Sermon by Bro. Roy Ehnle, Bradford, IL Genesis 47:15-31 and I Timothy 1:1-11

We read together in our first reading of Joseph, and it is humbling when we think of Joseph and the life that he did live. He was the youngest of several brethren. We have to be careful, don't we, loved ones, as we behold the place where God has placed us in life? We all have a place and we are all needed. We don't all have the same level in our places, and would it not be terrible if we did? It would be chaos! We can't imagine what the world would be like today if God had not so perfectly made and placed everything in its right place; and for mankind likewise.

Joseph was hated because he was chosen, not only of God, but of his father, and his brothers could feel that. There was something special about Joseph. Beloved, there is something special about each one of us well known to God, but unknown to one another so many times.

Light From The Word

In reviewing the culture around us, most sincere believers in Christ Jesus would agree that perilous times exist (II Tim. 3:1). The high incidence of divorce, family breakdown, crime, child abuse and general promiscuousness have led to social chaos.

Many aspects of the arts, films, books and publications of all kinds contain impurity that exudes corruption. In general, ethical waywardness coupled with an indifference toward good behavior pervades our land. Dishonesty and moral decay are found in many areas of government including the highest office of the land.

Added to the peril that threatens to engulf us is a cynical attitude indicating that many have given up hope that an acceptable level of integrity and morality can be recovered. While such pessimism is wrong, it nonetheless exists and adds to the perilous nature of the times.

In evaluating the concept of perilous times, a sense of perspective must be kept. The peril we see today does not necessarily match the peril and social degradation of the past.

History records suffering, plunder and severe heartache over the years. One need only think of the early Christians being thrown to the lions; of the medieval Crusades where both adults and children left their villages in Europe to help retake the Holy Land only to suffer disease and death; of the Anabaptists who were drowned, beheaded or had their tongues torn out because they held to Scriptures and promoted adult baptism; of the American Civil War where a million men were killed or injured; or of the Holocaust where 6 million Jews perished.

Perilous times have always existed. Because an enemy, Satan, exists and continually persists in his devious doings, peril and suffering will continue.

In drawing an analogy between the perils of the past and those which exist today, one is initially drawn to the conclusion that spiritual peril was much

greater in the early church, and through the ages, than it might be today. However, we should not lose sight of the fact that one of the greatest perils we face is our high standard of living. A general sense of ease exists across the land and the lure of materialism can cause leanness of soul. In former times it was the sword that caused untold perils among believers. To some extent, in today's era the sloth and indifference bred by plenty can be as detrimental to the soul as the roar of lions.

Our task as believers is to learn how to cope with perilous times. "But where sin abounded, grace did much more abound" (Romans 5:20). Notice that the Word says that grace did much more abound. This passage is heartening to any soul who feels burdened by the sin and iniquity (i.e., the peril) that surrounds us. Indeed, we must humble ourselves so the grace of God will be plentiful in our hearts (James 4:6).

"Peril" and/or "perilous" means danger, jeopardy and hazard. In a spiritual sense, we are all subject to peril. In his work for the Lord, the Apostle Paul faced untold peril as recorded in II Cor. 11:26-27: "in journeyings often, in perils of waters, in perils of robbers, in perils by mine own countrymen, in perils by the heathen, in perils in the city, in perils in the wilderness, in perils in the sea, in perils among false brethren; in weariness and painfulness, in watchings often, in hunger and thirst, in fastings often, in cold and nakedness."

The peril we face pales when compared to the Apostle Paul's difficulties. While he faced physical and spiritual peril, ours is largely spiritual. However, we must realize that our comforts of life, and general ease, are perils indeed.

The dangers we potentially face today are found in several subtle forms: questionable teachings in classrooms, wrong influences in broadcasting, entertainment, the temptations of impure literature, outlandish materialism, and becoming envious, lustful and jealous.

Further, in an era of relative ease, higher educational levels and less need to depend upon one another, the threat of attitudinal peril can easily beset a believer. One can more readily ignore church guidance (authority) and instead go his own way. Exaltation of self, as opposed to obeying God ordained authority, is an ever present peril that must be resisted.

In this generation there are additional traits that add to the concept of "perilous times": spiritual sloth whereby a soul drifts along at the bare minimum, a feeble understanding of doctrine and heritage, and naive exposure to religious falsehoods. This last trait is featured by instant salvation, eternal security, and a lack of sanctification (which results in worldliness).

As believers we must be skillful in recognizing the perils we face and the lifestyles that can drag us into sin and thereby displease God.

