

"ETERNITY IS FOREVER"

Sermon by Bro. Dwight Stoller, Latty, OH Jeremiah 30:1-9 and Revelations 12:7-17

When we read a book, typically most often the events are in chronological order, especially if it is a historical book. What we read in chapter three usually happened later in time than in chapter one. Not everything written in the Bible is that way.

I'm not going to claim in any way, shape or form that Revelation is my area of expertise, because it's not. I believe that there are some passages which can have multiple interpretations. In this issue of war in Heaven, it could possibly refer to more than one time.

We know that Satan was in Heaven once before and that he was an angel and he was proud. God threw him out of Heaven, "And there was war in heaven: Michael and his angels fought against the dragon; and the dragon fought and his angels, And prevailed not; neither was their place found any more in heaven." (Revelation 12:7-8). There is also war now.

It strikes me in verse twelve. "Therefore rejoice, ye heavens, and ye that dwell in them. Woe to the inhabitants of the earth and of the sea! for the devil is come down unto you, having great wrath, because he knoweth that he hath but a short time." (Revelation 12:12).

What is a short time? It depends on the situation, doesn't it? I think time is kind of an almost mysterious thing. We have had three or four funerals in Latty in the last three weeks. I say three or four because we had a double funeral, a husband and wife, on Friday. Both were elderly in age. But, you know, at a time when you lay somebody to rest is when you reflect upon time.

Time is kind of an expanse. It is a period during which actions take place or something occurs. If you ever think about time, in one sense we could consider it our most limited resource. If you ever think about it, you can't buy time. You can't trade anyone for time. You can't barter for time. Every day God gives us twenty-four precious hours and it will be consumed. When that day is gone, it's gone for good and we can't recover it.

Time is like we can picture that hourglass with little grains of sand in it that fall through. Once they flow through that little hourglass, they are never recovered. You can't put them back. It's like the second hand on this little clock on the pulpit here that continues to move. Every second that goes past is gone forever. It will never ever be recovered.

So every one of us have some supply of time; some supply of little grains of sand that is falling through the glass. You know, the thing is that none of us know what our supply is. None of us can see our own hourglass and know how much time we have.

We buried my forty-eight year old brother last November who died of cancer. A few years ago, no one would have imagined that he had that little amount of sand left in his glass. That little amount of opportunity to live as we know life. Most all of us are assuming that we will live the rest of this day and tomorrow. The average American lives seventy some years for a male, and I don't know what it is for a female. We will live with the assumption that we have this time.

A little analogy that helps me is I remember way back in Geometry class in high school, or maybe we even learned this in junior high, I don't remember, but we learned about this concept of points and lines and a ray. We learned that a point in Geometry class is something that is so infinitely small that you can't measure it and it has no mass.

You can't say, "Well, this point is this wide, because theoretically it is just there. It's infinitely small." I remember when we learned that a ray is a line that starts at this point and it goes on, and that ray can have infinite length. I can't quite comprehend infinite, but it means it never ends. You also can't measure it, because it's too big and never ends. We will at times do planning and will plot things on a time line. Usually the fine is maybe this long on a marker board or this long on a piece of paper. We usually divide it up. So maybe we'll have a year here, or this is a century or this is a decade. We use that to compare when this happened compared to when this happened, or how long ago did this happen.

When I think of our life and I think of eternity, I think of that ray. I think you know—this may sound absurd—but it is not an exaggeration. Because if eternity is something that is unending, there is going to be eternal life, and there is going to be eternal damnation. In my lifetime, even if God does give me seventy, eighty or ninety or whatever years of life, is like that little point on the end of that ray.

In so many million years downstream in eternity, which is this unending line, and if we have a memory and if we have the ability to look back, this lifetime is going to be like that little blip on the end of that line.

Light From The Word

"Lo, this only have I found, that God hath made man upright; but they have sought many inventions" (Eccles. 7:29). It is quite obvious that there have been many inventions that have brought significant changes in our lives, and as in the days of Noah, many of these changes have not been good. "And God saw that the wickedness of man was great...and that every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually" (Gen. 6:5).

