"TODAY IS THE DAY TO REPENT"

Sermon by Elder Bro. Andrew Stoller, Smithville, OH Isaiah 51 and 2 Thessalonians 2:16-3:18

There is a great deal of comfort and a great deal of encouragement in the passage that we have read this morning where Paul was encouraging each one to find consolation and to realize that the Lord does love us. There is hope through grace that Christ will bring to us. There is comfort and we can be established in His work and in His Word. So what kind of comfort and what kind of consolation should we seek through Christ?

At some point in our lives, those of us who have reached at least an age where we know the difference between sin and righteousness, have been able to find comfort if we have taken the opportunity because when we had sin in our lives, which all of us did, there was a lack of peace. There was a barrier. We just could not get through that wall. But we, by the grace of God, were able to have that wall removed and we had free access to Christ. We had the opportunity to remove the sins from our life and had the opportunity to remove the condemnation, then we had a great deal of comfort and a great deal of consolation.

What is it that any of us would want more than that kind of comfort? What is it that would console any of us more than to know that if we faced imminent danger or if our loved one faced imminent danger, what would be a greater consolation than to know that individual or we were right with God? While we certainly don't look forward to losing our loved ones,

we do know that there is a hope. There is a promise that follows this life, if we have served God. We don't have to be separated forever, just separated for a time. We don't have to face the finality of never ever having the opportunity to be with our loved ones again. That certainly will give us a great deal of comfort.

Then he says, "Finally, brethren, pray for us, that the word of the Lord may have free course, and be glorified, even as it is with you:" (2 Thessalonians 3:1). What is it that would prevent the Word of the Lord from having free course? I believe his concern here is that we as individuals would not place a barrier or not place a hindrance on the Word of God. But the Word of God should go out without being altered, without being watered down and that it would have a free opportunity, unhindered by whatever it might be that we might try to place in the way, that would have a free opportunity to work within the hearts and minds of mankind.

What kind of barrier could be placed there that would prevent the Word of the Lord from having free course? I think as we pause and reflect upon that for a few minutes, each one of us could find some things, at least at some point in our life, interfered. We may have tried at one point simply to be too busy. Not that we were necessarily involved in things that were wrong, just that we were involved in so many things that kept us busy that the Word of the Lord re-

ally did not penetrate our hearts and our minds as it should have. We really didn't stop and think about what we ought to be focusing our attention on.

We may have been involved in things we knew were wrong. I believe virtually at every testimony, and we heard it again last night,

Let Brotherly Love Continue

"Let brotherly love continue. Be not forgetful to entertain strangers; for thereby some have entertained angels unawares" (Heb. 13:1-2). What is brotherly love, and how can we be sure that we are practicing it?

To love is to display intense fondness or deep devotion toward someone. Brotherly love is the manifestation of this fondness or devotion to our brother. In this usage of the word, brother goes far beyond those of our household. It refers to God's children, who by virtue of our having been adopted by God, are therefore our brother.

The scriptures provide us with many examples of brotherly love. Jonathan, King Saul's son, loved David "...as his own soul" (I Sam. 18:3). This feeling that Jonathan had toward David developed even though Jonathan had been warned by his father that David would be King of Israel rather than Jonathan, Jonathan did not allow earthly ambitions to interfere with, nor destroy the love he had for David. So great was Jonathon's affection toward David that he was willing to put his life in danger for the king by defending David to King Saul (I Sam., 20:27-34). David did not feel himself worthy of such love but Jonathan knew the Lord was with David and he "...made a covenant with the house of David ... " (I Sam. 20:16).

Solomon expressed the value of brotherly love when he stated that it would cover all sins (Prov. 10:12). Covering of sins in this sense does not refer to hiding but rather to destroying the power of the sin. The opportunity that we have to exhibit love toward one another is from God. We may be a tool that God wishes to use to help someone else, and in the process, cover or gain victory over sin.

Many other examples of brotherly love are recorded in the Old Testament. Joseph's love for his brothers, Moses' love for his people, Ruth's love for Naomi and Elisha's love for Elijah are only a few examples of the love that God's servants had for each other.

None of these examples, of course, compare to the love that Jesus Christ demonstrated for all of mankind. The life of Christ is the perfect example of brotherly love. From the Sermon on the Mount to His prayer that God would forgive His executioners, Jesus lived and taught brotherly love.

