"BE UNITED IN ONE ACCORD"

Sermon by Elder Bro. Gerry Hertzel, Sabetha, KS Psalm 30 and Acts 1

The overwriting of the Psalm that we read in our first reading in this Bible says, "Thanksgiving For God's Mercy." It really does somewhat summarize a feeling that we have in our hearts, doesn't it, as we gather together on the Lord's day? We can have our memories sharpened and our minds brought into focus to be thankful unto God for His mercy. We need to be reminded of all the things that He has done for us, the many opportunities that He has made available unto us, to be reminded of His holiness, His goodness, and all that we then have the opportunity to be partakers of.

Then to be active in giving back unto God what He wants most from us, and that is to show within our countenance how much we love and respect Him, how much we want to serve Him and to be obedient unto Him so that He is glorified in our walk. That is really the only thing we can do for our Lord after He has cleansed us from sin and unrighteousness. He has made us free and clean from those things that contaminated us by the giving of His Son and the shedding of His blood. Then what can we do in return for Him?

That can't be summarized by just saying that if we give our self unto Him willingly to be of service unto Him, to let our countenance, let our activities, let our attitudes, let our whole being reflect that we want with our whole heart to be obedient unto our God and our Father for what He has done for us. That is really all we can do for Him. If we seek then to serve Him with that diligence, He will bless us, He will share with us so many wonderful things that are so much beyond anything that we could physically hope for or could even comprehend to maybe list out or ask for on our own. Those blessings just flow back onto us.

We really can't out give our God. It really doesn't matter what we give to Him in submission unto Him, what we sacrifice of ourselves of our own personal beings, of our time, of our earthly possessions, whatever it might be, there really isn't anything that we possess—absolutely nothing at all that we possess—really belongs to us. It all belongs to God; He just gave it to us.

So then if we are discontented with those things, we really don't feel like even in our very own being that we are actually owners of that. It really belongs to God, doesn't it? If we give it back to Him and if we just let everything that we possibly do be a glory unto Him, the blessings then from Him will abound and they will flow back to us in greater abundance than we can possibly imagine.

We think that the Psalm writer really did have that attitude, didn't he? He starts here saying, "I will extol thee, O LORD; for thou hast lifted me up, and hast not made my foes to rejoice over me." (Psalm 30:1). He is saying there that even though he had foes on this earth, his union with his Lord was greater than any distress that he felt in having foes.

We do all have foes, don't we? We deal and struggle with things in life and sometimes the people in this

In the three previous articles on the fear of God, the primary attention centered on the definitions of the fear of God and the primary benefits that can be derived by developing a truly reverent fear of God.

This final article of the series will concentrate primarily on how we can learn the fear of God.

How can we learn the fear of God? We know that God will help us to "Stablish thy word unto thy servant, who is devoted to thy fear" (Ps. 119:38). To learn the fear of the Lord, we must have the desire, the willingness to learn and the ability to ask for it. "Teach me thy way, O Lord; ... " (Ps. 86:11). The Ethiopian eunuch, when asked if he understood what he read replied "How can I, except some man should guide me?" (Acts 8:31). He wanted to know the truth. He wanted to be taught. He had traveled from Ethiopia to Jerusalem, a very significant distance, to worship and to learn about the truth of God's Word.

Just as the Ethiopian was willing to search, we must also search for the truth. Jesus, in the parables about the lost sheep and the lost piece of silver (Lk. 15:4-10), reminded us that we must search diligently for that which is precious to us. Our search should begin with the Word of God: "Seek ye out of the book of the Lord, and read:..." (Is. 34:16). Patient searching will help us learn more about God: "For whatsoever things were written aforetime were written for our learning, that we through patience and comfort of the scriptures might have hope" (Ro. 15:4).

In addition to being teachable and searching diligently, we must be willing to receive the fear of the Lord. The rich young man that ran to Christ for advice was anxious to learn and willing to search, but he was not willing to act on the instruction that would have provided him with the peace he sought. When told what he must do "...he was sad at that saying, and went away grieved:..." (Mk. 10:22). How unfortunate it is if we are

unwilling to receive and act upon the instructions that will bring us into the fear of God.

