Sermon

There was a wall that had the thickness, which, I think eight

We can believe that the city of Babylon was a great, great city, as it says it here. It was surrounded and protected in such a way that they could raise enough food for several years, and then they could, keep going.

Willingly Ignorant

The dictionary defines "ignorant" as lacking knowledge, education or experience. We are all ignorant in some topics for it is not possible for us to be knowledgeable about everything. As a result of our limited abilities, we must make choices about which subjects we will be ignorant and those about which we will be informed.

In choosing the topics about which we will be well informed, we need to weigh the importance of the topic and the consequences of ignorance. One topic that we are all ignorant about at some stage of our lives is the importance of salvation and a personal relationship with God.

Until we reached the age when we could understand our responsibilities toward God, we were not accountable for this ignorance. Prior to our ability to understand, the Scripture tells us that "...the times of this ignorance God winked at;..." (Acts 17:30). The time comes for each of us, however, when there is no longer an excuse to remain ignorant and we read that God "...now commandeth all men every where to repent" (Acts 17:30).

The Scripture often refers to the spiritual ignorance of man. In each case there are consequences for this ignorance. The prophet Isaiah wrote "The way of peace they know not; and there is no judgment in their goings: they have made them crooked paths; whosoever goeth therein shall not know peace" (Is. 59:8). The Apostle Paul wrote "For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves unto the righteousness of God" (Ro. 10:3).

Ignorance of God's ways is sometimes a result of being placed in a situation where the opportunity to know of God is very limited. Those who have less opportunity to know God's ways have limited accountability. We are instructed that "...he that knew not, and did commit things worthy of stripes, shall be beaten with few stripes" (Luke. 12:48).

The scripture issues strong admonition about those who are willingly ignorant. Christ spoke of willing ignorance

when He said "For this people's heart is waxed gross, and their ears are dull of hearing, and their eyes have they closed; lest at any time they should see with their eyes, and hear with their ears, and should understand with their heart, and should be converted,..." (Matt. 13:15).

The power of God is denied by those who are unwilling to rely upon Him - "For this they willingly are ignorant of, that by the word of God the heavens were of old (II Peter 3:5). Being willingly ignorant of God's plan of salvation in no way relieves us of the responsibility to do what is right. We are instructed that a "...servant, which knew his lord's will, and prepared not himself, neither did according to his will, shall be beaten with many stripes" (Luke 12:47).

How can we avoid being willingly ignorant? We have many opportunities in our brotherhood to learn of God's will. We can start and end each day with a conversation with God. It is important that we remember that a conversation is a two way process. We have the privilege of talking to Him through the avenue of prayer. We have the opportunity of having Him talk to us by reading His Word. This avenue of conversation needs to be exercised fervently and often. We are taught to "Pray without ceasing" (I Thess. 5:17) and "...continuing instant in prayer" (Ro. 12:12). An instant, unceasing two way communication with God will help to ensure that we are not ignorant of His will.

Attendance at all the church services possible (AM, PM and midweek) will help keep us in close contact with the Lord. Paul instructs us of the importance of "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together,..." (Heb. 10:25) as a means of encouraging one another to continue in the faith.

In addition to the regular worship services, in our brotherhood we have many additional opportunities to be in the House of God and under the sound of His voice. Gathering together to "Sing forth the honor of his name:..." (Ps. 66:2) also can bring us closer to the Lord.

When a soul has repented and been

converted, they have an opportunity to share their experience with the congregation. As often as possible we should be in attendance at these testimonies to provide support to the convert and to be reminded of our conversion experience.

The members of any organization need to be informed of the concerns of the leadership of that organization. It is especially important in the household of faith that all of the brothers and sisters are aware of the concerns of the church leadership. By listening to the tapes of the general conference and by attending the reading of the memorandum, each member of the church can be well informed of these concerns and of how they can support the unity and soundness of the faith. In the early church after the Jerusalem conference a letter was sent to the believers at Antioch and "...when they had read, they rejoiced for the consolation" (Acts 15:31). We also can rejoice when given Godly direction.

