Sermon by Bro. Thomas Troxel, LaCrosse, IN I Chronicles 13 and The Acts 5:1-32

David, a man after God's own heart, the Word tells us (I Samuel 13:14). A man that sought after God and now in this chapter we read that he desired to have the symbol of the presence of God in the location that was back to Jerusalem (I Chronicles 13:3). I believe it would have been to Jerusalem. There was nothing in and of itself wrong with such a desire. We hope that each of us have a desire to have the presence of God in our lives.

This ark was with the children of Israel through the wilderness and had been captured by the Philistines in a battle that Saul had taken the ark out because he desired the presence of God. He was so far removed from the presence of God in heart and mind. In fact he had been rejected of God. He desired the physical presence of God in the form of the ark to help him to win this battle. And God did not honor that.

So the ark was captured and it was taken into the Philistines camp there, wherever it was. If I remember right, strange things happened. Very strange things happened. Their gods were broken down and the ark remained (I Samuel 5). It got to the point where they found a mother cow that had a calf and they put this ark on a cart and drove this cow away from her calf, which is against nature, because a mother would have always wanted to stay by her calf (I Samuel 6:7-f 2). But anyway, they drove this ark because the presence of God was not something they could stand. They did not want to submit to it.

So we read in this chapter that, "And David consulted with the captains of thousands and hundreds, and with every leader." (I Chronicles 13:1). Dear ones, when we want the presence of God, we need to consult with His Word, consult with the right sources. Because he was given bad - he was not given the whole picture, the whole story. Because there was commandment in the law, that when the ark was moved the Levite tribe and the priests, they gathered it on sticks, I believe it was three on each side and they walked with the ark. It was not in a cart.

As this ark was in the cart and the oxen stumbled and Uzza tried to keep the ark from falling, we see that he put his hand up to the ark and he was smitten with death (I Chronicles 13:9-10). David went then and he did his homework, so to speak, and a couple chapters later they bring the ark back and they bring it back in the old-fashioned way, where the priests carried it by hand, the way that was instructed, instead of the easy way of having it on wheels and bring it in (I Chronicles 15).

In the life that we live, there are many, many things in life that we have found ways to make easier. Dear ones, the way to the Father's heart is never changed. To try to find an easier way, one that would be more convenient, one that would have wheels and be a faster way to get there may not be the right way. So we are thankful that God's Word is kept in store, that when we feel moved as David felt moved, and we trust it would be on a daily basis and a moment by moment basis, to have the presence of God in our lives, in our heart, we can come to Him in humility and experience the blessings of Him.

We read here then, something kind of sums this chapter up and it is a lesson for us. "And the ark of God remained with the family of Obededom in his house three months. And the Lord blessed the house of Obededom, and all that he had." (I Chronicles 13:14).

There is no one, I believe, that has the presence of God in their life that cannot feel the blessings of Him. Cannot feel the blessings. Because there may be times where there is a distance and there may be times where ultimately the presence of God is a blessing. We know that the psalmist David, he said, "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want." (Psalm 23). Just what did he mean then? He meant that the presence of the Lord as a shepherd in our life is better than all the other stuff the world has to offer. I shall not

Light From The Word

Participation in Social Activism

There is little doubt that in America today there is a serious decline in traditional morality. Although we claim to be a nation "under God", there is a clear trend away from the Christian influence which in the past formed the foundation of our social-moral outlook.

The degree to which our nation's moral structure is weakening can often be distressing to believers in Christ. The very fact that 1.5 million babies are aborted each year causes anguish in a believer's heart. Likewise, the growing promotion of homosexuality, the high incidence of venereal disease, the availability of pornography, and the general anti-Christian bias and moral wantonness in the arts and media are dismaying to those seeking to uphold biblical truth.

The rapid rate of moral decline and family breakdown may tempt a believer to become involved in social action. Distraught hearts may be drawn into the fray of public discourse, attempting to better society through various means of confronting the forces of social decline, without considering the many implications of such activity.

