"WHATSOEVER IS NOT OF FAITH IS SIN"

Sermon by Bro. Garth Steffen, Portland, OR Proverbs 24 and Romans 14

In another place, the Apostle said he would not eat meat to offend his brothers as long as the world would stand. That is a wonderful attitude not to needlessly give an offense in a church to others who might be weak in faith. Certainly we have many wonderful examples in the Scripture, even the Lord, even though He came to fulfill the law. Yet, when He would cure, for instance, the leper, He sent them to the priest who would judge then whether or not he was healed and he brought his offering.

Throughout Christ's life, He observed the various feasts and He did not go into the Holy of Holiest in the Temple which is reserved only for those in Aaron's Tribe, the Leviticus Tribe. So if we consider one another, we too, then will not give needless offense.

In the beginning of this chapter, probably all we can say is that I think this is a good Scripture. It says, "...not to, doubtful disputations." Romans 14:1. If there are questions in a convert's life, they should be dissolved perhaps before he or she is introduced and incorporated in the household of faith. Perhaps we all feel weak in faith at times. In Pilgrim's Progress there was a man who had a little faith. He was always troubled but he finally made it to the everlasting goal as well as the others. The Lord can strengthen our faith. A lot of times our faith is tested and tried but we think of those in Bible times, like the Apostle Paul and the opposition he experienced of persecution. Our forefathers encourages us and the faith is then renewed within us and especially if we remember and recall past blessings and deliverances of God. Then, of course, we can acquire this wonderful faith in which without we know we cannot please Him who called us.

We already know the times when there were diversions, you might say, that perhaps Satan introduced to weaken the church or to make it divided. Here he sets the story straight that whether we eat meat or don't eat it, it doesn't make us any better. We know the Jews were told in the Old Testament that there were certain creatures they could eat and what they couldn't eat. The Pharisees really followed this to a letter. They would even strain at a gnat which Christ referred to in condemning their critical ways. So they would not swallow a gnat which was unclean when they would drink. They would have a strainer over their cup. So we have to be careful that we are not drawn aside to unimportant and insignificant matters and make great issues of them.

He writes here "Who art thou that judgest another man's servant? to his own master he standeth or falleth. Yea, he shall be holden up: for God is able to make him stand." Romans 14:4. We have to look at a larger picture

as it states here to do those things

that make for peace in the church. That should not be difficult. We don't have a long list of rules. I remember when my father-in-law became introduced to our church and my future mother-in-law and future wife

The Wages of Sin is Death

The scripture is very clear in teaching us that "...the wages of sin is death..." (Ro. 6:23). Because all have sinned, we must die physically, and if we continue in sin, we will die spiritually, for "...every transgression and disobedience received a just recompense of reward;" (Heb. 2:2).

Wages are the payments a servant receives from a master for performing a task. Usually the wage and the task are agreed upon before the task is completed.

We are instructed in the scripture that a householder went out in the morning to hire laborers to work in his vineyard. "And when he had agreed with the laborers for a penny a day, he sent them into his vineyard" (Mt. 20:2). Later in the day he hired other laborers and told them "...whatever is right I will give you" (Mt. 20:4). There was an agreed upon task and either an agreed upon wage or a promise to give what is right. Both the servant and the master knew there was something to be given by the servant (labor) and by the master (wages).

Because wages are earned, there is usually some relationship between the task performed and the wages received. For example, more difficult tasks with a greater time commitment usually result in higher compensation.

Since the beginning of time, from the message given to Adam and Eve, God's people have known in advance that there is a relationship between sin and (spiritual) death.

The wages of sin were agreed upon long ago. In the Garden of Eden, God explained to Adam that "of every tree of the garden thou mayest freely eat: But of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, thou shalt not eat of it: for in the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die" (Gen. 2:16-17). The task was clearly defined obey God's commandment to abstain from eating from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil - and the wage was directly related to the task - a violation of the commandment would bring death. Adam and Eve knew exactly what was expected of them and they knew the results of disobedience.

The master of sin is well known and the wages to be received for sin are "earned". If

we are the servant of Satan, we will "earn" spiritual death when we reach the age of accountability.