A special time to strengthen our faith and to draw closer to God and one another is the communion service. Each of us is admonished to "...examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread, and drink of that cup...For if we judge ourselves, we should not be judged" (I Cor. 11:28,31). This is a very sacred opportunity for each brother and sister to strengthen his or her relationship with God and with the members of the church.

Other opportunities that we have to learn of God's love for us and of His plan for our life include attendance at funerals whenever possible. This provides us with a reminder of the brevity of life and the certainty of death and that we will give an account of our life to God.

Weddings of brothers and sisters, special holiday services and other special occasions all serve to provide us with an opportunity to "Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you" (James 4:8).

God has been so good to us. He has provided ample means for us to learn of His expectations for our life. Surely none of us would want to be ignorant of His love for us, and there is no excuse for us to be willingly ignorant of His Word.

USA Board Looks Back on a Busy Year of Helping Others

...and there shall be famines, and pestilence, and earthquakes, in divers places. Matthew 42:7

As we review the past year, the brethren on the USA board recognize the similarity of our weather patterns and natural disasters to the words of our merciful Savior.

Unprecedented numbers of damaging acts of nature

It seems as though the number and violence of hurricanes, tornadoes, flooding, and drought is almost unprecedented in our recent memory.

We are grateful to almighty God that most of our brethren have been spared from great catastrophe and major loss. However, those whose occupations depend upon weather conditions have also felt the strain.

Opportunities to serve God by helping those in need

Now we all have opportunity to assist those who have not been so fortunate as we by donating a portion of the blessings we have received from God above. Through our World Relief organization we are also given the chance not only to assist financially, but also with our time and efforts. Many brethren and friends have responded to the calls for help, and the need for such assistance is ongoing.

Cleaning up following tornadoes

Work projects for rebuilding after tornadoes from early 1998 are still looking for volunteers. The storms have brought mass destruction and flooding from the deluge of rain that accompany them.

Projects for cleanup and rebuilding have been organized. In some of these efforts we coordinate our work with Christian Aid Ministries, which has long been our ally in this kind of work. Some projects are:

- Birmingham, Alabama tornado damage.
- Pascagoula, Mississippi hurricane wind and flood damage.
- Cuero, Texas flooding from rains spawned by hurricanes.

The Birmingham project is about 95 miles from our Athens, AL church. The Cuero project is close to our central Texas church meeting locations. Please contact your local Treasurer-Representative if you would like to help in these efforts or would like to have more information.



Hay to the Southwest

Some of these areas of drought in the Southwest have been having floods as a result of the fierce hurricanes in the Caribbean. Concerned brethren continue to monitor the situation, and try to respond to the evolving events.

Late last summer our brethren were given the opportunity to provide hay and transportation to the drought area of Oklahoma and Texas. Upwards of 30 truck loads and 6 freight car loads of hay were donated by brethren and friends in several midwestern states. Aid continues as needs become apparent.

Caribbean/Latin America

Hurricanes Georges and Mitch, both violent storms, brought devastation to Puerto Rico and the Dominican Republic plus flooding and landslides to Honduras, Guatemala, Nicarauga, and Belize.

Food supplies were destroyed, and even worse, trees and vegetation necessary to produce foods were virtually wiped off the landscape. It will be years before they can grow to a size that will produce fruit.

Roads and bridges were washed out, making distribution of supplies very difficult. Again, opportunities have been given to the brotherhood and friends to donate food grains and money to deliver them.

Six containers of pinto beans are presently being processed. Four semi

loads of corn have been cleaned, bagged in 50 lb. Bags, palletized, and shipped. It is anticipated that many more will be available.

These commodities are being shipped through international relief organizations with whom we have worked for many years. We are very grateful that in years past brethren have sought out and established working relationships with

groups larger than ourselves in whom we have confidence. This type of mutual respect and cooperation enables us to reach much further than would be possible on our own. We thank God for guiding us in this way.

If you want to help

Anyone who feels they would like to assist in these projects and efforts should contact their local Treasurer-Representative. Although more funds are needed, there are also many ways in which you can give of your time and effort to help those in great need.

Building Advisory Committee & North American Church Building Fund

In April, 1998 we reported on the appointment and function of the Building Advisory Committee (BAC) and the North American Church Building Fund (NACBF). We wish to share with you some of the work that has been done.

