

Sermon by Elder Brother Kevin Ryan, Rockville, CT

II Samuel 24 and Ephesians 2

Just thinking back, this chapter in the Old Testament that we read of, we mentioned the key of David in our opening remarks. We think about the life of David and contrast that with the life of Saul. In many respects when Saul was rejected for being king over Israel, I would dare say that we have no evidence in the scripture in the life of Saul that he engaged in some of the base things, the immoral things - if we would use that term, scripture doesn't really use that term — those things which are carnal, and sensual, to the degree that David did. David was captivated many times by those things and encaptured by them. Saul of course, did also in his day and time fall into sin and David likewise in his time. If you think about it loved ones, the key of David gives us some thought and consideration. What was the difference between those two men?

In the times where Saul was in difficulty, and of course it really arose there when the time came that he went and he sought counsel of Samuel. Now that in and of itself was a good idea, wasn't it? The problem was Samuel at that time was dead. So rather than falling upon his knees and going to the living God which he could have confessed with his own mouth, who was filled with mercy and power and might to deliver, he went to a witch at Endor. Now there are a couple of things about that. First of all, let us never become so sleepy in our day and time to think that there is not something to the danger, there is something real and seriously dangerous about dabbling with those extra-spiritual things, those things of the occult. This is something that probably we as parents ought to talk to our children more often than we do. I say that to my own criticism, not to yours.

Sometimes a person comes repenting, and we go through as we mentioned this morning some of those things in the Galatians, which I am sure your brother does to, just to stir the mind there a little bit. What is it that is the sin

of life? We get to the sin of witchcraft. We think about it this way — they say well no witchcraft, never been involved — and I say now wait a minute, let me ask you a question. Do you have a habit of reading the horoscope in the daily paper? That is witchcraft. Because superstition enters in. And there is some kind of confidence set upon those things. Or we ask young people if they have ever been in some kind of game — and they might think it is childish-game or on a Ouija board and all that kind of thing. But those are where the beginning of those things start.

We live in a day and time where people talk about being spiritual. They talk about the Navajo Indians out in the West and they talk about this one being spiritual and they think about all those people in far places like China and India and they give credibility to those things. Let us remember some of the root of those things is witchcraft loved ones. Let us never forget that. That is one of the things that became destructive in Saul's life. He gave some credibility to the witch at Endor. Well she really was a witch. And there really was a spiritual world and Samuel really did come up. And she really did cry out when she realized what was going on. She was blinded and yet she had some powers of a witch. We need to be careful that we, in our day and time where people think they are so sophisticated and educated and all the things that go along with that, that we start to just think it does not really mean anything. It means a

Thinking about the key of David, the other thing that Saul did not do is that he never humbled himself. Think about the time with the slaughter of Amalek the king. When finally Samuel did come to him and he revealed to him and said what is the bleating of this sheep, what did Saul say? The people. You. The people were getting restless. You did not come. You were late. And the finger pointing and accusation went out, didn't it?

Contrast that loved ones, with the time where David committed that sin with the wife of Uriah the Hittite. And the prophet came to him likewise, in that case it was Nathan, and said I have a parable. He told the parable of that poor man that had that one little lamb. It was like a daughter to him. He nursed it and he cherished it. The rich man came because he had a guest and that lamb was just ready for the slaughter and he took it from him. Oh, and Da-

Weights I

On the surface it would appear that being a child of God in the United States in the early part of the 21st century should be much easier than it is in other parts of the world. Also, it appears that it should be much easier now than it was at other times throughout history.

Few of us in America have ever experienced either harsh or lengthy persecution. Few of us have ever faced the possibility of death, serious injury, severe hardship or even significant inconvenience for taking a firm stand for our faith in God. We rarely hear of Christians in America who have lost their jobs, their homes or other possessions as a result of serving God as they feel instructed to do so in His Word.

We can freely assemble around His Word as often as we wish; we can openly fellowship with those of like-mind and faith; and we can publicly express our views about the one true God with no fear of serious reprisal. We can dress modestly, we are rarely required to go places where a child of God ought not to be and the atmosphere of our homes can reflect our faithfulness to God. We are not required to take an oath of allegiance to a government official nor to an idol.

In spite of all of these blessings, Satan seems to be as effective in America as he is elsewhere in thwarting the Word of God and causing souls to stray from the straight and narrow way.

Although there are undoubtedly many factors which contribute to Satan's success, it would appear that one of the important tools that he uses to accomplish his evil purpose is to bring "weights" to our lives. If Satan can overload us with obstacles that hinder our service to God, he can reduce our effectiveness as children of God.

The Apostle Paul warned us to "...lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us" (Heb. 12:1). Paul recognized that in addition to easily recognizable sins, there are other tools that Satan uses to hinder a child of God from being faithful and from winning the race to receive

our heavenly prize. Paul recognized that as Satan adds "weights" to our lives, he hinders our progress.

Perhaps we could define a weight as anything which hinders our service to God or slows us down in our effort to draw closer to God. Since Paul wrote of weights and sins, we can understand that weights are not necessarily evil. It is possible that an activity which is good could become a weight. Weights are issues over which we do have some control and we could therefore, remove most if not all of them from our lives.

What are the weights that we need to avoid? How can we keep them out of our lives or at least keep them from putting our salvation in jeopardy?