Technology has brought significant change to our lives, and the rate of change is increasing rapidly. We often wonder, and to an extent fear, what impact this will have on our faith. The next two editorials will briefly explore some of the benefits and concerns that technology has brought to our lives.

The Internet is a world wide connection of computers that can give the operator of a computer access to information from sources throughout the world. Any computer, any place in the world, can be connected to the Internet once it has been registered with a central agency and has been given a "unique address". This collection of computers provides storage for information that can be transferred from one computer to another by using phone and communication lines. An individual who has a personal computer can access the Internet via a phone line using a device called a modem.

The World Wide Web (WWW) is a software technology that allows access to pictures, video, sound and text stored on the Internet. This software enables a computer owner to access information from virtually any place in the world.

Electronic mail (E mail) is similar to the standard postal service mail we all use today. The primary difference between E mail and standard mail is the means of delivery. E mail is transported electronically over the Internet instead of over the highway by truck or airway by plane. E mail can be delivered almost instantly and to numerous recipients at the same time.

"Chat Rooms" are a form of electronic

communication that use typed messages which appear immediately on the computer of another individual or group of individuals. Much like short wave radios, chat rooms allow instant communication over the Internet. Messages may be accompanied by a video camera picture of those who use this means of communication.

The advanced technology and reduced cost has made it possible for many individuals and businesses to have access to almost unlimited information. There are many benefits that this new technology and the Internet have already brought, and the potential for future benefits is enormous. The Internet or the WWW can be used by schools, businesses and individuals in a variety of ways to improve our lives. Devices that enable many handicapped individuals to live a much more normal life, medical and surgical advances, and expanded educational opportunities are only a few of the advantages.

Technology also provides an opportunity for those of like mind and faith to draw closer together through improved communication. Brethren who are somewhat isolated because of work or other circumstances could be in close and frequent contact with other brethren through this medium. It could provide an opportunity to broadcast E mail messages to friends and members, thereby keeping all of us better informed of opportunities to help each other. While this can be a blessing, we must be very careful because it could also lead to communication with those of another faith and increase the possibility of doctrinal confusion.

In addition to improved communication among brethren, the Internet and related technologies will also increase the opportunities for brothers to work at and from their own homes. This has the potential to reverse the trend started during the Industrial Revolution which required men to leave home to work among worldly people in factories and offices. Many children have no opportunity to know what their father does at work nor do most families have an opportunity to work together. Working at home may allow us to once again work as a family unit as was common in the agricultural era.

Increased business travel in recent years has become a problem for some families. With some fathers being gone several nights per week, additional stress is placed on the mother as she tries to fill the role of both parents. The improved technologies could reduce the need to travel.

Undoubtedly the future will bring additional, significant changes in technology and this will bring with it many opportunities and concerns. Although improved technology can be very useful if Godly standards are adhered to, we must be careful that we heed the scriptural warning that men can become "... vain in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened" (Ro. 1:21). With vanity comes self-exaltation. If advanced technology leads to the false belief that man is in control of his destiny, will the Lord again look down upon the earth and see the attitude of man is as it was at the time of the building of the Tower of Babel and say "...this they begin to do, and now nothing will be restrained from them, which they have imagined to do" (Gen. 11:6)? God is in control and determines how much knowledge man can gain. However, man may be tempted to try to go farther than he should, thus risking the wrath of God.

The Children of God would do well to be aware of potential problems brought on by technology. Some who become overly involved in the Internet have developed behavior similar to addiction. This behavior is often related to the dangers of pornography, profanity, games and communication with strangers that could lead to unwholesome relationships. The scripture advises us to "Be not deceived: evil communications corrupt good manners" (I Cor. 15:33).

The next article will cover additional topics of concern about technology and the Internet.

