"PUT ON THE DIVINE NATURE"

This was Elder Bro. Noah Schrock's last full sermon in Oakville church - Sunday, November 9, 1975 2 Samuel 15 and I Corinthians 12:27-13:8

I had to think as I read this chapter, it was a long ways and a long step forward from the time David was king until the directives to the church were spelled out, set up and are functioning today. We don't have any more kings. There is no nation that is singled out as a people of God. So, it is of intense interest when we compare the situation as it was in David's time where he had to cope with insurrection and he had to cope with his opponents and those who would overthrow his kingdom, to come to a time and place that we now have come to, where there are people of God.

He mentions here and addresses them, "Now ye are the body of Christ, and members in particular." (I Corinthians 12:27). Now here was, and had been, brought into existence, finally a body of people, namely, the body of Christ, that were permitted now to function. They were permitted to live here on earth as a people born under the second Adam, and it was a difficult transition. I don't believe we can imagine how difficult it was for the Apostle Paul. who himself at one time was an advocate of the law and concerning its demands he proclaimed himself as blameless.

Now, if this whole thing was to "go down the drain" and an entire new concept, an entire new approach, an entire new way of salvation was to be ushered in, it could not have been broken off in one day to the next. Even the apostles themselves could not have believed.

What a time that God had with them, and especially with Peter about going to the house of Cornelius. Never, it never occurred in his life that he would go to a Gentile and communicate with him! What end God had to resort to through the vision in order to convince him that the time had come that, "What God has cleansed, thou should not call unclean." (See Acts 10:15).

They could not comprehend the extent of the sanctification, what the death and suffering and shedding of blood of Jesus Christ, what it meant, and what it translated to fallen mankind. It took a generation and, I don't know, I'm not versed in chronology, but I take it that Paul was a young man when he witnessed the stoning of Stephen, because we read that they laid the clothes of those that stoned Stephen at the feet of the young man whose name was Saul. who later became the Paul that we read so much about.

Then, we read in his last letter to Timothy, he refers to himself as "Paul, the aged". So, it is entirely possible that the life span of Paul may have been some sixty or seventy years, and in all this time, there occurred the transition from the Old Testament and righteousness by the law, to the justification by faith.

Now it took another generation of people, I almost believe, to be able to grasp the depth and all the dimensions that associated themselves with the offering up of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. That was strange to them that the Son of God Himself would come into this world and offer Himself up to pay the ransom and the debt of sin to satisfy Satan and to justify God. That is exactly what happened!

Now the birth of a new race of

people was rather slow, even though at first we read of several thousand believing in Christ were baptized, but that only referred to a little area around Jerusalem, but soon after that the opponents of this way began to circulate. They put a stop to some of the "mass production" insofar as regeneration was concerned. Then there would be a few to follow the

Commitment II

The previous article emphasized the importance of making a lifelong commitment to God, counting the cost of those commitments, laying a firm foundation and seriously reading His Word. This article will focus on the importance of talking to God, of removing barriers to commitment through repentance and conversion and of a willingness to follow Christ where ever He leads us.

It is vitally important that we read God's Word and listen to Him as He speaks to us. Equally important is the need to speak with God. The scripture has much advice in this matter. "Pray without ceasing" (ITh. 5:17) and "Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation:..." (Mt. 26:41) are but two of the passages that remind us of this important part of our worship. Jesus provided us with an example of fervent prayer when He was facing His most severe trial. "And being in an agony He prayed more earnestly: and his sweat was as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground" (Lk. 22:44) and he included ...nevertheless not my will but thine, be done" (Lk. 22:42) to assure that submission to God's will would be the basis of what He did.

To be truly committed to serving God it is important that we establish regular patterns of prayer. If we pray when we have time, Satan will see to it that we do not have time. We also must be careful that we not always wait to read and pray until the last part of the day. Although reading and praying are, of course, appropriate at the end of our day, we must be sure we reserve some time during the day for communication with God when our minds are fresh and we are able to focus on His Word. In a precious hymn we are reminded to "Take time to be holy" and to "Speak oft with thy Lord".

