

"BE CAREFUL TO MAINTAIN GOOD WORKS"

Sermon by Bro. Ben Wiegand, Philadelphia, PA 2 Chronicles 23:1-11 and Titus 3:1-9

As we have been reminded, certainly each one of us in the past day, of the most precious gift that was given to each one of us—the birth of our Saviour, Jesus Christ, here upon this earth. He was given to us to show us the way. We can read about it in Paul's writing to the church of Corinth, the more excellent way. But then, there are instructions for how we should walk.

Just as yesterday afternoon and evening, whenever the time would be as each family does it a little bit different, we open up a gift and on the gift sometimes there are instructions for usage. We know that if we want to get the full value out of the gift, we must use it in a certain way. There are instructions, there are helpful guidelines, and there are helpful things for us to do as believers to make sure the gift has been applied to our heart. The gift has actually been a part of our life. Maybe we just see the gift there upon the floor and put it in the corner and not use it. Or maybe we open it up and say. "Well, that is a nice gift, but maybe another day I will use it."

As believers of the Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, we are instructed to show how much value we place upon this gift that someone gave us by the things that we do on a daily basis. Notice here, the first thought—and there are many thoughts through here—the first thought is we need to be careful of those things of the people that we are working with and we interact with here upon this earth.

What it means, loved ones, that so many times we say (or say to myself) we want to do something big and we want to do something that would really be important for the Lord. What does the Lord ask of us to do? No more than we can. He reminds us that in every instance, and that is the thought, we should be what? Careful to maintain good works. We look and read of the Lord and Master and it says as His manner was on the Sabbath day, He went into the synagogue. As His manner was in the evening, He went to the mount to pray.

Loved ones, we don't know much about the Lord when He was twelve until He was about thirty. Can't we just imagine with an eve of faith and in our heart, He was learning patience...He was learning prayer...He was setting those good habits in order for when the battles of life came (which they did in His life)? Even certainly in our life, if the foundation is set and founded and sure upon none other than the Chief Cornerstone, our Lord and Saviour. Jesus Christ. but in all things here, we maintain good works so that in all things our manner of conversation can be known to all men.

Did you ever read the next verse after that? It says why the Lord is at hand. "Let your moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand." (Philippians 4:5). We probably thought about it many. many times, for the Lord, as we sing in a hymn, He will never leave us alone. When we wake up in the morning, He is right there with us. He is at our hand. He is right there at hand...walking beside us...just waiting there with His arms open. If we ask for help, He is ready to give it to us. He is at hand. You know He is also at hand knowing that one day He is going to come again. The time is at hand. Are we ready? Are we watchful? Are we praverful?

You know how hard it is. I think if we would turn to James and try to find out about this one here in the first chapter. It says about one who tried to do two things. Maybe on Sunday, it would be a certain way, and then throughout the week, it would be a different way. Or maybe one of those people who they know will be one way, and then when around someone they

"Now the serpent was more subtle than any beast of the field..." "and the serpent said unto the woman, ye shall not surely die:..." (Gen. 3:1 & 4). Almost since the beginning of time mankind has been subjected to deceit and lies. The author of deception, of course, is Satan and his goal is to make us believe a lie.

To be deceived is to be in the unfortunate position of believing a lie and to be following a wrong course. Deception is often difficult to identify and even harder to unveil, because the one who is deceived genuinely believes that what he or she believes is the truth.

The scriptures contain many warnings about deception which seem to fall into two categories. The first category is the type of deception that is designed to aid selfish ambition and the second type of deception occurs when those who are deceived are in danger of eternal damnation.

The first type of deception is illustrated when Joseph's brothers lied to their father about what happened to Joseph. Because of their jealousy, the brothers used deception to achieve a selfish goal. Another example of this kind of deception involved Absalom, son of King David who wanted to be the king of the Children of Israel. Realizing there were others more likely to become king, Absalom put himself in a position where he influenced many of the Children of Israel by making them think if he were the king their concerns would be handled more justly than by King David, "...so Absalom stole the hearts of the men of Israel" (II Sam. 15:6).

Not only do the deceivers put themselves in danger of eternal damnation, but, the second and more serious type of deception, where individuals are influenced to believe a lie, can also cause them to be put in danger of eternal damnation.

In Matthew 24:4-5, 11-12, Jesus warned of this kind of deception.

