"STREETS IN HEAVEN ARE PURE GOLD"

Sermon by Bro. Andrew Klaus, Tokyo, Japan Isaiah 9:1-7 and Matthew 1:18-2:23

This is a familiar story and perhaps we can go through and look at it in a little more detail. "Now the birth of Jesus Christ was on this wise:" This is how it came to pass. "When as his mother Mary was espoused to Joseph, before they came together, she was found with child of the Holy Ghost. Then Joseph her husband, being a just man, and not willing to make her a public example..." We know in Moses law, if something like that happened, Joseph could publicly put Mary away and say, "She won't be my wife."

"But while he thought on these things, behold, the angel of the Lord appeared unto him in a dream, saying,...that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost. And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name JESUS: for he shall save his people from their sins." Matthew 1:18-21. Joseph, being a just man, believed also and he did exactly as the angel told him.

In a couple of places where we just read, It says, "Now all this was done, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord by the prophet," Matthew 1:22. Just as we read in Isaiah, there are many places in the Old Testament that talks about the birth of Jesus. "Behold, a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a son, and they shall call his name Emmanuel," Matthew 1:23. Emmanuel, we know, means God is with us. God Himself came down here to be born in a man's body and took on Him all the limitations that a man has, even though He was God Himself. He just did all the angel told him and took

Mary for his wife.

Between chapter one and chapter two, we know there is a lot more that went on. We can read about it in Luke chapter two. Before the wise men came, angels also appeared to the shepherds as they were watching their flocks outside of Bethlehem and they came and found Jesus lying in a manger. We know they put Him in a manger because there was no room for Him in the inn, which I take that as being probably Mary and Joseph were perhaps not from a very rich family. Maybe they got to Bethlehem late but they also probably didn't have too much, and the stable was the only thing left where they could lay down their heads.

After He was born (we don't know how much after), or at about the time He was born, a special star appeared in the sky. That was something that was out of the ordinary. This week we were supposed to have a very special moon. It was supposed to be brighter than it has been for seventy years. I went out one night to look at it, but to me, it didn't seem any brighter than normal. But these wise men here, they saw a special star in the sky and from their studies they somehow, perhaps by the Holy Spirit, knew that this meant that a King had been born in Judea. So they went to look for Him.

Perhaps there were several wise men plus a train of servants (we don't know how many people came), but they came to the capital in Jerusalem. Of course, they went straight to King Herod. They said, "King Herod, we saw a star in the east so where is He that is born King of the Jews?"

Obviously, Herod was very troubled. He didn't want anyone to take his place. He didn't know of anyone born in his family, or perhaps that was born recently. So he gathered

Accountability I

"For unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall much be required: and to whom men have committed much, of him will they ask the more" (Lk. 12:42).

To be held accountable is to be required to give a satisfactory explanation for actions we have committed. The Bible makes it abundantly clear that we will be accountable for what we have done with the time and talents we have been given. Trying to escape accountability is not new. It has been a problem almost from the beginning of time. There is a long list of excuses that have been used over the years by individuals who have tried to escape responsibility for what they have done. Furthermore, the scripture also makes it clear that some people are more accountable than others.

We are stewards, not owners. All that we have (houses, lands, possessions of any kind, and even our lives) belongs to the Lord. He has allowed us the privilege of using some of His possessions. Just as when we use something that belongs to someone else and the time comes to return it or explain how we have used it, we must give an account of what we have done with God's possessions. The unjust steward is not the only one who must "...give an account of thy stewardship;" (Lk. 16:2), "for we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ" (Ro. 14:10).

The first excuse used in trying to escape accountability was to blame someone else. When Adam was confronted for eating of the forbidden fruit, he responded: "The woman whom thou gavest to be with me, she gave me of the tree and I did eat" (Gen. 3:12). Adam was not only blaming the woman but he also tried to place an element of blame on God as he reminded God that He had placed the woman in Adam's life. When confronted about the accusation from Adam, Eve replied "The serpent beguiled me and I did eat" (Gen. 3:13).