As we read the scriptures and pray, we will find that to become fitted to be a servant of God, we must experience a true repentance for our sins. This repentance must be deep enough and sincere enough that we bear a true sorrow for past sins and develop a longing to change future behavior. Jesus said

"...except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish" (Lk. 13:3 & 5).

Sincere repentance will enable us to seek God's help in becoming a different person than we were before we were convicted to repent. When Jesus' disciples asked Him who is the greatest in the kingdom of Heaven, He called a little child unto him and said "...Except ye be converted, and become as little children, ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven" (Mt. 18:3). To be converted means to be changed, to become a different person in our hearts and in our whole being. We cannot cease being unconverted and become converted without undergoing a significant change.

Not one of us is good enough in our unconverted state that we can become a believer in Jesus Christ and become one of His disciples without undergoing a transformation. We need a new heart, a new attitude, a new perspective.

As a result of repentance and being converted, we can, and must become overcomers. The importance of being an overcomer is emphasized in various scripture passages. To each of the seven churches in Asia that were addressed in the Revelation of John the Divine, a special promise was made "To him that overcometh..." (Rev. 2 & 3).

Having begun our service to God by building on a firm foundation is a good start. But it is only a start. It takes much grace from God and a total commitment on our part to remain faithful until life's end. Our final judgment is not determined by our spiritual state early in life nor at mid-life. It is how we stand at the end of our life that will determine our eternal destination. Solomon recognized this important fact when he wrote "...in the place where the tree falleth, there it shall be" (Ecc. 11:3).

The Apostle Peter gives us a very clear explanation of the seriousness of not remaining faithful.

"For if after they have escaped the pollutions of the world through the knowledge of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, they are again entangled therein, and overcome, the latter end is

worse with them than the beginning. For it had been better for them not to have known the way of righteousness, than, after they have known it, to turn from the holy commandment delivered unto them. (II Peter 2:20-21).

There are numerous examples in the scripture of those who at one timewanted to follow the Lord but were not committed to faithfulness and therefore, fell away. The young man who came running to Jesus wanting to know what he should do to have eternal life was willing to live a good life but he was not willing to be totally committed to serving God. When told to sell all that he had and give to the poor, he went away from Christ.

The young man was willing to keep the commandments but was not willing to remove an idol from his life. His most important priority was his wealth. If we are serious about serving the Lord "...with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind..." (Luke 10:27) we must be committed to removing all barriers that will separate us from God.

At another time Christ told His followers that they must eat His flesh and drink His blood in order to have life in them. Following a discussion about the need for commitment, "...many of his disciples went back, and walked no more with him" (Jn. 6:66).

Jesus then asked his twelve apostles if they too would go away. Peter's answer demonstrates the commitment that each of us should desire. "Lord, to whom shall we go? Thou hast the words of eternal life. And we believe and are sure that thou art that Christ, the Son of the living God" (Jn. 6:68-69).

In the first and second article about commitment, attention has been focused on the need to be willing to serve God, to count the cost of commitment, to lay a firm foundation, to be obedient to His Word, to communicate with God and to remain faithful throughout our lives.

The next article will focus on heeding the warnings that will help us avoid falling away because of the temptation to follow the world.

Opportunities to Serve Others

ssisting one another in the construction of houses and buildings has been a part of the Apostolic Christian tradition since the first members came to the United States in the mid-1800's. This was especially so when a disaster caused one of the brethren or a neighbor to suffer loss. This assistance is the believer's response to instruction given by the Apostle Paul in his letter to the churches in "As we have therefore Galatia. opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith."

GALATIANS 6:10

This led to the origination of the Apostolic Christian Work Projects Committee, in the mid-1980's. Soon there was an opportunity for an outpouring of funds and volunteers to work on many projects, such as shelter for the earthquake victims in Mexico City, Mexico. The blessings received through working on these projects sparked a renewed desire to assist the unfortunate.

