John 1:1-34

John was writing this Word, and he was really not a lot different than any of us. He was a business man and knew what it was like to have the daily pressures of keeping men busy in working a business and working to make a living. At one time, I believe, the Lord Jesus called him "The son of thunder." (See Mark 3:17). He must have had a temper somewhat and yet, we can see how the Lord molded him and humbled him.

For any of us, we all have, perhaps, at least I know I sure do, I have some things that I would love to see the Lord change and I would love to be a little different in some areas. But the Lord can change us. I don't know how many times, but maybe half a dozen times in the Scripture it says that he was the disciple that Jesus loved. Isn't that precious? One time the Lord called him "The son of thunder" because he is quick on the draw and yet, the Lord Jesus loved him.

One time at supper time, we find John on Jesus' breast. They were evidently very close, and may it be so in our lives, beloved. Sometime we can say, "Well, maybe I am not quite right in this area," so we draw back from God. May it be just the opposite and may it cause us to draw close to Him. It is because of Jesus Christ that we read about here that we have that privilege and we have that right.

He talks about grace for grace. When we understand the grace of God and the forgiveness of God, then there is just more grace for every need in our lives.

It began, "In the beginning was

the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." (John 1:1). What is the Word, beloved? What is the Word as we read here, "In the beginning was the Word..." We know that if we think of the Word as this Word that we see today, this precious Word that gives us instruction, comfort, reprove and there is everything that we need right here, beloved, to direct us in life. The Word is God's revelation of Himself to us, isn't it? It is God revealing Himself and opening Himself to us and He did it in such a precious way through the life of the Lord Jesus Christ...Christ being God with us.

"In the beginning was the Word..." We have a Bible class at home and one of the questions that was asked in the Bible class, one of the young men said, "What does it mean The Word?" Communication is so important in life. Is it that in the beginning communication was one of the first things that God created? Oh, yes, in a sense but that communication, beloved, if it is not in Jesus Christ, we miss the mark, don't we?

"In the beginning was the Word..." We can read in Genesis, "In the beginning..." What happened in the beginning, dear ones? It says, "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." (Genesis 1:1). God spoke in the beginning and I take that to mean that in the beginning was the Word. The Word was there. The Word always was. God always was. Jesus always was.

But in the beginning, as we read of it here, the world began. In the beginning, God created and God spoke and the galaxies and the planets all whirled into place. God spoke and there were plants and animals breathing and pulsing. God spoke and there were human beings created with the heart beat and the capability of loving, and the capability of sharing and giving.

Faith Without Works Is Dead

We often hear sincere children of God discuss the topic of faith vs. works as they relate to salvation. We know that we can never do enough good works to earn our salvation. Yet we know that "...faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone" (Ja. 2:17). What, then, is the duty of a child of God as it relates to faith and works?

The attitude of so many in nominal Christendom is to accept the Lord Jesus Christ as your personal Saviour and be saved. This process of instant salvation has significant appeal in a world in which instant gratification is the normal expectation. We have fast food, fast transportation, fast communication, fast credit, fast entertainment, etc. Why not fast salvation?

The ability to receive almost instant gratification from the above list is dependent upon someone else having provided the means to allow us to have these material items so rapidly. If it were not for a great deal of organization, management and technological know how applied, there would be no means available for these things to be given to us so rapidly.

Salvation, on the other hand, is not something that can be given to us by someone else. There is one part of the nominal Christian version of salvation that is accurate. Salvation is dependent upon our having a knowledge of a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. It is a relationship that must be nurtured in such a way that it can grow over a period of time

Numerous places in the scripture we are instructed that we begin our relationship with Christ as babes and then we are to grow. We are instructed that "as newborn babes, desire the sincere milk of the word, that ye may grow thereby" (II Peter 2:2). The Apostle Paul, in admonishing and exhorting the Corinthian Christians to grow, expressed dismay that they had not gotten past the "milk stage" of Christianity. He wrote to them "I have fed you with milk, and not with meat; for hitherto ye were not able to bear it, neither yet now are ye able" (I Cor. 3:2). He further

encouraged them to "...be not children in understanding: howbeit in malice be children, but in understanding be men" (I Cor. 14:20).

