Sermon by Brother Tom Waldbeser, Atlanta, GA I Chronicles 29 and Ephesians 2

"In whom all the building fitly framed together growth unto an holy temple in the Lord:" Ephesians 2:21. As I read that verse, my mind made a connection with the account we read in the Old Testament, the last chapter there in I Chronicles, the end of David's life. If we would have read a few preceding chapters, we would have seen David had a strong desire to build a temple unto the Lord. In fact he started collecting the supplies and so on. He had a desire to do that and yet God told David that it was not in his place to build the temple. It would be Solomon's, a man of peace whereas David had been a man of war.

As I thought of that, my mind went back to the preceding verses in this chapter. We consider the temple of our heart. We consider the temple and the work that God is doing in each one of our hearts. We read here, upon the foundation, first and foremost Jesus Christ, but then upon the apostles, the teachings, the epistles, all the Word of God that has been shared and preserved down through the ages of time unto this time (Ephesians 2:20). Why? For our benefit. That our temple, the temple of God in our heart can be built up a spiritual house for Him. So as we consider this chapter, let us consider the state of our temple, God's temple in our heart.

What is the state of that? We read what the natural state is like. We read what we were born into. In fact, that is what we started out with. The title here in this Bible says, 'the natural state' at the beginning of this chapter. So let us consider that.

He said "And you hath he quickened, (or made alive in the Spirit) who were dead in trespasses and sins;" Ephesians 2:1. We who were dead, we were born into sin. We who were living in sin - dead. Not alive unto God but dead. We were the ones who He quickened.

"Wherein in time past ye walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience:" Ephesians 2:2. Do we even need to elaborate on that? We see the prince of the power of the air - Satan. The one who has been given a measure of power here on this earth to tempt, to mislead, to deceive, to destroy even. In some sense, he has been given power. And it says wherein in time past. He is talking to believers here. Wherein in time past. But those who have not yet placed their trust in the Lord Jesus Christ, these words apply also, except that we can take out 'in times past'.

"...ye walked according to the course of this world..." Ephesians 2:2. We talk about the winds of doctrine. We talk about, if you just took a sail boat and put it out on the water and just let it there, what is going to happen to it? It is just going to wander wherever it goes. It is not going to be guided. It needs to have someone that is guiding it with the rudder and changing the sails with the pitch into the wind to guide its course. That is how we are if we lack walking in the Lord Jesus Christ, being led by His Holy Spirit. We are as a wind just being driven with the waves of time, with the influences around us in this world. That is the picture I get.

"...walked according to the course of this world..." Ephesians 2:2, following the wide path. And we know where that wide path leads. "...the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience:" Ephesians 2:2. I don't think any of us, when we were unconverted, and those who have not yet believed in the Lord Jesus, I don't think any desire (maybe there is a few — I should not say any —that is pretty strong), that blatantly desire to be disobedient. I don't think any of us consciously said, "I am just going to be disobedient. I am just going to disobey today." But it happens when we are under the lack of influence of God or under the influence of the devil. Our natural state is that way. Any of us who have been blessed to have children entrusted into our care by God, we know that you don't have

The Children of God are not promised a life free of affliction. We are told that there may be hard trials as we serve God: "...behold, I send you forth as lambs among wolves" (Lk. 10:3). David, described as a man after God's own heart, knew what it was like to suffer extreme distress. "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me? why art thou so far from helping me,..." (Ps. 22:1)? The remainder of the Psalm details the grief, the helplessness, and the fear that David felt as he struggled to deal with his affliction.

Ten of the eleven faithful disciples suffered a martur's death and John was banished to the isle of Patmos to live in exile. Jesus, in His most extreme hour of affliction, cried out with virtually the same words that David uttered. "...Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani, which is, being interpreted, My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Mk. 15:34). Therefore, we should not be surprised if we suffer affliction for our service to God. Peter confirms this in his writing: "Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you: But rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings; that, when his glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy" (I Peter 4:12-13).

What, then, does a child of God have to look forward to? Is there no hope of escape? Is there neither comfort nor relief for those who suffer for their faith? Although there may be trials, the Lord has many promises for His people which give us hope and courage.

