

"THE GOD OF ALL COMFORT"

Sermon by Elder Bro. Ron Messner, Washington, IL Psalm 42 and II Corinthians 1

Let's start at the beginning of the chapter. There are different thoughts that Paul was introducing to them in this letter. Let's go to the beginning and find our way through those. Paul starts out the letter that with this church he had a personal relationship. It was one that he knew well, in fact, probably knew a number of the people well.

We think about today, as we travel from one church to another, if we were to call up someone or write, we would go directly to those personal relationships and ask, "How is so-and-so doing? We remember so-and-so who is a good friend and wonder about what was happening." It is not that we need to do as Paul did, but where you can see his heart and he went directly to the real relationship he had with them. The real relationship is the one that was established through the Father and that his real concern for them was not who had a baby and who is engaged. You know how we do.

In fact, you might think about this a little. There is nothing wrong in doing it but when you get the Silver Lining or something like that, what is our first interest? We want to know what is going on and what is happening there. That is because we care about each other, because we love each other and because we want to know that. Paul's relationship to the church was the same as what ours should be. His relationship was that he was directly tied to them through the grace of the Father in the common faith that they had. He went directly to it.

"Grace be to you and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ." II Corinthians 1:2. It is a reminder to us because we know each other so well and travel so freely. We have families in so many different congregations and have all those links. It is easy for us to get caught up in, like sometimes when we talk about the faith we share. We all know what we mean, but our interest in each other can almost take the place of that, can't it? We sometimes forget that. What is the real

link we have between each other? What is the real thing we share? Is it because we were in the young group together or because so-and-so married your best friend? Those things are definitely important to us.

God made us a people and made us to have a concern for each other. What is the tie that brings us together? What is it that makes us sit down together and feel comfortable being in the same church and in the same building? What is it that makes us comfortable traveling to another church and sitting down there? Is it because we knew them or met them on a trip or have family relationships and those kinds of things? Or, do you remember that it is the common faith which we share in the faith of the shed blood of Christ? Those other links do not mean anything.

It sounds like I am taking down those family relationships, but I am not doing that at all. We love them and they are important to us, but they can become so interesting and so captivating that we forget that, if we didn't know that soul at all and sometimes this happens. Sometimes we notice it more when we go to a church that is a little further away and where there is just not any of those kind of ties that we have. We go and then we are reminded that we are glad to be there and that they are glad to have us because we share the same faith in Christ and the same sense of God's love for us.

If we plan to come to church on a Sunday morning, there is no question we look forward to it in the same way we would when we get together with family, our family reunion, or our friends because we are going to get to see people and find out what happened during the week. It is a good place to do it. It is part of what we enjoy, but let's be sure it doesn't override the grace and peace from God our Father and the gift of life through Jesus Christ. Think about it. What is it you share with the people sitting around you? What is most important to you that you share? Probably most of you are sitting by someone that

you could think of another list of things you share. If not blood lines, then other things that you share. What most importantly do you share? Isn't that what knits us tightly together? Isn't it the real reason that we care a lot about what happens to somebody else? Sometimes when we doubt that a little or get moved away from it, maybe it helps us

Am I Your Enemy Because I Tell You the Truth?

One would think that the truth could hardly be controversial. If something is the truth it should be verifiable and, therefore, quite easy to settle upon.

Unfortunately, there are those who deny the truth, distort the truth, and even persecute those who stand for the truth. The world may make light of the truth, but Christ said "...the truth shall make you free" (Jn. 8:32). Pilot, in a state of confusion, asked "...What is truth?..." (Jn. 18:38) and as Jesus He prayed for His disciples, He answered that question "...Thy (God's) word is truth" (John 17:17).

Sometimes we are faced with situations about which we would rather not know the truth, perhaps thinking in the back of our minds that if we don't know we won't have to deal with it. There are times when an individual doesn't feel well physically. There may be fear that something is very wrong and as a way of denial, the individual tries to convince himself that there is nothing wrong.

Eventually, however, in those situations the individual must face reality. Perhaps they have put off seeing a doctor for so long that when circumstances finally force them to face reality, they find that the situation has become so serious there is little that can be done. Perhaps earlier it could have been dealt with successfully, but by denying the warning signals for too long, the situation became hopeless.

In the physical sense this is sad, but in spiritual situations it is disastrous.

When Ahab, King of Israel, wanted to go to battle against Syria, he sought the counsel of about 400 prophets who said he should go to battle. Although these prophets told Ahab what he wanted to hear, Jehoshaphat, King of Judah, who was going to battle with Ahab, was not sure these prophets were really saying God's will. Jehoshaphat asked if there was another prophet they could consult. Ahab said "...There is yet one man, Micaiah ... but I hate him; for he doth not prophesy good concerning me, but evil..." (I Kings 22:8). The King preferred to hear false good news prophesied, rather than the truth. It cost him his life.