It may be helpful to view the present social decay from a historical perspective. Many nations have never known the influence of biblical truth as part of their moral foundation. In addition to abortion, some have practiced infanticide and left their elderly to die unattended. Moreover, in some societies, acts of public sexuality were commonplace. History indicates that war, plunder and "ethnic cleansing" took place on the soil of many nations. Political depotism, injustice and religious persecution resulted in victims being tortured, beheaded, and burned at the stake. They had no civil rights. However, we live in a democracy which retains a sense of fairness and justice and still guarantees religious freedom.

Much more importantly we should view this subject from a biblical perspective. The Lord Jesus' short life span was during a time of harsh political oppression. There was no democracy. A rigid class system favored the ruling elite. Slavery existed along with other grave social injustices. Individuals who did not conform to the rigid standards of oppressive rulers were unmercifully persecuted.

Yet, Jesus quietly endured these inequities. He did not offer an agenda of social and political reform. He said, "If my kingdom were of this world, then would my servants fight" (John 18:36). His vision pointed beyond this short life. His focus was on that long and endless eternity; and He promised a home in heaven for all who would humbly repent for their sins and follow Him.

The mission for followers of Christ remains the same today. The primary objectives of the church are first, saving souls and then, nurturing them spiritually in the warm bond of brotherhood, so they can overcome sin and remain faithful until life's end.

Entering into the fray of social activism presents many risks for the devout Christian. Almost invariably this results in strife and contention. The Apostle Paul taught Timothy that "...the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient" (II Tim. 2:24). He also said that the "good soldier of Jesus Christ" does not entangle himself with the "affairs of this life" (II Tim. 2:4). The arenas of social activism are not conducive to the virtues of restraint and gentleness. Instead there are outbursts of temper and strong, self-willed expressions which bring reproach to the name of Christ. The Word teaches, "Make no friendship with an angry man; and with a furious man thou shalt not go" (Prov. 22:24).

Loud, boisterous and partisan demonstrations are manifestations of the works of the flesh (reveling and variance) and are in no way reflective of Christ's gentleness and lowliness of mind. Even a calm show of force (as in an orderly march) is nonetheless a form of intimidation and can cause a contentious reaction.

Perhaps one of the most distressing


changes in our society is the loss of respect for biblically-based truths. There seems to be a growing hostility toward Christian values. Many consider organized efforts to promote Christian influence as an imposition by the "religious right" which is deeply resented.

What can be done? If sincere believers seek to be the "salt of the earth" and the "light of the world" (Matt. 5:13-14), the true and gentle spirit of Christ will enable them to offer constructive and meaningful influence. First and foremost should be sincere prayers for "all that are in authority; that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty" (I Tim. 2:1-2). Believers can also convey thoughtful suggestions to public officials and teachers, write respectable letters of concern to elected legislators. and record their preferences at the ballot box. Creative ideas, void of extremes, can be forwarded to an array of decision-makers. These low-key actions can allow a separated believer to exert an effective influence in society while maintaining the respect of fellow citizens in a Christ-like manner.

All power is of God (Rom. 13:1). It is He who installs and replaces political power. The Bible teaches the believer that no matter what state he is in he should be content (Phil. 4:11). We can be very thankful that even in the midst of a time of deterioration, the true believer can find contentment. We can also be comforted by the assurance that "where sin abounded, grace did much more abound" (Rom. 5:20).

The cautious, low-key approach advocated by our church does not imply submission to any earthly authority or ordinance which would require our disobedience to God's Word. If this conflict should arise someday, we must say as Peter, "We ought to obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29), no matter what the cost. We can be assured that we will be able to withstand every test and trial, if we put our trust in the power of God and walk in humble obedience to His Word.

Pointing Them Toward Christ

hildren in Mexico, Jamaica and Haiti are seeing the love of Christ here on earth through the donors in the World Relief Child Sponsorship program. Your monthly donation allows each child an opportunity to hear about Christ and receive a good education. The monthly donation covers a part of the teacher's salary, school supplies, uniforms, books, a Bible and sometimes food. In Haiti, some of the children can hardly make the long walk to school and back because of being malnourished. At one of the schools, they implemented a lunch program (rice and beans) to nourish the children so they are able to study and most of all, to survive.