There are situations that we may face in which immediate relief is not promised, but we are promised the grace and strength to persevere. Paul suffered a thorn in the flesh and he fervently asked the Lord for relief. Rather than receiving relief, he was told "...My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness..." (II Cor. 12:9). We will not always see the path to relief as quickly as we may wish, but we will, by God's grace, be able to uphold our faith through severe trials.

God's Promises to the Afflicted

Does this mean we can never expect nor even hope for relief? We are promised deliverance and we are promised a brighter day - but it will be according to God's time table, not ours. "The Lord is nigh unto them that are of a broken heart; and saveth such as be of a contrite spirit. Many are the afflictions of the righteous: but the Lord delivereth him out of them all" (Ps. 34:18-19). David also wrote "For his anger endureth but a moment;... but joy cometh in the morning" (Ps. 30:5).

Therefore, we know that God will help us through our afflictions. We can make ourselves more available for His help if we are of a proper attitude. We know that "...God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace unto the humble" (Ja. 4:6). If we humbly approach God's throne of mercy and show true contrition for our sins, God will hear our prayers.

We also are promised comfort in our distresses by being in God's presence. If, for whatever reason, God chooses to not remove our affliction, we have the comfort of knowing He will be with us as we pass through our trial. "When thou passest through the waters, I will be with thee; and through the rivers, they shall not overflow thee: when thou walkest through the fire, thou shalt not be burned; neither shall the flame kindle upon thee" (Is. 43:2). God's presence in times of affliction is assured.

Afflictions in this life may seem long and harsh. There are times when we really do not see the solution or an end to the trial. Loved ones who are sick do not always recover even if they are not old. Financial set backs may never be completely removed. Consequences of sin may remain with us long after we have repented and been forgiven. Satan is at times permitted to bring distress that we may never understand. Job probably never understand. Job probably never understand in God and "...the Lord blessed the latter end of Job more than his beginning:..." (Job 42:12).

We do have the promise of help in this life even if the problem isn't resolved as we may wish it to be. Sometimes, after having dealt with an affliction for some time, and wondering what the end will be, we can look back and see there really was benefit in our affliction. We are promised that we will actually reach the point where we can say with conviction that "...we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose" (Ro. 8:28) and that we truly can "In every thing give thanks..." (I Th. 5:18).

In addition to receiving help in this life, we also have the assurance that those who can endure affliction to the end have a promise of God that will reward us eternally if we truly believe in God. Shortly before Jesus' trial, when He told His disciples that they would desert Him, He also assured them that in the end, they would prevail. "Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you" (Jn. 14:1-2).

In the book of Revelation, those who endured great tribulation are given a special promise: "...These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb" (Rev. 7:14). God also promises to be a comforter at the time of final deliverance for those who endured to the end. "And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away" (Rev. 21:4).

There are many trials and afflictions in this life. However, there is much encouragement to endure. "We are troubled on every side, yet not distressed; we are perplexed, but not in despair, Persecuted, but not forsaken; cast down, but not destroyed; Always bearing about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body" (II Cor. 4:8-10).

Group visits Yugoslavia

Our brethren have approved many new projects over the past years for Yugoslavia and Croatia. The Mission Committee approved sending several brethren to represent them on a trip into these nations last fall. Those traveling were Bro. Peter and Sis. Marian Petrovic (San Diego), Bro. Phil and Sis. Maureen Stettner (Bluffton North), and Bro. Dale and Sis. Judy Eisenmann (Chicago). They left Chicago on Thursday, October 10 and arrived in Belgrade, Yugoslavia about 16 hours later.

Getting acquainted with the brethren

Our visiting brethren were warmly welcomed by a group of Serbian brethren and driven to Novi Sad, about a 50-minute drive from the airport. The group was transported in two vans which had been purchased by World Relief and Mission funds contributed by our American brotherhood. These vans have been a great blessing in providing means by which brethren in outlying areas can be driven to various local churches for worship.

This portion of Yugoslavia has good farmland and a number of the brethren have small plots on which they are able to raise grain and various vegetables as they struggle to make a very modest living. In visiting with the local brethren about the current situation in their country, it was related that things are slowly improving, but there is still much need.

