

Sermon by Brother Don Sinn, Silverton, OR Isaiah 9:1-7 and St. Matthew 1:18-25 and 2:1-12

We don't read in this account of the shepherds abiding in the fields. In the Gospel of St. Luke we can read of that. How that glorious night when Jesus Christ was born into this world, the angels did sing and did announce His birth unto the shepherds there, saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." St. Luke 2:14. But I think all of us know the story. All of us have heard it and we sang it most all of our lives. We have heard those beautiful carols announcing and telling us again the old story.

Loved ones, we rejoice in this day because it was the beginning of the salvation for us. It was the beginning. But the more important part we all know was when the Lord concluded His work here on this earth and hung on Calvary's cross, shedding His blood for us. Making an atonement for our sins. That is why He came and that is why He was sent by the Father. Every one of us here today have so much to be thankful for in this because we had no way of salvation. We had no way that we could find a way back to God. Because we had sinned and we had gone astray. As Isaiah said, "All we like sheep have gone astray..." Isaiah 53:6. We had no way that we could be reconciled again with God. We could not do good deeds. We could not walk in the light of the law because we had already failed. Sin had already come into our lives and spoiled it. So we needed a Saviour. One that was able to once and for all take away our sins. All the blood of goats and of bulls and of all those things that foreshadowed Jesus Christ, that the Jewish people kept as God's priests, and revealed to the world that there would need to be sacrifice for the remission of sin, all those things were concluded there in the coming of Jesus Christ as that perfect lamb, that sacrifice for us.

We read together how He came. He came as a babe. I believe it said there in Isaiah, "...unto us a child is born..." Isaiah 9:6. So He was born and we read the account how it actually came to pass so many hundreds of years later that He was born there in Bethlehem. But it does not stop there because Isaiah said, "...the government shall be upon his shoulder ... " Isaiah 9:6. The government shall be upon his shoulder ...we think, the government. Most of us think of government as having a president and a legislature and congress as we have in this country. Maybe a kingdom where there is a king that is over all, which was common in that time. We think of someone that rules. We think of someone that has authority - absolute authority. Someone that is able to grant the needs of the people. Jesus Christ is our King, isn't He? He came here to be the head of the government, the government of all His people. The government of Christianity. He is the king of it, the leader, the ruler.

The other name was given to Him. He says, "...shall be called Wonderful..." Isaiah 9:6. How many of us today know Him as Wonderful? I think every one of us that have been baptized in the precious blood of Jesus and have received that peace that He gives us in our heart, we know Him as Wonderful because He is wonderful to us. He can be wonderful to every one of you today. He is Wonderful. There is no other thing, person, place that is wonderful in the sense of this here. We use that term sometimes lightly. But really, wonderful - that is Jesus.

Then, loved ones, He is a "...Counsellor..." Isaiah 9:6. He is the one we go to for help. His Word directs us. It reveals to us the way to heaven. It tells us what we are. It tells us what we need to do to be right again with God. He is our Counselor. No better counselor can we have. Many of us have sought counsel of others; our parents, our friends. Sometimes in school we have counselors, those that can direct us into things which will be good for us. But loved ones, there is no counselor like Jesus Christ. His coun-

There were ninety and nine that safely lay In the shelter of the fold, But one was out on the hills away, Far off from the gates of gold Away on the mountains wild and bare, Away from the tender Shepherd's care.

"The Ninety and Nine", Tabernacle Hymns, p. 231

How many saved souls are enough? How many lost souls are too many? No doubt if someone would tell us on a Sunday afternoon that by the next Sunday morning there would be ninety-nine converts in our congregation during that week we could hardly believe it. If it actually came to pass, we would be almost overcome with joy.

But how long would it take after we heard of that large number before we would think of one more dear soul - perhaps from our own family - who was still away from the tender Shepherd's care? How long would it be before we acknowledge that there are more souls who desperately need a Savior? Until all are saved it is not enough. If there is one soul lost, it is too many.

What is our duty and how do we go about seeking the lost? It would seem as though there are two issues here - the duty of the saved to seek the lost and a willingness of the lost to be found.