There are many activities which, in isolation, may not cause us to lose our salvation. However, these activities may divert our attention, waste our energy, blur our vision, put a barrier between us and God, or draw us farther from God, thereby making us more vulnerable to Satan's tactics.

When Jesus visited the home of Mary and Martha, Mary left the greater share of the work of serving to Martha. When Martha asked Jesus to tell Mary to help her with the work, Jesus said "Martha, Martha, thou art careful and troubled about many things: But one thing is needful; and Mary hath chosen that good part, which shall not be taken away from her" (Lk. 10:41-42).

Certainly Jesus did not say it was wrong for us to serve our guests. He did say that we should not be so particular about details that we allow these things to keep us from worshipping God as we should. Too much energy used on unimportant detail turned hospitality into a weight.

We must also be careful that we do not allow situations outside of our home to weigh us down. The social, political and economic systems under which we live bring us into contact with many people. Most of us live and work in situations that expose us to significant diversity in culture, family structure, values and religious beliefs. These areas of diversity are promoted by our govern-

ment as being wonderful attributes for our communities and nation. Perhaps this is true in a political atmosphere in which globalism is promoted as the solution to world conflict.

However, from a spiritual point of view, diversity is potentially a great danger. Many of the people from diverse cultures and religions are nice people and make wonderful neighbors and co-workers. But do they draw us closer to God or do they draw us away from Him? We must be careful that we do not make the same mistake that the children of Israel made as they allowed diversity to significantly impact their lives.

Solomon was deceived by having a close association with heathen people. He married "strange women" - those of ungodly people - and "...it came to pass, when Solomon was old, that his wives turned away his heart ...and Solomon did evil in the sight of the Lord" (I Kings 11:4-6). Even a man as wise as Solomon could not associate with evil without having his faith weakened.

There are many other examples that could be cited in which the children of Israel allowed themselves to become allied with ungodly people and it cost them dearly. David recognized this danger and wrote "Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful" (Ps. 1:1). The Psalmist cautioned us that this situation gets progressively more serious. First we walk with them, then we stand with them and finally we sit with them.

If our acquaintances do not draw us closer to God, we must be careful. Perhaps it is not possible to avoid working with, or living by, unbelievers. We can, however, avoid becoming involved in their activities which may lead us to spiritual shipwreck. Their kindness and friendly personalities may cause us to unwisely expose ourselves to false doctrines.

Distribution Centers and Material Aid Coordinators

Greetings to all in the precious name of Jesus. The Distribution Center Coordinators' Board (DCCB) would like to thank you for giving your time, talents, and tithes to Apostolic Christian World Relief. We are thankful for the privilege of serving this present world with the gifts that you share.

About the DCCB

The Board is made up of the Coordinators from most of our World Relief Centers plus a coun-seling elder from the National World Relief Committee. Duties of these brethren are to coordinate the efforts of the three international shipping centers, the three support centers, and the two local centers.

The coordinators of various products such as soap, meat, grain, kits, and beans also channel their efforts through this board.

Another duty of the DCCB is to be responsible for fulfilling the regional aid coordinators' requests for items going to Haiti, Jamaica, Mexico, and Europe.

If you would like to help

Anyone who would like to become involved in the ongoing activities at a center near you may talk to the coordinator of the center or someone who regularly volunteers.

They are always looking for workers and will be glad to share with you the exact local, national and international needs. The Lord has opened many doors of opportunity to serve at these centers, and you will be richly blessed as you share of yourself and become involved.

Policies under review

Although we have had such centers for a number of years, the work is a continual learning process. The duties of the board are to seek areas where assistance is needed and to try to meet those needs using the assets and opportunities available to us. We covet your patience and prayers as we continually refine our procedures.

World Relief Review

An annual World Relief Review program is scheduled each year. By decision of the World Relief Committee some time ago, the nation is divided into an east and a west region. Each region has a day set aside, normally a Saturday, where brethren can gather and be informed of the ongoing efforts.

New distribution center

The newest facility added to our chain of distribution centers is near the city of Arad, Romania. This past spring the European Board arranged for purchase of this facility, located on a main highway in the small suburban village of Vladimirescu. There are several buildings on this property with the entire complex surrounded by a wall, which is normal in Eastern Europe.

The property is already serving as a reception and distribution center for the food packages sent monthly from Bluffton to Romania. There is a house in good condition that will probably be used to accommodate brethren who will serve as caretakers.

Since there are areas of the work in Eastern Europe involving the Mission Committee, they paid \$20,000 toward the purchase price of about \$95,000. The congregation at Breidenbach, Germany is also

closely connected with this ongoing work, and are sharing costs as well as providing some necessary labor.

The Mission Committee works in cooperation with the World Relief Committee to meet spiritual and humanitarian needs around the world. Presently the Mission Committee is actively working in Canada, Central America, Europe, India, Japan, Mexico, South America and the USA. Following is the purpose, the Scriptural foundation and the objectives for these labors of love.

PURPOSE

To present to the lost the Gospel message of salvation based on faith in the shed blood of Jesus Christ and a true repentance and conversion. (Acts 3:19; Eph. 2:8) This includes the nurturing and instructing of the believers in the truths of God's Word (Eph. 4:12; Col. 1:28) and the preserving of sound doctrine by "earnestly contending for the faith."