Travel over busy roads with many trucks and bicycles and variable conditions made the visiting group very thankful for all the prayers back home on their behalf. The group was taken to a hotel in Novi Sad which was their base while in Yugoslavia.

Local relief meeting

On Saturday the elder brothers met with the Yugoslavian Relief Committee which administers the funds we have approved for various projects. Much of the discussion centered around the many self-help and church construction projects as well as personal assistance programs we have in place. Detailed reports were presented on the distribution and utilization of funds. It was reassuring to observe the care that is being taken to account for these funds in order to make sure that they are applied in areas where the greatest benefit can be derived. Discussion of circumstances in the country revealed that inflation is running about 20% per year. With consumer prices steadily increasing, it was felt that the monthly assistance being sent to our brethren in this land will need to increase.

There are several dozen self-help projects currently underway in Yugoslavia and Croatia. Most of these are limited to \$5000 per person or \$10,000 per joint project. The brethren are struggling to make ends meet and these loans have made a great difference in helping some to establish a small business or improve a farming operation. As they are able to repay these loans, and funds are returned. additional approved applicants are funded. There is a local committee of brethren who oversee these projects and report to our European Relief Board. The visiting brothers were able to visit and review many projects and were encouraged to see a glimmer of light for future self-sufficiency.

Sunday, October 13th

The visiting group was met at 6:30 a.m. by Elder Bro. Karlo Hrubik (Novi Sad) and their van driver. They traveled about 2 hours to the village of Omolica, in the province of Banat. Many villages were passed, including

the village of Titla, where an older sister lives. There were quite a few believers here at one time, but their old church just collapsed one day. This sister is the only remaining believer here. Upon arrival at the new church in Omolica, it was noted that many brethren were gathering for this special day from neighboring churches. This new building was funded by the Apostolic Christian Mission and World Relief Committees. The exterior is stucco with blue trim. There is no parking lot and the only restroom facilities are an old outhouse about a hundred feet from the church. It is apparent that they have used the funds contributed to provide only the necessities for a basic house of worship.

Dedication services were held both in the morning and afternoon. Many friends from the community were also present. There was an outpouring of appreciation from the local brethren for the help from American brethren to make it possible for them to have a decent place to worship. It was inspiring to observe the sincerity of faith and humility of these dear brethren.

Uzdin and Kovacica

The group left their hotel at 8:00 a.m. on Monday for the little village of Uzdin. Two older sisters with heavy scarves tied under their chin, were waiting at the church. They led the visitors through the sanctuary to a smaller room, no bigger than 10' x 10.' Here there are a few pews, songbooks, Bibles, and a small pulpit. This is where they gather for worship services as there are only two members and occasionally some friends who attend. Through their tears they related that no minister had come to preach to them for three months. Unfortunately there are quite a few churches where there are just a few elderly sisters left. There

is a great need for more ministers who can travel to such churches. Our small group shared in a brief service with Bro. Hrubik speaking in their native language.

A family was visited in Kovacica where four sons are on the Self-Help Program. It is apparent that they are quite industrious and their farming operation has been greatly helped by our assistance. The two older brothers are married and one of them is a minister in the Kovacica church. A visit to the church revealed an old building which had been replastered recently with help from our funds.

Approximately 80 souls worship here, and it was encouraging to see families with children benefiting from the efforts to provide usable facilities. There is need for additional help to further remodel the building.

Padina and other Yugoslavian churches

The Mission and World Relief Committees are financing the construction of an 8000 square feet church in Padina. It was heartwarming to visit this thriving church, with 100 members and a number of children and friends. The building has a modest and practical design and it is to be dedicated by May of 2003.

Many other villages and church buildings were visited throughout the week. A number of examples of new or remodeled buildings were observed. In every case there was deep appreciation expressed. In one case, following a meal served at the local elder's home, he stated with tears flowing that they cannot find words to express their thanks for our help. He said that this makes it possible for them to have decent places to worship and a better chance to keep their young people.