Brethren Visit Europe for Church Dedication

Interaction and cooperation between the brethren in the USA and Europe continue to increase. Each time we visit them, our respect for our European brethren increases. The European Board functions under the direction of both the World Relief and Mission Committees.

A new congregation in Germany

After World War II many brothers served in the military based in the picturesque town of Schwäbisch Hall. We have had a church in this area since the days of Bro. Froehlich.

Several years ago, a group of believers gathered together to form an assembly in Oehringen which lies in the same part of southern Germany. Surrounded by rolling hills, this picturesque region is always a lovely place to visit or to live.

For several years the group rented a facility in which to worship, but for various reasons there came a time when it no longer suited their needs. They explored various options, some

of which were shared with and considered by the Mission Committee.

Last year a building which served as a church for another group of people was available for purchase, and the congregation decided that this would indeed meet their needs. To support the purchase of this building, the Mission Committee agreed to send the sum of \$40,000 to assist this effort. The Oehringen congregation has expressed gratitude for this gift many times. The local elder is Bro. Hans Heer, who is well known among those who have visited Europe.

An invitation to the dedication

The Mission Committee received a formal invitation from the Oehringen congregation to attend dedication services for the new building. The date scheduled was May 24, 1998.

Approval was given for Bro. Wayne Anliker and his wife, Sis. Judy to represent the Mission Committee at this service. Also accompanying by personal invitation were Bro. Gene and Sis. Verna Lehman (Wolcott, IN)

and Bro. Kurt Munsel (Bay City, MI). The group arrived at the airport at Frankfurt, Germany on Friday, May 22. They were met by Elder Bro. Ernst Pfister and taken to Breidenbach.

After arriving at Pfisters' home, they had lunch, and rested a bit in the afternoon to compensate for the 7 hour difference in time. In the evening, the youth group orchestra played for about one half hour. It is no exaggeration to say that tears filled every eye. Following this, there were services in the evening. Elder Bro. Wayne Anliker spoke in English, translated to German by Bro. Martin Hildebrandt, one of their ministers

The dedication in Oehringen

After breakfast on Saturday, the group consisting of the five Americans, Bro. Ernst and Sis. Elisabeth Pfister, and Bro.Martin Hildebrandt, set forth for Oehringen. Because there was time, they took the scenic route along the Rhine river, and saw a number of historic sites. Arriving at Heer's home in good time, the group enjoyed a singing in the evening.

On Sunday morning, the dedication service was conducted by Bro. Ernst Pfister. This was followed by several hours of fellowship on the church property.

The afternoon service was conducted by Bro. Wayne with translation by Bro. Martin Hildebrandt. Evening found everyone with hearts full of gratitude and blessings, and bodies weary with the events of the day.

The further journey

On Monday, June 25, the group visited with the Klein family in Strasbourg, France. It is not possible in these short columns to express the spirit of brotherly kinship everyone felt. Historic sites, particularly those pertaining to Bro. Samuel Froehlich were visited.

What Can I Do To Help a Child?



The World Relief Committee was approached in 1996 concerning a need in Haiti to help fund education for children who otherwise could not afford to go to school. The World Relief Committee and the Mission Committee approved the idea of a Child Sponsorship Board being formed. The purpose of the Board was to organize a program offering members and friends of the Apostolic Christian Church the opportunity to sponsor a child in a foreign land and have direct communication with that child. In January of 1997, this new board began meeting on a monthly basis to ask for God's direction and to work out details on how this could be accomplished.

Sponsorship program established

In February of 1997, four brothers traveled to Haiti, visited several schools, and talked with many people concerning this need. Communication soon began between the Sponsorship Board and

school leaders in Haiti, CCCD in Jamaica, and the Mission Committee for Ixtlan, Mexico. Programs are being set up for each of these c o u n t r i e s whereby funds can be sent through



Apostolic Christian World Relief to help with educational needs. It was decided that a small "pilot program" would run for approximately one year to make sure all the details could be worked out before an announcement was made to the entire church body. That pilot

program began in early 1997 and was successful. This opportunity is now being extended to all members and friends.