(Jude 3; Acts 20:27)

FOUNDATION

The Holy Scriptures, which command that God's Word be shared by teaching, preaching and example, with Jesus Christ as the Head and the church as His Body, through which His work may be carried out here on earth. (Matt. 28:19-20; Acts 1:8; Col. 1:18)

OBJECTIVES

To share the Word

We encourage the sharing of God's Word by all brethren with anyone who has an interest in receiving it. This may include distribution of the entire Bible, the New Testament or small portions of the Bible as well as personal sharing of our eternal hope. (1 Pet. 3:15)

To establish churches outside the USA

We encourage the establishment of churches in new areas in foreign countries with the same conditions as establishing churches in the USA. Individuals who assist in these efforts must be directed by the Holy Spirit into this work and be of good report. When this is confirmed and adherence to the guidelines listed below is assured, such individuals

will be sent by the church on specific assignments to a particular area of need. (Acts 11:22; 15:22)

This process is carried out by the Mission Committee with the support of the individual's local elder and church. (Acts 11:22-24; 13:1-3; 2 Tim. 2:2)

Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost:

As we thought about what to write for this month's Silver Lining, we thought about our main goals at Gateway Woods—rebuilding and restoration of the family. One of the ways John spread the gospel was rebuilding the family. "And he [John] shall go before him in the spirit and power of Elias, to turn the hearts of the fathers to the children, and the disobedient to the wisdom of the just; to make ready a people prepared

for the Lord." (Luke 1:17)

The day to day interactions that children see in family life can be a powerful way to demonstrate how alive and real our God is. God designed the family to be a place where people could see faith in action and believe in Jesus as their Saviour. As we live and work here at Gateway Woods, it is a wonderful, secure place where the children are loved and taught about Jesus Christ. Yet, as workers, we all feel the strain of the emotional hurt these children carry because their homes have been broken apart by sin.

Is my focus on worshipping and communing with my Creator - even before serving Him? Am I laying down my will for the good of my wife or husband? Do nothing out of selfish ambition.

Are we being faithful in the first ministry of our own family? Or is our family receiving the brunt of our frustrations and self-ishness? Are we disciplining our children while taking the time to shepherd their heart so they understand WHY they needed it from God's perspective? Are we rising to the challenge to lose our life (die to self) in this world, so we may gain it in eternity?

Marriage and parenting are hard work, but it is a ministry that can have far reaching effects, good or bad. In Exodus 20:5, God tells us that our sin can affect people to the third and fourth generations after we have lived. But God promises to show us mercy and love for a thousand generations if we love Him and keep His commandments (Deut. 7:9).

Often, God's will for us is not hard to find. It's being obedient in the routine, mundane tasks He has called us to do today: going to work every day and doing the best job we can for His glory, changing that dirty diaper, writing a note of encouragement, taking time out to spend an evening with our spouse, throwing the ball with our child, etc. If God doesn't rule in the "mundane", then He doesn't rule! Let's be faithful to what He has called us to do.

Sermon continued from page 2 vid was indignant, wasn't he? He said, surely that man will die! And out of his own mouth he judged himself. And Nathan said to him, thou art the man. And when it was revealed to him, he did not say, well wait a minute. She should not have been out there bathing like that to catch my eye. Or he could have said, Uriah, he should have been more ... he didn't do any of that. In sackcloth and ashes he repented.

The same thing happened in the scripture that we read of here. The word of the Lord came to him. This is a fascinating scripture and it is really a fascinating thing to contrast the life of David and Joab also. Joab himself was not what we would call a godly man and yet he always seemed to know of the power and presence of God even in his own victories. We read the end of Joab's life. It is kind of a gruesome affair. He was really destroyed. He was killed by Solomon because of some infractions. He went into the temple and he was called to come out and he would not come out. He would not come out because he knew he was going to go out and he was going to be slain by Solomon. So Solomon sent the sons of one of his servants in and said you go and fall upon him. His blood be upon his own and he held on to the pillars of the temple. Joab wanted to die in the temple.

It comes through in this scripture too. He said to David, why are you doing this? "And Joab said unto the king, Now the Lord thy God add unto the people, how many soever they be, an hundredfold, and that the eyes of my lord the king may see it: but why doth my lord the king delight in this thing?" II Samuel 24:3. Joab was telling David this is not a wise thing to do. Don't count your strength. Your strength is in the Lord. Think about it. In many respects, he was the general of the army. It would have made a lot of sense to him. Let us go find out how strong we are, make sure we are arrayed, make sure the armies are in good order, the men are valiant, the chariots are ready to fight. But even Joab who really of himself wasn't a godly man, gave David a warning.

One of the things we can take from David's life is we should be a lot more attentive in the times when we are faced with temptation, to the exit doors. The door that lets us exit, not the door that keeps us going in to temptation. Because the reality is, when David walked away from that roof when he saw Uriah's wife and the plan came to his mind, he did not have to execute it. There would have been a door of escape. In this one here, Joab warned him. In some respects, we could liken it to brotherly admonition today, couldn't we? He didn't heed the admonition of the general.