In Haiti this past October, the Child Sponsorship board had an opportunity to visit some MEBSH and Living Word schools. The students, teachers and administration were an encouragement to us by showing a love for the Lord and a thankful attitude. On our way down the mountain from the Zabo school we stopped at one of the sponsored students and she sang a solo for us. A little further down the mountain we stopped at another student's home and we were invited in to the home and garden. We walked through trees and plants to their the two room home (approx. 12 ft x 16 ft) and looked around. We found two books- a children's Bible Storybook and a Bible. We could not speak Creole, but the language of Jesus is common to all who know Him. As we left, the family had us wait until they could give us a dozen grapefruits from their tree.

It must seem like a dream come true for the children to be sponsored

by people such as you! The children and their needy families pray and pray for someone to sponsor them. When they open their correspondence letter from you and sometimes even a picture of you, their hearts are truly touched.



When a child is not sponsored, it costs the parents of some of the children sixty cents for one month's education. Many of the parents can not even afford sixty cents a month for their child to go to school. They also, in many cases, can not even afford to purchase one pencil for their child; therefore the child can not remain in school. When we distributed pens, pencils and candy in the Haitian schools (donated to World Relief by generous brethren), you would have thought we were passing out hundred dollar bills. For some of them, it allowed them to attend school.

Isn't it amazing, the love of Jesus? How poor, needy students can be so happy, so content, and expressing the love of Christ so much. It is a lesson for us.

Individually, we may not be able to change the social structures and injustices that cause poverty. In fact, it is unlikely that we will. Jesus said that we would always have the poor among us (John 12:8). But what we do for those students is important to each child and to the Lord. We thank each of you for sponsoring children through the Apostolic Christian Child Sponsorship program. You are truly making a difference to these children and give them a hope for their future and most of all, pointing them toward Christ.

Sowing and Reaping in India

The Rural Gospel and Medical A Missions of India is headquartered in Nasik. India and was founded in 1938 by Dr. B.B. Bhagwat and his wife. The Bhagwats had a heart for the people of rural India and labored in this area for over 30 years. As their health declined, they sought an organization that would serve as a trustee of their facilities and assets. On a visit to Ohio, they become exposed to the Apostolic Christian Church and recognized many practices of our church similar to the one they had established in India. Most importantly, the message of salvation was proclaimed.

After numerous inquiries and visits to other churches, they made a formal request to our Elder Body that the Apostolic Christian Churches of America become the beneficiary of their estate upon their demise. After their deaths in the early 1980's, a seven member board of directors was appointed by the Elder Body to manage the assets of the Bhagwats and provide spiritual counseling and guidance for the work in India. Numerous trips have been made by Elder brothers to India to assist in this work.

Dr. Surrendra Parkhe is the current mission administrator and also serves as pastor of the Nasik church. The mission consists of three churches located in an area 75 miles northeast of Bombay, India. In addition to the three churches located in large cities, the mission also has a number of prayer halls in various small rural villages. These locations are served by three pastors and eight evangelists who conduct regular services each week with a varying time schedule to meet the needs of all the believers located in the rural area.

The mission has a medical arm that is served by two physicians and several nurses. Medical facilities consist of three clinics and a small hospital. A mobile medical van makes weekly visits to the rural areas. The normal procedure is to have a Scripture reading by an evangelist to the line of patients waiting to be treated.



Another area the mission serves is operating boarding homes for orphans and children of mission workers. Children range in age from 6 to 20 and are provided room, board, and clothing. They attend a nearby school in the day and then have activities and are taught stories from the Bible in the evenings. The children also learn hymns and memorize Bible verses. The goal of the mission is that each of them will learn about God and His son. Jesus Christ. It is so encouraging when they repent of their sins, become converted and serve the Lord.

One young man who came to the boarding home was Kisan Radho Khardikar. He was born into a Hindu family in a small village about 100 miles from Bombay. Kisan was the youngest of four children and very early in his life his parents and his oldest sister died. His other sister brought him and his brother to the RGMMI boarding home at Khardi. He was taught about Jesus Christ from the house father and pastor who were responsible for taking care of the children.

Kisan developed physically and spiritually in the good environment of the Mission Boarding Home. After finishing school, he enrolled in tailoring school at Sangli which was 500 miles away from the RGMMI boarding home. He studied hard and became an expert tailor. After completing his studies he returned to the Nasik area and attended the RGMMI church located on the compound. He soon repented and was baptized in the RGMMI church. He began stitching clothes for the mission's boarding boys and also started teaching the leprosy patients in a nearby asylum.