Accountability is important

We have several goals for all of the children who enter this program. They should keep their grades up, attend school and church on a regular basis, and write to their sponsors periodically.

They are also encouraged to pray for their sponsors. In order for the Child Sponsorship Board to make sure that the child is meeting all of these criteria, we depend on the teachers in Haiti, Mexico and Jamaica. Therefore, we ask that all correspondence go through the World Relief Child Sponsorship office.

New brochure being developed

A brochure will soon be available to all of the Apostolic Christian churches briefly explaining the program. Anyone interested in more detailed information will be able to fill out the application.

Generally, to sponsor a child will cost between \$21.00 - \$30.00 per month (12 months per year). To sponsor an entire Haitian school, which has no individually sponsored children, is currently **Haiti** \$1,050.00 annually. Many Apostolic Christian brethren and friends currently sponsor a child through MEBSH in Haiti. If interested, those individuals can switch and begin sending their sponsorship money through the World Relief Child Sponsorship office and still keep the same child. Anyone wishing information on this can contact the Child Sponsorship office.

EDUCATION COORDINATOR NEEDED

I spent long hours and exhausting efforts trying to think of ways to reach students who did not want to be in my classes and whose parents did little to support the work of their children's teachers. I kept wishing I could take some of my students home with me and teach them the important things they needed to learn-not just when to use a comma or how to avoid splitting an infinitive, but how to take responsibility for the choices they were making and how to see beyond themselves enough to get along with others. God has given me the opportunity to work for an organization whose motto is "Turning Lives Around." Working at Gateway Woods has been a great blessing. Cooperating with other believers in work that has eternal significance-what could be a better way to spend our time?

My work as Education Coordinator keeps me in close contact with educators in the public schools. I can be the third party who is willing to do something to encourage students to follow their teachers' direction. I also get to work with my Brothers and Sisters who have invested their lives in houseparenting the children entrusted to their care. And for a couple of hours each school day, I get to work directly with the students whose lives we are trying to help turn around. Seeing their growth and learning has been very rewarding. Our new on-grounds school has given me more opportunities to learn this year. Developing curriculum and working with school officials to establish credit for our students has been challenging and rewarding.

--- Receiving Robert's final report card—at the beginning of this school year Robert thought he should not be required to do extra study in the classes he got D's in because his report card was "better than he had ever had before." On his final report card he had achieved honor roll grades.

— Watching Alex's growth in our on-grounds school—Alex not only made a great academic improvement; he learned how important it is to choose good friends and set a good example rather than following peers.

— Listening to a teacher tell me how much Heather has improved after being in our remedial math program during the summer.

Paul states he has no confidence in the flesh but can do all things through God. Don't have a competitive spirit, but serve God. It is a matter of love against hate, Devil versus God. Who do we want to be with in eternity? Stuck with the world in hell or be with God, and the people of these examples, forever?

So when I read this verse: "...for the devil is come down unto you. having great wrath, because he knoweth that he hath but a short time." (Revelation 12:12). I don't know exactly when this is referring to. He could be talking about a later war. But he could also be talking about that time period when Satan was kicked out of Heaven. But because Christ had already been crucified, resurrected and ascended. and done His work when this was written-when the revelation was given to John-it could be talking about a combination of past and future tense.

It could possibly be alluding to this short time as since the beginning of Adam and Eve in the garden. Do you say a short time? When we get several million years out there into eternity, yes, it's going to be a very short time. "...because he knoweth that he hath but a short time." (Rev. 12:12).

How much time do we have? How much time do I have? How much time do you have? Does anybody know? I think, for some reason it comes to my mind, of the Value Jet that went down in the swamp in Florida. If I remember correctly, I think the last message they heard at the control tower from the pilot was something like, "We have time..." and that was it, and they were gone. They lost contact and they found them in the swamp.