Jesus set the example for all of us to follow in seeking the lost. He very clearly explained His mission to His disciples. "For the Son of man is come to save that which was lost" (Mt. 18:11). He also explained to the Pharisees that it was necessary to go to those who are in need. The Pharisees criticized Jesus because He ate with publicans and sinners, something which they felt was beneath their dignity. Jesus said "... They that be whole need not a physician, but they that are sick...for I am not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance" (Mt. 9:12-13). Although we do need to seek those who are lost, we must be careful that we do not go to places which may cause us to sin. Jesus warned us that we should not "...cast ye your pearls before swine,..." (Mt. 7:6).

How much effort is one soul worth? Again, we have an answer from Jesus, "I say unto

you, that likewise joy shall be in heaven over one sinner that repenteth,..." (Lk. 15:7). He also said "For what is a man advantaged, if he gain the whole world, and lose himself, or be cast away" (Lk.9:25)?

Therefore, we can readily understand that Jesus' mission was to seek the lost, and He placed the value of one soul above all other things. There is nothing of the material world that is worth gaining at the risk of losing our soul.

As Jesus sent His disciples out to preach the Word, He emphasized the importance of spreading the gospel. He said "...The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few:.." (Lk. 10:2j. After His resurrection, Jesus gave His disciples the Great Commission: "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost:" (Mt. 28:19).

Does this mean that all of us who are saved should go to the foreign mission field? The scripture makes it very clear that we have different gifts and different callings. "And God hath set some in the church, first apostles, secondarily prophets, thirdly teachers, after that miracles, then gifts of healings, helps, governments, diversities of tongues" (I Cor. 12:28). This does not mean that some have less value than others. We just have different functions. "For the body is not one member, but many...God set the members every one of them in the body, as it hath pleased him...those members of the body,... which seem to be more feeble, are necessary ... and our uncomely parts have more abundant comeliness" (I Cor. 12:14-23).

How can brethren safely, effectively serve God and seek the lost? In the 1993 Memorandum the following points were explained as they relate to the missionary policy of the Apostolic Christian Church:

- We encourage the sharing of God's Word by all members of our church with anyone who has an interest in reading it.

- We encourage all members to invite their friends, neighbors and associates to our churches.

- We encourage members who find it feasible, to move to existing Apostolic Christian communities, especially those that are small. - We encourage, especially where there is a nucleus of brethren and/or friends, the starting of new churches in areas within the United States.

- We encourage those of our members who feel a calling to assist in the establishment of Apostolic Christian Churches in foreign countries to work cooperatively with the Elder Body and the Mission Committee. For those who have this calling it is necessary that they teach, through their words and lives, the same doctrine as our church, and work separately from other groups or faiths.

We can see therefore, that the responsibility and the opportunity to seek the lost are great. We who have been fortunate enough to hear the message of salvation must be willing to share it.

What is the responsibility of those who are lost? They must be willing and they must be available. In the aforementioned hymn the lost sheep made its whereabouts known. "Out in the desert He heard its cry, Sick and helpless, and ready to die;" (Verse 3). The lost must not run away and hide. It was only after the prodigal son was willing to humble himself and start home that "...his father saw him, and had compassion, and ran, and fell on his neck, and kissed him" (Lk. 15:20).

Unfortunately, not all lost souls are willing to be helped. The rich young man was available, but not willing. When Jesus told him how he could be saved "...he went away sorrowful: for he had great possessions" (Mt. 19:22). The price was too great and, at least at that time, the young man passed up the opportunity for salvation. Jesus did not run after him and try to negotiate a different offer. He was always available to those in need, but He did not alter the plan of salvation to make it suit the young man's desires.

We have a great responsibility to share the gospel. The lost have a responsibility to receive it. God has called us to serve Him in many ways. The rich fellowship into which we were born affords us incomprehensible opportunities that cannot be taken for granted. Jesus said "...unto whomsoever much is given, of him shall be much required..." (Lk. 12:48).