Past projects near our churches

Since the Hurricane Hugo Project in 1989-90, most of the Apostolic Christian projects under our control in the United States were limited to vicinities near our congregations. During this time, we had been working with Christian Aid Ministries (CAM), when projects were large and at a distance from our church locations. The rebuilding project with the longest duration was the Hurricane Andrew Project, at Homestead, FL, which lasted for 18 months.

Work Projects merges with World Relief

In the mid-1990's, the Work Projects Committee merged with the World Relief Committee, which then developed Boards with regional responsibilities. The pro-

jects in the United States came under the responsibility of the USA Board.

As the years have passed, it has become more difficult to find openings to place volunteers. CAM has been increasingly able to fill their team recruitments from their own congregations.



At the August 1999 World Relief Committee Meeting in Smithville OH, after much discussion, a subcommittee was appointed, under the USA Board, to research the development our own disaster response organization.

The subcommittee consisted of Bros. Virgil Graf, Jerome Witzig, and Arnold Gerst. This subcommittee has made efforts toward two types of disaster relief: first response (cleanup) projects, and reconstruction projects. The cleanup project would be initiated as soon after a disaster as the authorities would allow entry to the scene. The duration of this phase is one to two weeks. The reconstruction project would begin several weeks or months later, and would be of long duration depending on the particular project.

Brothers investigate needs

Bros. Virgil Graf and Arnold Gerst made a fact finding trip to Greenville NC, after the hurricanes and flooding in October 1999. This mission had a two-fold purpose. The first was to survey the area to determine if we could establish, at that time, a meaningful work project, and secondly to check on

the distribution of the semi-load of food and clothing sent in previous weeks. It became apparent that to start a project, we needed more planning and management than we had available at that time

The consensus was to work with CAM and MDS (Mennonite Disaster Service) for the placement of volunteers for the rebuilding there. We would continue to plan and develop our own organization for future implementation. Unfortunately, we were unable to place volunteers during this past winter, as both services filled their requirements from within their own organizations.


At the December meeting, after discussing these matters, the World Relief Committee approved the addition of Bro. Kent Heimer as a new member of the subcommittee. His expertise in construction will help in the development and implemention of the disaster relief program.

Further investigation

In February, Bro. Jerome Witzig met with Bro. Terry Miller, at Camilla, GA, to survey the damage by a deadly tornado. It was determined that the initial cleanup effort would be completed by local and state efforts. Preliminary information was received on the rebuilding needs and the names of contacts were obtained. The subcommittee agreed that at the next World Relief meeting a proposal be made to consider this opportunity for our first Apostolic Christian Disaster Work Project.

Approval to proceed

At the April meeting of the World Relief Committee, the Disaster Work Project subcommittee was encouraged to proceed with a rebuilding project. Funds were allocated to cover the material costs. The committee approved the purchase of a closed van type trailer, and to equip it with tools suitable for building construction. Charitable brothers have donated a van type truck and a travel trailer. The travel trailer will be used as an on-site office.

Organizational trip to Georgia

On April 17, Bros. Jerome Witzig, Kent Heimer, and Arnold Gerst made an organizational trip to Camilla. Ms. Diane Watson of the Georgia Department of Labor, is managing the local office for disaster recovery. After screening applicants per our basic criteria of

(a) "not having financial means to repair or rebuild a house suitable for their needs," and (b) "selection to be made without regard to race, age, or sex," she selected seven for us to interview.

Additional conditions discussed with applicants during the interviews for each candidate were:

- 1. Contribute funds for the purchase of material for their individual house if and as they are able to do so. This is to give the individuals the sense of personal ownership and commitment.
- 2. Provide a building lot, titled in their name.
- 3. Provide water, sewer, and electrical utilities.
- 4. Pay, if able, for the building permits and utility hookup fees.
- 5. Pick out the preferred floor plan from a selection we provided.

Of the seven, five came for their interviews. Of the five interviewed, one was declined, because of ability

to secure help from their family and local sources. The selected applicants range in age from the early 30's to mid 60's. The financial ability of the candidates range from being able to furnish all the building material to not being able to furnish any material.