He also encouraged the Galatians that "...we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness whereby they lie in wait to deceive; But speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ" (Eph. 4:14-15).

Therefore, we can come to understand that salvation is not accomplished as an instant act nor from a short term commitment.

There is no doubt that salvation is available to us through faith. In Ephesians we are instructed very clearly that "...by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast" (Eph. 2:8-9). In instructing His disciples, Jesus Christ reminded them that it was His blood "...which is shed for many for the remission of sins" (Matt. 26:28) that makes salvation possible.

The Apostle Paul reminded the Romans that of ourselves, we are nothing. We have nothing to boast of because boasting "...is excluded. By what law? of works? Nay; but by the law of faith" (Ro. 3:27).

What role then does works have in our salvation? The writings of James makes it very clear that works are a part of the requirements for a Child of God. Are Paul and James lacking in harmony? Is there a division between them? Paul again addresses this issue when he wrote "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you;" (I Cor. 1:10). He also reminded them to "...Be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind..." (II Cor. 13:11).

Since Christ is not divided and God's people must be of one mind, we can understand that the writings of Paul and the writings of James complement each

other. They are not contradictory towards each other but supplementary.

Works then are a result of faith. After we have established a foundation of faith we are prepared to grow. Certainly our faith gets stronger as we mature and learn to know our Heavenly Father better. This maturity brings a desire to be of greater service to God.

James emphasizes a faith of action. He reminds us that we are to take advantage of the God given opportunities to do good. If we see one in need and do nothing to help them, then our faith is of no significance. If we simply acknowledge the need of the destitute and do nothing for them, we have neither warmed nor filled them. "What doth it profit, my brethren, though a man say he hath faith, and hath not works? can faith save him? If a brother or sister be naked. and destitute of daily food, and one of you say unto them, Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit" (Ja. 2:14-16)?

If taken out of their proper context, the statements of the Apostles Paul and James could be made to appear to contradict one another.

However, in I Cor. 13, this issue is laid to rest. In this beautiful exhortation, the faith vs. works issue is brought together and resolved. Here we are clearly instructed that works by themselves would leave us as nothing and be of no profit to us. Read I Cor. 13 for further study.

Therefore we take the instruction of Paul "...by grace are ye saved through faith..." (Eph. 2:8) and the instructions of James "...faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone..." (Ja. 2:17) being brought together by charity. A long list of works is mentioned and we are given to understand that these works, being alone, are of no value to us. We can, however, make them a significant part of our faith by heeding the final verse in that chapter: "And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity" (I Cor. 13:13).

Church Dedication in Ixtlan, Mexico



With the support of the Mission Committee the work of the Lord continues in Ixtlan, Mexico. Bro. Marshall and Sis. Jan Heinold have benefitted from your prayers as

they seek to bring the gospel message to lost souls in this area in Mexico. This photo shows many of the children that now have the opportunity to learn about the Bible.

At first, services were held in their home, which was very small and uncomfortable for even a small group. Last year appro-

val was given to construct a church building next to their home as shown in the photograph at the beginning of the article. Many brethren contributed time and money so that this could become a reality.

The physical work of providing new facilities for this budding congregation was competed late in 1998. Dedication of this church was held on January 24, 1999.

Elder Bros. David Wiegand, Wendell Gudeman, Roy Grimm, and Chuck Hemmer conducted these services, and submitted the following report of what occurred when they were in Mexico.

Friday, January 22

The four brothers and their wives met in Dallas, Texas, and flew together to Guadalajara, Mexico. There they rented a van to drive to Ixtlan. They arrived at approximately 6:30 PM. Sister Jan Heinold had a meal waiting when they arrived in Ixtlan. After a nice visit, they drove on to the Hotel Jerico at Zamora.

Saturday, January 23

After breakfast at the hotel, they drove back to Ixtlan where they heard the testimonies of Areli and Lorenia



Sibaja, two girls who are natives of Ixtlan. Bro. Roy lead in the testimony of Areli, and Bro. Chuck lead in the testimony of Lorenia. Both spoke in Spanish, and Sis. Jan Heinold translated.

In the evening after a short service explaining baptism by Bro. Marshall, Bro. Chuck baptized Areli and Bro. Roy baptized Lorenia. Bro. Chuck had the prayer of consecration. After a time of fellowship everyone returned to their quarters for the night.