"...for the devil is come down unto you, having great wrath, because he knoweth that he hath but a short time." (Revelation 12:12). I think of military war. I think of Baghdad and I think of the U.S.A. I think of all our people at the Pentagon and all the other places that are doing intensive planning right now. Not just now, but the planning that's going on and all the thoughts about military intelligence and if we strike, where it will be.

Where are their weak spots? Where are their communication centers? Where are their missiles at? Where are they pointed? Where are their arsenals? Where are their supplies? Where is all that stuff? Because if we go to war, we are going to target that stuff. We understand that. We can see that after it happens, we can see it.

We can't see spirits. You know spirits are things that are also powerful. When I think of a spirit, I think of right now going through this room are all types of energy waves. You don't see them. But if we set down a receiving device, a radio right here and turned it on, if it had energy, and it worked, all of a sudden we would have sound coming from this radio that came from those energy waves that we can't see. But they are here all the time. There are all types of energy waves going through this room, but we can't see them.

We don't comprehend that there is energy in this room until we have a receiving device, or until we see action, or until something takes place. Spirits are like that. We can't see them, but they are spirits. These spirits, the devil and his angels, and his spirits are at war. We don't always recognize that until it's too late.

"...for the devil is come down unto you, having great wrath, because he knoweth that he hath but a short time." (Revelation 12:12). There are all types of examples that we can think of where someone was asleep and woke up too late. I think of an example of one of the clearest experiences I ever had.

I was in Washington D.C. I had been there for a couple days. It was Sunday morning and I was looking very forward to gathering with some brothers. It is a small little gathering in Washington D.C. I had planned my route all out as I had been there before. I took a long walk on Sunday morning down to the foggy bottom Metro station. I know that I have to go to Metro Central to change trains.

I know I'm going to get on the line heading, I think, it was the orange line, orange or blue, whatever, and I'm going to go west straight out of D.C. and then get off and take a short shuttle to go to church.

It was a nice morning. I am sitting down, relaxed, and visiting with some people on the train. All of a sudden, I hear the conductor on the train say, "Next stop, Pentagon." Fortunately I had been there before to know that something is wrong, because the Pentagon shouldn't be on this stop. The Pentagon is after you hook South to go towards National Airport, and I'm not going South, I'm going West. That is what I thought.

I immediately knew I was in trouble. I immediately knew I was on the wrong train. I was fortunate that I had left early enough that I had time to get off at the next stop and transfer to another train and go on back the other direction.

But what really struck me was that I had missed several very important key signs. I should have clearly known I was on the wrong train, but I didn't. I was living under the illusion that everything is fine, when I was going in the wrong direction all the time.

There are other interesting parallels to life, and one is this. In the D.C. Metro system at times, there are multiple trains running on the same tracks. I literally was on the right track for a period of time. I was at the right place, but multiple trains stopped at the same track. Now I shouldn't have missed it there either, because not only are they color coded, but on the train they will always list the name of the last stop. I could have read it on the train, but I missed it. I got on the wrong train.

There was another warning sign which is every time they come to a stop, they will say, "Pentagon City, next stop Pentagon." They will also say, when they take off, the name of the train, the color and the last stop. I missed all of those. You know, sometimes, usually on those trains, the sound is kind of muffled. The person isn't talking real clear, the message isn't real clear, but you've got to pay attention and listen.

I think of that parallel and the reality is it is so easy for us as humans to be preoccupied with other things and we think we are on the right train. The reality is this: it doesn't matter what we think. We are on one of two trains. Time is limited. We don't know how much

Sermon continued from page 45 time we have, but we are on one of two trains. One of those trains says Heaven, and it's powered by the shed blood of Jesus Christ.

The other train is labeled Hell, hellfire and damnation. The reality is that is the only place those trains are going. We are never ever going to get there; it's absolutely impossible. I could have ridden that wrong train for days and I would have never gotten where I wanted to go. Unless we are on that train bound for Heaven, we are never ever, ever going to get there.