Both were guilty. Both knew they had done wrong, and both tried to blame someone else. The serpent was not given an opportunity for defense and had a curse placed upon him. Adam and Eve, of course, were both required to live with the consequences of their behavior. They were driven from the garden of

Eden and required to earn their bread by the "...sweat of thy face..." (Gen. 3:19). Even more seriously, of course, was the separation from God and the death that they faced as a result of their sin.

Denying knowledge of the problem is also used as a method of avoiding the consequences of inappropriate behavior. When God asked Cain about his brother Abel, he lied and said "...I know not: am I my brother's keeper?" (Gen. 4:9). Cain not only knew the situation, but he also knew that he was guilty of wrong doing. His claim of ignorance did not save him from the consequences of his behavior.

Likewise many people try to avoid accepting the consequences of their behavior by claiming that their unacceptable behavior was something they felt required to do. King Saul believed that it was necessary to offer a sacrifice to God before going to battle. He sincerely believed that sacrifices would bring the blessings of God to the Israelites.

King Saul was told to wait for Samuel who had promised to come to meet him and offer a sacrifice before Saul led his army to battle against the Philistines. When Samuel didn't appear, Saul offered the burnt offering. Samuel soon arrived and asked Saul what he had done. Saul said "Because I saw...that thou camest not within the days appointed, and that the Philistines gathered together at Michmash;...I forced myself therefore, and offered a burnt offering" (I Sam. 13:11-12). The king tried to blame Samuel for not coming at the appointed time to offer the sacrifice but that did not prevent him from facing the consequences of sin. Saul was told that he had done foolishly, he had not kept the Lord's commandment, and that his kingdom would not continue. Therefore, much of the remainder of Saul's reign was filled with sorrow and difficulty.

Finally, feelings of inadequacy are also used from time to time by those who are trying to avoid accountability. In the parable of the talents we are reminded that the time will come when "...the lord of those servants cometh and reckoneth with them" (Mt. 25:19). All of those servants were required to give an account of

how they had used their lord's money. Those who used it wisely were told: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant:" (Mt. 25:21). The one who hid his lord's money was called wicked and slothful and was "...cast...into outer darkness:" (Mt. 25:30). The unprofitable servant believed his master was so harsh that he could not possibly do as his master expected. His assessment was wrong and his sentence for not doing his duty was harsh.

When we make errors or commit sin it is necessary that we confess our sins and that we go to those we have wronged, sincerely apologize and offer to make restitution. We know that "...every one of us shall give account of himself to God" (Ro. 14:12). We know that if we take care of a mistake as soon as possible, we can keep the situation from getting worse and we can restore peace with those whom we may have wronged. Generally, the people of the world do not understand this: "...they think it strange that ye run not with them to the same excess of riot, speaking evil of you: who shall give account to him that is ready to judge the quick and the dead" (I Peter 4:4-5).

In legal matters, the first bit of advice that attorneys often give their clients is to keep quiet and admit to nothing. They seem to think that if their client is found not guilty in a court of law that there will be no consequences. The Bible tells us otherwise: "But I say unto you, that every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment" (Mt. 12:36).

All of us will be held accountable for what we do with the time and resources the Lord gives to us. Although God's mercy and compassion are great, excuses for unacceptable behavior will be of no value. Blaming others, claiming ignorance of a situation, feeling pressure to do wrong, and feelings of inadequacy cannot make wrong behavior right.

In part II of this series, attention will be focused on a variety of reactions to being held accountable, to whom we are accountable and the degree of our accountability.

Distribution Centers and Material Aid Coordinators

Our God has continued to bless the World Relief Committee that is an arm of our Apostolic Christian Church. As gifts of funds and goods have increased, so has the necessity to govern them wisely and properly.

New board created

The national World Relief Committee (WRC) has now changed the former Distribution Centers Coordinators Committee to a full-fledged Board functioning under their direction. This action reflects the increasing responsibilities that are coming to our organization as time progresses. The necessity for good stewardship of money, material goods, time, and effort is quite apparent. We are trying to respond in a way that will be acceptable to our great God as well as to our brotherhood. The ongoing efforts at the level of the local congregations are the basis of what finally is sent through our organization to the needy around the world.