Sunday, January 24

The morning Bible class was conducted in Spanish while the four elders visited the other Sunday School classes.

The dedication service was held in the evening with Bro. Dave speaking on I Kings 8:56-63 and then Bro. Wendell spoke on Ephesians 2:19-22 and Ephesians 3:14-21. Bro. Marshall had the dedication prayer. After more fellowship, the elders went back to their hotel to spend the night.

Monday, January 25

This morning, Bro. Marshall, Sis. Jan and Sis. Jenny Kellenberger met the Americans at the hotel for a farewell breakfast. After parting they drove back to Guadalajara for the flight back to Dallas.

Before parting, Bro. Marshall gave thanks to God for the blessings of the weekend and asked God's continued protection on the return journey of those who came from the USA.

As the brethren who attended this important service, which had the endorsement of the Mission Committee, looked back on what they had seen, heard, and participated in, they recalled the following scripture.

Mexico Board Activities

Medical and Construction

The World Relief work in Mexico is divided between medical and construction. The medical arm consists of two trips per year, Lord willing. The AMMAR group that we work with in Juarez wanted to help poorer people deeper in Mexico.

Working together, the past November and again in March, plans are to go into Mexico to medically assist the Mexican Indians in the Copper Canyon area. In November, 2,082 patients were cared for. The Lord certainly provided, keeping all safe, especially while traveling on the rough back roads.

The people of Juarez planned the trip, arranged the accommodations, and 23 Mexicans were involved in the medical assistance trip with us. The example of those whom we view as nearly destitute wanting to be of service to others is a wonderful testimony to us. The Mexican government was instrumental in helping and assisting with facilitation of the trip. It is a blessing to enjoy the support of the governing party at this time.

March trip is being planned

In March, the medical team is again planning to return to the Copper Canyon. This time, they are expecting to see approximately 5000 patients. Many of these people earn less than \$20 per month, so medical care is virtually nonexistent. This area has a strong Catholic influence and in the past were not friendly to our involvement. Thankfully, at this time, the door seems to have been opened.

Summer medical team planned

We are again scheduling a late summer medical team for Juarez. If interested, contact Sis. Cheryl Herrmann at 309/385-1082. Pharmacists and dentists are especially needed for this trip.

Construction team projects

The construction teams continue in Juarez. The AMMAR group decides who needs or deserves a new home or bathroom and gives us direction in all the construction projects. Five building teams are scheduled at this time for 1999. These teams will be working to provide decent shelter for those in great need

Amid such widespread poverty, our efforts seem small and insignificant. However, when we consider the responses of those who have received our assistance, we are humbled and encouraged. Our friends in Mexico tell us that they pray for their American friends on a regular schedule. Amid the lack of luxury, they find time to specifically pray for us. Can we with a pure heart say the same to them?

Government regulations easing

The easing of government regulations has been a blessing for the delivery of good to Mexico. A semi load of medical and building supplies was delivered in October. Later, a load was shipped to El Paso to be distributed to the Mexican Indians in the interior. Two more loads were shipped in February.

Consumer goods and computers

The February loads contained corn to be used for human consumption, canned goods, cereal, clothes, bicycles, computers and additional building supplies. Thanks to a generous donation of nearly 40 computers, the Mexican people are planning to not only have computer classes for the school children, but to plan to use them for adult

instruction as well. Education seems to be a key for helping to break the poverty cycle.

Bicycles are gratefully received

The response to a used bicycle drive was overwhelming, and to date over 100 bikes have been shipped with approximately 30 more to be shipped on another load. Most of the trucking has been donated by brethren or those acquainted with the work in Mexico. Work team to Agua Prieta

This March, a work team is scheduled for Agua Prieta, a border town south of Douglas, Arizona. There is a large influx of refugees from the interior of Mexico coming to the border in hope of a better life. This team plans to build several small homes for some of the refugees. There is an organization established there that will help us and arrange our supplies.

AMMAR funding continues

We continue to fund the AMMAR group in their efforts in the child lunch program. This project has been ongoing for the past eleven years, and countless children have benefited. Community children are fed a delicious hot meal three times each week after listening to a Bible story and singing.

