"TREASURES OUT OF DARKNESS"

Sermon by Bro. Roy Koehl, Morris, MN II Chronicles 22 and John 9

Where we started reading here, there was an account of Jesus right after He had experienced people calling and telling Him that He possessed a devil. They took up stones to kill Him. But at the end of that chapter, It says, " ... (He) went out of the temple, going through the midst of them, and so passed by." John 8:59. It was not His time to be killed, so God Himself kept Him from it because Jesus had yet more work to do upon the earth. It was the convincing of men. It was His mission to believe on God that by He Himself walking on earth to communicate with man, He could live a perfect life, and overcome sin and the devil by the power of God. Also, that the name of God could be magnified and men could be convinced to walk with God, and to come out of sin.

"And as Jesus passed by, he saw a man which was blind from his birth. And his disciples asked him, saying, Master, who did sin, this man, or his parents, that he was born blind?" John 9:1-2. We can see that the nature of man is to take note of things and try to figure out when something happens and we would say, "It is not good or something that is a burden." We try to figure out whose fault it is and who is to blame. What caused this? And who started it?

We know as children sometimes we would get into a tangle and then we would be scolded and we would be quick to say, "He started it." We like to do that because that is our nature, to put the blame on someone else.

"Jesus answered, Neither hath this man sinned, nor his parents: but that the works of God should be made manifest in him. I must work the works of him that sent me, while it is day: the night cometh, when no man can work." John 9:3-4. No matter how great a sinner is, we see that a small sinner and a large sinner are

both still sinners before God. They need not worry about whose fault it was, but rather to look for a way to escape it, that it can be dealt with and taken from our life. Then we don't need to be labeled with the sinners

To do that we need to come to a place where we don't long for that life anymore, but we think of a life free from sin. There is only one way we know to overcome it and to come out of it and that is through repentance and conversion. Confession of sin. Sin can be dealt with as it is brought to light. Satan is a worker of darkness and he hates the light. When he is brought into the light, he will flee from us. The confession of sin does that just for us. We bring it out into the light and admit that we were the sinner. Then we ask, "Lord, what must I do to be saved?"

For all that to happen in our life, we need a measure of faith and it doesn't take a lot to get started, but we need to have a measure of faith that we can believe that God will do that for us. We know and understand that we of ourselves are not going to accomplish this thing. Though we would live a hundred years on earth, we will never come to a place where we will find peace within and to have sin removed from us and have the blessed hope of eternal life. We cannot accomplish that by ourselves.

We can try in many ways to clean up our life and even to come over out of our youth and quit doing some of the things that were so evil. Yet, we will still be a sinner before God and that will be written in the books and will not be removed until we come to the foot of the cross.

The way of the cross leads home and that is where we find our salvation. We go there and look up to the Lord and it is His shed blood that removes sin from us and that we can have a pure conscience. Not just the removing of the filth but of the purging of our conscience that we can be pure and clean by having all that taken away from us. To just quit sinning will not do it, and it will not happen. We will still be a sinner though we would sin no more from this time to our death. We think that we sin no more.

Not to acknowledge that Christ was the Son of God, that is sin. So we would continue in sin, though we thought we were not sinning

Are You Ready for Christmas?

Often as we approach a religious holiday we are asked "Are you ready for Christmas (or whatever the holiday may be)?" The expected answer usually relates to our shopping, or baking, or some other secular aspect of the celebration.

How do we answer questions of that nature? Do we find ourselves focusing too much time and energy on the secular aspect of a holiday or do we prayerfully focus on the spiritual meaning of these special times?

How does a child of God prepare for a holiday? Do we get so caught up in the secular rush of the season that we sometimes forget what is important about that particular day? Have we spent so much time and energy on secular aspects of the holiday that when it arrives we are too exhausted to appreciate the spiritual significance of the day?

The purpose of this article is not to campaign against exchanging gifts or spending enjoyable time with family and friends. The purpose is to encourage each of us who is a child of God to reflect upon the meaning of these holidays and to encourage that they be holy days in our lives

If someone who has absolutely no knowledge of the gospel of Jesus Christ would spend an extended period of time in our homes during a holiday season, what would they know about God after their visit? What would they know about the plan of salvation? Would they know who, or what you worship? Would they have any idea what God looks like or what is important to Him? If they would then search the scripture, would they find a close relationship between what they observed in our life and what they learned from the scripture?

