

Sermon by Brother Kenneth Knapp, Taylor, MO II Chronicles 7:11-22 and St. Mark 4:1-23

It said there in that last verse, "If any man have ears to hear, let him hear." (St. Mark 4:23). I don't know if there is any amongst us today that don't have hearing. I have often thought about the different senses that we have and thought about, if I had to give up one or two of them, which one would I pick? We know that the eyesight is so important. The hearing is so important. The speaking, the taste and those things. We really would not want to give up any of them, would we?

But in this morning hour, we may not be gathered by the seaside. It may not be Jesus there sitting in the boat. It says here that there was a multitude of people. (St. Mark 4:1) But there is a resemblance here this morning. There is a multitude of people here. I don't know, it doesn't say exactly how many people were there, but there is a multitude of people here. There isn't a seaside and Jesus isn't in the boat, but Jesus is here in the Word. He has asked someone to stand and to read the Word so that those that were here could hear the Word. So in this morning hour this scripture has been fulfilled in our very ears, those of us that could hear. Where did it fall?

We live in a day and time in which we are fairly highly educated. Most of us have been taught to read and to write and the basics and those things. But today we are talking about spiritual things. We need to hear spiritually because there are those things that spiritually are going to be lasting, are going to be forever. That comes from this Word. This Word is true. As long as we read from this Word and as we hear it and as we understand it, not of our understanding, but the understanding that God and Jesus can reveal unto us.

We can read many accounts in the scripture where those walked to and fro and they didn't understand. Sometimes Jesus was even beside them. So we need to be careful today that we really understand the Word of God. Such a simple message that we have this morning hour.

If we would have been in the downtown Los Angeles or New York City and this Word would have been open and it would have been this type of a parable, someone that has probably never set foot on dirt or never got anything out of the garden to eat except by going to the grocery store, maybe it could be just a little bit so they might not quite understand it. But there is no excuse for you and I today to be able to take a word like this and to be able to have it read to us, and even explained! Even explained. There is no excuse. For it tells us to whom much is given, much will be required. (St. Luke 12:48)

I have often thought, dear ones, if I could find any fault with our faith and with our church, it would be that statement. Much has been given. Now much is required. We can take that responsibility and we can do it. But not by our self. We are going to have to have a humble heart.

We were reminded in the past evening hour, when we heard the testimonies of these four souls, of a proud behavior and a humble behavior, God resists the proud but giveth grace to the humble.

What do we have to do to be proud? We don't have to do anything. It is automatic. It is nature to be proud. We don't have to do anything.

What do we have to do to be humble? We need God's help. We need to rely upon God and His help to be humble. And we need to be humble because the Word tells us. (James 4:6). Humbleness is not a weakness. Meekness is not a weakness. It is a strength that God gives unto us.

I have often said it is kind of like those that - I was in a place one time where I saw a picture on the wall of a sail boat. I asked the person about that sail boat. I said, what do you do if you want to go against the wind? Can you do it? He said yes, you can do it. But it takes a lot of work. To go with the wind, he said you just have to sit there and relax and that boat will go and it will follow the wind. But to go against the wind, you really have to work. I said, can you go completely in the opposite direction of the wind? He said yes, but it takes a lot of work.

It is kind of a parallel to me of going to heaven. It takes a lot of work. It takes a lot of humility. It doesn't take anything to be proud. It doesn't take anything to go the other direction. Because if you just sit still, that is the way you are going to go. But by God's grace and by His help... We read here this morning hour about planting of the seed. Well, let us just go back for a few moments and get a few thoughts gathered together in the Old Testament reading

January 2004

A sign is an event that is intended as proof of something.

At various times in the scripture, God provided a sign for those who were to fulfill special assignments. Gideon asked for a sign that the Lord would save Israel by his hand. In the first request the Lord made a fleece of wool wet and the ground around it dry. Gideon recognized that he was risking the anger of God by asking another sign, but he humbly requested that God give him a second sign in which the fleece of wool would be dry and the ground wet. The Lord granted him his request (Ju. 6:36-40).