Isaiah wrote of rebellious children who

would not hear the law of the Lord "Which say to the seers, See not; and to the prophets, Prophesy not unto us right things, speak unto us smooth things, prophesy deceits:" (Is. 30:10). Again, they preferred short term comfort rather than the truth. In the long term, they suffered because they did not want to know the truth.

In the writings of Ezekiel, Chapters 33 and 34, the prophet warned of the results of not sending a clear signal and of refusing to listen to warnings. The shepherd and the watchman on the wall were warned of their responsibility to sound a clear alarm and to feed the sheep. Those who would not fulfill their duty were severely reproved. Those who refused to heed the warning when the truth was spoken were told that "...his blood shall be upon his own head" (Ez. 33:4).

In addition, as Jesus was explaining to the scribes and Pharisees His relationship to His heavenly Father, they became very angry and took refuge in the fact that they were Abraham's seed. Jesus reminded them that if they were Abraham's seed they would do the works of Abraham. "But now ye seek to kill me, a man that hath told you the truth,..." (Jn. 8:40). They denied that they planned to kill Him but a few minutes later they were so angry "Then took they up stones to cast at him:..." (Jn. 8:59). They could not stand the truth.

What about our brotherhood? Do we still stand for the truth? Do we avoid listening to Conference tapes and to the reading of the Memorandum? Do we stay away from provings so we don't have to be reminded of our commitment to God? Occasionally we hear of those who stay away because they don't want to hear what is said. If we choose to not hear the truth, it does not reduce our responsibility to do what is right. Those who have the opportunity to hear and to know the truth will be accountable for their behavior even though they may have tried to not be reminded of the truth.

Many of Christ's followers have also felt anger from those who did not want to hear the truth. As Paul was lovingly exhorting the Galatians, whom he feared were trusting too much in the flesh, he asked, "Am I therefore become your enemy, because I tell you the truth?" (Ga. 4:16).

The Apostles often risked their lives by standing up for the truth of God's Word. Paul described the persecution he faced as a minister of the gospel: "...in stripes above measure, in prisons more frequent, in deaths oft. Of the Jews five times received I forty stripes save one. Thrice was I beaten with rods, once was I stoned. thrice I suffered shipwreck, a night and a day I have been in the deep;" (II Cor. 11:23-25). He goes on to describe the perils of water, robbers, his own countrymen. by heathen, in the city, in the wilderness, at sea, among false brethren and so on. All of these were suffered because of his desire to be truthful in "...the care of all the churches" (II Cor. 11:28).

History tells us that all of Christ's original disciples who remained faithful except John gave their lives for the truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Although John was not killed for his faith he was banished to "...the isle that is called Patmos,... for the word of God, and for the testimony of Jesus Christ" (Rev. 1:9).

Throughout the world even today there are those who must suffer for their faith. Persecution is very severe in many parts of the world. In our own land many government regulations have changed which makes it more difficult to stand for the truth. We are told that there is strength in diversity, that we need to tolerate (which is often interpreted as embrace) those of a different faith. The purity of the Gospel of Jesus Christ is being threatened by those who would oppose the truth.

"Wherefore putting away lying, speak every man truth with his neighbor: for we are members one of another" (Ep. 4:25).

Are we enemies of some who do not want the truth? Jesus said "...If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed; And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (Jn. 8:31-32).

European Board Meets with CAM and ICM in Ohio

On October 18, 2001, all the members of the European Board met in the offices of Christian Aid Ministries in Berlin, Ohio, to discuss matters pertaining to our ongoing work in Europe. Elder Ernst Pfister from Breidenbach, Germany, also was with our brethren throughout the day and evening.

Christian Aid Ministries

For many years our brethren have worked with this organization to carry on efforts not only in Eastern Europe, but also in the Caribbean area and throughout the USA. Christian Aid Ministries handles shipping of our food packages to Romania each month.

It is the practice of our European Board to meet with this group in the autumn of each year. Since all Board members were able to be present, they used the opportunity to meet in the morning in a room that CAM so graciously provided from 9:00 AM until noon. The afternoon meeting with CAM's representatives was used to discuss the many areas where we work together.

Food packages to Romania

At this time we are shipping well over 400 parcels, consisting of two packages each to the needy brethren in Romania. Brethren from a wide area come together on a regular schedule to assemble these packages in Bluffton. The final destination of the shipment is CAM's warehouse in Cluj, Romania, from which they are taken to places where our own brethren distribute them to the needy brethren across Romania. The program seems to be working well, and is certainly

appreciated by all of the recipients across Romania.