Likewise, we must also be willing to grow in love and in our willingness to walk according to God's commandments. "And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might" (De. 6:5). If we would serve God completely, we must go beyond mercy, kindness, humbleness, meekness, longsuffering and forbearance. These are critical but we are reminded that "...above all these things put on charity (love), which is the bond of perfectness (Col. 3:14).

If we truly love the Lord, we will then want to do His will. The fear of God will bring to us the desire to walk after his commandments. "And this is love, that we walk after his commandments. This is the commandment, That, as ye have heard from the beginning, ye should walk in it" (II Jn. 6).

The scripture provides us with numerous examples of those who feared, served and loved God and of the impact that this obedience had on others. At a time when the world was so wicked that God decided to destroy man from the face of the earth, He saw there was still one who was faithful. "But Noah found grace in the eyes of the Lord...Noah was a just man...and walked with God" (Gen. 6:8-9). Noah feared the Lord and followed God's instructions even though, in the eves of the world, he must have looked very foolish. Noah's fear of God. his faith and his obedience saved his family.

Further, Abraham was asked to be obedient in the most difficult of circumstances. Having had faith to believe that he could have a son in his old age, he was then asked to sacrifice his son. Just at the point of offering his son God stopped him and said "...for now I know that thou fearest God, seeing thou hast not withheld thy son, thine only son from me." (Gen. 22:12). What would have happened to Isaac if Abraham would not

have had the fear (reverence) of God so firmly established in his heart that he couldn't immediately recognize God's voice? The fear of God caused Abraham to do what was right.

Finally, Joseph, when in a position to inflict punishment upon his brothers for the evil that they had done, refused to repay evil for evil and said unto his brothers "This do, and live; for I fear God:" (Gen. 42:18). He realized that the events which occurred in his life were part of God's plan "...for God did send me before you to preserve life" (Gen. 45:5).

Time and space do not permit a recounting of all who faithfully served God. Hebrews, Chapter 11, provides a brief list and discussion of many who feared God, endured much affliction and, in the process, helped to preserve faith in God. Likewise, in the New Testament, many faithful pillars feared and served the Lord that we can know of the benefits of serving God.

The scripture is very clear in describing the necessity and benefits of the fear of God as it relates to both the terror and the reverence of God. In the Revelation of St. John, the two extremes are clearly described. "Behold, the tabernacle of God is with men, and he will dwell with them, and they shall be his people, and God himself shall be with them, and be their God. And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away...But the fearful, and unbelieving, and abominable, and ...all liars, shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone:..." (Rev. 21:3-8).

The fear of God can bring us to repentance. The fear of God can also draw us very close to Him as we learn to reverence and love Him for all He has done for us. Both extremes in the fear of God are designed to separate us from sin and bring us to a faith that will last through eternity.

Work in Mexico began with the earthquake in 1985

World Relief involvement in Mexico dates back to the earthquake in Mexico City in the mid 1980's. During the work in Mexico City, some of our brothers became acquainted with Chito Aguilar of Juarez, which is a border town near El Paso, Texas.

Working with local people

Chito was feeding children in the poorest areas of Juarez. He and his wife, Lydia, were offering meals to children if they would come and listen to a Bible story and do some singing first.

Our brothers were moved by Chito and Lydia's sincerity and at that point asked for World Relief to become involved. Since that time, our Apostolic contributions have purchased many meals and several flannel graph sets. Recently, some brothers and sisters were able to see the lunch program in action.

Former recipients are now helping others

Probably the most touching part of this experience was the fact that the young women who taught the Bible story to the children were at one time recipients of the meal and story themselves. This program has had far reaching benefits within their communities. Chito and Lydia have hopes that we can help to feed children in other areas in the near future.

Helping school children

World Relief has some involvement in a school in the Granjas Community of Juarez. The children are taught Godly principles along with their regular curriculum. The schoolteacher feels that learning English is vital for the students to rise from the poverty they are in. Bilingual people are able to acquire better jobs.

Brethren begin to build basic houses for the needy

After our initial involvement with Chito, it was requested that World Relief become involved with building small homes for the very needy and sending medical teams to give rudimentary care to the poor.

At this time, World Relief sends five to seven construction teams to Juarez annually. Each team will construct two or three homes. Team members will range from young boys and girls with no construction experience to seasoned carpenters. Many long lasting Christian bonds are established and fortified on a work team.