After several years, Kisan built a small kiosk adjacent to the Mission compound on Nasik road and started a business that soon flourished. He married a young nurse and they have been blessed with three children. Several years ago his wife repented and was baptized at the Nasik RGMMI church. The Khardikar family is such a rich source of love and inspiration to the other boarding children located at Nasik as well as others they interact with. Kisan states that our Lord has been extra kind and merciful to him and his family and they are always grateful to Him.

Accounts such as this illustrate the fruit that comes when the word of God can be planted in the hearts of young and tender souls. May we continue to pray for the work of RGMMI as the spiritual workers labor in a country where Christianity faces persecution.

want-the presence of the Lord, the blessing of the Lord in our life is better than all that the world can offer.

There was a time in history where there were just a few that knew what the Word of God was, what the Commandments were. The scribes and the Pharisees recorded this and there were just a few. They didn't have, in times past, and really it isn't even that long ago, perhaps our grandmothers and grandfathers barely knew how to read. And our greatgrandfathers and grandmothers, maybe perhaps almost all of them didn't even know how to read- or didn't have access to learning.

This is a time and a place where as we look at the historical perspective of the Word of God, perhaps it was similar in that day. Where there were just a few that were able to gain the access to God by knowing, by being able to read and understand what the Word of God is and what it means.

So God was plenteous in mercy and compassionate. Willing that none should be lost. He had ways and means of gaining the attention of mankind, of you and I, As we read these stunning accounts of the power of God, even as great fear fell on them (Acts 5:11), surely, as we know that God is the same yesterday, today and forever, a fear of God can fall upon us as well. Because God is all omnipotent, all powerful, all knowing. Yet He is, as we read at the middle of this chapter where we finished. He has been so kind and merciful to give us a way of escape. A way of escaping the destination that unconverted man is destined to. A way of escaping damnation and condemnation.

This is a merciful God because how many times in the wilderness can we read the children came from Egypt and were going to a promised land, a land that God promised would be full of freedom, full of milk and honey, just an abundance (Exodus 3:8). There were cities there that they just had to take. God was going to deliver this all unto them. And as they got into the hard times, God was still there as a pillar of fire at night and a cloud in the morning (Exodus 13:21). He was there all the time. But the people saw the hard times. They began to murmur and they began to wish they were back to Egypt, where at least they were able to have food (Exodus 16:2,3). They were grumbling and groaning, not mentioning the fact that they were slaves.

As time went, as Moses was beginning to be raised up, they had to find their own straw and they had to make just as many bricks (Exodus 5:1-9). Their life was miserable. It was miserable! It was unbearable! Yet they looked back and they could only remember the good things of that miserable life.

"The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want." (Psalm 23). When we have the Lord as our Shepherd, it is always better. It is always better than what the world has to offer. Always better. Always better. There is a peace that no one can take from us. And God promises in His Word that He will provide. He will provide for our daily needs.

So as we read, in our first chapter, of God's omnipotent power and presence. He is a God of order. He expects us to be able to submit our ways unto His ways and come to a good end by doing this. In and of itself, had David been able to bring that ark back without the presence of the Levites or priests as it was dictated in the law there, and gain the presence of God that way in the symbolic way of bringing that ark back, what would the need have been for the priests and the Levites in the future? God is a God of order and He has placed people and things and ordered everything for one purpose. One purpose. So that many can be saved. Many can be saved.

The way of salvation is the same today as it was for our great, great and however many greats you want to put on it - grandfathers. But there are no grandchildren in heaven. So each and everyone of us has to come this way of salvation through Jesus Christ and experience the power of Christ's atoning blood to relieve us from the miserable life of sin. The miserable life of sin.

Are we any different than those? There are sometimes when we may look back and think that it was better before. May it be a fleeting thought. May it be a temptation that Satan would put into us. The psalmist said, lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. Let's not let that thought ever remain. Let it fly through like the bird flying through a tree. As it has been said before, not give the bird a place to make a nest and later turn it into evil.