Another thriving church was visited in Banatsko Novo Selo. Their new building was completed six years ago. They have six ministers, one of whom is a young brother who frequently serves the small neighboring churches where there is no resident minister. There were several places visited where the old church buildings are no longer in use. Due to the years of persecution as well as emigration of many brethren to settle in other lands, some congregations have completely disbanded. Where even a small nucleus of brethren remain, there was always a fervent desire to regain what has been lost.

Some individual cases

Several visits were made to families who are on self-help programs or receiving direct aid. One family has a green house funded by this program which enables them to raise and sell many kinds of vegetables. The operation is doing well. They have a large family and the oldest son is confined to a wheel chair. Another stop was at the home of a middle-aged couple where the husband has only a small portion of one lung functioning. He is unable to work and the labor of their small farming operation falls on his wife. His oxygen generating machine recently broke down and the visiting brothers were able to provide emergency funds to purchase a new one. This was one of many cases of severe need observed, and these brethren will certainly appreciate our prayers.

In the village of Brsadin in Croatia (visited the last three days of the trip) a widow was met whose husband had been killed by an enemy soldier in one of their recent wars. This sister struggles to survive by helping unload corn by hand for local farmers. She did not have funds to purchase fuel to heat her home for the winter, but help will be provided.

Another couple live in a bombed out building in the town of Vukovar. This is a war-torn area as it was the focal point of fighting in the conflict between Serbia and Croatia which took place in the mid-nineties. The wife is converted and the husband is repenting. They are trying to recover slowly from the great material losses which they have suffered. They testified that their trials have brought them to the Lord and helped them find their salvation.

Kotlina, Croatia and back to America

On Sunday, October 20th the visiting group as well as brethren from neighboring churches gathered to worship at the church in Kotlina, Croatia. They had crossed the border from Yugoslavia into Croatia a few days earlier without incident. Once again, they had been received very warmly by the local brethren. The Kotlina church is a relatively new building which was constructed with funds contributed by our brotherhood. It is a very modest structure set in a beautiful spot in this quaint village. Nearly every pew was filled in the church. Services included parts in Serbian, Hungarian and English. Throughout the visit, it was found to be of great help that the Petrovics are fluent in Serbian and were able to provide translation. However, it was also found that there was no need to translate the strong sense of a common bond of faith in our beloved Savior and to be able to express true brotherly love.

As the visiting group boarded their van to depart on Sunday afternoon, all who were present gathered outside and bid a very fond and tearful farewell. A young convert drove the van through the country-side and onto the Autobahn for the 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ hour drive to Zagreb, the capital of Croatia. The group stayed in a hotel there overnight and rose early the next day to begin the trip home by air. They were very thankful for a safe arrival and for the many prayers so faithfully offered by the American brethren. Of all the memories and unforgettable impressions made by this visit, all would agree that one clearly stands out: the resources being shared with our beloved brethren in these countries are being put to very good use in meeting some great needs in the household of faith; this is a tremendous opportunity for us to continue to share the abundance which God has given to us.

to teach them to be disobedient. You do not have to teach that. But it happens. We are no different, each one of us. We have the propensity to be disobedient, whether we intend to or not. And that is when we are being directed and guided, or maybe when we are just lax in being diligent in our hunger and thirst for righteousness.

"Among whom also we all had our conversation in times past ... " Ephesians 2:3. All. Notice the inclusion. All. Just as we read in Romans, "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God;" Romans 3:23. "... There is none righteous, no, not one:" Romans 3:10. Not one of us of our own volition is righteous before God. We all in times past were in this situation. "...in the lusts of our flesh, fulfilling the desires of the flesh and of the mind; and were by nature the children of wrath, even as others." Ephesians 2:3. By nature the children of wrath ...that is harsh language, isn't it? Children of wrath. Not of righteousness. The opposite of that.

Then the beautiful turn. Then the story of hope. The message of salvation that Jesus Christ brings. "But God..." Ephesians 2:4. But God -the transition. We just saw the picture that is not so pretty, that we all were or are in. It is not a pretty picture. It does not even go into where that leads to. In Romans it tells us, "For when we were in the flesh, the motions of sins, which were by the law, did work in our members to bring forth fruit unto death." Romans 7:5. We did not follow that path all the way, but that is where this leads, sin leads to death.