Iron Curtain Ministries

Some years ago a group of Amish in Holmes County, Ohio, established an organization through which they could channel assistance to struggling believers throughout the nations behind the "Iron Curtain". Representatives from the European Board try to meet with them each year. They cover one-half of the costs of the food package program to Romania, up to \$10,000 per month.

Garden tiller project

Several years ago ICM made arrangements to ship high-quality garden tillers and attachments to Ukraine from Italy. This excellent program is working quite well. Last year we agreed to send one of the tillers to our own brethren in Ukraine. Cost of these units is about \$2,500 each, and we provided necessary funding for this initial trial shipment.

The group of our brethren that visited Ukraine in May of this year was able to see first hand the results of our joint efforts with ICM.

They visited in the home of Brother Grisa Jacobits on Monday, May 21. As they entered the cluster of buildings that make up the home of this family of 12 children, they saw the mother carrying milk from the cow into the house. As reported last month, she was already in labor and delivered her child later that day. The family had to pay \$200 before she could be accepted in the hospital. They had been given the money for this on the previous Saturday.

Bro. Grisa is a deacon of the church in Mahalla, and had reported in the meeting held with our brethren on the previous Saturday that normally the government is supposed to make child support payments. However, this year he had received only one payment in three months, and the total sum could not buy enough bread alone for one month for his large family. They have no idea how they would manage without the support they are receiving from the American brethren.

As our brethren looked at the tiller and attachments and saw the tears of gratitude from this family, they shed tears of their own. There is no way to express how much a machine like this helps them to subsist as well as to help their brethren and neighbors.

At this time, arrangements have been made to ship six more machines into Ukraine and brethren have already been chosen to be the recipients. Since there is over 50% unemployment in Ukraine, people of necessity have learned to live off the land. A representative from the organization in Kiev, Ukraine, who oversees the distribution of these tillers says, "I think it is impossible for someone in America to fully realize what the tillers mean to these people without being along on a delivery."

It is common to see people working the ground by hand. With this machine they can accomplish far more. Wherever it is possible, people keep a cow for milk, cheese, and butter. They can cut grass in the fields for fodder to feed these valuable animals. Families now can cut as much hay with this machine in three hours as they could by hand in three days. The trailer will carry the hay.

Church Buildings in Eastern Europe

Over the years the Mission Committee has established communication with our brethren in Eastern Europe and has funded numerous new church buildings throughout the area that was formerly under Communist domination. During 2001 two new churches in Hungary and one in Romania have been dedicated to the honor and worship of God.

Funding for these projects has been taken from the East European Church Building Fund, through which our brethren have contributed large amounts of financial support over the years.

Learning of the needs of our brethren in Ukraine

After the fall of Communism, our brethren were able to establish communication with our members in Ukraine. There have been believers in this area since around 1920, but due to the political circumstances our American brethren knew little, if anything, about them. However, since 1989 there has been much contact, and the relationship with this group continues to improve.

New churches have been built

As the year of 2001 draws to a close, there are nine congregations in the province of Bukovina, Ukraine. Two of these congregations are now assembling in new buildings constructed with funds from the Mission Committee. One is in Korovia and the other in Dimka, each of which has around 100 members plus children.

A congregation was established in Lukovita in 1924, and now has about

73 members. The believers in this rural area endured many hardships over the years, and although the flame of faith perhaps grew dim under the oppressive regimes, it did not go out. By the grace of God and the support of our American brethren, the small building used for a church for this congregation was remodeled and improved during 2001. The team of brethren who visited Ukraine this year visited this facility, and were entrusted with the thanks of the faithful pilgrims living there. The building is quite simple, but seems to be adequate for their needs. As one observes the tranquil setting of this small building, it is hard to imagine that the believers have endured so much over many years.

Ostrita is the largest congregation

Since their first visit into Ukraine in 1991, our American brethren have held services in the building in Ostrita each time they have been in the country. This congregation is in a semirural area just to the east of Chernovic. a city of about 200,000. With about 300 members plus many friends and children, this is the largest congregation in Bukovina. The building in which they hold services is an addition built on the house of Elder Vasile Paladean. In about 1988 he and his family were able to plant a private plot of watermelons that they sold on the open market. The profit they made on this project enabled them to build the addition onto their home.

The room serving as their assembly area is far smaller than anything we would consider adequate for the size of their congregation. A balcony hangs over the rear portion of the assembly room, and the entire area has always been filled with people as our own brethren visited them.

Building a new church

Through the years we have encouraged this group of souls to build a new place to worship, and by the grace of God they were able to make a beginning in construction early in 2001. Plans were submitted to the American brethren in advance, and prior to construction a number of suggested alterations were made.