A Congregation Begins In Denver, Colorado

Down through the years there had been some interest in establishing an Apostolic Christian Church in Denver. When this was brought up by Elder Bro. Nathan Steffen of Elgin, IL at the Elder Conference in August 1979, it was pointed out that Sis. Katherine Ries from Akron, OH was living near her daughters in Colorado Springs and that there were several friends that were living in the area and some of them were interested in having a Church nearby.

Permission granted for a survey

The Elder Body gave permission to survey the various congregations and see how much interest there was in having Apostolic Christian Church services in the Denver area and appointed a committee consisting of Elder Bros. Nathan Steffen (Elgin, IL), Leo Moser(Lester, IA) and Bro. Tom Leman (Elgin, IL).

Report given to Elder Body

A survey was done and presented to the Elder Body at the Winter Conference in January 1980. At this time permission was given to hold services in Denver during the summer of 1980. Bro. Nathan Steffen visited the Denver area one weekend to search for a suitable site in which to hold the services. The Victory Grange Hall in Aurora was rented for Sundays through the summer.

First services June 1980

The first services in Denver were held on the first Sunday of June 1980. Brother Charles Sauder of Tremont was in charge of the first service. Services were held each Sunday throughout that summer. Attendance ranged from about 24 to a high of about 90. Permission was given by the Elder Body to continue services during the winter. Services were held the third Sunday of each month. Later permission was given to again hold services each Sunday during the summer of 1981. Bro. Tom Leman and his family spent the summer in Aurora to help give some continuity to the services. That fall Bro. Steve Scheitlin (Elgin, IL) moved out to go to school at Colorado State University in Fort Collins.

Regular services begin

In February 1982, Sisters Barb Unzicker and Sue Esterling moved out from Peoria, IL. Vera Jivan, who had been with the Sister Church, gave her testimony in March and was brought into the Church. In June 1982 Bro. Doug Hohulin (Roanoke) moved out for a summer job and stayed in the area.

Ministering Bro. Tom Leman and his family moved out to Denver in June 1982 to become the first resident minister. On November 20, 1982 Elizabeth Jivan gave her testimony and was brought into the Church. The first communion service in the Denver church was held following the proving.

Church building purchased

The group bought a Church at 280 S. Revere in Aurora. March 6th 1983 the first services were held in this church. Brethren from across the land came to help with the remodeling. Dedication Services were held by Elder Bros. Sam Anliker (Lamont, KS) and Nathan Steffen (Elgin, IL).

Current ministers

The current ministers are: Bros. Tom Leman, Mike Leman, and Nathan Lehman. On September 21, 2000, after serving as the Elder for Denver for twenty years, Bro. Nathan Steffen (Elgin, IL) retired and Bro. John Lehman (Bern, KS) was appointed to be the Elder at Denver. On August 7, 2002 Bro. Mike Leman was approved as Elder by the Elder Body and was ordained September 29, 2002.

New facilities being sought

The Denver church is currently in negotiations with a property owner and with the city of Aurora to purchase a small piece of land on which to build a new church building. The new site is approximately 2 miles south and 4 miles east of the present building.

Size of the congregation

The current congregation consists of 46 brothers and sisters, who live here full time, and 4 brothers and sisters spending 2-6 months of the summer season with us. The average attendance, not counting visitors, is 85-90. The congregation is wide-spread. While most live within ¹/₂ hour from Church others live in Greeley, the Longmont area, Winter Park, Jefferson and west of Colorado Springs.

Areas of interest

The Denver area has a varied economic base and down through the years there have been many job opportunities here. We would invite brothers and sisters seeking employment to consider this area. Denver is the gateway to many scenic attractions in the mountains of Colorado. Visitors are always welcome and appreciated.

Medical-Dental Missions in Mexico

She slowly walked toward our "tent" clinic. Her steps were pain-fully slow. Lines of age graced her face and could not hide the many laborious and exhausting yesterdays. The tattered rubber treaded shoes were past wearing and offered no comfort to two swollen, sore and infected feet. As she faced our group, words were not needed and her grimaces broke the language barrier. She was a Tarahumara Indian of the Copper Canyon to whom daily life remains a struggle to survive.