I think in another place, maybe it is in the book of the Chronicles where it is recorded and it went through there, Joab became so displeased. It was a disgusting thing to him, what he was doing. I think it tells us that he didn't really go and number all of them. He got so far, about eight or nine months into it which we read. And then he just went back and he gave him a number. Joab knew this was not going to be for good.

Well, the prophet Gad comes to David this time and reveals it. David's heart smote him. He knew what he had done. Once he got that number, it is like it came right out to him. Sometimes that happens in our day and time. It's kind of in human nature. Sometimes people are tempted, they are tempted, they are tempted and then all of a sudden they give in. They fall. It can happen to us. And then they realize the seriousness of it. It is a terrible thing.

I had a young sister say to me at home one time, she just recently married and I asked her how it was going. She said, "Well, it was going good." She said, "but I made an observation." I said, "What was that?" She said, "You know how the devil works? When you are engaged the devil does everything he can to get you together in ways that are improper. Then after you are married, he does everything he can to keep you apart in ways that are filled with conflict." I said, "You know, that is a pretty wise thing." That is how these things work. That is how the flesh works, isn't it? And the devil comes.

That is what happened to David. He was tempted to number the people. Immediately when he got that number, he was smote in his heart. The devil was victor then. He captivated him by that time.

Going back to the key of David, what is the difference here? When it was revealed to him, he did not try to justify himself. He did not rationalize it away one bit. He said something very wise to Gad. He said, "...I am in a great strait..." II Samuel 24:14. He was faced with three extremely unpleasant choices. Loved ones, you and I could have said, well he was given the choice. He could have said well, I will take the one least painful for me. Or, the one shortest in duration. Or, I'm old enough now to flee three months before my enemies. It has happened before. It happened with Saul. The Lord preserved me. It happened with Absalom, the Lord preserved me. I will choose that one. He could have gone through all of that. But the key within his heart and why he was the apple of God's eye, as the scripture tells us, is he said, "...let us fall now into the hand of the Lord; for his mercies are great: and let me not fall into the hand of man." II Samuel 24:14. He was referencing himself. He would not even fall into his own reasoning and rationale, as wise as he might have been. Let me fall into the hand of the Lord. And loved ones, there is the key of David. Our hearts can be moved likewise and we can have that much confidence in the mercies and in the judgment of God in our life.

It is an easy thing, isn't it, to thank the Lord when we are in good health, there is plenty of money in the bank, our families are in good order, our children are fairly obedient and our job is going well. It is very easy, isn't it? There is no praise really, just getting down on our knees and offering a prayer. But how about when we are sick? Or when the things that happen to us are the very things that we wish we never had to face? Can we thank the Lord for the afflictions of life? That really is some of the lessons that we can learn. And the scripture of the key of David is that we

can look and, even as one of the hymn-writers would write, that even our trust is in the Lord and He is able to bless. I am not saying loved ones, I have been able to do it either as quickly and as often in life, but I can say we have learned the lesson that even the troubles and afflictions of life are those things which shape and mold us and can humble us before our God.

That really is the difference between Saul and David and why one of those kingships ended completely and violently at the termination of Saul's kingship. And why David's continues on really unto the hour in which we right now dwell. Because in many respects isn't it true that He was the root of Jesse, the bright and morning star? And of that lineage was brought forth the only begotten Son of God. And it is a lineage not only after the flesh, although the scripture is clear that that was true too, wasn't it? But far more it is a lineage after the circumcision of the heart and the grafting in of the spiritual life.

David was at unity. He was one with the Lord. Obviously he was not a converted man and he shed much blood. But even that he had to pay a consequence for. The times in life when he committed many of those sins, he still had to bear a lifelong consequence for them. He was not able to build the temple. It was in his heart to build that temple. He loved the Lord and he wanted so desperately. He was humble before his God. He said, I live in a house of cedar and the ark of the Lord dwells in a tent. But the Lord would not allow it. It was a consequence that he had to bear life long for the sin of his life.

We read in the scripture in the New Testament, which really speaks of something even as the hymn #181 in the Zion's Harp that we sang together, the unity of brotherhood. It says, "And you hath he quickened, who were dead in trespasses and sins;" Ephesians 2:1. That is speaking to the believer, isn't it? We were dead in sin.

We do live in a day and time, and from time to time I am sure you hear this reminder and exhortation, there is a phrase that has welled up in the nation and it has made its way from time to time into the church, where it talks about sinning daily. Everyone sins daily. Well, if that is the truth, then this scripture is a lie. Because the reality is, we were dead in sin. Now loved ones, if we were dead in sin and then we have been quickened to a new walk of life, we are not called to keep on sinning. We are called to live free from the power of sin, aren't we?

That does not mean we are not tempted. It does not mean that we, from time to time, don't have to look at our life at the end of the day and say I should have spoken differently here. Or I should have handled that better. Or maybe I need to go just because there has been a lukewarmness that has come and to visit with my elder or in our case, with a co-laborer. Sometimes we do too. You know brethren we are brethren among brethren. We can be afflicted with all the same things that every man, woman that dwells upon the face of the earth are afflicted with. And loved ones, we can live a victorious life! We are no longer under the power of sin. And if sin comes back, it is a choice we make.