Branching out to bring medical and dental care

The medical/dental teams are normally sent to Juarez in March and September. They will occasionally visit the Copper Canyon, which is a very scenic area deep in the Mexico interior. Chito feels that this is an opportunity for the Tarahumara Indians to be influenced by Godfearing people, as many of them are influenced by strange doctrines. The medical teams will see from 3000 to 5000 people in a weeklong campaign. They discuss standard hygiene in addition to the medical and dental exams. The dental teams do many extractions. The medical teams pass out many health kits and other items put together by the sewing groups and Sunday School classes of our local churches. The Mexican people wait in long lines to see the medical team volunteers and look forward to them returning!

New opportunities to serve the needy in Arizona

World Relief has become involved in Agua Prieta, just south of Douglas, Arizona. There is a project there called "Agua Viva" which means "Living Water". At this time, a school is being constructed. World Relief hopes to become involved with an orphanage nearby called "Rancho Feliz" which means "Happy Ranch". The orphanage is well run but has many needs. Bro. Wayne and Sis. Shirley Lehman from South Bend plan to lead two work teams in March in this area.

Assisting an orphanage in Imirus, Mexico

Another area in which World Relief has become involved is at an orphanage in Imirus, Mexico that is south of Nogales, Arizona. Bro.

Jerry Tooley of Phoenix is involved with the work there and God willing, World Relief intends to do some additional construction there. To date, our southwestern brethren have done most of the work, but they would enjoy involvement of other brethren throughout the country.

Work groups being assembled to assist deaf village

International Christian Center for the Deaf (ICCD) is a deaf village located in Rio Bravo, Mexico about 100 miles from Zapata, Texas. ICCD is similar to the CCCD projects in Jamaica. World Relief plans to send two work groups in March and one in June. This project is in the early stages, so the deaf children are not on site at the present time. Further details on these work teams can be found in this issue of the Silver Lining.

The Apostolic Christian Church in Ixtlan, Mexico

The work in Ixtlan, Mexico is continuing. Bro. Marshall and Sis. Jan Heinold have been very active in the community there and the church is growing. To this date, National World Relief involvement has been minimal. The Mission Committee oversees most of the work there.

The Mexico Board is thankful for the involvement of the brethren in the projects in Mexico to this point and we pray that God's blessings will continue.

Bro. Samuel Froehlich's grave has been renovated

The Apostolic Christian Church was begun in Europe through the efforts of Bro. Samuel Froehlich. He was born in Switzerland in 1803 and died in Strasbourg, France in 1857.

The life story of this pioneer in faith is recorded in several books. One is "Apostolic Christian History", and another is "Marching to Zion", both available from Apostolic Christian Publications.

His life ended in Strasbourg

Bro. Froehlich spent the last several years of this life residing in Strasbourg. The house in which he preached still stands, having been converted into apartments. Two sisters in faith who live in that city were born in this house.

Froehlich's health deteriorated during his

last years, and on December 28, 1856, he delivered his last sermon. He closed his eyes in death on January 15, 1857 at the age of $53\frac{1}{2}$ years.


Burial in Strasbourg

The mortal remains of Samuel Froehlich were buried in St. Helena Cemetery. A plain granite gravestone has marked his final resting place for decades.

In order to maintain a grave in

Europe money must be paid every twenty years or the spot is reused. The congregation in Strasbourg paid these costs for many years, and in about 1995 the Mission Committee placed a sum of money in Strasbourg to cover these costs permanently, since the local congregation is diminishing, and as of this writing have discontinued regular services.

It is also customary in Europe for the family to maintain the surface of the grave. Here again for years the local brethren kept up this work. On a visit there several years ago, brethren from Strasbourg and USA



saw the benefit of renovating the grave surface to make it maintenance free. The original stone was taken up and a flat granite slab placed over the grave surface. The lettering on the stone was highlighted, and the stone itself reset on the granite slab.

The epitaph in the German language states,

THE MEMORY OF THE JUST IS BLESSED Proverbs 10:7

Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favor; and Whereas both Houses of Congress have, by their joint committee, requested me "to recommend to the people of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness:"

Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th day of November next, to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation: for the signal and manifold mercies and the favorable interpositions of His providence in the course and conclusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquillity, union, and plenty which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one now lately instituted for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and, in general, for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to confer upon us.