For a child of God, preparing for a holiday may begin at the time of our conversion. During that period of time we should be learning of the significance of the various periods of Christ's life and what these mean to our salvation. We should also be establishing priorities in our life that make serving God more important than anything else in our life. The

time and energy we spend in preparing for a holiday should draw us closer to God rather than cause grief and heart-

Spiritual preparation is certainly very different from secular preparation. Traditions of the world tell us how to prepare for secular celebrations. There are many scriptural passages that instruct us about the importance of, and the steps involved in, spiritual preparation for special occasions.

Since we do not know when the Saviour will return, it is important that we be ready at all times, lest we lose our opportunity to go with the Saviour, as did the foolish virgins. "And while they went to buy, the bridegroom came; and they that were ready went in with him to the marriage: and the door was shut" (Mt. 25:10). Those who were ready went in, the others were denied admission. The five foolish virgins did make preparation - but it was after the door was shut. The Lord did not know them.

To make a thorough preparation, we must be careful that we do not allow idols to remain in our lives. Samuel reminded the children of Israel that they should "...put away the strange gods ...and prepare your hearts unto the Lord, and serve Him only:..." (I Sam. 7:3).

Do we have idols in our lives that are part of our holiday observation? If we allow material items or secular images to blur the purpose of the holiday or to divert our attention from the significance of the day, we may need to carefully examine our priorities and be sure we have not allowed the influence of Satan and the world to contaminate a holy occasion.

In addition to removing idols from our lives, we must be certain that the temple of the Lord, our body, (I Cor. 6:19) is cleansed. The prophets of old called for a cleansing of the temple. "And they gathered their brethren, and sanctified themselves, and came ...to cleanse the house of the Lord" (II Chr. 29:15). Jesus saw evil in the temple of God "...and drove them all out of the temple;" (Jn. 2:15). Although the prophets and Jesus wanted

the House of God to be physically cleaned, their real concern was spiritual cleanliness. We must be careful that the customs of the world do not pollute our household of faith.

Sin separates us from God and we know "...all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God;..." (Ro. 3:23). Therefore, we need to consider the message the angel Gabriel delivered to Zacharias when he told him the work of John the Baptist would be to "...make ready a people prepared for the Lord" (Lk. 1:17). As we prepare for a holiday, we must ready ourselves for serving the Lord.

We must "...purge (ourselves) from these (sins) ...(and) be a vessel to honor, sanctified and meet for the master's use, and prepared for every good work" (II Tim. 2:21). Thus, personal purification should be a major part of our plans as we get ready for special days that God has given to us. They are special opportunities for us to learn to know the Lord better.

Therefore, as we think about readying ourselves to observe a holiday, we should be sure we have abandoned all idols (sin), cleansed the temple of God (our bodies), returned to the Lord from whom we strayed when we became involved in sin, and purified ourselves, removing the contaminates that past sins have brought.

We may think that we have completed all the details necessary for a "perfect" holiday. We may have had the foresight to do our shopping early, to plan our menu well in advance, to clean every spot and corner of our house and to invite our guests in plenty of time to assure their attendance at our gathering. However, if we have not taken the time to prepare our hearts and our minds for God's service and to instruct our children of the importance of making the occasion an honor to God, we have missed the real purpose of the holiday, and have lost an opportunity to worship in truth and sincerity. Are you ready for Christmas?

Disaster Work Project Completed at Pontotoc, MS

Damage done by Tornado

On Saturday, February 24, 2001 a tornado packing winds of more than 140 miles/hour cut a 1 mile wide and 24 mile long path of destruction across Pontotoc County. The tornado killed six people, injured dozens more, destroyed 93 houses and damaged over 200 other homes and buildings in Pontotoc, the county seat. One person described the area as looking "like an atomic bomb hit it."

Help was needed

This small devastated community was faced with tremendous recovery efforts. The World Relief Disaster Committee planned to build three homes for families that had their houses completely destroyed. One of the families selected for a new house lost their only child, a 10 year old son, to the storm.

Dedication services

The dedication services on August 26 culminated the successful Disaster Work Project, which began on June 4, 2001. The dedication of the three houses, built by the Apostolic Christian volunteers, and one built by local Pontotoc volunteers for Habitat for Humanity, was held at the Pontotoc Community Center.

Local coordinators

The whole project was arranged and coordinated by the local disaster recovery organization, Faith Alliance. Each family was given a large family Bible and each child received a book of Bible stories. Before leaving the service, many of the local citizens thanked us for our help in the recovery

of their community, and expressed many positive comments, on the work ethic, the decorum, and the Christian examples, demonstrated by all who came. Following the dedication, vans were made available for interested parties to tour completed homes. Many of the local people took advantage of the offer.