"Take heed that no man deceive you. For many shall come in my name, saying, I am Christ; and shall deceive many." "And many false prophets shall rise, and

shall deceive many. And because iniquity shall abound, the love of many shall wax cold". Thus, Jesus knew that there would be false teachers and false messages and that these would cause spiritual shipwreck for many.

Likewise, the Apostle Paul warned us that those who were involved in sin shall not inherit the kingdom of God. "Be not deceived, neither fornicators, nor idolaters ...nor covetous ...shall inherit the kingdom of God" (I Cor. 6:9-10). Further, there were those who taught that the grace of God was so great that it didn't really matter if one lived in sin as long as they believed in the grace of God. But Paul wrote "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin that grace may abound? God forbid. How shall we that are dead to sin, live any longer therein? (Ro. 6:1-2).

Although the grace of God is boundless, we cannot, as Paul said, continue in sin and misuse the grace of God to cover these sins. "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap" (Gal. 6:7). The scripture is very clear that sin has its price and that we must be spiritually alert that we be not deceived.

Even though we typically assume that deception is reserved for those who have never known the Lord, we are warned that even believers can and will be deceived. "Let no man deceive you by any means: for that day shall not come, except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition" (II Thess. 2:3).

The Apostle Paul was writing to the church of the Thessalonians about believers who had once known the truth but had a "falling away". We cannot fall away from something we never had. These believers were encouraged to remain faithful and to avoid the teaching of anyone "who opposeth and exalteth himself above all that is called God" (II Thess. 2:4).

Likewise, we are encouraged to remain faithful to the teachings of God. Those who refuse to love the truth of God shall find themselves among those who will feel the wrath of God. "And for this cause God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie: that they might all be damned who believe not the truth, but had pleasure in unrighteousness" (II Thess. 2:11).

How can we know whom we should follow? The scripture tells us plainly: "Little children, let no man deceive you: he that doeth righteousness is righteous ... He that committeth sin is of the devil: for the devil sinneth from the beginning" (I John 3:7-8). "Ye shall know them by their fruits" (Matt. 7:16). Therefore, no matter how sincere someone may be about what he or she believes, if that individual's life does not measure up to the Word of God, we then know that he or she is not of God. The scripture promises us that "...every good tree bringeth forth good fruit; but corrupt tree bringeth forth evil fruit" (Matt. 7:17).

History is filled with examples of people who were sincere in what they believed, but unfortunately what they believed was wrong. One example of this type of deception is the prophets of Baal. They were completely convinced that they were right. They were so sincere that they were willing to call upon Baal from morning until the evening sacrifice. "And they cried aloud, and cut themselves after their manner with knives and lancets, till the blood gushed out upon them" (I Kings 18:28). Despite their sincerity and willingness to go beyond reasonable dedication, they received no answer. They were deceived into believing that Baal was real and would answer them.

The scriptures warn us that deception is a tool of the devil by which both those who deceive and those who are deceived are in danger of eternal damnation. We must continually "prove all things: hold fast to that which is good," for "there is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death" (I Thess. 5:21; Prov. 14:12).



World Relief Improves its Structure

The Lord has blessed the efforts I of the World Relief Committee from its humble beginning to the present time. He has given our brotherhood countless opportunities to "do good to all men, especially unto those who are of the household of faith". (GALATIANS 6:10) As the opportunities multiplied, the number of individuals involved and the complexity of the World Relief organization has increased. As with every successful and expanding endeavor, good communication can be difficult, if not impossible, when the correct individual does not receive needed information.

Several years ago the World Relief opportunities were assigned to the Caribbean Board, European Board, India Board, Mexico Board, and the USA Board, based on geographical areas. The current exception to the geographical criteria is the Child Sponsorship Board. Each board, with its counseling elder, is charged with the first line planning and decision making for World Relief activities in its particular region or area of responsibility. All new plans approved by the various boards are brought to the World Relief Committee for final approval and for funding if required. The Mission Committee sends two representatives to every World Relief Committee meeting to provide counsel regarding the spiritual aspects of existing and proposed projects.

All financial collections for World Relief, not retained for local projects, should be sent to Bro. Jerry Bauman, World Relief Committee Treasurer. If there are funds designated for a particular region or project, this should be noted on the Treasurer Representative's Report and Transmittal form. Bro. Jerry will forward the designated funds to the board responsible for the region or project. His address is Jerry Bauman, 9652 Sterling Road, Rittman, OH 44270.