But God... "But God, who is rich in mercy..." Ephesians 2:4. I often think of God's mercy. He had a beautiful creation, a marvelous creation. We can read that in Genesis. The world was created and He said it was good. "And God saw every thing that he had made, and, behold, it was very good..." Genesis 1:31. We were created good. But then sin came into the world and God hates sin. Sin is the most detestable thing that is possible to God. He cannot be a part of it. So here is this holy, righteous, omnipotent Creator, God, looking down beholding His creation, that were created perfect and good. They turned their backs on Him and sinned, despised Him. Basically just turned our backs. The greatest rejection possible we did to God.

And yet, "But God, who is rich in mercy..." Ephesians 2:4. Despite that, in His mercy He looks down and beholds each and every one of us. In His mercy and love - just as the shepherd who went out and left the ninety nine to seek the one sheep that was gone astray. That is our God who is rich in mercy. He is seeking each one of you and me. He desires our heart. All of our heart. All of our heart every day. When He does not receive that, it is us who is rejecting Him. But He is still rich in mercy and even in those situations, He will not relent. He will continue to pursue and to seek us because He loves us.

"...for his great love wherewith he loved us, Even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ..." Ephesians 2:4,5. Even when we were dead in sins, hath he quickened us together with Christ. Mary and Martha said, "...Lord, if thou hadst been here, my brother had not died." St. John 11:21,32. He would not have died. Here He says when we were dead. We were already dead. But Jesus is still there. The hope is there. Just as Jesus told them, if ye believe, Lazarus will arise. They said, "I know that he shall rise again in the resurrection at the last day." St. John 11:24. Jesus said, "I am the resurrection, and the life ... " St. John 11:24. So by Christ Jesus.

"...(by grace ye are saved;) And hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus:" Ephesians 2:5,6. What a different picture that is. So we look as we put out the picture that we just read here in these six verses. We saw the dismal state of the natural man and our natural tendency to sin and to disobey God. Then we saw the love and mercy of an omnipotent Creator, God. Then what did we see? Did you notice that? It said, and hath raised us up into heavenly places in Christ Jesus. He raised us up. Brought us out of the pit, up to Him where He is in the high places.

"...raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus:" Ephesians 2:6. Those heavenly places, dear ones, can be many places here. This is one of them. The places where we draw nearer to Him. Where we draw near to His heart. Where we seek His heart. Those are the heavenly places. It could be in the quietness of our home. It could be wherever we are at as we commune with Him. But He desires us, to raise us up. To bring us out of the mire and the sin and the muck of this world. To raise us up in the Spirit to Him. Just as we sang in that hymn, "Our Conversation Is In Heaven", Zion's Harp #198, where it talks about: "Jesus, like a magnet, raises, Our faint spirit to the skies; And we seem in pray'r and praises As on eagle's wings to rise ... "

"That in the ages to come he might shew the exceeding riches of his grace in his kindness toward us through Christ Jesus." Ephesians 2:7. That in the ages to come He might show the exceeding riches of His grace and kindness toward us... It is through all generations, dear ones. From all generations, from time past to time in the future. God's plan is that all would come to Him. And in ages to come and as long as He tarries, this plan will be extended, this grace to all who are dead in sin.

"For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast." Ephesians 2:8,9. We might think a lot of this is written to those who are unbelievers. But reSILVER LINING

member what we read in verse two, "Wherein in time past ye walked ... " Ephesians 2:2. He is speaking, partially at least, to believers here. Those who have been called out. Those who have been called out. So some reminders. I believe verses eight and nine He is reminding us. "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves ... " Ephesians 2:8. I believe as we correlate this, we can turn to Galatians Chapter 3. I think it is a very similar account as the Apostle Paul wrote. It was very important for the Apostle Paul as he reminded the Galatians. He said you were saved by grace through faith. And as you were saved that way, you can't be made perfected by the works of your self. I believe it is the same reminder here. It is a reminder that it is a gift, a gift from God. Just as we were saved by grace through faith, we need to walk in faith. We are not perfected by our own works. We are not perfected by our own works. "Not of works, lest any man should boast." Ephesians 2:9.