So we read in this second chapter, of a day and time where the presence of God at the beginning of the establishing of the churches was a powerful presence. Here were two early believers, Ananias and Sapphira, who wanted to give the appearance that they wanted to serve God with their whole heart and their whole possessions (Acts 5:1.2). And their whole possessions. Because the church at that time was a communal type arrangement for whatever reason. Whoever needed was given and whoever had excess gave. Everyone was supplied.

Here we see how two individuals came. They had sold a possession. They had agreed to tell how much they were giving and lie about how much they were keeping back (Acts 5:2). It was within their own power to keep back. All they had to do was to tell the truth. To tell the truth. And once again, the church of God was just as in David's time. God will

never be mocked. God will never be mocked. He knows all things. He sees all things. He knows our lives in and out. Sometimes we are in denial of that. But God will not be mocked.

Here, as these two wanted to give the false impression that they were more than what they were, the Holy Spirit condemned that mind set. And the power of God was exacted, just as Uzza, in his innocent way, tried to help to stabilize the ark, fell dead right there, so did Ananias and Sapphira (I Chronicles 13:10, Acts 5:5,10). In both chapters we read that great fear came upon the people (I Chronicles 13:2, Acts 5:5). Great fear.

God could do this very same thing today. He certainly could. We trust that His mercy will be greater than His vengeance in our lives. That He gives us another chance to come through the blood of Jesus and repent. Repent for our sins. But you know, as we look at this historically, if the church of God would have been built upon falsehoods, the church that we have today would not have stood. Would not have stood.

If we could have read a little farther here, we read of how there was such an uproar. Of how the truth was being established and it was grounded. We can't go against Jesus Christ and Him crucified. That is the most powerful, grounding foundation of the world and of each of us. They wanted to try to find a way to dismiss this. The scribes and the Pharisees wanted to try - well really it was Satan working through wanted to find a way to minimize and extinct the truth of God. And the wise Gamaliel, who had taught the Apostle Paul, said, if this is of God, there is nothing you can do to stop it. If it is of God, there is nothing you can do to stop it. And if it isn't of God, it will be like the several different examples of people who led

up factions to go out and to do their own thing and they were all gone. When the individual died that led the faction, so did the movement. (Acts 5:34-39)

Dear ones, this is not what has happened to Christianity. This is not. It is living proof. There can be no stronger proof that God is and He sent His Son Jesus to die for the sins of mankind than the very fact that this way of salvation is alive and well and souls are still being called by God. By the fear of God and the recognition of condemnation.

Hell is an awful place. It is more awful than we could ever begin to imagine. There is a consciousness in hell that will be forever. We know that from the parable - not the parable because it is a true story - of the rich man and Lazarus. As Lazarus was in the bosom of Abraham and the rich man was in hell and the mighty gulf was between them, and the rich man could not come out of that place, he consciously knew what was going on. He said, let me go back to my brothers and tell them how many torments there are in this place. (St. Luke 16:19-31)

Oh the mighty gulf that God did span. He gave the way of escape, the way of salvation. We read of it here.

"Then Peter and the other disciples answered and said, We ought to obey God rather than men." (Acts 5:29). God has provided. Is there confusion? When Jesus was talking to His disciples, He said, do you understand? (Let's paraphrase a little.) Do you understand the meaning of this? And they said yes Lord. Jesus would have told them one hundred thousand times if it would have taken that for them to understand. And to understand what it is to obey God rather than man.

Jesus is the perfect example. The perfect life of obedience to God rather than men. Countless times Satan would have had Him. We think of the time where he went out in the wilderness. But countless times Satan would have had Him use the power of God to his own ways and means. Every time Jesus denied Himself and took up the cross, so to speak, and followed and obeyed God rather than men.

"The God of our fathers raised up Jesus, whom ye slew and hanged on a tree." (Acts 5:30). The tomb is empty. Jesus Christ is not in that tomb. The Word tells us many times that He is at the right hand of God interceding for us. He is alive, interceding for us, knowing our tests and trials and waiting for us to ask for help. He would go to the Father and find a way that we could have help in this time or need that we have.