He says, "And you hath he quickened, who were dead in trespasses and sins;" Ephesians 2:1. And the idea and the concept that we sin daily or that no one really can help themselves is very modern, very convenient - to what? It goes back to that account in David, doesn't it? It is very convenient to the flesh. It is a very fleshly serving kind of religion isn't it? That we can go out and live as we want and walk the edges and skate the edges, whatever the expression. I don't mean to use a common expression, forgive me, but I think you know what I mean. To walk dangerously.

We were visiting last evening about the time we visited a place. It was on the cliffs in the ocean and it was 800 feet straight down. It was a misty, rainy day. We walked on those cliffs. Those cliffs were shale. It was slippery. And I was on edge but I did not go near the edge. I stayed away from that place. I did not want to get close and I wanted to

make sure, some of our children were young at the time, to keep them away from that! But you know there were people at that place and that surf below that ridge was so rough that if anyone fell, they never went and searched for them because it was sheer right into the ocean. There was no way to even get a boat close, the waves just would crash against it, but there where people there on that rainy, misty day on the slippery rock that went over and they put their toes over the edge and they looked down. Lots of them. It was a tourist attraction where we where. I thought, can you imagine?

But people walk that way in the spiritual life too. They do those kind of things. They look over the edge back into the old life or into the beggarly elements of this world. And those people were confident. They did not think they would fall. But every once in awhile it happened. We don't want to be like those people in the spiritual sense, do we? We want to stay back from the edge, danger and destruction. We don't want to fall off into that abyss. We want to stay away and be watchful at the post.

"But God, who is rich in mercy..." Ephesians 2:4. We read of that also, didn't we? David was one who saw the mercy of God. Beloved, we too in our day and time, we need to be merciful. We do not sit in judgment of the people of this world. We should sit in judgment, I do believe, of two things. One is of the action, of those deeds of sin. Our lives, far more than our words should judge the sin of this world. And how is that possible? Only if you and I live free from those things and also, as we are reminded by the Apostle Paul, free from having pleasure in them.

That is why, loved ones, it moves us to just remind ourselves in this day and time of the media all around us. Not only the television but the printed material that comes into our home, obviously all that is available in computers and technology today, the movie theaters, the concerts. And just because they have a label of Christian, what

does it mean? It means it probably is a good tool of deception, isn't it? The devil is not going to try and deceive us by saying this is a wicked thing, come and try it out. He tempts us with those things. But deception will always have a label of something that looks good or something that appears good. That is the tool of deception. There is no deception when someone is tempted by something that is sinful because we are not that foolish are we? We are not stupid. And yet, deception is going to have a label that is good. It is a good thing. It is going to have a label of Christ. It is going to name the name of the Lord.

How do we prevent that in our lives? How do we know? Sometimes people, when we preach about deception or we speak of it or the Word talks about it, a lot of times the question will come up, well how do we know we are not being deceived? Loved ones, I think there is just three things we are given that really is helpful to us.

Number one is the Spirit of God who lives and dwells and abides within your heart, those of us who are converted here. But that is not the full sum and substance of it. We have the Word, don't we? We have the Bible. And those two things need to be in harmony and unity. They need to be in parallel with one another, don't they? But it does not stop there either. And that is what a lot of this chapter is about, because He gives us each other. And when those three things, when the Spirit within me and within you is aligned in harmony and parallel with the Word of God and when the brotherhood, which we enumerate ourselves among, is in line with those two things, in other words when my spirit, the Word of the Lord, and the council of brethren are in unity, we are very well protected then loved ones, from deception. Very well protected. And there is really there a tremendous asset, isn't there? That we are not just resting upon that which is our own thoughts, convictions and spiritual insight. But we have men and women who likewise by the evidence of their life, judge sin in their life because sin does not have dominion of their life. And

that is the greatest evidence.

Sometimes we meet people and they speak good things. But look beyond it. A tree by its fruit will be known. Isn't that what the Lord meant? That there is going to be a lot who say here is Christ and there is Christ. But He wanted us to look at the fruit. That is not to judge someone. That is to observe someone.

I think the other thing we need to be careful that we are continually judging is the doctrine that is around and about us. And I will give an example just for clarity. It certainly comes from our own background and I'm sure you could give examples that come from you. Loved ones, we make no judgment of a soul, do we? No matter what their experience might have been. But something such as infant baptism is a lie, isn't it? And it robs men of salvation. It does not bring them to salvation. And that is not to judge any soul but it certainly is to judge the words of that doctrine. Because there is no foundation in the Bible and it leaves not then room to exhibit the true conversion of life and a promise given from the lips of that soul, not from some proxy couple, but from that soul. Yes, I believe in God. Yes I am at peace with Him. Yes I am at peace with my fellow man and I vow and promise to be faithful and true to Him. So that doctrine we must always judge by the preaching of our pulpits, by the teaching of you brothers and sisters in Sunday school from little on up, by the exhibits of our life. When we are asked to give an account that we give that full and proper account. Not to judge another person. That is God's work. Our work is to be lights and examples of what? Of the truth of God.

"And hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus:" Ephesians 2:6. I can think of no better example of that than what we have experienced together in last evening especially but also throughout the day. I have troubles in my life, difficulties at work, things that concern us and duties to do and all that you do too. But they kind of melted away over the last twenty four hours haven't they? And we have been re-

vived and refreshed in the faith. We sat together in a heavenly place. There won't be trouble there. There won't be trial, temptation, heartache and despair in heaven. And we found somewhat a like experience in coming into the assembly into church.