Building Advisory Committee

This committee was appointed three years ago by the Mission Committee with Elder body approval. The purpose is to assist new, small, or needy Apostolic Christian congregations to construct or purchase an adequate house of worship.

The BAC is also available to assist any size congregation in a construction project. Five brothers who have experience in construction and financing of the same have been carefully chosen to serve on this committee.

On-site evaluation and help

Congregations who are investigating the possibility of having their own building are encouraged to invite the BAC to assist them early in the process. Small groups beginning a new congregation often do not have someone in the group with expertise in construction.

Committee members will visit the area and help evaluate the possibility of buying or building. Often building new is the best choice. However, many factors enter into this decision such as: availability of a structure or site, suitability of the location, and potential growth of the congregation.

These factors and perhaps some others then lead the planners to determine the size of the initial phase plus the provision for expansion should it become necessary.

How to finance the projects

When the BAC began to work, it soon became evident that funding the project was a major concern. Many times the group is small, and does not have the ability to finance an entire project without assistance.

The Mission Committee put much effort into investigating this situation, and eventually recommended that the North American Church Building Fund be established. Its purpose was to help small congregations cover expenses until they are large enough to do so themselves.

This was approved by the Elder body. Shortly thereafter funds from the Brotherhood Assistance funds became available, and it was agreed that approximately \$4,000,000 be transferred to this fund. Many times in past years churches and church homes were built using money from these funds as loans which were paid back as time progressed.

Grants or loans

The original intent of the NACBF was to give grants to small and needy congregations. A method of qualifying for grants is in place and available where needs exist. Additionally there is also a provision for any size congregation to receive a loan at reasonable interest if they do not qualify as small or needy.

Projects approved to date

Following are brief descriptions of approved projects in three states and in Canada.

Atlanta, GA

After exploring options, the BAC recommended purchasing and remodeling an existing building. It is now complete, for which we are thankful.

Kitchener, Canada

The BAC recommended a new building in this case, for nothing suitable was available. Construction is underway with plans provided by the BAC, who also coordinated the work. We are grateful that it will be well under budget due to a tremendous amount of volunteer labor from many of our congregations.

Prescott, AZ

The BAC followed the same procedure here, recommending a new building. They helped both in buying the land and planning construction. Hopefully building will soon begin with the BAC as coordinators. Volunteer assistance would be greatly appreciated.

Portland, OR

The BAC assisted in remodeling a building purchased prior to committee existence. Funding was not needed from the NACBF since the Mission Committee had approved financing.

Several other projects are receiving input from the BAC, but have not been given financial approval. Congregations that do not qualify for grants could possibly receive loans from the fund.



We received a telephone call from his wife, Junko, a little after 10:00 p.m. I am writing this at about 12:00 noon, Monday, December 21, which means it is 9:00 p.m. Sunday in Chicago, since we are 15 hours ahead of Central Standard Time.

It was 47 years ago that Toshiaki invited me to visit his parents who live in a place called Yamanashi Prefecture. We came out by train one Sunday. One thing led to another and now Lois and I are happily living in Yamanashi, pretty well surrounded by beautiful mountains, some of them snow-capped at this time of the year, although we have had a mild winter so far where we live, which is not as high as the mountains.

Tomorrow, Lois and I will travel to Chiba, have a pre-funeral meeting tomorrow evening at the funeral place, stay over night in that very building, and the following day, December 23, we will have the funeral from 12:00 to 1:00. We will be short of singers so we plan to take a cassette tape of hymn singing, to augment our own singing. It is about a three-hour trip by bus and train, so I think Lois and I will be the only ones there from our church. We have a special Christmas service here at Shioda that day because it is a national holiday, the Emperor's birthday, and fortunately, Bro. Akito will come to lead the singing and to have the service, at 3:00 p.m., which will be followed by a buffet style Christmas dinner. Things sort of piled up on us.

Babylon was a wicked city. Babylon was known as a city that was crushed, as it is now. We don't hear anything about Babylon. But Babylon (I don't get this from the Good Book here, but from what I hear) is to be rebuilt. This is a great city which will fall in one hour. (See Revelation 18:17).