Examples of useful items

Some examples of goods made and packaged by brethren and friends include: Comforters, layettes, homemade soap, motel soap, health kits, sewing kits, pre-natal kits, edible beans, etc. Companies often donate surplus or outdated goods to our local churches. These are appreciated, but must be properly handled, stored, and finally sent to those who can make the best use of them.

Always ask before accepting

Over the years, experience has taught that if an item has value to us it could

be of value to others. However, shipping and distributing costs are real, and becoming greater, and this increases the necessity of good stewardship throughout our entire organization.

For this reason we ask that anyone who learns of items available should seek the counsel of a Distribution Center Coordinator before accepting the goods. In the past we have often accepted nearly anything that became available, but sometimes it is simply not cost effective to do so, even if the products are free.

What kind of clothing?

Clothing should have at least six months of good wear left. It should be clean and mended. Children's clothes are always in high demand. Most families pass these clothes to others, and for that reason not too many come to our Distribution Centers. Undergarments are also vitally needed, but these should be either new or nearly so. Sometimes our loyal supporters find such items at sale prices, and donate them to the work. Even in cases like this we have found it well to ask in advance before purchasing a large quantity.

New Distribution Centers

The Bluffton Distribution Center (BDC) has been expanded through the purchase of an adjoining building. A new Distribution Center is now under construction in the Rittman/Smithville, OH area. It is hoped that with God's help a new Distribution Center can be built in Wolcott, IN in the coming year.

With thanks to God, we can report that not one ongoing project has had to suffer from a shortage of funds. Thanks also to our loyal supporters who have cared enough to share with others as the work goes on.

Rural Gospel and **Medical Missions** of India (RGMMI)

Thirty years ago in 1970 the first visit was made to India by Elder Bros. Joseph Waibel, Carl Kinsinger and Bro. Jim Hoerr to review the work of RGMMI. After the demise of the founders, Mr. and Mrs. Bhagwat, our Apostolic Christian Church responded to their plea that we assume the full oversight of the Mission providing spiritual counsel and guidance as well as material support.

Many visits over the years

Over the years, sixteen more trips under the auspices of the Mission and World Relief Committees have been made to inspect and review the work and to teach and encourage the RGMMI staff and congregations.

After several postponements because of the uncertainty of the political atmosphere in India another trip was undertaken during the month of October 2000. Five years had passed since the previous visit. Two couples and two other brothers were blessed to be able to participate. Spending fifteen days in India, they were able to visit the two Mission Compounds and seven of the twelve tribal church congregations.


Warm welcomes from the staff


They were welcomed by Dr. Parkhe and the other twenty-five members of the staff. It was striking to see a number of changes in the infrastructure of the urban areas, while in the tribal areas the Bible-time scenes have changed very little. More importantly was the growth seen and felt in the spiritual warmth, unity and love among the 600 or more believers.

Persecution is becoming a factor

It was evident that God has heard the many prayers for protection of the Christians who faced persecution by militant Hindus for many months. The RGMMI churches suffered no injuries nor destruction of churches but had to

endure the intimidating presence of policemen during worship services. They have since been removed. much to the relief of the believers.






Three days of convocation

As in past visits, three days of convocation were held as the visiting Brothers gave topical spiritual presentations to the staff and their spouses. They centered around the basic plan of salvation through Jesus Christ; growing in the spirit and love for one another; living sanctified lives; encouragement to continue steadfast in preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ; Apostolic Christian doctrines and practices; church order; and several other spiritual topics. The believers welcomed this counsel and advice and had a number of beneficial questions. God's direction could be felt in strengthening the spiritual leadership through identification of two faithful men to become ordained as Pastors, hopefully in January 2001 They are Dr. Parkhe and Evangelist Raju Kasbe.

Labors are being accepted

It is believed that along with God's hand of protection, the Mission's medical and orphanage programs which are helpful to the surrounding community and villages, provided a measure of acceptance by the Hindus. The two doctors and three nurses

treated more than 21,000 patients last vear. Plans were laid to enhance this work with improvements in facilities and provision of X-ray equipment. In the orphanage/

The winter white blanketing the earth is a vivid reminder of the magnificent cleansing of a sin stained soul accomplished only by the power of the blood of our dear Jesus.