The Kimono and Mt. Fuji

The kimono and Mt. Fuji are symbols of Japan. Our L church in Japan is what this article is about. The kimono is a beautiful garment for ladies, although quite uncomfortable, I am told, because of the tight obi or waste band. Kimonos are now worn mostly on special occasions. As to Mt. Fuji, it is the most symmetrical mountain in the world, having been formed by a volcano, the last eruption, a small one, having taken place in 1707. Japan is the gateway to the huge continent of Asia, where the masses live, especially in China and India.

As to how we came to have a church in Japan, there is a write-up on the history of our Japan Church in the book, Marching to Zion.

We have two main churches in Japan, Shioda and Tokyo. The Shioda church was built and dedicated in 1956 and presently has 14 members, four brothers and 10 sisters. Four of these members are from Tamahata, about 12 miles from Shioda, where we have another church, the building of which is not used very much at the present time. There is now only one meeting a month in our Tamahata Church, the second Sunday of every month. Our numbers are few so we like to have HONSHU the Tamahata members attend our Shioda Church. However, Oki Kanazawa Islands some friends in Tamahata Matsue earnestly request at vola Oşaka least one meeting Hiroshima a month in that Kita-Kwushu location. Fukuoka The Shioda SHIKOKU

Church is about 80 miles west of Tokyo in a rural, peach growing area.



It is surrounded by mountains, including the snowcapped South Alps. It is here that the church had an American Kindergarten for 26 years where American sisters came to teach. The kindergarten was closed in 1992 because it did not bring anyone into the church and because it was increasingly difficult to find teachers to come. Japan is a very affluent country and is no longer in need of assistance by volunteers from other countries. Even in the present, long-lasting recession, Japan is affluent as a whole, the second strongest economy in the world, although the population is about half that of the U.S. and the size of the country is about

1/25th the size of the U.S. Japan is about the size of California or Montana.

The Tokyo Church is located in the western part of the city, in the suburbs, in a place called Tsutsujiga-Oka, or Azalea Hill. It was built and dedicated in 1959. There is an expressway between the two churches so travel time by auto is about one hour and fifteen minutes, when the roads are not crowded with Tokyo traffic trying to get out of the city and then back in again, to get to work the following day. The charge for using the expressway between the two churches is 2,600 yen, or about \$23, one way, at the present rate of exchange of 109 yen to the dollar.

> The Tokyo Church has 15 members, 6 of whom are brothers. There are 3 American sisters and 2 American brothers in Tokyo, while Shioda has just 1 American sister and 1 ushiro American brother. More are welcome to come and live in Japan, if they support the church well.

> Less than 1% of the population of Japan professes to be Christian. The pressure to follow Buddhist and Shinto customs is very great. Many who make a beginning, return to the socially accepted practices of offering incense at Buddhist funerals and going to the Shinto Shrine at New Years to pray for health and prosperity during the new

year. To what gods they pray now is not clear, although during World War II, Shintoism was the instrument used by the government to instill extreme loyalty to the Emperor and to one's ancestors. Then they prayed to the Emperor, but after the war, General MacArthur required that he denounce his divinity. In our churches in Japan, we have lost more than 50% of those baptized so we are now trying to be more careful. Your prayers are appreciated.

We welcome guests to Japan and there is a friend in our Tokyo church who is generally available to be a guide for guests desiring to travel in Japan. If you come to Japan, the land of the Kimono and Mt. Fuji, and stay a while, you will come to understand America better. God bless you, we love you.

GATEWAY WOODS APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME Janice Anliker Melissa Frieden

It's 7:30 a.m. and time to begin our daily devotions at Gateway Woods School. This is truly the most important part of our day, as we pray that seeds of faith can be planted and someday bear fruit.

"A sower went out to sow his seed: and as he sowed, some fell by the way side; and it was trodden down, and the fowls of the air devoured it. And some fell upon a rock; and as soon as it was sprung up, it withered away, because it lacked moisture. And some fell among thorns: and the thorns sprang up with it, and choked it. And other fell on good ground, and sprang up, and bare fruit an hundredfold. And when he had said these things, he cried, He that hath ears to hear, let him hear. And his disciples asked him, saying, What might this parable be? And he said, Unto you it is given to know the mysteries of the kingdom of God: but to others in parables; that seeing they might not see, and hearing they might not understand. Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God. Those by the way side are they that hear; then cometh the devil, and taketh away the word out of their hearts, lest they should believe and be saved. They on the rock are they, which, when they hear, receive the word with joy; and these have no root, which for a while believe, and in time of temptation fall away. And that which fell among thorns are they, which, when they have heard, go forth, and are choked with cares and riches and pleasures of this life. and bring no fruit to perfection. As teachers, we try to plant the seeds of Christ's all encompassing love, but we know that only God can give the increase.