Hezekiah asked the Lord for a sign to assure him that he would recover from his illness. The Lord "...brought the shadow ten degrees backward,..." (II Ki. 20:11) and Hezekiah lived an additional fifteen years.

Most of us have had times when we were uncertain about a decision we needed to make. Even after diligent prayer and seeking counsel from those who have faithfully served the Lord for many years, we may be uncertain of our decision. At times like these we may wish God would simply tell us what to do.

Since God normally doesn't speak to us in clearly spoken language, we may seek alternative ways to understand God's will. Many times people seek a sign from God to help them know what they should do. Requesting a sign from God may make us uncomfortable.

Is it okay for us to seek a sign? Are we wrong to ask for reassurance when we make important decisions? There are examples in the scripture that may reassure us that seeking signs is acceptable and there are examples that may cause us to question whether we should seek a sign.

In addition to the examples cited earlier, others have asked for and received signs. Moses received numerous signs as he tried to convince God that he was not able to lead the children of Israel out of Egypt. On the way from Egypt to the Promised land, the children of Israel received many signs, even when they were not very faithful. At a later time when God was reassuring His people that He would be with them, He promised to "...make the wilderness a pool of water, and the dry land springs of water" (ls. 41:18). When Lazarus died, Jesus used his death as an opportunity to help the people understand that He was sent from God. "And I knew that thou hearest me always: but because of the people which stand by I said it, that they may believe that thou hast sent me" (Jn. 11:42).

Light From The Word

Signs

In other situations, people were chastised for seeking a sign. When Zacharias asked how he would know the message of the birth of John the Baptist was true, he became "...dumb, and not able to speak, until the day that these things shall be performed,..." (Lk 1:20). The scribes and Pharisees asked for a sign and were told that "...An evil and adulterous generation seeketh after a sign..." (Matt. 12:38-39). Paul wrote to the Corinthians that "...the Jews require a sign, and the Greeks seek after wisdom:" (I Cor. 1:22) because there appeared to be too much dependence on the wisdom of man.

If we look at the previous examples, we can see that our attitude plays a big role in the response God may have in our request for a sign. Those who were doubting God's power and, in effect, asking Him to prove Himself to them were often answered in a way that had some negative consequences.

On the other hand, those who believed God but just seemed to need a little reassurance were often rewarded with a favorable request. The example of Zacharias and Mary in Chapter 1 of the Gospel of Luke makes it clear that it isn't simply a difference of wicked and righteous people who are chastised or rewarded when they ask for reassurance. Zacharias asked for proof ("whereby shall I know this?"), but Mary simply asked how it would happen (How shall this be,...?). One appeared to be skeptical and one appeared to humbly accept it.

With the examples given in the scripture, we do have some guidelines concerning the asking of signs. We must sincerely want God's direction and humbly seek it. We must be sure we are seeking His direction in a situation where we need help and not merely asking His permission for something where we have already made up our minds and we want Him to confirm our opinion. We must be careful what we ask for because we might receive it.

As we seek God's direction, we must be very careful that we do not consciously or unconsciously manipulate the situation to get the "sign" we want. It is often quite easy to set up a situation where the end result is determined by the circumstances we have created.

We would also be wise to realize that when we seek a sign, we need to be of a ready mind to accept God's answer. Asking God for direction and refusing to accept His will can be very serious. Jonah knew what he was supposed to do and he chose to run the other direction. Saul (Paul) thought he was doing God's will, but was shown very clearly that God was not pleased with him. When he received direction from God, he was willing to submit even when he only understood a step at a time.

God speaks to His people in many different ways. Sometimes the answers are clear and rather quick in coming. At other times the answer is not so clear and may be quite some time in coming to us. Whatever the situation we need to be patient and submissive. If we diligently search His Word and humbly seek Him in prayer, we can usually understand His message. There may be times even with diligence, when we may be a bit uncertain about the direction God would have us to go.

We can receive some additional guidance if we try to think about the likely outcome of a decision. Will it draw us closer to God or will the end result fulfill our carnal desires? Will we be tempting God with our request or will we be serving Him?