The blessings received by going on a work team are unexplainable. The simple joy of intense fellowship with Apostolic Christian brethren from across the land is truly a taste of Heaven. Returning work team members often comment that being willing to lend our talents to those in need brings to us bountiful blessings.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by him, and without him was not any thing made that was made." (John 1:1-3). We think about ourselves made in the image of God and think of the magnitude of love that there was in that thought that God had when He Created man. "Let us make Him in our own image," we can read in the Scripture. (See Genesis 1:27). That is a precious thought—God knew us in the very beginning before we were even created. Whenever we get to thinking that maybe God doesn't understand, let us think about this verse. Everything that was made, Jesus made. He was there with the Father and He made us in His own image.

It says, "In him was life; and the life was the light of men." (John 1:4). In the Lord Jesus was life, and the life was the light of men. What does it mean? We see a lot of names of the Lord Jesus Christ. He is called The Word. Here He is called The Light. He is called the Son of Man. He is called the Son of God. Jesus the Christ, He is the Light of men. Without Jesus in our lives, we cannot understand really the meaning of human existence, nor the destiny of human existence. Jesus is the One that brings light to life.

Three years ago and four days, we lost a little girl, seventeen, and even though we know that God is in control, we know that God is the giver of life, that God has the power to take life and we understand this. From a child, I have been taught this, but still there is that human inclination to ask why. What for? What have I done wrong? Where have I failed? We tend to turn inward and that is a long road, beloved.

Yet, when we look at Jesus and we look at the end of things and we trust God for a mass of plans through Jesus Christ, then it sheds light. Then we can be encouraged. I don't know how people do it who do not have that faith that God is Almighty and that Jesus is the giver of all good and perfect gifts. In Jesus, in the sacrifice of that Innocent Lamb, do we have life, and Jesus is the Light of men.

Jesus is the answer in every situation, and Jesus brings life. John wants us to understand here those thoughts and those things.

I remember just a couple of weeks ago, there was an old man in our church who came to church pretty regularly. His wife was a Christian and yet he would kind of stay outside. He would come and we would shake his hand and say, "Greetings!" and he would just smile. He loved to talk about fishing and you could visit with him. It seemed like he enjoyed being there, but whenever you would talk to him about his salvation, he would just get stiff. He did not want to talk about it.

Then in the past three or four months, he got cancer and began going downhill. His body began to decrease. Some of the brothers would take turns taking him to Indianapolis. Sometimes in an emergency, he would take the ambulance because his health was just failing him. These brothers loved him and they would ask him about his salvation and he would say, "Talk to somebody else about that." Or, "Go talk to Brother Wendell." He would kind of push it aside. It just made him a little "edgy" but there came a day when he called and said, "I want to be baptized."

It was such an interesting picture to me as we see that when Jesus comes into a heart, things change. Instead of being ridged as when we talked about Jesus in those days, he would talk kind of like with just a breath. He couldn't quite talk out loud. When you would ask him a question about Jesus, his eyes

would just light up and he would just become so interested in what you had to say.

He wanted to be baptized and he wanted to be baptized right now. We kind of decided that it would be nice to do it in the morning. His family was coming to visit him and it would be nice maybe to let them be there. He said, "Can't you do it tonight? Can't you do it tonight?" Instead of kind of resisting and walking away, it was like, "I want to do it now!" That is the Light of the Lord Jesus, isn't it?

The Bible tells us that when we accept and obey the Lord Jesus and keep His commandments, then the Father will honor us. We can't come to the Father unless He draws us. But isn't it precious to be drawn to the Light, to have the desire to be in the Light? It wasn't always that way in our lives. We kind of liked darkness at one time, but to love the light is a precious, precious thing. It is the drawing of the Heavenly Father.

Brother Wendell asked him, "Do you recognize yourself as a sinner?" "Oh, yes, I was the worst of sinners." Isn't that something, beloved, when the Light shines into our heart, we recognize that those sins are understood as ugly? Before we hid them, they didn't seem to be anything important, but we let that Light shine in, the Light of Jesus Christ, and those sins became ugly. That is a precious thing, dear ones, only through the Light of God.

David said, "Search my heart and try me, try me!" (See Psalm 139:23). Do we have that kind of courage today, that kind of faith that we would ask God to try us? Try me!