There are numerous examples where God gave a commandment and tied it directly to a "wage" if violated. King Saul "...died for his transgression which he committed against the Word of the Lord,... which he kept not, and also for asking counsel of one that had a familiar spirit, to inquire of it" (I Chr. 10:13).

In the writings of Solomon we are instructed that "...he that pursueth evil pursueth it to his own death" (Pr. 11:19). Ezekiel wrote "...the soul that sinneth, it shall die" (Ez. 18:4).

Further, Korah and his followers were swallowed by the earth (Numbers 16:28-33), Nadab and Abhihu died for using strange fire in their censer (Le. 10:1-2); a man who gathered sticks on the Sabbath day lost his life (Nu. 15:36); Achan and his family were slain for keeping garments, gold and silver that were to be destroyed (Jo. 7:25): Jezebel (II Kings 9:32-33): Athaliah (II Ch. 23:15); Haman (Es. 7:10); Ananias and Sapphira (Acts 5:5-10); Herod Agrippa (Acts 12:23); and others died because of sinful deeds. From the point of view of mankind, some of the preceding transgressions seem more serious than others so we may think that the sentence should reflect this difference. However, all of these examples involved individuals who refused to obey a direct commandment of God.

Certainly we know that not all who sin are immediately slain. The scripture gives many examples of sinful men and women who were not required to immediately pay for their sin by losing their life. We could also find many examples in history for which those who seemed to perform very sinful deeds were not required to immediately die.

We are, however, instructed very clearly in the scriptures that ultimately we must stop sinning or we will die in our sins and lose the opportunity to spend eternity with God.

Christ explained to those who told him of the fate of the Galileans whose blood had been mingled with Pilot's sacrifices "...except ye repent, ye shall all likewise

perish" (Lk. 13:3). Also those upon whom the tower of Siloam fell were sinners who paid with their life, but Christ reminded the people that "...except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish" (Lk. 13:5).

When Jesus explained to the disciples who would be the greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven, He said, "Except ye be converted and become as little children, ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven" (Mt. 18:3). Therefore, we understand that not only will unconverted people miss the opportunity to be the greatest in the kingdom of heaven, but much more serious is the statement that they will not even enter heaven. They will suffer eternal spiritual death.

So important are the concepts of repentance and conversion that Jesus made it very clear that those who refuse to recognize the sinfulness of their past by humbly repenting and continuing on the path of sin by refusing to be converted will perish and not enter heaven.

The need to repent and be converted was made very clear through John the Baptist's early preaching - "John did baptize in the wilderness and preach the baptism of repentance for remission of sins" (Mk. 1:4). This message was continued throughout the ministry of Jesus. His disciples from the Acts ("commandeth all men to repent" Acts 17:20) through Revelations (..."be zealous therefore and repent" Rev. 3:19) also taught the message of salvation.

James gives an excellent summary of the progression of sin and its ultimate penalty. "But every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust; and enticed. Then when lust hath conceived, it bringeth forth sin: and sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death" (Ja. 1:14-19).

Thus, we can easily understand that God has been very open and clear to His people. Although He has given us the opportunity to know the right way to live and the consequences of choosing to do otherwise, we know that the result of a life of sin is eternal death. We also know that God does not want that for His people. Therefore, He offers us the opportunity to receive the gift of eternal life, a beautiful topic that will be covered in the next article.

Faith Cometh by Hearing

While the Mission Committee has responsibility of carrying out the goals and purposes of spreading the gospel, each of us can have a part in this endeavor. One way that we can be involved is through the distribution of Bibles. In the darkness of this present age the seriousness and the significance of this work cannot be emphasized enough. The following article is to remind each of us of the purpose of the Bible in our lives, the urgency of sharing this truth with a lost world and suggestions to accomplish this important mission.

The purpose of the Bible

The Bible has been given to mankind as a witness of one God, who created and sustains the universe, and of His holy son, our Lord Jesus Christ. The story it tells is continuous—that of the perfect redemption of fallen mankind.

This story unfolds as one reads through the books of the Bible. The great truths of redemption are given through history and prophecy. By studying these truths, one can understand the divine role of Jesus Christ as redeemer. It is divine inspiration which sets the Bible apart from any other book in the world, for it is the mind of God.

