this earth, because it is God and Jesus who know the best for us as His sheep while we are living.

Did anybody ever fall into the trap where you really wanted to just understand the whole Bible all at once? I want to understand it all, and that is a good desire to have. Remember, if we are like sheep, it is only going to be given to us in just the right amounts in the right time.

Now I am wondering if this would happen and if we could take too much of it at once, would we over eat? Do you know what happens to a sheep that over eats? They can't digest it all and it works wrong in their digestive system. Do you know what ends up happening when they do this? There is a wrong kind of bacteria that grows and eventually, they die.

God knows what is best for us while we live. He wants what is best for us. I find myself just like some of those sheep; I would like to eat and eat and eat more and more. I am talking about spiritual things, just like they would like to eat and gulp down a whole bucket full of corn. We don't like to do the same with God's Word, but if it causes us to die, then that is not really so good for us, is it?

God knows what is best for you and He knows what is best for me. We come here to God's house and it is important that we come and place ourself in God's house to worship Him. We are given the right amounts of Godly food in the right time that we continue to walk and follow Him as our Chief Shepherd.

In the Bible here, what comes next is a sub-topic called, "Peter's Second Sermon". What was the sermon that he preached first? That there is help from God. Are we going to take it maybe? What did it say to you when we read here about the lame man? Now it says, it is the second sermon. They are wondering what is happening and the people around are wondering what has happened. They are attracted and

their attention is there with them. It would certainly get our attention, too, wouldn't it?

What does God have to do to get our attention today? What does God have to work in lives, hearts and souls and around us to get our attention? Sometimes we see that there are things that really happen that are tragic. Sometimes there are things that happen that are really miracles! But what does God have to do to get our attention?

Hopefully, we want to give Him our attention. It doesn't just take so much but as we come here to God's house, are we wanting to look to His Word? Are we wanting to hear what He has to say? Do you want to hear what the Bible said this morning? I don't care if you don't listen to me. I don't care if you hear a word I say, but what did the Bible say?

Think about what we read. I did not pick out the Scriptures we had this morning. Think about these things and how they fit together about what we read. I wouldn't have known where to find those stories about the woman and the oil and the woman of Shunem. I wouldn't have known where to find them. I could not have picked them out.

I would not have chosen to read here, but this is what God had for us this morning and how He put it all together, so what is He trying to say to me? What is He trying to say to you? What does it mean to you this morning when we come and read from God's Word?

Peter said, "Why are you looking at me? Why are you looking at us?" is what he said. It isn't man that did this. He said, "We did not do this!" He said, "...why look ye so earnestly on us, as though by our own power or holiness we had made this man to walk?" (Acts 3:12).

Now he is going to tell the people how it all works. "The God of Abraham, and of Isaac, and of Jacob, the God of our fathers, hath glorified his Son Jesus; whom ye delivered up, and denied him in the presence of Pilate, when he was determined to let him go." (Acts 3:13). It is not by us that this work is accomplished, but it is God above. It is in the power of God that these things are done. It

is in God's hands for all of this to be accomplished.

It is that same God that sent the Lord Jesus Christ and that is the message that they brought. Every time we gather together around this Holy Word, the Bible, we want to spread the Gospel of Good News that Jesus Christ came upon the earth to die and shed His blood for mankind, and that is us...every one of us this morning... you and me.

He died for us. He shed His blood. I know we hear that a lot and I hope we continue to hear it a lot because isn't that really the main focal point of the Bible and of our living upon this earth? There are lots of things that we can do and lots of things that we can be involved in. Lots of us have different kinds of jobs or occupations. Lots of us have different things to do whether it be school that occupies our time, children, or our homes. All those things can just take up the whole day if we let them.

Are we really thinking about God and about Jesus Christ while we live? Are we thinking about living for Him? Working for Him? Helping others? Isn't that how Jesus lived? Are we looking at life like, "I'm going to enjoy life and I am living life for me."? Do you know if it is even possible or wonder for a child of God to live like that?

When we look at ourselves, are we living like Jesus lived? What did He do for Himself while He lived in total submission and subjection to God, His Father, while He was upon this earth? Were there things that He did that were to benefit Himself? Or was He thinking about those that were around Him trying to help somebody else, trying to help out others? Was He mindful of those that were less fortunate in many other ways, the sick and the feeble? Think about it.

How am I living my life? How are you living yours and how am I doing mine? Because as much as I could talk this morning, we could go through a Bible study for hours on all these things, but if you don't feel it in your heart, I doubt if I will convince you to be different.

So may God speak to us, instruct us, show us how we are going to live and how He wants us to live, and then may He help us to live that way. May He help us to follow that way...to live according to His will and His ways. Even when it looks like it is impossible, to know that with Him it is possible.