It is not wrong to ask God for direction and reassurance. It is not wrong to search His Word to clarify the direction we should go. It is not wrong to plead with God to show us clearly what He would have us do. However, we must remember that when we ask God to help us, we must be willing to receive His message and not interfere with His plan for us.

Eastern Europe

Following European Board practices of visiting brethren in former communist lands, a group of brethren traveled to Germany, Hungary, and Romania in November. Travelers were our brethren Elder Jon and Julie Schmidgall, Rod and LeAnn Stoller, and Gene and Verna Lehman. Schmidgalls and Lehman's flew to Frankfurt and were guests of the Ernst Pfister family. They attended midweek services in Breidenbach.

Headquarters in Arad

They left Breidenbach to fly from the Frankfurt airport to Timisoara, Romania with a layover in Budapest. They drove to Arad where they were later met by the Stollers. For several years now, traveling brethren have made their headquarters in the Best Western Central Hotel in downtown Arad. The accommodations are reasonable and satisfactory, allowing for physical needs and a private place to meet and work.

Baja, Hungary

On Saturday, November 8, those who flew to Timisoara drove about five hours into Hungary to visit a church where they need a new facility. After viewing the situation, and hearing the comments of local brethren, the European Board will receive a recommendation to help finance this new church.

Meeting with Ukrainian brethren

On Tuesday, Filip Augustinov picked the brothers up about 10:00 AM to attend a meeting at the Arad church. They met our Ukrainian Elder Brethren Peter Karcea and Vasile Paladean and ministering

Brother Georghe Amaritza. Bro. Filip Augustinov helped Bro. Gene Lehman with the translation efforts as they met the entire day reviewing the current economic status and needs of our Ukrainian brethren. Items discussed included the drought of last summer, self-help loan projects, the ag-tiller/farm equipment projects, financial records, and current living conditions within the regional area of Bukovina where our churches are located. The following is a brief overview of conditions as they were reported to the group.

Drought conditions

Brother Gene asked the Ukrainian brethren how Bukovina was affected by the drought conditions they experienced during 2003. Essentially after early May, no rain fell until the last half of July, and when it did, there was damaging hail to the crops still in the fields.

Further weather conditions contributed to what amounts to a nearly total crop failure. After much evaluation and long discussion it was decided to leave a substantial sum of charity funds and to send additional funds for winter fuel.

Small livestock projects

When our brethren were in Eastern Europe in May, they instituted a program of furnishing baby animals and enough feed to grow them to market size. The program is very much appreciated, with 202 projects for 176 families from 29 churches participating. At the end, two-thirds of the animals would be theirs and one-third would be ours to use for future programs. This program is the bright spot in a dismal world and is working well. The hope is to continue it.

Meeting with **Romanian brethren**

The group met with the Romanian elders and deacons and found the situation regarding drought, heat, and poor harvest exists there also. There was a lot of discussion concerning our new distribution center, which was visited, and how each country has equal use of goods sent there.

As the Ukrainians, the Romanians indicated that the harvest this year was almost nil. But with God's help and financial assistance and support from American brethren, they have gleaned enough for winter.

The Romanian brethren struggle with a currency that continues to devalue against other currencies to the point of devastating the purchasing power of anyone on a fixed income. In 1990 the currency exchange was 35 lei/\$1, whereas today it is over 35,000 lei/ \$1. Wage earners and self-employed people are also at risk as their purchasing power for basic needs has been dramatically reduced.

Winter heat

While food is available in the market, it is more expensive because of the drought. As one example, bread is two to three times more expensive. Because of the higher food prices, there is a definite need for assistance for winter heat and other needs this year.

In conclusion, there is a regular program of support in place, with food packages monthly from the Bluffton Distribution Center. Changes are coming, and World Relief is working very diligently to assist these suffering souls to the best of our brethren's ability and resources. It is the goal of World Relief that none of our Eastern European brethren will be hungry or cold this winter.