Our day continues with two classrooms of students in 7th-12th grade and GED classes. The students study subjects including Pre-Algebra, Physical Science, Writing, World History, Literature, and an ethics course called Managing Your Life Under God. This course gives us the opportunity to teach the application of Christian principles in daily life. After lunch we then have a volunteer program, through a grant provided by Learn and Serve of Indiana. We split the time between L.A.M.B.'S Christian Daycare, where the students teach a Bible lesson and coordinate activities with a Kindergarten class, and Cedars Retirement Home where the students interact with the residents. This has really taught all of us to reach out to others and not be so focused on ourselves. "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me" (Matthew 25:40).

The new semester at Gateway Woods School has brought some exciting changes. We have accepted our first foster care student, Becca G., and we will soon be getting our first placement from the Dept. of Corrections. This has brought about new challenges as we expand our enrollment beyond our campus.

The children we have in Gateway Woods School have been placed here for several reasons, including behavior and attitude problems, expulsion, and suspensions. One of our goals is for them to be able to handle a public school environment, academically and socially. So far this semester we have had two students, Dustin S. and Lydia A., graduate from our program and return to public school. Other campus news includes the arrival of Jasmine H. and Tyler J. to the Kipfer house and Amanda C. to the Bauman house. We will soon be saying our good-byes to Laura E. as she returns home to her family. Our Specialized Foster Care Program has recently placed two children, Kris and Victor, with the Snodgrass family.

We are rejoicing with the Wiegand's as they bring home baby Gabriella from the hospital. We are thankful that she is now over 3 pounds and breathing on her own. "...for I am fearfully and wonderfully made." (Psalm 139:14).

Please continue to pray for our current job openings. We have the need for an Education Coordinator, Alternate Houseparents, and Assistant Houseparents. Please see the notice in this issue or call for more details about these positions.

What does James tell us? It says, "A double minded man is unstable in all his ways." (James 1:8). In all his ways. So when we put the whole Word, the entire counsel of God together, we are instructed that a consistent manner of conversation and all things with our family, our work here, those with the principalities and powers here upon this earth, the magistrates there who would talk to us and ask us to do certain things, we are to be ready to do every good work.

Sometimes my children say, "Dad, I am not sure what you mean. You tell me what to do, but I'm not sure what you mean." Here we are instructed clearly to speak evil of no man. I believe Paul wrote to the church in Rome, and said that when we visit one with another, are we full of gentleness and goodness? Do we think the best of the other? Or, is there wrath in our heart, or a little hatred?

When we look in the Book of Galatians, those are the works of the flesh. Now we who have been called to a better way, a way where maybe someone we see is an example of our Lord and Saviour. How when He was mocked and spit upon, He didn't answer them a word. When He taught that if you are smote on one cheek, give to them the other. That is the example we are taught.

"To speak evil of no man, to be no brawlers..." (Titus 3:2). Are we brawling about, fighting for the things of this earth, or things that will have no lasting value? Or is our mind, our thoughts focused, our affections set on the things in heaven where Jesus Christ is? We are taught, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Luke 12:34).

"For as he thinketh in his heart, so is he:" (Proverbs 23-7). We are taught in the Word, "Evil communications corrupt good manners." (I Corinthians 15:33). "For out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh." (Matthew 12:34). So if someone would say, "I love you," and then if they would brawl, and they would speak evil of someone, it just doesn't make any sense. There is not the consistency of God's Word. Instead of speaking evil and instead of being brawlers, we are taught to be gentle, shewing all meekness unto all men. No respect to a person from the one of all different callings, all different estates, wherever we are to show all meekness.

Who was the perfect example? Our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. It takes application. They know, loved ones, the only way we can do it, is a second at a time. The only way we can do it, is if we start right now. Today is the day of grace. Today is the day we need to make application to our heart.