Many groups braved the cold and snow to come to Christmas carol for us. The beauty of the songs and knowing that others remembered us in a busy time helped us focus on the celebration of our Saviour's birth. Also, thanks to those of you who sent us Christmas cards.

The winter weather presents extra challenges here just as it does at each of your homes. On very cold mornings, decisions are made by nursing and social services staff regarding the ability of our physically fragile residents to go away to their work and Day Programs. If they are unable to go out, this break in routine is quite difficult for some of the people living here. Extra activities must be planned to occupy the time normally spent away from home.

The maintenance men must come in the wee hours of the morning to clear snow making it possible for the night shift nursing staff to go home, and the day folks to get in. The flexibility of the dietary department is evident when everybody gets snowed (or frozen) in, and they must prepare many extra meals. Can you imagine unexpectedly having to set 70 extra places for a meal? Extra assistance in feeding people is needed at a time when staff is short due to impassable roads. There are times when nursing and activities staff have to stay over for an extra shift to cover for those who are snowed in at their own homes. During a snowstorm, nearby motel rooms have been rented by the agency for nursing staff to sleep between shifts so there would be sufficient staff to cover for their co-workers who are unable to get to work.

But these challenges brought about by the weather also create a spirit of camaraderie as everyone works together to turn the unplanned and unchangeable winter storm into a time of safety and security for everyone.

the spiritual rulers at that
time—the chief priests and
scribes—and said, "What do you
say? Is there supposed to be a King
that is born here?" I don't think
they necessarily believed themselves, but again another prophet
said, "The Saviour that is to come
will be born in the line of Bethlehem...the little town of Bethle-hem.."

"And thou Bethlehem, in the land of Juda, art not the least among the princes of Juda: for out of thee shall come a Governor, that shall rule my people Israel." Matthew 2:6. So Herod went and told the wise men that. They continued to follow the star.

Another miracle happened when this star came and stood right over where the young child was. They came to the house and saw the young child and fell down and worshipped Him. This is the only place, I think, in the Bible that someone worshipped such a young person. Yet, through inspiration, they knew that this was the King that they had come seeking, perhaps for many months.

They opened to Him the treasures—gold, frankincense and myrrh. These three gifts were, I think, three items that were in common use at that time. We know gold has been in use since the most ancient times and is still used many times today. It is a form of value and it is something that has kept its value. The last two—frankincense and myrrh—are spices and perfumes which were also used back then sometimes.

They were warned of God in a dream not to return to Herod. They realized Herod did not want to worship this Baby after all and so they went back to their country another way.

We can look at these three presents that they gave to Jesus. Jesus didn't receive many gifts when He was here in this world, even when He was older. He doesn't want things from us. Even at the time of His birth, I don't think He necessarily needed things, but these wise men gave Him these three items because they have some of their meaning behind them, not just because they are gifts.

Gold, for instance; gold is an item that was used by kings. Gold was the most valuable metal...better than silver and better than brass. Gold was the presents that you give to kings. People in authority, people above you and people who are worth a lot are worth gold. We know gold has cognations of heaven. In heaven, the streets will be paved with pure gold.

In verse six in chapter two, It says, "Out of Bethlehem shall come a Governor—Governor or King that shall rule my people Israel." This gold represents Christ being our King and being our Head. He is God. He is worth the most valuable treasures that we have which, at that time, was gold.

Frankincense, the second gift, was an item used in temple worship a lot. It is mentioned in Moses' law and is mentioned in several other places. It was a sweet incense. We don't use incense today. In Japan, many people still use incense because idolatry is still quite rampant. You can go into many people's houses and you can smell the incense.

Sometimes it is the sweeter kind of incense, as in temple worship, and at this time also. Frankincense was used as a sweet offering to God. We know God's Son, Jesus, is our Priest...He is our High Priest. This represents Him as our Spiritual Leader. Frankincense. Another word for Jesus is Christ, which means The Anointed One. The Anointed One again is someone who has been spiritually anointed as our Great High Priest.