And also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions; to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually; to render our National Government a blessing to all the people by constantly being a Government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed; to protect and guide all sovereigns and nations (especially such as have shown kindness to us), and to bless them with good governments, peace, and concord; to promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us; and, generally to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best.

Sermon continued from page 2 world. Our needs and our foes and our concerns are all very different from each other, but we know that we each and every one had them. Satan doesn't give any of us a day off or a free ride. He is ever about us trying to destroy us or to steal away our close fellowship with God or to seek to damage us or to steal away our peace. Our foes are ever about us.

It goes on to say, "O LORD my God, I cried unto thee, and thou hast healed me. O LORD, thou hast brought up my soul from the grave: thou hast kept me alive, that I should not go down to the pit. Sing unto the LORD, O ye saints of his, and give thanks at the remembrance of his holiness." (Psalm 30:2-4). We really need to be reminded often of His holiness, don't we? To let a song of gratitude well up in our hearts and if we actually verbalize or utter a sound of singing praise unto Him, we know that those things lift our hearts up. They strengthen us and they do us good, but even more so, they touch the very heart of God. The song and the melody that we have in our heart that is focused on bringing praise to God touches the very heart of God. It makes Him appreciate and love us even more, if that is even possible.

It is hard for us to comprehend just how much God really loves us. We know that we can't comprehend when we think of what He did for us in the sending of His Son and being willing to shed that innocent blood to make Jesus suffer on our behalf. It is just impossible for us to comprehend how much God loves us.

Then to think that we can actually do things in this life as we walk here in our weakness. It seems like so often we stumble and we fall so short of our own expectations of ourselves. Someday when we come to that Day of Judgment, those things are all going to be weighed in balances, aren't they? We are just thankful for His mercy because of His willingness to forgive us, and because of our faith in the shed blood of Jesus that He would be willing to forgive us of the sins that we are all guilty of. God is willing to forget that. Then to think that His perfect memory would remember all those little things that we might have been able to do by His grace brought a glory unto Him.

We have to think of the words that He shared with the disciples in those moments right before He was taken up to be with His Father in heaven. Such precious advice. Not just advice, but they are instructions for us even today, aren't they, as we come into memory on these things?

"And, being assembled together with them, commanded them that they should not depart from Jerusalem, but wait for the promise of the Father, which, saith he, ye have heard of me. For John truly baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence." (Acts 1:4-5). That Holy Ghost was something that they really didn't understand, was it? They really didn't know just how precious the gift was going to be. They really didn't understand how much help and how much they were going to depend upon the strength, the understanding, the guidance, and the blessings that they would receive when the Holy Ghost was shared freely unto those who had been cleansed by the blood of Jesus.

So we really do live in a special time, don't we? It would have been special to have been there physically with Jesus at that time, but I think we have it even so much easier today. Yes, we do live in a time when the struggles in the world are evil and we have so many concerns that it would be so easy to feel in utter despair. The Holy Ghost has been shared without reservation unto those who have been cleansed by the blood of Jesus and the understanding that we now have.

These disciples really lived in a somewhat spirit of confusion and maybe looked at this whole thing as a bit mysterious, didn't they? It is true that their understanding was granted unto them in the time to come. If we would read on through the books, we would read how fruitful they were and how blest they were when that Spirit did come into their hearts. We have it so abundant around us today and with us. We should never ever take for granted that precious gift that was given at that time.

"When they therefore were come together, they asked of him, saying, Lord, wilt thou at this time restore again the kingdom to Israel?" Just reminds us that their understanding wasn't clear. "And he said unto them, It is not for you to know the times or the seasons, which the Father hath put in his own power." (Acts 1:6-7). That particular verse also reminds us that our vision isn't perfectly clear either, is it? We are not supposed to understand perfectly what the Father's plans are. We understand perfectly if we are obedient unto God. We understand perfectly what His will is, if we seek to know His will. If we seek with a diligent heart to do His will, we will know what His will is.