Verse ten is a key right behind that. "For we are his workmanship..." Ephesians 2:10. He is working the work in our lives. All that is required of us is to submit. Submit in obedience to Him and He will do the work in our heart. He will change our minds. He will give us the desires. "For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works..." Ephesians 2:10. So the question then comes to us, how submitted are we to His workmanship?

Grant was sharing with us - he likes to do woodworking - sharing that one summer or a break that was going to be a week long, he decided he was going to get some material together and make some furniture. His father was a little leery of that. He did not want it tying up his shop from then on to who knows when. But he put his mind to it and he worked on that furniture and he got it done in that week. He was creating something that he was working on. It was his workmanship. Jesus Christ, we are in His workshop, dear ones. We are the clay as we can read in the Bible. We are in His workshop. He is working on us. But are we allowing that to happen or do we resist? When we feel the Holy Spirit prompting and trying to maybe make some correction - maybe it is some guilt we have or conviction - do we resist and do we run from it? Or do we submit and say, "Lord it is hard, it is painful, but I know it is for the best. Please give me the grace to change, to do Thy will."

"...we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works..." Ephesians 2:10. So we know if we are being constructed. How? The Bible says, "...for the tree is known by his fruit." St. Matthew 12:33. Just as we tell a tree by its fruit, we can tell if our lives are being conformed and in His likeness, because the fruit will be born.

"...which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them. Wherefore remember, that ye being in time past Gentiles in the flesh, who are called Uncircumcision by that which is called the Circumcision in the flesh made by hands;" Ephesians 2:10,11. Part of this chapter - we see a little bit of that now coming through the remaining part of it – is the struggle that the Gentiles had coming into what had been, up to Jesus Christ's appearance, basically a Jewish religion. Jehovah God was the God of Israel. Although there were others that were not necessarily from Israel - we can think of examples, Naaman and others who did come to believe in God - there was not a lot. It was pretty exclusive. So here we see the conflict then that ensued in the early church between the Gentiles and the Jews. Here it is referred to as the uncircumcision and the circumcision. There was the gap between them, let's say. But the Apostle Paul also talked about the reconciliation that came through Jesus Christ. There should be one body. Not a Gentile church. Not a Jewish church. But the church of the Lord Jesus Christ.

So he shared that here, "That at that time ye were without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, (that is what I was talking about, being aliens from Israel - Israel being followers of God) and strangers from the covenants of promise, having no hope, and without God in the world:" Ephesians 2:12. Again, the lost condition, the lost state. Specifically there, recounting to the Gentiles and that applies to all of us.

But now again, the transition, the tie in. "But now in Christ Jesus ye who sometimes were far off are made nigh by the blood of Christ." Ephesians 2:13. Dear ones, the blood of Jesus Christ is the equalizer. Every soul on the face of this earth is either covered by Jesus' blood or not. And as such, are united in Him or are not. It is that black and white. It is that black and white.

"...who sometimes were far off are made nigh by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace..." Ephesians 2:13,14. He is our peace ...there will be no lasting peace outside of being reconciled to Jesus Christ. There will be no lasting peace.

"...who hath made both one, and hath broken down the middle wall of partition between us;" Ephesians 2:14. It is talking here, dear ones, specifically about the Jews and the Gentiles, but I believe this principle goes beyond that. It goes beyond that. As we look at our own fellowship, sometimes there are things that try to come up, that try to bring division, separation. Dear ones, we are one in Christ Jesus! He has broken down that partition. He does not want us to be separated. He wants us to be united as a body as we serve Him.

"Having abolished in his flesh the enmity, even the law of commandSermon continued from page 45 ments contained in ordinances; for to make in himself of twain one new man, so making peace;" Ephesians 2:15. I believe this is speaking on probably two fronts. One, speaking of the new creation in Christ Jesus. We are no more split allegiance. We are no more following, but we are dedicated, we are a new man, a new person in Christ. But I believe it is also taking about the Jew and the Gentile as well. No more separate - two different groups but one person, one group in Christ Jesus.

