"THE APOSTLE PAUL'S INSPIRATIONS"

Sermon by Bro. Darrel Stoller, Bern, KS II Corinthians 5

It begins speaking here of our earthly house. He also then goes on and speaks about the body. I believe the beginning few verses here where he speaks of our earthly house is in reference to our bodies that the Spirit of God, our soul, lives within. He speaks of it that if it is dissolved and returns to the earth, which we read, we all will then have a building made by God, not made by hands, eternal in the heavens.

The Apostle Paul was speaking this to the brethren in Corinth, to those who had experienced a conversion. It seems even though, at least for myself, I perhaps cannot explain everything contained within this chapter. Yet it does seem like it is a very simple and basic instruction here that he goes over with them.

Sometimes it seems as we stand before you and read the story over and over again, some of these same chapters that the mind of man often wants to hear, perhaps, something that we did not know before, we want to be enlightened to something that we had not previously considered. We are thankful that as we go through the Scriptures, that to the believer, it is not really a mystery of what Christ has done and what He has accomplished and what He has fulfilled.

It is not a mystery what is in store for those who are true and faithful. It is receiving it by faith and taking the Word and believing it and knowing it. Just as the Apostle Paul was speaking to believers, it comes to us today also as believers. So we have experienced Christ in our heart and we have come to the point in our life that we knew we transgressed our beloved God.

We knew we were guilty and that we had sinned and there was a judgment remaining for us if we did not receive and did not become reconciled unto God. But there is a judgment of everlasting damnation, eternal hell, and eternal repentance. We are reminded of it throughout the Scriptures.

We were reminded of the rich man this morning, and Christ Himself spoke of that place. We can read it in many other places. So that created a fear within our heart. We did not want to spend our days here and waste them away standing idle in the market place. We wanted to be laborers. We wanted to have a hope. We wanted to be a part of the promises of God.

As we read here, with a groaning within, we had a desire to be clothed upon with that earthly house which is from heaven. We read, "If so be that being clothed we shall not be found naked." (II Corinthians 5:3). Shall not be found without. We can read of the wedding and those that were invited in. There was one there that came without a wedding garment, unprepared, without, and he was speechless. There was no reason that he could give. There was no justification.

We also know brethren, don't we, there is going to be no reason to come without being clothed upon. "For we that are in this tabernacle do groan, being burdened: not for that we would be unclothed, but clothed upon, that mortality might be swallowed up of life. Now he that hath wrought us for the selfsame thing is God, who also hath given unto us the earnest of the Spirit." (II Corinthians 5:4-5).

The earnest of the Spirit is that which has been given unto us in part, temporarily, while we are here in this life. There are some things that, I believe, we need to continually remind ourselves. We were reminded in this morning hour of those things that we should strive after.

It seems that this life and in our pursuits from day to day, each day we are faced with making temporal provisions for ourselves. Each day we should be faced with the reality and the brevity of life and for what we are really striving after.

So we want the earnest of the Spirit, that which was given to us to hold us and to keep us until that time we would be relieved when this earthly house will become dissolved. So then the Apostle Paul speaks of liv-

ing in faith and the ministry of the faith.

"Therefore we are always confident, knowing that, whilst we are at home in the body, we are absent from the Lord: (For we walk by faith, not by sight:)" (II Corinthians 5:6-7). What is that, dear ones, to really walk by faith and not by sight? Don't we so much want to know what is before us? We might say, "No, it really doesn't matter a lot to us." When there is someone that is predicting something and it can be about anything, it can be events and it can only be the weather, we give attention and listen. We may

All Sunshine Makes a Desert

Nearly everyone enjoys a balmy, sunny day that has no clouds. The blue sky, lush vegetation and comfortably warm temperatures provide an atmosphere of peace and serenity. However, we also realize that too many warm, sunny days all together will cause the earth to get very dry, hard and even develop cracks. The vegetation will begin to wilt and will eventually die if the rains do not come. We know that sunshine every day would make a desert and that we cannot live without the refreshing rain from heaven

Nearly every child of God enjoys the times when our life is going well, when there are no major problems that we must face and our relationship with God and man seems to be very peaceful. We also know that when everything seems to be going our way too long we can get careless and begin to slowly drift away from God. Too many days or weeks of carefree living can lull us into a false sense of security and self sufficiency.