His will is defined for us here in the Word and it is without error. But it is not for us to know the Father's plans, is it? He tells us as much as He knows that we will need to know. He reveals unto us and He

metes it out to us in a measure that He knows that we are going to need it. It really isn't something that should cause us to be distressed when we really can't figure out and we don't understand what the Father's will is. Sometimes there are situations in our lives that don't go the way that we absolutely thought they were supposed to go. We thought that we knew and knew what to expect when things don't go the way we thought or the way we wanted. We just have to be submissive to the memory that we carry and the instructions that we have here. We don't always know what the Father's plans are.

Even if we know what the Father's plans are, we don't always know and we certainly don't know His time table, not the way He knows it. It is not given unto us to know that. It is really something that we don't need to know but to just be thankful for the time and opportunities that He gives us, and for the understanding He does give us and then be content. He wants so much for us to be content.

It goes on and says, "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." (Acts 1:8). That really does describe where we are today, doesn't it? We really understand those who have tasted of the power of the Holy Spirit. We really understand just how meaningful that is. Each one of us who have shared in that gift know just how

impossible it was for us to stand up against the wiles of the devil when we were in our unconverted state and didn't have that Holy Ghost as a source of power and of strength.

We know how the Holy Spirit is able to do in us things that, as we look at ourselves in all honesty, know that it was impossible without the Holy Spirit that we could ever overcome this or could have been able to do this or that. It is a precious thing, isn't it? That Holy Ghost is such an important part. It is an absolute necessity within our lives. It has to be the driving force of our every conscious thought, and our every action. But we also think that this gift that has been given to us is capable of so much power. It is also so fragile that the relationship that we have with that can become tarnished. We can lose that precious gift. That power is available unto us if we keep ourselves clean and if we keep ourselves pure and sanctified in the eyes of God.

We only become cleansed by the blood of Jesus. He takes us as wretched and unworthy creatures as we are in this life. Then He cleans us, purifies us and He makes us holy in His sight through the washing of the blood of Jesus. Then it is up to us to maintain that purity. It is up to us to maintain our vessel so that we are a fit vessel for the Holy Spirit. God wants to give us that Holy Spirit that is absolutely everything we will ever need to overcome anything in this life that we will ever have to deal with. But it is up to us to maintain our vessels as a fit habitation for that Spirit.

"And when he had spoken these things, while they beheld, he was taken up; and a cloud received him out of their sight. And while they looked stedfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel; Which also said, Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? this same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." (Acts 1:9-11). That very thought should just really put a lump in our throat, shouldn't it? Doesn't it just touch our hearts to think how wonderful it is going to be when Jesus comes to gather His own? In such awe, they must have looked up into those clouds as they saw their beloved Lord and Saviour being taken up out of their sight. We have to wonder what was really in their hearts. It is hard for us to comprehend and it is even harder to comprehend what our hearts might be when we look up and we see Him.

We have a promise here. These two angels who came and explained it to His followers said that He "shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." (Acts 1:11). We are told later in the books how He is going to come in the clouds and that every eye will see Him...every eye will see Him! Each and every one of us! There are some whose eyes have grown dim and maybe can't see so well anymore, but I really believe that when Jesus comes, our focus, our eyesight, and our perception is going to be perfect. I think that God is going to want every creature and every man on earth to see Him perfectly. We are going to be there and see Him.

Then the disciples returned. "Then returned they unto Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet...And when they were come in, they went up into an upper room, where abode..." and it lists all of the disciples here. (Acts 1:12-13). God kept track of each and every detail, didn't He? He knew the names of everyone who was in attendance. He knew what was in their thoughts. He knew what was in their minds. He still remembers it today. Those things are not forgotten by God.

"These all continued with one accord in prayer and supplication ... " (Acts 1:14). It really is the way we want to be together also, isn't it? Don't we want to be considered and don't we want to be viewed by God in exactly the same light that God viewed that group of believers? He looked at those men, Mary, and to the brethren and He saw a group of people there who were in prayer and supplication all in one accord. He wants us to be together like that today. He wants us to live like that throughout our whole lives so that we are continually in prayer and supplication toward Him. To be together, as a body of believers, that we be in one accord.

It takes maintenance and it takes effort but we all serve just that one God and we are all recipients of just that one Holy Spirit. He is not divided. He is not diverse. He doesn't have many faces. He really is only One and He shares to us equally as

Sermon continued from page 45 we need so we can be in one accord. That is His desire for us. He wants us to be of that mind, to all be the same, and to all serve Him the same.