As is typical in Eastern Europe, the building has several stories because the building site is small. It is also typical that the entire structure is masonry construction. As the project evolved, the Mission Committee and the European Board approved using our own unemployed brethren to do the construction. We have agreed to pay them modest wages which accomplished the double purpose of getting the building built and providing a means of income to those who otherwise had no jobs. Unemployment in Ukraine is over 50%. It is hard for us to understand this, but the problems are real for those who are living there.

Seating for about 500

The building under construction provides an assembly room for about 500 people, which is only slightly more than the number who now attend services. The plans include full restrooms, which is a bit unusual in Ukraine, but our brethren thought it necessary for such a large group. Rooms for the children to assemble in Sunday School are also included.

Completion in 2002

It is hoped that with the grace and help of God the new church can be completed sometime during the year of 2002. Estimated costs are around \$400,000. Anyone who wishes to contribute to this project for our needy brethren may do so through the Mission Committee.

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN COUNSELING SERVICES History and Development Part II

I John 3:17 - "But whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him?"

The Bible is very clear that as a part of being Christ-like and as a part of our service to God we are to have compassion on those who are suffering. Specifically, the body of believers is called to support, encourage and assist those who are struggling. In the New Testament Scriptures we are taught by Christ's example and teachings as well as other scriptures (Paul's letters) that service to others should be given a high priority.

Matthew 5:45 - "That ye may be the children of your Father which is in heaven: for he maketh his sun to rise on the evil and on the good, and sendeth rain on the just and on the unjust."

We also know by Biblical teachings and by experiences in life that adversity and struggles happens in the lives of believers and unbelievers as well as to the most faithful and the weakest.

Because of the need around us and because of the scriptural call to serve and to do good to others, the Apostolic Christian Church has looked for ways to meet some of these specific needs. This was the impetus for developing Apostolic Christian Counseling Services.

ACCS offers four types of services. Each one is designed to help people understand and get assistance dealing with mental health issues and relationship problems.

The types of concerns most often referred to ACCS are depression, anxiety, adjustment difficulties and relationship problems of all kinds.

The Apostolic Christian Mental Health Hotline has been in existence for over 10 years. The Hotline was started by the church's Mental Health Committee who recruited and trained sisters who were registered nurses. In March of 2000 the Mental Health Hotline became part of the ACCS. The same five sisters continue to provide services and coordinate their efforts with the ACCS professional staff. The sisters take phone calls from struggling individuals or concerned family members/friends. The sisters help callers by listening to their concerns and then providing them with a referral to a counselor or sending print information. The print information available covers a wide variety of areas such as depression, anxiety, parenting, etc. The sisters are available to help callers find qualified counselors and/or physicians near the caller's home area. The Mental Health Hotline is available to all of our churches by calling the toll free ACCS number 877-370-9988. There is no charge for these ser-

Apostolic Christian Counseling Services also provides individual, marital and family counseling for those who can travel to the office at 73 East Queenwood Road in Morton, IL. There are currently three counselors working out of the center. Hours are by appointment only. The counselors are trained mental health professionals who provide counseling from within a Christian framework that supports and encourages the doctrine and traditions of the Apostolic Christian Church. Many people choose to come to ACCS because they have the assurance that their faith will be respected and protected. Fees for counseling are based on a sliding fee scale based on family size and annual family income. No one will be denied services because of inability to pay. The fees charged do not cover the full cost of providing the counseling services. The fees were set below actual cost so that a financial burden would not prevent individuals needing counseling from seeking services.

People calling ACCS can receive a consultation by the professional counselors. Calls are received from people needing assistance for themselves, family members of those struggling and Elders/ministers who are assisting people. Counselors can help callers understand mental health issues and relationship problems and develop a plan of action to deal with these issues. The counselors do not provide diagnosis or treatment over the phone. This part of the service has greatly increased in the last year and a half and is available to all of our churches by calling the number ACCS toll free 877-370-9988. There is no charge for this service.

Finally, ACCS offers an educational component that supports the other functions. Counselors from ACCS have provided presentations to churches that have requested them. Presentations of this type are requested or approved by the Elder of the church and cover mental health or relationship issues. At times, presentations are given to smaller groups such as the ministers of a specific church. These talks may be about how to deal with specific issues or more general information about how to be helpful when counseling. In addition, ACCS has print materials available that cover a wide variety of mental health and relationship issues. These materials have been screened by the ACCS staff and, when appropriate, the overseeing Elders. Some of the materials have been written by the ACCS counselors. Print materials are available by calling the Mental Health Hotline through the ACCS toll free number 877-370-9988. Print material are sent out in a variety of situations including: providing additional education following a telephone consultation, being "homework" during the course of counseling and/or to addressing specific requests for information about an issue. Some of the print materials are specifically intended for support of Elders and ministers who are working with people dealing with particularly difficult issues.