Just as we need the rains and storms of life to replenish the water supply that will sustain life, so do we occasionally need spiritual rain and storm to remind us of our dependence upon God for all

We do not look forward to spiritual battles. We sometimes anticipate them with fear. Even Job, who is described as "perfect and upright, and one that feared God, and eschewed evil" (Job 1:1) had a fear of pending troubles. "For the thing which I greatly feared is come upon me, and that which I was afraid of is come to me" (Job 3:25).

Most Christians would prefer to live their life and serve God without persecution. Those who face persecution usually try to flee. This is understandable. Even the apostles, who spent time with Jesus, often would flee when given the opportunity to escape persecution.

When King Herod persecuted the Christians he killed James and imprisoned Peter, intending to kill him also. Many were praying for Peter's release. When he was miraculously released, he went to the home where they were praying. After gaining admission to the home, he "...declared unto them how the Lord had brought him out of the prison. And

he said, Go shew these things unto James, and to the brethren. And he departed, and went into another place" (Acts 12:17). He did not stay there and face almost certain death.

Saul, soon after his conversion, faced persecution. When the Jews planned to kill him, "...The disciples took him by night, and let him down by the wall in a basket" (Acts 9:25). At that time Saul chose to flee to a place where he could be of greater service to the Lord.

When it suits the Lord's purpose to spare His people from harsh trials to complete the work He has for them, "...The Lord shall deliver me (his people) from every evil work, and will preserve me unto his heavenly kingdom: to whom be glory for ever and ever" (I Tim. 4:18). Numerous other examples are recorded In the scriptures, both old and new, that record God's merciful deliverance of his people from harm or evil. A few examples include Lot (Gen. 19:16), David (I Sam. 17:37), the Hebrew children (Dan. 3:27), Daniel (Dan. 6:22), and Paul and Silas (Acts 16:26).

There are times, however, when the Lord allows His people to suffer persecution and death. Stephen, after making a defense against the accusation of blasphemy, was not delivered from his accusers. "Then they cried out with a loud voice, and stopped their ears, and ran upon him with one accord,...and stoned Stephen, calling upon God and saying, Lord Jesus, receive my spirit...he fell asleep" (Acts 8:57-60).

Peter and other disciples, when faced with persecution did not flee when it suited the Lord's purpose for them to fulfill a task in the face of danger. When they were commanded by men to stop preaching, said "We ought to obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29). They continued to preach the truth. They were beaten for this and "...departed from the presence of the council, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer shame for his name" (Acts 5:11).

shame for his name" (Acts 5:11).

The Apostle Paul, as he neared the end of his ministry, refused to be intimidated by even the threat against his life said "...none of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy

and the ministry, which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the gospel of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24).

Many other examples of self-sacrifice could be recounted, including Abraham (Gen. 13:9), Joseph (Gen. 50:21), Moses (Nu. 11:29), many early disciples and, of course, Jesus Christ. They faced heavy trials and their faith grew stronger.

Why would God allow His children to suffer? There are a number of reasons. Persecution caused Christians to move to many areas where there were no servants of the true God. Persecuted Christians "...were scattered abroad (and) went every where preaching the word" (Acts 8:4). Also, "...they which were scattered abroad, travelled as far as Phoenice, and Cyprus, and Antioch, preaching the word..." (Acts 11:19), and giving many people an opportunity to hear the Word of God.

Persecution also helps individuals grow in their faith. "if we suffer, We shall also reign with him:" (II Tim. 2:12). "...but if, when ye do well, and suffer for it, ye take it patiently, this is acceptable with God" (I Peter 2:20). There are many examples throughout history, such as those accounted in the Bible and in Martyr's Mirror, that provide us with evidence that faith can be increased with adversity.