Brother Ron Hodel, from our Bloomington, IL congregation, was the on-site coordinator for the USA Board. He was kept busy directing and allocating the jobs, and securing the building materials, as required, for the three job sites. Brother Ron's assignment was complicated by the communications and logistics required to service the sites, which were several miles apart. His God given talents were evident and appreciated.



Dedicated participants

When a project is planned and started, there is always an underlying concern that volunteers may not be forthcoming in numbers and skills required. This project was no exception. "Oh ye of little faith." The Lord again was faithful, stirring the hearts, of the Brethren and Friends, to come forward in a timely manner. Eighty-two volunteers, from twenty-two congregations, and six states, availed themselves of the opportunity for service and fellowship. The weather was often very warm and humid, but without the sand gnats experienced in Camilla, GA.

Simple construction plans

The house plans, selected for the three families, were more volunteer friendly, than those built in Camilla, GA last year. The straight rooflines and rectangular house plans called for trusses of simpler design and allowed for easier roofing and siding installation. The volunteers appreciated this, as it saved them much time and effort.

Craftsmen from the area

Faith Alliance was a source for information on local and area vendors and artisans. They also coordinated the financial arrangements for the new homeowners. The local area provided skilled craftsmen and trades, which were hired to fill skills needs that were not available through our Brotherhood, or when volunteers with required skills were not available. Nearly all of the building materials were purchased locally.

Materials donated

A donation of drywall was received from U.S. Gypsum Co., through the efforts of the American Red Cross. The quantity received was sufficient to complete all three houses. In-kind donations help lower the building material costs.

USA Board expresses thanks

The USA Board and the World Relief Committee want to express thanks and appreciation to Brother Ron and Sister Donna Hodel for their sacrifice of three months of effort during the time of the project, and to all the willing volunteers who communicated the love of God by their participation.

This work project was a wonderful opportunity to communicate the love of Christ. Our Heavenly Father is due all our praise and honor for His love and compassion unto mankind.

Brethren Visited Ukraine in May

On May 18, 2001, after a journey across Eastern Europe which began in Budapest, Hungary, a team of American and German brethren crossed the Ukrainian border to assess and further the ongoing work in this troubled land.

In late autumn of last year, the European Board and Mission Committee approved a trip into Eastern Europe. Brothers Marvin Leman, Andy Stoller, and Gene Lehman were authorized to represent our brethren in this endeavor, and plans were made over the ensuing winter.

Group assembled in Budapest

Bros. Marvin Leman and Andy Stoller flew directly into Budapest, arriving on Monday, May 14. They were met by Bro. Gene and Sis. Verna Lehman and Elder Ernst Pfister and his wife, Sis. Elisabeth, who had come via van from Germany. The group traveled together starting early on Tuesday, May 15, driving through Hungary and Romania. By prior arrangement they spent two nights in Arad, Romania, where they had services on Tuesday evening.

As reported in previous issues of this paper, another group of Americans had also traveled to Eastern Europe to visit various lands and attend two church dedications. The two groups met only briefly in Szeged, Hungary, after each group had spent some time carrying out their assignments.

From Arad to the border

Bro. Filip Augustinov from the Arad congregation acted as driver for this group, using a van that had been bought previously for the use of our Romanian brethren. Past experience

has shown that it is better to use a vehicle of Romanian registry as opposed to German registry, because it attracts less attention from the police and the people who observe along the way.

Because the group wanted to cross the Ukrainian border in daylight, they spent the night in a hotel in the mountains of Transylvania, a lovely area of Romania. This hotel was both lovely and comfortable, and by our standards quite inexpensive. They were able to get a good night of rest before crossing into the troubled land of Ukraine.

At the border

Crossing borders in Eastern Europe is interesting. One never knows what to expect. Our brethren have tried numerous tactics to facilitate this crossing, but in the past it has always required a lot of time, patience, and sometimes the payment of money. This time the members of the group, both German and American, had acquired visas for entry into Ukraine in advance from a travel bureau in the USA. Because they were staying for more than three days, it was necessary either to register with the police or stay in a hotel. In this case the group made hotel reservations in advance, and actually crossed the Ukrainian border with very little loss of time, and practically no expense.

Meeting with the brethren

When they crossed the border, our group of brethren was met by a group of Ukrainian brethren who had been there for several hours. Everyone traveled together to the home of Elder Peter Karcia in Korovia, where an evening meal was served. It was both delicious and nourishing, and appreciated after a day of travel.

Following this meal, the Americans and the Pfisters registered in the hotel where they spent the night. The Romanian driver, Bro. Filip, stayed in the home of one of the Ukrainians.