Now we have to realize that all these things are mentioned, "Cinnamon, and odours, and ointments, and frankincense, and wine, and oil..." (Revelation 18:13). She had all those, Babylon had all those things at her disposal. She could ship many of them.

The River Euphrates went right under Babylon...went right under the wall...right through the wall...and on to the other side. As long as the River Euphrates was high, it was safe from any intruders that wanted to get in from the outside.

We know that because the Medes and the Persians conquered Nebuchadnezzar. We know that the Medes and the Persians were the two kingdoms which fought together and conquered Babylon.

How did they conquer her? I don't know whether it was a Persian or a Mede, but they diverted the River Euphrates up the line a ways. They made another outlet for the River Euphrates to go and that dried up the water that went under the walls. Then the Medes and Persians marched in on dry ground.

Now we know that it wasn't Nebuchadnezzar who was in rule then. It was a grandson of Nebuchadnezzar, Belshazzar, who was Nabonidus' son. Belshazzar was in power and Belshazzar was not the ruler. He was a man who occupied the high authority while

Nabonidus was out fighting.

Belshazzar took the cups, the gold and the things that came out of the temple in Jerusalem and they had a big party. That is when the hand writing was on the wall: "MENE, MENE, TEKEL, U-PHARSIN", which means, "Thou art weighed in the balances, and art found wanting." (Daniel 5:25,27).

Daniel told them the meaning of the rest of the hand writing on the wall, "MENE: God hath numbered thy kingdom, and finished it. TEKEL: Thou art weighed in the balances, and art found wanting. PERES: Thy kingdom is divided, and given to the Medes and Persians." (Daniel 5:26-28). That is when he found out that very night that he was going to be conquered. He did not know how, but he was going to be conquered.

It so happened that the Medes and the Persians, in the meantime, came in under the wall and they had a battle there. And Belshazzar was slain. (See Daniel 5:30).

Now what does that all have to do with this Babylon here? It can tell us that the Babylon that was there first was the same type of city that will be there afterwards, we think.

We can do like much in the Revelation. We might think that it means something else. We might think that it is a mystic. We might think this means this, and this means that. I don't think this chapter is that way.

I think Babylon is going to be a city, and I think it will fall in one hour. Now you might ask me, "What does one hour mean?" I am not sure what one hour is, but we know that it is shorter than a day. We know it is shorter than a week.

We know that it passed from time into eternity in a very short time.

Here it says, "And I heard another voice from heaven, saying, come out of her, my people, that ye be not partakers of her sins, and that ye receive not of her plagues." (Revelation 18:4). Now that gives us a clue that there were some of God's people in that city. There were some of God's people who are mixed. Don't ask me whether they were Jews or Gentiles because I think there would be both here during this time. But they were told to come out and not to partake of any of her sins.

"For her sins have reached unto heaven, and God hath remembered her iniquities. Reward her even as she rewarded you..." (Revelation 18:5,6). We think of the latter part of the tribulation period. I will call it the tribulation period because the first three and one-half years is a tribulation period. The second three and onehalf years is not of God. If you don't believe me, you can read in the latter part of Revelation, it doesn't speak about the tribulation period. It talks about the wrath of God.

If we knew what the wrath of God really was, it would sober us a great, great deal. For we have never encountered the wrath of God. We have never come close.

The merchants in the ships that took goods of precious stones, pearls, fine linen, purple, silk and so forth, they warned the falling of Babylon because they were rich by her, and they "cried when they saw the smoke of her burning, saying, What city is like unto this great city!" (Revelation 18:18).

Now I don't know but I believe and I heard it spoken by elders who are not on this earth anymore, that Jerusalem will be the great city that will endure and be God's city. This is a great city, but it isn't God's city.

"And they cast dust on their heads, and cried, weeping and wailing, saying, Alas, alas that great city, wherein were made rich all that had ships in the sea by reason of her costliness! for in one hour is she made desolate." (Revelation 18:19)

Now I ask you, will you put a meaning to that? Can you divert from the words here and use other words? I don't believe so. I think it is just the way it says.