Everything that Jesus did, from the time He left Heaven until He returned to Heaven following His resurrection, was a demonstration of brotherly love in action. Even the time when He challenged and chastised those who considered Him as their enemy, He demonstrated brotherly love. The Sermon on the Mount (Mt. Chapt. 5-7) contains numerous examples where Jesus encouraged His followers to implement brotherly love. His chastisement of those who opposed Him was out of love. He wanted them to submit to God's will.

The Golden Rule and many other of Jesus' teachings run counter to human nature (love your enemy, do good to them that despitefully use you, etc.). We find in Jesus' teachings that it is necessary to live contrary to human nature if we truly are going to demonstrate brotherly love.

No act in the history of mankind exemplified brotherly love more fully than the willingness of Jesus to give His life on Calvary and to shed His blood for the redemption of our sins. He willingly allowed Himself to be ridiculed, beaten and finally nailed to the cross. Why was He so willing to pay the debt of sin that He did not owe? Because He knew we had a debt we could not pay. He fulfilled the mission for which He was sent to earth and put brotherly love into practice.

Jesus' example of brotherly love is undoubtedly beyond the ability of human beings to match. However, there are many other examples and teachings in the New Testament that encourage us to implement the commandment to display brotherly love.

The entire chapter of I Cor. 13 emphasizes that love is more important than

many of the issues that man might think to be important. The Apostle Paul reminds us that love is more important than speaking in tongues, than the gift of prophesy, than knowledge, than giving, and that even faith without love leaves us as nothing. Many things will fail but love will not.

The Apostle Paul many times, in the face of severe persecution and extreme danger, felt the love and support of fellow believers. He wrote of the willingness of Priscilla and Aguila "Who have for my life laid down their own necks:..." (Ro. 16:4). He also wrote of the encouragement he received from Onesiphorous who "...oft refreshed me, and was not ashamed of my chain: ...but...sought me out very diligently, and found me:" (2 Tim. 1:16-17). Paul not only received brotherly love, but gave it as well. He was willing to "...spend and be spent for (the Corinthians): though the more abundantly I love you, the less I be loved" (2 Cor. 12:15). For Paul, as it should be for us, brotherly love was unconditional. He did not require it of others before he was willing to give it. For him, it was such a natural state of affairs that he wrote to the Thessalonians that they "...need not that I write unto you: for ye yourselves are taught of God to love one another" (ITh. 4:9)

The Scripture makes it clear that we cannot love God if we do not love our brother. "If a man say, I love God, and hateth his brother, he is a liar: ...and this commandment have we from him, That he who loveth God love his brother also" (I Jn. 4:20-21). Brotherly love must be more than words. It must be put into action. "But whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him" (I Jn. 3:17)?

Brotherly love is a privilege. It is also a commandment. If we love our brother, we also love Christ. Jesus said "...Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me" (Mt. 25:40).

Casa de Elizabeth Orphanage

Thildren come to Casa de Elizabeth from all over Mexico for a variety of reasons. An eleven year old runaway slips while jumping a train and the wheel runs over his foot. A two year old baby girl is found cold, abandoned and unable to speak. A nine year old boy is in trouble with the law and is brought in chains. Siblings need a place to stay for a short time until a parent can provide for them. Other children are orphaned when parents die, or sadly, are abandoned by parents who come to the US and don't return. Some suffer from abuse at home. The needs are endless. A million children, lost under the influence of drugs, live in dangerous sewers or fend for themselves on the streets of Mexico's crowded cities.

Manuel Vergara founded Casa de Elizabeth in 1986 in Imuris, Sonora, a beautiful mountainous setting about 30 miles south of Nogales, Arizona. He and his wife Gabby serve as administrators of the home. Manuel was only 12 years old when his family visited a Mexican orphanage. He would never forget the children; unclothed, malnourished and filthy; living in an earthen hut too small for their numbers. That haunting memory became a dream for a better home for children in need. Some 40 years later, over 70 children find God's love, food, clothes and a refuge at Casa de Elizabeth.

Working Miracles

When Children arrive at Casa de Elizabeth with emotional scars or behavior problems, it is very encouraging to see them improve under the positive influence of God's love. The police recently brought a girl who they had found living on the street with a group of boys. She looked just like

the boys, dressed like them and talked like them. But when they found out she was a girl, they told her she would be better off at the orphanage. She agreed to stay, but refused to change her clothes or her foul language. It was only a short time though before she began to conform to the Christ-like example of the staff. Our sisters, Rosa Cabrera and Claudia Gonzalez, from our church in Ixlan have volunteered at Casa de Elizabeth, and their godly example and hard work is evident in transformed lives.