"Him hath God exalted with his right hand to be a Prince and a Saviour, for to give repentance to Israel, and forgiveness of sins." (Acts 53 1). We are such a fortunate people to be living in this day of grace. The moment of time has passed where history and spiritual reawakening has happened. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Then the Lord knew that no man is an island. There was a day where -I've said it before, forgive me for saving it - I thought I could take a canoe and cross the Atlantic ocean and make it to England on a journey all by myself. I was told that would be very risky. Chances of you making that destination are slim to nothing. So God established the churches. He established the churches whereby we can come together and in heart and spirit and mind, by the power of the Holy Spirit, come to agree on what is beneficial for our soul's estate as we live and walk here on this earth. What are the things that are pitfalls? What are those carts that will seemingly bring the ark and the blessing of God into our lives but are really contrary to God's will? This is part of the many functions of the church that we are so blessed to be a part of that. The truth has been established

and maintained.

You can't add to the truth. You can't add to it. It is. It stands on its own. So the way of salvation for us and the way of salvation for those that have gone on before us is the same. That in itself also is living proof of God's faithfulness to each of us.

"And by the hands of the apostles were many signs and wonders wrought among the people; "and they were all with one accord in Solomon's porch." (Acts 5:12). Dear ones, what variance was to be gained? Their spiritual needs were totally fulfilled in this way of life they embarked upon. Were totally fulfilled.

"And of the rest durst no man join himself to them: but the people magnified them. And believers were the more added to the Lord, multitudes both of men and women." (Acts 5:13,14). You see, there was four hundred and some odd years of just darkness in this world. It was just darkness. There was this hope of the Savior coming. There was spiritual darkness. It is a testimony of God's faithfulness that Ananias and Simeon and the shepherds and the wise men were still looking, after four hundred and some years, for the Savior to come. There were still those that kept the truth and passed it on to their generations; that God was going to bring light into this world. He did it. He did it. And now the light has come. And there were multitudes of men and women who wanted to leave there darkness behind and come into the light of God. Come into the light.

We know they came by repentance. Sin is darkness. Evil is darkness. When we confess that sin and believe that the Son of God, Jesus Christ, when He gave His life, there is no remission of sin except there be a sacrifice of blood. His blood was sufficient. And now we read here that multitudes, both men and women, believed that God is. That this is the way, the truth and the light. Multitudes came from darkness into the light. Into the light. Dear ones, we can be so thankful that those multitudes did.

It doesn't take but a few generations of darkness. The Lord can bring back the light. Dear ones, the darkness is a powerful thing, but not nearly as powerful as the light. Not nearly. God is all powerful. We have heard it said before that Satan is mighty, but God is almighty. Dear ones, to have the Almighty caring for us, watching over us as our Shepherd, recognizing that with Him there is no want.

This continues an 8-part series on church practices. The following are excerpts from booklets distributed to Sunday School teachers by Apostolic Christian Publishing in Eureka, Illinois.

CLOSED COMMUNION

In America today there are widely divergent Christian groups. Pluralism and diversity seem to be the hallmarks of our time. It's fair to conclude there are some falsehoods and error. It's also possible that some who profess Christ may have sin in their lives.

To insure, as much as possible, that only worthy souls take communion, this rite has been open only to baptized souls (within our church) who have sincerely examined themselves prior to taking part in this very sacred service.

Preparation

Contingent on a believer properly taking Holy Communion is that he be ready, or "worthy," to actually take it. One does not arbitrarily participate, but must be in a state of readiness. This does not imply one has to be perfect to take communion. One must, however, be free of willful sin, be walking in a state of grace and be at peace with God and man.

One must also, through the grace of God, be living in separation from the world of sin. The Apostle Paul instructs, "Wherefore whosoever shall eat of this bread, and drink of this cup of the Lord unworthily, shall be guilty of the body and blood of the Lord" (I Corinthians 11:27) and "For he that eateth and drinketh unworthily, eateth and drinketh damnation to himself, not discerning the Lord's body" (I Corinthians 11:29).

If a person would take communion unworthily two things result: (1) he is guilty of the body and blood of the Lord, and (2) he eateth and drinketh damnation to himself. This is very serious. Can the church, in good conscience and in obedience to Scriptures, allow just anyone to participate in view of the Bible's high standards regarding this ceremony?