Jesus Christ is the center and the heart of the Bible

The Old Testament is the account of a nation. The New Testament is the account of a man. The nation was founded and nurtured by God to bring the man into the world.

One can read at the beginning of Genesis that God made man in His own image. Man is the highest form of life on earth, and alone has been given the reasoning ability to make personal choices. In exercising this right of choice, man willingly disobeyed God, and the sentence of death was placed upon him and his posterity.

In the fullness of time, God Himself was born as a man in the person of His only son. First man in God's image, and then God in man's image as an offering for sin. Christ's appearance on the earth is the central event of all history. The Old Testament sets the stage for it. The New Testament describes it with deep passion.

As a man, He lived the most beautiful life ever known. He was the kindest, tenderest, gentlest, most sympathetic person who ever lived. Ways that we can share the Gospel

Bibles are available from distribution centers in Bluffton, Indiana and Eureka, Illinois. Several foreign language Bibles are also available for distribution in other countries. Listed below are some suggestions on how we can bring the bread of life to a hungry world:

- Plastic boxes are available that hold New Testaments. These can be placed in businesses, hospitals, motels, gas stations or anyplace where people can take them. On the front is a small decal that encourages anyone to take one free.
- Newspaper ads can be placed in your local paper offering a Bible free to anyone who requests one. These can be delivered in person, offering an opportunity to meet both physical and spiritual needs.
- Ask those who you work with if they own a Bible and offer to get them one if they express an interest in having one.
- Keep Bibles available in your car to give to someone who has a need.
- Invite someone to church. Have Bibles available to give them when they leave.
- Large print Bibles can be placed in doctor's offices, hospitals or anyplace where they would be read.

These are only a few suggestions. Each of us has unique opportunities to share our faith individually and give a testimony of the work Christ has done in our life. May we encourage each other and pray for one another that our efforts will bring honor and glory to our great God and Lord Jesus Christ.

Medical/Dental **Teams to Mexico** From the Perspective of a Volunteer

A brother who has been actively involved in the Medical/Dental work in Mexico has submitted the following thoughts to share how the work has affected his life.


Tave you ever been across the border to visit our neighbor to the south? Do you picture pristine beaches, and palm trees swaying in the breeze, ...or maybe banditos lurking around every bend? Have you ever been to Illinois? Do you picture the John Hancock Building, the Field Museum, and pristine Lake Michigan beaches, ...or maybe Mafia bosses shaking down neighborhood businesses? While all of these may exist, they by no means give a clear picture of Illinois, or Mexico. Misconceptions and stereotypes are hard to break. When I was first asked to participate in an Apostolic Christian World Relief Medical/Dental Team to Juarez, Mexico, I was reluctant to visit a country that I pictured in a less than favorable light.

We arrived in Juarez, Chihuahua in September of 1992, knowing that there must be a need, but unaware of the extent of that need. We found a hot, dusty, clamoring city bustling like a concrete anthill in the middle of a barren desert. Horns blaring. Hot wind blowing. Dust everywhere. Beat-up cars careening wildly. Desk clerks staring blankly, as I attempted to communicate my need for a room. "Why would anyone want to live in such a place," we wondered? This was not the land of palm trees and beaches.

That first trip we learned what it was

to set up a mobile health clinic utilizing

scrap two-by-fours as frames, clothespins and baling wire to hang bed sheets as dividers between exam rooms, and sign language and smiles to communicate. We learned what it meant to meet unknown Brothers and Sisters from all over the U.S. and Canada, work together, learn together, and fellowship together. We learned what it meant to use a privy made of strips of lath (including the floor!), or a privy with a Dutch door (with the top half missing!). There were all kinds of challenges, and always a faithful Lord to help us through those challenges.



Since those days, we have seen improvements in average living conditions. Average wages have risen to approximately \$10 - \$12 dollars per day. Fewer people are living in houses made of discarded pallets, or bedsprings. More people are employed than before. However, it is still largely subsistence living, especially among the Tarahumara Indian people in the Creel area. Medical care of sorts is provided by the government to all who are employed at a company that pays into the national health care system. However, many are unable to participate in the system, and have no practical access to health care. Dental

care is likewise beyond the reach of the majority of Mexicans and takes a back seat to other more pressing needs. There is a definite need for any dental caregivers who may be able to participate on one of these teams.