Again the time in which we live in loved ones, wants to minimize the importance of the church, of the body of believers. You know what I mean. I have confidence, I really can feel within my heart you know exactly that I do not mean the physical structure of a building. But the unity of our lifestyle and the conviction of heart. The love for the Lord and the care and love for one another. The rejoicing that we can renew from time to time, even though we may be a thousand miles apart as we are, reacquaint ourselves. How are things going? To be able to share the burdens of life as well as the joys. To have brethren unknown to us extend the hand. Friendship and concern even to our children yet without the faith. These are things to sit together in heavenly

How important is the brotherhood? I made a comment Wednesday evening before we left to come here. The brother who had the services Wednesday evening referenced the scripture where the Lord talks about "Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" St. Mark 8:37. It really stirred some thoughts within me as I sat by and listened and thought about coming here this weekend and really looked forward to it. I asked the congregation before I left, I realize the Lord was talking about salvation and I don't want to in any way minimize the Word, but it drew a parallel for me, what would we give in exchange for the things that we have as a brotherhood in the church? What would you give in exchange?

Let's talk about something simple: separated seating. It is not common in the worldly churches is it, in nominal Christendom? It once was very common in almost all denominations. But it has been lost. What do you want to give in exchange for that? What would you want to give? I don't think you would

give anything. Or maybe in some respects, you would give everything, wouldn't you? You would give up your own will, your own life. Even the marital relationship and the relationship of mother and father and children is superseded by the relationship of brethren. Would you give up something for that?

You beloved sisters wear a veil in obedience to the Word of God. That is why we do this! It is our way, it is our custom but that is second, isn't it? Because primary is it is obedience to the Word and that is why you have the conviction. What would you give up for that? What would you give up to do away with that black lace veil? Would you give anything? I don't think you would. I trust you wouldn't. I can tell. Our spirit is united. We would not. You would not want to. But from time to time, there wells up round and about us and sometimes even within the walls of Zion, thoughts about those things. And those are just two small examples. But I would not want to give them up. I would not want to see them minimized. I would not want to see them lost and I trust we are in accord and unity in that.

What would we give in exchange for the things that we have within our faith? And that does not mean that we do not have work to do and that there are not things that we could even align ourselves closer to the Word of God. Maybe there is! We trust the Holy Spirit to reveal even that unto you, as the Apostle would write. But that is really what this scripture is telling us. If there is re-alignment to do, it should be re-alignment to the Word.

What did he say further on? "Wherefore remember, that ye being in time past Gentiles in the flesh, who are called Uncircumcision by that which is called the Circumcision in the flesh made by hands; That at that time ye were without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers from the covenants of promise, having no hope, and without God in the world: But now in Christ Jesus ye who sometimes were far off are made nigh by the blood of Christ. For he is our

peace, who hath made both one, and hath broken down the middle wall of partition between us; Having abolished in his flesh the enmity..." Ephesians 2:11-15. These are the things he wrote. Do we read from the scripture that we should strive to become more like the society or the world in which we live in? We should strive to become more and more like the scripture would have us to be, in the image and likeness of the Lord and Master. That is what our striving should be. Not so that we become more acceptable to our society and easier for them to accept us. The middle wall of partition was broken down so that we could become what? Part of the commonwealth, no longer aliens. So if we are no longer aliens to the commonwealth of Israel and we have been united to that commonwealth, where are we aliens?

Loved ones, if we went to another country and we exchanged the citizenship of this land, even if we were born here and we voted here and everything else, for some country in Europe, and we were to come back, we are aliens here then, aren't we? The same is true in a spiritual sense. If we have gone and exchanged our citizenship of this world to become members of that commonwealth of Israel, to be grafted into the body of Christ, we are aliens to world then aren't we? We cannot have a foot in both camps. And we cannot sit on two chairs at the same time, can we? Or as the Master Himself said, "...Ye cannot serve God and mammon." St. Matthew 6:24. It is very binary.

We sang in one of our hymns, "Two ways, O man, are there for thee..." Zion's Harp #106. There is nothing changed in the modern day and time that makes that thought and hymn obsolete. There are two ways and we will choose. And we have, brethren, we have chosen. Let us not forget that. We made a vow and a promise in the waters of baptism. We have been grafted in, we have expressed our testimony and in the spirit of proving we have laid it to the heart of the brotherhood for them to decide. Is it time that I as a soul should be brought forth to the baptism?

Let us remember that concept. That is one of the old paths, too, isn't it? A convert comes and makes application to the brotherhood. They lay a testimony of faith down. It is not an entitlement and right — well, I am ready to be baptized so you are going to hear my testimony and conversion and you better accept it! That is not the Spirit of the old path of the brotherhood, is it? That is not the breaking down of the middle wall of partition. Because there is a wall of pride, isn't there, in that kind of thinking. But are we willing to come humbly and lay the testimony before the hearts of those people whose lives, whose lives, and there is the key, are victorious and able to live free from the power and condemnation of sin? And it is laid to their heart.

