### "BE WILLING TO SHARE"

Sermon by Elder Bro. Eugene Pamer, Akron, OH Exodus 12:1-14 and II Corinthians 8

We opened in the Old Testament to a passage which, no doubt, we have often read together. It is a very familiar passage. The Lord spoke to the Israelite people there through Moses and through Aaron, and He told them of the importance of that which they were about to observe.

The Passover was described to them and it was so important because that observance was to mark the beginning of the year for them. It would be the first month of the year from that point on for those people. When we stop to think about it, not just in an earthly sense, but in a spiritual sense— the sacrifice of the Lord Jesus. This, of course, was a prophecy of that.

The sacrifice of the Lord Jesus is really the beginning, isn't it? The beginning of one's spiritual life. Now we were not there when that happened, but when we recognize that that sacrifice was made for us, when we recognize that there was a Perfect Lamb—just as these people were instructed to take a lamb without blemish—there was a Perfect Lamb that was sacrificed for us. When we recognized that in the depth of our heart, and realized that that was done for us, that was really the beginning of our spiritual life, wasn't it? That was the beginning of a new life for us.

They were instructed that they should take the blood of that lamb and use it to mark the side posts and upper door post of the houses where they resided, and that when the Lord would see that blood, He would pass over that house. Those places where that blood was not present, the angel of God entered in and the first born in every household was killed.

We can hardly imagine the great lamentation and the great sorrow and great weeping that occurred throughout that land. So that indeed was a very momentous time, not just for the Egyptians, but above all, for the Israelite people for it marked the event by which they were released.

Also the sacrifice of the Lord Jesus marked the event by which we could be released. At that time, we may not have recognized our bondage. We may not have recognized that we indeed were servants of Satan, but as we grew in the understanding and knowledge of the wonderful plan of God, we could see the great importance of what the Lord Jesus has done for us.

It should be that we are, therefore, willing to devote to Him anything and everything that He would ask us to do for Him.

Now in this passage that we read here in the eighth chapter in Second Corinthians, some of it deals with our earthly life. Some of it deals with how we use the material things that God has given to us for our use. Sometimes we speak of our things, our house, our car, or whatever it might be. Sometimes that way of speaking, we know what we are talking about, but we should all remember that those things are just for our temporary use. We

haven't in any way created them. We haven't in any way produced them for surely we are going to leave them. There will be nothing of this earthly life that we can take with us.

So the encouragement here in this chapter is in part to use it wisely. He said here, "Moreover,

### **Light From The Word**



Writings based on God's Word

## The previous article discussed the importance of greeting brothers and sisters with godly love. It is a holy greeting and it includes a kiss of charity. This article will focus on the history of the greeting and explore when the greeting is appropriate.

In the New Testament, the commandment to greet one another with an holy kiss or a kiss of charity occurs five times. There are numerous examples in both the Old and New Testament when the greeting with a kiss was practiced.

The Bible provides us with numerous examples of the greeting with a kiss of charity to show love and forgiveness at a time when human nature might have called for revenge. Imagine how dramatically the following accounts would have changed if there would have been revenge instead of a kiss of charity.

After Jacob had stolen Esau's blessing by deceiving his father, he and his brother were separated for many years. Jacob had run away to escape his brother's hatred and after many years had a desire to return to his father's house. This required him to meet Esau whom he feared because he thought Esau would take vengeance for what Jacob had done years earlier. As he returned home, "...he passed over before them, and bowed himself to the ground seven times, until he came near to his brother. And Esau ran to meet him, and embraced him and fell on his neck and kissed him: and they wept" (Gen. 33:3-4). Esau's willingness to forgive his brother was evident by his expression of love for Jacob.

Joseph, having been sorely mistreated by his brothers, was in a position of authority that would have made it possible for him to exact a severe penalty from his brothers for what they had done. Instead he "kissed all his brethren, and wept upon them: and after that his brethren talked with him" (Gen. 45:15). Years of deceit and wickedness were freely forgiven. Joseph, a man of authority in Egypt, was a man of compassion and forgiveness in his heart. Although sold into a heathen nation, he retained his godly spirit of love.

### **Our Precious Greeting II**

Likewise, the father of the prodigal son had ample reason to be upset with his son. However, when his son "...was yet a great way off, his father saw him, and had compassion, and ran, and fell on his neck and kissed him" (Lk. 15:20). The wasted years, the riotous living and the irresponsible attitude of the younger son were forgiven by a father who understood the need of a son with a broken and contrite heart. The father's kiss of love was evidence of the father's forgiving spirit.