For each of these services there is a need for donations or subsidy to cover the ongoing costs. The next article will go over costs and funding in more detail.

if we think about who is missing in that link, but who we know who is not saved, the person who is not there.

Then we are reminded about the true fact. Family or not, whether we knew them in the young group or not, or whoever they are, the real thing we miss in someone who is not saved, is that they are not saved. They are not one with us. We don't have a promise of eternity with them and that we don't sense our common bond — not a completed common bond — even now, do we? We long to reach out and touch in a spiritual and emotional way. Sometimes even in the physical life and sometimes we want to do it that way because we want to take someone and say, "Here, let me hold your hand and I'll show you where we need to go." Surely, it is something that we share.

I don't want that in any way to be heard in this message that it is missing in who we are. I don't think it is missing; I think we just want to be sure we focus on it and that we understand the immensity of the gift that we have. The joy of being able to say when we greet one another, we know what that is about, that it can become a formality of something that we practiced from the time we were young. When we were first converted, when we saw our parents do it, what we say when we greet someone as a brother or sister, what do we mean by that? When we think about it, do we just mean that we greet them because they are a member in the Apostolic Christian Church? Or, do you greet them and call them that because they recognize God as their Father like you do and then that establishes them as a sibling? Do you recognize that and are we thankful for it that we share the same Father?

"Blessed be God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort;" II Corinthians 1:3. These next two verses, I have always felt a little bit like they were a tongue-twister to me. But when we undo that and think about what he is saying, and think about what our responsibility is, it is God! The God of all comfort. "Who comforteth us in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort them which are in any trouble," II

Corinthians 1:4. I want to stop there for just a moment. When you go through a hard time (even as we read this morning in the Psalm when David went through those), and you feel God's hand on you and stuff starts to come together, even if there are not any answers, but then you feel the comfort of God around you.

Why do you think God is doing that? What is he saying here? We have a tendency (maybe I should owe it as I have a tendency) but I think it is a pretty common trait of human nature. It is a tendency to feel like God is doing it to help us feel better. That is what it feels like, isn't it? He is doing it to help us feel better.

But what does he say here? He said, "Who comforteth us in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort them which are in any trouble," II Corinthians 1:4. Maybe this is just to think about, and maybe it would take a little study, but I wonder if there is any gift that God gives us which isn't for the purpose of sharing it. I can't think that fast up here, but maybe some of you can. I wonder if there is any gift God gives us that He doesn't give us so we can share it, which doesn't mean it is not for us, too. But when we were given the gift of salvation, do you believe that any person is given the gift of forgiveness and salvation to keep it? Do you think there is any one of us that when we repented and God forgave us and we knew it, do you think there is any one of us that was given that without a responsibility to then give it to someone

Do you think there is any one of us that feel the realness of God's love, that wasn't given that love specifically to give it to someone else? There is an old phrase. I wish I could think who said it but it was some old, old church father who said this phrase (maybe some of you know it), A bell isn't a bell until you ring it, and love is not love until you give it away. You know what you feel inside you isn't really happening until you share it with someone else. In the same way, it is not literally true but there is no purpose to a bell until you ring it. God's love in your heart is for you, but the realness is for you to share

it with someone else.

So he said that God comforted us so that you can comfort someone else in need. Do you do that? If the purpose of these gifts is to share them, then the question for us is not do you have the gifts, but do you share them? In some way tell or let it be seen that the shed blood of Christ rests upon you. Do you in some way comfort another person? We are different and we don't expect everyone to act like everyone else and comfort is not only given by a big warm hug or some warm wonderful thing to say to them. There are other ways to do it, but do you see when someone is hurting? Do you remember thinking, "I was hurting, too, and God reached out and touched me? So I should reach out and touch that person some way."

We can be awfully intimidated about doing that in fearful of responses but when you think about it, do you remember how hungry other people are to be comforted? You did and they sent you a card. It did not make any difference what was on the card. In fact, in some ways it mattered more what was on the return label, who it was from. Isn't that really what mattered—that someone you knew cared enough to send it to you? If I asked you right now to remember what people said to you in those cards, my guess is very few of you could remember what was said. My guess is you could remember who sent it.

Let's remember to do those things and to notice what Paul teaches in the New Testament. He teaches clearly that we have different gifts, but there are some things we are all responsible for. Some things we can't say are just the gifts of others and this is one. We cannot say it is the gift of others to witness. It may be the gift of others to preach or to teach or to heal, but it is not the gift of others to witness. It is the gift of all to witness. I would say from what Paul shared here, it is not the gift of others to comfort either. It is the gift of all to comfort others which isn't any trouble in the same way that we are comforted of God.