There is this one that we are reminded about that likes to tell you that tomorrow is a better day. Tomorrow is a new day...a new day that has never been used before; why don't you just wait until tomorrow? Then you can take care of all those things. Today it is almost one o'clock—there is only eleven hours left in this day and that is probably not enough time to do anything. Just wait until tomorrow. That would be a better day as there is a whole twenty-four hours left in it.

But what are we taught? Tomorrow never comes, does it? That next day gets pushed off until the next day. We also are taught that the Lord never asks us any more than we can do or any more than we can bear. He just asks us to do little things. He did the most biggest thing for us by dying upon the cross.

Sometimes we need to be reminded where we came from. We were foolish. We were disobedient. We were deceived. We were, at some time, thought that tomorrow was a better day. We also thought sometimes that, no, we really weren't living that bad of a life. Instead of listening to the counsel of the Psalmist of old, Da-

vid, who said, "Except the LORD build the house, they labour in vain that build it:" (Psalm 127:1). We thought we could build our own house in our own heart, and we can take of things our own way, and we were deceived, weren't we? The deceiver had come in and deceived us. We were disobedient to the teachings of the Lord.

Loved ones, I hope I am not out of line saying this. Those of us who have godly mothers and fathers, it is awful hard for me to understand sometimes if we say we are obedient to the Lord and not obedient to our parents. God's gift to us of godly parents is giving us opportunities to prepare ourselves. We are told that we are charged and commanded to work and to go on to perfection. What does that mean? To completion so that we can be complete and one day we can be with our Lord and Master in heaven.

He gives us opportunities here upon this earth. Parents ask us to do simple things...simple things! Are we disobedient? Are we foolish sometimes as we read here later to get into asking foolish questions or contentions, get caught up in genealogies and sort of change the focus as we are taught where things and people in this life take things that are incorruptible—which is Jesus Christ and Him crucified—and make it into corruptible things?

No, we're told to show meekness unto all men, not to go back and look at those things "...serving divers lusts and pleasures, living in malice and envy, hateful, and hating one another." (Titus 3:3). But, no, we were reminded that the kindness and love of God our Saviour toward man appeared, Jesus Christ came. Jesus Christ came!

Let's think about it for a second.

I was visiting with someone one day this week, and we talked about how one sometimes their temper just gets a little bit better of themselves and they said some things they didn't want to. It was hard; that is how it is. We are told in James that no man can tame a tongue, but with God's help all things are possible.

The thought just came out as we visited, God's Spirit bringing the thought out. I asked him, "Have you ever had this problem in church?" He said, "Well, I know I wouldn't. How could you raise your voice in church? How could you say something like that to somebody? Well, that's God's house. How could you ever do something like that?"

Then we went on and thought about Moses there-Moses and the burning bush. What did God tell Moses? He said, "Take your shoes off; the ground where you are standing is holy." What do we sing in that hymn-"Wherever God's people are found, is holy ground." God is with us. Satan sometimes likes to confuse us, doesn't he? Now when you leave the church, you're free to say whatever you want. No, have a consistent walk of life. If we can remember, the Lord is at our hand. He is right there by our side.

You know, at Christmas time, we just want to give our parents anything we could because we love them so much. Isn't that the same love we have for our Father? Sometimes, we forget about our parents, if we are thousands of miles away, just for a few minutes. But you know, our heavenly Father is right there with us at all times. Let's remember that.

Let's remember what He did for us—His love and His kindness. It wasn't anything that we have done. No. What is the thought that came out? We are created unto good works. This new body that arose out of the watery grave, buried and risen in the resurrection of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, that is how He made us—created unto good works. We are saved by grace through faith.

Why not? Why would it not be of works? It says, "...lest any man should boast." (Ephesians 2:9). We have been created in His workmanship so that the fruit of His Spirit can be made evident in our life. According to His mercy, He saved us. He went ahead and paid the way for us, so that we could live more abundantly here upon this earth, and have that peace that passes understanding and have a beautiful home in heaven.

What does He ask us to do? To share His gifts with others. He doesn't ask us to climb any mountains, solve some calculus equations which we could never in as many, many years ever do, or speak some language that we never know. No. He does ask us to speak one language—it's the language of love, the language of charity. The language where we esteem the other higher than ourselves, whether they are of lowly estate, whether they are a magistrate, or more importantly, whether they are our brother or sister. If we bear one another's burdens, that we love them or kindly affectionate one to another, maybe we just pray for one another because we need those prayers of those we love.