These are examples of the kiss being a symbol of love and forgiveness at a time when human nature might have called for revenge. Imagine how dramatically each of these accounts would have changed if there had been revenge instead of a kiss of charity.

Other examples of a kiss of charity occurred when some of God's people faced hardship. When Paul was parting from the brethren at Ephesus, "...They all wept sore, and fell on Paul's neck, and kissed him. Sorrowing most of all for the words which he spake, that they should see his face no more" (Acts 20:37-38).

The early Christians practiced the greeting with a kiss as an act of love and unity at a time when the number of Christians was small and when persecution was profound. The early Christians were encouraged, strengthened and sustained by the loving support they received from one another. The same benefits of a Christian greeting are available to us today. Paul described it as a holy kiss to distinguish it from ceremonial or lustful acts which were so prevalent at that time.

Various histories of the early Christian church indicate that the greeting with the kiss was a token of affection that had its beginning in the early days of Christianity and lasted, to varying degrees, throughout the centuries even to our day and time.


Unfortunately, the practice of this greeting began to break down among many Christian groups by the end of the fourth century. The Anabaptist movement, which grew out of the Reformation in the sixteenth century, was largely responsible for

a significant return of the greeting with the kiss, a practice which continued among various Christian groups until the present.

There are times when the question arises concerning when it is appropriate or inappropriate to greet with a holy kiss. Clearly it is appropriate when we are in our churches or in our homes. Other places such as our fellowship halls or other gatherings where the group is predominately those of our brotherhood would also be times when this special greeting would often be deemed appropriate.

We do, however, want to protect the sacredness of our precious greeting. If the greeting would be practiced in an atmosphere which would bring reproach upon the Church, it would not be edifying. If this greeting would be accomplished in a manner that would appear to be lustful as described in Romans (Chapter 1:20-32), it would not be to the honor and glory of God. While we do not wish to cast aspersions at others, we must remember the scriptural directive that we "Give not that which is holy unto the dogs, neither cast ye your pearls before swine, lest they trample them under their feet, and turn again and rend you" (Mt. 7:6). Those who have little knowledge nor appreciation of the scripture "...speak evil of the things they understand not; and shall utterly perish in their own corruption" (II Peter 2:12). We would not want to give Satan an opportunity to bring reproach from the world upon the children of God, and "turn the truth into a lie" (Ro. 1:25).

The greeting of our brethren, as brothers and sisters of Christ, is a precious greeting. It provides us the opportunity to show our love for the brethren, to demonstrate forgiveness, to promote charity within the church and to greet one another in a manner that shows our concern and compassion for the children of God. We do not want to let the evil forces of Satan deprive us of the love and unity we can gain from the proper use of it, nor do we want to display it in a manner that would give the world an opportunity to dishonor our Lord and our Saviour.



As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith. Galatians 6:10

## Rural Gospel & Medical Missions of India

In previous articles we have included descriptions of the Rural Gospel and Medical Mission (RGMMI) founding in 1938, its organization, goals, responsibilities, activities and how our church became involved. For this month's article it was felt that it might be interesting to know what occurs on a daily basis in that far off land of India on the mission's compounds. As has been earlier described, one of the important segments of the mission operations is the orphanage and boarding. There is boarding at both Khardi and Nasik. Presently there are a total of 68 boys. There are 43 girls sponsored by the mission at another Christian facility. Following is a description of a day in the life of a typical boarding boy at either mission compound.

### Orphanage/Boarding A Typical Day

He gets up at the sounds of the rising bell at 5:30 in the morning. After finishing his morning chores, he joins his group for the early morning devotion from 6:15 to 6:30. He joins in the singing of praise and devotion to our Lord and listens or reads from the Holy Bible. He spends quiet time of about three or four minutes in prayer and meditation.

After the early morning devotion, he along with the other boys come outside and join in the physical exercise of jogging, running and stretching from 6:30 to 7:15. Basic

exercises are done under the guidance of the seniors and the housefather. By this time, the breakfast is being readied by the cook and he has the morning tea and chappatis as breakfast from 7:30 to 8:00. After breakfast he readies himself to come for the Daily Devotional Service in the Church. He joins for this service along with the other boarding boys and the staff of the mission. An

initial 10 minutes are spent in singing choruses and hymns and also learning from the staff some new spiritual songs and choruses. The Daily Devotional Service is from 8:30 to 9:00 and is led by a staff member. The staff of the Spiritual Arm contributes meditations for this service, which is read and further elaborated by the concerned staff who is leading the service.