I believe the Book of Hebrews also talks about Jesus being our High Priest. In Hebrews here, Paul mentions, "And no man taketh this honour unto himself, but he that is called of God, as was Aaron. So also Christ glorified not himself to be made an high priest; but he that said unto him, Thou art my Son, to day have I begotten thee. As he saith also in another place, Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchisedec. Who in the days of his flesh," which means when Jesus was come down here as a man, "when he had offered up prayers and supplications with strong crying and tears unto him that was able to save him from death, and was heard in that he feared; Though he were a Son," or the Son of God, "yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered; And being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him; Called of God an high priest..." Hebrews 5:4-10.

This is another name that we have for Jesus. He is our High Priest. He is the One who intercedes for us. When we pray, we pray in Jesus' name because for each one of us, He has offered many prayers and supplications. "With strong crying and tears," It says. Even though He was God's Son and yet, by coming here as a man, He learned obedience by the things which He suffered and by being an

example to all of us.

God's Son was perfect and came here to this earth, and yet, was completely obedient in all things. How much more should we learn of obedience to God and to those above us in authority? So frankincense represents Christ's Spiritual Headship over us.

The last one is myrrh. This is another perfume that was used sometimes. It is mentioned several times throughout the Bible. I think the other time it is mentioned in the New Testament is when Jesus died. After He died, the women came carrying myrrh to anoint His dead body and this was used as a form of embalming. I believe it also had a sweet smell.

So this last one here, perhaps, is the most important. The purpose of Jesus coming to this world was to die. He came to be born so that He could give His life. Another name we have here for our Saviour is Jesus. This is perhaps the most used name. It is the name the angels told Mary and Joseph to call Him. Jesus means Saviour...Saviour of the world. "...for he shall save his people from their sins." Matthew 1:21. That is the whole reason why He came here to this earth. Yes, He is our King. Yes, He is our High Priest. The purpose that He came was to save us from our sins.

Myrrh. That is to anoint the dead. Perhaps the wise men maybe didn't fully understand the meaning of these gifts. Yet, we can look back now and see how they matched so well the life He lived here.

So continuing, "And when they were departed, behold, the angel of the Lord appeareth to Joseph in a dream, saying, Arise, and take the young child and his mother, and flee into Egypt, and be thou there until I bring thee word: for Herod will seek the young child to destroy him." Matthew 2:13.

We know that throughout Jesus' life, Satan has always tried to foil God's plan from the time of His birth until the time at the cross. Many times Satan tried to do away with God's plan that He had for His Son. Again, here he used King Herod. Herod saw that he was mocked of the wise men and he was very wroth. He went and slew all the children in the Bethlehem region from two years old and under.

Again, this was a fulfilled prophecy "which was spoken by Jeremy the prophet, saying, In Rama was there a voice heard, lamentation, and weeping, and great mourning, Rachel weeping for her children, and would not be comforted, because they are not." Matthew 2:17-18. So when Herod was dead, an angel again appeared to Joseph and said to go back to the land of Israel. It is safe to go there.

We know that Joseph and Mary originally lived in Nazareth and went down to Bethlehem because a young Baby was just born. They probably were not able to return to Nazareth right away and ended up staying there for awhile. But Joseph did not want to go back to that region because he was so afraid; but he was warned of God in a dream again, so he went again to the parts of Galilee and came to a town called Nazareth.

It says here, "...that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the prophets, He shall be called a Nazarene." Matthew 2:23. I believe this Nazarene comes from the same root as the Old Testament of the

word Nazarite which is a person that was especially set apart for God's service. This was again as written in Moses' law. A Nazarite is someone who kept himself from the things of the world. He didn't do certain things like drink strong drinks or cut his hair. Moses' law says that.

We know the two famous ones in the Old Testament were Samson and we also know the prophet Samuel, who were both Nazarites. Perhaps it is just chance but I tend to think of it more than chance that He happened to live in a town called Nazareth, which comes from the same root. He also was someone set apart...a separated one. Sometimes it means a branch. Jesus' life was completely set apart for God's service.

We know babies don't know really anything. They are completely helpless. Other animals of this world when they are born, they have many instincts and they can kind of fend for themselves, or get food for themselves. But human babies are completely helpless. If it were not for the mother taking care of the baby, we know babies would not live.