The work begins

Everyone was very grateful for the good facilities in the hotel. It had working plumbing, clean beds, and security. Both the night of rest and the breakfast that was included in the price of the room were satisfactory.

The Ukrainians came to the hotel about 9:00 AM, driving a van that our brethren had purchased for their use. It is a Mercedes, what we would call a "people mover", holding about 15 people. It is very plain, but adequate. The Mission and World Relief Committees share the costs of these vehicles, and have bought quite a few for the brethren throughout Eastern Europe.

The roads are not good at all, but our brethren are accustomed to them, and get around very well. These trips would not be possible without their assistance and participation.

It is very hard to explain how primitive this land is in comparison to western countries. The facilities we take for granted simply do not exist. However, the brethren share the best they have, and it is enough.

In order to learn living conditions, the group visited an open market to determine local prices. In the next issue, we plan to print a list of what consumer goods cost in Ukraine in terms of hours necessary to purchase the individual items.

It was obvious that everything a family or person needs is available, but it is evident that very few people have the money to buy the goods. This is why we feel we need to continue our efforts to help them. (To be continued)

GATEWAY WOODS APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN CHILDREN'S HOME Kent Kloter

As I sit at my computer, my mind

is racing because of what has happened this morning. Two hijacked airliners have crashed into the World Trade Center towers, causing them both to collapse. The Pentagon has been hit by another hijacked plane and is on fire. Another hijacked aircraft has crashed somewhere in Pennsylvania. I suppose thousands of people are dead and many more will die. The air traffic around the nation is being completely grounded. The government operations at the White House and the Pentagon are greatly disrupted. Our entire nation is stunned. We are beginning to understand how vulnerable we are.

The losses are impossible to assess; it's far too early. I do not think it premature to conclude that the magnitude of the losses at Pearl Harbor will pale in comparison to those of today's events. Pearl Harbor resulted in the deaths of 2,403 soldiers and sailors and 1,178 were wounded. It seems quite apparent that many, many more than this will have lost their lives today as a result of a very few hate-filled individuals.

As I ponder the destruction, devastation and death in those various places, my thoughts go to Isaiah chapter six. Isaiah writes about his visit to the throne room of Heaven. "In the year that king Uzziah died". Perhaps there was confusion, unrest and uncertainty at that time too there was en empty throne in the kingdom, no leader, no certainty, no security. Yet when Isaiah saw "the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up," he no doubt was calmed by the face-to-face realization that God was not at all shook up by the events taking place on the earth. Isaiah not only saw God on the throne, his sight gave him insight to his own sin, and he cried out in repentance; "Woe is me! for I am undone; because I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips: for mine eyes have seen the King, the LORD of hosts." After Isaiah repented and cried out to God, God sent an angel to cleanse him. After his cleansing, Isaiah was given an opportunity and a vision for ministry and God put him to work. Now is the time for the Church in general and the believer in particular to come before the Throne, see God, receive insight into our sins, seek His forgiveness and cleansing and receive a vision for ministry to a lost and hurting world.

At a traumatic time like this, the vision of God on the throne also gives me confidence and comfort, knowing that an all-knowing, sovereign God is in control. If God really is who we believe He is, now more than ever, is the time for the Church to "awake out of sleep" (Rom. 13:11). The world's media, its materialism and its thirst for money have affected the Church for many years. The opportunity is here, and it is time for the Church to really affect the world. Many of our neighbors and colleges will be asking real soul-searching questions about where we've come from, the meaning of life, about Good and Evil and about human destiny.

In these days when there are so many questions and so many needs, the Church has a great opportunity and responsibility to offer Jesus as the answer to those questions and the "meeter" of those needs. "But my God shall supply all your need according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:19). Peter exhorts the believer to "sanctify the Lord God in your hearts: and be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear" (I Peter 3:15). This call to be able to give answers comes in the middle of a letter written about serving God in the face of suffering. The message of hope is most powerful when it is proclaimed in the midst of hardship and suffering. America is certainly in position to hear a message of hope. America

may be more ready to listen to God than it has been in our lifetime. There are precious few times that we get these opportunities. The Church should be ready to give the answers.

However, this message will not be received unless the Church actively reaches out to the community in which it finds itself. Nor will it be received if believers are not living lives that show that we truly believe what we say to be true. Our proclamation will not be credible if we are not demonstrating that we are able to overcome difficult situations in our own lives. If we are no more equipped to deal with the hardships of living in a fallen world than the unbeliever, we will give no reason for others to trust God's Word.