Persecution can help strengthen the church by helping the individuals of that church be stronger in their faith. Following Saul's early persecution against the Christians, there was an element of unrest but when Saul was converted and stopped the persecution, "...then had the churches rest and were edified; and walking in the fear of the Isord, and in the comfort of the Holy Ghost, were multiplied" (Acts 9:31). Other accounts of godly fear that brought the church closer together can be found throughout the scripture.

Persecution, suffering and pain are not conditions that we seek but when we face them on occasion, it can bring us closer to the Lord. We have been promised that "God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it" (I Cor. 10:13).

The tiny seeds that we planted in the basement in early spring actually turned into some huge plants that have been quite interesting. We purchased a collection of flowering vine seeds, and they have proven themselves to be very enjoyable. These little seeds became nice little plants ready for the out of doors in the spring. I was not terribly confident that they would survive, so

I planted a few where one would have been sufficient. We now have some very lush foliage on our trellis (and occasionally grabbing onto our porch swing) and up the downspouts on the back of the house. The night-flowering moonflowers have been the ones which really prompt us to be amazed at the wonder of creation. These vines produce a gorgeous large white flower which opens in the evening and wilts away by the time the dew is dry in the morning. While it is open, the bloom looks majestic with a large yellowish-colored star reaching out from its center and it releases a sweet, pleasing fragrance. Every evening, a spiraled bud unfurls and comes into its glory to be with us for just that night. While that was the product of our careful seeding and nurturing, we had a surprise visitor plant in our garden. Last year's autumn pumpkin eventually became part of the compost pile. That produced our mystery plant. Although our neighbor thought it would be a gourd and I thought maybe a return of last year's squash, we eventually had several small pumpkins scattered through vines which seemed to have a goal of taking over the garden, alley, and yard. We were actually glad when the pumpkin vines died, but will be sorry to see our climbing vines wilt and die with the seasonal frost.

As I was reading my devotional, there was an account of a woman who thought God had things turned around as she saw that huge pumpkins grew on small vines and little acorns grew on towering oaks. As she enjoyed the autumn day and pondered her observation, she fell asleep. As she was awakened when a falling acorn bounced off her head, she realized that God was certainly right and knew what was best from the start! Next year, we'll have more adventures in horticulture and again be witnesses to the little wonders of God's creation.

God created a day that was just perfect for our annual student welcome picnic. Following a very nice day of worship and fellowship, a picnic was held at Hessel Park. There, families, students, and local folks enjoyed the afternoon. From my perusing the new edition of the church phone list, it seems that this year's crop of students represents a total of seven states and seventeen of our nineteen Illinois church congregations. We welcome each student, whether new or returning, and we invite the families and friends of these students to come visit them in Champaign-Urbana and worship with us. Those planning to visit on a Wednesday evening should be aware of the fact that services are sometimes at church and sometimes at the Illini Union, so it would be best to check ahead of time. Once the semester was in full swing, the annual gathering at Illini Grove was held. This is a Wednesday evening picnic for the Champaign church and students and is held amid the tall pines on U of I campus. Again our gathering was blessed with nice weather, good food, and enriching fellowship.

not believe exactly what they are saying but we listen because we always have an interest in what is going to happen so we might make preparation to be ready for it.

There are events and even perhaps the ending of this year, there are people who are all concerned about their temporal welfare. Sure, we want to be ready and we want to be found prepared, but here in a spiritual sense, the believer doesn't always know what is before him. I believe God has it this way for a very distinct purpose because man would be so throned to want to lean toward his own understanding. He would seek his own wisdom and he would live following what he thought was right.

We have found and experienced, haven't we, that living by our own abilities really hasn't gotten us anywhere, but it got us into sin. So we are thankful that God has given unto us the Spirit that we can look to Him, knowing that He careth for us and that we can walk by faith and not by sight.

We can think of the faithful patriarchs of old. Think of Abraham, think of Isaac, of Jacob, David and many men of old who were given directions by God. They were instructed to do and go accomplish a certain thing. God told Abraham to leave his kindred and to leave his family and go into a land that He would show him. He didn't even tell him exactly where to go, I don't believe, but he said, "Into a land that I will show you."