Peter went on then to talk some more about Jesus and how He had died and how those there had denied Him. I am paraphrasing, of course, as there are many verses that spoke of this of how they had the Prince of life, I think they called Him here, and how they rejected Him, denied Him and eventually, as we know, put Him to death. That is what they had desired for Him.

We have been reminded, at least a couple of times lately, of God and His kingdom and His glory. Are we wanting to be subject to that? There is really a teaching there for us—for me. Am I really wanting to be subject to Him and follow Him? Am I really wanting to do what He wants?

Everybody here lives in the United States of America. Without going up and down the rows, I would say virtually everybody here is a citizen of this country. Does that make us subject of this country? I think there is kind of a difference. We can be a citizen here but if I just go about doing whatever I want and however I feel and just bend things to work and if I don't get caught, it is okay. Am I really a subject of this country and supporting this country? Or am I just living here as a citizen? Now what do you want to be in the Kingdom of God?

He went on talking about Christ and what He said. Again I go back to the verse as Peter said it, "Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord; And he shall send Jesus Christ, which before was preached unto you: Whom the heaven must receive until the times of restitution of all things, which God hath spoken by the mouth of all his holy prophets since the world began." (Acts 3:19-21).

Jesus came just for that one reason, that everyone that lives upon this earth, that comes under the sound of the Word, that hears the Word of Truth that we have before us, would have the opportunity to repent and be converted and that we can become God's people. That is what He seeks for us today and that is the hand that He is extending out to us today, that is His help that He would give unto us.

Jesus shed His blood for every one of us. He promised us His grace and His Holy Spirit while we live, that we might remain true and faithful if we give our life to Him. He promises us His help.

Isn't it just hard to understand how He promises us so much? He promises us everything we need to be His if we will just put ourselves to hold onto His hand and allow Him to lift us up, heal us, take us, mold us, shape us and convert us. How long does it take to find out we cannot convert ourselves or truly change ourselves so that all is right? But God can do it!

One more of those miracles! One more of those things that men would say it is impossible, but with God it is possible.

He can work those things so our sins may be blotted out. "And he

shall send Jesus Christ, which before was preached unto you:" (Acts 3:20). If I am not mistaken, probably Peter and John here are talking to the Israelite people because he talked to them about how they crucified Jesus. Jesus was preached to them and they had the prophesy that Jesus was going to come. They knew He was going to come but they didn't see it. They didn't understand or couldn't comprehend it for whatever reason.

We know and we understand and are told in the Bible that Jesus is going to come again. I hope that every one of us understand what that means for us, when Jesus comes again. When is that time and when is it going to be? But when it happens, no more opportunity to repent, to be converted, or to have our sins blotted out.

It is just made real clear in God's Word that that is the way it is for us. So where do we stand today? How do we stand with God? How do we stand with our Lord and Saviour and how are we really wanting to be one of His people? Are we really wanting to be one of His kingdom? Are we really wanting to be a subject of His that when He comes to call His kingdom home, we will be a subject to His kingdom, and be ready and waiting to go with Him?

Just like all those accounts we read this morning, you might think that is impossible for you. I wonder if it is impossible for me, but it is not you and it is not me that are going to work that. With God, all those things are possible.



Excerpts from the diary of Elder Henry Geistlich of Switzerland who visited the existing American churches in 1866.

Friday, June 29. Roanoke, IL: Today Bro. Jos. Bella and myself visited the church house, where Bro. Bella was teaching school. Today for the first time I saw a snake, which crawled out of the grass. For some time I watched Bro. Bella teaching his scholars.

He complained to me of the domineering actions of some of the brethren toward him. They were brethren of foreign birth. They also complained the same. Therefore, I did not feel as good here as at other places. Yet there is the same God and the same Saviour and the same pure Spirit in all the faithful on earth. There should be and is. Yet there appears a difference in the habits and customs of the various nationalities which cannot quite agree with each other. So this difference that appears to be here between them that came from the old country and the Americans who were here longer. At first it does not seem to go in unity, being very sorry that there is disunity among the dear brethren on account of this. I am hoping, however, that the Lord will direct their actions in such a manner that it will be for the best. In my coming here, I felt somewhat burdened, but afterward it was better, the Lord taking the burden from my heart and giving me His blessing and joy in our assembly.

Illinois is a fertile and productive state where much wheat, oats, barley, potatoes and fruit are grown. Here I saw the most excellent fruit trees and gardens, but it seems to be a hot and feverish region. The new soil, which is broken up, seems to smell bad. There is also a new settlement being made, 60 miles from here along a railroad. This no doubt is Fairbury, where the Bros. Virkler (Joseph and his son, and brother-inlaw) have bought much land, building houses and then selling to other brothers. They are trying to establish a settlement and church there. Bro. B. and Bro. J. said to me today that they almost have made up their minds to settle there. The land costs from \$22.00 to \$25.00 per acre, which is much cheaper than where Bro. Weyeneth lives. They think the brethren who come from Europe would be better off to buy there.