Examples of the extent of the need abound: a dental patient who had filled his own cavity by biting down on a short nail; a Tarahumara Indian who had walked six miles through the mountains to see the doctor.... because he had a sore leg; and a man who had broken his arm, had it pinned by the local doctors, and subsequently broke the pins. Unable to obtain proper care, his arm now pivoted at a new "joint" between his shoulder and elbow. There was not much we could do for him.

One cold cloudy day, at a clinic in the Copper Canyon area, a Tarahumara man dressed in his native triangular skirt-like shorts arrived, and watched. He had no health problem, and did not want to see the doctor. After some time, Chuy, one of the AMMAR team members asked him if there was anything we could do for him. The Indian said he was cold, and he would like the pants that Chuy was wearing. Chuy wasn't much better off than the Indian, and besides that, he was a little reluctant to compromise his modesty. He explained that it wasn't possible for him to remove his pants, but if it would help keep the Tarahumara warm, he would give him his coat. The Indian accepted the gift with an expression of joy. It was Chuy's only coat.

Are there banditos? Yes, just like there are mafia hit men in Illinois. Are there palm trees, and beaches? Yes, but not in Juarez. Have my impressions of Mexico changed? Immeasurably. Have I been blessed, humbled, and inspired by participating on a Medical-Dental Team? What do you think?

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN HOME FOR THE HANDICAPPED

Is disease fair? Is heartache fair? Is being wealthy fair? Is knowing poverty fair?

There are times when persons express their bewilderment at handicapped individuals having to experience various painful events in their lives. They wonder about the very fact of their handicap not being enough of a problem for them. "It's not fair," they say.

God's Word tells us in John 16:33 that "...in the world ye shall have tribulation:". We are reminded in I Peter 5:8 that "...your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour:". At this present time, the earth is his realm, and no one is exempt from his evil intent. "The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill, and to destroy:" (John 10:10). "For we know that the whole creation groaneth and travaileth...even we ourselves...waiting for the adoption...the redemption of our body." (Romans 8:22-23)

"For who hath known the mind of the Lord? or who hath been his counselor?" (Romans 11:34). In Job we read, "Shall man charge God with unrighteousness in his rule of the world?" Only when we stand before Jesus at His judgment seat will we know what "fairness" truly is.

At the end of some of the above quotes from the Bible are colons (:). If you read past these colons in the Bible you will find wonderful promises: "but be of good cheer: I have overcome the world." "...But the God of all grace, Who hath called us unto his eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered a while, make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you." "...I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abun-

dantly."

I was recently visiting with a parent of a resident of ACHH. The resident was experiencing some health problems and needed to go to the hospital for a surgical procedure. The mother, a widow, was the only family member present as her daughter was being wheeled into surgery. She was feeling a great weight during that moment. The outcome was questionable. As she was trying to reassure her daughter before they parted, the daughter spoke these words, "Don't worry, Mom. If I die, I know I'll go to Heaven." What a tremendous witness of faith this mother received from her "handicapped" daughter.

Can you begin to imagine the worth of "handicapped" persons, not only to us...but to God?

If we are governed by love and charity, like it says that charity covers a multitude of sins or failings, then our union and community and fellowship can be very sweet and we can have a beautiful harmony. There are those even today who are familiar with them and make a great ado of one day of worship and they esteem every day alike. This is perhaps the wisest, though the Lord's Day we do want to come to church.

We had a brother out there in Portland who lived in Iowa when he grew up and he was very zealous. On the Lord's Day, he would not farm. He had a neighbor that accused him of being self- righteous. Anyway, his neighbor farmed on Sunday and I guess they got a lot of moisture in the soybeans and he was docked on his price. But our dear brother from Portland, who is no longer with us as he has gone home to be with the Lord, he got a full price for his crop because he harvested on other days than Sunday. Someday we will be summoned to meet the Lord in the air and we will be changed. Our atmosphere and our environment and everything we have shall be glorified. It will be a wonderful transition. We think of the butterflies that emerge from a cocoon. We think then of the glorious life of the believer. Here we get old, we have frailty of the flesh and we cannot reverse the effects of the coming age. The earth will pass and the day will come when we shall be young forever and we shall be with those dear ones of ours who we so often think of that we so dearly love.