He picked up and went and followed God. It is that way for you and me, dear ones, in life. He maybe isn't going to instruct us to go a certain place. He may not tell us to go and preach to the regions far away, but He does tell us in His Word how we are to live and how we are to conduct ourselves and what we are to deny ourselves

That is living by faith and that is a battle and that is a struggle, but God will reward and recompense the faithful. He will give them an inner peace and a contentment that we cannot find if we go beyond His Word. Yes, we might be blessed in abundance physically in the necessities of life. We might acquire houses or we might ac-

quire positions. We read of that this morning, didn't we? It isn't in the abundance of this life that we receive the blessings. That is not the gain that we are looking for, but it is godliness with contentment, we read.

So may we be encouraged to walk by faith, to be dependent upon God. It is contrary to our nature. We read here that when we are present in the body, we are absent from the Lord. When we are home in the body, we are absent from the Lord. So how do we shake off this? We always want to be present with the Lord. We want to have Him in our heart.

I believe, dear ones, it is a battle within that we must crucify those fleshly desires of wanting to even be independent and wanting to choose all of those things. May we put our faith and our trust in Him. What He wills, may that be our desire.

The apostle said, "We are confident, I say, and willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord." (II Corinthians 5:8). Can we see the enmity there is between the world and God? They cannot co-exist, can they, in the life of a person? So even we as believers must crucify the flesh so we can be present with the Lord.

"Wherefore we labour, that, whether present or absent, we may be accepted of him. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad. Knowing therefore the terror of the Lord, we persuade men; but we are made manifest unto God; and I trust also are made manifest in your consciences." (II Corinthians 5:9-11). The judgment seat of Christ, we read. We may receive of the things done in this body according to whether it be good or bad.

We read that what we sow, we shall reap. So we are encouraged. There is really left not an alternative, is there? We want to press into it, we want to press into the Word. We want it to have this full effect in our lives.

"Knowing therefore the terror of the Lord..." (II Corinthians 5:11). Today He is on the Mercy Seat and He is pleading and calling and He is willing to forgive. There will come a time, we read in His Word, that His terror will be expressed.

In the Old Testament, we can read of the times when God allowed the children of Israel to suffer. It was a punishment that was dealt out to them. The law was fulfilled that they would change and come back to Him. They would cry unto Him and they would look unto Him for help. Today, dear ones, we may not receive that type of exhorting, but it is going to be through the Word that He exhorts us and He instructs us.

He may not come down with His arm and physically touch us and correct us or bring His judgment upon us, but it is going to be here at the judgment seat. The Apostle Paul goes on and exhorts to a life of faith and a life of acknowledging God for what He has done.

"For we commend not ourselves again unto you, but give you occasion to glory on our behalf, that ye may have somewhat to answer them which glory in appearance, and not in heart. For whether we be beside ourselves, it is to God: or whether we be sober, it is for your cause. For the love of Christ constraineth us...." (II Corinthians 5:12-14). But I am not real sure what he is really meaning here, but it seems that the believer can certainly see it in the life of Christ. We can see it in the lives of the apostles. They didn't talk about those things that they were able to accomplish that God wrought. They always gave the glory and praise to God.

When Christ healed individuals, He often told them, "Go and tell no man". They came and were healed. It seems like it would have been for the furtherance of the gospel if they could have gone and spread it to other people. I believe it was that Christ didn't want people coming unto Him only for the temporal things or to praise Him to make Him king.

The apostles, when they were shipwrecked upon an isle, there were those that did not know of God that were wanting to worship the apostles because a viper that had come and fastened upon the apostle's hand. They watched to see what would hap-

pen. They were protected. When they should have fallen down dead, they thought and perceived then that there was some mighty man or some god had come to visit them.

It really troubled the apostles when there were those who came there to praise them. They focused their attention upon God, the One who had delivered them, and upon Jesus Who gave His life and shed His blood.

The Apostle Paul here did not want to receive any commendation, but only that they could glory in the fact that the gospel had been brought and dispensed that they could become believers because of what they had heard and what they had experienced and through faith had believed.