My wife and I had a similar experience again last September. I had a meeting in Belgium and we were there for a few days time. We knew some friends over there and went to visit them. It was late one evening. There were multiple trains that we could have caught from St. Troiden back to go to Antwerp. We were enjoying our visit. They said, "You have plenty of time; we'll put you on the last train."

We had ridden that train the previous day, and every time we had wanted to get off the train, when it would stop, we would get up to get off the car and the doors to the car were open. We were coming from St. Troiden back into Brussels, it's late and the train came to a stop at the North Brussels rail station. We got up to go to the doors but the doors didn't open. We had never had to open them before. I didn't realize that you had to hit a button to open the doors to the train.

We got there and the doors didn't open. It doesn't stop very long, because it's late and there weren't very many passengers. We hear the sound of air. The brakes are released and the train starts to move again. By now it's going from the North to the Central Brussels rail station. With that in mind, the optimistic side of me said, "That's okay, we'll catch the next train coming back this way and it'll take us to Antwerp."

We got to Brussels and we checked it out and the last train had left two minutes ago. So we went to the station and asked, "How do we get to Brussels tonight?" He said, "You can't." "How do we get to Antwerp tonight?" He said, "You can't." "Anymore trains?" He said, "No. There are no more trains out of here until something like four or five in the morning."

I said, "What about motels?" He said, "There is none here, but there is one more Brussels station. You can go down there and check."

We went down the street and stopped at the first hotel and they said, "We are full." We said, "What about the others?" He said, "Already people have been by here and all the places are filled and there are no places to stay."

We spent the night in the cold. At a certain time after midnight, they shut the heat off in the Brussels railroad station. We spent the night in the Brussels railroad station, having had a room bought and paid for back in Antwerp. We didn't know anybody and it was kind of spooky and it was cold and it wasn't very comfortable.

I thought, "Wow! What a lesson." Someday, somewhere, someone is going to get caught and they are going to remember that there were two trains. You know, I heard about that. I heard about the message of Jesus Christ, but I thought I was okay. I thought I was on the right train. Or you know, I thought, "I'll catch the next one. I'll catch the next one tomorrow. I've got plenty of time."

It is going to hit someone after the rapture comes and all the believers that they knew are gone. All of a sudden, it's going to hit them. You know, I had a warm place that was bought and paid for, for me. It was already paid by the shed blood of Jesus Christ. I heard about it, but I didn't get there quick enough and I missed the train.

"...for the devil is come down unto you, having great wrath, because he knoweth that he hath but a short time." (Revelation 12:12). How much time do we have? What are the stakes? What is the game that we are playing? Do we think that there is a cost to serving Jesus Christ? Do we think that we have to give things up to serve God and Jesus Christ? Do we think that it's too much of a price to pay? If we do, we aren't seeing very clearly. If we feel that way, if we are foolish enough to feel that way, I shudder to think of the day that we will understand.

You know, Heaven is just absolutely going to be gorgeous and wonderful and marvelous beyond our dreams. No devil, no temptation, no pain, no cancer, no death. Nothing wrong. It's just going to be marvelous!

Hell is just going to be horrible beyond our imagination. I hate to talk about hell. But I have to think that perhaps two of the worst things about hell, beyond pain, is: Who are we going to be there with?

You read the newspapers. You read about the horrible things that are happening in life today, and those are happening because people don't have Jesus Christ in their hearts. If those people never come to Christ in their lifetime, those are the people that somebody is going to be in hell with.

But I think the greatest tragedy, the absolute, utmost, most horrible thing about hell is that it is going to be forever. If any of us find ourself there, we will be forever missing the love of God. We will never ever get to know the true love of a perfect God and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Think about this little point of time, thinking about this ray that goes on forever. Think about that the devil views himself as having a short time to deceive us. Where are we going to invest our time or energy? What is going to be our focus?

"And the dragon was wroth with the woman, and went to make war with the remnant of her seed, which keep the commandments of God, and have the testimony of Jesus Christ." (Revelation 12:17).