A couple of days ago (I hope my son doesn't mind me telling this) I wanted my son to drive the van back to the back and empty that trash in the van. It is a little ways around the shed back to the back. I happened to

go through the shed and I was coming out and opening up the back door as he was coming by. He didn't know I was there, but when he got on the straight-of-way, he just had to punch it. A little gravel spun out there and I had to kind of chuckle to myself that he was going to try it out. That is the way we are, young people, we have got to try it out. We have to see what this thing will do, so we try it out.

When we ask God to try us, to punch it, to push the accelerator, try the brakes, will I stop when you tell me to stop? When we ask God to try us, that is what we are asking, isn't it, for Him to try us? Lest there be any wickedness in us and that he could see that that Light could shine in and that He could search out if there is anything that is not right or not pleasing in His sight that we could change.

He said, "And the light shineth in darkness; and the darkness comprehended it not." (John 1:5). I remember a time in my life when the Light was shining and I did not comprehend it. I didn't really let it shine. How can we do that? You shine a light in a dark room and that beam is going to go across the darkness. The only way we can shut it out is to turn our head or turn our back and don't look at the light. That is what we do, isn't it?

Anyone who is exempt from this beautiful life is exempt because of self-exemption. When we turn our head and when we refuse to comprehend, it is a simple truth.

Then he starts talking here about John the Baptist. It seems that John had this desire to go back to the foundation. In all the gospels, they use parables which are so precious. The Lord Jesus used parables to an earthly story with a heavenly meaning because there were so many that did not understand. If they really had a desire to see what God was speaking in the Spirit, they would

listen to the earthly story but they would catch the heavenly thought. They would begin to pick up on that and would have a desire to search it further.

Nicodemus, who was a perfect example, came to the Lord Jesus by night. He wanted to know more about what this prophet had to say. Yet, in John's gospel, it seems that it goes one step further. He is talking to Christians and non-Christians who have a desire to look into that Spirit of God. He likes to go back to the beginning. He wants to build that foundation.

"The same came for a witness, to bear witness of the Light, that all men through him might believe." (John 1:7). Anytime the Apostle John mentions the name John, it is John the Baptist. John never talks about himself, does he? He calls himself the disciple that Jesus loved. Here we see John the Baptist and his attitude, as we read here together, as one who is not worthy to unloose the shoe latchets of the Lord Jesus. May we have that humble attitude, dear ones.

Last Sunday in our Bible class, my brother had a topic about the catalyst. He works at Eli Lilly and they work with chemicals all the time and this thought came to him about how you can take two chemicals, mix them together and they never do lose their identity. The molecules just hang on to their identity. They are ridge and you can mix them all day long and all year and they won't change. They are two compounds mixed together but they don't flow together. They keep their identity.

Then he used a catalyst—an iodine catalyst—that he put in the jar and it just steamed up and so forth. The catalyst remained the same but both of the beginning compounds lost their identity and became one compound together. That example is being Lord Jesus Christ as one

compound, one example and how God is available in Jesus Christ, as John says in the gospel, "Whosoever will." Then you and I as the other compound.

You and I made in His image, who in our own selfish way, love to retain our identity, just like those molecules that are ridge and we can mix with the Lord all of our life. We can go to church, pray and do good kinds of things for the Lord until we use the catalyst of humility and humble ourselves before Him and let ourselves be exposed and break down that we might be united with our Heavenly Father.

So it is here, when the Light shines and he says, "There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. The same came for a witness, to bear witness of the Light..." (John 1:6-7a). Dear ones, what is our purpose? What is your purpose and mine? As Christians, may we ever bear the witness of that Light. John says, "I am not worthy to unloose His shoe latchets." Remember when He came, they said, "Who art thou?" If someone asks us who we are, and they say, "Well, I am the president of such and such and I have a construction company." No. that is not really who we are.

Who are we? He said, "I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness..." (John 1:23). This world is a wilderness. It is not my home. I have an eternal home in heaven and I am looking forward to that place. I am a voice crying in the wilderness.

I don't want to get ahead of the story here, but what was he crying? He was crying about a Saviour. The prophets in the Old Testament—Jeremiah, Isaiah, they didn't really have a nice report to tell, did they? They told about the sins of the people and they cried out that if they did not change their ways, they were going to lose their lives. They would cry out against sin. Beloved, we cry out today against sin but we

have a message that is precious, and that is the Lord Jesus Christ.