Beginning the work

There was much joy and some tears on the part of both givers and receivers, when we

advised those who would receive our help. At that meeting, we gave each a number of floor plans from which to select their preference.

Local suppliers, including home centers, truss manufacturer, and ready mix cement plant, have been visited and arrangements for credit purchases have been made. An area HVAC supplier has phoned to offer his support to our efforts. The local

supply of material appears to be sufficient and competitive enough in price that it should not be necessary to go elsewhere for material. Three local motels have quoted us preferred rates for our work teams. The restaurants, while not numerous, are sufficient.

Apostolic Christian Counseling Services Opening Announcement

For several years the Elder Body of the Apostolic Christian Church has been reviewing the mental health needs of the church. Specifically, the need for professional counseling that is consistent with the doctrine of the church has received a significant amount of attention. In February of 1999, a proposal to start a counseling service was presented to the Elder Body by the church's Mental Health Committee. After reviewing the proposal, the Elder Body confirmed their recognition of the need for mental health services and gave their support for the development of a professional counseling service to be added to the existing Apostolic Christian Mental Health Hotline. A board of directors was appointed and they began the task of developing the center. The board of directors comprises Bro. Richard Kilgus (Elgin, IL, representing the Mental Health Committee). Bro. Bill Schick (Washington, representing Gateway Woods), Bro. Jerry Christensen (Gridley, representing Apostolic Christian Home for the Handicapped), Bro. Jim Mueller (Roanoke, member-at-large) and Bro. Dennis Virkler (Congerville, member- at- large).

The new counseling center, called Apostolic Christian Counseling Services, opened its doors on March 1. 2000. It is located at 73 East Queenwood Road in Morton, Illinois. It's mission is to assist individuals, couples and families to grow spiritually by helping them improve their emotional health and to strengthen their relationships. Consistent with the philosophy of the center, all services will be delivered in a Christ-centered manner, will be consistent with Apostolic Christian doctrine and will affirm the need for each of us to be reconciled to God through Christ's shed blood. This center is committed to preserving the role of the local Elder as each individual's spiritual counselor and is intended to support and assist the church leadership, not replace it.

The center will be staffed,

part-time, by Elder Bro. Ron Messner, Washington, and Bro. Ted Witzig, Jr., Morton, who are professional counselors. The Apostolic Christian Mental Health Hotline will continue to be provided by registered nurses: Sis. Martha Moser, Washington; Sis. Karen Martin, Eureka; Sis. Kathleen Klopfenstein, Peoria; Sis. Judy Witzig, Washington; and Sis. Jane Stoller, Eureka. The service can be reached via a national toll free number: 1-877-370-9988 or a local number 309 -263-5536. All calls will be answered via an automated answering system that can be accessed 24 hours a day. Based on the option that a caller selects, his or her message will be referred to the appropriate source and returned as soon as possible. All calls are strictly confidential.

Individual, marital and family counseling will be provided, by appointment, at the Morton office. The center will address issues such as (but not limited to): depression, anxiety, relationship problems and referrals for medication and psychological testing. The service will make referrals, conduct screenings and give out general information on mental health issues. In addition, the service will provide telephone consultation to Elders, ministers and others in the church that have questions about emotional or psychological problems. The Mental Health Hotline, which has been in place for many years, will now be accessible through the Apostolic Christian Counseling Services phone number. A sliding fee scale will be used; however, no one will be refused services because of inability to pay.

Apostle's teaching. There were a few at Athens when he made that wonderful speech—I may call it—an address to the Greek people, with the sermon there. There were a few, four or five, when he spoke to the women at the riverside. There was a Lydia, but there was no one else, and finally her household.

In the meantime, there had to be some weighty demonstration that accredited these people who were endeavoring to introduce this new way of salvation through Christ's suffering and shedding of blood and the hope of immortality through His resurrection. There had to be. These men had to become accredited through some unusual things that they did.

Now then, there arose speakers of tongues which even the Apostle Paul could not quite digest. So then, that began to taper off. I call it a sort of a "tapering off" process, until the group that believed could grasp and could comprehend what the greatest gift of God was—"a new nature".