According to Romans 12:2, if we are not conformed to the world, and our minds are renewed, we can more readily discern the perfect will of God. We can thence clearly see even the smallest peril that can affect us negatively in a spiritual way.

As true believers, we live to please and serve God. The truly converted soul is called to do his or her best (Matt. 5:48). The peril that exists makes this difficult, but the Word tells us that God's power far exceeds that of our enemy. "Greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world" (I John 4:4).

We are wise to seek lowliness of heart so God's grace can keep us diligent in reading His Word, faithful in church attendance and protected from the perils we might face. Anticipation of the joys of Heaven together with participation in the glorious cause of Christ should motivate us to withstand peril, and overcome sin until life's end.

World Relief Projects Rise Up From Within Our Brotherhood

X orld Relief projects are developed by suggestions or recommendations made by our brethren and friends. When someone discovers a situation in which they feel the World Relief Committee (WRC) could be involved, this should be taken to the local Treasurer-Representative (TR), who then takes it to the national WRC Director who has jurisdiction over the designated area. There is an established policy which sets out the criteria for approval of such projects, and each Director and TR has access to this document.

Take the project to the proper Board


When it appears that the proposed project meets the approved policy, the Director submits the recommendation to whatever World Relief Board would have jurisdiction over it. Projects within the USA are handled through our USA Board. The designated Board determines if the proposal will meet the established criteria for new projects. If this is the case, the project is presented at the next national WRC meeting for project approval and funding.

An example from past experience

In 1996 a sister from the Bluffton congregation spoke to her local WRC member about the Harbor House Mission, located in Celina, OH. (It is to be noted that in this particular case, a local brother was a member of the national WRC, therefore a Director. That is not always the case, and the first contact should be made to the local TR) A group of brethren from the Bluffton area visited the site and agreed that there was a need. The Director submitted the request to the USA Board, who in turn approved the request for presentation to the national WRC.

This was a unique situation

The Harbor House Mission was started in 1990. It is a family oriented, Christ centered residential care center for single, pregnant teenagers, who are accepted from any state in the USA. There are very few maternity homes, such as this one, who will take in teens under the age of 18. The organization purchased a building that was formerly used as a hospital. At this time they occupy about one-third of the building's area. The state of Ohio has granted Harbor House Mission an adoption agency status.



The immeasurable value of life

At the Harbor House Mission, the girls are counseled on the immeasurable value of the life that is carried in the womb. Our sister, a school teacher, served as a volunteer teacher at the facility. An ongoing education program is provided by teaching volunteers, and Christian counseling is done by the staff and directors of the home. The organization does not receive support or funding from governmental organizations, and relies on private grants plus gifts from organizations and individuals.

Even though this operation is small, since 1990, 187 babies have been born to mothers counseled by the Harbor House Mission. Each mother decides between parenting or placing her baby for adoption. About 33% of the babies are placed with adoptive parents. A recent placement was made to an Apostolic Christian family.

The current state of the facility

At this time, the girls are housed on the second floor. The house parents, with their 5 children and a nanny, have living quarters and offices on the first floor and in the basement. Currently there is a need for remodeling more of the unoccupied area of the building. More office space is required due to the adoption agency status. Additional living quarters are needed for the young women who want to stay longer than the state-mandated limit of 30 days after delivery. With the availability of after-care apartments, the teens would have the option to stay for a longer time.

World Relief Committee involvement

In 1996, the WRC allocated funds to replace nineteen windows and help buy a used 15-passenger van. Since then, funds have been approved for operating expenses.

This project came into being because one sister took the interest and initiative to bring it to WRC attention. This project has given opportunity for volunteers from various congregations. We hope that other comparable projects will come to our attention.

Crisis in Yugoslavia A special report

A sthe situation in Yugoslavia continues to unfold, a large number of our American brethren have expressed concern and sympathy for the Yugoslav brethren. For the first time in many years, we have a situation where a substantial number of our own people are in a war zone. They are in daily dangers to life and property, with every day bringing new challenges. This report is being written near the end of April to meet the deadline for publication, and thus reflects the circumstances at that time.

European Board activities

The European Board has held two emergency telephone conferences since the beginning of the conflict, and have more scheduled in the future. We are doing what we can to make the best moves in the interest of helping and not hurting brethren.

As it is written, He hath dispersed abroad; he hath given to the poor: his righteousness remaineth for ever. 2 CORINTHIANS 9:9

How we communicate

The technical age in which we live brings benefits, in that we can contact our suffering brethren. This is done by telephone, fax, and e-mail. However, we use utmost caution in our correspondence, because the situation is very complicated and goes back hundreds of years in history. The brethren strongly advise us that they themselves take no political position, and have committed the entire matter to our great God.