A Perspective of a Volunteer

"Our team arrives on a cool December Monday morning to start our work week. School is out for the holidays, and a few sleepy-eyed children are already shuffling about in the 35 degree chill. The sun will come out and it will warm up to 65 degrees, the kids' activity level rising with the temperature. It's not long before games of soccer, basketball or baseball break out. And you can always find some boys shooting marbles with astonishing accuracy.

Our job is to hang drywall, and after getting organized, we all, brothers, sisters, fathers, sons, and friends, dive into the work. The days are filled with challenges and improvisations, but by Friday the drywall is nearly complete.

A team member has brought a bag of chocolate bars. The children quickly form an orderly line for the "candy," an English word they all understand. I reach down and pick up a little girl. I don't know her name, but I recognize her as one of the "twins." I ask her if she wants some candy. She smiles and nods. Then one of the boys in line gestures for me to cut in front of him. I decline, yet I marvel at his thoughtfulness. The children are meek and genuinely unselfish. And they treat each other with kindness and respect. One night the children sing songs for us. Their joy and love for Jesus is evident on their faces, and our hearts are touched. Unfortunate circumstances have brought them here, and yet they are generally happy and content.

Saying goodbye to everyone at Casa de Elizabeth was difficult. We were thankful for the opportunity to share with and serve our Mexican friends, but we too felt incredibly blessed by them. We've thoroughly enjoyed our daily devotions together, and the nightly singings at our hotel, but the blessing goes deeper than that. Our perspective on life is changed. We purpose in our hearts never to complain about our circumstances again. And we all desire to be more thankful and faithful to God."

World Relief Involvement

World Relief Teams have built a security wall around the entire orphanage compound, and have added restrooms, showers and laundry facilities to the main building. World Relief is currently building a new administrator home, two apartments for volunteers and three apartments for mothers and children that have an emergency housing need.

Eye Witness Accounts From Romania

In late January and early February, a team of brothers from the USA and Germany traveled into Romania. The purpose was to gather information needed to make decisions concerning our efforts to assist these needy brethren. We want to use this page to relate to our brethren at home the situation as this team found it.

Flying into Timisoara

Since this trip occurred during winter months, it seemed best to avoid traveling a large distance via auto. As they investigated options, the brethren found that it is possible to fly direct from Frankfurt, Germany to Timisoara, Romania. Tarom Airlines, a small independent firm in Romania has good service in modern aircraft, and the group flew via Tarom. The aircraft was a Boeing 737 that was less than 5 years old. The one and one-half hour flights were good.

Arrival in Arad

Brother Filip Augustinov from Arad met the brethren at the airport, and drove them to their quarters in the Best Western Central Hotel near the center of Arad. Breakfast each day was served in the hotel as a part of the normal service. Noon and evening meals were prepared by the Romanian brethren and served in their homes. This all made the stay in Arad quite comfortable and very enjoyable.

Visiting open markets

The travelers visited stores and open markets numerous times in order to evaluate both cost and availability of consumer goods. It became quite clear early on that the only thing lacking in Romania is money. Virtually any product one needs is available, and the cost in dollars is cheaper than we can buy the same item for at home. It is clear that as time goes by changes will need to be made to some of our programs to accommodate changing circumstances.

As an interesting side note for anyone planning on traveling to Europe, the best means of paying for goods is by credit card. In addition to this, it is quite easy and convenient to get local currency from ATM machines, which are widely available. This does eliminate the need for carrying large sums of cash in a foreign land.

Medicine program with CAM

In many of our projects World Relief and the Mission Committees have worked together with Christian Aid Ministries of Berlin, OH. This organization receives millions of dollars worth of pharmaceuticals from corporations in the USA. These medicines are then distributed in many foreign lands as well as close to home.

For several years the European Board has worked to make these prescription drugs available to our brethren in Eastern Europe. There is an established system which needs to be in place before anyone can receive this medicine, which is only proper.

With thanks to our great God, by the end of the week, our brethren saw the last piece of the puzzle in place. We now have a secure cabinet in the Arad church that will serve as a pharmacy to store the medicine that will be delivered each month. One of our Romanian sisters is a nurse and is qualified to distribute these medicines.