Without even giving a second thought, one of our nurses gently bent down, took off the worn shoes, wiped the dust off her feet and proceeded to wash, massage and cleanse each open sore. The overgrown nails were cut and trimmed and lotion applied to her feet and legs. Overcome with compassion, this nurse then removed her own shoes and socks and gently placed them on this sweet little elderly woman. It was no accident that the shoes fit.

"If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet; ye also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you." JOHN 13:14-15

Jesus set the example for all of us to go into the world serving God, serving each other, and serving all people who need to hear the message of salvation...and this very thing is what happens on a medical-dental mission to Mexico.

The need for medical and dental care extends way beyond the borders of America. Medical-Dental teams are taken twice a year to Mexico. It is here in the Copper Canyon and Juarez that we work with the poor. These medical-dental teams have been in existence since 1986 and a love bond that is indescribable has been formed and united with this country.

The team to Juarez, Mexico provides medical-dental care to the Mexicans who live in the colonias around the outskirts of the city. They live in poverty both in physical and spiritual ways. Each day the team sets out and goes to different areas to set up work sites and clinics outside. We also set up in very remote places, on city streets, in government buildings, and even in the big Juarez prison. The average day includes treating 600-900 people.

The team to the Copper Canyon (in the interior of Mexico) is the home of the Tarahumara Indians. They are known as the "Running Indians" and actually live in caves scattered all throughout this amazing canyon. Many hours of travel each day on bumpy, unpaved roads are a reality when we set up clinics. Some of these Indians have never seen dentists, doctors; furthermore, they have close to nothing to call their very own. Their way of life includes making and selling crafts and growing their own food supply. It is here we see and treat approximately 400-700 people.

There is a job for everyone. The day starts with prayer and devotions. Then we are taken to the sites (planned months before) to set up our "pop-up clinics". It is here that medical services are rendered. The people line up and wait all day if necessary. First off, vital signs are checked, patients screened, and then the gospel of truth is given to them while they wait. Spanish Bibles and children's Bible stories (all bought by World Relief) are distributed. There is a Bible school area set up for the children so they can listen and color Bible pictures. Then the people are seen by doctors (American and Spanish), and nurse practitioners. Nurses cleanse and dress wounds, check blood sugars and perform any other procedures needed. There are also areas set up for diet teaching, physical therapy, health education and a pharmacy.

However, the real drawing card is the health maintenance area. It is here that health kits (provided by World Relief) are distributed along with beans, rice, clothes, toys, layettes, and various other needed items. In the dental area rotten teeth are cleaned, scaled, and sometimes pulled. Dental classes are given to the children as they wait to have their teeth cleaned.

Why do we go? What good is just one week in Mexico? What difference can be made? All these questions can be answered with the example of Jesus. Our redeemer did miracles to draw people unto Him and show them the love of the Father. One simple act of love will reap a harvest beyond what we see. Through just one act of love, someone, somewhere, will be touched by the Spirit and find our God.

On both sides of the border lives are touched forever. We truly believe that there is a very unique and incomprehensible blessing for all who not only agree that humble service is Christ's way, but also go forth and do it.

Occasionally at our larger home, Timber Ridge, there are groups of children or civic organizations that ask for tours. Because of the size of Timber Ridge, it is not as intrusive to have groups visit. Often the reason for a group to request a tour is educational. When we do accommodate groups, we try to keep in mind Jesus' words in Matthew 7:12. Jesus said, "Therefore all things whatsoever ve would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them." Therefore we try to maintain standards of privacy and confidentiality. This is our residents' home. We also want others to view our friends who live in our facilities as interesting people with whom to interact, no matter the level of challenges. One of the points in our mission statement reads, "Believing all people have dignity and potential". We try to communicate this vision because of Jesus' words.

At times when children (such as Sunday School or Home School groups) have come, we gave given information to these children on how to interact with people who have mental retardation. We might discuss how to start a conversation with some residents, what to do if you do not receive a response, if you don't understand the response or how to end a conversation with some residents. These tips and others can help us to remember that we want to treat others just as we would want to be treated. It makes us wonder, in what ways do we interact with people in our lives? Do we reflect Biblical values in our conversations with all people with whom we interact?

sel is truth, verity, righteousness. He can show us the way through the maze, the darkness of this world even to heaven.