So we have much exhortation here against judging our brother or sister. We are encouraged only to judge ourselves. If we judge ourselves, we will not be judged with the world. We should use a very close scrutiny of ourselves. In each day, we can ask ourselves. "Was this necessary or what good was this?" Our Dad had an interesting phrase or expression he used to use. He used to have a question, "What does this profit spiritually?" I remember (this is kind of a side issue) my father-in-law, mother-in-law and my folks went to eastern Oregon one time and went digging for gem stones. My father asked my father-in-law, "What does this profit spiritually?" My father-in-law told him that if you see God's handiwork and you extract a beautiful stone from the ground, it is good exercise, and he went on. We can examine our lives and ask ourselves this question, "What does it profit spiritually?"

"For it is written, As I live, saith the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall confess to God." Romans 14:11. This is wonderful for the believer because we love it when we can pray and feel the presence of God wherever we are at. We can feel His strengthening hand and His blessings. But think also of the sinner who does not bow in prayer now. The unbelievers who refuse and reject Him, but in eternity and in hell, they will bow and acknowledge but it will be too late.

No wonder the translation states that He will be with them uniformly, perpetually and on every occasion. It is a wonderful thought. They went into distant lands, but first they stayed to be strengthened and fortified in their faith. They read the Scriptures and prayed in Jerusalem and later they went further, some went as far as to India and undoubtedly they recalled the wonderful words of their Saviour that He would be with them always. So we are blessed, are we not, that we have His presence and that we have His assurance that He will not fail us or leave us?

"I know, and am persuaded by the Lord Jesus, that there is nothing unclean of itself" Romans 14:14. Here he is speaking about meat again, and Peter had to learn this lesson in a spiritual sense when he went to Cornelius, "What God hath cleansed, not to call unclean." The Jews had a real problem there because they wouldn't eat with the Gentiles. Peter disassembled and Paul had to rebuke him for this.

They had to come back, you might say, to the teachings of the Lord and even remember His example. He told them not to go but to the lost sheep of the house of Israel, and to not go to the Gentiles, but later He himself showed such love for the Gentiles: the Centurion, who was the servant near death; the Syrophenician woman, and He healed her daughter; and the woman of Samaria at Jacob's well who by most standards would perhaps not have shown any interest in, but the Lord is interested in a soul.

There is a dving soul in each one of us and of every human. It is not His will that any should perish, as we read, but that all should come unto repentance. For the kingdom of God is not meat and drink. Here we always have to put things in the right place and right order and if we do this, then we will not miss the mark. That is where we can do like the Galatians, we can fail of our high and heavenly calling. The Galatians were taught by the Judaizers that to be extra holy, they should keep the law. Paul had to speak very sternly to them that this was not edifying and it was not for their eternal well-being. The Lord brought about a different order, a different plan but He did not deviate from much of the law. The Ten Commandments were reiterated and reintroduced by Christ except the keeping of the Sabbath. I think every other commandment was reemphasized by Christ.

So if the Lord will guide us and steer us in our lives of faith that we can look to one another for examples, and I am sure if we do this, we will be able to live a peaceable life and a very beneficial life and we can please the Lord and we can also please our brother and sister. In fact, we are exhorted that we should please our brother and sister for their own edification. There might be some things we might feel that we can do, but maybe a brother or sister feel maybe we should avoid this and not be involved in these certain pursuits and pasttimes. Then if we have the mind of Christ, we will not willfully or carelessly offend our brother or sister. Then, too, we should not be easily offended at others. If we see a fault in a brother or sister, we should pray for that brother or sister. Prayer changes things. If we follow the Bible's course here, life can be pleasant and we can all be faithful and more than conquerors through Him who loved

This meat here again was a big issue in that day. They had meat that they offered to sacrifice to idols and later was sold in the market places. This was a very difficult issue also to handle and in one place, Paul said, "Ask no questions for conscious sake." In other words, if you were bidden to eat at that time, don't ask where the source of the meat came from. I remember Brother John Klotzle and other brothers were in India and I guess over there, they eat

various rodents. I think they were served rodents. Brother Carl Kinsinger was a little reluctant to eat and finally Brother John said, "Let's just pray and eat." I think they thought of the Scriptures. Many times we are subject to different incidents and issues and matters in life, but the Bible provides the answers. If we walk close to the Lord, He will provide the way that we can handle the situation.