John the Baptist came crying to make the way for the Lord Jesus Christ. He came to clear the paths. Sometimes when we start a construction site, the first thing that we have to do is to build a road back to the place so that when we bring the big trucks in, we have a way to get in. That is what John the Baptist did. He was clearing the road, but he was not that Light.

"That was the true Light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world." (John 1:9). In Him, we have life. We do live and move and have our being. "He was in the world, and the world was made by him, and the world knew him not." (John 1:10). This is such a sad thought, beloved. As we think in our lives how we rejected Christ at one time and then when we think of a great God that created all the things in the world. He made us precious and He gives us every good thing we have. He gives us every earthly possession and heavenly possession that we have. Then when we puny men turn our back on a great God, that is just heart-breaking, isn't it, beloved? It says that the world knew Him not.

"He came unto his own, and his own received him not." Then this verse twelve is so precious, "But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God. even to them that believe on his name:" (John 1:11-12). We read here in verse ten, "The world knew Him not." We can read in John's gospel that to know the Father is to have everlasting life. In order to have everlasting life, we need to know the Father. How do we know the Father? It is through Jesus Christ...it is through this precious Word. Jesus came that we might know God because He is God in the flesh.

We read that here, "And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among

us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth." (John 1:14). If we could just talk about verse twelve, "But as many as received him..." What does it mean to receive Jesus? We hear a lot today about accepting Christ. That is another way of saying it perhaps, but what does it mean truly to receive Jesus? In order to receive Jesus, we know that God cannot tolerate wickedness. In other words, they can't dwell in the same place. So if we have wickedness in our heart, we have to get rid of that wickedness before God can come in, when we receive Jesus.

Last night we were received into a dear brother and sister's home and we were received with such kindness. We even slept in their own bed, which I felt bad doing. I would have rather slept on the floor than do that, but yet, the hospitality, the receiving of love and giving the best, and treating with love, there is no expression so precious as that as we share with each other. I should not say there is no expression so precious because there is a lot of expressions in life that are so precious. It was a wonderful feeling to be received in that kind of love.

Now when we receive Jesus Christ, we give Him our best. We give Him our life. Jesus died for us and gave His life for us. It says, "As many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God..." (John 1:12). Sometimes we think, "I just can't do that." But when we receive Jesus, we have the power to become the sons of God, and it says, even to them that believe on His name. Such a precious, precious verse. The promise is to whosoever will, isn't it?

May we tell that story and be like John crying in the wilderness, there is one coming, and He is coming again. There are two mountain peaks in the Bible. One is the cross and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the other is the coming of the Lord Jesus. We need to be crying that as John the Baptist did, the coming of the Lord Jesus.

In verse fourteen, we read, "...full of grace and truth." In another place we read, "For the law was given by Moses, but grace and truth came by Jesus Christ." (John 1:17). The law was precious. We read in the verse before, "And of his fulness have all we received, and grace for grace," (John 1:16). You know how love builds.

In our relationship with husband and wife, how over the years, love builds. At first it is kind of a romance kind of love, and yet, the love begins to be more internal and more spiritual and it builds grace upon grace. That is the way it is for our love for Christ—grace for grace.

In the Old Testament they had the law, and there was grace in the law. There was forgiveness there, and yet, that was only a part of what God wanted to give to you and me, through the Lord Jesus Christ, grace for grace.

Truth. There is nothing so important as standing for the truth. Standing for the truth is more important than life itself. In our individual lives, how peaceful it is to keep the truth, to dwell in truth, and to keep up that standard of being truthful. Because we know that when we are untruthful, when the old devil perhaps brings deception, it seems like that builds also.

One thing deserves another, but truth is grace for grace, it builds. We know these things and happy are we if we do them. We realize that there is no pillow so soft as a clear conscience. When we dwell in truth, God can give us that peace that passeth all understanding. We owe Him a lot of thanks. May we praise Him together.

An Analysis

Those of us who have had the privilege of reading the Geistlich Diary—an account of Swiss Bro. Henry Geistlich's 1866 visit to America—have been both inspired and intrigued by his trip.