Let's be courageous. Let's not be ashamed of the gospel of Jesus Christ, even if the majority of the people around us don't care and mock us and make fun of us. Let us never lose sight of that because in the end there are only two destinations. Every living human being has need of what we have.

If we have Jesus Christ in our hearts, we have what every person in the world needs. Let us be thankful. Let us fight the devil for that.

When I am gone, release me, let me go -I have so many things to see and do. You mustn't tie yourself to me with tears, Be thankful for our many beautiful years.



Excerpts from the diary of Elder Henry Geistlich of Switzerland who visited the existing American churches in 1866.

<u>Saturday, July 7</u>. Near Bloomfield, IA: Today we arose at 4:00 to go on to Pulaski, IA. During the past night it was very hot, and we were unable to sleep. Three brothers and myself were in one room. We would like on our uncomfortable bed, uncovered, yet the sweat would roll down our bodies continuously. One brother lay down on the floor on account of the heat.

Oh, how many burdens and how much trouble there is here on this earth. Today we visited the brethren Miller and others. The church here is young, most of the brethren used to be Mennonites, people who lived much according to the law. This I am writing in Iowa, about 5,500 miles from my earthly home. At times homesickness seems to come over me and a longing for my home in Europe. Here at Pulaski there are many hundred thousand acres of land for sale, as cheap as four dollars and less per acre. The thought came to me that this would be a good place for the poorer brethren to settle.

The climate here is healthier than in Illinois. The wages are also good, but the grain and produce are not worth as much as in Illinois. There is a railroad through this part of the state, which will help the price of grain when it is finished. In the summer it gets hotter and in the winter colder here than at home in Europe.

I saw swine which had their ears frozen. This region does not have as much wood as many other places in America. The snakes and other pests are plentiful. At no place would I like it as well as at home in Europe. Yet when my brethren are assembled together, it became friendlier. I was somewhat burdened to make this trip to Iowa for if the lord doe snot shield us, it is hard to labor in the work of God.

Faith must give us courage and strength. Only belief and faith have the promise of God. Therefore, we must go our way and do our works only through faith and belief—without faith it is impossible to please God. Therefore, this trip was heavy and bitter for me. I have had to fight many a battle with Satan on my way.

Yet after we came here, the brethren were very glad and joyful over us. The Lord gave us his blessing and His precious Word of Life. So if it doe snot always go as we think and wish, we must let it serve for our best. We are only servants and maidservants of the Lord. We must at times go away or do a thing in obedience to the Lord, whether we can do it in full belief or not. We find in Samuel I, 15:22, "Behold to obey is better than sacrifice." This is also for all followers of Christ.

<u>Sunday</u>, July 8. Pulaski, IA: Today there was church at Bro. Kropf's. He used to be a leader and preacher for the Mennonites. The entire church consists of about 25 members. They are yet young in their faith. Seemed to be very lovable brethren to me. We had many blessings together and enjoyed ourselves as children of God. Today I felt sick in body, but in the spirit I felt well and was of good courage. Through many afflictions we must be proved and receive from the Lord one victory after another.

<u>Monday, July 9.</u> Pulaski, IA: Today we visited with many brethren in their homes. In the evening there was church. Bro. Josef Bella and myself talked over many things concerning the church.

<u>Tuesday</u>, July 10. Pulaski, IA: Today I wrote several letters; one to the brethren in Zurich, Switzerland and one to Bros. Peter and Joseph Virkler in New Bremen, NY which I sent away by chance, as the mail is not as regular here as at home.

<u>Wednesday</u>, <u>July 11</u>. Pulaski, IA: Today we left Pulaski for Elgin, IA which is in the northern part of the state. We first visited three brethren who live about 26 miles south of here. A brother took us to the Mississippi River, where we boarded a ship for Burlington, which is city on the river. Today we saw a rattlesnake. We could see how with its power of charm it tried to catch a frog. The snake was yet a way off when the frog started to scream and with all its power tried to escape while it was yet possible for the frog to get away so that it would not become a victim of the snake.