"And in those days Peter stood up in the midst of the disciples, and said, (the number of names together were about an hundred and twenty,)" So they did have a good size gathering. "Men and brethren, this scripture must needs have been fulfilled, which the Holy Ghost by the mouth of David spake before concerning Judas, which was guide to them that took Jesus. For he was numbered with us, and had obtained part of this ministry." (Acts 1:15-17). We all know the story about how Judas through his transgression fell and lost his place to be numbered among the twelve.

Now the apostles were going to fulfill the instructions of the Word, where It says, "For it is written in the book of Psalms, Let his habitation be desolate, and let no man dwell therein: and his bishopric let another take. Wherefore of these men which have companied with us all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, Beginning from the baptism of John, unto that same day that he was taken up from us, must one be ordained to be a witness with us of his resurrection." (Acts 1:20-22). So at that time and so it is the same today, isn't it? We try in our human weakness and

in our human understanding but according to the promptings of the Spirit of God, we try to maintain a good Godly order that is defined in the Word of God.

They were instructed in the Word of God that they were going to have to face this situation and there was going to be one whose habitation would be desolate and another would have to be appointed and his bishoprick let another take. So they sought by the instructions that they understood in the Word to find a replacement, even for Judas.

"And they appointed two, Joseph called Barsabas, who was surnamed Justus, and Matthias. And they prayed, and said, Thou, Lord, which knowest the hearts of all men, show whether of these two thou hast chosen, That he may take part of this ministry and apostleship, from which Judas by transgression fell, that he might go to his own place. And they gave forth their lots; and the lot fell upon Matthias; and he was numbered with the eleven apostles." (Acts 1:23-26). The situation today is very much different, isn't it? There hasn't been a brother that has fallen from grace and that there is a replacement being sought for. I really don't think that it is a coincidence that God would have opened the Word to this Scripture this afternoon.

He is telling us and reminding us

that there is going to be times when there is going to be a need to have a selection of a servant. That is what they did here. They selected a servant, and look how they did it. They prayed and committed it unto the Lord, and said, "Lord, which knowest the hearts of all men, show whether of these two thou hast chosen." (Acts 1:24). It really is so important. They didn't come unto the Lord and seek approval for their own personal opinions. They came unto the Lord and asked which of these two hast Thou chosen.

It really needs to be in our minds also, doesn't it? When we consider the appointment of a brother like we are considering this afternoon or it doesn't matter if it is for any of the church offices, whatever it might be. There are many, many duties and responsibilities in the faith that it is always in our heart. It is always our desire to have the Lord's will be done; not our own will. What is the Lord's will? He certainly has one. If we are standing in grace with Him and we seek to be perfectly aligned in unity to Him, He will reveal it unto us. We just pray that His will would be done and that He gives us that clear focus and that clear understanding that we can always be together in these things.



We are afraid to place much confidence in any human solution, in any human formula, because we know who is loose in this world-none other than the devil. The devil of all nations who will also seat himself at that peace table as the unseen delegate, who is present at every peace conference and sows the dragon teeth that produces future wars and when once he is cast into the bottomless pit and when Jesus Christ will come as King of this universe, then the world will know what constitutes good government. And then there will be a great many of the people, and earthly rulers who will crawl into the caves and cry for rocks to fall upon them.

Now is the time for us to turn to God, those of us who have not known Him, and seek His kingdom. It would contribute a great deal to the comfort of this family if by this occasion a soul could be moved to turn from the world and from sin to God and become converted. If a soul could be saved, they could feel, they could see the purpose and reason. I hope they can be able to experience this comfort.

Serving In The Military

The death of Bro. Dale Aeschleman —as a noncombatant brother-in-faith serving in World War II— and his death and subsequent funeral has received quite a bit of coverage in the Silver Lining.

This has been for a special reason. While our brethren in the Apostolic Christian Church have been very patriotic over the years and loyal to the United States government, our young brethren, and a big share of unconverted friends of the truth, have served in the U.S. Army as noncombatants.

In this, our young men register for selective service at age 18. If they are subsequently conscripted (i.e., "drafted") into the military, they submit to the draft, but with the provision they will not bear arms for the purpose of killing. This is legal, and our government has allowed this procedure, based on sincere religious conviction.