Saturday, June 30: I am at Roanoke with Bro. Weyeneth. Today he took us to Metamora, where we visited with several brethren among whom were brethren J. Brau from Bern, Switzerland. We stayed overnight there.

Sunday, July 1. Metamora, IL: Today there was church at the home of Bro. Peter Engel. A large barn was our place for assembling. In the forenoon there were 53 rigs in the yard and in the afternoon still more. It looked as if a party of artillery had camped, there being many unbelievers with us. While I was looking at this with astonishment, a brother said, "See, brother, all that you see here is work and inconvenience for us. You in Europe do not have the inconvenience because you live closer together."

Monday, July 2. Metamora, IL: Last night we stayed with Sister Krahanbuhl. I also talked with the expelled K.S. and his wife. All I could do was to advise them to humble themselves, otherwise, there is no help for them. I was doing all that was possible and committed them unto the mercy of God. This all I kept in my heart as we find of Mary.

Tuesday, July 3. Metamora, IL: Today I wrote a letter home to my dear ones, which was forwarded on Wednesday. We drove from Metamora to Morton. Several brothers accompanied us, including the brothers Forster and Fahr from Eglisau, Switzerland. We arrived at the village of Washington, where we stopped. We then went out to Brother Ackerman's who lives near Morton. In the evening there was church there. The Ackermans showed much love toward us. their household reminding me of Abraham and Lot. This brother has a very large business, many horses and cattle and about 900 acres of land, his activity being in much the same proportion that we find of those fathers of old. The brethren live near a large oak timber.

Wednesday, July 4. Morton, IL: Today we went from Bro. Ackerman's home to Morton, where in the afternoon we had church in a wagon factory. For our text we read in Hebrews, Chapter 12, verse 12 which says "Wherefore lift up the hands which hang down and the weak knees." Today I also saw brother Carl Hurlemann, who used to be a

servant from Fritz Lithu, in Seefelden, Zurich, Switzerland. I was also surprised as I saw Bro. F.M. and others coming to church, riding on horses. It seems to me that the brethren here are not as humble as at home by us. I found that they must watch out lest they rise too high, both as to soul and body.


Thursday, July 5. Dillon, IL (near Tremont): Today we went to Dillon where Bro. Michael Reuter and Bro. Geo. Welk live. In the evening we had church at Bro. Welk's. Bro. Reuter lives on a nice place next to a woods. This is beautiful region, being very fertile. Here grapes grow in abundance. This place would suit me the best of any place I have seen so far, if I had to live here. We also visited an English brother, who was on his death bed, suffering from cancer. I was delighted in the friendliness of this brother, who patiently bears his pain and is glad to leave this earth to be with Christ. From here we went to Peoria where we boarded a train for Burlington, IA.

Friday, July 6. Burlington, IA: Last night we stayed in Burlington. At 5 a.m. we boarded a train for Ottumwa where we took a stagecoach to Bloomfield, arriving there at 7 o'clock in the evening. We still had seven miles to go to the brethren, where we intended to stay for the night. We were able to hire a coach to take us. On the way, darkness overtook us, and our drivers got lost. This is a very rough and unsettled region. On the way we sometimes feared that our rig would upset. Whenever we would see a light in a log cabin, we would stop and inquire about the name of the brethren whom we were trying to find. At last we reached our destination, which was a miserable log house. At that we were glad as it was getting late. One interesting thing I saw this evening was what seemed like many thousand fire sparks jumping around on the earth. There are called fireflies or firebugs; they hop up from the earth throwing a flash into the air that looks like fire. This all is part of nature's play.

"A Father's Responsibility"

I was once told by a brother that my first responsibility is to provide for my family. There is scripture for that, "But if any provide not for his own, and specially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel." (I Timothy 5:8). We fathers do have the responsibility to provide for our families the necessities of life as recorded in I Timothy 6:8, "And having food and raiment let us be therewith content." The Bible does teach the work ethic and we are not to be lazy.

The Bible also says something about our relationship to our children, "And, ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." Sardis, OH - 1848

Tucked almost unnoticed between the banks of the Ohio River and the hills to the immediate west is the small hamlet of Sardis, Ohio. It was founded just five years prior to brethren moving there from Switzerland.

In 1848 a number of brethren boarded a flat boat for a journey down the Ohio River, which was considered a throughway to the West. Why the brethren stopped at Sardis is not known for sure, but we can believe it was the hand of God.

Pictured above is the Sardis church as it looked in the 1970's. This building was built in the 1870's after fire destroyed the first building on the same site. It was elevated and a basement added in the 1890's. In 1966 extensive remodeling took place, which included a new entrance to the church. The old Sardis church serves as a Fellowship Center today since a new edifice was built in 1987. To the right of the building, the third stone back, is the grave of Elder Isaac Gehring (1819-1896).