I don't think Jesus really knew His life when He was a baby, and yet, as He got older and His knowledge increased, He came to know of God's purpose for Him. I don't know exactly what age He really knew of His purpose in life and that was to go to the cross, but we know that by the time He was thirty and by the time He was baptized and started preaching this, He fully knew what God wanted for Him.

Luke. There is one more verse I would like to read in Saint John that I think is beautiful as a Christmas story. In John 1:1, It says, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was Word, and the Word was God." This is another name we have for Jesus.

Yes, He is Emmanuel, God is with us. He is our King. He is our High Priest. Another thing He is, He is the Word. He came to this earth also to bring the Word to us. That is why we have four gospels completely filled with words that Jesus spoke. This same Word was in the beginning with God. This Baby who came to be born two thousand years ago was originally with God. We know God had no beginning. Jesus also had no beginning.

"All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made. In him was life; and the life was the light of men." John 1:3-4. We again here have the word light. We know of ourselves that we can do nothing to earn salvation. We ourselves are completely worthless and yet, Jesus is the One who gives us life. By believing on Him, by looking at the Light and learning from Him, we can have life.

It says here, "Which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God." John 1:13. His whole birth was a complete miracle. It wasn't obviously a normal birth. It wasn't because man willed something but it was because God willed it. The Word was made flesh. This Word, Jesus, came down here to be flesh and to dwell among us.

"And the Word was made flesh. and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth." John 1:14. That is how John describes our Saviour. He was made flesh. God was. The Word was, John writes here. John was one of the twelve disciples who spent many years with Jesus. It says we beheld Him and beheld His glory. It is something that the prophets looked forward to with earnestness. They wanted to behold the day so they could see their Saviour being born. We know that two thousand years after it happened, and we can't necessarily look at it with our eyes, and yet, we can read of it and we can still have the same faith within our hearts.

There were several people around the temple at the time of Jesus' birth that had been looking for the Messiah for many, many years. There was the prophetess, Anna, and she spent every day in prayers

and fastings. The Bible says she never departed from the temple. Her whole life was completely sold to God, and she was looking forward to her Messiah, the Anointed One. Finally, the day came when this Baby was carried into the temple and she saw Him and she blessed Him and said, "Now I have seen the redemption in Israel."

There was another man named Simeon who was an old man and looking every day for the salvation of Israel. When he saw the Baby, he didn't see the whole life of Jesus, he just saw God's Son as an infant. Then he said, "I have seen the salvation and now I can die in peace."

Today each one of us has the opportunity as well to read and to understand what God did for us. We read for the wise men, when they saw the Baby, it brought them exceeding great joy.

Today as we think of God's miracle of His Son, may we also be filled with joy. May our hearts be filled with love so we can share to each other. May it be filled with hope that through Him we can have eternal life. Through Him we can be saved from all of our sins, as it says here. He is our Saviour. He is our King. He is our High Priest.

May each one of us have a joyful Christmas day.

Aspects of Growth

During the century of 1900-2000, the church grew, both in numbers and congregations. It also grew in its scope of ministry.

By century's end, the church had found a presence in 22 states and in Canada, Mexico and Japan. In addition to holding worship services, it grew into many projects that might not have seemed possible in 1900.

In the early part of the 20th century, due to a variety of factors, the church brethren were primarily active in finding an adequate existence. Having been in America for a little more than 50 years, the members had not found much integration in the culture. The language of worship and in everyday life was German. Cultural patterns from the old country did not die fast. Many brethren were farmers and had little social contact with those of nationalities other than German and Swiss.

Two wars with Germany were responsible, in part, for the brethren to shed its German ties, and begin to find more accommodation with the American culture.

The post World War II era found the church evolving into service pursuits that were beneficial in the Lord's service. Not only did the church grow in numbers (slowly), but also in projects to aid the poor and needy.

In addition, efforts in publishing (Apostolic Christian Publications) and in communicating (Silver Lining) gave the church a mode of influence it did not have early in the 1900's. A history, Marching To Zion, was published in 1984 that helped a growing number of members and youth understand the past and today's link to it.