A recent e-mail message

The following report was received in English via e-mail from one of our brethren in Novi Sad, a city of around 175,000 people. Many brethren live in the city and surrounding areas.

Dear brethren,

God bless you and all your family, all the brethren in your country.

Using the kindness of my relatives (to send the message), I am writing this short letter on the situation here. I want you to know all the details, although it is not easy to describe how the people feel when bombs are falling. Two bridges are destroyed over the river Danube in Novi Sad and it is a sad thing that bring tears into our eyes.

We brothers from the Relief Committee of Yugoslavia are working through the brothers in Europe and America to help suffering brethren.

A very sad thing is that a street where one sister used to live is almost completely destroyed now. Her house is not damaged very much except for the windows and plaster. Houses in the neighborhood are destroyed. Someone else had the same experience in an area in Novi Sad. Pristina (capitol of Kosovo), where the bombings are the heaviest, one sister in Christ used to live. The very centre of the city is completely demolished, her house was there, but fortunately she is not there now, she escaped to another town. Several houses of our members in Novi Sad are damaged, but with no victims of our members up to now. Pray for us to be that way in the future.

I am in a hurry, because I am going somewhere else now. My wife and children are in a town where we believe it is safer. In the evening the only bridge is going to be closed for traffic because of the air raids. Very sad story, and nobody did believe that the war is going to take place.

Some of our families from Belgrad, Novi Sad, and other cities are thinking of leaving for Hungary. Some members are already there. That is a great problem.

Send our greetings to everybody. Hearty greetings in our Lord's name. Let Him protect His people.

From our viewpoint

Thus the letter ends and we will not print the signature. There has been no attack on American soil by a foreign adversary for nearly 200 years. We cannot identify with the roaring of aircraft engines and the screaming of the bombs, but for these brethren it is a reality. In past years many young people left Yugoslavia to build a life for their growing families in a different environment. This left behind those who were the least able to meet the challenges of building and maintaining the faith.

It has been our past goal to help reverse this process, and assist in making an environment, at least for our own, where they could live, prosper, and build the church. Now we are facing a situation with which we have not previously dealt, and whose outcome no one can reliably predict.

What can we do?

As we continue to communicate with our suffering brethren, their first appeal is for our prayers. We encourage our American brethren to remember them in prayer every day. They tell us they have committed the entire matter to God, and now will not even seek shelter during bombing attacks. This is the essence of true faith, which we wonder how we could carry out ourselves if called upon to do so. Our own future is unknown.

Presently some funds are available to meet current needs. However, much more will be needed. If you wish to help financially, it will be much appreciated. We recommend giving through your local church, specifying the funds for Yugoslavia. The funds will be forwarded to:

community. He had passed away and we went to his visitation and I said to his son, "We believe and have a hope in the hereafter, and we are so grateful we can commit one another into the hands of a merciful and gracious God." He reminded me that it wasn't a hope; it was a sure thing. I was kind of surprised because we know the people well. I think of that often. They led a good life and they were good examples and they were also sure where they were going to go.

When I read this here, the Lord Jesus Christ, which is our hope, and surely He is our hope, we live with a deep anticipation of someday being able to be victorious over self in this life. Being victorious in that perfect end, then we will only know and be able to feel when this life is over. We know not how long we are going to live.

Surely we know not how it is going to be in our end, but we have a deep hope, loved ones, that it is going to be in Jesus, our Saviour and our Redeemer that died for us and shed His blood for the remission of our sins so that we could be forgiven and begin a new life, a purified life, because of His shed blood for the whole world.

Then he drew us, called us and revealed to us our lost and our wretched condition, and how humble we were. Then to come back to the church and feel their love and welcome into the midst of a body of believers whom we had forgotten and forsaken for many years. We wondered how it would be, but they were waiting with outstretched arms.

This really isn't man, it is the love of God in men. That is what we have. That is what we want to leave to those who follow behind us. There is no greater thing! There isn't anything more that we can do for one another. We want to do the very best that we can, don't we?

Here the apostle said, "As I besought thee to abide still at Ephesus, when I went into Macedonia, that thou mightest charge some that they teach no other doctrine, Neither give heed to fables and endless genealogies, which minister questions, rather than godly edifying which is in faith; so do." (I Timothy 1:3-4). Surely, we live in a day and time when these things are so prevalent in the world.