"For as the sufferings of Christ abound in us, so our consolation also aboundeth by Christ." II Cor. 1:5. Let's just stop there for a moment. What is it

that gets in the way for us reaching out to other people? If I were to ask that question again for all of us, some of you would say, "I'm just not good at it." Some of you would say, "I'm afraid of what I am going to say." Some of you would say, "Well, I don't know how and I don't know what to do."

But how many of us, if we were honest, would say, "It is because we are focused on other things?" How many of us know that you should have said something, stopped and talked to somebody, sent something but you were on your way to somewhere else or doing something? How many of you do not notice other people who are hurting because you are so wrapped up in your own responsibilities?

How many of you are in the busyness of whatever? Let's just go down to family for a minute. How many of us as parents and as spouses don't notice when our spouse or our kids need some comforting because we are so focused on getting the crops out of the field or getting to work or getting home from work or bringing problems home from work or making phone calls or not work at all? Sometimes we don't notice people around us who need comforting because we are so caught up in the fun we are ready to have or the trip we are off to take or the people we want to go with or the good times we are going to have. What really stands in the way of us reaching out to other people? Is it really a lack of confidence? Or, is it fairly often because we are so busy we don't practice noticing?

I wonder if it is enough to just wait and see if something comes our way or if we ought to be specifically focused on looking for needs. I wonder if we should think specifically about who is around us and look for it.

"For as the sufferings of Christ abound in us, so our consolation also aboundeth by Christ. And whether we be afflicted, it is for your consolation and salvation, which is effectual in the enduring of the same sufferings which we also suffer: or whether we be comforted, it is for your consolation and salvation. And our hope of you is stedfast; knowing, that as ye are partakers of the sufferings, so shall ye be also of the con-

solation." Paul goes on and talks about his own struggles a little. "For we would not, brethren, have you ignorant of our trouble which came to us in Asia, that we were pressed out of measure, above strength, insomuch that we despaired even of life: But we had the sentence of death in ourselves, that we should not trust in ourselves, but in God which raiseth the dead:" 2 Corinthians 1:5-9.

I don't know specifically what Paul is thinking of here, but when I read that, how many of us remember that we have the sentence of death upon us? Somebody asked someone at work, what is the one condition that is always fatal? It is life. Did you remember that ...that you are going to die from living? Of course we remember it but we lose focus of that, don't we? Now we are talking of physical death. The sentence of death rests upon every one of us and sometimes we become so caught up in needing to have good health or having our resources built up or whatever is coming or being concerned about problems that are coming that we forget that the sentence of death rests upon every one of us. All we are talking about is the difference of a few years.

In the big scene of time, the difference of ten or twenty or thirty years is not a lot, is it? The sentence of death rests upon every one of us. I wonder if that is a bit of what Paul was saying in the fear of all that was happening. There was a reminder that if some people take a life (or in this case he doesn't talk about that) but a wild animal or

health condition or whatever it is, do you remember really how much does that matter? You are going anyway and in a sense not all that long from now you are going. We should not use that as an excuse to give up. We have work to do but we need to use it as a reality base of how we are dealing with it spiritually. We are not talking about it in a physical way. We are not talking about a tiny eternal life. We are talking about purchasing a few more years.

Even a really good health plan when we are in trouble (I don't mean insurance part, but a good plan for cancer, diabetes or whatever it is), all we are talking about is buying a few years whatever the response is. Good things to do and we are thankful that God has given them, but let us not lose focus on the fact we all have the sentence of death upon us.

I suspect that Paul also (and maybe he is not referring to it here) but reminding that the sentence of eternal death is upon all who do not purchase salvation. We don't purchase salvation; God purchased it for us. We don't attain unto salvation. There is not a soul (the Bible is clear) on the earth who does not have the sentence of death of sin upon them. That sentence we can remove, can't we? We can remove eternal death, but we cannot remove physical death. We are going to die fairly soon of our physical afflictions. Even if you don't have any, you are going to get them fairly soon and you are going to die from them. We do not have to die of spiritual affliction. That we can remove.

Why don't we focus a little different when we think about it? Why do we invest such huge amounts of money and time and emotion on buying a few years physically and invest so little (that is a little too strong but sometimes it is true) in purchasing for ourselves or others eternal life? Why the disparity there? Well, I think it has something to do with the fact that when you poke yourself with a pin, you feel it right now. When you experience something spiritually, it is not so acute and you can ignore it, can't you? Too bad.

I wonder how our response would be if we felt with that kind of acute or that physical the spiritual things that happen to us, if we might not respond a little bit better. We need to remind ourselves of which is more important, to not just respond to the pain that we feel that makes us think, "I'm not giving into that and I'm not giving into that." The sentence of death rests upon us so let us think about and talk about how I can have a few good years. A few good years doesn't mean good health. A few good years means years lived well for the Lord. Be sure and keep our focus right there.