With this system in place at last, a new means of assisting our needy brethren in the area of prescription medicines has opened up. We intend to work through this program step by step as it unfolds under God's direction. It is hoped that the medicines can also be furnished to needy brethren and friends in neighboring countries such as Ukraine or Yugoslavia.

Ukrainians come to Arad

On Wednesday, March 30, two elders and two deacons from Ukraine came to Arad and brought an update on conditions in their land. Inflation and unemployment continue to stalk the land, but with thanks to God, the Ukrainians reported that to their knowledge, no one from the Nazarean faith is cold or hungry.

The European Board has numerous self-help projects in place, and also sends a substantial amount of money to be distributed as humanitarian aid. The brothers brought reports showing where these funds had been utilized. There was a list from each congregation, with the sum of money designated to each person. The recipient had signed each time they got help. This system of accounting is of great benefit and interest to both the European Board and those faithful donors who wish to help.

Garden tiller program

In the December Mission Committee article of the Silver Lining we disucssed our ongoing program to furnish garden tillers to Ukraine. The response from our brotherhood was very generous and has allowed us to expand this program. At this time six units are due to be delivered to our brethren before gardening begins. We have also sent another \$10,000 that they intend to use to buy similar machines in Ukraine as a comparison.

The generosity of our brethren has also allowed us to send \$10,000 to Romania to buy tillers locally to be used by the Romanian brethren. Thank you very much and God bless you all for your interest and help.

APOSTOLIC CHRISTIAN COUNSELING SERVICES

Part V - Mental Health Hotline

Luke 10:36 - "Which now of these three, thinkest thou, was neighbour unto him that fell among the thieves?" 37 - "And he said, He that shewed mercy on him. Then said Jesus unto him, Go, and do thou likewise."

Jesus gave a clear message that we are to reach out and serve those who are in need. It is easy for us to give excuses about why we cannot help. Those who were invited to the King's feast had said they had no time, had to see a field or cow, or see to their wife (Luke 14:16-24). We all have important responsibilities the Lord has entrusted to us, however, we must not use them as an excuse for not responding to His call that we "go and do likewise".

The part of Apostolic Christian Counseling Services that has been in place the longest is the Mental Health Hotline. Establishing the hotline was one of the first projects undertaken by the Apostolic Christian Mental Health Committee. A small group of sisters who are Registered Nurses agreed to provide the service by taking turns being on call and carrying a pager. The service has basically remained the same since it's beginning.

The nurses receive calls regarding a wide variety of concerns and provide a variety of services. When they receive a page, they talk with the callers about the nature of the problem and help them to assess the seriousness of the problem. The calls come from the struggling individuals, ministers and family members or friends of someone who is struggling.

The nurses help callers deter-

mine whether they need professional counseling, need to seek spiritual counseling, or just need more information about a particular problem. Often the nurses give preliminary information over the phone and then follow up with print information that is available from ACCS. If the person is in need of professional counseling, the nurse will offer to help locate a counselor in the caller's location. ACCS maintains a directory of counselors that others have used and found helpful. There are also some national directories of counselors that are used to locate counselors. If the person decides to use a professional counselor, the nurse may offer to mail out a handout from the counseling center office that gives helpful information about what to expect from counseling and how to interact with a counselor.

Sometimes individuals calling the hotline are already receiving counseling but would like to talk to someone about the counseling. At times it is helpful to get a perspective on the counseling from someone who understands his or her Apostolic Christian doctrine.

Some individuals who call ACCS are in situations that have no obvious resolution. They may call the hotline for support or they may call to be sure that they are not overlooking something that they could be doing.

The sisters who provide the hotline receive quarterly training from the counselors of ACCS. Because the sisters are nurses, they already have training in assessment and do a very good job of it. They receive training in recognizing symptoms that could indicate a particular problem, in how to make an effective referral and how to deal with unique situations.

Each call is documented by the

sisters and reviewed by a counselor at ACCS to ensure that an appropriate response was given. The sisters are able to consult with the ACCS counselors if they have questions about how to respond or what kinds of suggestions to give. All calls coming into ACCS are kept strictly confidential.

"Now the word of the Lord came unto Jonah the son of Amittai, saying, Arise, go to Ninevah, that great city, and cry against it; for their wickedness is come up before me. But Jonah rose up to flee unto Tarshish from the presence of the Lord, and went down to Joppa; and he found a ship going to Tarshish: so he paid the fare thereof, and went down into it, to go with them unto Tarshish from the presence of the

Lord. But the Lord sent out a great wind into the sea and there was a mighty tempest in the sea, so that the ship was like to be broken..."