If Bill Gates had his children walking the streets, begging for food, clothing or shelter, he would be disgraced and embarrassed. By the same token, if God's children are living lives of discouragement, despair and defeat, what will draw the unbeliever to the One who said "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." (Matt. 11:28)?

Living a life in the name of Jesus brings a responsibility and opportunity, not only to proclaim His goodness and power, but also to demonstrate this by our victorious living in the face of adversity. Prov. 11:30 reminds us that "The fruit of the righteous is a tree of life; and he that winneth souls is wise." Speaking of the power of Jesus and the power of the Word of God has little positive effect if we are not personifying what He has said. Our main call in life is to "Give unto the Lord the glory due unto his name; worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness." (Psalm 29:2). To glorify God is to reflect His character, His attributes and His nature. If the Church is not reaching out to the hurting world around us, if we are not "rubbing shoulders" with them, how will the unbeliever know that followers of Christ take Him seriously? Will they know what He is like if we don't show them? He said, "Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself." (Matt. 22:39). Where is the modern "Good Samaritan"? (Luke 10)

This is an opportune time to articulate the goodness of God, the beauty of Salvation and the power of God's Word to address the problems of living in a confused, hurting and frightened world. May we all sanctify the Lord God in our hearts and be ready to respond in meekness and fear.

anymore. If we acknowledge that Christ was the Son of God and that He shed His blood for us, then we believe. If we believe, then we will confess our sin knowing, as in one of the books of John, "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." I John 1:9.

There are steps that we need to take and God will keep His promise. His whole Word, this Bible, is a promise. If we enter into it the right way, with the right mind, and in humility and asking and seeking with a repentant heart and mind, it will be revealed unto us what we should do and we can find remission of sin. There is no greater thing that we can attain to in this life and time.

There are things that we desire, like a nice place to live, and in a land of freedom like we have, it is so nice. We appreciate that, but there is something that is so much greater than that, something that will last through all eternity that we can each one have also. These things that we have in this life, we know they will perish. They are temporal and they are seen for a time, then they pass away.

We will also do the same from this earth. We will pass away. If we are young, sometimes we don't think about that like we should. We think it is going to be awhile and there are many things that we need to do and accomplish. We can become so caught up with the things around about us that we don't spend time with the most important thing—the thing which will endure.

God has placed an undying soul within each one of us, and that soul desires to be rejoined with God. It cries out unto Him and that is the feeling that we have, that it is a desire to escape death. There will be no routes around death. We know if we are cleansed from our sin, we can experience what the Lord experienced even in the resurrection that death will not have dominion over us. That death and darkness forever

will not have to be a part of eternity for us.

Jesus tried to explain to the people why He was here. "I must work the works of him that sent me, while it is day: the night cometh, when no man can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." John 9:4-5. Right here Jesus was trying to convince them that He was really the Son of God. He said, "I must work the works of him that sent me." Many times He was accused of devising His own plan. Or, what He had to say, they would accuse Him, because it sounded like God. They would ask Him who He was and why He made Himself thus and thus because it sounded so much like God, and no man should ever do that.

One time He said, "If you don't believe Me, do the works. At least believe that and do that so that they might receive it." Be the benefactors thereof. If they didn't think anything of Him, they were to at least do what God asked them to do. They could experience something that they never experienced before. Though they were so wise, yet, they rejected Him. They could not see that it was something that would be good for them. They thought they were seeing plainly already without being told and they were not interested in what He had to say. They would go back and say, "Abraham was our father, or we serve Moses. We know what he was about, but as for this fellow, we don't trust Him."

Jesus told them while it is day, do the work. The night is going to come when man can't work anymore. We can liken that unto our life. There is going to come a time when we can't work anymore physically. We know that. No one needs to convince us of that. Also, there is going to come a time spiritually where we won't do any work, where we won't do anything to prove to God that we love Him. Really, none of us know when that is.

Sometimes we think we do and

we think we know when that will be. We think it will probably come when we get older if our mind fails us, then we won't be able to do anything. That is the day when we can't work anymore. But there are many things that can happen between now and then to bring us to a place where we won't have a sound mind or body. Sound minds do that which we thought some day we really for sure are going to do.

The other thing that could happen here is, "As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." John 9:5. We don't know how long the Lord is going to be in the world, and to be the Light of the world for us. This is going to ever be before us. There could come a time when it is taken away and all those that were going to repent tomorrow, will find there is no tomorrow. Really, there isn't. The devil would convince us that tomorrow we are going to do many things, but today is the day of salvation. Today while you hear His voice, it says in the Bible, harden not your heart.