The Word teaches us that we are to judge ourselves and that is what we want to do. We don't judge the world and we don't want to spend too much time talking about the world because we know what their end is going to be if they do not repent and draw nigh unto God and be led and directed by God. We need to judge ourselves. We need to see where we stand in the sight of God's Word.

So that is why the apostle here wrote that we are not to teach any other doctrine and neither give heed to fables. We need to be careful that we aren't overtaken by things that are good, look good and sound good. There are a lot of things in the world today that are good, they look good and they sound good, but are they to the benefit of the deep need of the soul of man?

There are places in the Scripture where people came to Jesus and they said, "We need help. Tell us how to divide this or that or whatever it was." He said, "Oh, ye do greatly err. I came not for these things."

Time and time again, He separated Himself from that which was material. He said, "I came for the souls of men and for the undying soul."

"...which minister questions, rather than godly edifying which is in faith: so do. Now the end of the commandment is charity out of a pure heart, and of a good conscience, and of faith unfeigned:" (I Timothy 1:4-5). A pure heart. We know of only one way of getting a pure heart, and that is, repenting and confessing. That empties us, but more so, it gives us the power to overcome the evil one. We know that the devil is even in our midst here if we permit him.

In an individual base, he can come and be in our midst in our heart, one, two, or five. We really believe that he is not in our midst, but he could be if we as individuals let him. Our mind would have to stray and if we think of something that is not good, that is the devil—that is him. That is how he comes. We don't believe he is here, but he is everywhere. He is waiting and he is just as far away as we keep him. He is as close as he can get. We know that.

"From which some having swerved have turned aside unto vain jangling; Desiring to be teachers of the law; understanding neither what they say, nor whereof they affirm" "I Timothy 1:6-7". Are we as grateful as we should be for our faith? How many times for those on the outside that say, "What school did you go to? What is your church background, and where did you get your schooling?"

I have to think of an old brother who came from German years ago. One morning as his family of his children and his dear wife were seated around the table, a neighbor stopped. He thought, "Now what am I going to do? Am I going to have a loud prayer, or are we going to pray silent?"

Many times we pray silent, don't we, in our home? We are also taught that we are to have loud prayer with our family. He was moved to have a loud prayer. An old brother who had his schooling in Germany and here he was with a neighbor who was educated, even a teacher in the high school of that community. He was moved to have a loud prayer.

When he was through and they had taken care of the reason he came, he said, "I would like to have that prayer you had at the breakfast table. Would you give me that prayer?" This old brother said, "I can't give you that prayer." He said, "You don't have it down on paper? Didn't you learn that prayer?" He said, "No." He couldn't understand that.

Now what is it that we want to give our children, beloved? We labor and we go to school because we know that our children have to have a good education today in a degree. It might not do them a bit of good, but they are not going to get a job if they don't have it. But, what do we want to give our children? What is the most important thing that we could give our children?

How sad it would be if they would not be taught as the apostle here reminded the people so many years ago the things that are most important—the things that will bring us through when everything else fails. "From which some having swerved have turned aside..." (I Timothy 1:6). We have to hold fast or we are going to lose the things that are most beneficial. In that day and time, it was no different and that is why the warnings are here. But today we feel they are so very, very necessary in our lives.

It says here, "Learning the Law." He said, "But we know that the law is good, if a man use it lawfully; Knowing this, that the law is not made for a righteous man..." (I Timothy 1:8-9). Probably a goodly number of us have experienced being stopped for one reason or another on the highways. If we had been within the law, we would not have been stopped. Let us try to remember that.

Right here it is, "Knowing this, that the law is not made for a righteous man, but for the lawless..." for those who don't obey the law or the disobedient, for the ungodly and for the sinners.

Our law is lenient and we don't want to abuse that. We are grateful. For the most part, our law is lenient and we, too, are to be compassionate one with another. We know that. We need it and we appreciate it, but there is a limit to all these things.

"...for unholy and profane, for murderers..." (I Timothy 1:9). It starts little and it is all for the lawless, and for all those who break the law, and finally, for the murderers of fathers, mothers, manslayers, whoremongers and for them that defile themselves with mankind. Surely we want to be of those who would not misuse and abuse the law to the full extent of the law.

When we speak of the law, I have to think of a young man, a brother in our faith in our area, and I believe it is that way wherever we find ourselves, there are those who come around and they have something to sell. There is nothing wrong with that, but this one man kept reminding everyone that he tried to sell, "This is not against the law. It is legal. You can do this. It is legal." Finally, this young brother said, "I am getting tired of you reminding me that it is legal." He said, "What is concerning me, is it right or wrong?"