For Members Only

In "closed" communion, this service is confined to members of a particular denomination. This policy is not for the purpose of exclusion, but is more a recognition of the solemn fact there are Biblical requirements for participation in the life of true Christian brotherhood. Can a church, in good conscience and in obedience to Scriptures, allow persons to take Holy Communion indiscriminately? One would have to ignore the Apostle's teaching to do so.

A noted historian once wrote: "Closed communion is made necessary by the fact that not all Christian groups today require strictly Christian standards; that is, some denominations definitely tolerate sub-Christian standards on the part of their members. If all Christian denominations had identical standards for a high Christian life including separation unto God and nonconformity to the world, there would be no occasion for closed communion."

Brotherhood

Before one can truly gain a clear grasp of why a policy of closed communion should be maintained, he must fully understand the concept of brotherhood as it relates to the precepts of the body of Christ — the church.

The church, in reality, is a brotherhood consisting of brothers and sisters in the Lord. They are members one of another, and each esteems the other over himself. Thus, when brethren join together for the sacred act of Holy Communion, they should join do so with a sense of oneness, both in doctrine and practice. It would be inconsistent, as well as contradictory, if the table of communion was open arbitrarily to any professed believer. If this occurred, the communion with the Lord would not be a common one, nor would the various communicants be perfectly joined together, or united in the likeminded way that is so enriching to the truly converted, and from which we as a church have benefited so much over the years.

If communion was "open", all degrees of religious thought and attitude would be unnaturally mingled together, and the oneness taught by Scriptures would not

be reali ed. Probably, many would be taking oly Communion *unworthily*, which the Bible teaches against. If left open to all, the church might be granting a false security to certain persons by giving recognition they are Christian when, in fact, they are not — never having repented for their sins. Perhaps they might be converted — perhaps not. For those who would not be, the church would be unintentionally acknowledging they are. This would be wrong.

If, by such an open communion policy, occasionally a sinner took communion, the church cannot overlook the Scripture found in I Timothy 5:22: "*neither be partakers of other men's sins.*"

To keep this rite a holy and Godly one patterned after Scriptures, to insure brethren observe it "in common" and to maintain the Scriptural command that all take it *worthily*, closed communion is the only way a church can confine this sacred ritual to those whom the church feels are truly converted. And too, closed communion helps shield our doctrine from falsehoods.

Our forefathers, since the beginning of our church in the early 1800's, saw the value in holding to a high standard, both in maintaining sound doctrine, and in conducting a communion ceremony that was in accord with the Bible's teachings.

It is a particularly wise policy today due to the widespread proliferation of Christian diversity, and varying winds of doctrinal teaching.

"Rejoice in the Lord" Elder Bro. Willis Ehnle, Shioda, Japan

If you wait to rejoice until there isn't anything to be sad about, you will never rejoice. Philippians 4:4 reads, "Rejoice in the Lord always: and again I say, Rejoice."

Paul and Silas had been beaten and thrust into the inner prison when they "Prayed and sang praises unto God." (Acts 16:25). They rejoiced in the Lord under difficult circumstances.

In the book of Habakkuk, 3:17, we read, "Although the fig tree shall not blossom, neither shall fruit be in the vines; the labour of the olive shall fail, and the fields shall yield no meat; the flock shall be cut off from the fold, and there shall be no herd in the stalls; Yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will joy in the God of my salvation."

The Lord Jesus Christ said, as recorded in John 16:33, "In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world."

Every day is not wonderful." I obliged, but it is hard on me to change my routine.

To those of you who are depressed, I do not mean to criticize you. We cannot always control our own feelings. However, in the midst of your depression, please try to think about how wonderful it is that we can see, we can hear, and we can think. The Apostle Paul encourages us to think about good things, as much as possible. "If there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." (Philippians 4:8).

There are different kinds of rejoicing and our rejoicing should be of a pure nature. We should be happy that we are redeemed. God loves us. Let's trust Him.

As a child, my mother taught me this poem. "It's easy enough to be happy, When life flows along like a song. But the man worth while, Is the man that can smile, When everything goes dead wrong."

The Bible tells us to rejoice in the Lord. By the grace of God, we hope to fulfill that teaching. If you wait to rejoice until there isn't anything to be sad about, you will never rejoice.