"Then there was a great rejoicing for God said they should rejoice." (Revelation 19:20)

He compared the fall of Babylon with a millstone that is cast into the lake. (See Revelation 18:21)

Babylon will be utterly destroyed, "and shall be found no more at all. And the voice of harpers, and musicians, and of pipers, and trumpeters, shall be heard no more at all in thee; and no craftsman, of whatsoever craft he be, shall be found any more in thee; and the sound of a millstone shall be heard no more at all in thee." (Revelation 21,22)

This is not talking about the millstone that is cast into the lake because they used millstones at that time.

"And the light of a candle shall shine no more at all in thee; and the voice of the bridegroom and of the bride shall be heard no more at all in thee: for thy merchants were the great men of the earth; for by thy sorceries were all nations deceived." (Revelation 18:23) Now the last verse means something. They all mean something, but it is evident here, "And in her was found the blood of prophets, and of saints, and of all that were slain upon the earth." (Revelation 18:24). We ought to recognize the ones that die in Christ a martyred death. They were slain on the earth...the prophets and the saints. It is pretty hard to put ourselves in that position.

Have you ever been confronted with someone who wanted to kill you? It is not an easy thing. To stand facing God, that is worth more than what all this world has to offer, only to await the time when the dead in Christ shall rise.

Then what will it be? It will be glory for ever and ever.

Thursday, September 13: We are on the sea. The weather is pleasant. Today was another fine day. I can hardly believe that it can go so good for us, yet we can well accept it if the Lord gives it to us. Oh, that He will also give us grace to be thankful for all His love and goodness, which He shows to us. We were created to praise Him and glorify His Holy Name, which is high in Heaven and on earth.

Today my thoughts went back to New York City where it is like Babel, which means confusion. We find of Jehu in the book of Kings (Chapt. 2:9-20), "The driving is like the driving of Jehu, the son of Nimshi, for he drives furiously." Yet the driving of Jehu was not without purpose for the Everlasting. But this confusion and driving is as if they were without a mind for all the values and riches of this world. I was glad when I could leave this city, so much did I dislike it.

Most all large cities in America are the same. How much patience does God have with these people, who are hurrying and running toward the end when all will be accomplished, as the Lord says, "When you see the abomination of desolation, then you know that the end is nigh." I believe that the time is near and that we stand close to the end, near to that great day, for soon will the six great world days be over and the seventh as a day of rest appear. Today our ship made 290 miles.

Friday, September 14: The weather is rainy and windy today. Often I have heard it said that the morning hour has gold. This fable has come true in me, for if early in the morning I open my heart and mouth to God, I am more delighted than I am in the evening. It is as the Psalm reads, "The night comes with weeping, but the morning is joy again." Yet in the evening, when the afflictions and the longing for home is the greatest, I feel more need of the patience which we all must have. It is as I said the first time, the sea is a real test for measuring our pa-

tience. Today the trip went well. Thanks be to the Lord for this. Our ship made 285 miles today.

Saturday, September 15: On the ocean. The weather stormy and unpleasant. Today I awoke to another new morning. When will the time come when I will awake on that Eternal morning? Today I read in Chapter 11 of Hebrews about the faith of our forefathers, how the spirit of faith made them holy. This is very important and strengthening to read. They, too, only saw the promises from afar. In faith God did wish to accomplish this in us, for that we are thankful. Today our ship made 298 miles.

Sunday, September 16: Today is a stormy day. Last night it was so rough one could hardly sleep. Today is Sunday, when others can refresh themselves in the Lord, we must fast. But in this we are not alone, for in the time of the Apostles, Paul and the other brothers had the same experience on their trips. They were humbled in many sorrows.

The Apostle writes in the Acts how on their trip to Rome they were in many dangers on land and on sea. And if the storm is wild and dark on the outside, if only we are clear and light inwardly, for by God darkness is not dark, night is light as day. The city of God where the mansions of the ransomed are, will be fine and merry. God will be in the center of it and, therefore, it is well protected.

Every time I went to bed on the sea, it seemed as if I laid myself in a casket, first because the bed was so small, similar to a casket, and secondly because one does not know if he will be swallowed up and buried in the deep from the waves during the night. On the sea it is only a step between life and death. Here one should give his life entirely into the hands of God, for Him to do as it is pleasing to Him.