That "new nature" curves through a true repentance, a confession of sins and a repudiation and a renunciation of a former life as being insufficient. It makes no difference how pious. Then, to embrace a righteousness which is an imputed one through Christ.

Now what the Apostle brings to light here is the result of this imputed righteousness. He doesn't dwell here upon repentance, and upon confession of sin and many other things. But, he delves immediately into the nature and the characteristics of this new birth, and he compares it, and he sets it out now all by itself. He closed the book on all the rest of these miracles and he said, "Now even if I would have, I could speak with

tongues of men and of angels and did not have charity..."

Now I want to substitute that there are many translations. I want to substitute the word love. or, in other words, a further substitution, the divine nature. If I didn't have an indwelling given to me—an indwelling divine nature that craves Godliness, that nourishes a deep appreciation of what it took to redeem us from Satan's bondage, even though I could speak with tongues of men and of angels, if I wouldn't have this new divine nature (Peter calls it the divine nature), it wouldn't help me any! It "boils down" to the one thing-the new life in Christ!

I remember (and I have had many experiences in Japan and if you don't mind hearing it now and then), they didn't all hold out. There were some again who went back into the former life, not into an enslaved life of sin, but there was Buddhism and there was Shintoism, and there were, again, those who did not believe in anything. One wandered away for awhile, but by the grace of God she still felt to cling to the faith that she once found. She told me this in my own home, with tears streaming down, she said, "When I became converted and was baptized, I felt life! I want to go back again to find that same thing that I lost!" Life! Now, even though spoken by one young girl, it was one of the most meaningful statements that I ever heard. The explanation, "There" she said, "I felt life!" There was the moment of regeneration. There a new person, invisible to man, but just as real as though it were visible, was born and placed on the inside of this mortal shell that had the promises of an adoption. An heir of God! A promise of the resurrection when He comes back again to earth to be an heir of God and a joint-heir with Christ.

Now I hope we haven't forgotten that feeling. It may have visited us in one degree or another, maybe not so pointed but nevertheless, I say it has. How we rejoice when we get a little breath of that same air we had at that time when we must lament the situation in the world. We must express our concern and fears for our children Were we born for salvation? Or were we born for destruction?

The anxiousness of a mother of children was so impressed upon me when I was perhaps twelve or thirteen years old, just beginning to realize what a mother's worries was. We were naughty and Mother was crying. Of course, that always hurt me when I saw Mother crying. We didn't like to see her cry as we loved our Mother. We said, "Mother, why do you cry?" She said, "Well, I'm willing to go through all this if I would know that you children are not born for destruction. If I could know that eventually, and in the end, you would be born for salvation and if you would find your way into the true faith." I never forgot that!

So this divine nature that I want to present to you now in these very few words, was now overshadowing everything else, and it should overshadow everything else always. We are exposed to many things. The Apostle mentions here, "And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries..." (I Corinthians 13:2).

If I could write a book, and there are a lot of books being written, prophetic books, I enjoy, sometimes, just delving through them. At the same time, who are these authors? I don't know them.

Maybe that is just an idea that they have developed and they sell it to somebody and make a lot of money. But even that, that wouldn't do it, even if I were able to write volumes of my own personal conclusions and elaborate, perhaps, on the prophetic scriptures, if I didn't have this nature, this divine nature that God gave me. Another name for it is an imputed righteousness. I believe we have a right to feel that imputed righteousness, but we also have a duty to live it. Therefore, we must not follow all of the things that the world offers.

l believe it is the intentions of God that His people can be identified by each other, even though the world might not be impressed. My heart is lifted up when I see a woman of God and her general appearance and conduct and manner of life indicates it (or a brother). Those are the kind of people that constitutes the body of Christ that now was brought into existence, not the world, the body of Christ that makes us brothers and sisters one of another.