His name also is "...The mighty God..." Isaiah 9:6. The Mighty God do we ever think about that? Jesus and God are one. In another place we read there, in Matthew it said, "...and they shall call his name Emmanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us." St. Matthew 1:23. Emmanuel, which is God with us. God in the flesh - Jesus Christ. A mystery, the Trinity. But loved ones, He is God. He came as God in the flesh. One with God, He told us. Doing only the things that God would want Him to do. Saying only those things. Jesus Christ is equal and is God with us. He is God in the flesh. So loved ones, let us rejoice in that we don't just deal with someone that has not power. We don't deal with a king that is still under another. But we deal with God. God with us. Emmanuel. Jesus Christ.

Then He is also called "...The everlasting Father..." Isaiah 9:6. Not just to stop at Calvary, not just to conclude His work and perish. But everlasting. Without beginning, without end. Jesus Christ. It had been revealed to them that this was for a king. They went to talk to Herod. He did not know anything about it. He deceitfully told them, "...Go and search diligently for the young child; and when ye have found him, bring me word again, that I may come and worship him also." St. Matthew 2:8. We know how Herod dealt with the children of that land a short time later, thinking he could stamp out a competitor, killing all the children in that area.

We see how that star led them on until it says, "...till it came and stood over where the young child was." St. Matthew 2:9. They followed the light. They followed that light. They kept their eye on it. They put aside their homeland, their wives, their families and they headed out to see Jesus. That is what we have to do today, too. That is how we make our beginning, loved ones. We follow that light of Jesus Christ and we come to the light. Then we are wise men and women. Then we truly can be called wise, because herein alone is truth. Herein alone is something of value beyond anything we can have in this world. These men recognized that and they came and it was revealed to them. God did not leave them in darkness any longer, did He? He did not shut the light off. He did not take away the star, even after they went and enquired of Herod. He gave them that light. He led them to that place where Jesus was. They found Him, didn't they?

It says they did not just come in and say, "Oh, here He is", did they? No. They bowed before Him. They humbled themselves before Emmanuel -God with us. They humbled themselves. We do that in repentance, loved ones. We humbly come to Jesus at the foot of the cross where He shed His blood, trusting in that blood. We come to Him and find our peace, our redemption. We find our forgiveness. And then, loved ones, we bring also the gifts, as these men so many years ago brought these precious gifts - precious gifts.

I often think about that because as little children, we don't have money maybe. We start feeling we would like to do something for our parents. Christmas day comes and we know

Mom and Dad are going to be buying us presents. I remember as a young child feeling sometimes, I just want to do something for Mom and Dad. I would like to buy them something but I don't have any money. I remember going and talking to Mom and saying, "Mom, I want to get you something." And I remember her telling me, "Well, you just give me a kiss here and be a good boy. That is the best present you can give me."

That is what we want to think about when we talk about our heavenly Father. What can we give God, who owns everything, can make everything, who created the world and everything we have and are? But there is a little song that says, "What shall I give Him, poor as I am? If I was a shepherd I would give Him a lamb. (That is not anything, is it?) If I was a wise man, I would do my part. What shall I give Him? I'll give my heart." That is what we need to give. We need to come to Jesus Christ in love. He gives us a kiss of peace, doesn't He? Give Him our life. Then, loved ones, we receive that peace. That is when we receive that peace which we read about here today. That is what is so important in our lives, isn't it? Peace the absence of turmoil, the absence of strife. The absence of war, fightings, doubtings, fears, tremblings.

It is one of those precious words in our English language, isn't it, this peace? It can come into our souls and then we can truly enjoy our life here and the life to come. We can truly know that the star we are following, the star of hope, the star of faith will lead us to see Jesus again. We see Him and we know Him in the Spirit. But someday we will see Him face to face the Bible tells us, if we continue following and don't turn back and don't give up.

We read together, too, of how the wise men had come and found Him in a house. So we know it was probably some time after He was actually born. It was not on the same night, necessarily. Because already Mary and Joseph had found a house. We know that all the inns and the homes were taken when they came until that one inn keeper gave them a place to rest, a place that at least was out of the weather there in the manger. A lowly place, wasn't it? We would say today, He is in a barn. Born in a barn. I do not think any king or ruler today would look back and want to reveal that fact that they were that humble and meek. But Jesus Christ is humble and meek.