Brethren, we need to be merciful. We need to be merciful. The brethren in Rockville, when I laid that testimony, they were very merciful to me. I look back to my days in those times and there were things that I still did that I would not do today. I understand there is time that needs to be. But loved ones, if they would not have been really content, I would not have wanted to press forward. Are we losing some of those foundations, the principals, the precepts -line upon line, precept upon precept - of our faith?

That middle wall of partition is broken down that we can become a citizen of the commonwealth by faith. If so, we will have a wall of partition now between us and the world. We will be aliens to the commonwealth of the society that we up and left, because we exchanged our citizenship of this world for the one that is to come.

In that exchange, it is like sailing across the sea. Some of those of our fore-fathers who did that, they exchanged that citizenship, didn't they? But they had a pilgrimage to make first. They crossed a no-man's land, because no nation or sovereign claims the ocean, do they, even to this day. There is no country or citizen once you get beyond that twelve mile boundary or whatever it is, that says four hundred miles out in

that Atlantic Ocean, that piece of this coordinate belongs to this country and that piece of this coordinate belongs ...it doesn't happen, does it? Our fore-fathers had to sail through a pilgrimage because they exchanged the citizenship of one country for another.

That is what we are in. That is the time of life we are in. We have exchanged our citizenship in this world to be members of the commonwealth of Israel, to be grafted into the body of Christ. We are in a boat traveling together. We are brethren and sisters in the Lord and we are on the journey. We are in the pilgrimage. We don't have any continuing city here and we are not members of this country, so to speak, in the spiritual life. But we do have one another and the Apostle Paul wanted that, didn't he?

"And that he might reconcile both unto God in one body by the cross, having slain the enmity thereby:" Ephesians 2:16. "Now therefore ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellowcitizens with the saints. and of the household of God; And are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone;" Ephesians 2:19,20. And we are! We are founded upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets. That is exactly why we call ourselves Apostolic Christians. Because it is on the foundation of the apostles that we build our church and our lives. Their teachings and their ways, we are built upon those things. We are not any longer fellowcitizens of the country of this world, but now we are members of the household of faith.

The Apostle goes on here and just in conclusion, these thoughts. "In whom

all the building fitly framed together ... " Ephesians 2:21. Now loved ones, we all live in some kind of abode, some kind of house. How do you want the joints and tenens and the mortises of that building to be built? If you hired a contractor, how do you want that fit together? Do you want it tight? Do you want it square? Do you want it aligned properly? Do you want it to fit well? How about a cabinet? If you had a kitchen cabinet and were putting in new cabinets, would you want the joints of that to have an 1/8th inch gap in some and 1/4 inch gap in another and one right up against it nice and tight, you could not hardly see the joint? Would you accept that in the building that you dwell in? Are we fitly framed together as individuals with one another? I am talking about how we live, how we worship and how we speak, the things we believe in and hold precious. Are we fit together like the joints of a house?

How about congregation to congregation? We have work to do there, don't we? It cannot be denied. We would be foolish if we tried to cover it up. We have a lot of work to do in that area. But it does not mean we despair and give up. We plane a little here and prune a little there and we press on. We keep that part for which we are building fitly framed together, square, tightly joined, grafted in.

We talked about that. The Apostle talks about that too, being grafted in. I have never really done it. One of our brothers at home is kind of an orchardist. He has a lot of trees and he does that kind of work, grafting. I asked him to show it to me one time. You could hardly tell. He cut that and laid that graft in that mother tree, or whatever it

is really called, it is probably not the right term. But it fit right in there! Why? So that air could not get in there to disturb the flow of the nutrients from that tree that had to go in to keep that branch alive.

How does that relate to us? We need to be close to the church, close to the brotherhood, aligned in our life to one another. To embrace the things of that root tree that is firmly planted. Loved ones, if we really look into these things with a spiritual eye, we can gain from them in our day and time. Just like the first century church gained from the writings of the apostles when they first read this letter that came to them in Ephesus. May God give us grace and might we be fitly framed together, an holy temple.

"In whom ye also are builded together (listen to this, loved ones, we have experienced this, haven't we, together) for an habitation of God through the Spirit." Ephesians 2:22. We want our lives together, our church, our worship service, our communion service to be a habitation of God, through the Spirit. Might we be inspired and live such that in our homes, in our hearts, in our assemblies that God can find a place of habitation through the presence of His Holy Spirit.



The intended article on Benedict Weyeneth will be delayed until next month. Because the General Conference was held in August, the following essay discusses the concept of church conferences, both in the past and today.

Conference Time

In late July and early August, millions of Americans lamented the drop in the stock market. As multitudes depended on the affection for things that are seen (i.e., material), a worrisome countenance lingered.

At the same time – and particularly as the week of August 5 drew near – hundreds of brethren, whose focus was things unseen (i.e., spiritual) – left their earthly cares and traveled to Rockville, CT. They traveled hundreds and thousands of miles. One dear brother (wheelchair confined) drove all the way from Oregon. Their motive was to attend the annual church conference (August 7-9).

The contrast – material verses spiritual – was striking. From a spiritual perspective, brethren looked to the stability and promises of God for their help and consolation, not to the market or to the marketplace. The Word teaches, "Set your affection on things above, not on the things of the earth (Col. 3:2).

Historical Precedent

Coming together to "confer" is an ongoing tradition. Already in the book of Acts precedent was set to discuss matters affecting the church; and in our specific heritage brethren came together (under Bro. Samuel Froehlich), and subsequently, to address problems and opportunities.