"When he had thus spoken, he spat on the ground, and made clay of the spittle, and he anointed the eyes of the blind man with the clay, And said unto him, Go, wash in the pool of Siloam, (which is by interpretation, Sent.) He went his way therefore, and washed, and came seeing." John 9:6-7. Jesus has His own way of healing. But we do need to recognize to do what He asks us to do, or there is no healing. So it is with our spiritual life when He asks us and tells us that we need to repent and to find remission of sin that we do that. We can follow in this way so that it would be said of us.

"He went his way therefore, and washed, and came seeing." John 9:7. Then we see with a different vision. We can see that we were not anything. Only God can cleanse us from sin and we marvel at His goodness towards us when we come into a condition of repentance and that God would really have mercy on us

and really do that for us. Really, in our former days we never cared about it. Never cared about Him or even the teachings that came from Him. We thought about them but it was always going to be some other time. When we come to a place or be ready to enter in, it is revealed unto us and then we wonder why so many more wouldn't do this.

It is a blessed thing and the blessings that can be received and that joy within and the peace of being forgiven of sin and being in communion with God and not being separated anymore by that wall of sin. Sin separates us from God today. It is that way. If sin is in our life, it is always going to be that way. We know that sin doesn't enter into Heaven and cannot be tolerated. It needs to be dealt with now before we get to those doors.

This blind man did what Jesus told him to do and he came seeing. "The neighbours therefore, and they which before had seen him that he was blind, said, Is not this he that sat and begged?" They noticed a difference. "Some said, This is he: others said He is like him: but he said, I am he. Therefore said they unto him, How were thine eyes opened?" John 9:8-10. They were interested. They wanted to hear what He had to say how this was accomplished.

"He answered and said, A man that is called Jesus made clay, and anointed mine eyes, and said unto me, Go to the pool of Siloam, and wash: and I went and washed, and I received sight. Then said they unto him, Where is he? He said, I know not. They brought to the Pharisees him that aforetime was blind." John 9:11-13. They were going to see what the Pharisees had to say about this because they were instructed in the law and supposed that maybe they would understand what happened to this blind man.

"And it was the sabbath day when Jesus made the clay, and opened his eyes." John 9:14. There are different places where we read

that Jesus healed on the Sabbath day. The Pharisees really had trouble with that. They thought He was doing a physical work and they thought that would be a good way to accuse Him. It was an opportunity for Christ to show them that there is a difference of a spiritual work and a physical work. They couldn't separate the two. They couldn't understand that. They thought they had accusation and reason to put Him to shame and to convince the people that He was not the Son of God and that this way would be diminished. But Jesus used it in an opposite way to convince the people that He was not one of them.

In the preceding chapter, He had to tell them in a way - a very straight-forward way —that He was not one of them. "And because I tell you the truth, ye believe me not. Which of you convinceth me of sin? And if I say the truth, why do ye not believe me?" John 8:45-46. If Jesus would have changed His talk here and tried to please these people, He would have been a sinner like unto them. But He didn't do that. He kept telling the truth no matter what. He did that until the end. He told the truth. We know what happened to Him. They crucified Him because He told the truth. Yet, we say how can the truth set you free then? In the Word, It says that the truth will set you free.

Do we question that it didn't set Jesus free because He was crucified? Why did He go to the cross? He knew what was going to happen to Him if He kept telling the truth. He knew that better than anyone else did of what was going to happen to Him, that He would suffer and die there; yet, he told the truth. He bore the cross for the joy that was set before Him. He knew where He had come from. He had been in Heaven before and He knew that if He overcame the devil, He would be received up into glory again. That is an example for us that we should always tell the truth. No matter what, we will be delivered. Maybe not at the perfect timing that we think, but we will be delivered and it will be well with us. We love the truth, we tell the truth, and we live the truth.

They really made a big issue of this blind man and we read further on that even his parents, when they were questioned, they said, "Go ask him". If they would have told the whole truth of what they knew, they would not have been welcomed around the Pharisees. They would have been driven from the synagogue, so they just kind of backed around the situation and they said, "Go talk to him. He is of age; ask him" (See John 9:23). They knew that the Lord had done that and they were really denying the Lord.

"Then again the Pharisees also asked him how he had received his sight...Therefore said some of the Pharisees, This man is not of God, because he keepeth not the Sabbath day. Others said, How can a man that is a sinner do such miracles? And there was a division among them." John 9:15-16. Why would the Lord bring division? We read in one place, the Lord said, "I don't bring peace on earth, but rather division." We think why would He do that? The division comes because some people believe and some do not. Then there is a division. There would be no division if everyone believed in Christ and served Him. All would be followers.