We love it when we see true meekness and true humility, don't we? We see that in little children and that is why they are so precious. Because they can show us what true humility and true meekness is. Jesus showed us perfection in that because He was meek and humble even after He became an adult. How many of us today can really feel that we are always meek and we are always humble? I think about myself and I know all or at least part of the pride and the arrogance and the things that rise up within us. And I cannot say that. I would like to be. I would like to be like Jesus. I would like to be able to really, truly always be like Him.

So we keep following the star, don't we? Even sometimes it seems to flicker before us, the little light that leads us on to Him. But if we keep our eyes tuned to it, we don't take our eyes off it, they cannot be clouded, they cannot be side tracked by other lights that might even be brighter and appear to be brighter, that come into our lives. We cannot become disappointed, discouraged if our effort and our goal is to follow the light.

Let us be careful, loved ones, today. Because we live in a time of affluence. We live in a time where we can buy each other all the goods of the world. Many of us have a lot of them in our homes. We surely don't want them to

keep us from occupying our proper place with a group of pilgrims that are following the light, do we? Nor do we want to have them keep us from seeing clearly the light, because their glamour and their light is blinding us. Then we would fall back into the place where it says the land of Zebulun and Naphtali was in. Where dimness would be coming over our eyes and darkness would be once more a part of us. I think, loved ones, all of us that know Jesus Christ as Wonderful, as our Counsellor, as our Prince of Peace; I think all of us know that Jesus Christ is the light we want to follow. He is the One that we want to eventually see. Because He alone gives us the promise of eternity. Everything else we have, everything else we can buy will fade away, will rust, will corrupt. Jesus does not. Jesus never fails. He will never fail us.

So loved ones, as we think about this today and we rejoice together, let us keep our hearts joyful because of the promise, because of the hope, because of the joy that we have in Jesus, not in the things of the world. Even if we are little children here today, even if we have had many presents we have gotten at home - Mom and Dad have fulfilled a lot of our desires providing for us, providing us something to do to enjoy ourselves - let us not forget Jesus. If we follow Jesus, we can have that promise that our soul shall rise from the graves, if it be that it lieth there, and shall join our loved ones that are there also. What a light, what a glory, what a splendor that will be when He comes again! Loved ones, we will be so thankful that we have followed the light, as the wise men of old. That we have seen His star. Not only saw it, but followed it. May God give us grace today that every one of us would fix our eyes on that star and follow it.



The data below consists of a variety of historical facts. On occasion, the "Remembering" column will feature miscellaneous topics that are not necessarily related.

Thanksgiving

On November 28 our nation celebrated "Thanksgiving". A special day has been set aside since 1863 for Americans to give thanks (to God). As we reflect on the general concept of giving thanks, there are a host of things to be thankful for, not the least of which is religious freedom. We are able to assemble without fear of governmental persecution. The constitution of the United States guarantees the right for each citizen to worship according to individual conscience. There is no mandate to support a state church. The right to worship freely is a wonderful blessing.

For true believers in Christ, this has not always been the case. The early church suffered terrible persecutions. Our Anabaptist forbearers had to endure harsh persecution in the 16th century. This resulted, however, in the movement's growth.

When our church denomination was founded in Switzerland, government authorities did not take kindly to the establishment of any group that pulled away from the state church. They were sometimes hounded by police.

Bro. Samuel Froehlich was dismissed from the Swiss State Church for preaching an evangelical doctrine, and for refusing to adopt the practice of infant baptism. He and his dedicated brethren in the 1830's and 1840's were harassed for preaching from the Bible and advocating adult baptism (based on faith, repentance and conversion).

They vowed to each other they would keep the faith, "whatever the cost might be." The early days (in Switzerland, etc.) were not always easy as evidenced by the following:

—Once in 1837, Bro. Froehlich conducted a worship meeting from 2:30 a.m. until 6:00 a.m. to escape the attention of civil authorities.