"...by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost; Which he shed on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Saviour; That being justified by his grace, we should be made heirs according to the hope of eternal life." (Titus 3:5-7). All these things

He has done for us so that we could have that hope of life eternal, an abundant life here upon this earth, and what a return on the investment—a home in heaven for all eternity, time without end!

He asked us His challenge, His instructions for living for each one of us, maintain good works, affirm these things constantly, be careful in all things that you do. Be careful.

At times yesterday I had to think about it. Yesterday we were sitting around the supper table and our three-year-old son was right there. Things were placed on the plate in front of him and I noticed he just didn't put everything in his mouth right away, but he looked it over a couple of times. He made sure it was good, at least, what he thought was good, and then if it passed those tests, it went into his mouth and he ate it. How about us? Do we just maybe open up a book without thinking and just put it right into our heart without any filters?

Do we go to certain places? Do we let certain things come in front of our vision without being careful? What happens? If we think back, I know if we eat something that would not be helpful to us, what happens? There is usually some pain or some sickness and sometimes those things have to be brought back up to rid it from our body. That is the same way it is for each one of us. Are we careful that we are maintaining good works and that we don't let evil thoughts come right into our heart? Why? Because sometimes they are going to come back out and hurt somebody. They will hurt us as well.

If you have, as we have heard, that sword of the Spirit (we heard in the Old Testament time), God's armour upon us to protect us, His Word hidden in our heart, are you prepared for the onslaught of Satan? Then what happens? We'll have a profit.

These things are good. They are profitable unto all men. A profit, loved ones, doesn't say how much, but we go back and think of the story of the lord and master, a husbandman of a vineyard, and asked them to come. Some worked throughout the day and some worked for just an hour. At the end of the day, they each received a reward from the husbandman of a penny. That one penny would gain them entrance into heaven.

That is what He asks of us to do. Do we do those things that are profitable, not for things here upon this earth, but to be profitable for us to gain heaven?

Perhaps just a thought in closing because we spent a lot of time thinking about those things that are profitable. That is good for us because that certainly should be and is the desire of each one of a believer's heart, is to work for those things that are profitable. Godliness with contentment is great gain.

We are reminded here in the last verse that some things are unprofitable, some things that are vain or vanity. To be forewarned about them is to be forearmed. What are they? Here it says, "But avoid foolish questions, and genealogies, and contentions, and strivings about the law; for they are unprofitable and vain." (Titus 3:9). Let us be careful what we talk about. Let us be careful what we think about. Are we trying to sort split hairs, as the world would say, being more worried caught up?

It is good sometimes, loved ones, to know genealogies, but as we are told, for unto us a child is born...unto us a Son is given. It is for you and it is for me. It is for parents, it is for grandfathers, and yes, it is for our great - grandfathers. Even as we saw in the Old Testament times what happened to David, it didn't affect Solomon that much. Somewhat it did. But each individually, that is how each one is as well.

Avoid foolish questions. The things that we should be speaking about are the things that we should be talking about. When we have time hearing the family time at Christmas is time to teach our children as the Israelites taught their children and how good God was to them.

We could spend a lot of time talking about Y2K and about what is coming up in the world and we could spend a lot of time talking about the goodness of Jesus Christ Who was crucified. Let us walk the more excellent way.

Brethren Jailed

This article is a continuation of a series of significant events in our church during the 1900's.

Persecutions

The Scriptures teach that all who will live godly in Christ Jesus will suffer persecution. History records atrocious acts of hostility against professed believers over the centuries.

When Samuel Froehlich began preaching in Switzerland, state authorities often interfered. In a meeting in 1834, participants at a meeting were manhandled to the shedding of blood with sticks and stones.

In 1837, a church meeting at Berne was stormed by police. The preacher was banned from the canton. In Thurgau, newly baptized persons were beaten.

In 1842, Bro. Froehlich was jailed and fined 150 francs. He was deported for seven years.

Jailing in Georgia

In America, believers were accorded a constitutional right to worship freely according to their beliefs. Isolated occurrences of persecution have occurred, but it has been very minor compared to centuries past.

One notable act of police persecution against our members occurred in 1918 at Macon, Georgia, during the time of World War I.