Christ predicted those things were going to happen because He knew that some men would receive the Word of God and some would reject it. That continues on year after year, generation and generation. Some enter in as recipients of the blessings of God by remission of sin, live a sanctified life, and separated from this present evil world and the lusts thereof.

We read one place in the Word that in times past, that was sufficient for us to live to the will of the

flesh and to the will of man. But now we want to live to the will of God and that He would be the One that directs our life and to be led of His Spirit. We had enough of the old life and we want to put it away. How do we do that? We want to bury it. How do we bury something? What condition does it need to be in? We all know that it needs to be dead. Our old life needs to be dead and done away with, and that is to be crucified in the flesh through remission of sins. We don't want it to be a part of us anymore. We want to put it away and leave it there.

"But the Jews did not believe concerning him, that he had been blind, and received his sight, until they called the parents ... And they asked them, saying, Is this your son, who ye say was born blind? how then doth he now see? His parents answered them and said, We know that this is our son, and that he was born blind: But by what means he now seeth, we know not; or who hath opened his eyes, we know not: he is of age; ask him: he shall speak for himself." John 9:18-21. The authority that these Pharisees had really affected men the way they would live. They would deny Christ and yet, think they have a hope of life eternal. They were actually serving men. They were not serving God.

Then they did get him around and finally asked him, "Then again called they the man that was blind, and said unto him, Give God the praise: we know that this man is a sinner." John 9:24. They believed in

God, they said, but as far as Christ, they wouldn't take a chance on Him. They called Him a sinner. "Then said they to him again, What did he to thee? how opened he thine eyes? He answered them, I have told you already, and ye did not hear: wherefore would ye hear it again? will ye also be his disciples?" John 9:26-27. This is the point they were done listening to this man.

"Then they reviled him, and said, Thou art his disciple; but we are Moses' disciples. We know that God spake unto Moses: as for this fellow, we know not from whence he is. The man answered and said unto them, Why herein is a marvellous thing, that ye know not from whence he is, and yet he hath opened mine eyes." John 9:28-30. This man recognized that this was a marvelous thing. What does it take to get us to recognize that this plan of salvation is a marvelous thing?

"Now we know that God heareth not sinners: but if any man be a worshipper of God, and doeth his will, him he heareth." John 9:31. Makes a difference there. Our attitude and what we want to hear, and if God is going to hear us or not. If we be a worshipper of Him, He will hear us and He will reveal unto us those things that have been hidden from us from our very youth. They can be revealed unto us but it is a righteous thing with God to withhold any of these things from us if we hold back. If we stand afar off and try to figure things out and to place them in our mind how it is going to be or how it should be, it will never be revealed

to us. It would not take faith if it would. There would not be any faith on our part. We would have it figured out and we would be the designer instead of God.

They didn't appreciate this man telling them about Christ. They thought that he was trying to convert them. So they reviled him. Even of a good thing like this, they didn't want to hear about it. It is the condemnation of sin that makes it uncomfortable and that miserable for men. What is the difference to make it something of some interest to us or not? Are we tired of the condemnation of sin, or do we want to continue to live in it and suffer the consequences? We make provisions in so many ways in our lives to avoid consequences. Why not in our spiritual life? Why would we not do that when we know the spiritual things are eternal and is a place without end? Why won't we do something to avoid the consequences of sin and death?

We don't have an excuse that we don't have the money to buy it or do it. So many things people would do if they would have the money. But this doesn't take any money. It is free and it is given to anyone who will believe. Anyone can have the best part of it for the same price. Christ was the price and it has been paid. Now it is like a mansion has been built for us and we are asked to enter in and to possess it. Who would reject it?

The book inventory is computerized, and the personnel at Bluffton can drop ship to nearly any address.



The following is an analysis of the recent remarks of Bro. Henry Michel—and of the general origins of our church.

An analysis of the remarks by Bro. Henry Michel in 1947 — which were printed in the last several issues of the Silver Lining — helps draw our attention to historical events that have shaped our lives.

It is important that the present makes a connection with the past. From our spiritual history, we find a firm foundation wherein, with God's grace and guidance, we may spring forth into the future.

In all honesty, our more immediate spiritual roots are somewhat sketchy. Our predecessors, totally loyal to Scriptures and somewhat skeptical of high education, and thorough record-keeping, did not see a lot of value in meticulously recording events, baptisms, marriages, minister terms and church going ons.

So today, we try to piece together, as best we can, how our church denomination originated, progressed and grew, and ultimately gravitated to America.