After the church service he goes to the study room/dining

room and spends about 90 minutes, which is from 9:15 to 10:45, in studies. The homework given by the teacher is completed; the portion to be taken for the day by the teacher is read so that he can understand the topic better. From 10:45 to 11:30 he spends doing some gardening. Tending to the plants, grass and flowers is enjoyed by all the boys.

At 11:30 he has some snacks of cooked beaten rice and starts getting

ready to go to school by wearing the school uniform and packing his school bags. He walks to school along with the other boarding boys. School is from 12 noon to 3:00 in the

afternoon. There are five teaching sessions of 35 minutes each with 5 minutes small recess between each session.

He comes for lunch at 3:00 in the afternoon and has a quick lunch of rice, curry and vegetables and leaves within 30 minutes for school. The school reopens at 3:45 PM and he attends the three teaching sessions until 5:30 in the evening.

He comes back to the boarding campus and has some recreation and games of cricket, volleyball, etc. until 6:30 pm. From 6:30 to 7:00 pm he joins the other boarding boys in singing sessions and prayer and scripture reading.

He has dinner at 7:00 PM consisting of millet or milo bread, curry and pulses. After dinner he goes to the study room for studies and completion of the homework. During this time he reads the lessons taken by the teacher during the day and also learns the answers to the questions on the topic studied. At 9:30 PM he joins his colleagues and friends for the closing prayer conducted by the housefather and at 9:45 PM goes to bed.

Dr. Parkhe who oversees the mission including the two house-fathers who look after and teach the boys has furnished the above description. It is through the loving and generous support from our churches that this important service can function.



### APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN HOME FOR THE HANDICAPPED

Some activities include: special holiday decorating, shopping, Christmas carolers (and some homes Christmas carol to others as well), seeing friends or family, presents, special foods, the Peoria Church Christmas Party at the Fellowship Hall, the group homes' Christmas dinner at the Morton Fellowship Hall, special services at church, driving through East Peoria to see the lights, Christmas activities in individual homes or facilities and many others. As you can see, people with special challenges enjoy participating in a wide range of events and activities at holiday times, or really any other

time of the year as well. We pray all Silver Lining readers will have a blessed holiday season as well.

At the same time, baby Jesus was peacefully sleeping in the manger. Little did the world know the importance of that birth. May gratitude fill our heart, for our salvation, not only this season, but every day throughout the year.

brethren, we do you to wit..." meaning we want you to know. He is addressing these Corinthians and he is telling them, "We want you to know" "... of the grace of God bestowed on the churches of Macedonia;" (II Corinthians 8:1). He is talking now about a different group of churches.

He speaks to them of the great trial that they went through...a great trial of affliction. We do not know exactly what that affliction might have been. However, he said that, "...the abundance of their joy and their deep poverty abounded unto the riches of their liberality." (II Corinthians 8:2). In spite of the trials they went through, in spite of the deep poverty that they had, they were willing to share with those who were less fortunate using what God had given to them.

"For to their power, I bear record, yea, and beyond their power they were willing of themselves; Praying us with much entreaty that we would receive the gift, and take upon us the fellowship of the ministering to the saints." (II Corinthians 8:3-4). They were giving to the Apostle Paul of the material things they had to share with those who were less fortunate.

Now when we stop to think about our situation, our physical situation here in our land compared to the countless number of people across the world, we know that we are abundantly blessed. We are rich beyond measure compared to what others have.

So it seems the Word is encouraging us this evening that we should be willing to share. But there is also a sharing in a differ-

ent sense other than material things, there is a sharing in spirit, and that we would also be willing to impart to others the wonderful understanding that we have received from the Word of God.

If anyone would ask of us of the hope that is within us, if anyone would ask of us of why we do thus and so, if anyone would ask of us why do we not be conformed to the world, or if anyone would ask of us why we are a peculiar people, as the Word describes the children of God, we would be willing to impart to them that which we have come to know, and that we would be willing to impart to them what God has done for us.

Now unless there is a heart or a mind that is inquiring of those things, trying to impart that to them most likely will be unsuccessful. We can just look back to our own unconverted life and think about how receptive we would have been at that time, had someone tried to speak to us of spiritual things and of the blessings that there are in serving God.

But God is able to touch the hearts and make them receptive. So when that occasion arises, might it be that we willingly impart of that great love which God has given to us.

Then further on in this chapter, he speaks about the Lord Jesus Christ. "For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor..." (II Corinthians 8:9). That is something that is rather difficult for us to comprehend, isn't it? The Lord being in heaven with the

Heavenly Father and that willingly, willingly taking upon Him the form of man to come down here to this earth.