It says, "For the love of Christ constraineth us; because we thus judge, that if one died for all, then were all dead: And that he died for all, that they which live should not henceforth live unto themselves, but unto him which died for them, and rose again." (II Corinthians 5:14-15). Isn't it beautiful, dear ones, when those can come? Even though we have experienced it, many of us, many years ago we could see the work of God.

There are those among us whether they be old or whether they be young to seek God, to feel the burden and the weight of sin and they give up of themselves. The old self died and is given over unto God in faith believing that God will provide for them spiritually and physically and yield unto the power of the Spirit of God.

Those on the outside cannot understand and it is a fearful thing to let loose of those things which seem to bring a pleasure. We can find here in

the Word of God that if we are going to be present with the Lord, our physical house, the old man must become dissolved and then we can receive the fullness of His blessings. Even though we war in this lifetime, we experience the joys and the pleasures and have the assurance within our heart that God is with us and allow Him to mold us and shape us so that we can be a vessel for His use.

Saul, who penned this, we believe by God taking his hand and writing it yielded himself fully in his service. He did not know when he was knocked down there on the road to Damascus, he didn't know the fullness of the power of God. He didn't know what was awaiting him in those moments of his life.

Each one of us, when we repented of our sins, when we beckoned God to come into our life and to help us, to forgive us, to show us the way, we didn't know the blessing that were to await us by living in faith. We didn't know what it was going to be like to be brought into a body of believers whose purpose and single goal in life is to serve God and keep His commandments, to keep free of the world and the stains thereof, and to be found fit for His eternal Kingdom.

These blessings awaited us. We thank Him and we praise Him for it today. May we continue on. Let us fight a good fight of faith that when we stand before the judgment seat, we can hear the words that we read in the Scriptures, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant:" (Matthew 25:21a).

May we never be like the nominal Christian who comes bringing the acts and deeds and say, "We have prophesied in thy streets. We have cast out devils in thy name." But there will be those who will still hear the words, "Depart from Me; I know you not."

We make the decision today of where we will spend eternity. His grace is sufficient to help each one of us to attain it.

HMO Coverage in Nursing Homes

With the increased marketing of Medicare HMO programs, it is important that individuals are aware that many of these programs do not cover the cost of nursing home care unless the HMO has a contract with the nursing home. This means that if you are covered by one of these HMO programs you may not receive coverage for your care if you choose one of our church homes and the home does not have a contract with the HMO. Instead you may be required to be admitted to a home that is under contract with the HMO. If you are considering coverage by an HMO, you may want to specifically ask and get in writing if there are any limitations on the choices you have where you may go and receive nursing home coverage. You may also want to discuss the matter with the church home administrator.



Many of us were privileged to be present for the annual General Conference at Rittman, OH on August 13, 1999. The following is a brief summary of that occasion.

The Annual Conference

As daybreak peered over the horizon on the morning of August 13 at Rittman, OH, kitchen lights were on in a host of believers' homes. Breakfast was being readied for guests. Many of these guests had never met their hosts, but the tie of a common faith in Christ Jesus made them acquainted almost immediately. This is a precious aspect of our faith.

The occasion was the annual General Brotherhood Conference of the Apostolic Christian Church. Brethren from across the churches had traveled to Rittman to listen to a day of inspired exhortation—and to show their support for the church's welfare.

Attending a Conference is a wonderful experience—and it never seems to grow old. The Spirit is present every year, and a powerful blessing pours forth. One is able to feast on the comments for months.

Upon driving into the parking lot, one receives a special feeling of anticipation. It's obvious everything is well organized; and that all aspects of hosting such a large assemblage have been well thought out. It gives one a lift to note the sincerity and energies of those directing the traffic in the parking lot.

On entering the church, one senses a common surge of love as brothers (and many sisters) are endeared to the fellow believers they meet on a nationwide basis. One is able to meet new people, and to renew old acquaintances. The exchange of the holy kiss expresses this joy.

Attendees arrived and were seated around 8:00 a.m., a full hour before the 9:00 a.m. starting time. Singing began at once and the volume of male voices was deeply inspiring. Hymn singing from the Zion's Harp confirmed the in-depth doctrinal content of that hymnal.