"And that he might reconcile both unto God in one body by the cross, having slain the enmity thereby:" Ephesians 2:16. This was pretty difficult for the Jews. They had been taught. And I believe, if I err not, even some of the teachings in the law and others, they were not to associate with other groups, for many valid reasons; not to intermarry, not to be influenced by their idol worship. So on one hand, when you think about that and the teachings they had received, and now all of a sudden those from the Gentiles were being converted and coming. It was pretty different for them to even entertain the thought of fellowshipping with these other groups.

We have a pretty close knit group too. That can be very, very good. But I believe, at times it can also present its challenges for us. For those especially who maybe come in for the first time into our fellowships. Dear ones, we need to reach out when there are those that come. And I know we all do that but sometimes we are so close and they sense that. That they are just not quite able to even see how they could become a part. It is just a challenge. I think we all do in our own way very well. But I think that is something that we need to be sensitive to. That we make sure we reach out to all. Regardless if they look like they fit in. Dear ones, we read Jesus Christ is the Lord of all.

"And came and preached peace to you which were afar off, and to them that were nigh. For through him we both have access by one Spirit unto the Father." Ephesians 2:18. Through Him. Through our intercessor, our high priest we have access by one Spirit unto the Father.

"Now therefore ye are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellowcitizens with the saints, and of the household of God;" Ephesians 2:19. Think of that! No more strangers and foreigners but fellow citizens. Citizens of where? Remember our conversation is in heaven? We are citizens of God's kingdom, the kingdom of heaven. With the saints, and the household of God.

"And are built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone;" Ephesians 2:20. Is our foundation strong upon the Lord Jesus Christ? We know just as we were children singing the song. If our house is not built on the rock, it will not stand.

"In whom all the building fitly framed together groweth unto an holy temple in the Lord:" Ephesians 2:21. Again, back to the workmanship-God's workmanship. He is doing the work, remember that dear ones. But we need to be willing. We need to be willing and pliable, submissive that that work can be done. Because we can resist. We can resist. He gives us that free choice. Even as we read, He is a God of rich mercy and love. But He is also a God that, as much as He desires our worship and praise, He wants it to come of a free will. He does not coerce us to worship and serve Him. But He is delighted with those that come with a willing and desirous heart to give Him the praise and the worship that He is worthy of.

"In whom ye also are builded together for an habitation of God through the Spirit." Ephesians 2:22. I am sure there are many other thoughts here that could be shared, dear ones. I trust that each one of you will ponder the words that we have read together here and the Holy Spirit would speak to your hearts. May God bless the words.



In America, we enjoy the benefits of religious freedom. It is guaranteed in the U.S. Constitution and remains one of our greatest national ideals. Our forefathers in faith did not always enjoy such a benefit in Europe. They faced many frustrations in this regard. The following is an appeal to Swiss Authorities by Bro. Samuel Froehlich (on August 24, 1851) to the Aargau government in Switzerland. These are excerpts taken from Apostolic Christian Church History, Volume I by Herman Ruegger (1949).

Petition to Authorities

"A number of people in our Canton petition you to consider our interest in the legislation and constitution of our common fatherland.

The Apostle Paul has admonished us that first of all, supplications, prayers, intercession be made for all men; for kings and for all that are in authority that we might through the providence and heart-directing power of God have our wish fulfilled and it be granted to us to lead a quiet and peaceable life, under the protection of the established government, in all godliness and honesty (I Tim. 2:1-2). We have been of the opinion that we are doing something good and not evil when we follow the apostolic rules. But it is not so; for, although the government should not be a terror to good works but to evil (Romans 13:3), we have been persecuted unceasingly for twenty years, and oppressed, for trying, according to this precept, to lead a quiet life in all godliness and honesty. No one can bring any other charge against us, for we cannot be accused of evil

works which the government, as God's minister, must punish.

Might it not please the established government to make arrangements so that we may live a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty?

For we have not always had the power of godliness and to lead an honorable life, but first received it when we heard the good, powerful, and living Word of God, which has become in us a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart, in order to turn us to the living God and to give Him our hearts' obedience. This Word of God is become our spiritual mother (Hebrews 4:12-13), whom we duly honor, and in this we would, unhindered, mutually edify ourselves.