He goes on to say, "And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor..." (I Corinthians 13:3). If I were a great benefactor, sell the wonderful possessions I might have, open up a kitchen so anybody could come in, especially the poor, that would be a worthwhile venture, but it would never replace nor substitute for the divine nature. Maybe this is rather a bold statement, but I would rather be an inefficient and somewhat weak benefactor, and still possess the hope and unction of the Christlike nature than to get the credit of being a great benefactor. That would be mine! That is something that I did! But, if I sold my goods to feed the poor, or if I give my body

to be burned, if that was the one entire decision on my part, it would be something that I did. But the thing that we should embrace and hold precious is the thing the Lord did!

Let us go to Gethsemane and let us go to Calvary occasionally. We do at communion time, but I believe that every waking morning that our first glance in the Spirit as we kneel down to commit ourselves to God that day, would be a humble recognition to Him for the end that His Beloved Son had gone to provide for us a birthright that had been lost through Adam's transgression.

Now the Apostle goes on here, very briefly, and begins to spell out what this divine nature is, what the functions are of deeming it that it is motivated by the Spirit of adoption. But how should it be identified?

He goes on to say, it "...suffereth long..." Whenever I see a believer too demanding, I don't believe that they have everything that they ought to have of the divine nature. Too demanding! They may have the money to do it, but that kind of an attitude does not produce growth and devotion to our Lord.

"...it is kind..." That doesn't mean that we have to compromise with evil to be kind. I think we should be kind in a constructive kindness where God is honored and the Saviour's grace is magnified.

Charity does not envy. This divine nature doesn't begin to shout, "I want to have what other people have. I want to have the kind of home that they have so I can invite my guests!" That kind of thinking is far removed, brothers and sisters, from what the Apostle is attempting to define

here as the functions of a divine nature. Now all of this will overshadow everything else of all the miracles.

"...vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up..." That is why we believe humility is one of the earmarks that a people of God should display, and you can't help but display it in your appearance. This thing, "Well, God sees the heart," is true, but that does not edify each other. I can't see your heart, or you can't see mine, but you can see what the heart moves me to do or leave alone. Those things impress each other.

"Doth not behave itself unseemly." That covers a lot of different subjects. That doesn't mean you are supposed to hear him all over town. That does not mean that he should be a discredit, but his behavior should be held within the proper limitations.

"...is not easily provoked..." It doesn't say that it is never provoked. Sometimes it is. I excused myself one time to an attorney in a hearing. I wanted to impress my point and I was sorry that I emphasized it too much, so I said to the attorney, "I am sorry that I showed a little emotion." He said. "That was not anger; that was righteous indignation." I got some relief out of that, but I don't think there should be too much righteous indignation displayed either. But there are times when we have to express some righteous indignation about something that is not good or does not promote the honor of God.

I feel the brethren here with me should emphasize further whatever might be necessary.

Serving America In World War II

Aside from the hope of salvation and the right to assemble freely, one of the greatest blessings of this generation is that our young men are not compelled to serve in the military.

Our young men today hardly know the meaning of words like "draft" and "conscription"; neither is there much of a consciousness about military service. There is a reason to rejoice that young boys no longer need to be separated from loved ones to serve a term in the army, sometimes in peril of injury and death.

This era of peace has not always been so. Our brethren and friends have served our nation in World War I, World War II, the Korean police action and in Vietnam. All of our brothers have served without bearing arms, and with few exceptions our "friends" (i.e., non-members) have done so as well.

Over the years our church has followed the Biblical precept that killing is wrong. As such, we do not bear arms (for the purpose of killing in warfare).

The Apostolic Christian position against war has differed somewhat from those denominations with an Anabaptist and "peace church" heritage. Rather than choosing alternative service (and not serving in the military), our brethren have entered the military as non-combatants.

Apostolic Christians have felt a deep sense of commitment to a government that has guaranteed religious freedom, and young men of the church have been willing to serve the nation in nearly any capacity short of bearing arms and killing. For the most part, they have served in the Medical Corps where they could give loving and Christ-like care to the sick, wounded and dying.

These duties have often taken them into combat, armed with only a small Testament and a cloak of impenetrable faith; and riding the wave of heartfelt prayers and loved ones back home, they accompanied their units, unarmed, into battle. This was not an easy task in view of what they had to endure: firefights, ambushes, artillery, bombs, enemy mines, and snipers, etc.