Because we learn from history, this analysis is intended to draw insights from his experiences that might benefit the church today. As we look back, it often helps us see ahead.

The Man

Very little is known about the personal life of Bro. Henry Geistlich other than his being an Elder at the church in Meilen, Switzerland. He was ordained in 1852, and served for 32 years until his death in 1884. His date of birth is unknown.

He served as Elder for five years under the tutelage of Bro. Samuel H. Froehlich; and was very likely a product of the zeal inherent in the first generation of this newly-formed denomination. The motto of those days was to serve the Lord "whatever the cost might be."

It's assumed that if he was ordained Elder in 1852, he was a minister prior to that, and a lay member previous to being selected for the ministry. That would place his conversion possibly before the early 1840's, when a split occurred in the Froehlich churches. Obviously, Bro. Geistlich remained loyal to Bro. Froehlich.

The fact he was sent to America (to review the churches) lends credibility to his stature as a leader in the Swiss church.

The Purpose

By 1866, the new European church was barely a generation old. The fact that some members were settling in America was significant, and the prospect for a new beginning in a new land was of concern to the leadership. Because the church was far-flung across the mid-and Eastern portions of the United States, a visit from a European Elder—to check the pulse and general welfare— was wise. Bro. Geistlich performed this task.

He came to America when the church here was only 19 years old. There were approximately 14 congregations. At that time, there were five Elders presiding over the churches.

The Spirituality

This diary reflects a man who walked closely with God. His daily entries almost always listed Scriptural references. He had a wonderful understanding of Old Testament verses. It seemed his whole being was yielded to God. He reflected often on God's power, and the promises of eternal life. He perceived a great separation between the church and the world.

The Lesson

Bro. Geistlich's many diary entries reflected a sincere, deep love for the existing brotherhood. Often, he was lonely for his family and the European brethren back home.

The many anxieties he had during his travels across the ocean were committed to God. When he trusted God in times of trial, his prayers were answered.

The fact that he saw the great hope of eternal life through Jesus Christ—and its monumental meaning compared to the shallow pursuits of earthly living—is a lesson from which we all can draw. His zeal for faithful living should spur us all on to greater devotion.



"Wisdom Shall Die With You"

Job's three friends told him that he had sinned and that was why he was suffering. Job chided them, "No doubt...wisdom shall die with you." (Job 12:2). His friends were too sure that they had all the answers.

This raises the question as to how certain I can be about what I say and believe. It is true that the only thing those of us who teach God's Word can teach with certainty is what is written in the Bible, not what we think about what is written there. Surely, we can give our interpretation but that is not for sure. Surely we can give illustrations to get our point across and we can speak of our own experience, but this is not where the wisdom nor the power lies. The wisdom and the power lie in God's Word itself.

Sometimes we feel too sure that we are right. That might be in speaking to our spouses or other members of our families, to our friends, and to our brothers and sisters in Christ. We should say what we think but we should at least acknowledge that we are mere humans, not God, and that we might be mistaken. We should take a strong stand for what is right as it is written in the Bible, not just our opinion.

Socrates, a Greek philosopher who lived before Christ was born. listened carefully to the teachers of his day who gathered in the market place to discuss all the mysteries and the meaning of life. I was fortunate to learn about Socrates from a Polish professor who taught me World History. He was very dramatic and had been in the French underground during World War II. I sometimes ate lunch with this professor as he and I both needed a friend on campus. He was a man without a country because Poland became communist after the war and he did not want to return to his own country.

According to this professor of world history, Socrates listened to all this discussion and then said, "The difference between me and you teachers is that I don't know and I know that I don't know, but you don't know and you think you know." This didn't set well with the teachers and they had him condemned to death, a sentence that Socrates complied with by drinking hemlock poison.

I have always been impressed with Socrates' acknowledgment that he didn't have all the answers. This same thing is taught in the Bible, "In lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves." (Philippians 2:3)

I know for sure that wisdom will not die with me, and I don't think it will die with you, either. Perhaps you and I should both be careful about what we are sure of, unless it is plainly written in the Bible in so many words. Being too sure that "This ship can never sink," sank the Titanic.

During World War I, Union City was a church where young men in training at Camp Mills or on their way to Germany could gather.