If you would reply that there are no hindrances in the way, then we would say: Yes, we are hindered just in this respect, for when we together would edify ourselves in our holiest faith in Jesus Christ our Lord, then we are attacked by the police, persecuted, accused and punished, as if we had done something evil, while at the same time what we ask for is permitted in other Swiss cantons.

Nowhere more than in Canton Aargau is, since 1831, appeal made to an old prohibition, in order to persecute and punish the participants in a Christian meeting. In the abovementioned years a new constitution was adopted which gave freedom of faith and conscience. If the constitutional council had wanted to apply this article only to the Roman and Protestant parties, it would, without a doubt, not have been added to the new constitution, for such freedom was enjoyed previously without such an article. But the constitution meant it otherwise. namely, that no one should be forced in matters of faith and conscience, but that everyone would, in this, enjoy the protection of the laws of the land so long as he was a good citizen. If one would apply this freedom only to the Roman and Protestant parties, then the apostolic rule would have no validity any more, in all godliness and honesty. For those who enjoy undisturbed freedom truly do not live in godliness and honesty, but rather in ungodliness and dishonesty.

If one would ask and enter into a contest about it, as to which faith is the right and true one, we would answer as the Prophet Elias: 'The god that answereth by fire, let him be god.' That is, over which faith God in heaven answers with His Holy Spirit and with fire, that is the only true faith in our Lord Jesus Christ (Matt. 3:11; Acts 11:16), but the fruit of the Holy Ghost is evident in all godliness and honesty. So we have the true faith, in which the government, without danger, may and should protect and shield us for God's sake. We shall never abuse the freedom of the Spirit as a cloak of maliciousness and for the caprice of the flesh.

With all due respect, we wait for the granting of our petition for freedom of faith and conscience and the mutual edification."

"Dreams and Visions for 2003" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

Dreams and visions are quite often mentioned in the Bible. In Matthew 1:20 we read, "The angel of the Lord appeared unto him (Joseph) in a dream." Recently, upon reading that statement, I began to think about the importance of dreams.

In Genesis 37:5 we read, "And Joseph dreamed a dream, and he told it to his brethren." Ordinarily, this dream should have been kept a secret because it had Joseph's older brothers bowing to him, something altogether unacceptable in Asia where the older brothers have the preeminence. However, it did get Joseph to Egypt where he could be used to save the lives of many people.

In I Kings 3:5 we read, "In Gibeon the Lord appeared to Solomon in a dream by night: and God said, Ask what I shall give thee." In this case, God Himself, conversed with Solomon in a dream.

In Daniel 2:3 we read, "And the king said unto them, I have dreamed a dream." King Nebuchadnezzar had a dream about a great image, and only Daniel could give him the interpretation which concerned four kingdoms.

Visions are similar to dreams but in the Bible they occurred in the daytime without the participant being asleep. Paul had a vision on the road to Damascus, Acts 9, and Peter had a vision when he fell into a trance while praying on the house top, Acts 10. John had a vision when he wrote the book of Revelation. The word "vision" is used in 9:17, "And thus I saw the horses in the vision."

We ask God to give us good dreams and good visions. We are taught in Proverbs 29:18, "Where there is no vision, the people perish." This may mean that we must have the faith and the determination to help others the best we know how, spiritually and physically. If we simply say, "There is nothing I can do," then no one is helped and the people perish. If we lose our enthusiasm and vigor, if we become stagnant and complacent, if we lose our vision for holiness and spirituality, the people perish, and we, too do not fare very well.

For the year 2003, we need to have a dream and a vision of our church being selfless, spiritual, holy and faithful. It is not sufficient to say that we want to stay away from all things which are sinful or which are apt to lead to sin, but we want to stay away from everything that acts as a weight which hinders our speed and endurance in running this race of faith. Hebrews 12:1 tells us to "Lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us." We are instructed not only to lay aside sin, but also to lay aside weights, anything that is a hindrance to the life of holiness and spiritual accomplishments. Don't misunderstand me; I haven't arrived yet, but I have a dream and a vision for myself and our church. By God's grace it can be done.