In 1842 — during a schism in Europe, brethren met, and Bro. Froehlich wrote a circular letter to all the churches warning the believers of false teachings that affected the brethren.

Also, in the late 1840's, a brother meeting was convened to send Bro. Benedict Weyeneth, 29, to upstate New York to counsel with a group of Mennonites. His advice to them: They must repent, and be baptized by immersion. One-half of the

church followed him. Subsequently, our first American church was established in Lewis County, New York, in 1847.

Periodic Meetings

In the early years, our elders met only to address specific problems. For instance, during World War I, they met to decide on an official church name to list with governmental authorities so our young men could enter the army as non-combatants (i.e., not bearing arms).

In Europe, our church name was Evangelical Baptist. In America, our elders were reluctant to use that name because of a "Baptist" identification. Our leaders had difficulties with a few Baptist doctrines – foremost among them being eternal security, faith "alone" and individual autonomy (authority). They felt it was unwise to affiliate with those theological distinctives. So they chose the name "Apostolic Christian" because they followed the teachings of Christ and the Apostles.

As time wore on and travel became easier, elders met more often. Moreover, as worldly exposures became more pronounced, the elder brethren began meeting annually; and then semi-annually. A General Conference (with lay brothers and sisters present) is now held each year.

Coming Together

The anticipation of attending a Conference lingers in one's heart for weeks and months. Arriving at the cite generates a special feeling of gratitude and expectation. It is a quest for eternal things. The desire is for simple unseen things. It's seeking the things that far exceed our pocketbooks, our balance sheets, and our earthly securities. It's the simplicity of meeting and greeting believers of like precious faith - who have had a common repentance and conversion experience, and who walk in a common self-denial and separation from the world. We find courage in fellowshipping with others who strive to walk on the narrow way.

Coming into the Rockville church or supper on Thursday evening and meeting loved ones and then joining in the beautiful singing(s) amounted to a treasure that money can't buy.

Listening

It was a heavenly place to be sitting on Friday morning when the General Conference began. As the elder brethren filed into the assembly at 8:50 a.m., and a thousand voices sang from the Zion's Harp, a feeling of oneness permeated the gathering. It was a blessed and joyous time. Such uplifting times made the long drive worthwhile.

Sitting through the kindly exhortations of 12 Spirit-led speakers gave encouragement to the listeners. Indeed, our spiritual armour was polished and the sword of the Spirit became sharper. The unspoken theme was faithfulness to the end.

A vivid thought among many is that we must "preserve" and "promote" the faith. Along with this, we must "practice" the faith. There is a correlation between doctrine and order. The order (practice) reflects a concrete illustration of the doctrine. Over time, if the order falters – or the way broadens – the doctrine becomes vulnerable. History instructs us in this.

The Future

If the Lord tarries, the next generation(s) will benefit by the beliefs and strongholds that have preceded it. If we are faithful now, our offspring's faith, and its implementation, will rest on a more stable/secure foundation.

The precedents of holiness in our faith have been well established. The elder brothers are asking us to hold fast to our Biblical applications (standards) without wavering. Our task is to "obey them". We truly thank God for all their unseen efforts and labors for God's people. In humility, and by God's grace, let us keep the faith – the practice of the faith, now and always.

"What's The Good Of It?"

We may be apt to say about many activities, "There is no harm in it." However, there is another way of thinking, and that is, "What's the good of it?" This is prompted by the scripture, "Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatever ye do, do all to the glory of God." (I Cor. 10:31)

There is a danger that we may become too strict, to the extent that we are opposed to playing catch ball with our children, or opposed to potluck suppers for believers. However, I believe we can truthfully say that such activities are for good. They build excellent human relations. which is one of the most difficult issues we face in life. Let's strive to have good human relations among ourselves, and insofar as possible, with all men. "Follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord." (Hebrews 12:14)

We attempt, by our church memorandum and word of mouth, to help determine what is for good and what might be better left out of our lives. It is also important that we think about, "Good for whom, ourselves or others?" and "Good for the body, or good for the soul?"

The Bible teaches that we have been crucified with Christ, "Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him.""(Romans 6:6). If I understand it correctly, this means that doing something for self-gratification is out for the believer. We should be concerned for others and then we ourselves will be greatly blessed by God. If we seek our own pleasure, we probably will never find it. Therefore, an important question to be asked, is, "Is this doing anybody any good?" which is a little different from the question, "What's the good for it?" The former question tends to point to others.

In regard to what's good for the body and what's good for the soul, the welfare of our soul is more important. "And fear not them which kill the body but are not able to kill the soul." (Matthew 10:28). But this doesn't mean that we should forget about whether something is good or bad for our bodies. "If any man defile the temple of God, him shall God destroy; for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are." (I. Cor. 3:17)

Doesn't it follow then, that what we put into our bodies should be based on whether or not it is good for our bodies, not on whether we like the taste or not? In this area also, we need to ask the question, "What's the good for it?"

These questions have been asked in the past and as a result we are more active in sharing God's Word with others and with helping others who are poor and hungry. We better keep asking these questions and improve in all areas of doing good, for the soul and for the body, for others and for ourselves. Let's ask, "What's the good of it?"