Beloved, that is something that we need to remember. There is a great difference in the sight of God whether it is right or wrong, or whether it is legal. Who makes our laws? What are laws? We need them. We have to be careful that we don't let those things that are legal mislead us in our thinking between right and wrong.

"According to the glorious gospel of the blessed God, which was committed to my trust." (I Timothy 1:11). Beloved, this is for you and me to keep that which has been committed to us against that day. Someday we are all going to meet that day and it will be asked of us if we have kept those things that had been entrusted unto us which we cherish and know it is beneficial to our own dying soul.

In light of the war in Yugoslavia, the following "Remembering" article is excerpted from a booklet entitled Nazarenes in Yugoslavia. It was published in Syracuse, NY by what was then known as Apostolic Christian Publishing Co. This entity was a part of our "sister" church, and is not to be confused with our publishing house in Eureka, IL.

The "Nazarenes", in this instance, refers to the Froehlich movement in the Balkan nations, primarily Yugoslavia. They share our faith and practice.

Secular and governmental conflicts have existed for centuries in the Serbian areas. Much suffering stemming from ethnicity and religion has resulted. Our brethren have not been spared. The following remarks illustrate how our fellow-believers stood firm in the face of severe confrontation with state officials.

Incidents occurring in the 1920's in Yugoslavia follow:

A Strong Faith

In September, 1924, all men of military age (from 20 to 50) living in territories ceded to Serbia from Austria-Hungary as a result of the World War, were called to arms for the "defense" of the new government of Yugoslavia.

Because the Nazarenes (i.e., Apostolic Christians) could not take the oath in accordance with the Word of God, about 1,400 were imprisoned. Some of them, fettered in chains, were led through villages. A high officer is reported to have said: "Rob them of everything, burn down their houses, do not buy anything from them." For a few weeks they (the believers) had to, at least in part, furnish their own board while in jail.

This imprisonment lasted for about four months. Nearly all meeting places of the Nazarenes were sealed, but many were opened again by tacit understanding.

In a conference which was held in Belgrade in the fall of 1924, an agreement was reached between some of the elders and the higher military authorities, that in the future they were no longer compelled to "swear", but would be given permission to "promise". Thereupon, the 1,400 Nazarenes were set at liberty toward the end of December, 1924.

Contrary to all expectations, only the Nazarenes of the military district Veliki Beckereck were called into the army on August 1, 1926, under this pretense: for the purpose of military drill. The greater number of these had already given their "promise" in December, 1924.

In spite of this fact, they were not asked for their "promise", but the officers insisted on the complete oath and the taking up of arms. Because their faith did not permit them to do this, they were arrested and tried for "insubordination" and also for belonging to a sect not recognized by the state.

Long Prison Terms

A little later, 50 of these 56 men were sentenced in Belgrade up to 10 years imprisonment. Among them were men nearly 50 years of age, some of whom had already been sentenced in Austria-Hungary two and three times for the same refusal and had served 8 to 12 years in prison. This was a long and severe period of suffering for the sake of their faith.

Six Nazarenes were called into the army in December, 1926, from the military district Sobor to "swear and to take up arms". Four of these men had already given their "promise" in December, 1924. In spite of this they were again asked to take the "oath"; this they refused to do. They suffered the same fate.

There were among the imprisoned Nazarenes men who were close to fifty years of age when they were arrested. And now they were supposed to serve 10 years in prison among the worst of criminals. They were to remain in prison under the severest of conditions until they reached sixty years old.

"Yea, and all that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution."

When Jesus was 12 years old, Mary, and Joseph, too, no doubt pondered about His statement, "How is it that ye sought me? Wist ye not that I must be about my father's business?" (Luke 2:49). How did He know that He was the Son of God if they had not told Him about His miraculous birth?

At the cross, Joseph is not mentioned. He must have died sometime during the previous 21 years. If so, Mary may have pondered why Jesus didn't heal him or raise him from the dead, as He had done for others. Then what about her Son being crucified? That was really something to ponder.

Mary pondered the fact of Jesus' birth but she also pondered the fact of His death. Fortunately, she could also ponder the fact of His resurrection.

I suppose all mothers ponder the birth of their helpless little babies, such as you and I once were. We would do well to remember how dependent we once were, and things haven't changed very much. We are still dependent upon others from all over the world, for many things, and we are dependent upon God for the breath of life. Mothers know that, especially about babies. Mothers ponder about many things.