Jonah 1:1-4

God has a purpose and plan for each of our lives, and He has blessed us with many gifts and talents to use for His glory. He calls us to do many things; some are great, some seemingly small. Sometimes the things God calls us to do seem hard, difficult, or even impossible. When God calls, instructs, and leads, He also allows us the freedom to choose our own response. Sometimes when God calls, we respond willingly. Other times we ignore, or, even worse, try to run away.

What are the consequences of ignoring or running away from God? In Jonah's case they were many. Jonah paid fare to travel from Joppa to Tarshish. Tarshish was at the opposite end of the known world at that time. You couldn't purchase a ticket to travel any farther than Tarshish. Hence, Jonah's disobedience cost him financially. Jonah's disobedience cost others financially as well. The Word says that, after the storm arose, the ship's wares were cast into the sea to lighten the ship. Again, Jonah's disobedience had financial impact, but this time on others. Jonah's actions put both his and other people's lives in great danger. The Word says: "...there was a mighty tempest in the sea, so that the ship was like to be broken." When the storm came, the mariners were exceedingly afraid for their lives. Not only were they in danger, they had to deal with great emotional duress, and Jonah's actions brought about the storm that caused their fear. Finally, Jonah brought great physical, mental and emotional stress on himself. As one reads about Jonah's stay in the belly of the great fish, one reads words like "...out of the belly of hell cried I", or "The waters compassed me about, even to the soul", "...weeds were wrapped about my head", or "...my soul fainted". The picture is of a man in total anguish.

What grief do we cause when we walk outside of God's plan for our lives? We may never know the full impact of our decisions, but if we look to Jonah as an example, we see a far-reaching mental, emotional, physical, and financial impact on Jonah and on innocent bystanders from Jonah's single decision to step outside of God's plan. What an encouragement to insure that we first, seek God's will for our lives, and second, pray for the grace and courage to carry it out.

As we think about this valuable lesson to follow the Lord's direction. we are glad for two of our on-campus residents who have moved on after learning about God and His plans for men's lives. Shannon G. and Keith C. both returned home to their families in February. We pray that God will continue to bless them and make His will and presence known in their lives. As some children leave, we also welcome new. Angie K. and Mike S. have joined the Plattner household, and Jenee L. and Shawn R. have joined the Meister home. God bless you as you get to know about Him and the marvelous plan of salvation.

that there were times when those souls and each one of us, was involved in things that we knew we shouldn't be doing but we just didn't have the power to do anything about it. Try as we would by ourselves, we just couldn't allow the Word of God to guide us. We heard again last night that for a time, they tried it on their own. They just tried to do better. On the surface, that sounds pretty good, doesn't it? They tried to do better. They tried to do away with the things in their life that they knew were not right. What do you suppose would have happened when we tried that if we would have succeeded? We knew we were doing things wrong so we just thought we would do things better, and we would have succeeded. What would have happened? Would that sense of accomplishment have deceived us to the point where we would have thought, "Well, I am doing better so I really don't need the Word of God. I really don't need the conviction of sin. I am doing better and things are going okay, so I don't need to repent."?

When the Word of the Lord has free course, we find out real fast that it doesn't work to try it on our own. A lot of that may not seem a lot of fun when we are young and unconverted. What a blessing it is from God that He does not allow us to overcome these things by ourselves. Because if He allowed that and we could overcome things by ourselves. 1 doubt that we would really recognize how badly we need God. Most of us come to the conclusion after trying that for awhile and maybe a number of times while it works for just a little while, it doesn't take very long until we are at least back where we were and possibly even worse. It

is really a blessing of God that He does not allow us to do that on our own.

"Finally, brethren, pray for us." (II Thessalonians 3:1). Do we on a daily basis pray for each other that the Word of God can have complete free course if we are willing to listen to whatever it might be that God would have for us on that particular day? Most of us get up in the morning with a sense of what we plan to do for the day. We plan to do this and we plan to do that and plan to do whatever. We think we have things pretty well under control but how many times does something intervene and we have to realize, "Well, that isn't the way it is going to go today." Then we alter our plans. If we have prayed in the morning fervently that God will really direct us in whatever way that He wants us to go, we should not even be too disappointed, should we, if we really feel God's leading and God's direction?