"But we had the sentence of death in ourselves, that we should not trust in ourselves, but in God which raiseth the

dead: Who delivered us from so great a death, and doth deliver: in whom we trust that he will yet deliver us; Ye also helping together by prayer for us... For our rejoicing is this, the testimony of our conscience, that in simplicity and godly sincerity, not with fleshly wisdom, but by the grace of God, we have had our conversation in the world, and more abundantly to you-ward." II Corinthians 1:9-12.

Again, Paul is really just talking about priorities, isn't he? Just listen as we spend a little time on this verse. He said, "For our rejoicing is this, the testimony of our conscience, that in simplicity and godly sincerity, not with fleshly wisdom, but by the grace of God, we have had our conversation in the world." It goes back to a question we have asked lots and lots of times, where do you put your trust? How bright do you think you are, really? How much wisdom do you think you really have? How much do you think you really know? How much do you really think you have things figured out? Again, I think we might feel a little embarrassed if we were forced to honestly admit how much we trust in ourselves. We all like to say that is not true; we put our faith in the Lord, and we don't really trust in ourselves.

But I wonder if we were really honest if we wouldn't all be embarrassed with the answer about how much we do think we have things figured out and know what to do and work them through and how little we really depend upon faith. Really, we ought to be depending on the grace of God, not in yourself, that in simplicity and godly sincerity, not with fleshly wisdom.

"And in this confidence I was minded to come unto you before, that ye might have a second benefit; And to pass by you into Macedonia, and to come again out of Macedonia unto you, and of you to be brought on my way toward Judaea. When I therefore was thus minded, did I use lightness? or the things that I purpose, do I purpose according to the flesh, that with me there should be yea yea, and nay nay?" II Corinthians 1:15-17. Let us talk about this a little bit. Paul says that there should

be yea yea and nay nay.

"But as God is true, our word toward you was not yea and nay. For the Son of God, Jesus Christ, who was preached among you by us, even by me and Silvanus and Timotheus, was not yea and nay, but in him was yea." II Corinthians 1:18-19. What again is he talking about? I don't claim to have deep wisdom in this, but I think about he said it was not yea and nay, but it was yea. It seems that what he is teaching is our salvation is not yes and no and it is not maybe. It is not sometimes and sometimes not. It is certainly yea.

The things that are uncertain are our response to it. The things which are uncertain is our willingness to repent. The things which are uncertain is our willingness to be obedient and our willingness to stay close to God. But there is no uncertainty in the power of His shed blood. There is no uncertainty in the salvation of a believer. There is not yea and nay. It is not yes on some days and no on others. It is not there when we feel good and not there when we feel bad. Again, when we read through the Psalm which we read this morning, David expressed the heaviness of heart, didn't he? He talked about being far from God and the heaviness on his soul. Some times when we have that, we go through this thing of wondering where God is and I wonder if I am right with God and I wonder if I am saved. We begin to take away the absoluteness of the power of Christ's shed blood.

We don't need to wonder if we are saved. The only thing which could remove that is our willing disobedience and abandonment of it. This yea and nay which we feel is the doubt which Satan puts on our soul and we feel it, don't we? We can be honest. We feel sometimes this tug of where we are and doubt creeps in and uncertainty tests us and our faith is pulled here and there, but the power of Christ's blood is not pulled here and there. It is yea. It is certain. It is not yes sometimes and no sometimes. It may be hard for us to lay hold on that and hang onto it, but even if we can't always remember in our heart, at least remember in our head the truth. The truth is that if we are redeemed by the shed blood of Christ and continue to live with Him and for Him that we are saved. We don't lose it on our bad days.

God doesn't take it away on our days when we struggle a bit. I don't want to take away from the fact that it can be lost. I am not talking about that. The Bible is clear that if we turn against God, turn away from God, it is not talking about our bad days, but if we turn away from God and willingly serve Satan and abandon Him, it can be lost. But let us remind ourselves and remind each other of the strength and power of Christ's shed blood. Satan has no tool against it. Satan cannot take that away. He cannot reduce the effectiveness of it or make it maybe. It is not yea and nay. Our salvation is yea.

"For all the promises of God in him are yea, and in him Amen, unto the glory of God by us. Now he which stablisheth us with you in Christ, and hath anointed us, is God; Who hath also sealed us, and given the earnest" or the down payment "of the Spirit in our hearts. Moreover I call God for a record upon my soul, that to spare you I came not as yet unto Corinth. Not for that we have dominion over your faith, but are helpers of your joy: for by faith ye stand." II Corinthians 1:20-24. Paul wanted to make clear that he was there to help. He was there to encourage. He was there to admonish. He was there to correct, but by faith ye stand. We stand and we will stand alone. We stand together today.