Endowment Fund

In 1986 the Elder Body appointed seven brothers to determine the need and feasibility of establishing an Endowment Fund for the Apostolic Christian Church of America. Prayerful deliberations and investigative inquiries by these brothers revealed that there was a need for long-term faithful management of donated assets and resources of brethren and friends of the Church. To meet this need, the Elder Body established the Endowment Fund in 1989 to encourage, receive and administer such gifts in a manner consistent with the loyalty and devotion expressed by the grantors and in accord with the policies of the Apostolic Christian Church of America.

Since inception, the Endowment Fund has provided opportunities for those who wish to make life-time or longer-term charitable gifts within the framework of the Church for the benefit of its charities and organizations. Its purpose has been to enhance the outreach of the Apostolic Christian Church of America by accommodating extended gift giving situations with a means for continuous stewardship of assets that are given to the Church for the Lord's work. The mission of the Endowment Fund is to:

1. Receive and manage assets given for the long-term benefit of Apostolic Christian charities and organizations.

2. Encourage larger life-time gifts and bequests under a will by providing an organization to manage such gifts.

3. Provide an alternative for those who wish to make a gift while continuing to receive income for their lifetime.

4. Receive gifts when the donor has no specific church charity in mind, or has designated multiple church charities.

5. Provide professional assistance involving charitable gifting techniques for cash and non-cash donations.

The Endowment Fund is administered by a seven member committee appointed by the Elder Body. Their fiduciary responsibility is to oversee the management of the Fund's assets and its charitable activities in accordance with donor wishes and Church policy. Annually, financial reports are submitted to the Elder Body for their review and approval. Current members of this committee are brethren from our churches in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Missouri and Ohio.

The Endowment Fund provides opportunity for brethren and friends to give to charities and organizations of the Church through bequests in a will, trusts, charitable remainder trusts, charitable gift annuities, assignments of life insurance, and outright transfers of property including cash, stocks, bonds and real estate. While allowing for more sophisticated gift-giving techniques of a long-term nature, the intent of the Endowment Fund is also to spend principal whenever it is needed as long as there are no specific donor designations and restrictions as to principal. Contributing to the Endowment Fund can benefit both the donor and the Church in the following ways:

1. It provides for better long-term stewardship of assets given to the Church for the Lord's work now and for many years to come. 2. Lifetime income from donated assets can be retained, while saving income and estate taxes for present and future years.

3. It provides easy administration of funds going to multiple church charities and life-time beneficiaries.

4. Income can be used to assist existing Church funds, provide a long-term source of funds for ongoing projects, or provide resources for unexpected Church needs in accordance with Church policy.

The Endowment Fund is not intended to supersede the short or long-term fund-raising efforts of the other charities and organizations of the Apostolic Christian Church of America. Where endowment funds are already established for Apostolic Christian charities or organizations, brethren and friends are encouraged to contribute directly to those charitable entities rather than to the Endowment Fund.

Listed earlier are many opportunities for charitable giving to the Endowment Fund. Income tax savings will depend upon the income tax bracket of the donor, the value and holding period of the donated property, and the age of the donor and/or beneficiaries where there is an annual income payout or lifetime use of the contributed property. Donors should consult with their tax consultant prior to making any substantial gifts to determine what is most appropriate for their situation. Donors may also contact Endowment Fund committee members as they are available to assist.

that we had.

In this pulpit Bible, it said, "the Lord's promise to Solomon". The Lord did not only promise this to Solomon, He promised that to you and I today. Solomon found himself in a position where he was asked to build the house of the Lord. It wasn't permitted to his father David, but Solomon had built this house and he had finished this house. The Lord told him that this is the Lord's house. "And the Lord appeared to Solomon by night, and said unto him, I have heard thy prayer, and have chosen this place to myself for an house of sacrifice." (II Chronicles 7:12). The Lord's house.

Do we today, dear ones, cherish the Lord's house? The Lord's, as He has built? It is not the building. It is the assembly of these people that are gathered here together. The brothers and the sisters and the friends.