The origins of a renewed faith in Switzerland were a calling from Heaven. Bro. Henry Michel's remarks certainly confirm this. Bro. Samuel Froehlich — as a somewhat agnostic seminary student - heard the call of God, and repented for his sins. His faith and inner soul struggle led him to a new birth and he became a new creature in Christ Jesus. Ultimately, his calling was to organize a new denomination based on God's Word. We

have come to be known as Apostolic Christians.

The events in Switzerland where many were called to repentance, often dramatically, are quite profound. Indeed, it is quite striking to note that 110 congregations were formed during a period of 35 years. That's an average of a new congregation every 3 months for 3 1/2 decades.

It is evident that a zeal to spread the Gospel existed, and God blessed the labors of Bro. Froehlich and his young contemporaries. But it must be remembered that the zeal to "evangelize" was marked by two foundational precepts, and it is vital that these precepts be understood today.

First, the truth was to be upheld. The Bible was true, and it's messages were to be adhered to and followed. One of the sole purposes of uniting together in this new church denomination was because it had discovered the Truth, and was willing to follow it. The hundreds and thousands who embraced the new faith did so because they had fled the falsehoods of those times (many of which exist today) such as infant baptism, eternal security, faith "alone", a lack of repentance and unrighteous living.

The second precept centered on the structure and authority of the church—and the major purpose in this was to follow the Bible's model. The matter of the continued nurturing of souls who repent and become converted was of primary importance. This was in light of the Scriptures found in II Peter 2:20-22 where it's taught that if a soul repents, and then departs back into sin, his state is

worse than if he had never repented. The first generations of our church took this teaching very seriously (as we still do today).

So souls could be fed and built up in their most precious faith, an order of worship and holiness was initiated as guided by the Word of God. New Testament ideals such as unity, likemindedness, keeping the same judgments, being perfectly joined together were sought. The church felt a deep responsibility to maintain a godly order so souls could better thrive as they walked on Christ's narrow way.

What is the message for today? As a people, we need to know our origins. The prophet Isaiah said to "look unto the rock from whence ye are hewn" (Isaiah 51:1).

The first century poet, Virgil, said, "Happy is he who gets to know the reasons for things."

We benefit today if we learn to know the reason for things. If we know how and why our church was started, and how our Bible applications and traditions began, it will accrue to our supporting our beliefs (and practices) more fully.

Bro. Michel's message revealed a zeal of the forefathers. Let's revive and retain such zeal, but wisely insure it is accompanied by a Biblical order and holiness.

"The Unexpected Attack"

The Bible teaches us to expect the unexpected. Matthew 24:44, "Therefore be ye also ready: for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh."

The unprecedented manner of attack on the World Trade Center in New York was unconventional and unexpected. We must remember that there are many nuclear weapons in the world today and one nuclear bomb over New York City might well destroy all of the city with its eight million residents. In 1945, one small atomic bomb over Hiroshima killed about 100,000 people and melted the iron in the buildings. We forget, so easily, we forget.

The question always arises, "Why does a loving God permit such things to happen?" I don't really know, but I believe Satan has something to do with it. In the book of Job, God had a conversation with Satan and Satan was permitted to test God's servant, Job. The result was tragedy upon tragedy, such as recorded in Job

1:15, "And the Sabeans fell upon them and took them away; yea, they have slain the servants with the edge of the sword; and I only am escaped alone to tell thee."

The attacks on New York and Washington, D.C. were terrible beyond words. One of the results is that more people are praying to God than before the tragedy. We have been sobered. All of a sudden, almost everyone has become religious.


I arrived in Japan on January 9, 1951, on an American troop ship, the Marine Lynx. It was during the Korean War and the Chinese had entered the war on the side of the North Koreans. During the two weeks on the ship I often thought about how much difference six years make. At the beginning of that six year period, the Japanese were the most terrible people on the face of the earth and the Chinese were our bosom friends. When I was on that ship, the Japanese had become our bosom friends and the Chinese were the

terrible enemy who had poured thousand upon thousands of troops into the war to assist North Korea, and they were mutilating our troops, many of whom I had trained with, who were sent to Korea while I was temporarily out of the army in the reserves. I kept wondering, how can the Japanese people and the Chinese people change so quickly. The truth is, they didn't change, but world conditions changed.

On the ship, my favorite Bible words were "See that ye be not troubled." It is found in Matthew 24:6, "And ye shall hear of wars and rumours of wars: see that ye be not troubled." I tried to pretend that I was a newspaper reporter, just going along to observe. However, it was, and is today, difficult not to be troubled.

In the army I was a conscientious objector and by so being I know that I have forever lost my right to be selfish. We must cheerfully live for Christ and help others.