To enter a combat zone takes courage above and beyond that which a man can muster alone. Even those who are armed tremble before and during engagement with the enemy. Yet, to enter combat unarmed requires an infinite amount of courage that comes only from above. This courage (from God) allowed young Apostolic Christians to do this in World War II (and in other national conflicts, too).

The number of boys associated with the church who served in the military during World War II totaled more than twelve hundred. Nearly all of these were non-combatants. Elder David Mangold, Roanoke, IL, published the Service Men's Newsletter which contained a sermon along with the manes and addresses of boys associated with the church who were serving in the armed forces. Issue No. 18 listed the names and addresses of more than twelve hundred men.

Several young men serving unarmed were injured in battle. They survived. It is believed that only one man who was a member of the church

was killed during battle. He was Bro. Dale Aeschliman of Bluffton, IN.

This 26-year-old man lost his life in late January, 1945. He was the son of Elder Sam Aeschliman. The young soldier was part of the 38th Infantry Division that was assaulting the Philippine Island of Luzon. He met death on the day of combat. It was a time of terrible sadness for his family, the Bluffton congregation and for brethren across the land.

At his funeral in Bluffton, Elder Bro. Noah Schrock said, "The teachings of Christ have to be suspended and annulled for anyone to take the sword, but we are thankful and grateful, however, that because of the benevolent attitude of our government that he was given the permission to serve his country and nation in a line of duty that was in conformity and consistent with his inner convictions.

And for that reason he became attached to a combat group as one of the "angels of mercy" so to speak. It became his duty to soothe the wounded, to aid those in need. Was that not a wonderful and noble undertaking, even if it did merit on his part a great deal of reproach and ridicule, answering many a question, as a living witness to the utmost end. Was not this a noble young Brother? Thanks be to God."

"EARNING RESPECT"

Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

During our early years in Japan I asked the question, "How do you get respect?" It was explained to me that you have to earn respect. I still think about that.

When the word "respect" is used in the Bible, it indicates favor or partiality toward the rich or powerful, such as in James 2:9. "But if ye have respect to persons, ye commit sin." I used the word in the sense of having regard for and appreciation of worth, regardless of being rich or powerful. In this sense, respect is necessary to be a leader. Fathers, too, are leaders and need to be respected.

Reverence is a word which means a profound respect, such as we have for God and for the Bible. No child of God should want to be revered because we are supposed to be humble, but I think it is all right to want to be respected, at least enough so that the people we are trying to serve, listen to us.

Earning respect seems to indi-

cate that we should serve so well that people will begin to have respect for us. Yet, when Jesus was in Nazareth, He said, "Verily I say unto you, no prophet is accepted in his own country." It sounds as if Jesus was not always respected, in fact, He was crucified in spite of doing well. In Acts 10:38, it is written of Jesus that "He went about doing good," that is, He went about doing good things. He should have been respected by everyone but that was not always the case.

The Apostle Paul had somewhat of a problem with respect, too, for it is written in II Corinthians 10:10, "For his letters, say they, are weighty and powerful: but his bodily presence is weak, and his speech contemptible." Some of the people in the church weren't so sure they cared to listen to the Apostle.

It sounds as if, if we live a holy life and try to help others, at least some will respect us, but not all. It depends partially on the heart condition of those whom you are trying to serve.

Albert Schweitzer was a medical missionary to Africa who went to medical school after 50 years of age. He started hospitals there and when he was an old man, according to what I read a long time ago, someone visited him at one of his hospitals and asked the question, "How do you get these people to respect you so much?" His immediate reply was, "Respect comes with age." Perhaps he also had a problem gaining respect when he was younger.

Respect is very important, but it is something like happiness. You cannot gain it by chasing after it. We need to respect others, respect our church, and revere God, but as for getting respect for ourselves, although it is necessary for being a leader, perhaps we should just forget about it and do what is right and have the right attitude. That is probably the best way to earn respect.