Then He requests, "That we may be delivered from unreasonable and wicked men: for all men have not faith." (II Thessalonians 3:2). There are those in the world who just do not trust God at all. They have no use for the Word of God. They have no use for the life style that the Lord would teach us to have and they just don't see any reason for it. We might say, "Well, there are some people that are that way that really do not seem to be so wicked. Nice people. Pleasant to be around. Helpful in many ways." What is the definition of a Christian, and what is the definition of a wicked person? Is there anything in between?

I am sure that at one point in our life we thought there was. But either we are a child of God or we are not. We can try to make all kinds of degrees, but if we haven't submitted ourselves to the Lord, if we haven't repented, if we haven't allowed Him

to convert us, or if we are not working on it and if we have not recognized that there are things in our lives that have to go, then are we in fact a Christian? We can come up with all kinds of definitions of a Christian, but very simply a Christian is one who leads a Christ-like life. Not once in a while, not on Sunday morning, but one who leads a Christ-like life to the best of their ability every day. We have to be just a little careful about saying to the best of their ability because without the help of Christ and without allowing Him to change the attitude that we have, we really would not have much ability, would we? So to the best of our ability only counts when we have allowed God to take control of our life. Even then we are going to make plenty of mistakes.

"But the Lord is faithful, who shall stablish you, and keep you from evil. And we have confidence in the Lord touching you, that ye both do and will do the

things which we command you. And the Lord direct your hearts into the love of God, and into the patient waiting for Christ." (II Thessalonians 3:3-5). Often when I read passages like this, I think of the individual who had a vinevard or an orchard. He went out and found this fig tree that it had not bore any fruit and I think it was a couple of years that it had not borne fruit. He said, "...cut it down; why cumbereth it the ground?" (Luke 13:7). The vine dresser said, "Give it another chance. Let me give it a little special attention. Let me dig about it and dung it and let us see if we can encourage it to produce. Then if it doesn't, then cut it down." As I recall, and I might be wrong in the number, but it seems to me it had been either two or three years that he was seeking fruit and didn't find any, and he was going to give it one more.

How many of us resisted God for more than four years? How many of us waited a lot longer than that knowing that we had things to change in our lives? We waited and we waited more than one year, more than two, more than three, more than four. If God would have cut us down at the end of the fourth year when we knew the difference between right and wrong and continued to choose wrong, where would we be? We can take a look at that third verse and be thankful. Also look at the fifth one, the Lord is faithful and He is willing to be patient waiting for Christ.

I sometimes have to wonder now what are we waiting for if we haven't vet turned to the Lord? Or if we have some kind of barrier and even those of us who have some time ago by the grace of God been able to repent and there is this thing maybe we kind of hang on to. What are we really waiting for? Maybe some people will consider it unfair to say this, but it is less than a month since we faced one of the greatest disasters in our nation. Thousands of people were killed instantly or within a very short period of time. But for the grace of God, those disasters could have hit any place. It could have been where some of us happened to have been. We are fortunate enough to be in a small area that I guess most of the time people don't pick on. But I guess I kind of thought when that was going on, that surely there would have to be souls who would be thinking pretty seriously.

Maybe, just maybe, God is calling a little more clearly than He has for a while. He really wants to get the message across that the times are evil and that there is no promise for tomorrow. I don't mean to use scare-tactics. Those simply don't work. What would have to happen—and each one of us needs to an-

swer this question for ourselves—what would have to happen in order for us to finally say, "That is enough. I have resisted God long enough and I want to give in."? What will it take? What if we had that happen in our community or in our nation in the last year?

We have been very thankful and very fortunate that we have had a number of converts the last year. It seems that it goes on one here and one there and it doesn't seem like a lot until you count them up. I think at one point, we had nineteen here, which is a wonderful number. But it is not enough because any time we see one soul who has reached the age of accountability who hasn't repented, we are just not quite satisfied. I guess I would like each one of us to think what would have to happen in my life and what would I expect God to do to really convince me that today is the day, not tomorrow, not next week, not next month, not next year? I guess (and we have a little time left) that last January first, there are souls who are sitting here today who have said, "I will not allow another January first to come without repenting and turning to God." If you made that promise, don't let it become December thirty-first before you think about it again. Don't wait that long. God is patient. God is faithful. There is a time when He might just say, "That is enough," and call someone home unprepared. I can't think of anything that would be sadder.