Bro. Gustave Bucher of Gridley, Illinois, father of Harry Bucher, and Elder Barthol Rapp of Morton, Illinois, journeyed to Camp Wheeler to visit the young men of the church who were stationed there. On arriving, they sought permission from camp authorities (from Major General Leroy S. Lyon) to conduct church services for several soldiers of the Apostolic Christian Church. These services were held on the afternoon of July 29, 1918, at Hotel Lanier in Macon.

The servicemen of the church and two civilians, Gustave Bucher and Barthol Rapp, gathered in one of the hotel's rooms. They locked the door and pulled down the window shades. They passed out German language hymnals, sang from them, and Rapp conducted worship services in the German language, this at a time when the United States was involved in a war with Germany and anti - German feeling in the nation was gaining in intensity.

Both the military police and the local Macon police were evidently unaware that the worship meeting was authorized by the camp's high command. On hearing the singing and the German language, police came in and broke up the meeting, arrested the participants, and marched them down to the city jail.

A Macon, Georgia, newspaper contained the headline, "German Religious Services Broken Up By the Police". It noted that 20 soldiers and two civilians had been arrested and jailed. When it was learned that the meeting was sanctioned by military authorities at Camp Wheeler (near Macon), the men and boys were released. It was a misunderstanding.

Gridley, IL

The incident at Hotel Lanier was obviously controversial, and the news spread rapidly. Word soon reached Gridley, Illinois, the home of soldiers, William Gramm and Harry Bucher. Because of the war with German, anti-German feeling in Gridley ran high among some people. In fact, soon after the incident at Macon, vandals splashed a bold sign in yellow paint on the front of the Apostolic Christian Church at Gridley.

This occurred on a Saturday night. When members arrived for worship the next morning, they saw the big yellow sign which read, "NO MORE GER-MAN". This, of course, made reference to the German language which was used during worship services at the Gridley church. The sign symbolized the anti-German feeling that existed, not only in Gridley, but across the nation.

The sign stunned the congregation and deeply offended many of the brethren. Fearfully, they wondered, "What will happen next?" This unpleasant incident ultimately led to the use of the English language during worship at Gridley. The change to English occurred across the church nationwide as well.

Following Scriptures

If one adheres to the Bible, he very likely will, at times, receive the scorn of the unbeliever, either overtly or covertly. But we must realize that suffering for the Lord's sake is a noble calling. God is pleased when we follow His ways!

"SHE DID WHAT SHE COULD"

We may not always be able to do enough, well enough, but we should do what we can. I am comforted by the account in Mark 14 of the woman who anointed Jesus' head with an expensive box of ointment. She was criticized for wasting the ointment which could have been better used, but Jesus defended her. It wasn't that Jesus didn't care about the poor; He devoted his life to helping the poor, those who are poor spiritually and financially. The financially poor can get along better by living a pure and simple life as Jesus taught, and the spiritually poor can become spiritually rich by repenting and becoming a follower of Jesus. We read in II Corinthians 8:9, "though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich."

Jesus looked past the price of the ointment to the intention and motivation of the woman. The woman had probably spent a lot of her own money to buy that ointment. To her, it may have been a great sacrifice to buy it. In any case, her heart was in the right place in regard to what she was doing. Jesus, knowing this, said when He heard her being criticized, "Let her alone...She hath done what she could." He further stated that she had done it as a preparation for His burial.

The question arises as to whether or not this woman, usually spoken of as Mary, knew that Jesus was to be crucified. God may have given her an insight into the coming crucifixion, or the Holy Spirit may have prompted her to do it without her realizing exactly why. You and I may also be prompted to do certain things although we may not know exactly why. The important thing is that we do what we can to honor the Lord Jesus and bring glory to God.

How is it with you? Do you always do so well in your daily walk of life that you are confident and comforted by your constant successes in sharing God's message with others and in living a really holy life? If so, God bless you for your excellent service. As for me, I often take comfort in many situations by saying to myself, "At least I tried. I did what I thought was right. I did what I could."

Others may not need Jesus' words, "Let her alone. She hath done what she could," but I need those words. My life is filled with failures. I failed the Japanese course at the university, receiving only half as many credits as I would have received had I been able to handle the course. I had hoped and prayed that we would see a new church started in Japan every three years but after three churches (buildings at least) were started, we became bogged down in just keeping our churches alive and continuing. At least, I wanted to succeed in maintaining my health, but, nevertheless, I have had some health problems. I did what I could so I'm happy anyway. You, too, please.