World Relief

While brethren had always been charitable, the early 1960's ushered in an official organization that sought to give assistance to needy persons.

By 1970, the World Relief Committee consisted of ten brothers. From 1964-1970, records indicate that disbursements reached \$360,000. From 1971 to 1976, they rose to \$1,033,070. Giving to a wide variety of causes saw disbursements rise significantly by 2000. From 1981 on, World Relief was giving to dozens of approved organizations.

Grain has been shipped to Honduras. Earthquake victims were aided in Guatemala (1976); and an Apostolic Christian presence in India was born when the church became an overseer of the Rural Gospel and Medical Mission as requested by its founder, Bhagwant B. Bhagwat. (Elder brethren have made numerous trips to India for this cause.)

Material Aid Centers were set up. Sewing groups were established in local churches. A big emphasis was put on Bible distribution. In the May, 1977, issue of the American Bible Society Record, the Apostolic Christian Church was shown as the biggest giver (per capita) of all U.S. denominations. A work projects program augmented World Relief.

Silver Lining

In the early 1940's, a monthly church periodical was begun in Grabill, IN. The first issue was in October, 1943.

As time unfolded, each local congregation furnished news. In 1981, circulation reached 6,400. Today, the total circulation remains nearly the same. The Silver Lining serves as a cohesive force among our 86 congregations.

Ministers Book

A booklet, published every few years, that has brought a further sense of cohesion to believers across the land, and abroad, is the Ministers Book.

First published in 1944 by Bro. Orel Steiner of Oakville, IA, it grew to 6,000 copies by 1981. The 2000 issue had 14,000 copies printed.

Apostolic Christian Publications

In 1967, a small building was built in Eureka, IL, to house church-related materials. In the early 1960's, the church saw the need to house hymnals and Sunday School materials, and related items.

In time, a large brick building —facing Route 24 —was built in Eureka. It's volume continues to grow.

Nursing and Retirement Homes

Local churches today operate nine nursing homes, and several churches have built apartments for elderly brethren. This has been a major work. The financial statistics, and the people served, accrue to a significant work on the Lord's behalf.

Home for the Handicapped

In October, 1971, a new \$800,000 facility was built in Morton, IL, to care for handicapped persons. In 1978, a 1.1 million dollar addition was made. This work has experienced expansion over the years. It is a notable work for the Lord.

Children's Home

In 1976, a children's home was established. It is located one mile east of Leo, IN, and cares for youngsters from troubled homes. A dedicated staff devotes itself to helping and extending love to young people in need of special direction.

There have been many aspects of growth during the past century. While the church has experienced a four to five-fold increase in membership (since 1900), it has experienced significant growth in service areas as well.

God spoke to Elijah in a still, small voice, and that was simplicity after all that noise and commotion. First there was a wind storm, followed by an earthquake and a fire. We read, "And after the earthquake a fire; but the Lord was not in the fire: and after the fire, a still, small voice." (I Kings 19:12)

There is something wonderful and beautiful about simplicity. A teacher who can make difficult, complicated and abstract ideas simple, is a teacher who is much in demand. The students love it and I don't blame them.

Don't you sometimes feel like you would just like to get away from it all and relax some place where the birds sing in the trees, water runs in the mountain stream, and all is quiet and peaceful? The duty you and I have, is to make right where we are, that kind of place. In all of our learning, let's learn to keep life simple.

A word that is closely associated with simplicity is quietness. I Timothy 2:2, "That we may lead a

quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty." This requires us to speak softly and respectfully to one another, and not to show any anger in our voice or facial expression. At times, it may be necessary to be stern with children but we must be careful not to give them the impression that we cannot control ourselves, and that we consider ourselves to be superior to them. "And ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath." (Ephesians 6:4)

I'm thinking about this coming year, 2001. How I would like to have a more simple life, although my life is already quite simple. What can we do to make our life more simple? The first thing I think of is, "Don't demand so much in regard to luxurious items." I Timothy 6:8 says "And having food and raiment let us be therewith content."

Concerning spiritual things, "Keep it simple." There is a living God who is a Spirit and He is the Creator. He is perfect and we are not perfect so in order for us to be able to spend eternity with Him, we need to be purified.