When we think of the terrible deeds that have been committed and then we think of heaven and hell. We think of the Word of God where we are told that we will either spend eternity in one place or the other. We read the descriptions of hell. Is there really anybody-anybody!-that we would want to spend eternity there, even though they may have commit-

ted the most horrible of crimes? I don't think that we would want anyone to spend eternity there. Certainly we would not want any of our loved ones there.

Last night at the supper table we were visiting and one of the brothers mentioned a family that has a very, very large family - nineteen children. Eighteen of the nineteen are converted. There is one missing. There is still one missing. I don't think it matters if we have nineteen children or if we have one, if there is one missing, we are just not quite satisfied. Oh, it is a comfort when one, or two, or three have, but as a child of God, we can never ever look at a family and say, "They have four out of five. That is pretty good. We will stop worrying now and stop praying for that family." We can't do that. This is one area where we are never quite satisfied.

I think if we would be told today that by next Sunday at this time, we would have twenty-five converts in this church, we would just be thrilled. I guarantee you that next Sunday morning, we kind of hope for number twenty-six or twenty-seven. There isn't anyone that we want left out. There isn't anybody that we want left behind. God doesn't either. That is why He is faithful and that is why He is patient. That is why He is willing time after time after time to offer the opportunity for salvation. A lot of people do not have that opportunity. They possibly hear the Word of God a couple of times and that is it.

For you and I have had as easy a time, most of us, getting into the house of the Lord as what could be humanly possible. I don't know of a way that it could be easier for us to come to the house of God. We have good transportation. We have a comfortable place to sit. In the winter, it

is warmed and in the summer, it is cooled. Probably most of us have cars that are the same way. There really isn't much excuse, is there? We all have excuses. We all had excuses, but do any of us have reasons that really will hold up on the final Judgment Day?

I know I have said this before but I think it is valid. Think about your favorite excuse for not repenting, and I don't care what it is. Think about your favorite excuse for not repenting and imagine yourself standing in front of Christ on the cross and saying, "I didn't repent be-

cause..." and then you fill in the blank and see if that really makes sense. To see if it really justifies not turning to the Lord after He paid the price that He did. If our excuse didn't make sense there, do we think it will make any more sense when we are standing in front of God?

He says to us, "I sent my Son. I paid the price. I preserved My Word. I sent people to tell you about salvation and you had everything you needed, why didn't you come?" Will that excuse make any more sense then? If it doesn't, then we probably need to come up with a new excuse

because that one isn't going to work. I haven't found any that will hold water. I've heard a lot of excuses but I have not heard one excuse that God would say, "Oh, yes, why didn't I think of that? That is okay." There are not any of those.

By the grace of God, may each one of us seriously consider our standing. Are we ready? Do we have an excuse that will hold water the day we become accountable?

The life of Isaac Gehring continues. He was an Elder of the church at Sardis, OH. He arrived in America in 1848, and passed away in 1896.

Bro. Isaac Gehring was only 29 years old when he came to America. Sardis, OH, was the second church of our faith to be established in the United States.

Sardis was strategically located on the Ohio River, so the church became a "passing through" and a "feeder" church; many European emigrants spent time in Sardis before settling in other areas where congregations were formed. Gehring, as a minister and later as an Elder, made a significant contribution by ministering to these many newcomers.

He worked closely with Elder Joseph Bella. Because Sardis was a hub of church activity, these two men exerted a wide influence in establishing the faith in America. Gehring was ordained Elder in approximately 1868 and served until his death in 1896.

Gehring is remembered for his kind and gentle disposition. He is remembered as a brother who had a sincere love for everyone and once said, "One cannot catch fish by striking in the water." One is more successful by luring the fish and furnishing an appeal to them. In the realm of salvation, this is true because people cannot be coerced into repentance, but instead will respond more readily to the gentle and appealing message of love, and also to the radiant example of a believer.

In 1855, Gehring learned there were individuals in the Rittman, OH, area who were interested in their soul's welfare. The matter of providing a ministry to the Rittman area was of no small consequence since it was nearly 140 miles from Sardis. Gehring, full of youth, vigor, and zeal, set out walking to Rittman. In 1928, John Ott of Lamont, KS, recalled an incident that he, along with Andy Yost and Isaac Gehring, experienced during Gehring's first walk to Rittman. The account was told to Rudolph Graf who re-