Today (in the year 2000), there is presently no draft. It ended in the 1970's by order of President Richard M. Nixon. Thus, a generation or more has elapsed wherein our young men have not been called to serve in the military.

Because of this, young men today hardly have any perception of the possibility of serving in the Army; neither is there much consciousness of years ago when our young brothers and friends yielded to the call of the U.S. government and willingly went off to their training camps, and many eventually went into combat unarmed!

It will benefit today's youth if they are able to understand that during the time of World War II, nearly 1,200 of our church's brothers and friends left home and assisted (aside from killing) American efforts. They entered the Army and went into basic training. At this time, many suffered verbal abuse for not taking arms. After basic training, they were given a 30-day furlough to return home and be with loved ones.

The departure to return (from home) to their military units after the furlough was a time of tears and heartache for those left behind. As a young boy left, there was no assurance he would ever return home again. World War II was a fierce conflict with many deaths and casualties. The United States lost 405,399 dead and 670,846 wounded. Bro. Dale Aeschleman was one of those who gave his life.

Our church should be thankful—indeed very thankful—for a benevolent and reasonable government who respects a stand for conscience sake. The provision allowing one to serve in the military (and potentially in combat, unarmed) has worked well. In this way, because we cannot kill (according to God's Word), we can still serve as medics to treat the wounded and dying. We thus remain true to two authorities—to God, and to our government. The former exceeds the latter. That is a wonderful policy for our brethren here in America. It was not always so, and especially in eastern European nations.

The belief in not bearing arms is centered on Scriptures. One of the ten commandments is "Thou shalt not kill." Further, in the New Testament, the Word is clear that the true believer must not kill or resort to violence. War itself is the very antithesis of Christianity.

Scriptures in the New Testament that support peace and love are:

Matthew 5:39: "But I say unto you, That ye resist not evil: but whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also."

Matthew 5:44: "But I say unto you, love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good unto them who hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you."

Luke 3:14: "...Do violence to no man..."

Romans 12:19-21: "Dearly beloved, avenge not yourselves, but, rather, give place unto wrath; for it is written, Vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord.

Therefore, if thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst, give him drink; for in doing so, thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head.

Be not overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good."

"Peace Makers" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem, the angels sang to the shepherds, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men."

This would indicate that Jesus was to be a peace maker. If we repent, believe and obey, He certainly does give us peace with our Heavenly Father. I treasure that peace in my heart.

In His Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said, "Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called the children of God." (Matthew 5:9). We are called to be peacemakers and we must consider how well we are succeeding in that calling. If you try to make peace between two other parties, you may find that they both turn against you. If you try to make peace between yourself and someone else, the other party may not cooperate except on his or her own terms. This calling is not so easy to carry out.

In Luke 12:51 we read, "Suppose ye that I am come to give peace on earth? I tell you, Nay; but rather division." Here we have a

contrast between the peace we have in our hearts regarding being ready to meet God, and peace on the earth between human beings and nations. The latter is hard to come by. The question we must ask is "Why?"

The truth of the matter is that we human beings are filled with "self". In Romans 6:8 it is written, "Now if we be dead with Christ...". If this verse means anything, it means that our selfish nature should be gone, once we are converted. However, the amazing thing is that it keeps popping up, even among us believers. I have sometimes thought, mistakenly I hope, that my friends and associates before conversion got along better than we do in the church. Forgive me, please, for such a thought. However, it may be that the devil is working overtime in the church, to destroy the peace which Christ calls us to have and promote. We must not live in a make-believe world.

I want to praise my brothers and sisters more, and never criticize

them; only caution or warn them in a soft and loving voice which puts myself lower than them. We have got to do better and avoid patting ourselves on the back.

In order for us to follow Christ as peace makers, we first need to have peace in our own hearts, with God and with other human beings. Our hearts must be free from malice, grudges, or an unforgiving spirit. Jesus said, "But if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." (Matthew 6:15)

I have said, on the basis of Scripture, that peace between human beings and nations is hard to come by. Again, on the basis of Scripture, I believe the problem is that we are not dead to self. Whatever the cost, let's pray that we can all be dead to self. Then only will we be able to be peace makers, and then only will our own peace and happiness in Christ Jesus overflow in our hearts.