—Night meetings (in secret) were not uncommon. Once, during 1841 at Teufenthal, brothers and sisters were together from midnight until 5:30 a.m.

—On April, 1842, Bro. Froehlich came to Hauptwil to visit a newborn son. He was thrown in jail overnight.

—In 1843, Bro. Froehlich was expelled from Zurich and labeled a "dangerous sectarian".

An American Jailing

In America, due to constitutional protection, civil persecution was virtually nonexistent, save for misunderstandings growing out of noncombatant military service during both World Wars. A jailing of brethren took place at Macon, GA, during World War I.

This incident happened when Elder Barthol Rapp (Morton, IL) and Bro. Gustave Bucher (Gridley, IL) went to visit boys from church serving at Camp Wheeler near Macon. These two men went to hold worship services for those serving in the Army.

They gathered in a room in Hotel Lanier in downtown Macon. About 20 or so soldiers and the two older brothers crowded themselves into a room. They locked the door and pulled the shades. German hymnals were handed out and singing began (in the German language); this at a time when our nation was at war with Germany.

The sounds of German singing soon wafted through the halls and down to the main lobby. Bystanders were offended. Police were summoned, and police broke up the meeting – and marched the entire group down to the nearest police station and jailed them. In their defense, the group indicated that General Leroy S. Lyon, of Camp Wheeler, had approved the meeting. City authorities were able to confirm this, and the men were released.

A headline in the *Macon Daily Telegraph* read, "German Religious Services Broken Up By The Police." The article went on to explain that permission had been granted, but the local civilian police were not notified.

Gridley, Illinois

News of this arrest soon traveled north. In Gridley, Illinois, townspeople heard of the jailing – for soldiers singing in German at a time when that nation was our enemy – and a reaction occurred. One Saturday night a group from town scrawled (in yellow paint) the slogan, "NO MORE GERMAN" on the front of the church. When the brethren arrived at church the next morning they were stunned, and became fearful. This incident resulted in switching over to the English language in worship, after having used German since the church was established in 1870.

Bro. Froehlich's Appeals to the State



"Christ Was Made Perfect" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

The idea that Christ needed to be made perfect is probably as big a shock to you as it was to me. Nevertheless, in Hebrews 5:9 we read, "And being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him." This insinuates that at some time, there was something about Christ that was less than perfect.

At Christmas we celebrate the birth of the perfect Son of God. who was born as a babe in Bethlehem some 2,000 years ago. I am willing to be taught as to what the verse in Hebrews means, but it may be that any imperfection was in the human body in which He came to dwell. Certainly His spirit was perfect because He was equal with God. John 5:18, "Therefore the Jews sought the more to kill him, because he not only had broken the Sabbath, but said also that God was his Father, making himself equal with God."

When it was decided that the Son of God would become a human being, there was risk involved. The human body is subject to temptation differently than a spirit is subject to temptation. At least Christ was tempted very severely for 40 days and 40 nights as recorded in Luke 4:2, "Being forty days tempted of the devil." Evidently, Christ could have yielded to the temptations of the devil. He was not preprogrammed to be victorious over all temptation. This involved a risk. Hebrews 4:15 reads, "But was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin."

In Hebrews 5:7 we read that Christ, "Offered up prayers and supplications with strong crying and tears." This sounds like His experience in the Garden of Gethsemane. The next verse says, "Yet learned he obedience by the things which he suffered." Maybe we also, have to learn obedience by the things which we suffer.

When Christ came to earth He escaped being under the curse of sin because of the virgin birth. However, His situation was similar to that of Adam and Eve in that He was subject to temptation. However, this second Adam stood the test and was made perfect by resisting all temptation. Romans 5:19 reads, "For as by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one shall many be made righteous." Christ in the flesh was not perfect in the sense that His earthly body was subject to temptation. However, He did win the battle with

Satan and we are very thankful for that. We, also, need to persevere and win the battle with Satan, thus fulfilling Christ's commandment, "Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect." (Matthew 5:48)

Yes, Christ was not automatically perfect as a human being. He struggled and suffered, by virtue of which He was made perfect. What a Saviour!