I thought in like manner shall the faithful try to escape from the old serpent, which is Satan. When he is yet far off, we must run for him so that with his charms and calling we do not let ourselves be misled; for if we do not escape, he will swallow us. His power of charm is great and his hold is death to all them that are not awake to his danger and again listen to his calling.

To the opposition of this serpent we have Jesus Christ, who did conquer and overcome this serpent. In Jesus Christ there is hidden no false charm, no deception, and no deadly poison, for He is the Messiah. He is the Saviour! He is the Redeemer and salvation of the world. No one is deceived or harmed by Him. He came to bring salvation and happiness to mankind, life, peace and joy.

Thursday, July 12. Burlington, IA: Today we sailed further north on the Mississippi on a steamboat to McGregor, where we took the railroad to Elgin, IA which was our destination. The trip on the river was very pleasant. I was thinking to myself, that this river is as I have heard of it many times before and thought of it and now I am riding on it. How wonderful are the ways and leadings of the Lord. How He leads His children to the goal of their eternal end.

Friday, July 13. The past night we had to spend in a railroad station as there was a wreck on the railroad. The train left the track and the engineer and the fireman were hurt. How soon does an accident happen if the Lord does not shield and watch over us. For all things we shall be thankful to Him.

<u>Saturday. July 14.</u> In northern Iowa. We still have one more day to travel. The region here is thinly settled and has much timber.

"Carried By Angels" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

Recently, the story of the rich man and Lazarus was read in our church. I noticed that "Lazarus was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom." (Luke 16:22). I have long imagined that when a believer dies, his or her spirit soars away to be with the Lord, to receive a new body at the time of the resurrection. The Apostle Paul wrote, "Having a desire to depart, and to be with Christ; which is far better." (Philippians 1:23).

Enter the angels. What do they have to do with this? Will they carry you and me to Abraham's bosom in Paradise? Jesus told the thief on the cross, "To day shalt thou be with me in paradise." (Luke 23:43). Therefore, I use the word Paradise for Heaven, and I capitalize it as a proper noun, the name of a definite place. It may well be that angels will carry us to Paradise.

The word "carry" is interesting. When I was in Alabama, the word meant to give a ride in your car. In the north it meant to hold and transport something in your arms. It may be that the angles will carry us in their arms, or it may be that they will simply escort us. Either way, I like the idea. Most of us are ready for a little comfort and consolation.

In Acts 4:12 we read concerning the Lord Jesus Christ, "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." So far as I know, Abraham had never heard the name of Jesus Christ. Christ's mother. Mary, and her husband to be, Joseph, were the first to hear it. The angel, Gabriel, said to Mary, "Thou shalt...call his name Jesus." (Luke 1:31). The angel of the Lord, perhaps Gabriel, said to Joseph in a dream, "Thou shalt call his name Jesus: for he shall save his people from their sins." Nevertheless, Abraham is most

certainly in Heaven where he welcomed Lazarus. He did not know Jesus by name but he knew God's promises and believed them. We read, "Abraham believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness." Christ's atonement was efficacious or effective for Abraham because he believed God, and believed in the promises. That's wonderful.

The Bern Apostolic Christian Church is located five miles southeast of Bern on the rolling Kansas prairie—an area settled largely by Swiss and German immigrants.

In 1870, four families from Bluffton, IN moved to Blue Springs, NE and then eventually settled near Bern. As other families migrated to the area, a church was established. In 1895, a building was erected for worship services, with a separate building serving as a Sunday School. Many hardships, primitive living conditions, and encounters with Indians were endured by these forefathers. The church was remodeled and a full basement added in 1947. Construction began in 1970 on the new church building and it was dedicated in 1972. An addition to the Sunday School was completed in 1984. As this is being written, in 1998, a hard surface road is just now under construction, leading to the present Bern Church.