I offtimes think about Solomon's life. One time the Lord said to Solomon, He said, if you will ask some request unto me, I will grant it to you. And Solomon, he asked the request to be able to discern right from wrong. (I Kings 3:5-9)

If the Lord would ask you today, if you could have any request that you wanted, if you would ask for it and He would grant it to you, what would you ask for? I probably wouldn't have asked for that - right or wrong. But we analyze it, we look at it and we see how important that it was. Because we struggle with that today. We struggle with what is right and what is wrong. We really shouldn't, but a lot of times we do. We struggle with that. God was pleased that Solomon asked for that, to be able to discern right from wrong. (I Kings 3:10)

Then the Lord blessed Solomon with riches. That is something that Solomon didn't ask for. And the riches were Solomon's downfall. I ofttimes think, as I go back and think of our forefathers that came into this land and had somewhat of a struggle to establish a home, to establish a living, to establish a church, to establish a heritage. It was somewhat of a struggle for them. They probably didn't ask for riches either. But God saw their faithfulness. Because of that, He blessed them.

He blessed you and I with riches. Those of us that came on behind, He blessed us with riches. May it be that it is not our downfall, these riches that He has blessed us with. But may we use them for an advantage to draw closer to God. To use them for an advantage.

He said unto them that, "Now mine eyes shall be open, and mine ears attend unto the prayer that is made in this place. For now have I chosen and sanctified this house ... if thou wilt walk before me, as David thy father walked, and do according to all that I have commanded thee, and shalt observe my statutes and my judgments; Then will I stablish the throne of thy kingdom, according as I have covenanted with David thy father ... " (II Chronicles 7:15-18). How are we walking today? Are we walking according to His commandments and according to His statutes?

Remember, dear ones, there is a difference between walking with the commandments and the statutes of the world and with the commandments and the statutes of God. We don't want to say anything bad about the world. Because God has given you and I a wonderful place to live and to work out our salvation. We need to be thankful for that. But we need to have our priorities, that we are walking upon the spiritual walk of life.

Someone said, even the scripture says we should walk in moderation. (Philippians 4:5). But there is a tremendous difference between the moderation of the world and the moderation of the scripture. We are to be walking in the moderation of the scripture, the Holy Word of God, because we have been called. We have been called unto this way, to this marvelous life. Not of anything that we have done. Remember, dear ones, God has chosen you. God has chosen me.

I have often thought, dear ones, when we get to heaven and we stand there before our Maker and our Creator, did you ever think what might be the first question that He asks you? I thought about that a lot. I've thought that the question that He might ask me goes clear back into the Book of Genesis. He might say, where is your brother? (Genesis 4:9). Because that is what He asked the one that had murdered his brother. And the Lord knew, but He said, where is your brother? I have often thought, dear ones, that that would be the question that He might ask me.

So we are our brother's keeper. I didn't choose you. You didn't choose me. But God chose us both. We are to walk in humility. We are to walk in love. We are to walk hand in hand. So that when we get there to heaven and the Lord asks us that question, where is your brother, say he is right here with me. We came together. May it be that He would give us the grace to be able to do this.

May we keep His statutes. May we keep His commandments. We oft times think that they are becoming harder. But if they are, dear ones, it is because of us. Not because of anything that God has done. When He asked us to keep His commandments and His statutes, we look at that and we say, well, this might be difficult. But it's really not. It's really not, to keep those statutes and those commandments, if we are willing to humble ourselves. If we are willing to take up our cross. If we are willing to follow Jesus. They only become a burden if we are not willing. They only become a hard task if we want to please our self. But if we want to please God, they are really not hard to do. Because they are something that we want to do.

So may it be, as we learn from the Old Testament readings and their walk of life, it wasn't always easy. It wasn't always a bed of roses that they would have. There was a lot of joy. There was a lot of happiness. There was a lot of sadness and a lot of heartache.