"He then told me a long story. At seventeen years, he with a young man named Yost, were baptized by Elder Isaac Gehring. The next day on Monday he joined this Elder Gehring who started for what is now the Rittman area. This trip they made on foot taking six days. Father Gehring made this long trip three times during his life. Must have been his first trip for near New Philadelphia they made inquiry as the shortest way to their destination. This they said was along a new laid railway. About two miles further on they met a woman with a bag of groceries on her arm. They bid her the time of day in their Swiss dialect, walked on but soon were called back by this woman, also speaking Swiss. The conversation was pleasant. The woman asked their destination and reason for such a long walk. Then Bro. Gehring revealed the whole matter. There were seeking souls where they wished to visit. This woman then asked about the faith and doctrine Bro. Gehring preached. Then she also related to them of a deep soul's conviction which she made eight years before. Repentance and heart's conversion followed by peace of heart, which she had never experienced before though baptized as a babe and confirmed in the state church in Switzerland. She lived nearby and asked these brothers to stop on their return way. She said her name was Katherine Wingeier and that she had four children then, all boys.

The visit to Rittman area was blessed by the Lord. It was the beginning of the large assembly there at this time. The brothers returned during the week following. They were heartily received by this Katherine Wingeier. In the eight years this woman said she had never found anyone of like experience as was her conversion. The Wingeier home was near Stone Creek. About a year later, a second walk was made to the Rittman area, Bro. Ott again accompanying Bro. Gehring. They called at the Wingeier house. It was empty, also none of the neighbors had any idea where this family had gone. One said it had been rumored that they had left for Michigan. It was a grave disappointment. This was Bro. Ott's story. He had never heard any more for his family soon moved to Kansas. Also mentioned that after the baptism of he and Andy Yost, he had not seen nor heard anything of this Yost."

During one of his early trips to the Rittman area, he was visiting a home of prospective believers. A young son in the home where he was visiting sat with his feet perched up on the dining room table. He somewhat casually or disrespectfully asked Gehring, "Where are you staying tonight?" To which Gehring replied, "Wherever the Lord opens the door." Such a forthright statement tends to symbolize the faith and trust exemplified, not only by Gehring, but by other forefathers of the faith. The Lord and the church were first in their lives, and they served both with all diligence.

The young boy who irreverently asked Gehring this question, and had previously scoffed at his preaching, was Daniel M. Steiner who soon became converted and was the first minister of the Rittman congregation.

While Gehring experienced many wonderful times preaching the gospel, he also had his share of setbacks and danger. One of these incidents occurred on August 30, 1866, when he and Elder Henry Geistlich of Switzerland were driving home from a church service at Sardis, OH. Geistlich recounts the incident in his diary, "Gehring and myself were driving home. The horses became frightened and ran away, throwing us both out of the wagon. I was slightly injured."

"Heaven"

Everybody want to know about Heaven. It is God's home office. God travels a lot and can be everywhere at one time because He is Spirit and not confined to time and space. Psalm 20:6, "He will hear from His holy heaven." This indicates that God hears our prayers from His home office, although this reception may not be limited to His home office.

But what kind of a place is this Heaven? There is another meaning for Heaven which is the sky or outer space. We are talking about God's dwelling place, His main dwelling place. To get ready to go there is the most important thing in life.

We can read in I Corinthians 2:9, "But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him." Surely this preparation has taken place in Heaven, and if we aren't capable of understanding it in our human bodies, we might as well

give up in that regard and wait until we get there. However, the Bible attempts to describe Heaven with earthly vocabulary to give us some idea of what Heaven is like.

First let's consider the things that are not in Heaven. Revelation describes the heavenly city as the Apostle John saw it in his vision. Verse 4 reads, "And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes, and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away." I can imagine tears of joy and maybe God will let us keep those tears, but tears of sorrow will all be wiped away because there will be no more death and no more sorrow. No more funerals in other words. Also there will be no more crying nor pain. This means no more disease or illness of any kind, including mental illness. That is very good. Revelation 22:5 adds, "And there shall be no night there."

Next, let's consider the things

which are in Heaven. In Revelation seven angels are mentioned who "Stand on the sea of glass, having the harps of God. And they sing the song of Moses the servant of God, and the song of the Lamb." This indicates that the angels sing in Heaven. Perhaps the believers from Hungary will join in as their singing is quite angelic. I better just listen.

There seems to be no shortage of gold in Heaven. Revelation 21:18 reads, "And the city was pure gold, like unto clear glass." I have been corrected for equating the heavenly city spoken of in Revelation, with Heaven itself, but let me persist in thinking that what applies to the heavenly city probably applies to Heaven itself.