I believe that is what the Apostle Paul is referring to here when he said, "he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich." (II Cor. 8:9). Not rich in material things, but rich in that which is beyond all value. The material things we have just temporarily here in this earthly life are all going to be left behind. While we are here in this life, we can gather together heavenly treasurers. We can gather together those things where rust will not corrupt, moth will not enter in and destroy, but we can gather together that wonderful gift of peace and hope.

Now he gives the Corinthians here some advice. I believe he is trying to encourage them on in what they had begun in. As we begin our spiritual life in seeking the Lord, when He calls us to repentance and He shows us our great need, He would like us to press on and experience those things that He would have us to experience at that time in our life. That is a time of change and that is why we speak of it as a time of conversion, but He wants us to press on.

Now opposing that, of course, we have the enemy of our soul, and Satan wants to stop this process. He doesn't want it to start in the first place, and then if one does turn and seek the Lord, he wants to set up all types of barriers and hindrances and provide all kinds of excuses to prolong this. Hopefully trying to

side-track the individual, we might say.

The Apostle here says, "And herein I give my advice: for this is expedient for you, who have begun before, not only to do, but also to be forward a year ago. Now therefore perform the doing of it," (II Corinthians 8:10-11). Now he was possibly speaking regarding their helping others, but I think it is also applying to our spiritual life, that having begun, we would press on and through His grace carry out that which He would have us to do.

Then again as far as sharing, he says here that the most important thing is a willing mind. "For if there be first a willing mind, it is accepted according to that a man hath, and not according to that he hath not." (II Corinthians 8:12). God doesn't expect us to completely remove all earthly things from us in an attempt to help others, but He expects us to share of that which we have, not according to that we have not.

"But by an equality, that now at this time your abundance may be a supply for their want, that their abundance also may be a supply for your want that there may be equality. As it is written, He that had gathered much had nothing over; and he that had gathered little had no lack." (II Corinthians 8:14-15). That I be-

lieve is referring to the time when God sent manna down to the earth for the Israelite people and they were instructed that six days of the week they were to go gather that manna.

As it said here, however much they gathered, they had just enough. That I believe is what God would have us to experience also. He wants us to share one with another so that there is no great abundance on the part of one, and a great lack on the part of another.

Might it be that we who have been blessed so abundantly in material things be willing to share. As God has given to us abundance, each in a different amount, possibly than another, but that we would even, according to what we have, be willing to share.

Especially by our life, by the things we do, the things we say, and the things we avoid doing and saying, that we might share with those who have yet to come to understand that Perfect Lamb given for them and that they might see in us possibly a light that would show the way, that we would be able to share with them of that great abundance which God has given to us.

May He bless His good Word to us this evening.

# A Century in America 1900-1999

By 1900 — after 53 years in America — the church had an estimated 2,500 to 3,000 members. Today, there are approximately 12,500 members. There has been a five-fold increase in membership during the past 100 years.

There were momentous occurrences during the past 100 years. Things happened that could have toppled the ship of faith, but God's steady hand preserved it.

#### 1906-1908

From 1906-1908, the church was beset by the "first split", where a division left 25 percent forming the Apostolic Christian Church (Nazarean) and 75 percent constituting the Apostolic Christian Church.

The focal point of disagreement centered on the wearing of a mustache, and other ethnic differences. Poor modes of communication by the American and European elders hastened the schism. After the split, both sets of elders regretted it happened.

#### Trial in Peoria

In 1908, four elders and two ministers were taken to court in Peoria after a dismissed member filed suit against them for \$50,000. He asserted that after his expulsion, church leaders advised members not to purchase farm implements from him. At a much publicized trial, the church lost and the elders were fined \$1,000.

#### **Church Name**

When the United States entered World War I, many young members and friends were conscripted into the service. To serve as conscientious objectors, they had to list an official denominational name. Up until this time, there was no church name in America.

In Europe, the church had been known as Evangelical Baptists. The elders did not want to use the name "Baptists" in America because of doctrinal differences with that group, especially over unconditional eternal security. They chose Apostolic Christian because they were followers of Christ and the Apostles.

#### **Brethren Jailed**

In July, 1918, several brothers serving in the U.S. Army at Camp Wheeler near Macon, Georgia, were attending church services at Hotel Lanier in Macon. While singing from their German hymnal (while our nation was at war with Germany), they were reported to the local police, who broke up the meeting, and jailed the participants, including Elder Bartol Rapp (Morton, IL) who was conducting the services. Eventually they were released after the police learned that the commanding general of Camp Wheeler had authorized the meeting. This is the only known jailing of our members in America (for their religious faith).