In such a place, a true Christian has many advantages, for he can turn to God his Heavenly Father in full satisfaction and confidence, knowing that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, not made with hands, eternal in the heavens (II Cor. 5). Often it is my desire and longing to be pleasing to Him. Today our ship made 313 miles.

Monday, September 17: On the ocean and the weather is pleasant. The sea was quiet and all was well, yet I had a great desire to be on land. On the sea one becomes very lonesome, although I am satisfied for the Lord has helped until now. I noticed several times a passenger beside me, who had a nice photograph of someone. I presume it was his beloved one, which he looked at eagerly. At last this became interesting to me, taking from it a lesson for myself, thinking that I too shall have such a desire for Jesus, my Beloved one, with Whom I am eternally united and obligated and spiritually carry His picture and image deep in my heart, which this man does with his picture (which is all in vain, as it is only a shadow).



This all the apostle truthfully and plainly describes in such a manner that we do not have to be in doubt about it. We only shall be concerned as to how we can become more like this image of Christ. There is no doubt that our churches and assemblies are appreciated far too little. Those that can partake or enjoy them continuously appreciate the assemblies most when they have them no more. Therefore, we have the important admonishment of the Apostle Paul. He writes in Hebrews 10:25, "not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as is the manner of some, but exhorting one another, and so much more, as ye see the day approaching."



"In Remembrance"

Concerning the Lord's Supper, Jesus said, "This do in remembrance of me." (Luke 22:19). Thanksgiving Day helps us remember to be thankful, Christmas helps us to remember Christ's birth, and Easter is to remind us that Christ arose. Jesus said in John 14:26, "But the Comforter...shall...bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you." The Passover Feast, which preceded the institution of the Lord's Supper, was itself in remembrance deliverance from the slavery the children of Israel endured in Egypt. It is written, "And this day shall be unto you for a memorial." (Exodus 12:14).

Clearly, the Bible teaches us to remember certain things and our culture teaches us to remember certain things. It is commonly believed that we should remember our wedding anniversary, if we are married, and also our birthdays. If we remember the special days of our family members and friends, they are very happy to have been remembered.

At a recent Holy Communion service in our Tokyo Church, I emphasized "In remembrance." Later I thought, "But I often teach that we should forget, based on the scripture, 'Forgetting those thing which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before." (Philippians 3:13). For sure, the Bible teaches us to remember, but it also teaches us to forget. Evidently, we have our hands full figuring out what to remember and what to forget. Even after we have decided what to remember and what to forget, we may not be able to forget some things as we would like to, and we may not be able to remember some things which we should remember. For instance, we would all like to remember names better, but we forget. If you can associate something like a person's name, with something familiar, like another well known person with the same name, it is much easier to remember. If we can associate Christ's resurrection with Easter, we can remember the resurrection almost without thinking, although it may be rather shallow thinking.

About forgetting those things which are behind, the Apostle Paul was speaking about unpleasant things, I do believe. We simply must put behind us our own failings of the past, and also the failings of others toward us. If Satan can get us to stew about things which can no longer be changed, he might even get us to become depressed. It is better to think of those things which are, "Honest, just, pure and lovely." (Phil. 4:8).

Obviously, there are some things which we should remember, such as Christ's death on the cross for us. We should also remember with thanksgiving, how hard our parents worked for us. At the same time, let's at least try to forget all those unpleasant things which can no longer be changed. Let's smile and start over.





Harper, KS -1885

Cheap land and the pioneer spirit drew brethren from various established locations to Harper, KS. The living conditions of the South Central Kansas area during the 1880's were harsh. One room homes, made of sod, which formed the walls. Boards were placed across the walls to form rafters on which was placed tar paper. Sod was then laid on the tar paper.

There are many stories of the trials of our brethren as they braved the challenges of the day. One couple wrested with the severe conditions for nine years as crop failure from drought and hail plagued their brave hearts. They were also plagued by diseases prevalent on the frontier, such as malaria and typhoid.

Hardships caused a gradual decline in membership until finally in 1959 services were terminated.