We were told clearly in the beginning part of this chapter we are responsible for each other, to comfort, to strengthen, and to hold each other up. But we will stand before God alone with just the shed blood of Christ. Unless we turned against God or thrown away that mantel, if will be a simple yes. Think about it. Think about standing before God and giving an answer for your sins. You know there will be no answer except uncovered by the shed blood of Christ. Yes. It will be yes.

The need for the facility is very great due to alcoholism, which is exacerbated by the lack of opportunity for meaningful employment, on the reservation. The current rate of unemployment is 50-55%.

The 4,112 square foot living area of the building will be a single level frame built slab-on-grade. The design is patterned after the homes at Gateway Woods, near Leo, Indiana.

Work teams will be needed throughout the coming volunteer season. It is hoped that the project can be completed by the spring season. This is an opportunity to volunteer to fulfill a need to help disadvantaged children. The project will require all construction disciplines. Experienced work team leaders will be necessary. This is the second in a three - part series entitled, "Applying God's Word", a historical analysis of the origins and development of our church.

Fulfilling Scriptures

To fulfill the Scriptures the church helped define its teachings with respect to standards, styles and boundaries. This was done both in lifestyle (conversation) and in liturgy (worship). In both categories, the intent was to establish a Godly order that met the Word's standard; and which would provide an order for future generations because they knew Satan would seek to incrementally undermine and/or water down the church's sense of sanctification.

The order that followed became an expression of how they interpreted the Word. The lifestyle definitions they gave (regarding separation, nonconformity, chastity, shamefacedness, holiness, humility, submissiveness, etc.) were put into practice. Their doctrinal applications thus reflected the Word's instructions.

The believers of Bro. Froehlich's time (i.e., the first generation of our brethren) saw the devoted attempt to "follow" Christ and the Apostles as being fulfilled by their liturgical and lifestyle practices (in everyday living).

The brethren surely caught the eye of their social counterparts as they reflected a humble, outward holiness, and a lifestyle that disdained a love for worldly things.

Resisting Deception

As the Word was applied in a practical way, and a visible tradition of holiness resulted, Satan tried — and continues to try — to dismantle and/or dilute such a Bible-expressing obedi-

ence.

The enemy is sometimes skillful in this by persuading people they are only following tradition instead of the Word of God. In this, some fail to perceive that practical holiness and separation from worldliness propose only to express/reflect the Word.

The first generations of the faith—who were devotedly willing to support this newly-formed church body—could clearly comprehend the application-tradition equation that was initiated (i.e., holiness patterns, separation, nonconformity, etc.). For clarity, the leaders defined the Word. The "definitions" the brethren embraced per holiness were seen as following the Word. The interpretation-application link was very well understood, and a lure to souls seeking a true faith.

Thousands of people fled the state church along with the Catholic and Lutheran bodies, to repent and become converted in a manner that fulfilled the Word of God.

Close adherence to the Word's instructions, and fervent preaching, led to a new denomination called the Evangelical Baptists (changed to Apostolic Christian in America). Actually, the proper German name was Gemeinschaft Evangelisch Taufgesinnter.

A total of 110 new congregations were formed in 35 years, from nothing! This amounted, incredibly, to an average of a new congregation every 4 months for 35 years. Fervency, not casualness, led to this awakening. A Bluffton College historian said, "It was like the time of the Apostles."

This was a church order born out of brotherly esteem where lowliness of heart and annihilation of self bred a Godly closeness among the believers. A deep Spirit-led sensitivity allowed the brethren to comprehend what was Godly and what was worldly. They proposed to avoid the latter and embrace the former with all their hearts.

When the forefathers came to America, the application-tradition understanding was very much alive and their sense of holiness and doctrinal separation (from all that was false) continued to see our faith remain as closely-knit.

Contending for the Faith

But as time unfolded — and the church began experiencing growth and prosperity — it began to face the forces of pluralism and diversity (which were developing ideals of the culture at large). The church was affected by the society's influence since more and more members were becoming integrated into the educational and occupational spheres of American life.

As this happened, and decade after decade passed by, there was always the possibility that some would have a varied view of how to apply Scriptures. Inconsistency wanted to manifest itself.

In this, the applications (of the Word) had become normative to the point that it was possible for some to conclude that brethren were following tradition instead of the Word. A sense of not being linked, understanding-wise, to the original intent (of the early days of our church) to define and follow the Word, could have led, in part to this attitudinal pattern.

It is important that you and I also have fulfillment in life. I may not be able to do much but maybe I can be kind to someone, including members of my own family. Maybe I can speak softly and lovingly in cautioning someone about his or her failures, realizing that I also sometimes fail. The way we speak and the way we do should give us a sense of fulfillment. Life can be rather cruel to some people and we all need to be like angels of mercy,

while gently exhorting each other.