He states here, "It is good neither to eat flesh, nor to drink wine, nor any thing whereby thy brother stumbleth, or is offended, or is made weak." Romans 14:21. Perhaps our church had problems through the years since many of our forefathers came from Europe. The water over there is not too safe to drink, so many of them drink wine. They carried the same practice here and they made wine and they drank it. Sometimes they went too far perhaps and drank to excess. I don't think this is quite the problem today as it was years ago. Anyway, it is good if we can forego any practice or any eating habit or drinking habit if it would offend our brother or sister, because we want to help one another, encourage and edify one another.

The Apostle Paul followed the law very carefully even though he knew it did not serve to justification. But when they brought the accusations against him, they couldn't come up with much, could they, except that he turned the world upside down? He didn't want to offend his brother and he

did not want to cause anyone to lose their way through life. So the attitude the Apostle Paul had was certainly commendable and one that we can follow as well. Certainly, I think we have a wonderful heritage and a wonderful brotherhood. We can avoid a lot of these difficulties if we just consider how our brother and sister look at things and live accordingly.

"Hast thou faith?" Romans 14:22. Maybe we might have something on our mind that maybe we are doing for the Lord. and perhaps we think it is fine. Then maybe we should keep it to ourselves. But then the Scripture here that follows it is so beneficial, "Happy is he that condemneth not himself in that thing which he alloweth." Romans 14:22. So we can stand with a clear conscience and govern our lives in such a matter that looking over our deeds or conduct. if we can live with that without condemning it, then happy are we.

"And he that doubteth is damned if he eat, because he eateth not of faith:" Romans 14:23. So anything that is questionable, we should perhaps leave it aside for it gives us so many wonderful pursuits, spiritual pursuits that we can do and live for the Lord. I know in years past we used to have those who would leave our faith because they said they wanted to do more for the Lord. It usually didn't end up that way. Now we have so many avenues for one's zeal. We have collections from time to time. We

have work teams and there is so much that can occupy our lives that we don't have to tread upon these questionable things and occupy ourselves with these things that are not profitable to soul and spirit.

Certainly the Lord will direct each of our lives as there is much we can do for Him. We can pray. We can write letters when people are sick and we can visit them. There is so much we can do for the Lord. It is kind of like the Garden of Eden. There must have been many beautiful trees with wonderful fruit, but only one was forbidden. Why didn't they stay away from that part of the Garden and enjoy that which could be done? We, too, have so many positive things that we can do in our lives.

Brother Froelich writes again to a brother so beautifully. I wish

This continues the series on the development of the church in Europe. These are remarks by Henry Michel of Switzerland who spoke on church history in 1947.

Froehlich Family

And now we are coming nearer, and we are coming to the nineteenth century. There was a revival in many places, and one of the results of this revival is this wonderful and dear crowd that we have before us. That is the wonderful story that I want to tell! Understand me rightly, I don't want to praise people; I don't want to make people higher than they are, but we do have a lot of respect for these people who were persecuted through their whole life, who were full of zeal and full of the Spirit of God, leaving the comfort of their homes and going the way of self-denial, bringing the good Gospel and the tidings of peace to the people.

I have to mention a name that is perhaps going to be mentioned a few times. that of Samuel Froehlich. This was a French family. Their name was DeJoyeux which is a French word meaning "The joyful". These people were living in France up to the persecution of 1648. On this date, the Catholic church decided that everyone that is not Catholic should either be killed or leave the country right away. In one night, the terrible Bartholemew night, 40,000 were killed, murdered in a terrible way. In the name of the "holiness" of the church, of the "universal church", the only church through which, as they pretended, people could go to heaven. Many escaped, and one of the families that escaped was this family of DeJoyeux. They went to Switzerland and settled there in a part of the country that speaks the Swiss German. They changed their name from DeJoyeux to

Froehlich which means "joyful" in German.