At 8:55 a.m., when everyone was seated (the Elder brothers included), the song, "The Best Refuge" was announced. As nearly 1,500 believers stood and sang that beautiful hymn together it helped reveal that the omnipresent Spirit of God was in our midst; and would remain so during the day.

A day of timely exhortation was given to those eager to hear. The presence of approximately 1,500 was a vivid show of support to church leaders who aspire to "keep the faith", and guide the church aright. The assigned topics related to practical aspects of the believer's life as he/she seeks daily to put off the old man, and walk anew in the way of Christ and the Apostles.

The collective spiritual discernment of the church offers a beneficial guidance to every humble member of Christ's body. Reminders and warnings, as well as much positive encouragement, were given. Those in attendance were lifted up, and hopefully the recorded tapes will offer the same benefit to each congregation.

Church conferences reach back to the early days of the Christian faith. The New Testament records a meeting in 44 A.D. in Acts 11:30. Other references are in Acts 15:6 and Acts 21:18.

The earliest known "brother meet-

ing" in America was on August 20, 1866, at Leo, IN. Elder Bro. Henry Geistlich of Switzerland, who visited all the churches (of our faith) in America that year, was present.

In the early days, Elders met periodically to address specific problems. At Elgin, IL, in 1944, lay brethren attended for the first time. In 1942, based on the Elders' deliberations at Rittman, OH, a written report was first sent to all the congregations.

The Conference is a great coming together to reflect on the beliefs and pathways of the church. On an annual basis, it is well to give church-wide exhortation; and to support the Bible's message of likemindedness and keeping the same spiritual judgments. The fact, too, that the Elder brothers meet together semi-annually to discuss matters of mutual concern constitutes a unifying pattern that is enormously beneficial to the church.

Energies expended for a successful Conference will offer a reward to those who put forth so much effort. The sisters who served all the meals provide a wonderful Christian service; and all brothers who served on committees did an efficient job. May God bless even the smallest efforts.

Elder Geistlich described the 1866 meeting:

"Brothers were assembled from far and near. We opened our assembly with singing and prayer. We talked about many important things concerning the welfare of the church. This was a blessed day."

The same was true in 1999!

"Action Increases Faith"

If someone tells you that he would like to repent and become a follower of Jesus Christ but that he simply cannot believe, cannot believe that Christ was born of a virgin nor that He physically arose from the grave after He was crucified, what would you tell that person? Many people are scientifically minded to the point that they will not accept the testimony of the Bible that Christ "Was seen of above five hundred brethren at once." (II Cor. 15:6). Witnesses are important in proving anything but those 500 brethren are no longer alive to testify of what and whom they saw. The case rests on how much we can depend on what is written in the Bible, which is no problem for the converted child of God, but what about all those others out there?


In John 7:17, Jesus is quoted as saying, "If any man will do his (God's) will, he shall know of the doctrine, whether it be of God, or whether I speak of myself." Here Jesus teaches us a very important principle. It is that we learn

by doing. It is akin to pragmatism which means that ideas or beliefs have value based on the results of those ideas. A certain Prof. Dewey influenced American education by teaching pragmatism, which meant that children learn by doing, not just by studying. Therefore, American education is based partly on the idea that teachers learn with their students through discussion and experiment, while in some countries the teachers are expected to hand down to the students their knowledge about a subject. In America, at least in theory, students are welcome to challenge what the teachers say, if they do it respectfully. At present, however, American education is not getting a very good grade. Something else must be wrong.

Getting back as to what to tell this person who wants to repent but can't believe. Would it not be all right to tell him to read the Bible every day, including the New Testament, to pray every day, asking God for faith and forgiveness, to confess any sins he may have, and to make restitution where needed, and to attend church regularly and faithfully? If he doesn't believe in God, either, we can tell him to pray anyway and God will understand. He should pray that he can believe in God. According to what Jesus has spoken, that person will come to know the doctrine, he will come to believe in the miracle and all the rest. Action increases faith and may even be the beginning of faith.

Our Brotherhood is active in helping others less fortunate than ourselves, and in sharing the Gospel with others as we have opportunity, especially if there is an interest.