I have thought, dear ones, we are here in church today. This is a happy day. I have spent a lot of wonderful days in the church. I have spent the most happy day of my life in the church in the front bench. And I have spent the saddest day in my life in the front bench. But we are here today to worship God. And to thank God, because we can have the hope of life eternal. Remember, the scripture tells us, all things work together for the good of those that love the Lord. (Romans 8:28)

So as we were reminded of Solomon, of building the house and what the Lord had told him, He tells us the same today. I believe it is probably somewhat of a struggle for those who have the oversight, the shepherds of the flock today, to keep that commitment, to keep that walk of life.

Remember, I believe it is in Matthew's gospel the seventh chapter, it says, strait and narrow is the way. (St. Matthew 7:14) When I read that, it really never bothers me too much about walking a strait way and a narrow way, because many of us were brought up and taught by our parents to walk that way. But there is a real troubling verse that just follows that, to me. It says, few there be that find it and go there at. (St. Matthew 7:14) The strait and narrow doesn't bother me. But the other verse does. That is going to take grace. That is going to take humility. That is going to take help. But we have all of the help that we need. Because it comes here from this Word.

We have read here in the reading, about the parable of the sower of the seed. I like to think, dear ones, when I read this, that that seed fell on different types of soil. I would like to talk about the soil that it fell on, the good ground. Because that is the type of ground that we need to have. If we have that type of ground, and that seed falls there, it is going to do what? It is going to produce. "...some thirty, and some sixty, and some an hundred." St. Mark 4:8.

What does it take to have good ground? What kind of soil is that? I have often thought about, I'm really not much of an expert on soil. We can do a lot today with soil, with fertilizers. We can do a lot today with chemicals and things to make land that is hardly bearing to be able to produce something good. But I like to think of good soil as something that has quite a bit of humus in it. You know where humus comes from? It comes from those things that are dead. Those things that have been cut off and have died and they are plowed under. It becomes humus and it becomes so the soil is workable.

I have to think, there is a parallel there, between that and the life of one that walks in sin. If we take all of those sins, and if we bury them, if we cut them off and if we bury them and put them in, it is kind of like a compost. They will deteriorate and they will decay and they'll be gone. But then we will have good soil. That soil is as this Word as we heard it in this morning hour. It comes forth. We could hear it. We could feed upon it. We can ask God that we could use it and apply it. Then we could be that light.

We ofttimes are reminded today, that we live in a dark world. If it is, dear ones, if this world is getting darker, it is because our light is not shining brighter. There is no doubt about that to me. So it is not the world that might be getting darker; it is our light that is being covered up a little bit and being hid. Sometimes we would just like to have the best of both worlds.

Someone said one time, it is amazing as how we always preach to be separated from the world. To walk not with the world. But isn't it amazing, how close that we do walk to the world? Isn't it amazing? May it be that He will give us grace that our light could shine bright and the world could see that light.

What brings a soul to repentance? What brings a soul to this, we always say, conviction? We say, sin. All types of sin. Those of us who grew up, had all of these things. I don't know what brought you, but I could tell you what brought me. Because when I went to church and sat in that back row, they had something I didn't have and I needed it. Because they had something I didn't have, I could see it. And I needed it.

I know the Word is supposed to show you. I know the preacher is supposed to preach it. Your Sunday School teacher is supposed to teach it. But sometimes those of us that are a little bit slow in learning, we have to see it. When we could see it, it brought a conviction because we needed it. So may it be that we could continue upon this pathway. We can sojourn down this pathway and we could keep that.

It says in Revelation about those seven churches. All of those churches had a problem. But all of those churches had something in common. Jesus said, to him that overcometh shall inherit eternal life. (Revelation 2:7). To him that overcometh. We want to be amongst the overcomers. He also said to that one church to strengthen those things that remain. (Revelation 3:2). May it be that we can all take courage today. Not be discouraged but we could take courage and battle onward and forward to that promised land. The hymn writer says, "...A few more days and I must go to meet the deeds that I have done..." (A Beautiful Life, #139, Hymns of Zion). I never would believe that life would go by so quickly. The Word tells us this. The Word explains this to us. But when I was nineteen, I thought it would be forever before I got to be sixty seven. But it was just a few days. Just a few days. And we don't know.