#### 1932

The nation's war with Germany resulted in the church changing from the German language to English in its worship. This was not an easy transition.

In 1932, a second split occurred. One factor was changing from German to English. Another was the wish to develop a stronger sense of sanctification. About 10 percent left to form the German Apostolic Christian Church.

#### A Sad Occasion

During World War II, a host of brothers and friends served their country, but as unarmed soldiers, and mostly as medics. They often served in great peril. Bro. Dale H. Aeschleman, 26, Bluffton, IN, lost his life on January 31, 1945, on the island of Luzan. Elder Bro. Noah Schrock, Oakville, IA, conducted his funeral at Bluffton. This was a very sad occasion.

# **Brother Meetings**

Because communication and travel capabilities improved over the years,

administrative cohesion was upgraded as well. Elders could meet more easily and problems could be addressed with more dispatch.

The Elder Body began to meet annually, and eventually semi-annually. In 1942, an annual letter was drafted for reading in all the congregations. This continues. In 1944, lay brethren convened at Elgin, IL for a day-long meeting. Subsequently, the annual General Conference has been a time of great inspiration and sound guidance for the church. It has accrued to the cause of unity. In some years, almost 1,500 have attended.

# **Administrative Growth**

Many new aspects of church life were initiated between 1940-1999: "The Silver Lining" (1943); the Minister's Booklet (1945); World Relief (1965); Apostolic Christian Publications (1968); A Statement of Faith (1982); a history, Marching to Zion (1984); a booklet on Winds of Doctrine (1986); and homes for the elderly and needy.

#### Vision

As the century began (back in 1900), the elders and ministers—amid trials and setbacks—were preaching the gospel, baptizing converts, and nurturing the members. Always, there was a striving for purity in the church, Christ's bride. Nearly 100 years later, the same patterns continue.

During this century, the church grew approximately five-fold. If the same pace continues in the coming century, and the Lord tarries His coming, the church might possibly reach 60,000 members by the year 2100. Is that possible? "The things which are impossible with man are possible with God" (Luke 18:27). It's in His hands.

### "WHY CHRIST CAME"

Jesus came to loose us and let us go. In John 11:44 we read concerning Lazarus, "And he that was dead came forth, bound hand and foot with grave clothes: and his face was bound about with a napkin. Jesus saith unto them, Loose him and let him go."

I love that last phrase. It reminds me of Moses speaking to Pharaoh, king of Egypt, as it is written in Exodus 8:1, "...Thus saith the Lord, Let my people go, that they may serve me." God wants his people to be "let go", not that they may use their liberty for an occasion to the flesh but that they might, by love, serve one another. (Galatians 5:13). The Bible teaches that this whole experience of being loosened and let go is so that we can serve God and serve one another. The key word in both verses is "serve", which indicates that this is not simply a matter of receiving all of God's blessings in order to satisfy our selfish selves.

Getting back to Lazarus, he was pretty well bound up, even

his face. This can be likened to human beings bound up with the so called "pleasures of this world". Before conversion, it may be more than pleasure, it may be we are tied up with downright sin. Once a human being is addicted to something evil, it is difficult to break away from it. But Jesus came to get us untangled and to loosen us and let us go. I love it. It is, of course, necessary to be broken before Him and that is part of repentance. We need to be broken enough to be victorious over sin and to have the liberty to serve God with joy and peace and enthusiasm. We have been loosened and let go. You can't improve upon this situation, it is ideal.


To be loosened from the power of the devil is understandable, but what about the "let go" phrase? If you are let go, you move. When we turned the horses out of the barn back on the farm, the colts would kick up their heels and gallop around the barn lot, at top speed. The older

horses had a calming effect on the rambunctious colts. And so it is in the household of faith, the older believers have a calming effect on the energetic youth, because experience has shown that all is not as easy as it may appear, and there are many dangers in the life of faith.

Therefore, the elderly, the middle aged, and the youth, move together to go and serve the Lord. We should be the kindest, most helpful people in the world. We have been let go to serve, in one way or another. It is the power of God that brought Lazarus forth and we also depend upon the power of God.

At this Christmas time, we rejoice that Christ was born in Bethlehem so that He could reveal God to us and later make that atonement for us, by which we are loosened and let go. Such glorious freedom and such glorious liberty! Christ came to loosen us and let us go!