This joyful family had a tradition, that one of the family had to be a preacher. He had to do something for the Lord. It was not a question whether he likes it or not, if he is fit for this mission or not, he just has to be a preacher, and Samuel Froehlich was the one who had to be a preacher. He did not believe. He did not like it. He was not interested. That did not matter. He had to be a preacher.

He went to school. He went to college. He went to the theological school of Zurich and in his diary he says, "When I came to the theological school, I had just a little bit of faith, but this little bit of faith, I lost there completely." When he was graduated from theological school, he was an atheist. He would rather be blaspheming against God than to be praising Him. He was in a terrible state of unbelief, but nevertheless, he was graduated a preacher, ready to be ordained.

Repentance

The Lord was watching this boy and He made him sick. He had a terrible sickness of the lungs, a sickness that was the reason for his early death. It was the reason why later on he was sick practically two months every year and never recovered completely. He was in such a miserable condition that every doctor had no hope whatsoever. And in his terror of death, he was asked, "Now how will you present yourself before the Lord in the resurrection of the dead? With your graduation paper? With your diploma? And your hatred against God?"

He came into a terrible condition, he was not only very sick, but his soul found neither rest nor peace, and was full of "yearning, sadness and anxiety."

He found out that he was the poorest among the poor, and he came slowly but truly into repentance, crying days and nights for the wickedness of his soul, and he went through weeks and weeks of crying to the Lord that He would help him


Everybody wanted to help him for the sickness of his body, but there was no one, not a single one who could be of any help for his soul; and he suffered more than can be told. In this misery of his repentance, suddenly he looked to the Bible, the Book he had been studying for years, criticizing it and trying to find what was right and what was wrong; and when he had finished his study, there was nothing right in the Bible anymore, but everything was wrong.

He took this Book as much as he could in his weakness, and he found the revelation of Jesus. He found the reason why Jesus died; that Jesus died for him and for his sins. Joyfully, he accepted salvation by grace and stretched his two hands towards his Saviour, and he found a wonderful peace in his heart. As soon as his soul was saved and rescued, the body started to recover and instead of dying as they thought he would, he recovered, not completely, but anyway he was in fairly good health.

"Self-Discipline"

The only time church discipline is necessary is when self-discipline fails. Therefore, we should teach and embrace self-discipline more.

The Apostle Paul wrote in I Corinthians 9:27, "But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection." The first part of this sentence means that he kept his body under control. The second part means that he made his body obey him. If we do the same, we will be able to refuse everything that is not good or wholesome, and we will be able to do everything that is good and wholesome.

A body is not all there is to a human being. More importantly, we are a spirit and we also have a soul. Both the soul and spirit are non-material; you can't touch them with your finger. However, I understand that the soul has more to do with our personality while the spirit has more to do with our God-consciousness. Our bodies return to dust but our spirit and soul live on. Our bodies are just a temporary dwelling place for our spirit

and soul.

Our bodies should not dominate our spirit and soul; rather, our spirit and soul should dominate our bodies. Therefore, if we say, "My body feels like doing this so I'm going to do it," we are operating or functioning on the wrong basis. The determining factor is what is right or wrong, edifying or not edifying, according to God's Word. Our bodies must be our servants, not our masters. Self-discipline is to have our bodies under the control of our spirit, and, in the case of children of God, our spirits under the control of God's Word and the Holy Spirit, which work together.


Scripture which requires self-discipline to fulfill is found in I John 2:15. "Love not the world." Here the word "world" does not mean the beautiful things of nature which we all love, but those things which make for a carnal life instead of a spiritual life. Even the most spiritually minded child of God will have carnal inclinations

so long as he is in the body, but it is imperative that we each have enough self-discipline to keep those inclinations from taking over and dominating us, body, soul and spirit.

Self-discipline is necessary, not only to keep us from going the wrong way and doing the wrong things, but it is necessary for us to go the right way and to do the right things. As much as possible, we should do those things which are good for our spiritual well-being as well as avoid those things which are bad for our spiritual well-being. As much as possible, we should eat those things which are good for our bodies and avoid those things which are not good for our bodies, the temple of the Holy Spirit. I Corinthians 6:19, "Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost?"

The only time church discipline is necessary is when self-discipline fails. Let's encourage each other to keep our self-discipline healthy and working for the Spiritual life.