When I saw those four souls there last night to give their testimony, those young souls, there's some that don't even make that age. There's some that their life is required before that age. Some that age and some afterward. So we really don't know. But at best, if we are able to live out our span of life, it is quick and it is gone.

They told us last night, I had to think of those four souls about making a commitment for as long as they shall live. I thought about Daniel. Daniel was about that age of those young souls when he was taken out of his homeland and into that land and had to stand for his faith. (Daniel 1:3,4). I believe he was in his teens when that happened. And when he got thrown into the lions' den, he was in his eighties. (Daniel 6). So it wasn't always easy. The battle was always there. But Daniel was always victorious because that he knew where his help and his strength came from.

I would like to encourage the young converts today, when they talk about a long life and to be faithful. Sometimes we look at it at their age and think it is a long time. But I'd like for them to look at it, we only have to be faithful for today. Just today. We don't even know if tomorrow is going to come. If tomorrow comes, then we want to be faithful for tomorrow. But we want to take it just one day at a time. Because you know what happens, dear ones, with one day at a time? Pretty soon it is a week. Pretty soon it is a month. Pretty soon it is a year. May He grant us grace today to be faithful and to walk with Him down the pathway of life that leads to that eternal home.

It is a special delight to sing this hymn because it was written by a man many of us knew, Bro. Henry Beer of Milford, Indiana. God gave him a wonderful poetic gift. He used it. And we benefit yet today.

Concerning a son born to Bro. Samuel Froehlich, the history book, *Apostolic Christian Church History, Volume I* reads, "When on April 14, 1842, another son was born to them, Froehlich, who had come for a passing visit to Haputwil, was jailed and his wife had to pay 150 francs. From them on, he was forcibly separated from his family."

A year later the brethren petitioned the government for recognition of their church. "They resolved that the congregation should hold fast to its principles according to the Word of God, and to carry them out *whatever the cost might be.*"

The early brethren endured much persecution. In 1846, in Aargau (Switzerland), they could only meet on remote farms, or in forests, often at night. Once, after meeting deep in a forest, Bro. Froehlich wrote, "What a meeting in the middle of a forest. It was a day of joy and blessing close to the Lord. We celebrated the Lord's Supper also, and then quietly returned home."

Author Herman Reugger writes, "Repeatedly the meetings were disturbed by police who led away the teaching brothers (ministers), handcuffed like common criminals."

Standing up for one's faith (by the grace of God) was not confined to Switzerland. As the faith spread eastward into the Balkan countries, souls were jailed for refusing to bear arms. In Yugoslavia, state attitudes toward the Nazarenes (our church's name in that area), were especially harsh.

Some young men were drafted into the army, and on refusal to bear arms, were sentenced to 3-5 years in prison. On release, some went back home only to be conscripted again and sentenced to another term. Some brothers even spent a third term in prison. One can hardly imagine the burden of being sent back to prison, repeatedly.

These zealous brethren, however, did not relent (in their beliefs) and endured hardships. Their faith sustained them, and they cherished the time when they were allowed to worship together quietly. What a tremendous lesson this is for us today.

One of these brothers is prepring an account of his prison years and will include the difficulties (and spiritual blessings) of being separated from loved ones back home. He came to America and enjoyed the blessings of religious liberty.

It is difficult in America today

— in light of our constitutionally-guaranteed freedoms — to grasp the governmental harshness toward believing people. Indeed, our young men have had it very nice today in not having to serve in the military. When they did — during the past century's wars — their belief in nonresistance was respected, and they loyally served without bearing weapons.

Concerning our heritage the matter of standing for truth has not been confined to men only. When Elder Isaac Gehring first preached the gospel to a small group of people near Rittman, Ohio, in 1855, the first convert was Anna Steiner. She was the wife of the Mennonite bishop in that area. She held true to her faith. The resolve of that one soul grew into a multitude of believers at Rittman and Smithville that totaled nearly 700 in 2002.
